With election pending

Tories concentrating on unfinished agenda

With Canadians "clearly within a year of the next federal election," the governing Progressive Conservative party is putting the finishing touches on the record it will take to the public. Tory MP Pat Crofton said last week that while the country remains preoccupied with speculation about the date of the election, it will be business as usual in the House of Commons until that call is made.

Earlier this year, at a breakfast meeting in Ganges, Crofton told his audience of Tory supporters that the government wished to clear up three items before seeking re-election — legislation for the free-trade agreement, implementation of child care legislation, and reform of income tax guidelines. Last week, he told *Driftwood* he doubts whether all three goals will be accomplished before the next federal election.

Crofton sits in the House of Commons as MP for Esquimalt-Saanich. However, electoral boundary changes amalgamated portions of that riding with Cowichan-Malahat-The-Islands, which is held by Jim Manly of the NDP. Crofton has been nominated by the Tories to seek election in the new Saanich-Gulf Islands riding, while Manly has decided against running.

Crofton, who visited Salt Spring last week to attend a meeting called to discuss commercial clam harvesting issues, said that if a federal election is called for this fall, an announcement would be made in the next week or so. If that does not happen, he expects the House to take a three-week break, then return for a fall sitting.

The House has been in session almost continuously since last August, when an emergency debate was called to review proposed changes to rules governing immigration — a session sparked by the sudden arrival of 170 illegal immigrants in Nova Scotia.

Since then, the government has concentrated on its free trade, child care and tax reform initiatives, Crofton said. He expects the

free trade bill to be passed along to the Senate late this week or early next week, and debate on child care legislation to follow shortly afterwards.

Tax reform measures are unlikely to be presented until next spring, however. Crofton said there has been no time to debate measures in the House, and more time is needed to discuss those measures with the business community.

"The whole spectrum of tax reform is still under review and discussion," he said. "It's very disappointing. We embarked on tax reform in 1984 but it hasn't moved since then. We've made progress, but not as much as we would have liked. People in business make their plans according to one- and five-year projections, and if we make abrupt changes, it means some trouble for them."

The fate of free trade legislation, meanwhile, will rest in the Senate, which has agreed to Liberal leader John Turner's request to stall the bill until Canadians can vote on the issue. Crofton said while the Tories would prefer to see the bill passed this autumn, it can wait until next spring. However, he said a wait

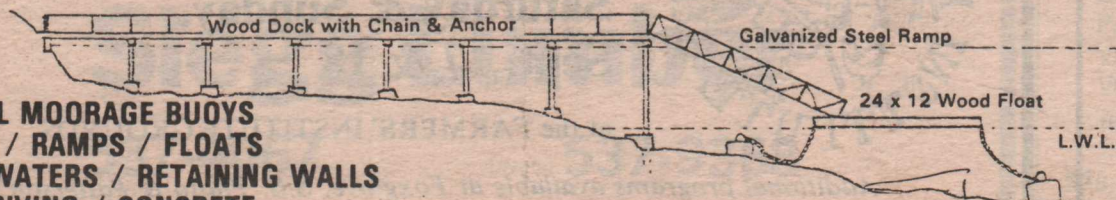

your garden

It virtually always seems like there are so many pressing things to do that writing this article seems dangerously close to missing the deadline for publication — but at least this time I have an almost-valid excuse. This week we've been attending the FarWest Horticultural Trade Show in Portland, Oregon, and as the show is just about over, I want to hit the presses with the news.

Held in the Portland Coliseum, the show has fully 650 exhibitors displaying their wares. In the plants category, much of what was presented is already available up in Canada, without the border hassles, and to be honest we in B.C. have a lot to be proud of in the way of selection and quality.

A few new variations of maples, crabapples and dogwoods will eventually find their way north of the border, and a number of alpines and perennials should soon be forthcoming, too, but all in all we are doing just fine. Two nurseries in the Greater Portland area specialize in Japanese maples, and hopefully we will soon be able to get them up on the Gulf Islands. Some of them were spectacular specimens, and bonsai pots, plants and tools were to be found in numerous booths. Japanese granite garden ornaments and bronze garden lanterns were available in a wide array of form and price.

