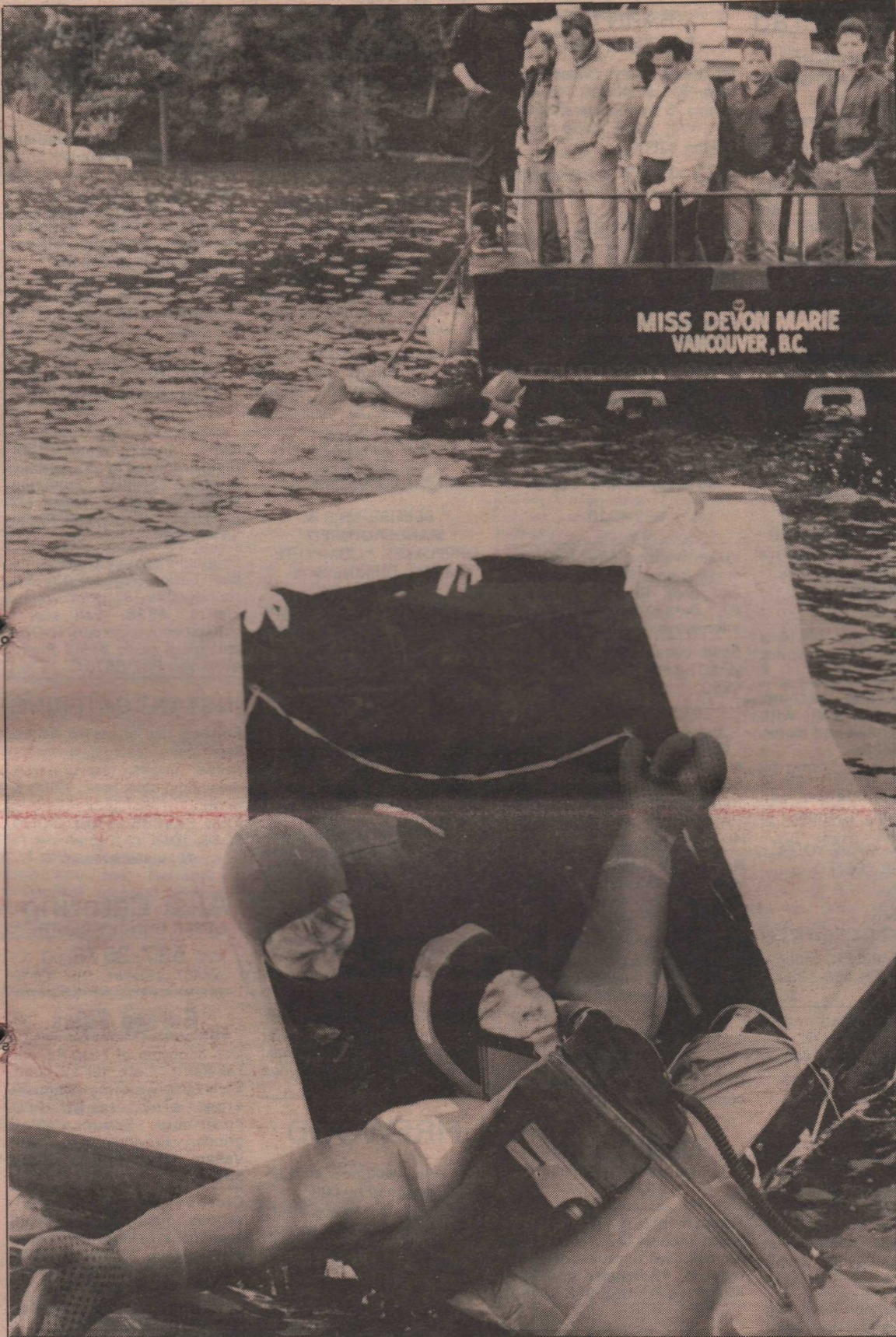

Rezoning request questions raised

The future answer to a present problem may end up costing Bob McCully about \$20,000.

The moving company operator recently saw his application to rezone a central Salt Spring Island property win disapproval from the Advisory Planning Commission (APC). Although the rezoning bid will go to the Islands Trust for final decision, a thumbs down from the APC does not help its chances of acceptance.

McCully told *Driftwood* he purchased the five-acre residential lot on Sky Valley Road to rezone it for commercial use. He envisioned an office for his moving company and, more importantly, a mini-storage facility to meet what he says he has recognized as a growing need on Salt Spring.

