

Salt Spring activist 'must move off-island'

Bis Whitby, a long-time participant in battles waged to preserve the island's semi-rural way of life, is leaving Salt Spring.

Deteriorating eyesight means Whitby must give up driving her familiar blue van and, since she believes it's "impossible to survive on the island without a vehicle," relocate to a small house purchased in James Bay in Victoria.

The move from Salt Spring officially takes place at the end of this month. In the meantime, she has been the guest of honour at several farewell parties, including one held Saturday at the home of her neighbour, Isabel Hunt.

Whitby, interviewed last week by Driftwood, is visibly embarrassed by the accolades and attention she has received since news of her imminent departure became public.

"It's not my style to blow my own trumpet," she said. "Just because I'm leaving is no reason for this song and dance. It's really not necessary because so many other people have been doing the same things here."

Those "same things," for Whitby, have included a prominent role in a wide range of community organizations concerned with raising community consciousness about far-reaching issues. Among them are the Nuclear Disarmament Group, Advisory Planning Commission (APC), Islands Watch Society and Water Preservation Society.

With those groups and on her own, she has voiced disapproval of several local trends and activities, including clear-cut logging practices, the use of motorboats on St. Mary Lake, a mine proposed for the Fulford area, and the general pace of development on the island.

"There have been ongoing battles," Whitby said, "but I haven't done any more than anyone else. No one person is ever indispensable. When one person drops out, there is always another to take the place."

Whitby moved to Salt Spring from Victoria in 1980 after separating from her husband. During her early life in Scotland, she had acquired an affection for islands and smaller communities which she felt could be satisfied on Salt Spring.

Married in Scotland in 1951 to a Canadian she met in Norway, Whitby relocated to Nova Scotia. Two children later, the couple decided to move to the Highlands of Scotland to live a simpler life. Still later, with a third child in tow, they elected to raise their family in North America.

Landing in Nova Scotia, the family travelled down the Eastern Seaboard of the U.S., across the southern states and up the west coast, "just looking for a nice place to live." They settled in Victoria.

Once on Salt Spring, Whitby purchased acreage on Sharp Road and tried to fulfil her ambition for farming. "It wasn't a farm, though — there were no animals," she says. "But I ploughed the field and planted; everything was organic. Soil conservation has always been my real focus, and in some ways I regret I didn't preach it more often."

Whitby has one other regret about leaving, and it concerns the

people who have become friends and now will be a visit away. What

she will not miss is the population growth of the island and the associated problems she sees on the horizon.

"Increased population density is the crux, and it worries me," she says. "On the APC, every time we get an application, the question we always ask is, Will it add to the density?"

"There's been a huge difference in my nine years here. Now, I can't cross my road to pick up my mail. I would stay and fight it if I could still drive but I have to be realistic. It's best that I move before there's an accident."

Whitby says James Bay, her new home, is still a small community tucked within the larger mass of Victoria. If threats to that lifestyle materialize, will Whitby be in the forefront?

"I find it hard to say no, because I care," she said, "but I've made a solemn oath to myself that I won't join anything for three years."

She added that friends in Victoria, on learning that she will be moving there, asked if the local Sierra Club knew she would be arriving soon.

"I said, No, and don't tell them."

Summer recreation programs scheduled

A full range of summer programs is being sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission. It includes:

St. John's Ambulance emergency first aid course, June 28.

Successful completion earns a three-year ticket. Topics covered include artificial respiration, broken bones, burns, bleeding, choking, etc. Fee is \$30. Instructor is Leanoir Hearsey.

CPR Level A, July 5.

Topics covered include signals and actions regarding heart attacks, rescue breathing, treatment for conscious and unconscious victims of choking problems. Fees are \$20 for youths, \$25 for adults. Instructor is Leanoir Hearsey.

Saturdays in July.

An arts and crafts workshop for children from 1 pm to 4 pm each Saturday. Activities include kite-making, drawing, painting, collages, and clay working. Minimum age for participants is six years. Fee is \$6 per day.