The trade shows are the first trial grounds

For new advances in the growing technologies, the trade shows are the first trial grounds for acceptance by the industry. There are now several companies marketing granular super absorbents for use in planters, pots, tubs, etc., at very low mixing rates. For a hanging basket, for instance, a teaspoon will help to hold more water in the soil-root area, somewhat like a sponge, and release it into the soil as required by the roots. When mixed in and wetted down, the small granules absorb from 25 to 40 times their weight in water. Known as either *Terra-sorb* or *Supersorb*, the granules can also be mixed with water to form a jelly and then used to dip bare root plants and root ball of transplants to help hold water and reduce transplanting stress.

Many other elixirs and chemicals promise results, and each of them may be worth trying, but most cannot be brought into Canada without passing stringent testing for entry approval. One fascinating tree guard for protecting young tree seedlings from attack by deer is a plastic webbing or mesh, somewhat similar to thick fishnet, which shields the plant for a couple of years and then biodegrades and releases fertilizer into the soil. Over the course of the first two years, the moisture-activated fertilizer is slowly released, while still protecting the tree, and then breaks down.

A permanent cover never breaks down

Other companies have released various ground cloths, and permeable fabrics which reduce or prevent erosion, block the growth of weeds and still allow the penetration of water and fertilizer. Blunk's of the Phillips Petroleum Corporation has a whole range of materials which are designed to break down over various time spans. From one year to three years to five years, and finally to a permanent cover which never breaks down, the choices are such that you can use the cloth where you eventually want the groundcover to take hold, but you need a year or two of weed protection. The group of ground fabrics should be available in Canada soon.

A new item, called *Drain-It*, is a two-part drain material made of a formed black poly core covered on both sides with a non-woven fabric that looks like ground cloth or molten cloth. This fabric allows the water to enter the drain, and allows the water to pass along the poly grid, which looks like a flattened egg crate. The soil is kept out by the fabric, and the whole pipe is about six inches high but only an inch or so thick. This allows the drain pipe to be inserted in two inch-wide trenches, behind railway tie walls, through lawns, etc., with a minimum of soil disturbance.

Solutions to growing garbage woes sought by B.C. environment ministry

Last year's futile search by a New York garbage scow for a final resting place for its rotting cargo was dramatic, focusing world attention on one of our most serious environmental problems — what to do with the mountains of trash that are beginning to clog landfill sites throughout North America.

Excessive product packaging, too many consumer products, too many materials that are not biodegradable or recyclable — these are the culprits responsible for overloading our solid waste disposal systems.

In B.C., although the "garbage crisis" isn't as advanced as it is elsewhere, every man, woman and child in the province generates over two kilograms of garbage every day — a staggering 2.1 million tons a year. This is more garbage than we can dispose of properly, and unless appropriate action is taken, 60 per cent of the province's landfills will reach the end of their service life within 10 years.

But the solution does not lie in creating more disposal sites. Only two per cent of the land in the province is suitable for new landfills, and this land is needed to meet the demands of industry, housing and agriculture.

As well, the notion of establishing new disposal sites has met with stiff opposition due to lack of public confidence in the environmental safety of conventional disposal methods.

To meet the challenges of dealing with the problem, the provincial environment ministry has begun exploring alternatives to landfill disposal of solid wastes. As a first step, the ministry has prepared a discussion paper which examines all aspects of solid waste management, including alternatives to landfills such as recycling, energy recovery from wastes, and beverage container regulation and litter control.

The paper has been widely distributed to local governments

and citizen groups and will be the basis for full public consultation under a task force headed by James Rabbit, MLA for Yale-Lillooet. The task force will conduct public hearings until the end of November, and a provincial strategy for dealing with solid wastes will be recommended to cabinet in the early part of next year.

'Environmental issues centre' eyed for coast

MP Pat Crofton is pressing his provincial and federal counterparts to support establishment of a "centre of excellence" for environmental studies on the West Coast of B.C.

Crofton, the Tory MP for Esquimalt-Saanich who will seek re-election in the new riding of Saanich-Gulf Islands, said last week he envisions this region setting a global pace in environmental impact studies and protection.

