Training sessions set for volunteers

A training session is set for June 26-30 for Salt Spring teenagers interested in volunteering to help with the Parks and Recreation Commission's summer day camp program.

Organizers are seeking teenagers between the ages of 13 and 16 years who would volunteer their time to work with children. Volunteers are welcome to commit to any length of time; however, a one-week span is preferable.

Volunteers would work under a counsellor, who will direct specific activities and duties. Volunteers will be given an opportunity to lead and plan activities; they will also be encouraged to develop leadership skills, and will be given exposure to a day-camp setting.

"Teens who enjoy working with children, like being outdoors and are energetic are encouraged to become involved," says recreation director Sandra Henry. "The experience gained this summer would be invaluable to anyone who intends to apply for a counsellor's position next year, or who is planning a future career involving children."

Anyone interested in participating is required to attend the June 26-30 training session. It will orient volunteers with the program and its activities, with their responsibilities, and with other staff members. Also on the agenda is training for a St. John's Emergency First Aid certificate.

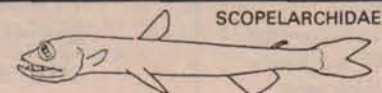

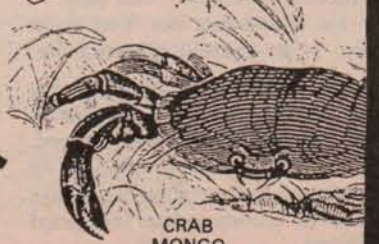

Rare hand arrives -- after wait of 70 years

It took over 70 years, but Jack Tamboline of Salt Spring has finally realized the thrill of a lifetime.

Tamboline, who will turn 80 this August, counted a rare 29-point hand in a cribbage game he played on Friday, June 9.

The 29-hand was the first Tamboline has held in "about 70 years of playing" cribbage, a game he learned while growing up on a farm in the Ladner area.

Tamboline held three five-cards and a Jack in his hand, then cut the last five to match the Jack. The cards are now posted on his wall.

"It was sure a surprise, I'll tell you that," said Tamboline, a retired commercial fisherman who moved to Salt Spring in 1972.

He added that he has held several 28-point hands in his card-playing lifetime, including two in the last month and a half, but never thought he'd see a 29.

Fish farm tours set

Tours will be offered this summer to islanders and visitors interested in fish-farming operations.

Beginning June 30, the fish farm at Yeo Point on Salt Spring will be open to four tours daily.

The public cannot simply turn up on site, however; a shuttle bus has been arranged to move people from the Fulford Inn to the fish farm near Beaver Point, and back again.

"We don't want people arriving indiscriminately — they have to be in small groups," said the operation's Michael Weir.

Visitors will be taken through the farm's fish hatchery, to its shellfish operation (where oysters and mussels are grown, and where experimental growing in underway with scallops), and finally to the sea pens where fish are maturing.

All the while, tour guides will "deliver an informative and educational talk on the processes of aquaculture, as we practice them," Weir said.

Times for the daily tours are 9 am, 10:30 am, 1 pm and 2:30 pm.

Before the daily tours begin, however, the fish farm will hold an open house for any residents interested in seeing the operation. They are set for Wednesday, June 28, from noon to 8 pm.

Weir said the idea for the daily tours sprang from a belief that the public would be interested enough in fish-farming in general -- and the Yeo Point operation in particular -- to pay for a visit.

"And it might help us to keep the place spruced up if we know visitors are coming," Weir said.

He added that the Yeo Point farm is an unusual operation because it includes shellfish growing and is one of the few fish farms on the coast easily accessible by road.

Since it opened in 1986, Weir continued, the operation has always tried to accommodate interested visitors.

'Drug counselling help available'

"If you or a member of your family is in trouble with drugs or alcohol, you are not alone," says Community Society street worker Geoff Fishleigh.

In order to give young people on the island the opportunity to share their experiences and fears surrounding drugs and alcohol, Fishleigh is

country gourmet

Tell me what you eat, and I will tell you what you are.

Brillat-Savarin

Schoolchildren seem to know instinctively what many adults have forgotten: salad greens do not grow only in the garden. On a walk in the woods my son and his friends in the second grade will munch on tender miner's lettuce, wild sorrel and dandelion shoots like generations of young foragers before them. The more ambitious may add cow parsnip stalks, fireweed shoots, salmonberry and thimbleberry sprouts to their list of salad ingredients.

As a cook and a father I'm always interested in foods which have grown and taste good without the assistance of chemists and geneticists. There's a lot of truth in the saying "you are what you eat," and I get uneasy when I read the fine print on the labels of most convenience foods. If FD & C yellow no. 5 and carboxymethylcellulose are good for you, they sure don't sound like it. And so when I glance out of the kitchen windows and see the children looking down between their feet for early greens I know it's time to collect the makings of the first green salad of the year.

Miner's lettuce (*montia perfoliata*) grows in shady well-watered places in abandoned clearings in the forest or even at the edge of our lawns where the shade is deepest. Its sweet tasting leaves are saucer-shaped and this plant has distinctive small white flowers that rise on stems from the centre of the leaf-shield. It's great as a salad ingredient and also, like watercress, splendid in ham or egg sandwiches on a picnic.

Wild sorrel has almost as many names as uses: red sorrel, sour grass, sheep sorrel, sour-plant, rumex acetosella. My neighbour holds wild sorrel in contempt as a weed and ruthlessly stamps it out of his garden, but all this plant needs is a little appreciation.