Pre-school Tumble Time, July 4-27, August 1-24.

Two classes are organized — one for children aged two and three years (10:15 am to 11 am, Tuesdays and Thursdays), the other for children aged four and five years (9:30 am to 10:15 am, Tuesdays and Thursdays). Classes are 45 minutes long and include gymnastics, climbing, rolling, movement education and games in a musical atmosphere. Cost is \$27 for eight sessions.

Three interconnected problems plague seniors in small centres

Housing, transportation and the provision of services are interconnecting problems faced by seniors in small communities, according to University of Guelph professor Dr. Anthony Fuller.

These three elements must be seen as a co-ordinated package, Fuller told a workshop entitled *Serving Small Town Seniors Better*, held at Simon Fraser University on May 18 and 19.

The workshop, which heard speakers from different parts of the United States and Canada, was attended by Salt Spring *Seniors for Seniors* representatives Nan Jenks and Mary Toynbee.

The local representatives said Fuller's discussion was particularly relevant to the situation on Salt Spring Island.

Fuller said housing is the most crucial element for seniors who want to stay in a home of their own for as long as possible. Usually these homes are family houses which are too large.

Seniors' housing is more than bricks and mortar, Fuller said. Housing should be considered in relation to a person's entire lifestyle. A balance needs to be struck between maintaining one's independence in housing and being "connected" to other people.

There is usually little public transportation in rural communities, forcing seniors to rely on a private vehicle. As this capacity is progressively hindered, seniors

lose some sense of independence and gradually their mobility becomes restricted to essential services.

Fuller said "transport dependency" is related to the location of a person's home. His lifestyle becomes vulnerable to the life pattern of those he depends on.

Services for seniors, Fuller noted, are frequently physically separate from where they live, thus requiring transport.

"These three needs are thus seen to be inextricably interconnected. Transport is not just another service to be provided, but is part of the problem of providing all services, and it must be closely co-ordinated with seniors' housing."

Capital Regional District (CRD) representative Paul Bingham referred to the Salt Spring Seniors for Seniors organization in his address to the workshop.

Bingham said the CRD Long Term Care Program aids people who do not need acute hospital care, but who have ongoing health problems. The Long-Term Care Assessor visits the client, on the recommendation of a doctor, and arranges for services such as homemakers and meals-on-wheels.

Bingham told the group the provincial budget has been increased 20 per cent this year to keep seniors in their own homes by providing more home support services. In the CRD's Victoria Health Project, 11 new or expanded programs have been developed this spring, stressing "wellness," home-

support and hospital/community partnership.

Bingham referred specifically to the Salt Spring program, which was chosen for funding by the Victoria Health Project as a pilot program involving senior volunteers helping other seniors in the community.

One of the hosts at the workshop — Dr. Gerald Hodge, Adjunct Professor of Gerontology at Simon Fraser University and popular CBC commentator on the subject of aging — will be the guest speaker at an upcoming Seniors for Seniors meeting.

The meeting, scheduled for June 28 at 2 pm at the Ganges United Church, will be open to the public.

