## Salt Spring gears up for needed youth centre

Salt Spring Island youth are striving to put aside differences of opinion and create a long-awaited and much needed youth centre on the island.

The need for a young people's facility has been recognized for some years. And while a number of groups have initiated plans aiming towards reaching that goal, differences of opinions and ideas expressed by both adults and teens have prevented any of the initiatives from getting off the ground.

Organizations attempting to prepare outlets for teen activities at the beginning of this year included the Community Society's YEP! program, a number of church groups and the Parks and Recreation Commission's recreational program.

Due to their structural characteristics, none of these organizations appealed to the 15 or so young people who began "hanging around" the home of community worker Rosalie Miles. These individuals, who Miles describes as "fringe kids," expressed constant frustration at the lack of facilities available to them on the island.

While the group was aware of the Community Society's attempt — headed by Judith Knight — to establish a youth council and teen-related programs at the high school, they backed off from "anything called a meeting," Miles said.

Knight's program did get support from several students, particularly those interested in structured activities and group leadership opportunities.

However, tensions between the varying groups almost became confrontational, Miles says.

When Miles was elected to the Community Society Board, it became her responsibility to lobby for a teen society and strive to tie the different groups into a common force.

Adults and teens representing the different factions met in mid-June in an attempt to find common ground. According to Miles, everyone agreed on the basic needs for young people on the island: a place to "hang out" and have fun; some sort of facility where teens could both listen to and play music; an area for dance, art and theatre workshops; and a place to provide a basis for work experience.

The problems faced by the group are rooted in some "very different ideas regarding life-

styles and goals," Miles says.

Dissent has occurred over issues such as the amount of adult intervention needed and the type of programming offered. Some people feel the organization should be very sports-minded; others feel it should focus on leadership and peer counselling.

"Other teens just want to play music, read some books, and try out some dramatic art," Miles says.

Division between Salt Spring's teen "cliques" became apparent at a teen dance held June 17 at Central. The event, which was organized by young people as a fund-raiser for a youth centre, saw confrontation regarding music preferences. Bands were booed and even forced off the stage.

The organizers were unprepared for the depth of division.

However, at the second dance they organized (held June 25 at Fulford Hall), the youths worked to eliminate the previous problems, adopting an attitude of "I don't like the way you live, but I'll try to play the music you like."

This way of thinking illustrates the compromising attitude which those involved in youth centre organization will have to adopt. If the group agrees to initiate a facility, the next step will be to work out scheduling that allows time for all interests.

"There's the choice," Miles says. "We can leave everyone in separate corners, or at least agree on giving the kids a space."

The type of "space" envisioned would allow a diverse range of activities, from pool tables to a video and hand games centre, to a movie area and a pop and juice lounge.

One idea, Miles says, would be to have three or more separate rooms which could be opened up for large-scale activities. The building would also need a kitchen; other rooms could be split into a games area, a meeting room/library area, a music spot, and an arts workshop area.

The group has looked at several possible locations, including the former Legion building and a number of potential houses. Many of the young people agree a downtown site for the centre would be the most appropriate and accessible location.

As Miles indicates, the formation of a youth centre could go in two directions. One option would be to create a non-profit society, while the other would be to establish a commercial enterprise. A non-profit society would have access to, and be dependent

on, government grants. It would take several months to form. On the other hand, a commercial enterprise — wherein teens could work at the centre and gain job experience — would take a great deal of initial fund-raising.

Teens are already discussing methods of fund-raising. Ideas range from car washes to Saturday music in the park. Initial funding is one of the larger problems facing establishment of a youth centre. (The group has its manpower at hand.)

The community will have the opportunity to express ideas concerning a youth centre at an upcoming meeting. Set for July 7 at 7 pm in the Community Centre, the meeting will aim to form a core group of adults and teens.

"A lot of adults have expressed interest," Miles says. "Now is the time for them to show up. We need an open-hearted response."