Believing his rezoning bid is

now doomed, McCully says he must list the property for re-sale and expects to lose about \$20,000 once all related costs are tallied. Although he said he realizes he was gambling by buying the property before rezoning was assured, the businessman said discussions he held with the Trust prior to purchase led him to believe his chosen site would be suitable.

He's also upset that he received no official notification of the reasons why his application did not pass muster — he received a form letter from the Trust office in Victoria — and that a blind eye is being turned on Salt Spring towards other, non-conforming storage businesses.

"If I can't have it, I want all the others shut down," McCully said

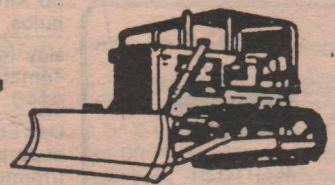
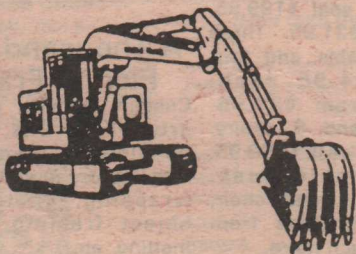

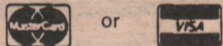

Two weeks ago Sam Lightman demonstrated his concerns with a letter to the editor. About 13 years ago Andrew Place, where he lives, was an integral part of the Stevens Farm. It was subdivided into 10-acre parcels for numerous purchasers who desired a rural environment in that area. Fenced fields, a heritage farmhouse, outbuildings, vacant land and timber land were all sold to those who took the opportunity. Many purchasers have developed their properties, including one who remodelled the farmhouse, turning it into a bed and breakfast accommodation.

Like many newcomers to Salt Spring, Sam's letter and the Islands Watch Society seem to share a common goal: "to strengthen the Islands Trust." Sam accuses Murray Cyprus of a contradiction of terms, but as I read it, it's Sam who says he doesn't like paying higher taxes, yet he'll do anything to strengthen the Trust. Well, this one's for you, Sam. What exactly does the Islands Trust mean to you?

The Trust is supposed to mean local planning and local management of land use. Would you blindly strengthen a system of local government that did not ensure local planning and local management of land use? For those who are unfamiliar with the Islands Trust System, we respectfully submit the following information for your perusal.

Today there are over 500 islands within the Trust area — the 13 major Islands elect two trustees each. Therefore there are 26 trustees in total which, when together, comprise the General Trust. The General Trust meets and elects the executives — the chairman and the two vice-chairmen. The Islands Trust office

is located in Victoria at the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. There, the Trust keeps its files, the secretaries, the manager and the non-resident planners.

Trust meetings are held on individual islands (and sometimes in camera in Victoria.) Each meeting must include one Trust executive, two local trustees, the islands planner and the public. Each meeting is by agenda and deals with a wide range of land-use issues. Most islands have an APC, which is a committee made up of representatives from local groups. The APC makes recommendations to the trustees on those proposals the Trust refers to them.

The total Trust expenditure in 1988-89 is approximately \$628,500, with \$178,500 and \$450,000 coming from two separate sources. The 1986 census establishes that the total population of the Trust area is approx. 14,564 residents.

Questions:

Salt Spring Island contains 42 per cent of the resident population within the Trust area. Why only two trustees for Salt Spring? Why is the office in Victoria?

- Why are there no resident planners?

- How is it that two non-resident trustees from Gambier, with a population of 93 residents, could effectively neutralize the Salt Spring vote of 6,164 residents?

- What can the General Trust do in order to strengthen itself?

Now that people have a more acceptable alternative, I wouldn't be a bit surprised if the socialists in B.C. suffered the same fate as those in Nova Scotia, where the party

was almost wiped out.
This time, when people are fed up with the tired old parties, they

won't have to turn to the NDP. They have the alternative of voting for the Reform Party Of Canada. In so doing they will be voting for free trade, but also for the only party that will work to improve the lot of the western provinces.

after noting he has hauled goods for customers from many of the other sites, and that it was the condition of the other facilities which led him to spot the need for the mini-storage yard he hoped to build.

Ian Fraser, chairman of the APC, has an apology for McCully. He said the moving company owner should have contacted the APC directly to find out why it disapproved of his rezoning proposal, and that the form letter from the Trust was doubtless sent

because staff is labouring under a heavy workload.