"Environmental issues are es-

pecially important today, and we as Canadians have the technical capacity to be world leaders in the field," he said. "Why shouldn't the Victoria area be the leader. We have a lot of the parts already in place."

Crofton pointed out that the region is already home to the Institute of Ocean Sciences, the Dominion Astrophysical Laboratory, a horticultural centre, an experimental farm and the University of Victoria. All that is needed to make the region a

global leader in environmental studies, he said, is to "pull the pieces together and add an infrastructure."

The MP, who said he has been pursuing the initiative at the federal and provincial levels for the past six months, said Canadian and American attempts to involve themselves more closely with Pacific Rim nations means such a centre is bound to be established on the West Coast of North America. "If it's not here,

it's going to be San Francisco or Seattle," he said.

The Pacific Coast is an especially appropriate spot for such a centre, he continued, because it is experiencing rapid population growth and subsequent pressures on its natural resources and amenities. With consideration being given to oil and gas exploration off the West Coast of B.C., with tanker traffic from Alaska to Washington State, and with concern over B.C.'s fishing industry, he continued, the time is

ripe for an environmental studies centre to assess those impacts and help guard against repercussions.

As a start, Crofton said, he would like to see establishment of a lab in B.C. to carry out testing work. Work now underway to monitor and assess the impact of dioxins released into the environment by pulp mills is hampered because the only Canadian laboratory capable of testing samples is located in the east, he pointed out.

'Liberal presence needed'

could cause difficulties if this fall's elections in the U.S. bring a more protectionist profile to the White House and the House of Representatives.

Should a Canadian election be called shortly, Crofton feels its focus in the Saanich-Gulf Islands riding will be on the free trade bill, job creation and environmental issues. "Those are the three key issues," he said, adding that constituents have also expressed concern about the new language bill, the nuclear submarine purchase issue, the federal deficit and tax reform.

As to his prospects for election, Crofton indicated he expects a tough challenge. In the race for the Saanich-Gulf Islands seat are Lynn Hunter of the NDP and Bob Slavik of the Reform Party. The Liberals have yet to name a candidate.

While most pundits are predicting a head-to-head battle in B.C. between the NDP and the Conservatives, Crofton said he feels races could be decided by Reform Party and Liberal candidates.

Crofton explained that the lack of a strong Liberal Party presence could prompt dissatisfied right-wing Tories to throw their support behind the Reform Party.

"If there are no credible Liberals in the race, it may hurt us," he said. "It could mean 5,000 to 10,000 votes in B.C., and that could mean the difference (in a lot of ridings)."

In the last federal election, Crofton won Esquimalt-Saanich

with an 8,000-vote margin over the NDP. The Liberals drew 10,000 votes in that race.

Crofton said Tory election prospects will be based on the government's record of accomplishments, and that he hopes

that record will overshadow its disappointments.

"We've had our troubles," he said. "It seems as if every time we get our head above the water, something (government scandals) came along. But don't forget that we've had a number of accomplishments — we could have spent all of our time dealing with job creation and financial matters but we did a number of other important things, like a defence white paper and a whole range of social legislation dealing with issues like capital punishment and abortion. We can be accused of a lot of things, but laziness isn't one of them."

Given the "teething problems" faced by any new administration, and the difficulties inherent in running a country as complex and diverse as Canada, Crofton said he feels the Tories did a credible job in their first term in office.

"Sure, we made our mistakes, but if you ask whether we gave it a good shot, if there is anyone better or whether we deserve another turn at bat... well, when the time comes, I think the voters will judge us fairly and reasonably, and that's all we can ask for."

Healing

Sir,
I'm writing in response to *Ground breaking book gives power to heal*, on Page A17 of the August 10 *Driftwood*.

May I say a little bit more about healing in regard to sexual abuse of children? The main point is that people *can* be completely healed of the memories of abuse so that they can experience life joyfully, lovingly and without fear. I know this because I was healed the effects of five years of abuse by a "trusted friend", beginning when I was four years old.

My own efforts at forgiveness and re-focussing of my life were important, but not enough to free me. The completion of my healing came through prayer for the healing of memories (or healing of the deep heart) in the Christian Church.