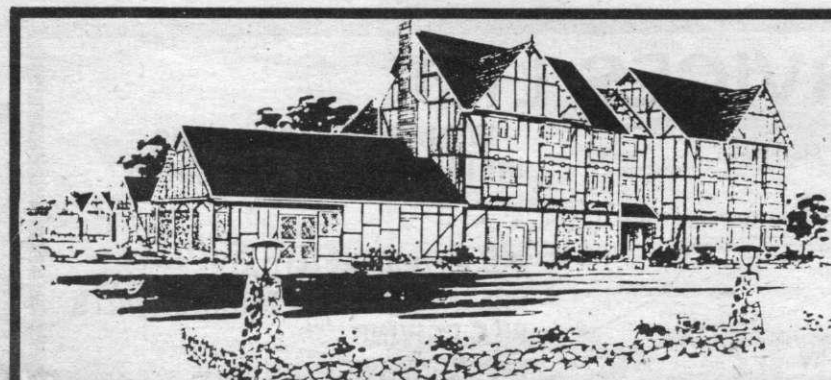

# Society tours castle; Peter Pan visits Jamboree

**SOUTH GALIANO**—The north-enders must have enlisted the aid of some benign influence to ward off the rain, which fell only on South Galiano during the North Galiano Community Association's annual *Jamboree* celebrating Canada Day.

The program began with the Grand Parade wending its way up Porlier Pass Drive from Spanish Hills to the Community Hall. A panel of judges awarded numerous prizes for floats in individual entries illustrating the theme of *Children's Literature — Storybook Friends*. The children were particularly impressive; there were Peter Pan with Tinkerbell and the wicked Captain Hook, the Knave of Hearts, Dumbo, Miss Muffet and the Spider, Merlin, and Raven from our Northwest Coast native legends. Top group prize went to the Morris Dancers, from Victoria, who tirelessly danced the whole route.

As well as the usual refreshment stalls, vendors of many kinds, games of skill and chance, there were comprehensive information booths from various local organizations. The hall itself was full of an interesting display put together by Alistair Ross. There were exhibits related to the theme, but also an extremely interesting collection of archival material of the social history of Galiano over the past century. This exhibition merited a detailed study with a knowledgeable guide such as Alistair — for which, unfortunately, there was insufficient time. It is hoped that Alistair himself will provide a commentary in a future issue.

The program of games and entertainment was kept moving along by Woody Coward and Al Chambers. Two new acts to Galiano made very favourable impressions. The Morris Dancers from Victoria presented a series of dances which originated in English villages in Medieval times. The colourful costumes and simple but vigorous steps had the audience clapping, both in appreciation and to accentuate the rhythm. The insertion of three dances from the Ottawa Valley illustrated the affinity of folk dances from many cultures separated by distance and time.

The Galiano Trio consisted of flute, oboe and clarinet; the three young musicians were from Vancouver and had no previous association with Galiano. They

chose the name as having both a European flavour to match their repertoire and a West Coast implication. They played light classical and modern music with skill and style and appear to have a promising future. The Galiano Singers contributed brief selections from *Mary Poppins* and proved that their May concert success was not a flash in the pan.

### Coming Events

- There will be an art exhibition and sale in the Community Hall on Sturdies Bay Road this weekend. Organized by the Galiano Artists Guild, showing is by invitation. Times are 7 to 9 pm on Friday, July 8 and from 10 am to 4 pm on the two following days.
- At Montague Provincial Park, the interpretive programs sponsored by Parks B.C. will continue. On Friday, starting from the Park Meeting Place at 11 am, a walk will be conducted along the shore pointing out the ancient 'middens.' Archaeologists who have investigated these sites are able to deduce that they have been occupied for over 3,000 years. The evening walk, beginning at 7 pm from the boat ramp, will explore the Douglas fir forest on Gray peninsula, which also includes examples of juniper, yew and arbutus. On Saturday there will be a program especially for children, with games and activities featuring native birds. At 9 pm at the Meeting Place, there will be a slide presentation on the subject of B.C.'s marine parks.
- An Anglican Service led by Lay Reader Michael Sharp will begin at 10:30 am at St. Margaret's this Sunday.
- The monthly Garden Club meeting falls on Wednesday, July 13, beginning at 1:30 pm. The featured speaker is Bill Dale, past president of the Rhododendron Society.

