

### Staffing shortage troubles Trustee

The Islands Trust was scheduled to meet yesterday (Tuesday) with Municipal Affairs Minister Rita Johnston to discuss its need for additional staff.

"The staffing issue is crucial," Trust chairman Nick Gilbert said last week in noting that the Trust is currently operating with a staffing level below its minimal requirements.

The Islands Trust operates with staff members provided by the municipal affairs ministry.

Gilbert, who will be accompanied to Victoria by Trust vice-chairmen Carol Martin (Hornby Island) and Steven Wright (South Pender Island), said the Trust recently lost the services of a planner transferred to another division of the municipal affairs ministry, and fears it may lose another member when the fiscal year expires in April.

"Right now, we're at about 75 per cent of what we need for a minimal operating level," he said. "If we lose the other person as well — and we have no guarantees for that position after the end of March — we would be down to about 50 per cent."

Such a reduction, he continued, would place the Trust in "an impossible situation."

Gilbert said staff members are overworked and too scarce to properly handle all of the work the Trust is expected to perform.

"It's really tough for the staff — they're near burnout," he said. "The critical problem is not omissions but errors. There's a need to do things quickly, and that's when mistakes are made."

The lack of enough staff is also causing planning problems, Gilbert continued. "Where we are really suffering is in our ability to do planning — it's hard for the staff to get into major policy initiatives and do routing business at the same time."

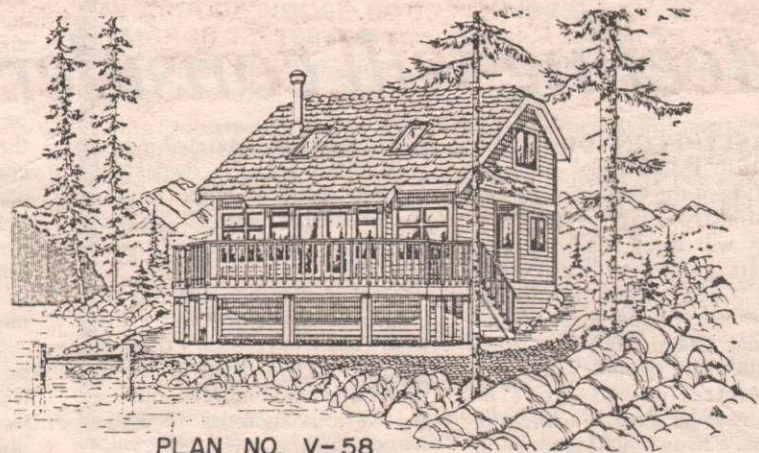
"We've been saying this for years, but now it's getting worse."

The shortage is even more troubling, Gilbert said, because it comes in the wake of an all-party legislative committee's recommendation for a strengthened Islands Trust.

"There was so much positive input in that report, and nothing has come out of it to address the concerns raised at the hearings," he said. "That's what makes this particularly disheartening."

Gilbert concluded that he did not know what type of reception the Trust would receive from Johnston because the trustees are still not sure how her ministry intends to deal with the report of the all-party committee.

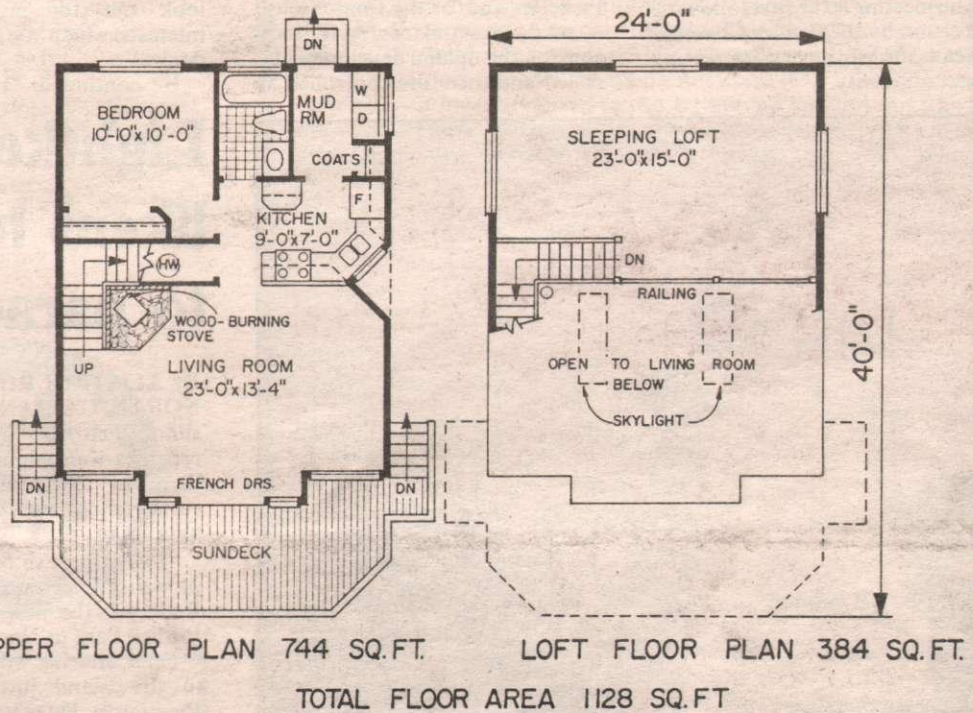
Mom and dad get the downstairs bedroom and the kids get the loft. Sounds like fun, doesn't it?