Let me say that healing and love are synonymous, and that healing is not restricted to those who think of themselves as Christian, but is a response to suffering and need and the heart's cry for wholeness. Every healing is unique, as is the person being healed.

In my case, my residual anger was noticed by someone who told me about the healing of memories. It was explained to me how, if I were willing, Jesus (who is real to me) could bring me back to the memory which most needed healing, and that I need not be afraid because I would be protected from hurt of any kind. The simple prayer began for protection and healing, and as I relaxed, my mind began to focus on my early childhood. It was very real, so that once more I was a child of four, but this time Jesus was with me. I was aware of Him as a strong and totally trustworthy man. He took me up in His arms and I felt completely loved, confident and safe.

Then I saw again the man who had abused me, and I saw the evil on his face. I thought indignantly, "Now Jesus will tell him what a bad man he is!"

But this didn't happen. Instead, the man looked at Jesus, and as he did, all the evil became like a mask or husk, and it withered and fell away. I saw underneath a completely new face that I had never seen before, and I saw a look of wonder and relief spread over that face. I felt surprise and then joy, as I thought "Why, he really didn't want to be like that at all."

With this the healing experience ended. Now I have a beautiful healing picture, plus a feeling of safety and joy to replace the distressing memories which I wanted to keep blocked out of my mind. Before the healing I would never have wanted to see my abuser again, in all eternity. Now, through this transforming experience, not

only is there complete forgiveness but reconciliation, which I would not have thought possible. The power of abuse is totally broken.

The maleness of Jesus in this experience is important, as it showed me the wholesome, protective and nurturing love of a man for a child, in contrast to the perverted emotions of the abuser. It made clear that it is not male against female, or vice versa, but all of us against perversion, or, more importantly, all of us, male and female alike, for wholeness, and wholesome and loving relationships.

The gentleness of this healing impressed me. I would like to make clear the sense of privacy and dignity as an individual that I had during the whole healing experience. Nothing happened without my consent, and I was not pushed into anything I was not ready to receive.

Since this healing, the hurtful emotions and memories do not return to haunt me, nor do I dig them up. If I did I might be stuck with them again, and I treasure the freedom and fullness of my healed life too much for that.

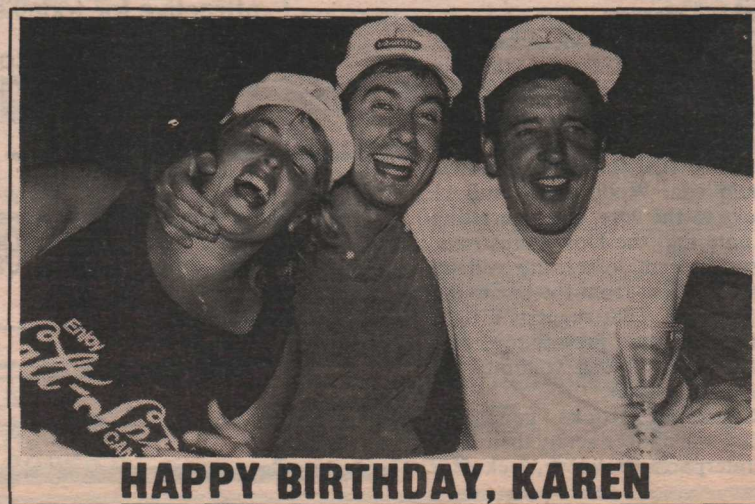
Small towns for the young can often be a hell of a boring place — Salt Spring probably more so, because of its very "insularity."

Flow-through share offerings vary

Flow-through tax shelters have been hailed as the most successful government tax incentive plan ever devised.

Flow-through shares are resource stocks that 'flow through' to investors a federal tax deduction actually granted to companies as compensation for whatever cost they incur exploring for minerals, oil or gas. The resource firms pass this tax break along to the investors to attract the investment capital they need to fund the exploration programs.

Introduced in 1983, flow-throughs got off to a slow start, raising only \$34 million their first

year. But as the program became better understood and as word spread of after-tax returns as high as 385 per cent being achieved, people got interested.

