Will be missed

Skinner leaves "island parish"

Some 150 islanders bid farewell to Reverend Al Skinner and family at a dinner held at Ganges United Church last week.

Skinner, who has pastored at the church for close to eight years, said the evening was "light-hearted and positive." He also said he and his family are experiencing some "trauma" at the prospect of leaving Salt Spring.

As is the tradition with Skinner's occupation, a change of churches usually occurs every five to seven years.

"We count ourselves fortunate for having stayed eight (years)," Skinner says.

Skinner, his wife Iona and children Andrea, 17, and Ian, 15, will be moving to Victoria, where Skinner will take charge of Cordova Bay United Church.

Skinner arrived at Ganges United Church in November, 1980, but has not limited his

services to the church. As close friend Mel Sumner says, Skinner has practised an "open door policy" as far as the community is concerned.

"He provided service far beyond the realms of the United Church," Sumner says, recalling numerous occasions when non-churchmembers approached Skinner for counselling. Sumner said young people, in trouble or without a place to stay, frequently ended up in Skinner's office, where he would work to find them accommodation for the night. Often the young people would be taken into his own home.

In his own words, Skinner says "the whole island is the parish" — not just the 225 families in the church. The nature of the island lends itself to creation of a uniquely diverse congregation, Skinner says, combining families of different traditional backgrounds under its roof. Within

Nomination date closing for golden citizen award

Community members have only a few more days to nominate fellow citizens for Air Canada's Heart of Gold award.

A recent letter from Air Canada said the corporation is well behind in its national goal of receiving some 10,000 nominations. The Gulf Islands, however, have surpassed the company's expectations.

Air Canada's Heart of Gold program was created several months ago to generate, in conjunction with community newspapers across the country, the names of citizens deserving recognition.

The purpose of the program is to acknowledge those who "go the extra mile in their efforts to help others or their communities."

The nominee might be an individual who has overcome some sort of disability to become "useful and inspirational," a community hero, or one who sets a fine example for others.

Nomination forms should be accompanied by a letter of sup-

port, outlining why the individual merits the award.

Each nominee will receive a Heart of Gold Award certificate. Those deserving provincial awards will be chosen by a panel of judges across Canada.

According to a letter written by program co-ordinator and founder Bruce Renner, local communities are not living up to expectations. Renner said each community should easily be able to generate the names of at least 10 deserving citizens.

"We are currently averaging only two nominations per community newspaper," he said.

According to the numbers recorded by Catherine McFadyen at the Driftwood office, however, this community has responded above and beyond expectations. A total of 20 nominations (with only one duplication of names) has been sent to Air Canada from the Gulf Islands.

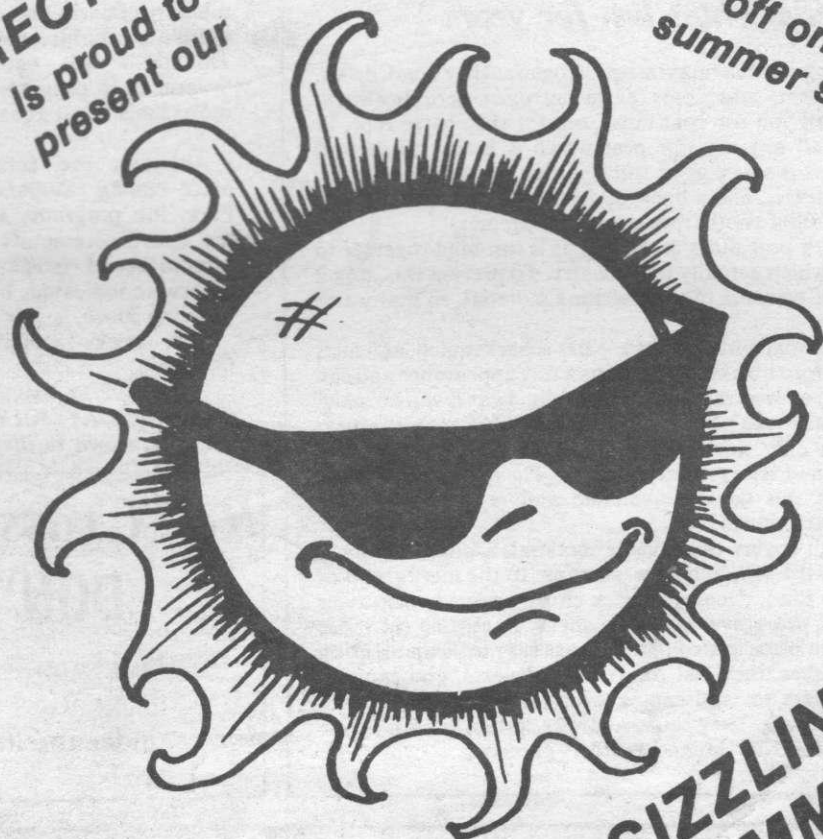
The deadline for nominations is July 31. They should be deposited at the Driftwood office on Upper Ganges Road.