The cabin is designed for summer use, but a small room outside the utility could provide an air lock, and space for skis, gumboots, clam rakes etc. for fall and winter use.

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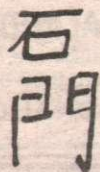

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### Meeting will consider wharf administration plan

PENDER ISLANDS — Representatives of the Coast Guard and the Ministry of Fisheries and Oceans will meet March 7 with members of an ad-hoc Pender Island Chamber of Commerce committee to discuss formation of a Pender Island Port Authority. The authority would take over administration of government docks at Port Washington, Hope Bay, Browning Harbour and Bedwell Harbour.

The meeting is the first following a decision by the Pender Chamber to act as the lead agency in creating a port authority.

Attending the March 7 meeting will be Bob George — owner of the Corbett Store at Hope Bay and Fisheries wharfinger for the docks at Hope Bay and Browning Harbour.

"We need to upgrade and have standards set for upkeep," George said, "but I have what I think is a better idea — keep everything under a federal umbrella, but lease the various facilities to upland owners such as myself. Then have the federal government — Fisheries and/or the Coast Guard — set down standards. As for local control, the upland development is zoned and therefore controlled by

the Islands Trust. They would continue to oversee proposed changes."

Following the Chamber of Commerce decision to take on the ports project, George wrote a letter to Gary Norberg, the regional manager for Fisheries and Oceans.

"I asked that he give me a lease on my wharves at Hope Bay," says George. "As I proposed it, the lease would guarantee no change in public access or Fisheries rate structure. I just feel that I have to look out for my own shore interests which are tied in to the docks."

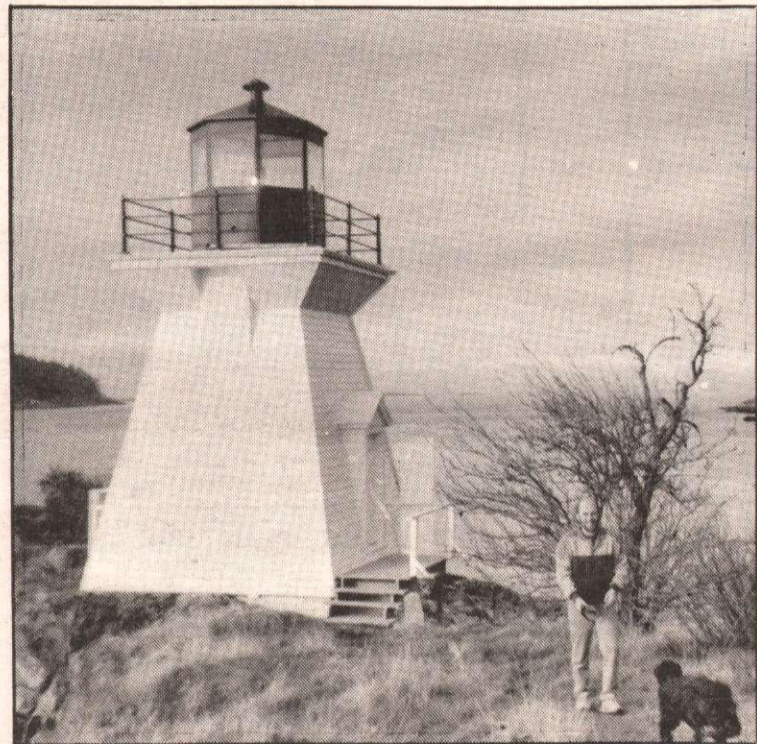
He continued: "I saw this port

problem coming a year ago, and talked with Gordon Wallace about it then. With regard to Port Washington, I saw the writing on the wall following the wharfinger seminar in November at Port Hardy. I found out at the meeting that Lions Clubs up and down the coast were, in certain instances, spearheading efforts to retain their government wharf facilities. I told Dave Barratt, who was at the meeting, that I would talk to a Lions' representative when I returned."