"I'm sure the office didn't have time — it's no excuse, but it's a fact," the APC chairman said, adding that he still apologizes to McCully for the treatment he received.

As to the rezoning application itself, Fraser said the main problem was that an adjacent property has been heavily logged, leaving McCully's land exposed to view. There is little chance of adequate screening for the operation, he explained.

There was also a larger problem. Fraser, stressing that he was speaking for himself and not on behalf of the APC, said the Trust must be careful to avoid scattering industrially-zoned properties all over the island. The concept of spot zoning promises larger problems in the coming years, he said, as neighbours object to light industrial or commercial operations creeping into what they believed were residential areas.

The answer, Fraser said, is to find suitable land for light indus-

try or commercial enterprises, and to encourage users to set up shop only on those lands. Once that's done, zoning regulations have to be strictly defined and enforced, to discourage applicants from pursuing rezonings of residential property to commercial or light industrial status.

"If we don't stop allowing those kinds of rezonings, and if we don't find appropriate areas, we're going to be in real trouble," Fraser said. "We have to designate those areas ahead of time and enforce the bylaws —

everything has to be fair and straight-forward, and it has to be enforced.

"The problem has been that there's no other place to go. But if we can convince people of the need for (light industrial and commercial) areas, we can put them in place. And then we can start to deal with the non-conforming users."

The Trust and the APC, Fraser continued, are trying to resolve the problem but can't implement any changes until and unless the public accepts the need for de-

financed commercial and light-industrial areas.

McCully has one problem with that scenario. Because he expects lots for commercial and light industrial use will be scarce if they come into being, he believes the price will be inflated beyond the means of his pocketbook. He also indicated he has little faith in the Trust, noting that he tried to do it their way once and has nothing but losses to show for the experience. Especially galling, he said, is losing while trying to play by the rules, then watching others

get away with non-conforming uses.

Fraser said a prime concern has to be developing hard and fast zoning regulations, publicizing those restraints, and then refusing to allow any deviation from the rules.

"We've got to get to the point where everyone knows the rules and regulations and how they will apply," he said.

Pat James agrees. The local realtor chaired a 1987 task force investigating industrial land use needs and sits as a spectator at

many APC meetings. The area McCully chose for his proposed mini-storage facility may not have been "all that great" for such a use, she said, but it had some merit that could have been considered in light of the pressing need for such sites outside the Ganges core.

James believes applications like the one McCully presented are being graded according to opinion, when they should be assessed by a strict interpretation of zoning rules and regulations, and by the needs of the island.

"Logic has no place in some of these decisions," she said.

McCully, meanwhile, isn't sure what his next step will be. He still believes there's a need for a mini-storage facility but wonders how long he will have to wait to find land suitable for such a venture, even though Fraser said the APC and the Trust are trying to locate appropriate parcels.

"Why blindly flail away at something futile?" he said of another rezoning attempt if his current bid fails at the Trust level.

Elect advisors to Trust committee?

Since the earliest days of planning and land use legislation among the islands, there has been a sharp awareness here that the decision-making tribunal needs substantial local representation.

When land use controls were within the province of the regional districts, islanders objected to the conditions. For example, in the Capital Regional District, the tribunal responsible for planning decisions was the board of directors. There were 18 directors — not more than one of whom actually lived on the island in question. In the case of the Outer Islands and other islands up the coast, there might be no director resident in the area under debate.

It was this impersonal participation that led to the warm reception accorded the Islands Trust at its inception.

Instead of one local representative among 18, the new decision-making body was two local spokesmen among a tribunal of five. For a number of years the procedure whereby all zoning and planning matters were resolved in this manner proved an acceptable improvement.

The situation on Salt Spring Island today is that the tribunal consists of four members. The Salt Spring Island Trust Committee includes the two island trustees and two general trustees or vice-chairmen. Because the chairman of the Trust, Nick Gilbert, is also the Salt Spring Island local trustee, he occupies two of the five chairs. At such time as another trustee might take over the chair, the Salt Spring committee would return to full five-member strength with its two local trustees and three general trustees.

Also contributing to the decision-making committee is the advisory planning commission. Its members are nominated by various island organizations and all proposals for change in the use of land must be considered by this unpaid body. It has administrative authority. As the name would indicate, it serves purely in an advisory capacity. From time to time, it exerts a persuasive influence, perhaps, but its powers go no further.

