Longtime Islander recalled

Many long-time residents of Salt Spring Island remember Mary Brenton as the organizer of community concerts and plays. Others, like her niece, Dorothy Harris, remember her as a Salt Spring Island school teacher in the earlier part of this century.

There are not many people, however, who can recall Mary Brenton attending school at the turn-of-the-century Burgoyne Bay building.

Mary, who was born on Salt Spring in 1894, died late last year at Greenwoods care home. She was 93 years old.

Dorothy Harris and her brother, Bob Akerman, recall their aunt as a quiet woman with a great deal of "gumption."

Mary was born to Salt Spring Island pioneer Micheal Gyves, an Irishman, and a Native Indian princess who later became known as Granny Gyves. Mary and her brother Micheal and sister Ellen (later Ellen Akerman) grew up in the Fulford valley, attending the Burgoyne Bay school where Mary later taught.

People, classes recalled as Newman leaves post

Virginia Newman has mixed feelings about retiring from her work with the Continuing Education office on Salt Spring. After 12 years of part- and full-time work there, she says she has met a lot of interesting people — and experienced a lot of fascinating courses.

But, as the Continuing Education office closes its doors for the summer, Newman is leaving the job and preparing to direct more energy into her other interests and activities.

Newman, who was recently awarded a lifetime membership to a provincial group of individuals involved with adult education, has spent many years organizing and running the Continuing Education program on Salt Spring. She says she has met numerous interesting people through the job: individuals who have come to the island and immediately taken a night course with the intention of meeting people with similar interests.

"That's exactly what I did," she recalls.

What is now known as Continuing Education evolved from being tagged *Night Courses* and *Adult Education* before emerging under its present-day title. The courses offered today, Newman says, are not restricted to either the night, or to adults.

Newman recalls many unique courses offered by the program — classes dealing with items such as dream interpretation, women's

needs, and small business start-up — as well as those provided on a regular basis. The program provides a range of courses in music (listening to music, singing, jazz, classical), languages, dance, cooking and wine-making.

Cooking classes, which involve everything from ethnic and health food to microwave techniques, are always fun, Newman says. Participants, who eat what they cook, have been known to create a candlelight and wine atmosphere for the consumption of their products.

On the more serious side of the Continuing Education program, classes are offered in high school upgrading for those who did not complete high school, or for those interested in "brushing-up" in a particular area. These classes — General Education Development, or GED — are offered to people of all ages.

Some 20 applicants are being interviewed to fill the position being vacated by Newman. An assistant will also be hired.

When Newman took on the job full-time, her husband, Ray Newman, left his part-time work to assist her on a volunteer basis. Ray Newman performed much of the paperwork, while his wife dealt with the "people-side" of things.

Newman says she is looking at her retirement as an opportunity to direct greater energy into her other activities, such as performing with the "Raging Grannies" group on Salt Spring.

Undesirable precedent?

Public hearing debates subdivision rezoning

SOUTH GALIANO — Most of the two hours of the Galiano Island Trust Committee meeting held in the Community Hall on Friday, June 17, was devoted to considering a proposal to rezone for subdivision an 11-acre lot belonging to Shari Street at the bottom of Morgan Road.

At the public hearing neighbours objected to the application on the grounds that granting the request would create a precedent for similar applications, and that the area was predominately one of small holdings of over 10 acres. Bob Knowles of the APC noted that, although he personally was not against the proposal, some members of the APC were also concerned that an undesirable precedent might be created.

When the Trust Committee came to discuss the rezoning bylaw, it became evident that the main difficulty was the designation of the property as Agricultural Land Reserve. The Land Commission was criticized for its decision that the parcel should remain in the ALR but that it had no objection to the configuration of the proposed subdivision and, by implication, the rezoning.

However, this is at variance with commission policy that the minimum size for a viable agricultural parcel is 10 acres. Under these restrictions the subdivision might work to the disadvantage of the applicant, as only one dwelling would be allowed on each parcel and no guest cottage, resulting in some non-conforming features.