Over the next few years, the amounts raised by flow-throughs doubled or tripled annually, and by 1987 more than \$1 billion was invested in the program.

Today, over 90 percent of all tax shelter dollars have gone into flow-throughs.

The real appeal with flow-throughs is two-fold. Firstly, they provide the investor with significant tax deductions. In fact, for every dollar invested in exploration, the investors receive

\$1.35 in tax writeoffs. Secondly, investors are given a chance to invest in the relatively unpredictable resource sector with minimal risk.

There are today a wide variety of flow-through share offerings available, and they vary widely in format. When considering purchasing a flow-through tax shelter, potential investors should be sure the offering meets with the following criteria. The company offering the flow-through should provide details of past offerings, including performance figures. Investors should ensure they are not paying premiums for the shares they are purchasing. Flow-

throughs that roll into a fund should be avoided as they make liquidating the units very difficult. And, generally speaking, the larger flow-throughs should be avoided, as they have such huge sums of money to place, and cannot be as choosy of the underlying securities, often lowering the quality of the portfolio.

The best flow-through offerings now available provide the investors with direct ownership of common stock and warrants. If an investor does his homework, ensures his flow-through meets these basic criteria, he can look forward not only to large tax savings, but capital gains.



Uncertainty dominant theme of stock market

Stock markets corrected this month. To date, the Dow Industrials have lost six per cent while the TSE 300 has given up only about four per cent. That's typical for August. Historically, any significant rally in stock prices comes at the end of the month, just before Labour Day.

Interest rates are rising.

Higher short-term interest rates don't provide a positive environment for stocks. As interest rates move up, fixed income investments such as Treasury Bills and bonds provide a more attractive income return than stocks. For example, the yield on five-year Government of Canada bonds is now over 10 per cent. The average yield on stocks in the TSE 300 is 3.5 per cent.

Rising interest rates adversely affect the stock market in yet another way. As they move up, economic activity generally slows, retarding corporate profit and dividend growth. There is also the risk of "overkill." If rates go up too much, economic activity can actually contract. This is a recession. Corporate profits fall and dividends are in jeopardy of being cut. It is in this precarious environment that investors now find themselves.

The mood of uncertainty is heightened by the November 8 election in the U.S. and the possibility of such an event in Canada this fall or next spring, over the controversial free trade issue. A Republican victory in the U.S. would be viewed as a plus for financial markets.

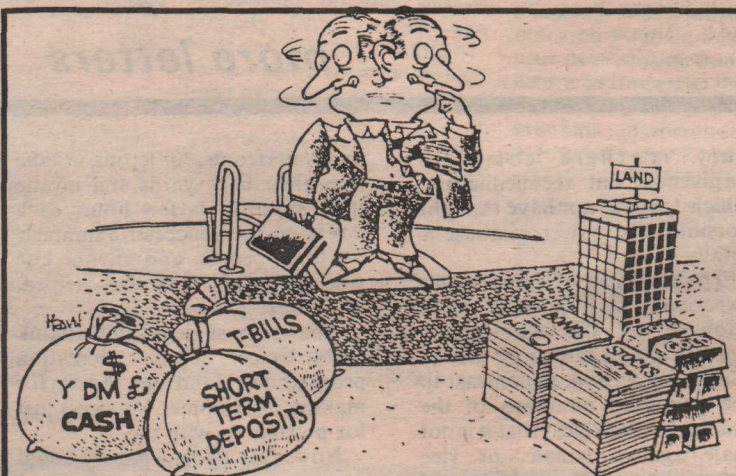
This year it's an incumbent-less race in the U.S. In the six incumbent-less races since 1900, the Dow, by rising between New Year's Day and Election Day, predicted that the party in power would win. While there's still 11 weeks to the vote, it is interesting to note that the Dow Industrials, despite recent losses, are still up three per cent from the beginning of the year. That suggests a tight race for the presidency and probably continued volatility for the stock market.

Canadian stocks generally follow the pattern set by their U.S. counterparts. However, lack of a

free trade agreement with the U.S. could cause some distinct divergences.

In the absence of an agreement, investment funds that flow to Canada from abroad could decline. If this occurs, the dollar will likely weaken and interest rates will rise. Bonds will drop. Higher interest rates will impair corporate profits. Stock prices will fall.