If, however, the Municipal Act were amended to provide for the election of the planning commission in unorganized components of the Trust area, then the standing of the members would be enhanced. And if that measure were further extended to provide for the participation of the planning commission as part of the island trust committee, the local input would be considerably increased. By this means the planning commission could prepare all applications for change before the final Trust Committee sitting, in which it would then take part.

The number of members would be reduced and a maximum of five or six persons would probably

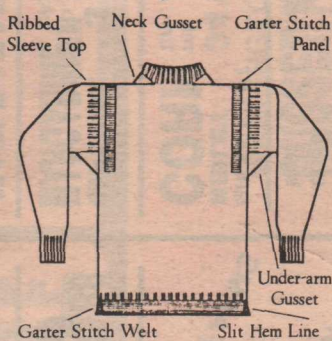
suffice.

It would be a measure almost certainly welcomed by most islanders and it would bring land use controls close to the home community.

History of the Guernsey

The knitting industry in Guernsey dates back to the early 16th century, when licences were granted by the Crown to import wool from England. The Guernsey sweater came into being as a garment for seamen, who required a warm, hard wearing, yet comfortable item that would resist the sea spray. 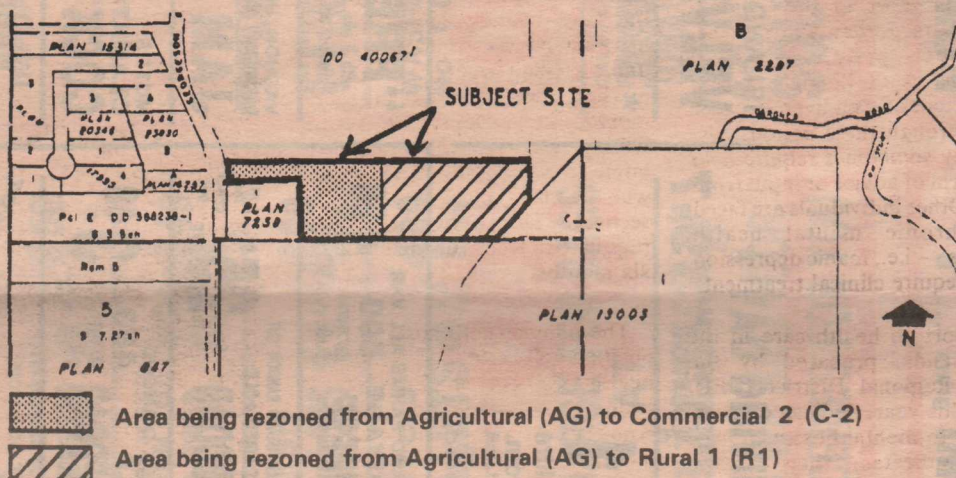

1. Uses permitted on the land zoned Commercial 2 (C2) shall be limited to:

 - (b) A restaurant;

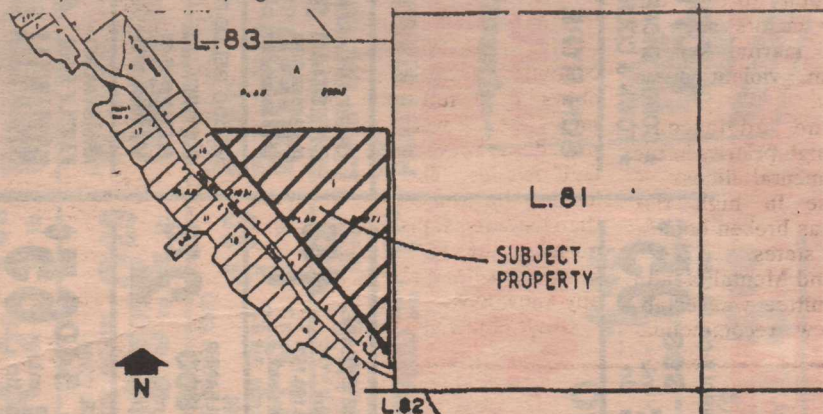

Community Society looks to improve island's mental health care resources

One in every eight Canadians can expect to be hospitalized for mental illness at least once in his or her life.

Mental illness is the leading cause of hospital and medical care in the most productive part of the population — those aged 20 to 64 — and suicide is the second most frequent cause of death among Canadians aged 15 to 39.

Mental illness is described as a "problem of major proportions in Canada" and something that may not get the attention it needs.