Expressing sympathy for the

applicant, the trustees decided against proceeding with the bylaw until the Land Commission clarifies its position and decides whether the property is to remain within the ALR. If the commission removes the parcel from the ALR, the trustees anticipate no obstacle to changing the zoning from agricultural to residential.

It was revealed that by a resolution without meeting, the committee had agreed to a modification of the development permit obtained by former owners of Galiano Lodge and inherited by the present owners. The change will downgrade the scale of development and permit the construction of 15 units instead of the original 70. This should result in a collective sigh of relief. Such RWM's tend to slip by unnoticed, although the chairman observed that they are usually submitted to the APC for comment and that any major change would be brought to a public meeting.

Applications for Crown Leases (water zones) included one from Galiano Fishing Charters for Saltery Bay. The granting of this lease will depend upon whether the applicant is able to have the adjacent foreshore zoned commercial.

Notice was given of another proposal for rezoning in an eight-acre parcel of valley land on Georgeson Bay Road. This land is also in the ALR and zoned Agricultural. A syndicate of the

Walkers, the Hoebels and Connie Kennedy is investigating the possibility of developing a country inn on this site. It has been determined by an agronomist that two acres of this parcel lacks soil and is unsuitable for agricultural and they would apply to have this rezoned C2. There will be more comment on this interesting proposal when time and space permit.

Later that Sunday at 7:30 pm, friends of the Maclures are invited to the church to see slides and hear their

comments of their most recent tour of relief duty in Africa, from which they returned three months ago.



NORTH GALIANO - The North Galiano Volunteer Fire Department now has an auxiliary. At a meeting held in the North Hall recently, Fire Chief Ted Waterman listed things an auxiliary could do at the fire hall so that the firemen could better concentrate on fire-fighting.

Dispatching from the fire hall, checking pump equipment regularly, building and grounds maintenance, updating the water resource and road map — these were some of the jobs listed. The building of storage shelves to hold equipment in the fire hall and the construction of a shed nearby to hold extra equipment are also necessary jobs slated for the near future.

Close to a dozen people attended the meeting and from them came volunteers to take on most of the jobs. A steering committee of four — Ellen

Coward, Terry Wishart, Miriam Bings and Arne Haksi — was named to organize action for the group.

As in the past, fund-raising will be looked after by the North Galiano Community Association. The two groups are, in fact, one. A supporter of the Community Hall is a supporter of the volunteer firemen, and vice versa.

Twenty-five years ago

• Sixteen people turned out for a public meeting held at Mahon Hall to discuss the forthcoming school referendum. At least half of those present at the meeting were involved in its organization; two others were reporters, leaving six voters interested enough in the spending of \$179,246 to hear the matter discussed publicly.

• In a regular meeting of the school board, trustees agreed to suspend bus drivers involved in future school bus accidents from operating the buses until investigations had been completed.

In other matters, the board received a letter from a Fulford mother asking for a kindergarten addition to the school. The board responded by indicating it had already gone on record favouring the formation of such a class.

• A *Driftwood* contributor said: "It is a shame that school district 64 has short-changed itself for so long."

In that year, it was noted, the district had given away 1.75 mills (\$19,000) to provide school buildings elsewhere in the province. It kept 1.25 mills (\$13,600) for itself. The school district could have had required buildings more than four years previous, when the province adopted the policy of tax for education.

Twenty years ago

• Islanders were preparing, along with the rest of the country, to vote in a federal election. Seeking the Nanaimo-Cowichan-The-Islands seat were: Colin Cameron (NDP); Jeffery Brock (Conservative); Lorne Lee (Social Credit); and Mladen Zorkin (Liberal).

Cameron had held the seat for the previous three sittings of parliament. He had been involved in politics for 31 years.

• The road from Pioneer Village in Ganges to the commercial centre was in the process of being widened.

The previous week, the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce discussed the problems of constructing a sidewalk, and the lack of any walkway provision. The road was to be widened with adequate provision made for Ganges Village residents to reach Ganges.