Uncertainty is today's markets' dominant theme. Take advantage of higher interest rates. They won't last. Purchase treasury bills and Government of Canada bonds of up to 10 year's maturity.

Adhere to time-honoured investment rules

For many investors, the prospect of capital appreciation is the main attraction for purchasing common shares. In most portfolios, these shares represent anywhere from 25 per cent to 100 per cent of an individual's invested capital. Because of the common stock's potential for growth, almost every investor has their own method or strategy for creating this wealth.

Since 1982 and up to last October, the common share was the most exciting part of any portfolio; virtually all issues were moving up. No matter which method an investor used to choose a particular stock or which expert or "guru" he listened to, chances are, he was correct. However, since October, market psychology has changed. Corporate profits continue to increase but fear has replaced greed as the driving force behind the market.

Fear causes inaction. Many investors have decided to do

nothing with their portfolios and wait till the market shows some direction. This position of waiting is emotionally understandable, but fundamentally wrong. The purpose of this article is not to change investors' trading habits, but more to review the true basics of investing for capital appreciation.

There are five time-proven principles that an investor should never lose sight of, in any market.

- Buy only active, leading listed issues that are quoted daily in the better newspapers. Always buy quality. You want a ready market to attract other investors.

- Cut losses. When a mistake is made, there is no cheaper insurance than accepting a loss quickly. A buyer who holds regardless of unfavourable news or action can become involuntarily locked in to his "investment" for years, and therefore miss industries that are outperforming the market.

MONEY Matters

- Don't be overly conservative or speculative. The conservative investor is looking for a guaranteed return and by doing so, will often miss opportunities and their portfolio under-performs over the long term.

On the other hand, the speculator seldom outperforms the patient value investor. Only a few very skilled traders can ever, over the long term, achieve a higher return. When speculation is desired, it should be intelligent risk taking on quality companies, not promoter-controlled junior issues.

- Be patient. All our great money managers are extremely patient. For example, John Templeton and Warren Buffet buy the best value

in a particular industry and hold for an average of five to seven years before selling. One of the major faults of amateurs is that they try too hard to make too much money too fast.

As with most business decisions, take your time. Once in a while, a stock will take off and rush up, but in most cases appreciation is slow, and often erratic. It is possible to project long-term trends but only rarely short-term action.

- Industry selection, not market timing, is the key to stock market performance. This is probably the most common mistake an investor will make when choosing an individual stock. Emphasis, as to portfolio adjustments, are often placed on market direction or timing. If the market, as a whole, appears uncertain, then investor decisions are often frozen, until the direction is clear.

This is an attitude that is best

suitable for traders but should never be used for long-term investors. Year after year, in all market conditions, three or four industries will greatly outperform the market averages. For example, in 1980, gold was up 90 per cent; in 1981, sulphur producers increased 134 per cent; and in 1982, the automotive industry rose an impressive 176 per cent; 1987 and 1988 are no exceptions to this rule.

The key to long-term capital appreciation is not market timing but in the selection of the proper industries to invest in.

By paying attention to these five time-honoured investment rules, much of the confusion and uncertainty about common shares and the stock market can be eliminated. Once in a while it will pay to make exception to these rules, but be cautious about such actions. In investing, rules should seldom be broken.

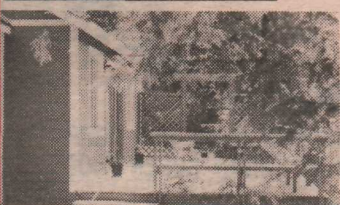

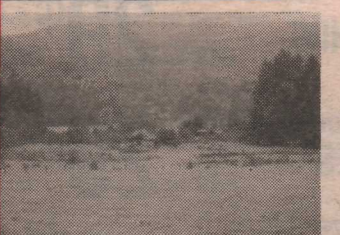

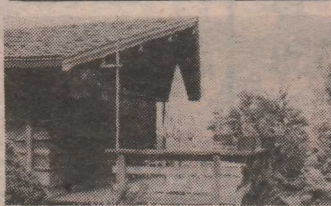