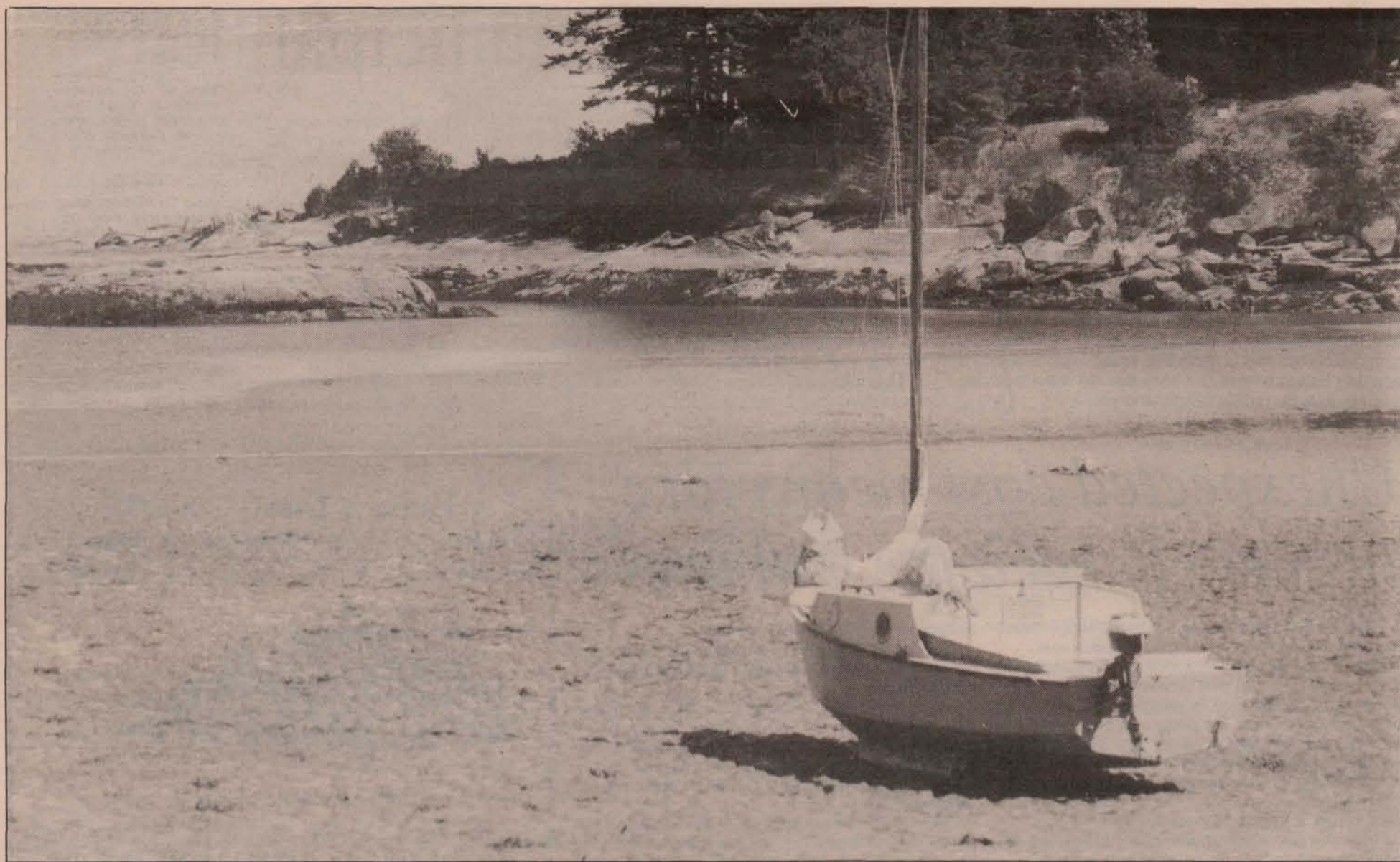

Island squadrons to take part in rendezvous

Boats of every description from all over the Pacific Northwest will converge on Transfer Beach Park at Ladysmith, July 7-8-9 to attend the annual district rendezvous for power and sail squadrons.

The Gulf Islands will be represented by both the Pender Island and Salt Spring power and sail squadrons. The rendezvous is the one big social event held each year for the 17 squadrons in the Vancouver Island District, which covers an area from Victoria to Port Hardy.

"The main reason for power and sail squadrons is for training," says Pim Manning, commander of the Pender Island squadron, which also takes in Mayne Island.

"On the west coast Canadian squadrons have real ties

with those in the U.S.," says Manning, adding that members from Bellingham and Seattle are expected to take part in the Ladysmith event.

In return, Canadian squadrons have been invited to San Juan Island this summer where a celebration of the "Pig War" between the Americans and Canadians will be held.

Squadrons offer basic boating courses, covering the operation, maintenance and navigation of vessels, as well as understanding tides and currents and government regulations.

It is necessary to pass the basic course before joining the squadron.