• Seventeen Salt Spring Island sheep breeders met at Fulford Hall to explore the benefits that could be achieved should they form an association.

After lively discussions concerning industry problems, the group unanimously voted to form the Salt Spring Island Sheep Breeder's Association. Mike Larmour was elected president, and Jim Stewart was picked as vice-president.

• Ganges should be incorporated as a village, the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce was told.

W.M.Mouat made the recommendation when he addressed the regular chamber meeting. "We are losing many thousands of dollars a year because we are not getting the per-capita grants from the government," he told the group.

• Salt Spring Island was the centre of "construction fever," *Driftwood* reported. Contractors were "run off their feet" as both commercial and residential construction boomed.

• The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce gave its support for a private airstrip on Salt Spring. President C.W. Hatch introduced a resolution supporting the Burgoyne Valley airstrip, which had been under vigorous fire both on and off the island.

Hatch noted that only one resident within a quarter mile of Gordon Cudmore's property was opposed to the proposal. He further indicated the impossibility of the strip ever becoming a public field.

Ten years ago

• The Legion blood donor clinic attracted more than 200 people: when the last ounce was squeezed, 217 pints were counted.

The Rotary, RCMP and the Legion won the trophy for the most donations per group.

• Taxes payable by Gulf Islanders had risen dramatically since 1976. In three years, the average tax bill climbed from \$584.94 to \$816.76.

The school tax for 1976 was \$353.97, compared to \$553.38 in the current year.

• Fire protection of South Pender Island would be the subject of a public meeting on the island.

Residents would be asked to indicate their preference for or against the funding of a volunteer fire brigade to serve the island.

• The bean supper at Fulford Hall drew 250 people to the 25th annual "gastronomic delight." Consumption ran to 73 pounds of beans, 97 pies, 468 buns, and 13 pounds of coffee.

The event raised \$265, with the profit to be directed towards Beaver Point Hall maintenance.

Five years ago

• Following a heated and sometimes light-hearted debate, the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee rejected the school district's application for rezoning of the Fulford school property, which lies in the the Stowell Lake watershed.

Representatives of various groups and individuals appealed to the Trust to reject the rezoning application to protect the watershed.

• An 84-seat Vosper Hovermarine was expected to begin making trial runs in the Gulf Islands early in July.

Details of the vessel's schedule had not been worked out, but the present plans called for stops between Sidney and all of the major Gulf Islands.

• The future of the abandoned Fulford school site would be

decided at an upcoming school board meeting. Board chairman Charles Hingston said the property could either be traded or it could be used as a golf course, among other permitted uses.