your garden

There never quite seems to be a happy medium when it comes to summertime in the Gulf Islands. The season doesn't come on slowly and build up heat over the period of a few weeks so we can get acclimatized to it; it simply arrives, as if someone just turned the oven on.

If it's heat you want, it's *heat* you've got, and you'd better get used to it, or wilt. The heat makes working out-of-doors rather uncomfortable and tiring, but gardeners are generally a hardy lot, so we can probably forge on with the second part of our discussion on mulches and mulching, without too many people having to run off to the fridge for another cool one.

Last week we dealt with the basic aspects of mulching and the use of groundseals, as well as some other considerations when applying the materials, but we didn't get the opportunity to weigh the pros and cons of the various mulches available.

Before we get to the rundown, I'd like to pose a few questions which will help you make the right choice. Why do you want to mulch? Is it for weed prevention, water conservation, soil improvement, simplified maintenance, or aesthetics? What is your budget and how will you be maintaining it? What sort of character or "flavour" do you want to add to or enhance in your garden?

For building up organic matter content or improving soil workability and moisture retention in the soil, the fast-decaying mulches such as alfalfa hay, pea hay, grass clippings, seaweed and shredded maple leaves will all break down readily. These will help to improve the nutritional value of the soil as well.

Shredded leaves make great compost

Alfalfa hay is relatively costly for mulching but contains plenty of nitrogen and proteins for the soil organisms to work on. Pea hay is less commonly available, but cheaper, and just as effective as alfalfa in its soil-improving ability. Seaweed also has numerous goodies, including added potassium, phosphates and minerals, but it tends to mat up, get soggy, and can look slightly unsightly. Seaweed works fine in veggie gardens or under shrubs or perennials which cover or shield the mulch with their foliage or branches.

Grass clippings are commonly available as long as the grass continues to grow, and while they can look just fine as a mulch, the average island garden just doesn't create many grass clippings, and they often contain quite a few weed seeds.

Shredded maple leaves make a great compost ingredient, and a mulch, but for the best lofted mulching effect, the leaves should be gathered in the fall, and kept dry in bags for the following summer's mulching. Maple leaves look great in the woodland garden, but for the work involved, it's difficult to decide as to whether or not it's worth it.

The group of mulches just covered works well in a vegetable garden, perennial border and under shrubs or trees so long as no real cleanup is expected for the season or two for which they will be effective.

For a slower breakdown, with less nutrient content, and a slightly longer mulching effect, arbutus leaves, oat straw, fir and cedar sawdust, planer shavings and peat moss will fit the bill. Arbutus leaves break down very slowly, but after you've just raked them all up, who would ever want to use them again somewhere else in the garden?

Cedar chips last for years

Sawdusts and planer shavings tie up nitrogen as they break down, so if you use them, add some extra nitrogen periodically to compensate. When you use peat moss, opt for the coarse type, or wind may carry off any dry fine peat which is laying on the soil surface. Peat moss is also a good soil acidifier for rhododendrons, azaleas, camellias, etc., and a light topdressing will help to protect the fine surface-feeder roots from drought extremes.