### Noises in the Night

In the same area can be heard from time to time an incredible sound resembling a very rusty old piece of machinery being set in motion. It seems to come from the Bill Stevens' property on Cain Road. No, it is not their dog or even the goat which can be seen in its pen behind their house. It is, in fact, made by their donkey which is kept out of sight on the far side of the lot.

### Gulf Islands Historians

In these busy days of summer, considerable organizational skill is needed to bring off a field trip which involves co-ordinating ferry times with a goal that will attract and bring together people from all four of the Outer Gulf Islands. On Wednesday, June 29, members of the Gulf Islands Branch of the B.C. Historical Federation journey from Galiano, Mayne and Pender to spend a day in Victoria that was most instructive and enjoyable. Last summer the group visited Royal Roads, formerly Hatley Castle, built by James Dunsmuir, coal-mining magnate, premier and, for a term, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia. This summer's expedition was to visit another great mansion built by a member of the Dunsmuir clan — Craighdarroch Castle, built by James' father Robert.

At the time of its building it was the most expensive home of its size in Western Canada, yet built by a man who arrived as a poor Scottish immigrant only to become the richest man in the province. With his skill in finding coal seams in the Nanaimo area and his business acumen he acquired a great fortune. Robert died in 1889, just before the home he had promised his wife and planned was completed.

Joan lived on in the Castle in state for 18 years, until her death in 1908. Neither of her two sons or large family of daughters wanted to continue to live in Craighdarroch, so its contents — including furniture, silverware, valuable china and carpets — were auctioned off in three days. The 28-acre estate went to a developer,

who promptly divided it into more than one hundred lots, which were then sold off together with a raffle ticket for the castle, which had now become a white elephant too expensive to own and run.

The new owner soon lost Craighdarroch to the Bank of Montreal, and it became in turn a Veterans' Hospital, then Victoria College, the Victoria School Board office and the home of the Victoria Conservatory of Music. Fortunately, under the leadership of newspaperman James Nesbitt, the Castle Society was formed with the purpose of saving and restoring Craighdarroch. Now anyone may see Joan Dunsmuir's Tower Room, where she took tea as her groom read the newspaper to her — while she gazed out at the magnificent three compass-point view over Victoria.

Visitors to the Castle gain an insight into the social history of 80 years ago. Many of our historians could have lingered longer at Craighdarroch, but their energetic acting-president, Charles Illsley of Pender, had arranged two further Victoria treats for them.

Off they sped down Rocklands Avenue following the same route from the castle that Joan Dunsmuir's sixth daughter, Jessie Sophia, did in 1891 when she married Sir Richard John Musgrave of County Waterford, Ireland, in Christchurch Cathedral. After the wedding came a splendid reception, according to the *Victoria Colonist*, when "Sir Richard and Lady Musgrave received 300 guests at Craighdarroch, the fashionable company spending several hours nearby in the palatial residence and its garden. The band of H.M.S. was present to entertain the guests with their playing."

welcomed Hugh Maclure and his wife Muriel last weekend when they stayed on Galiano at the home of Charles and Florence Dodwell. The Maclures climbed Mount Sutil with their hosts, visited local homes, and showed slides of their recent four-month medical missionary stint in Sierra Leone, from which they returned only three months ago. Both Maclures look well and happy and, if the opportunity arises again, will return to Africa or Haiti to do much needed medical work.

Present in St. Margaret's congregation were Air Service Freedom missionary pilots Phoebe Kingscote and her husband Pierre La Jeunesse with three of their four children, who have also recently returned from Africa (Dungu in Zaire) to stay with Phoebe's father Tony Kingscote. We look forward to hearing of Phoebe and Pierre's last 10-month stint in Zaire missionary flying.