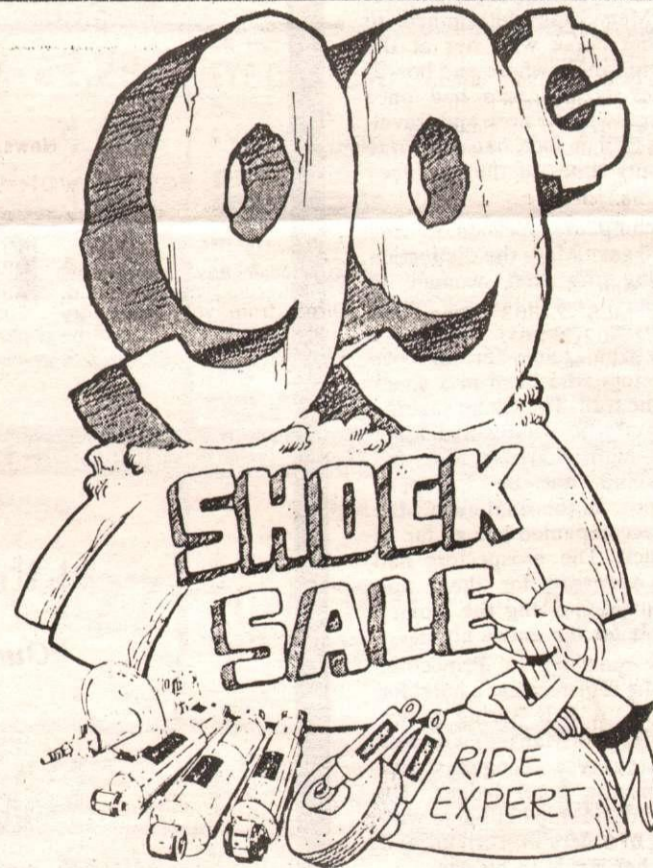

Brenton described as full of gumption

Without a high school on Salt Spring, Mary was forced to take alternative steps in order to continue her education. The Isabella Point school had, at that time, a highly qualified teacher — Mr. Cook — who agreed to tutor Mary and a friend in high school education. Every day Mary walked from Fulford valley to the school, which was located one-half mile beyond where Roland Road is today; her friend, Rose Johnson, walked from the Weston Lake area.

Both girls did well. According to one source, Mary obtained the highest marks in the province when she took her government exams.

With her high school education complete, Mary moved to Galiano Island to spend at least one term teaching school there. Moving back to Salt Spring, she taught at schools in the Fulford, Isabella Point and Central areas.

Mary Brenton's favourite story, according to Dorothy Harris, typifies the determination she demonstrated throughout her life. Mary often talked of her journey by horseback along the route that is now the Hope-Princeton Highway.

Hired to teach school in Vernon, Mary was determined to have her horse with her at the O'Keefe ranch, where she boarded. Her father, who had once prospected in the area and travelled the trail on foot, had spoken to her many times of the Dewdney Trail.

Reaching the decision to ride the trail gave Mary the distinction of being the first woman to complete it on horseback. Near Vancouver, she met up with a friend who told her of two prospectors who lived in a shack along the trail. The friend said the men would be willing to let her stay the night; however, Mary felt this would not be "proper" behaviour. In the final event, the friend accompanied her as far as the shack. The prospectors had dinner prepared for them and slept outside, giving the women the cabin for the entire night.

Mary rode on to Princeton, where she registered at a hotel for the night. A Salt Spring police officer (Hughie Mansell) who was also in the area recognized her name on the hotel ledger. He suggested she ship her horse with a group of others to Vernon, and offered her a ride in his car.

The O'Keefe ranch where Mary boarded is now a museum in Vernon. After Mary began teaching at the school, the owners of the ranch decided, for the first time, to send their children to public school.

"She was very good at teaching children," Dorothy says. She recalls one child who, along with herself, attended Mary's class, but could not learn to read. Mary used to pick the boy up, put him on her knee and teach him by himself. He eventually learned to read, Dorothy says.

The late Betty Drummond also attended a school where Mary taught. "She used to say (Mary) was the best teacher she ever had," Dorothy remembers.

Mary returned to Salt Spring from Vernon when her father became sick. She undertook a year of nurses' training; however, she did not care for it.

It was about this time that Mary met up with a childhood

playmate, Ernest Brenton. Brenton's grandfather, who ran a store in the Fulford valley, became ill. Because of her training, Mary was asked to care for him. Mary and Ernest Brenton were married soon after.

The Brentons had four sons and one daughter. At the time of her death, Mary was grandmother to 13, and great-grand-mother to 17.

The first 10 years of their marriage were spent in Bellingham, where Ernest Brenton worked as assistant sherrif. Arriving back on Salt Spring, Ernest drove a logging truck and then a school bus.

Mary became well-known for organizing community concerts, having gained experience from producing Christmas concerts with school children.

"Her concerts were something else," Dorothy says.

At 90 years of age, Mary moved from her family home in Fulford to the Greenwoods care facility. She remained bright and articulate until her death some three-and-one-half years later.

An explorer's banquet

Scurvy and moulded bread avoided in history you can eat

Many islands in the San Juan Archipelago still have Spanish names, although the explorers who came north from Mexico in their tiny ships did not have time or inclination to linger here. Anchorages were unknown and landings dangerous in the Gulf of Georgia.