"There is no doubt," says George, "that Gordon Wallace's letters to the Coast Guard resulted

in Transport replacing the torn-out docks with the new ramp, pilings and fingers. My major concern is politics. Our harbours here on Pender are ports of call for Mayne, Saturna and the other nearby islands."

Attending the March 7 meeting will be Coast Guard Manager Dave Barratt and Fisheries Manager Gary Norberg. They will be joined by the Chamber's Dave Jamieson, the Power Squadron's Jack Little, and Phil King of the Pender Island Yacht Club.

### Lightkeeper likens home to paradise

NORTH GALIANO — It was a sunny February afternoon. The crocuses were blooming here and there in the neat flower beds surrounding the lawns of the lighthouse.

"I can't believe this place — it's paradise," commented Peter Redhead, the new lightkeeper at Porlier Pass in North Galiano.

Peter and his wife Sheila came to the island just a year ago. Previously, Peter had been posted to the Triple Island light near Prince Rupert. There, a fortress-like building clings to one of a series of bare rocks. You come and go by helicopter, and spend one month on duty and one month off (because of the desolation and loneliness of the station). Often, the storms rage for days on end, the waves crashing against the rocks and sometimes breaking over the buildings three stories high.

According to Peter: "At many times of the year, exercise becomes a problem as you daren't go outside. On calmer days you could jog around and around the helicopter pad to get exercise. Sheila, not a lover of hot sunny days such as we had on Galiano last summer, liked the cool breezes at Triple Island, but she was only there in the summer and even then found living with a fog horn a bit much."

"The horn went on for days," Sheila claims, "and then there was the machinery. To get away from the noise of the horn I moved my bed into the room above the machinery room, but there the vibrations prevented my rest and I could still hear the horn."

Here at Porlier Pass the machinery is in a separate building at least 150 feet from the house, and the fog horn is in the tower on Race Point, about 500 feet in the other direction.

### Festival to celebrate trees

GALIANO ISLAND — A mid-March festival being organized to celebrate the island's unique environment will have a special focus on trees.

Arranged by the Galiano School of Arts, the festival is set for March 13 to 19 at various venues. Included on the program agenda is a forest talk by Montague Park naturalist Dave Fraser, a family country dance hosted by Galiano's Scottish Country Dancers, *A Tree Story* staged by puppeteer Daphne Mennel, story-telling with Ellen White, and a surprise performance event listed only as *A Tree Celebration*.

"The festival is really an opportunity for the community to get involved in the promotion of our island as a very special place to live and visit," says Akasha Forest, program co-ordinator for the Galiano School of Arts.

She added that the island's artists, sports enthusiasts, naturalists and others are all invited "to make use of this time to feature special activities on the theme of the environment."

Galiano School of Arts is now in its second year of operation. It provides enrichment programming for visual and performing arts, plus sports and outdoors skills training for children and families.

Its *Summer Adventures 1987* program drew 400 participants to 21 courses ranging from kayaking to printmaking to creative writing. The school's *Winter Adventures 1988*, still underway, has 88 students enrolled in programs like violin training and gymnastics.

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# Land use planning must look at timber

The recent confrontations between logging crews and residents on Galiano and Salt Spring Island are clear evidence that logging methods which were acceptable in the past are now considered unacceptable, especially in the Trust area.

The forested areas on these islands are perceived by all residents as a major and important resource. While the harvesting of timber may be the desired principal use on some of those lands, it is important to recognize the benefits from other uses.

The Islands Trust, when establishing regulations for land use within the Trust area, takes into consideration the potential effect on the environment and on adjacent land uses, particularly when intensive uses of land are involved. It would be consistent with the Trust mandate and reasonable to request that the Islands Trust have some input into the industrial use of large parcels of private and Crown lands where logging is involved. Management plans establishing the rate, extent and methods of harvest should respect the policies of the Islands Trust.

It is desirable for the Islands Trust to promote the establishment of logging practices that are sensitive to the environment, and to ensure a sustainable yield and economy to protect future opportunities and preserve other values and uses of the land.

Poorly-managed or careless logging practices severely reduce future opportunities for many compatible investments. For example: the visual impact of large areas denuded by clear-cutting has a negative impact on tourism. Recreational and education opportunities that are considered important by residents and visitors alike are lost.

Increased erosion, the impairment of recharge areas to groundwater aquifers, diminished surface water quality and the destruction of wildlife habitat and plant communities are examples of the environmental degradation, caused by careless logging methods, which can affect the local communities long after the logging has finished.