Be cautious with peat moss mulching, as it can bind together to form a dry shell which actually repels water. To prevent this, mix it with soil, sawdust or some other mulching material, so that water can penetrate.

The most traditional mulch in these parts is bark mulch, as it lasts for a long time before breaking down, has a tidy appearance and can be dressed up, regroomed and cleaned up easily. Leaves can be raked up, and the mulch stays in place in windy situations. For an alternate look, cedar chips may work, as the large flakes of wood have a different texture, and silver as they weather. The material also lasts for years, but is not usually available and is generally more expensive than bark mulch.

That pretty well covers the organic materials which will break down to improve the soil, and now we come to the inert group of materials such as sand, decorative rock chips, crushed rock, river rock, oyster shell, pea gravel and clam shells. Excepting the sand, they will all stay in place in strong winds, are easy to clean up using leaf blowers or rakes, they last for years and years, and can add textures and colours to landscaping which aren't available with other organic materials. They can also evoke certain garden styles, such as raked gravel for "Japanese effect" gardens.

country gourmet

"My salad days, when I was green in judgement."

— Cleopatra

Henry the VIII called for sallats and had his cooks arrange them artistically in colours and shapes for the temporary enjoyment of his wives. Sometimes you could see the coats of arms of Catherine or Anne Boleyn picked out in almonds and raisins. In French the word *salade* also came to mean the jumble of elements which results from tossing herbs, vegetables, cooked eggs, meats or fish together in a bowl. In whichever official language you dine, however, you're really speaking Latin because the word is derived from *salere*, to salt.

Recently the universal condiment, this "edible rock" has fallen from grace; but it remains an indispensable element in many salad dressings. Symbolically, salt has long stood for intelligence and status. If you sat "below the salt" at the castle there might be a nasty surprise in store after dinner. In the history of cookery the ability of this singular substance to enliven the taste of food made salt expensive, taxable and even the object of wars. It is only in recent times that salt has become plentiful and, accordingly, overused.

"Moderatio in omnibus" — moderation in all things — said the ancient Epicureans. In other words, there's nothing wrong with a little salt in the dressing. Anyway, a good recipe needs some sallats in the lines to make the matter savoury.

Green salads are particularly apt for warm midsummer evening dinners made with vegetables and herbs just gathered in the garden, and so fresh that everything is robust and crunchy upon your lips. I named this one after the besotted Antony who found out to his cost that his Egyptian Queen was not so green as he thought, either at the table or in bed.

Salad Antony

- 1 head very fresh lettuce
- a handful of broccoli flower heads
- 2 fresh sprigs lovage, torn, or 2 t celery seed
- 1/4 C slivered almonds
- 1/4 C best olive oil
- 1 T white wine vinegar
- 1 t coriander
- 3 T chopped parsley
- 1 sprig rue, chopped minutatim
- 2 t crushed rosemary
- 1 t Italian oregano
- 1/4 t coarsely ground black pepper
- salt to taste
- pine nuts, cherry tomatoes and capers

Pick a lettuce, wash, dry, tear and throw in a jumble into a salad bowl. Add raw broccoli, lovage and almonds. For the dressing first take olive oil and vinegar. Season with coriander, parsley, rue, rosemary, Italian oregano, black pepper and salt to taste. Pour over the greens. Garnish attractively with cherry tomato 'suns' and planets of pine nuts and capers. For the main course to follow try a salmon omelette in cream sauce with chives.

Salmon Omelette in Cream Sauce with Chives

- 4 eggs, beaten lightly
- 1/4 C milk
- pinch salt
- a small onion, chopped finely
- 2 T olive oil
- 1/2 C hot, cooked, flaked salmon
- 1 t oregano
- 1/2 t celeryseed
- 1/8 t pepper
- sage to taste
- sprigs of fresh parsley
- cream sauce:
- 3 T butter
- 3 T flour
- 1 C milk
- 2 T chopped chives

Take four eggs beaten lightly and combine with milk. Season with salt and sauteed, chopped onion. Cook gently in a greased frying pan. Now take cooked salmon and season with ground oregano, celeryseed, pepper and sage. Spread over one-half of the omelette. Fold.