Manning says there are also advanced courses on

seamanship, sailing, weather, engine maintenance and electronics. The squadron also offers an advanced piloting course which covers celestial navigation and the use of a sextant. This course is internationally recognized.

Let's be Boatwise is a junior course held in conjunction with schools for youths in Grades 6-8. Manning says the course familiarizes youngsters with emergency procedures — using radios, summoning help and bringing boats back to port if, for example, something happens to their parents. In the past Squadron instructors have been asked to teach this course to Sea Cadets.

There are also courses offered to the general public, such as on radio, tides and currents.

Trust to examine joining municipal body

The Islands Trust will investigate joining the Union of B.C. Municipalities (UBCM).

Trustees, meeting June 2-3 in council on Gabriola Island June, decided to explore the idea after hearing Salt Spring's John Stepaniuk argue that joining forces with the larger provincial body might prove beneficial to the Trust.

On the down side, according to Trust manager Cynthia Hawksworth, is the cost of the move: an estimated \$3,000 to \$4,000 each year, based on population.

Stepaniuk said joining the UBCM could serve the Trust in several ways. It might find support for its role from municipalities; it could learn about legislation on municipal books that is applicable to the Trust area, and it wouldn't hurt to be part of a body that has some lobbying leverage with the provincial government.

Stepaniuk argued his case by pointing out several instances of lack of Trust clout with the province. They included no opportunity to consult with Victoria on legislation governing the Trust, the absence of a Trust member on the regional committee studying possible transportation network changes for the region, and no consultation with the Trust when a task force studied the effectiveness of the Agricultural Land Reserve system. "We have to have contact with the outside world," the Salt Spring trustee said. "The Islands Trust, by itself, won't change the world." He urged council to study how the Trust could make itself more effective by officially affiliating with other bodies.

Gabriola trustee Susan Yates, however, said she was not in favour of joining the UBCM, and not just because

of the projected cost. "Our advantage is our autonomy," she said. "I don't see that affiliation would be that useful" compared to informal communications.

Hawksworth, the Trust manager, said the UBCM has taken several steps of interest to the Trust, as when it looked at legislation to govern private-land logging practices and when it lobbies Victoria to make legislative changes.

Vice-chairman Carol Martin agreed that about 20 per cent of what the UBCM does "is of interest and relevance" to the Trust, and echoed Stepaniuk's suggestion that a full listing should be made of the pros and cons of joining the body.

Trustees then elected to have staff research the benefits and disadvantages of joining the UBCM.

Unexpected cost means hike in rent charged for hall use

The rental charged for use of Central Hall is being increased to help offset an unexpected annual cost.

The society directing operation of the 95-year-old hall recently learned it now faces an annual bill of between \$1,100 and \$1,300 for pumping out the holding tank for its washroom. The pump-outs used to be done in exchange for services.

As a consequence, society president Bevis Walters said last week, directors have no choice but to raise the rates charge for rental of the hall. It is believed to be the first time in at least 30 years that rates will rise.

New charges, which go into effect July 1, see the rental charged for use of the main hall go to \$7 per hour; for use of the small hall, to \$5 per hour; and for use of the kitchen, including use of the 80-person banquet service area, to \$10 per hour. Free use of the parking lot is included.

Walters said Central Hall has no septic system but relies on a holding tank that must be pumped out whenever full. Contents must then be disposed of on a

site approved by the health department.

The pump-outs, which increased use of the hall means must be done between 11 and 13 times a year, cost \$100 each.

Walters said the hall society received pump-out service free of charge until last December because one of its directors allowed and pump-out contractor to use part of a privately-owned property as a disposal site.

However, in December the health department asked that another site be found.

"As the hall society was now unable to offer anything in return for the free pump-out service, it had to be paid for, making for an annual increase of \$1,100 to \$1,300 in the hall's operating costs," he said. "Directors, with great regret, decided that the only way to cope with this situation will be to increase the hourly rental charge."

Walters noted that the hall is operated as a community service, "on a hopefully break-even basis," and not for profit.