No doubt there are legitimate differences of opinion regarding the best use of this resource from occupational/professional/environmental perspectives. However it should be the objective of the provincial government, private landowners and the Islands Trust to work together with island residents to effectively manage the use of this resource the achieve sustainable benefits for ourselves without diminishing the potential of the resource for future generations.

To some extent, this process has begun. The recent Select Standing Committee review of the Islands Trust recommended that policies of the provincial ministries when operating in the Trust area should conform to the object of the Trust. The minister of municipal affairs should encourage the establishment of protocol agreements between the various ministries and the Islands Trust to this end.

MacMillan-Bloedel (Noranda) recently joined in a process through which Clear-Cut Alternatives, a local group representing the Galiano community, could exchange concerns about logging practices on large tracts of MacMillan-Bloedel's privately-owned land. While there are still some differences of opinion, it is hoped this dialogue will continue and lead to an equitable solution. On Salt Spring Island, overtures have been made to the Trust Committee by owners of land to discuss the possibilities of density transfers as a means to preserve forested land.

All these examples are encouraging. However, it should be kept in mind that while dialogue is important in initiating a process, action will determine the true success. Too often dialogue is used to delay action, as part of a public relations strategy or to drag negotiations over a long period of time to frustrate the other participant. Also it is conceivable that some forested land may be held for ransom to gain higher densities or favourable rezoning.

It is hoped that none of these situations will occur and that our common goal will be a well-managed forest with a reasonable harvest by reasonable means based on sustainable yield that will encourage all the positive aspects of this resource without threatening anyone's investment or income.

Surely the time has come to acknowledge that long-term investments that will benefit future generations are more important than the quest for short-term gains. We can no longer afford to separate economic policies from environmental policies.

Unfortunately, it will depend on the determination and commitment of local communities to keep this issue in focus and visible, otherwise the political will to remedy this situation will not be found.

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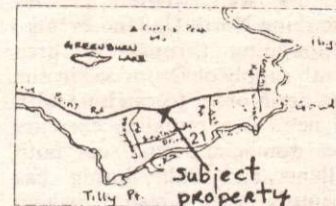
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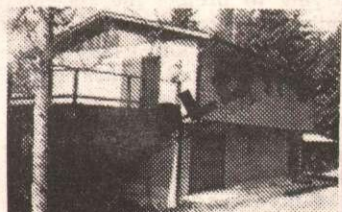

# Logging conflicts dominate Gulf Island columns

After three months absence one returns to the duty of writing the Galiano column with a feeling of disorientation but also a sense of *deja-vu*. But first to obligations; to thank Florence Dodwell for her faithful reporting of Galiano news, and to compliment Alistair Ross for his well written articles describing North Galiano events.

Ploughing through a three month supply of *Driftwood* in one evening in order to catch up with the news is a revealing exercise. The dominant issue on both Galiano and Salt Spring has obviously been forestry; logging practices and the use of forest land have been the subject of numerous articles and letters to the editor. This is no less a contentious issue in the lands down under, where we have been enjoying a borrowed summer.

In Queensland the tropical rain forest has been almost completely destroyed, with very little chance of regeneration within 100 years. Environmentalists were warning about a similar fate threatening the native forests of Tasmania. In New Zealand, despite a so-called socialist government, state forests are being sold to private companies and the magnificent native trees, such as the *kuari*, are not being replaced. Although there are extensive new forests and an abundant supply of timber, over 90 per cent of new plantings are radiata pine, so monoculture is firmly established as policy in both the private and public sector.

In England and Wales, 40 per cent of the deciduous woodlands have been lost in the past 40 years while an equivalent area of conifers planted. The British are trying to protect some of their remaining native forests by means of the Woodlands Trust, which does for woodlands what the National Trust does for architectural treasures of cultural and historic value. In appealing for funds the Trust notes that donated money "won't be spent on conifers, either the bureaucratic ranks of the Forestry Commission or the assembly-line ones of the tax avoidance companies." Neither of these organizations bears much resemblance to the Islands Trust, but on Galiano the Bluffs Trust performs a similar function with regard to the 300 acres of Bluffs Park as the Woodlands Trust does in trying to protect the ancient woodlands of Britain.

Henry David Thoreau (1817-62) the New England writer and naturalist wrote: "If a man walks in the woods for love of them half of each day, he is in danger of being regarded as a loafer; but if he spends his whole day as speculator, shearing off those woods and making earth bald before her time, he is esteemed as an industrious and enterprising citizen." Perhaps at last this attitude is changing.