For the cream sauce first melt butter in a saucepan. Add flour, little by little, stirring constantly. Now add the milk and the chopped chives. Bring up to the boil, but not beyond, then simmer until the sauce thickens. Spoon over the salmon omelette. Decorate with parsley and serve with a glass of chilled, dry white wine.

Not only could Cleopatra outcook the Roman, she could also outspend him. When Antony was stuffing himself daily with exquisite dishes, she derided his shows of magnificence and splendour. Antony asked how one could possibly add to the sumptuousness of his dinners? She answered that she would be able to consume 10,000,000 sesterces at a single sitting. Antony longed to learn such extravagance, but did not believe it possible.

Accordingly, wagers were made. Cleopatra then served a marvellous dinner, but not unlike those of other days. Antony jeered and demanded his money. The queen then declared that this meal was merely a gratuity for him and that her portion alone would still satisfy the bet *all by itself*. She ordered dessert.

As the servant had been instructed he placed before her couch a solitary vessel containing vinegar, but of the kind whose strength reduces pearls to liquid. She was at that time wearing in her ears that truly unique work of nature, her famous pearls. As Antony looked on the Queen removed one of the pearls and dropped it in the vinegar. It melted and she swallowed it. The judge in the wager between them put his hand on the other pearl just as Cleopatra was preparing to destroy it in the same way. He proclaimed Antony vanquished in battle, an omen which later was to be fulfilled.

Plans for Terry Fox Run reach preliminary stages

Preparations are being made to hold a Terry Fox Run in Ganges in September.

The run, sponsored by *Driftwood* and scheduled for Sunday, September 18, would raise funds in aid of cancer research.

Last Friday, *Driftwood* employee Damaris Rumsby met with Betsy Dosco of the local Canadian Cancer Society branch and representatives of each of the island's three elementary schools to plot strategy for this year's run.

Plans call for a separate run for elementary school students to be held on the Friday before the Fox Run itself, and for the staging of related fund-raising events like a bowl-a-thon and sailboat race.

The Fox Run itself is expected to follow the same route as last year's event: the start would be at the school grounds in Ganges, and participants would then walk, ride or run along Rainbow Road, Canal Road, Lower Ganges Road, Upper Ganges Road and Fulford-

Ganges Road before finishing at the school.

The length of the course is just under 10 kilometres.

This year's Terry Fox Run would be the eighth annual, and the second in succession sponsored by *Driftwood*. In 1987, the event drew 123 entrants who raised just under \$6,000 in pledges — a per-capita total that ranked Salt Spring among the most generous communities in B.C.

Organizers are aiming higher this year. Pointing to the \$10,000 raised on Salt Spring in 1987 in aid of Rick Hansen's *Man In Motion* campaign for spinal cord research, they have set the same monetary goal for the Terry Fox Run.

Along with pledges for run participants, organizers hope funds can be raised through challenges, contributions and sales of commemorative t-shirts.

the fellowship, he notes, there exists individuals with backgrounds as diverse as Quaker and Pentecostal traditions. The church hosts members of the Christian Reform tradition, plus individuals of Anglican, Roman Catholic, Lutheran and Mennonite backgrounds.

"In worship we try to respect those traditions, with Christ as the unity," Skinner says. "Rather than emphasize the denominational doctrines, we emphasize

the gospel and what (beliefs) we share."

Skinner says this can be difficult — like walking a tight-rope at times.

However, he sees himself in a serving role which encompasses the entire community. "I see Salt Spring as a microcosm of our society . . . it (provides) a great opportunity to touch all aspects of it."

In his eight years on Salt Spring, Skinner estimates he has performed over 225 weddings. He has also been called on to conduct

numerous funerals and baptisms.