Like Robinson Crusoe, the first Europeans to visit our beautiful coasts carried the old world in their minds and in their stomachs. On board the 46-foot schooner *Sutil* in that long, hot, eventful summer of 1792, Lieutenant Galiano and his crew carried meagre, perishing rations: harsh wine, ship's biscuit, mouldy bread, beans and other decaying vegetables.

In spite of all this, the B.C. Historical Society had asked me to devise a banquet that would celebrate the achievements of Galiano and his companion Valdes. I accepted but told them that historical cookery must also be "history you can eat". There's no point getting scurvy just to prove your facts are accurate. We agreed to compromise and I planned a meal that the explorers would have eaten if they could.

For *hors-d'oeuvres* we had plates of fresh oysters baked on the half-shell and swimming scallops picked that morning off the floor of the sea. I called these by their old name — *nivea*, or snowballs — after a recipe I found in an old Latin cookbook. Seasoned with herbs and spices, dipped in melted butter, rolled in breadcrumbs, sauteed briefly then served on their shells, these scallops were a delight.

Snowballs On The Half Shell

- 8 oz. scallops, dry weight, reserving the shells
- 1/4 t. ground pepper
- 1/2 t. celery seed
- 1 T. fresh parsley, chopped finely
- 1/2 t. fresh mint
- 1/4 t. cumin
- 1/4 C. melted butter
- breadcrumbs
- lemons

In a mortar grind pepper, celery seed, parsley, mint and cumin. Add these seasonings to melted butter. Dip the scallops in the sauce then roll them in breadcrumbs. Saute briefly in butter then serve on their half-shells with a sprinkle of lemon.

The main course was 50 ducklings that had been quartered and cooked in huge, deep-sided pans the day before, then finished the afternoon of the banquet in a tomato mushroom sauce seasoned with whole branches of rosemary, thickets of basil and carpets of sweet-smelling thyme. As a brilliant summer sun climbed over the tops of the cedars on Galiano Island, the exotic aromas streaming from the Community Hall kitchen recalled the smell of the hot rich Mediterranean earth that had nourished the Spaniards two centuries ago.

The dessert had to be something really special. There is always an expectant pause that follows the removal of the dinner plates and

the wine glasses and I wanted to fill it with style. At the last moment, when the historians at the head table had begun to stare nervously in my direction, wondering if something had let the wind out of my sails, I wheeled forward a small army of identical, quivering, trifles. Each one was covered with cream that had been whipped to the point of evanescence and then decorated with concentric rings of toasted almond slivers and tight-skinned long dark grapes in imitation of the ancient stone circles that dot the countryside of Western Europe. The body of the trifle was composed of fruits used traditionally since Roman times: cherries, damsons, blackberries, grapes and dates. These were seasoned with nutmet and cinnamon, marinated in Spanish sherry, held together by sponge cake and sealed with a spicy custard.

Exhausted by two days of non-stop cooking, I walked slowly back to the kitchen past tables crammed with talkative historians. Suddenly I was overwhelmed by an attack of guilt. What would Galiano think of us as we devoted our minds and our stomachs to the memory of a man who spent a few difficult hours sailing by a long, hilly island 200 years ago, only to write its location in his log and then forget it forever as he groped his way north against currents and fickle, outflow winds? Would he be amazed at our behaviour? Flattered perhaps? Or simply disgusted at the menu for our lavish feast when his undernourished crews could barely muster enough hands to sail the cramped *Sutil* and *Mexicana* out of Porlier Pass and north along Valdes? When had he last tasted scallops *nivea*, rosemary'd duckling and a trifle made of his native Mediterranean fruits marinated in Spanish sherry?