## Ten year plan

At a February 20 meeting hosted by MLA Terry Huberts, B.C. Ferries General Manager Rod Morrison announced that B.C. Ferries is embarking on a long-range plan for expanding and upgrading the entire ferry service. Gulf Islands representatives were assured that their input would be considered at various stages of the planning process. In the past, representatives were consulted only regarding scheduling and short-term problem-solving.

John Allen and Ann Hennessy

of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce attended the meeting with ferry committees from each of the other islands, as well as representatives of the school board and Islands Trust and managers of key corporation departments. Islanders agreed that they would like to be made aware of any alternatives that were being considered so that they could help the Ferry Corporation to direct its plans, wherever possible, in ways which would cause the least economic disruption and inconvenience.

The Chamber of Commerce has invited Bill Bouchard, B.C. Ferries Manager of Marketing and Public Relations, to attend its annual general meeting (on March 26 at 7:30 pm in the South Galiano Community Hall) to provide relevant information about the corporation so that Galiano can see its place in the context of the entire service. The Chamber would like to encourage any interested islanders to come and discuss ways in which island transportation needs can best be met.

## Home medicine show

Sponsored by the Tools for Peace for Nicaragua Coalition, Dr. Bossin brought his Medicine Show to the South Community Hall on Friday, February 26. It was interesting that the audience was almost entirely made up of the 'sixties generation' — those middle-aged members of the community who had lived their whole lives under the threat of nuclear war. The geriatric set was conspicuous by their absence and hardly a person was under 30 except children accompanying parents.

Bossin is a skilled and professional entertainer. His songs, sketches and monologues were witty and amusing, but nevertheless his satire and exhortations were propaganda for the non-nuclear alternative. To remind listeners of the appalling consequences of nuclear war and make them laugh at the same time is some feat. It wasn't until the second half of his two hour program that the audience could relax sufficiently to overcome their 'nuclear numbness' for which Dr. Bossin had the remedy.

Based on the travelling medicine shows so popular in 19th Century America, Dr. Bossin was no

quack. Laughter is a cure for anxiety and even nuclear neurosis. His remedies were practical, such as urging the doctor to join Physicians for Peace of the past-president of the History Society to campaign for a continuing supply of history. His one-man show confirmed his contention that one person can make a difference.

# Activity at Porlier Pass recalled and compared

At Triple Island, Peter experienced two marine accidents. In one storm, a group on a pleasure craft headed for the safety of the islands and the lighthouse only to be sucked by the heaving waters onto the rocks, and to have their vessel smashed to pieces. Peter had "house guests" for several days.

The other accident involved a Korean ore carrier. Its load shifted in a storm and the ship capsized, with the loss of 25 seamen.

At Porlier Pass things are less dramatic, but there are accidents and Boscowitz Rock is usually involved. It sits about 70 feet out in the pass off the Galiano shore, midway between the keeper's house and the Race Point light, and is only visible at low tide. Mariners are wise to approach the pass from Georgia Strait, keeping the two light towers in line, and once past Race Point to keep well away from the Galiano shore and

Boscowitz Rock. An overconfident fisherman who had used the pass for years found himself atop Boscowitz recently.

Other dangerous rocks in the pass are marked. At the south end of the pass are Black and Virago Rocks. The steel tug *Point Grey* went down after ramming Virago Rock in a February fog in 1949. Off the northern entrance to the pass is Canoe Islet, the site of the sinking of the paddle steamer *Del Norte*, which went down in 1868 while travelling from Nanaimo to Victoria. The tug *Peggy McNeill* got caught in the currents of Porlier Pass in 1923 and went down with the loss of five lives.

About 14 years ago the government blasted the tops off some of the more dangerous reefs, but even so the prudent seaman takes no chances. It is a common sight to see tugs and their tows circling for hours in Trincomali Channel while waiting for the wind

to drop in the Gulf of Georgia, and for a slack tide.

On Sunday mornings in summer a veritable armada of pleasure craft waits at the south end of the pass for the right tide to get them through the pass and safely home to the mainland.

Peter's duties at Porlier Pass include servicing the two towers. The one at the northern end of the pass, the front range light (Race Point) contains the fog horn which can be operated manually, or automatically by a scanner which picks up fog developing anywhere within a two mile radius. A quarter mile away by sea, or a 15-minute walk along cliffs and catwalks by land, is Virago Light, the back range light, at the southern end of the pass.

Both towers have sodium vapour lights run electrically with a battery-operated backup emergency light. In case of a power failure the Lister diesel plant in the

engine room cuts in a provides power to keep the lights operating. Two or three times this winter, the plant has been needed — for 30 hours after one storm.