Skinner's wife Iona has also been active in the community, teaching and working with special needs children. Skinner says he hopes the move will open up opportunities for her, perhaps in the area of resource writing for curriculum. (Iona has already had some success in this area.)

The Skinner's daughter, Andrea, graduated from Gulf Island Secondary School this year. She plans to attend Camosun College in Victoria for one year, possibly followed by a year of education in

France. Andrea, who went through the high school's French Immersion program, hopes to eventually teach French at the elementary school level.

Ian will attend Grade 10 at Belmont High School in September. Skinner says his son's interests revolve around electronics, computers and drama.

The Skinner family will miss Salt Spring very much, Skinner says: "But I'm only leaving in body . . ." the spirit of his efforts will remain.

Society receives job grant

The Gulf Islands Women's Place Society has received a \$70,000 job development grant from the federal government.

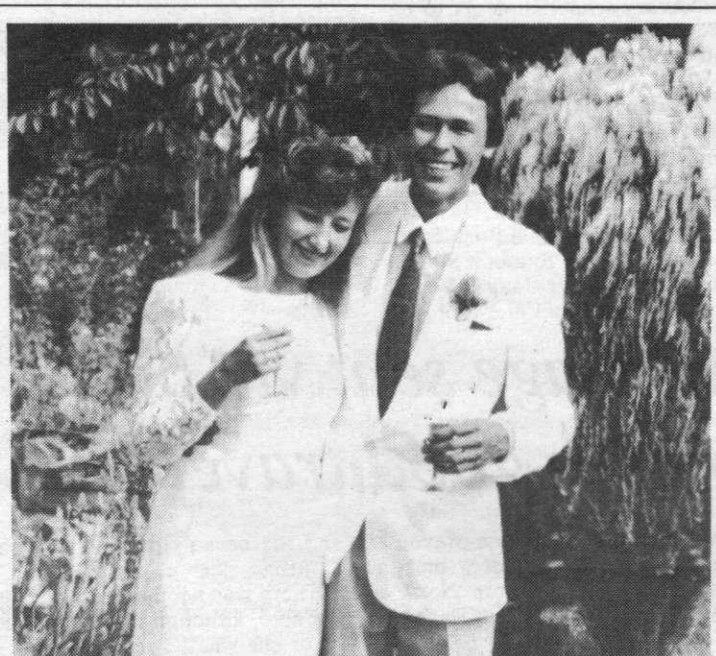
The society said it will use the grant to teach unemployed women to start up and operate successful small business enterprises.

The six women selected to participate in the program will go through an intensive four-month training program, which the society says will include instruction in the dynamics of self-employment, advertising, marketing strategies and computer skills.

Training will be aimed at those women who are currently unemployed, and who are in the process of developing small businesses.

The society has hired Judy Liefschultz of Ventures in Victoria to be one of the project managers. Over the past five years Liefschultz, a part-time Salt Spring Island resident, has been involved in assisting women in business.

Other qualified women on the Gulf Islands are being sought to fill the part-time positions of project co-manager and book-keeper. Advertisements for the positions, and their job descriptions, are to be published shortly, the society says.

Coliform count remains safe

Coliform counts at Salt Spring Island beaches remain well within safety guidelines established by the Capital Regional District (CRD) health services department.

Coliform counts — which measure the degree of sewage pollution in water and the related risk of gastro-intestinal illness for swimmers — are considered safe if within 200 parts per 100 millilitres of water.

The most recent counts for Salt Spring are as follows: Vesuvius Beach, 22; Blackburn Lake, 18; Collins Road Beach, 13; Stowell Lake, 11; Cusheon Lake, 10; St. Mary Lake, 8; and Weston Lake, 6.

The highest counts recorded in the CRD are at Shoal Bay in Oak Bay, which last week registered levels of 313. Signs advising

swimmers of the risks caused by contamination conditions have been posted at Shoal Bay, Gonzales Bay and Cadboro Bay.

Twenty-five years ago

• The new ferry *Queen of the Islands*, which began scheduled runs between Long Harbour and the Lower Mainland two weeks ago, could not cope with the traffic the route had drawn.