The Mental Health Advisory Committee based on Salt Spring is an autonomous body combining representatives from numerous Gulf Island organizations. Following a mandate to look into mental health needs in the Gulf Islands, the committee has drafted several objectives and is ready to proceed with priority implementations.

Among the five objectives outlined by the committee is one to find a residence where an individual dealing with a mental health problem could live for a time. The committee also hopes to establish more permanent mental health services on the islands.

The chairman of the committee, Barbara Jordan-Knox, notes that most people undergo "problems with living" during crisis periods of their lives. In order to get through these periods, she said, they sometimes require help in the form of advice or input from others. Other individuals are faced with chronic mental health problems — i.e., manic depression — and require clinical treatment.

A report on health care in the Gulf Islands, prepared by the Capital Regional District (CRD) earlier this year, dedicated several pages to mental health. As the report indicates, there is no universally accepted definition of mental illness. In a 1983 report by Dr. Hesltine, mental health is described as "a style of living that allows the individual to develop his abilities to pursue goals, to meet needs and to cope with life problems without undue emotional distress."

A person's ability to cope can be affected by factors such as unemployment, marital separation, alcoholism, violent crime and delinquency.

Children and adolescents should receive high priority in the prevention of mental illness — especially those in high risk situations such as broken homes, the CRD report states.

The Gulf Island Mental Health Advisory Committee was established to review recommenda-

tions made by the CRD report. The committee, which represents numerous health care groups in the Gulf Islands, looked at the recommendations, modified some and prioritized others.

The committee is presently looking for a family or couple willing to periodically open their home to a mentally-ill individual who needs a place in which to recover. The individual might require two weeks at the home, or six months.

The homeowner chosen for the position will be funded by mental health services in Victoria. If training is necessary, Jordan-Knox said, the Mental Health Advisory Committee will provide for it. The family or couple will be in constant touch with the advisory committee, which will be available should the homeowner feel the situation is over his head.

(Anyone interested in applying for the position should contact Jordan-Knox, who can be reached during the day at the Community Centre — 537-9212.)

Also high on the advisory committee's list of priorities is obtaining a full-time "mobile" mental health worker, who would provide services on each of the Gulf Islands. The committee is looking for someone with more than listening skills to take on this position: the worker should also have counselling ability and therapy know-how.

Other objectives for the islands

include provision of emergency foster homes for children in unstable environments; psychiatric services performed by a regular visiting psychiatrist; and mental health education.

Currently, mental health resources available on Salt Spring Island consist of family physicians, Lady Minto Hospital, the Community Centre, a psychiatric nurse who travels to the island one day per week, school psychologist Dr. Ralph Miller, and the NEED Crisis and Information Line.

A visiting psychiatrist, who once travelled to Salt Spring on a regular basis, stopped coming here due to time lost in travel. There is no doubt, the CRD report states, that the geographical separation of the Gulf Islands from the rest of the CRD area complicates matters, making it expensive and time-consuming for professionals to travel here.

Jordan-Knox feels the position of a visiting psychiatrist might be filled by someone wishing to retire slowly from the profession,

or by a young psychiatrist looking at starting his career. A sufficient workload for the individual is guaranteed, the report states.

Jordan-Knox also said there is a great need for emergency foster homes on the islands. Children temporarily needing a stable environment are presently staying with family or friends, and are sometimes forced to move off the island.

The Mental Health Advisory Committee is committed to continuing its work in these areas of mental health on the islands, acting in an advisory position to any number of groups, Jordan-Knox said.

"We have identified the sources," she noted, "but need more resources."

Recent news reports have told of the effective and massive job the Canadian Red Cross is doing in providing relief to the storm-stricken country of Jamaica.

The news doesn't come as any great surprise to Canadians, or indeed to most people in the western world, for it is just one of the ongoing and varied roles of the Red Cross. For many generations it has brought succor to countries ravaged by nature and by man. It is an accepted tradition of Canadians in every corner of the country that when help is needed the Red Cross will be there. In recent years, much of the financing of its work has come through its partnership with the United Way on a nation-wide basis.

On Salt Spring the annual door-to-door canvass of the Red Cross was no longer necessary when the United Way of Greater Victoria came to the island in 1987 by accepting the Salt Spring Community Society as one of its agencies.

"Having the United Way on Salt Spring is just marvelous," said Carol Simpson, a long-time worker with the Red Cross. "It gives the Community Centre a much higher profile in the community and eliminates the need for the door-to-door canvass."