The son of lightkeeper Charles Redhead, now of Race Rocks near Victoria, Peter has spent most of his life on the lights. As a young man he acted as relief keeper at Dryad Point, then Pointer, Ivory, McInnes and Langara Islands. He was junior keeper at Boat Bluff near Klemtu briefly, before going to Triple Island, but Galiano is his home now and he hopes the government will see fit to keep him. Sheila and five-month-old Emily here for some time to come.

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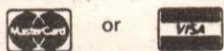

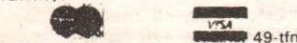

Sir,  
With regards to the letters, TV coverage and the state of chaos which is escalating regarding the logging of the properties sold by MB, it leaves me amazed (as Mr. Bennett stated in his letter) that there are so many experts and authorities on logging. Especially women.

I believe it is a state of panic caused by a few who have neither done their homework nor stopped to consider that many properties on Salt Spring, have been selectively logged and many clear-cut in the past. Not a word was said, for instance, about the 100 Hills area where the Armour residence is located — it is completely cleared, but is acceptable as it is a beautiful view. Also, on Sunset Drive many acres were completely cleared for beautiful farmland. This, too, is acceptable.

The TV coverage showed the property of the Yardleys. Does Mrs. Yardley know that — I believe it was in 1968, when her property was owned by the Stevens — that it was logged and Phil Valcourt, previously of Valcourt Centre, had his mill on that property, and processed the lumber and hauled it by truck to Victoria?

The two main factors which have led to this situation are as follows: Just prior to the sale of the B property, there was a great deal of publicity regarding the logging on Galiano, thus causing people to get concerned and riled; and when logging commenced on Salt Spring, people were aroused and tension escalated. That is quite understandable. To add to the fire was the announcement that Murray Cyprus purchased a fair amount of this property.

I do not know Mr. Cyprus. I have heard the gossip regarding his previous ventures but feel Mr. Cyprus is only accountable to his

family, creditors, business associates and himself. The persons investigating the controversy feel Mr. Cyprus owes them an explanation; he does not.

These same people have only used Mr. Cyprus as an example and have not approached the other MB property owners or bothered to inquire as to what their plans are.

They somehow have taken it upon themselves to make a cut and dried case and feel thousands of acres will be clear-cut and flattened. This is not the case at all. Perhaps they should do their homework before being so vocal.

Do these people realize that hundreds of thousands of dollars were generated into the economy from the tax alone on these sales?

A great percentage of the larger trees being cut are suffering from advanced states of root rot, and that area is known to be prone for root rot to which the trees are of no value to leave standing.

Perhaps these concerned people should have banded together and, as the saying goes, put their money where their mouths are by

purchasing the lands if they wished them to be kept intact, or to institute some common sense and not to go off half-cocked and escalate this into something ridiculous.

# Third world

Sir,  
The current hassle about clear-cut logging on our beautiful island must be considered in the light of the broad Canadian picture.

To one who lived in the United States most of his life and was involved in the fight for conservation of its forests, passing

a wilderness act, scenic rivers act, and similar legislation, it comes as a shock to discover that Canada is still in the cut-and-get-out stage of forest use which generally ended across the border in the 20th century.

There is little or no forest conservation here. The great bulk of Canada's timber wealth is in the public domain but the provinces control it, not the central government as in the United States. Thus, use of the forests is at the whim of the politicians, there being no provincial legislation to protect them, and of course no national legislation such as the National Forest, National Parks, Wilderness and other acts in the United States.

The system is summarized by Donald Mackay in his fascinating book, *Heritage Lost: The Crisis in Canada's Forests*. Forests small and large were granted to timber companies — seven or eight have the bulk of what's left — as tree farms with licenses that run for 21 years. There was no forest management, "as was recognized in 1954 when the Crown Timber

Act was passed. This put responsibility for forest renewal on industry. Inventory surveys were made, forest management plans drawn up, and sample plots laid out to determine timber growth rates.

"This approach was recognized as the start of a new era of sustained yield management (as is practiced on the national forests in the U.S.) but it proved mostly an academic exercise. The government, partly because of manpower shortages, did not police the act effectively and most companies failed to take sustained yield very seriously, exploiting the forest (as MacMillan-Bloedel does) more or less as they had." Mackay and other authorities I consulted say that in Canada the forests are mined; sometimes they say they are raped.

In researching for an article on Canada's forests to be published in an English magazine, I consulted a forester attached to the World Wildlife Fund and asked him how the Fund rates this country from its point of view. He replied: "It is a Third World country engaged in cashing out its forests, wildlife and other natural resources." Mr. Cyprus is helping in this process.

### Twenty-five years ago

• Colin Cameron, MP for the islands and NDP candidate in the upcoming election, tried his hand at flipping pancakes in the men's international pancake race in Ganges, but has had better luck in politics.