On both weekends the ship was in service, cars were left to make the round trip from Fulford Harbour.

• The Salt Spring Island Public Library Association purchased a building to house a library. The building was 30 feet by 35 feet and located "opposite the old movie theatre" on McPhillips Avenue in Ganges.

The purchase price of \$2,300 was made up from \$1,100 raised for the Centennial fund in 1958; \$400 came from donations raised in the meantime; \$700 was donated by Dr. W.J. McAllister; and \$100 was provided by an anonymous gift.

Job similar to a "holiday" brings Dodd back to island

Sidney swimming instructor Mark Dodd has returned to Salt Spring to take on instruction with the local swimming program. This marks the second consecutive year Dodd has travelled to Salt Spring to fill the position.

Dodd is the principal instructor for the Parks and Recreation Commission's swimming program, and will teach over 150 students throughout the summer. The program offers four two-week sets, with some 40 children in each group. Each class holds six or seven swimmers.

The program covers the entire Red Cross spectrum and offers the additional Bronze Medallion, Bronze Cross, Red Cross Instructor's course, as well as adult swimming lessons. Dodd, who teaches at Panorama Leisure Centre in Sidney during the winter months, says instructing on Salt Spring is like a "working holiday."

The 25-year-old Victoria native did not take a swimming lesson until he was 19 and living in Fort Nelson. Without "much else to do," he took up swimming as a recreation. From here, he went through all necessary courses and

was offered a job instructing. At present Dodd is providing teaching instruction by himself. He will, however, have volunteers next month when students in the instructors class take on the practical aspect of the course. Two swimming courses offered

this summer will qualify successful applicants to take on swimming-related occupations. A Bronze Cross holder can legally lifeguard, and the Red Cross Water Safety Instructor (level 1) holder is qualified to instruct swimming lessons up to the maroon level in the Red Cross spectrum.

Minimum age for the Bronze Cross course is 14 (the applicant must also hold a Bronze Medallion ticket). The course will run August 2 to 26 on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 4 pm to 6 pm. Cost is \$55, plus \$19 for the manual and \$11 for the examination.

The instructor's course is scheduled for August 12 to 14 and 19 to 21. Cost is \$75, plus price of the manual. Prerequisites include holding a green level of the Red Cross spectrum (or equivalent) and being at least 16-years-old. Recreation program director Sandi Geiger will be assisting Dodd in the instruction of this course.

Those interested in these courses must register by July 29. Contact Sandy Geiger at the Portlock Park office, or by calling 537-4448.

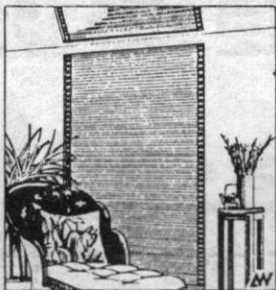

Fourth candidate joins race

A fourth candidate has joined the race for the new federal seat of Saanich-Gulf Islands. Ernie Knott, a resident of Victoria for 30 years, will represent the Communist Party of Canada in the riding in the next federal election. Knott, nominated last week, will run against current Esquimalt-Saanich MP Pat Crofton

(PC), Lynn Hunter of the NDP, and Bob Slavik of the Reform Party of Canada. An opponent of the proposed free trade deal with the U.S., Knott is the Communist Party of Canada's representative to the

Victoria Coalition Against Free Trade. A member of the executive of the Victoria branch of Veterans Against Nuclear War, Knott is an activist in the peace movement. For many years, he served as an executive member of the Victoria and District Labour Council, and as chairman of its environmental protection committee.

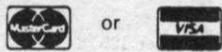

Big John

Sir,
John Turner's enlisting help from the Senate to prevent Mulroney from forcing his free trade agreement upon the 25 million of us has sent free traders into a frantic activity to save their agreement from being demolished at the ballot box.

This government was elected on an anti-free trade ticket, mandated to break the Liberal sejour at the helm. (Trudeaumania did not produce 211 seats in 1968; there was no Mulroneymania in 1984). This government is lead by a man without any credibility, is riddled with scandal, and is strongly mistrusted by some two-thirds of Canadians.