Minor baseball schedules championship tournament

The Salt Spring Island Baseball Association will stage its Little League championship tournaments on Sunday, June 18.

A full day of games has been arranged to decide the top teams in both the eight- to 10-year-old and 11- and 12-year-old divisions. Recreation games for coach pitch and tee-ball divisions are also scheduled.

Play begins at 9 am for the four teams in the eight- to 10-year-old division, and the three teams in the 11- to 12-year-old group. Games will be played at the Little League diamonds on school district property adjacent to Salt Spring Elementary School.

Also arranged for the day is a concession stand, and the Frying Scotsman truck.

The games should conclude in time for trophy presentations at about 5 pm.

Regularly-scheduled Little League games will continue for one

week following the championship tournament. The season continues beyond the tournament because organizers did not want to hold the championship rounds the following week, during Sea Capers.

Fledgling actors, actresses showcase developing talent

Over the weekend theatre-goers saw the equivalent of butterflies emerging as 10 nascent actors and actresses stretched their wings under the lights of Off-Centre Stage.

These graduates of a scene study workshop, taught recently by April Curtis, presented five scenes from plays that demonstrated their skills in what was for some their first stage appearance.

In the first scene, from *The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds*, Anne Lyon portrayed a mother (Beatrice) and Caitlin Hayes her daughter, Tillie, both withdrawing into their own selves to the point of alienation.

As the two-faced sloven, Anne dredged up memories of "might-have-beens," with the acrimonious criticisms of a woman who sees herself as the victim, bitterly destroying those around her.

Mathilda has enthusiasm, a double-life, and in sympathy with her character, Caitlin expressed the wonder of new experiences, growing in dramatic spotlight soliloquies like the marigolds in the title.

It was suitable — given the heat of the evening — that *Night of the Iguana* should reflect smouldering passions. The ease with which Lynda Jensen slipped into the role of Maxine betrayed her earlier acting experience, rounding out her character as a full-blooded, sensuous "cushion" against which Shannon beat his embattled self, confronting him and yet embracing him.

Jack Speed, playing in his stage debut, made Shannon a rough-edged, brittle and nervous man, a couple of degrees larger than life, hardened by his circumstances.

In *The Importance of Being Earnest*, Lady Bracknell always gives the impression of talking above everybody's head. Her lo-

quacity can be hard to follow, suitable for more leisurely times as it is, but Marcie Berner's Bracknell settled into the right level of genteel haughtiness, probably due to the measured tones of Jack (Jason Tyler).

The vacuous Jack, bowing graciously with every response, was the epitome of an upper-class gadabout trying to impress his fiancée's guardian, apprehensively trying to reassure her of his pedigree, albeit that of "A Hand-bag."

Another social satire — of quite a different sort — erupted between George and Martha, the protagonists, in *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* Shouting and screaming at each other's vitals, they are two poles separated yet connected via the magnet of their relationship. Adrien Towne gave a tour de force presentation of Martha — brassy, drunken, loud. Her denial, "I don't bray" had the stridency of a ferry horn, and Adrien looked as if she enjoyed the part, stopping carefully short of giving us a caricature.

Newcomer Arvid Chalmers (at least to serious theatre) feelingly played George, palpably as disconcerted as any man would be whose wife was behaving so indecorously. With clenched teeth betraying the

undercurrent of his violence, Arvid's George, the moderator of restraint, really wanted to punch her.

A bittersweet final scene, from *The Rainmaker*, took the characters away from confrontation with each other, slowed down the destruction of relationships, and introduced a poignant look at two lovers facing their own self-analyses. In an affirmation of budding love, believably acted by Judy Thompson, Lizzie laid bare her dreams and her pains, her small-town feelings of a woman faced with spinsterhood at the age of 26. The catch in her voice evoked the feeling of her almost daring to believe that Joe Starbuck could be the man she dreamed of.

Starbuck, facing reality for the first time, knew himself not to be "the rainmaker," but (edgily portrayed by Mike Hayes) a man at the crossroads. Mike imbued Starbuck with an uneasy feel, confessing to his sham, nervously safeguarding his manhood, yet surrendering cautiously to love.