Game to the last — his position in the race — he was no match for Salt Spring's winner, Dave Pallot, who was followed by Charlie Horel and Rodney Pringle.

• A letter to the editor reads: *Dear Sir:* This island's friendly practice of waving your hand at approaching drivers calls for some appraisal. Visitors may misunderstand it. Is the man drunk? Is this a Chamber of Commerce gimmick for tourists, or is it a friend who suddenly recognizes you? Anyway, he drives along and before he reaches his destination he must come to the conclusion from the hand-waving that there are lots of drunks, or friends, or island boosters.

### Twenty years ago

• The ferry strike left isolation, annoyance, protest and aggressive action in its wake. For 10 days the islands had been without the familiar sight of B.C. Ferry vessels bringing visitors from Vancouver Island and the mainland, and bringing in a constant flow of supplies.

Thanks to the prompt response of merchants, supply houses and freight companies, the islands suffered only a few shortages. Many fish boats shipped in needed commodities; Salt Spring Freight chartered a barge and hauled in their own trucks.

### Fifteen years ago

• An additional \$281,000 was needed before the school building project at Ganges could go ahead.

The building project proposed three phases: a major renovation at Salt Spring Elementary school; construction of a new vocational training centre at the high school; and construction of an activity

centre.

Tenders for construction and reconstruction proved much higher than architects anticipated.

### Ten years ago

• A delegation from Salt Spring Island met with education minister Pat McGeer, presenting him with a petition opposing the new Fernwood school.

Presentation of the petition, which bore 438 names, followed strong opposition to construction of the school away from the Ganges complex.

• The herring fishery in the Gulf Islands closed after a total of 1,000 tons of herring was taken by about 100 gillnets.

When the fishery opened one and a half weeks before, there were close to 300 boats in the Ganges area waiting for the arrival of the spawning herring.

• A master plan for recreation on Salt Spring would cost \$11,000, parks and recreation commission chairman Glenn Woodley said. He urged the commission to back the study of recreation on the island. It would allow the commission to plan at least five years into the future, and create guidelines for up to 20 years. The provincial government and the Capital Regional District (CRD) would help cover some of the costs, he said.

### Five years ago

• The *Queen of Sidney* made her last run through the Gulf Islands

for at least some time. The ferry is to be replaced by her sister-ship, the *Queen of Tsawwassen*.

• A new organization of merchants, business and professional people had been formed on Salt Spring.

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# Weather feels great — but hedges remain the priority

With this weather having been so fine for the past several months, it feels as if we've been enjoying March-April temperatures and sunshine for a long while already, and yet this week sees us just started off on March — good heavens, spring is still three weeks away, officially.

managed. The hemlock will do well if sufficient water and good drainage is given, and, for a fuller cedar hedge, the *T. plicata* "Excelsa" is favoured for its deeper fuller green foliage.

Pines, both native and exotic, can be used especially where full sun is available and drainage is good. From the dwarf mugo pine (good up to five feet or so) on up to the Austrian and Scotch pines, which grow to 30 feet and more if left unpruned, their appearance is informal and bold-textured. They need lots of space to look good and will tolerate considerable drought.

I should mention, before we get too far along, that the cultivated varieties of hedging cedar, most notably the *pyramidalis* and smaragd cedars which grow tall and quite narrow, are suited to use where space is limited and a more formal look is desired. In order to look good, sufficient water must be provided.

While cypress hedges have often been used, they have a tendency to die out and turn brown if not adequately watered, and some are susceptible to root rots, so I generally don't recommend them. I do, however, strongly recommend the use of *Leylandii* cypress (*Cupressocyparis leylandii*) — not a true cypress, as it grows very quickly (three to four feet or more per year) keeps a lush green coloration, takes shearing well, is

deer-proof, and withstands drought quite well after it becomes established. A golden *leylandii*, Castle Wellan Gold, produces a rich golden colour on a plant that doesn't grow quite as fast upwards but rather bushes out sideways more willingly. It makes a tight, broad hedge, and has all of the positive attributes of its green form.

While not commonly used for hedges, upright and bushing forms of Junipers can make strong, formidable, drought-proof screens. A new one to watch for is the Kuriwao juniper from Asia, a golden form which grows tall and bushy to make a deer-proof screen.

Native spruces and the live Christmas tree spruces, Norway spruce, Colorado spruce, and white spruce, can also be used for hedges, but don't look quite so nice when they are sheared or when forced to grow in full sun or dry, poor soils.

Well, by this time I should know better, but once again, space has run out before the topic has run its course, so next week we'll have to split the article with the last of the hedge epistle and things to do in your garden during March.