# Parade celebrates Canada's birthday

**NORTH GALIANO** — It was 11:30 am, and North Galiano Community Association members and their helpers were all on duty. A last-minute scurry of activity had all the booths set up, the displays finished, the sound system working and the chili cooking in the kitchen.

The parade began, led by Constable Gary Styles in his handsome scarlet uniform, and Canadian flags were everywhere. On its way to the community hall the lengthy parade passed the reviewing stand by the Spanish Hills store, where three judges watched and adjudicated.

The storybook theme evidently appealed, for islanders had gone to a lot of trouble to create theme costumes — Captain Hook was there, also Tinker Bell, Little Toot, Rub-a Dub-Dub, the Owl and the Pussycat, Raggedy Ann and Christopher Robin, to name but a few.

The floats were numerous and clever. Holidayers at Salishan Resort and Coon Bay built group floats. Professional-looking, they added much to the colourful parade.

The Jamboree opened at noon with the singing of *Oh, Canada* and masters of ceremonies Woody Coward and Al Chambers got things going from the stage on the newly-finished deck in front of the hall.

This year's Jamboree featured a performance of Morris dancing by groups from Victoria. The Island Thyme Dancers and the Holly Tree Group all enjoy their dancing and their joy was easily passed on to a most receptive 400 to 500 spectators.

The program continued with the Galiano Trio, a classical group from Vancouver. Leader David Bodington arranged favourite children's tunes for his trio — lovely music by a group in white jackets, black trousers and red cummerbunds.

Ann Duncan's popular Galiano Singers followed with three happy songs from Walt Disney's *Mary Poppins*, and next came Sunny, our favourite clown — a class act for the young ones. His comic songs and patter ended with the distribution of helium-filled balloons — red and white, of course.

Also free for the youngsters was a flower arranging event. More than one young mum and dad appeared quite overcome when presented by a newly-arranged bouquet made for them by their little boy or girl.

In another corner of the grounds the Mad Hatter was at work, supervising the decoration of the wildest flowered and feathered hats. A parade of hatters was held for all to show off their newly-designed finery.

Also featured were games of chance where everyone gets a prize, and fun sports.

For adults and children alike there was good food at the cook shed, where 14 ladies and gentlemen had a hard time keeping up with the demand.

In the hall there was a display of old toys, children's books, historical pictures of Galiano's children and their elders and a very popular country store display. Ena Hooley of the St. Margaret's Needle Guild was present to explain quilting techniques to one and all.

Gill Allen of Madrona Lodge, a former teacher and an artist and illustrator, has recently written three books for children. A

On the stage was a floral display with a painted backdrop and at least a dozen flower arrangements by North Galiano's Aini Haksi filled the window sills. Also to be seen was a display of artifacts catalogued by Dr. Tony Kingscote when he emptied Galiano's charcoal pits — a modern-day midden.

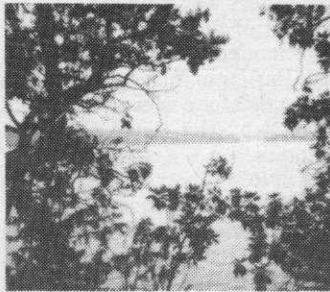

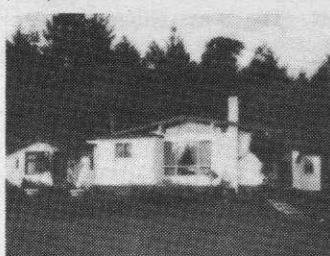

**Twenty-five years ago**

• Another step was taken towards improved ferry service for Gulf Islanders when the M.V. *Queen of the Islands* sailed on its maiden run between Tsawwassen and the Gulf Islands.

The *Queen of the Islands* was to provide direct sailings to the mainland. The new vessel was 236 feet long and able to carry 40 cars and 400 people.

• A *Driftwood* columnist warned travellers of the "magnetic pull" of Salt Spring Island: "Many of you have come for the day and never returned home."

The article warned that "the tourist industry has lost customers; corporations have lost travelling salesmen and wives have lost husbands to the charms of Salt Spring."