April Curtis can be justifiably proud of her fine students, and of her choice of material for them to work with. We hope that, as dramaturge at Off-Centre Stage, she can have a new group together soon, as this present 10 take to their wings.

The sand-castle contest remains one of the most popular Sea Capers events. It begins this year at 2 pm, with judging set for 4 pm. Entry is free, and an array of prizes awaits winners of the various categories.

Windsurfing will take place off Vesuvius Point from noon to 5 pm, providing a colourful backdrop to the sand-building contest. To participate in windsurfing, call Pate McKenzie at 537-5261.

The treasure hunt, meanwhile, starts from Vesuvius Beach at noon and finishes there later in the day. This year's version is being organized by Ronnie Cannon, Phil Osborne and Bob and Linda Sayer and kids.

Steve Reich is an American contemporary musician and composer. Widely considered to be one of the founders of the "minimalist" school and a major contributor to the "new music" scene, he was recently interviewed in *EAR*, the "Magazine of New Music" published in New York City.

Many of you out there will ask, *What is new music?* Just as Beethoven and Vivaldi created music for their time, our century has spawned composers whose work is concurrent with and as revolutionary as developments in the visual arts in the last 90 years.

Our century has been one of rapid change in availability of information, ideas and technology. Reich says: "The operatic voice was created to be heard over a group of musicians in a great hall. Then the microphone was invented 80 or 90 years ago and has become ubiquitous in the world; having a profound effect on vocal style throughout the 20th Century, from Indonesian music to jazz and rock and roll."

The technology (the tools) we embrace as a culture has the effect of colouring our inputs, perceptions and insights into our aesthetic world. The way we think, see, feel and hear is, in large measure, influenced by the quality of the devices we engage to extend our reach. Computers change our scientific comprehension of the world but also they change our aesthetic one.

Serious and rigorous working out

New music is not "pop music," but the serious and rigorous working out of musical and intellectual ideas in sound using any of the tools, technologies and musical heritage available in our age. We don't give a second thought to the use the microphone these days, but when we think of doing without it, its contribution to musical style becomes obvious.

Seeking to understand new musical forms as well as old is an important step to becoming more musically literate, as was well illustrated at Saturday's concert given by the choral group, *Tuned Air*, directed by Bruce Ruddell, and pianist Chris Kodaly.

An invigorating blend of familiar and more recent compositions gave us a sort of 20th Century cross-cultural musical history lesson. We heard traditional folk music and song, Haiku-inspired music by Robert Fairfax Birch, preludes by Debussy and *Piano Sonata, Opus #1* by Alan Berg.

But the most exciting works was those drawn from recent times. Particularly notable was the choral piece composed by Bruce Ruddell and based on poetry by the popular Canadian author of children's literature, Dennis Lee.

Intricate electronic keyboard solo

Following strength upon strength we were then treated to an intricate electronic keyboard solo by Chris Kodaly of Anne Southam's 1981 minimalist composition, *Glass Houses #5*. The evening was a diverse and enriching experience for an enthusiastic audience.

Well, the Salt Spring Festival of the Arts is coming up quickly, with events scheduled from July 1 to the 30.

On July 6, the play *Jewel* will be produced at Off Centre Stage. Its author, Joan McLeod, is a Vancouver native whose credits include Playwright in Residence at the Banff school, radio plays produced by the CBC, and works of fiction and poetry.

Her play *Jewel* opened at the Paragon Theatre in Toronto to rave reviews and has since been touring across Canada.

As a precursor to its performance at this year's festival, Joan McLeod will be reading excerpts from her newest script, *Amigo's Blue Guitar* at Off Centre Stage on Sunday, June 25, at 8:30 pm.

The Gulf Islands Community Arts Council will be having an extraordinary general meeting this Thursday (June 15) at 8 pm at the Elementary School Library. This is an important one if you have concerns about the proposed Centre for the Arts on Salt Spring Island.