On the other hand, Simpson points out, it has in no way decreased the activities of the Red

Cross and its various programs on the island. She said the Red Cross will continue to offer a variety of invaluable and sometimes life-saving services to the community.

At present, in addition to recruiting blood donors and organizing clinics, the Salt Spring

Red Cross group offers free transfusion services through the Lady Minto hospital. Free blood transfusions are unique to Canada, it was pointed out. In most countries, there is a charge for the blood and for the transfusion.

One of the more active Red

Cross programs on Salt Spring is the sickroom equipment loan service. It provides crutches, wheelchairs, bed pans, hospital beds and other items to those in need.

When residents are solicited for pledges to the United Way on

October 12, they should bear in mind that their donation is supporting not only the many programs of the Community Society but also the valuable work of the Red Cross which has been active on the island for more than 40 years.

Food bank operating year-round

The food bank of the Salt Spring Community Society is an operation which many people think is only activated at Christmas time to provide hampers for needy families. In actuality, it is a year-round operation which supplies food on an emergency basis to more than 110 families on the island.

The food bank was started just over six years ago and for the past two years has been supervised by Nel Meyer, an employee of the society. It is financed largely through an annual auction, donations and the supermarket cash register tape exchange.

Last year a total of \$7,280 was raised from these sources. That was just \$819 short of actual expenditures. The deficit had to be made up from the society's limited general funds.

This year the food bank auction is being organized by Maggie Warby and will be held in Central Hall early in January. Articles for the sale can be left at the Community Centre offices.

Of the total amount raised last year, \$3,969.64 was derived from the supermarket cash register tape program. The tapes are normally collected in a box at the Village Market exit doors. There is also a container for food donations at the exit.

Last year the food bank made over 279 visits distributing food hampers. Those visits were in addition to the Christmas hamper distribution.

Contributions to the upcoming United Way annual solicitation on October 12 will help keep the food bank operating on Salt Spring.

Alcohol, drug abuse program supplies funds to Salt Spring

Joe Leans, regional manager for the provincial government's drug and alcohol abuse program, met with various islanders last week to discuss use of funding which has become available for drug and alcohol treatment in the Gulf Islands.

Funding in the amount of \$33,000 for six months — and a further \$66,000 next year — has been made available to the Community Society for the development of treatment programs on Salt Spring Island and the Outer Gulf Islands.

Leans met with members of the Community Society and the substance abuse committee to discuss the types of programs allowed under the funding guidelines. As Leans explained, the money is part of a \$60 million package aimed at several aspects of dealing with drug and alcohol abuse in B.C.

One of the problems identified in the Gulf islands is that of access to treatment services.

Community Society director Barbara Jordan-Knox said the society will be looking for input from the substance abuse committee and will stress improved access for Outer Islanders as it decides how the funds would best be allocated.

She said the substance abuse committee, which has been studying the situation in the Gulf Islands since its formation last spring, will function as an advisory body.

The society is presently considering the feasibility of a "mobile team" which would travel throughout the islands, providing services in the areas of mental health, family counselling and drug and alcohol abuse.

Ruckle house restoration finished; crew completes all exterior work

It took a five-man crew a month to complete restoration of Henry Ruckle's historic Beaver Point farmhouse — but at least they did not have to row back and forth between Sidney and Salt Spring to bring in supplies, as was the case for the Ruckles around 1874.

Contractor Bob Whelan said last week the farmhouse, nestled in an idyllic setting surrounded by orchards and Ruckle Park, had been battered by time and the elements, and was in worse shape than the other nearby buildings.

Whelan, whose renovation firm is based in Victoria, began the restoration work in August using construction specifications supplied by Salt Spring architect Jonathan Yardley, who had earlier completed structural assessments of the historic farm buildings.

The project was carried out under the jurisdiction of the provincial ministry of environment and parks.

Whelan said sun, wind and rain had done extensive damage to the farmhouse over the years, and that the required restoration work included painting of the entire exterior, plus repairs to all exterior doors and windows, and rebuilding of the porch.

"In a project of this nature," he said, "obstacles are numerous, due to the age of the structure. Special attention had to be given to the paint colour, wood dimensions and hardware in order to match the original and preserve the building's authenticity."