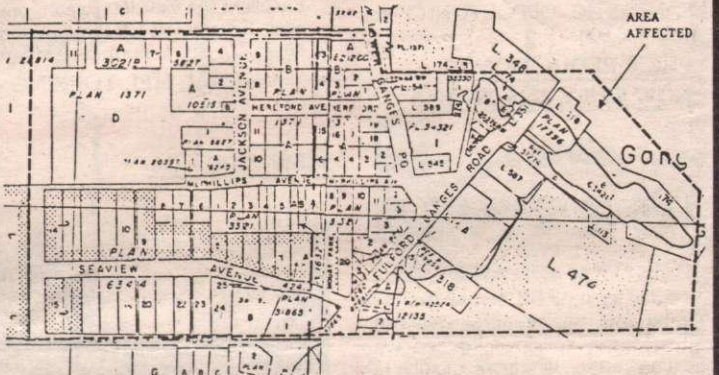

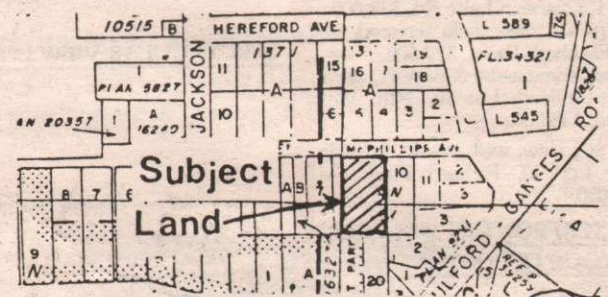

(b) Proposed Bylaw No. 203, cited as "Official Community Plan, Salt Spring Island, Amendment Bylaw No. 3, 1988", is a bylaw to amend Official Community Plan, Salt Spring Island, by adding to the proposals for Ganges a new policy relating to the provision of a seawall within Ganges from Fulford-Ganges Road to the head of Ganges Harbour.

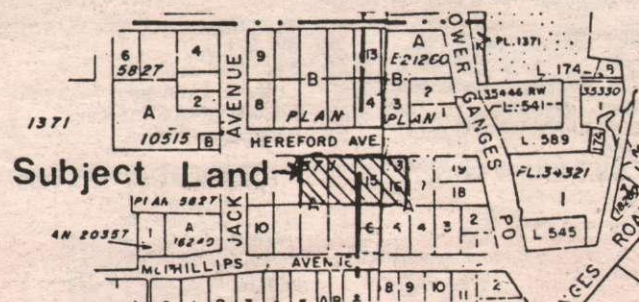
(c) Proposed Bylaw No. 204, cited as "Zoning Bylaw, Salt Spring Island, 1985, Amendment Bylaw No. 3, 1988", is a bylaw to amend Zoning Bylaw, Salt Spring Island, 1985, by making "parking" a use permitted in any zone, and by requiring that off-street parking to serve land within the Commercial 1 Zone (C1), Commercial 2 Zone (C2), Commercial 3 Zone (C3), and the Comprehensive Development Zone (CD) in Ganges as defined in a Plan attached to the Bylaw, be located not more than 12.1 metres (40 feet) from the rear property line. (e) Proposed Bylaw No. 206, cited as "Zoning Bylaw, Salt Spring Island, 1985, Amendment Bylaw No. 5, 1988", is a bylaw to amend Zoning Bylaw, Salt Spring Island, 1985, by changing the zoning classification of Lots 13, 14 and Parcel 'B', Block A, Plan 1371, Section 1, Ranges 3 and 4 East, North Salt Spring Island from the Residential 1 Zone (R1) to the Comprehensive Development Zone (CD). The general location of the subject land is shown on the following sketch.

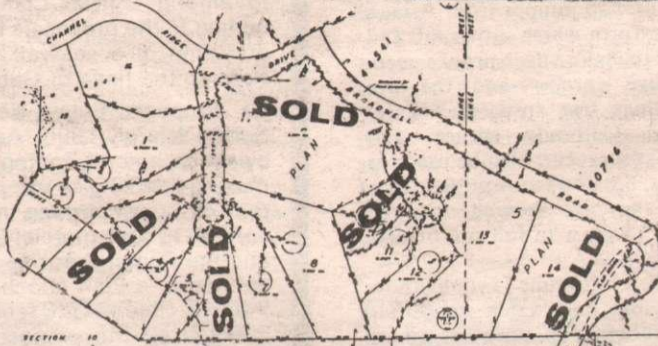

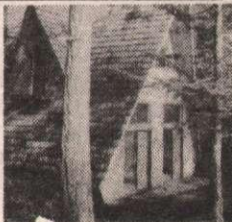