Along with the beaches and views, it notes, the island still has the "trappings of a city. We have a liquor store, a jail, a modern hospital and 50 organizations you can join. So along with the good life, you can still have sin, gin and traffic tickets."

**Twenty years ago**

• The Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital received the green light from the Capital Regional Board

to purchase for future needs a four-acre piece of property adjoining the present hospital site.

• For the third time in a year, flags from the cenotaph in Centennial park were stolen.

The previous year, a group of navy cadets was held responsible for theft of the flags. They were apprehended and the flags recovered. Earlier in the year, the flags were stolen for a second time, and replaced by the Royal Canadian Legion.

Local RCMP were investigating the most recent incident.

• The results of the recent federal election came as a surprise to almost no one in the Gulf Islands riding. When Colin Cameron, NDP, retained his seat for another term, there were few expressions of surprise.

• Deer beat drivers to the draw on two islands.

A Salt Spring Island man drove his vehicle into a tree when he swerved to avoid striking a deer. On Galiano, another driver also served to avoid hitting a deer. His car ran into an obstruction.

Damage was sustained by both

vehicles, while both deer escaped with "complete indifference to the havoc they had wrought."

**Fifteen years ago**

• For the second time in a quarter-century, the Saturna Lamb barbecue ran short of lamb.

The 1973 barbecue drew the largest crowd to date. Over 300 small boats were reported anchored in the bay. People came in cruisers, charter vessels, ferries, ships and planes from all over the map.

• The RCMP boat from Ganges, skippered by Sgt. George Lewis, came to the rescue when a fiberglass boat began sinking in Montague Harbour.

The boat, from Ladner, had a hole in its hull after striking a floating object. When the *MP 53* found the skipper, he and his crew were fighting a losing battle as the small vessel steadily filled.

Police towed the boat into Montague Harbour.

• Water bombers were called in to douse a fire on Galiano Island when fireman were unable to

reach it from the road.

The fire was one of two on Galiano Island over the holiday weekend. Both were attributed to carelessness in the woods.

**Ten years ago**

• A massive search for a six-year-old boy at Fulford Harbour ended in tragedy when divers from the RCMP unit in Port Alberni found the child's body.

Between 150 and 200 people were engaged in the search after the youngster failed to return to his home two days earlier.

• Water users in the Vesuvius area complained that the taste and smell of water from St. Mary Lake was offensive. To ease the situation, water was being piped from Mt. Maxwell Lake. Restrictions on use were in effect, however.

• Portlock Park would be ready for use in the fall, reported Glenn Woodley, chairman of the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission.

Both the soccer field and building containing change rooms

would be ready for use. Additional facilities for the recreational project, begun by the Lions Club, would be installed as money became available.

**Five years ago**

• Comparison of costs between the city and the island were made by a Saanich couple, who also owned property on Pender Island.

The cost of sewer tax at their Saanich home was \$87. Parcel tax for their Pender property reached \$196. The tax was levied even though the recreational vehicle on the site was not hooked up to the sewer.

• Investigation of a suspected embezzlement from Greenwoods on Salt Spring Island was nearing completion and police expected a break in the case within the next few weeks. The suspected embezzlement involved at least \$39,000.

• Ganges RCMP would be conducting spot checks for business licenses with the warning that "anyone without a license would be dealt with." Under the Business License Act, any business outside of a municipality requires a license.

• The Drummond park clambake would go on as scheduled, despite a shellfish closure due to red tide. The clambake would be held without the clams — just the clam chowder.

**Saturna recalls Obade for 'bigness of heart'**

Last week, on my way to pick Jesse up from school, I rounded the turn at Lyall Harbour and saw the lawn was mowed at Dave and Sandi Obades'. "Summer's really here," was the thought that went through my mind.

Last week Dave died, to Saturna's sadness. Dave and Sandi had come up here every summer for 11 years. Dave's friendliness, his bigness of heart, was apparent to all who met him.