Which brings us to one piece of hardware. Whelan says he is still searching for a spring-loaded sash locking pin — a rare item today, since none has been manufactured since the 1870s. If anyone happens to have one, they can contact Whelan at 385-0674.

country gourmet

by john edwards



*After Indian summer will come the cold
The frost will creep and the world seem old
Across the crackling grate the logs will spark and glow
While blackbirds scratch for icy worms upon the fallow
And when freezing apples rust beneath the snow
Then roasting chickens will sizzle next to puddings*

In my stove

According to Charles Darwin our domestic chicken started out as Gallus Gallus, the Red Jungle Fowl of South-East Asia — not, as some may think, on the Kentucky farm of Colonel Sanders.

Unlike cattle and pigs and sheep, this shy forest bird was only recently domesticated in our history: by 2000 B.C. in India and even more recently in Egypt and classical Rome. Recipes from this period are written interchangeably for wild fowl: guinea hens, geese, pigeons, doves, partridge, hazel hen, crane, peacock and, for the adventurous, flamingo.

People who don't live on this island do a lot of things with chickens, besides eating them or using their cockerel as a rustic alarm clock.

*The cock, that is the trumpet to the morn,
Doth with his lofty and shrill-sounding throat
Awake the god of day.*

There is the deplorable but popular "sport" of cock fighting, which efficiently combines blood lust and gambling. Foretelling the future through the examination of bones is popular in some political circles (our home-grown varieties are less imaginative and rely upon motives of greed and avarice), as is the wearing, among other things, of tail feathers by style-conscious foreigners.

Chicken, however, is the delight not only of western cooks, but also of etymologists. From the Latin pullus comes the French poulet and the English pullet, while both the word *cook* and the French *coq* sound suspiciously close to an ancient Sanskrit term, *kuk*, linguistic echoes of which "crop up" in many regional kitchens across Europe and North Africa.

Everyone has roasted a chicken, plainly, in the oven; but serious, experimental cooks know that this food has nearly every advantage: the flavour is delicate yet survives all but the most outrageous of seasonings, and it can be easily and successfully stuffed with an enormous range of ingredients, from almonds to oysters, or constitute the foundation of an infinity of soups, stews, curries, salads and sandwiches. And we haven't even got to the question of the eggs.

The number of excellent chicken sauces is legion and almost all incorporate the pan drippings so that nothing is wasted. The index to my book, *Roman Cookery* (\$12.95 at your local bookstore), for example, lists 27.

It is hard — perhaps impossible — to spoil a chicken, short of setting fire to it or stuffing it with pepper like the demented cook in Alice in Wonderland; although just as some unfortunates claim to be incapable of learning to draw, so, I suppose, people exist for whom a kitchen is anathema.

There are, in fact, as many ways to make chicken as there are to make love and in both cases the only limits to enjoyment are those of the imagination.

To get things rolling, so to speak, I recommend Chicken Vardanus, a dish popular in Dalmatia, served with the Egyptian flavour of Squash Alexandrine and a few mushrooms sauteed gently in a red wine sauce. It's a feast for lovers and cooks.

CHICKEN VARDANUS WITH CHIVES AND HAZELNUTS

2 lbs. chicken parts
2 T olive oil

first sauce:

1 C chicken stock
2 t olive oil or butter
1/2 C white wine
1 T fresh chives, chopped
1 1/2 t coriander
1 1/2 t savory or sage

second sauce:

ground pepper, to taste
1/4 C hazelnuts or almonds, finely chopped
1/2 C pan juices
1 C milk
flour

Take chicken parts and brown them in olive oil.

For the first sauce, mix stock, olive oil, white wine, chives, and savory or sage, according to taste. Cover, and cook the browned chicken parts in this sauce until done.

Now, in a mortar, grind pepper, mix with finely chopped nuts, and add to sauce from the chicken pan. Blend with milk, pour over the cooked chicken, and bring up to the boil. Thicken the sauce with flour. Add water to achieve the desired consistency, and serve over the chicken pieces.

The combination of chives and hazelnuts goes wonderfully well with slow-cooked chicken breasts and is delectable when served with hot rolls, sauteed mushrooms, and Alexandrine Squash.

Squash is always a versatile and appealing vegetable. It marries well with most birds and adds a dash of unexpected colour. Another dependable balance of tastes in this dish is represented by the presence of cumin with coriander. These culinary twins are used to best advantage when they have been freshly ground.

Seniors' data file outlined

Over 140 people attended a September 26 luncheon held by Salt Spring's *Seniors for Seniors* to launch the group's "Seniors Resource Information file."