Trifle Galiano

- 2 x 8" sponge cakes
- 1/2 C. firm, quartered damson plums
- 1 C. blackberries, not overripe
- 1/2 C. strawberries, halved
- 1/2 C. pitted cherries
- 1/4 C. pitted, chopped dates, marinated in sherry
- 1 C. dark grapes
- 1/2 C. medium Spanish sherry
- 1 1/2 t. cinnamon
- nutmeg, a pinch

- 3 C. custard
- 1/2 C. toasted almonds
- 2/3 C. dark grapes
- 1 1/2 C. whipping cream
- cinnamon

Cut the sponge cakes into one-inch squares and put them in a mixing bowl. Moisten with sherry and stir with a long wooden spoon. Now add the prepared fruits. Season with cinnamon and nutmeg. Mix the ingredients and then turn into a deep glass bowl. Gently flatten the top of the trifle. Now prepare the custard. Season with cinnamon. Pour over the trifle and allow to set in the refrigerator overnight, if possible, to allow the sherry and the cinnamon to act as a cold marinade. Just before serving, finish with a semi-sweet layer of whipped cream and decorate with rings of grapes. Garnish with toasted almond slivers and finish with a final blush of cinnamon. Eight to 10 servings.

"Terrible price" for B.C. coastline indicated by its high drowning ratio

The Canadian Red Cross Society is warning boaters to exercise safety this summer.

The society's B.C.-and-Yukon division said recently the warning is needed because British Columbians "pay a terrible price" for their magnificent coastline and moderate weather: the number of drownings each year in B.C. is 2.5 times the national average.

About two-thirds of B.C.'s annual drownings will occur in the next four months, it adds.

A safety campaign now underway by the society is emphasizing the importance of proper use of lifejackets and personal flotation devices (PFDs).

The society recommends that boaters wear a lifejacket or PFD at all times while on or near the water, and points out that all boats require one Department of Transport (DOT) approved life-jacket or PFD per person on board.

The Red Cross also notes that there are different types of PFDs designed for specific boating activities — i.e., canoeing, water skiing or sailing — and that boaters should choose the type most appropriate to their activity.

Other points about lifejackets and PFDs made by the society include:

- before heading out on a boating

trip, test the lifejacket or PFD in the water;

- make sure the lifejacket or PFD fits snugly;
- a lifejacket or PFD is not a substitute for adult supervision;
- don't buy a too-large PFD hoping a child will grow into it — loose or poorly-fitting PFDs are dangerous; and
- do not use these safety devices as a cushion or boat fender, since

"a jacket stored in a boat will be useless if you fall overboard."

Seventy-five per cent of all people who drown in B.C. are without lifejackets or PFDs, the society points out.

The Red Cross said it is also concerned about the mixing of alcohol and boating, noting that one-third of all drownings in B.C. are connected to the use of alcohol.

"After a few hours on the water, the fatigue caused by wind, sun, noise, glare and other factors reduce the ability of boat operators to observe and react to things around them — if this fatigue is mixed with alcohol, the effects are multiplied," says Steve Borthwick, chairman of the society's water safety services division.

He also noted that alcohol impairs judgement, increases body heat loss and affects balance.

Boaters are also advised by the Red Cross that ignorance and carelessness are major factors in most boating accidents. Boaters should keep an eye on the weather for warnings that a storm may be brewing — i.e., choppy water and sudden wind shifts — and be aware of rules governing which boats yield the right-of-way on the water.

"Develop a knowledge of the rules and regulations that apply to your boat and the waters in which you are operating it," Borthwick said. "Above all, use your common sense."

Other safety tips for boaters include having charts and a compass aboard, carrying a proper first aid kit, filing a "float plan" before leaving on a trip — and learn how to swim.

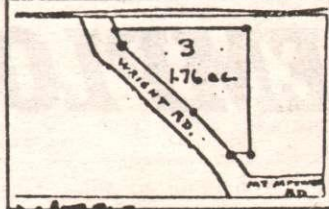

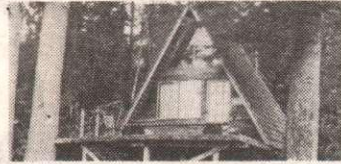