He spent a lot of time sharing time with Saturna Islanders. Friends and family were important to him. Every summer, Dave shut down his business to be in a place he and his family loved.

My contact with Dave and Sandi wasn't a lot, but it carried that feeling of *I'm glad they're in the world; I know it's a much happier place with them here.*

Dave and Sandi and Dru and Davey have their winter home in Huntington Beach. It's the only place I've heard of Saturna Islanders visiting regularly — sort of a Saturna south.

Sandi and Dru and Davey are surrounded by many loving, caring friends. Dave loved Saturna Island and islanders and much solace and love will be returned to the family.

Within our community, we have several people well-trained in CPR techniques and emergency first aid. Gerri Davidson, alerted by Dru Obade, was with Dave in minutes, as was Tip Walker and Cal Hollings. Many thanks to them and their skills. They are an asset to their community and families.

And now, I would like to include a piece written by Jeannie Ratzlaff, a good friend of the families:

For the past 11 years, Dave and Sandi Obade and their children, Dru and Davey, have been coming to spend the summers on Saturna. Everyone who has known them has looked forward to their arrival because they are such a warm, friendly, stable family.

So it was with great shock and sadness that I heard that Dave had died on June 24, only days after arriving on Saturna. He was a dear, dear friend. As friends of Dave and Sandi draw close to comfort and support Sandi, Dru and Davey, we can feel the great hole that has been left by Dave's passing, and we can feel the strength of the family. But then, they are a special family.

Dave was a wonderful, big bear of a man with an even bigger heart. The way children were attracted to him, you would have thought he was big enough to generate his own gravity. The fact that Dru and Davey are such pleasant, likeable, sociable, outgoing kids is testament to his dedication to his children.

I first met Dave when he and Sandi and the kids started coming to Saturna. One of my earliest memories is of this huge man on the wharf carrying this gorgeous, deliriously happy toddler with the wildest head of golden curls you could imagine — young Davey. Dave was coming home from one of his almost-daily fishing trips, a pastime which, to him, made the universe turn.

I visited Dave and Sandi twice at their home in Huntington Beach, California, and always I was truly made to feel part of the family; on both occasions, Dave spoke fondly and longingly of

Truly, it wasn't what happened on the adventure that mattered to Dave, it was the fact that you had the guts to try.

Dave epitomized decency and goodness. I can't imagine someone meeting him and not realizing what a warm, special person he

was. Through his ability to find the extraordinary in ordinary people, he showed us all how we, too, can be giants. We will all miss him very much, as our hearts and thoughts continue to be with Sandi, Dru and Davey.

Wednesday was awards day at the community hall. What a big turnout of moms, dads, grandpas, aunts, grandmas, brothers and sisters.

All of the kids were singled out with a prize for the area in which they made the most individual improvement. I liked the feel of it — personal achievement rewarded.

hours. Melanie Fraser won special recognition for musical ability.

# Fines given for infractions and impaired driving

Two men received fines and had their drivers' licenses suspended after both pleaded guilty June 14 to separate charges of impaired driving.

The judgements were handed down at the June 14 session of Ganges provincial court.

David Seip was ordered to pay an \$800 fine after being charged on June 27, 1987.

Court was told that local RCMP had given Seip a 24-hour driving suspension at 1:20 am on that date. The accused's vehicle was then left stranded over a cement curb on Seaview Avenue.

Within one hour, testimony revealed, Seip was observed driving the vehicle southbound on Fulford-Ganges Road. RCMP stopped the vehicle, placed Seip under arrest and read him his rights.

Seip pleaded guilty to the charge. Judge R.E. Hudson then fined the accused and prohibited him from driving a vehicle for nine months.

In the second incident, Desmond Steven Smith pleaded guilty to impaired driving on May 1, 1988.

Court was told that RCMP Const. Gary Styles was on regular patrol duty in Ganges when he observed Smith spinning the tires of his vehicle. When he pulled Smith over, Styles said, he felt the accused showed signs of impairment.