Yet this government is determined to push us into what one half of Canadians view as being an irreversible slide into the gigantic American melting pot. This frenzied pack of 211 PCs keep on crying "we have a mandate to govern" and stomp like madmen on the democratic rights of

Canadians. While they dismantle the country, the nation looks on helplessly, incapable of stopping this "democratic" government of ours. Enter Mr. Turner and the Senate.

An overall measure of the extent of the electoral mandate is the penalties for its violation. The maximum penalty the electorate may inflict upon politicians is denial of re-election. No one would call such a penalty "severe," which leads to the conclusion that "the electoral mandate to govern" is not absolute, that it has some rather narrow limits. Certainly what this government is bent on doing is well beyond such limits.

What if Mr. Mulroney "surrenders" Canada to the U.S. and later we get to vote him out of office? What good is this for us? He will return to the boardrooms of American branch plants but we would never get Canada back, we would never again recover the freedom to manage our affairs, to be Canadians in the global village.

I find it distressing that the media examined Mr. Turner's initiative almost exclusively from the perspective of whether it would help the Liberal Party to win the next election. I suggest that what he did was no more, no less, than what society has a right to expect from Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition. That is, to check the arrogance, to curb the corruption of governments by power which inevitably occur, as Lord Acton observed.

While we may be justifiably suspicious of the motives of politicians, certainly we must shed suspicion when they do their job reasonably well. Mr. Turner did just that. In all fairness, we have no right to read sinister motives into his deed. We must accept that his

motive in this instance is pure, that he was driven by his duty to Canada.

And so does the Senate; it is simply doing what it is supposed to do, which is to catch the errors of politicians. Canadians wanted the Senate abolished, precisely because it did nothing for some long time. Now, at the most critical point in the life of our nation, the Senate is doing its job. It is asserting its authority to stop an arrogant government from violating the democratic rights of Canadians. Indeed, it went as far as to say that it would approve the free trade agreement as soon as Mr. Mulroney obtains a democratic mandate for it. The Senate could not possibly do less than that without abdicating its role. Senators owe that much to the nation.

Certainly Mulroney's "right" to call an election when it is most favourable to his re-election and most adverse to others, fades away when contrasted with the democratic "rights" of Canadians. Turner and the Senate told Mulroney that.

Mulroney, the master of hyperbole, declares unabashedly that "the Senate is hijacking the rights of Parliament." He is angry because the Senate is foiling his strategy to suppress our right to vote on the future of Canada. It is not a "non-elected Senate" subverting the will of Parliament — it is a Senate doing its job, protecting the democratic right of Canadians to vote.

Until now I could not possibly believe that I would ever say it, but here it is — loud, straight from my heart — thank heavens for the Senate! And for Big John!

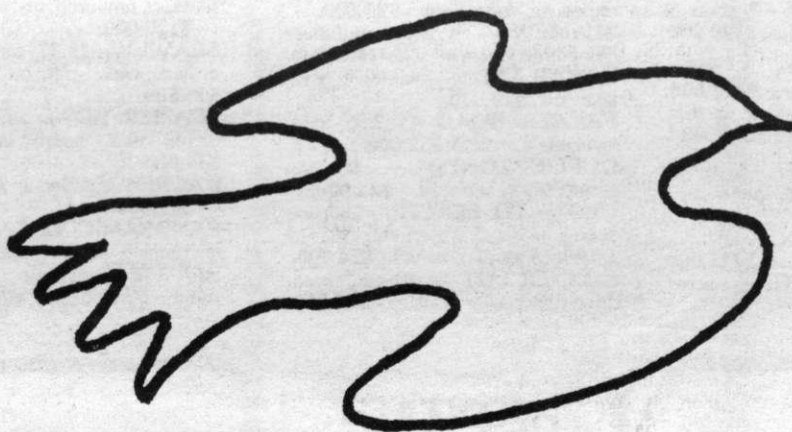