President Mike Beach outlined the background of the group's information of relevance to seniors. Bob Appleton, co-ordinator of the project, then explained how the file was put together with the help of many members of the group. He noted that the job still requires continued dedication by many workers, to keep the information up to date and accessible.

Appleton also stressed that the group's purpose is to direct seniors to services they need, and not to duplicate services already in place in the community.

Nan Jenks, co-ordinator of the "Helping Volunteers," spoke of those who will be dispensing the information to the public, together with related services. Julia Forbes, leader of the "Senior Buddies," described the many small services these volunteers will be able to provide to seniors in needs of such things as transport to a medical appointment or a friendly visit.

The leader of the "Outpost Volunteers," Lillian Horsdal, explained how other volunteers would be taking the file around to such places as Croftonbrook, Brinkworthy and Fulford to make the information more accessible to seniors, and to provide assistance in filling out application forms or making contact with other agencies.

Marion Goodwin spoke of a peer counselling course to be given through the United Church, and which interested members of *Seniors for Seniors* have been invited to attend.

Barbara Jordan-Knox, director of the Community Society, spoke of the connection the seniors' group has had with the society over the past two years, and of the persistence and hard work they have shown in bringing their present program to fruition.

Following the program's presentation, several people interested in joining the effort were given further information. The group's present headquarters is at the Community Centre; telephone 537-9971.

Bike trek collects funding for lungs

A total of \$56,000 was raised for the B.C. Lung Association by a recent event which saw 78 cyclists pedal around Salt Spring Island.

The cyclists, who travelled around Salt Spring September 17 before leaving for Vancouver Island the following day, raised \$43,710 in cash and \$12,296 in pledges.

To date, William Shoichet, 41, a physician from Victoria, is the top fund-raiser, bringing in \$7,800 in cash. Money raised through the Bike Trek is directed towards lung disease research and health education.

The three-day, 180 kilometre trek followed a route across Salt Spring, through the Chemainus and Cowichan Valleys, and around Shawnigan Lake and the Saanich Peninsula.

The fifth annual Bicycle Trek for Breath and Life is scheduled for September 16, 17 and 18, of next year.

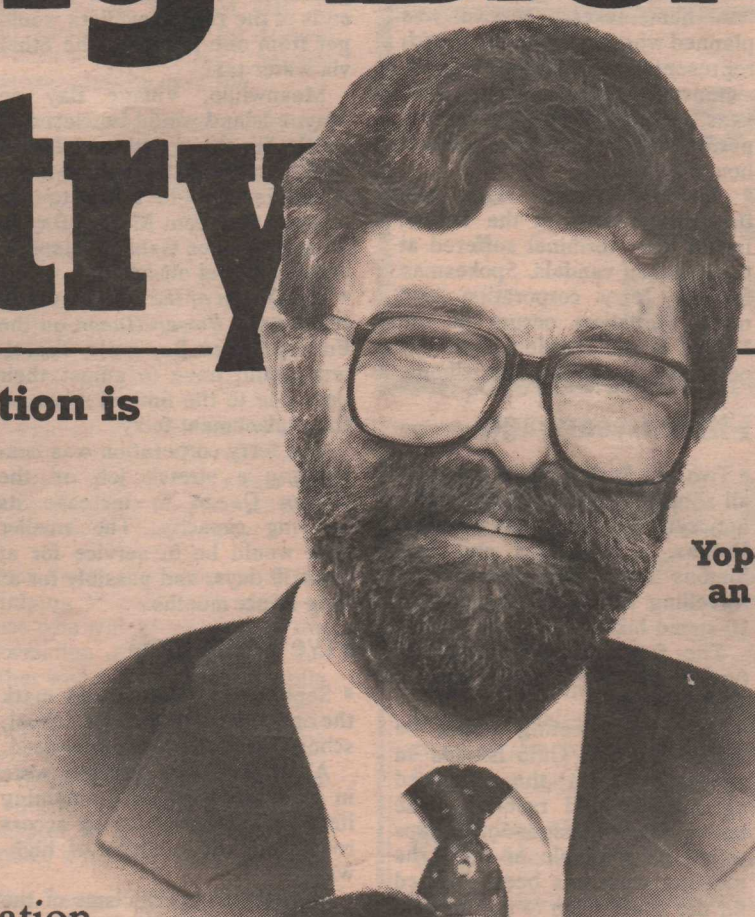