After pleading guilty in court, Smith received a \$400 fine and was ordered to surrender his driver's license for six months.

In other court matters, four individuals pleaded guilty to driving infractions.

• William John Crandall pleaded guilty to charges of driving without due care and attention.

The incident occurred April 19, when Crandall lost control of his vehicle, which then went into a ditch and struck a power pole.

Crandall was fined \$100.

• Russell Mark Crouse pleaded guilty to the same offence.

Crouse was charged with driving without due care and attention after police found a vehicle rolled over on its roof and in a ditch.

Judge Hudson fined the man \$75.

• Gavin Kyle will pay a \$100 fine after pleading guilty to driving without reasonable consideration for other persons.

The offence took place October 31, 1987. Local RCMP were in a marked police vehicle, located in the former Ganges Village Market parking lot, when they heard screeching tires in the Lower Ganges and Rainbow roads area.

• The fourth incident took place on December 27, 1986. Police received a report from a citizen who observed an erratic driver on Fulford-Ganges Road.

The citizen said he had to swerve to avoid hitting the vehicle, which was travelling on the wrong side of the road. He followed the car to the parking lot of the Gulf Islands Trading Company, and then phoned the police.

Police found Margaret Campbell, who matched the description of the driver, on Hereford Road. Campbell appeared intoxicated.

Judge Hudson fined the accused \$50, and prohibited her from driving for at least six months.

A Ganges woman was found guilty of taking a motor vehicle without the consent of its owner.

Tammy Duke pleaded not guilty to the offence, which took place on September 27, 1987.

of the vehicle, told the court she, Duke and Calvin Fraser left the Harbour House Hotel after an evening of drinking and drove into Ganges. Passingham said Duke was sitting in the middle of the front seat, with Fraser to her right in the passenger seat.

Passingham told the court she

stopped and got out of the car to provide assistance to a friend. She then saw the car driving down the road towards Mouat's, then turning left into the former Ganges Village Market parking lot.

Several witnesses testified they saw Duke slide into the passenger

seat and take control of the car.

The car went through the parking lot, up the ramp towards the former Rita's Inn. The car smashed into two parked vehicles and damaged the stairway to the inn.

Duke admitted to drinking a great deal on that night. She told

the court she does not remember any of the events between the time she left the Harbour House Hotel and the time she was pulled from the smashed vehicle.

Judge Hudson found her guilty. He sentenced her to a conditional discharge and six month's probation.

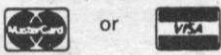

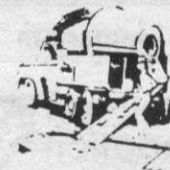

## Commission to consider proposal

Parents for Playgrounds presented the Parks and Recreation Commission with a preliminary proposal for new playground equipment for Centennial Park.

The proposal calls for a "play ship," featuring a number of climbing, swinging and sliding activity sites. Still to be completed are feasibility studies and approvals.

The playground group is looking to incorporate several safety features into the play area. (The site will be in approximately the same location as it is at present.) One proposal is to install a thick layer of pea gravel as a ground cover.

Spokesman Debbie Magnusson told the commission that 80 per cent of playground-related injuries occur from falls. Pea gravel would eliminate much of the hazard.

The group also proposed enclosing the play area with some type of wooden dividers. This would serve a number of purposes, Magnusson said: it would dissuade individuals from running in front of the swings, and work towards keeping the ground cover within the enclosure.

Parents for Playgrounds has a number of fund-raising plans and will be looking to the community for support. Magnusson told the commission the group is looking to apply for a Lottery Fund grant. She also said Gasoline Alley owner Fritz Boehm has donated \$1,000 towards the project, on behalf of his tenants.

Another three-way tie was fashioned in the putt pot competition, where Libby Noble, Tash Hewitson and Margaret Rithaler were deadlocked.

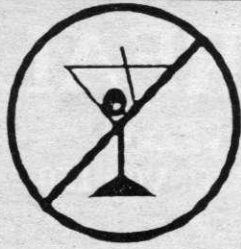