Its tangy leaves are narrow and lobed at the base in the shape of an arrow. Even now, in the middle of May, my land is full of wild sorrel and by early summer their slender fruiting stalks will bear tiny greenish or reddish flowers. Sorrel greens with their refreshing, vinegary taste have enjoyed a long culinary history in Europe as an element in salads, as a potherb for soups, and in sauces for meats and fish.

Of course everyone knows about dandelions. You can eat the leaves in salads or make wine from the flowers. A hive of bees near a dandelion-covered field will yield a marvellous honey. One of my earliest memories is the golden taste of a drink made in Northern England called Dandelion & Burdock. This was a kind of ginger beer flavoured by this remarkable, yet usually vilified, plant.

Miner's Lettuce Salad

| 1 colander of miner's lettuce leaves | 1 C mushrooms, washed and quartered |
| 1 handful each of wild sorrel and dandelion leaves | 1 handful bean sprouts |
| 1/2 C vinaigrette dressing | 2 T pistachios |

Wash the tender spring salad greens under a cold tap, pat dry then toss into a bowl. Decorate with fresh mushrooms, chopped pistachios and bean sprouts. Season with vinaigrette dressing and serve as a first course or as an accompaniment to stuffed zucchinis, green peppers, or cabbage leaves. A glass or two of Chianti won't do the cook any harm, either!

People say I have a Darwinian garden. They notice that only the fittest plants survive the assaults of deer, slugs, caterpillars and even the selfish behaviour of our cat who likes to roll decadently in the soft earth of a newly planted row of lettuces. Out of curiosity (or laziness) I like to leave parts of the garden alone at this time of year, although every week I have delayed the sensible work of weeding and planting will surely be regretted later. Like Dickens' hopeful character Mr. Micawber in David Copperfield, I want to see what will turn up.

Rhubarb does, of course, and Swiss chard and tender young spinach shoots pushing through a sudden growth of wild sorrel and miner's lettuce. Every day the hops leap another six inches up the cedar fences. My favourite herbs — lovage, thyme and mint — have emerged from the dark sea of wild blackberry that never gives up the struggle to reclaim the land. At the edge of my woods the tall elderberries are in flower and lean hungrily out of the alders and maples to snatch the hot sunshine that light up the clearing.

Many of the ingredients for these first salads of spring are really volunteers from last year and, since I did no work to grow them, they taste even better!

The Lazy Gourmet's Salad

|---|---|
| 1 colander of Swiss chard | 1 small sprig rue if you have it, chopped very finely |
| An equal quantity of spinach leaves | 1/4 t ground black pepper |
| 1 handful watercress and dandelion leaves | 2/3 C good quality olive oil |
| 1 C chopped celery | 1/3 C cider or white wine vinegar |
| 6 fresh mint leaves, torn | 3 hard-boiled eggs, quartered |
| 1 t pennyroyal | 1 C farmer's cheese, grated |
| 2 t rosemary, crushed | |

Take the Swiss chard and spinach leaves, wash, dry, tear and throw into a large salad bowl. Add the other greens, celery and mint. For the dressing combine olive oil and vinegar. Season with pennyroyal, rosemary, rue and black pepper. Pour this over the salad and toss. Garnish with hardboiled eggs and grated cheese. Serves four to six.

A few points

The MacMillan Bloedel forester used an interesting new slogan "the working forest," in defending MB's proposed management plan for the Carmanah Valley.

Dreamed up by some person it implies a lazy welfare-bum type bunch of logs just slouching around until introduced to the folks at MB and suddenly, they get the BC spirit, clear-cut themselves and leap on logging trucks content in the knowledge that they are finally useful. The age of double-speak!

They ARE working — providing oxygen, absorbing carbon dioxide, controlling weather patterns, soaking up water for our watersheds, holding topsoil, providing a varied ecosystem for plant and animal life, AND giving us timber if we recognize it as a gift and harvest in a sustainable way.

A few points that the forester missed are:

- Protected old growth forests in all of B.C. cover 186,000 hectares. At the current rate of cut the forest industry would gobble that up in 11 months.
 - Jobs versus Parks is a scare tactic. Parks in B.C. cover a measly 5.2 per cent of the land base and include only two per cent of the prime forestland. The forest companies "share" the rest. The decline in logging jobs is caused by automation, wasteful logging practices, high-grading, and log exports. MB's own figures show that 100 direct jobs and \$6.6 million would be gained by logging the Carmanah — in the near future, that will be easily surpassed by the local tourist industry and spin-offs, and the trees will still be there.
 - The 538 hectare "reserve" is actually classified as an MB recreation site, which has no guarantee that the trees will not be logged in the future. The only real protection is legislated park status. The plan also allows for logging within 100 metres of the spruce which, coupled with clear-cutting the entire watershed over 20 years, will leave the shallow-rooted spruce extremely vulnerable to windthrow during winter storms.
 - The Forest Act allows the Minister of Forests to delete up to five per cent of a TFL without compensation to the Forest company. The Carmanah amounts to about two per cent of TFL 44. MB reported a profit of \$815 million over the past two years.
 - The Carmanah is the last untouched valley on southern Vancouver Island and the only Sitka spruce ecosystem that is readily accessible to the urban areas of Victoria and Vancouver. So your kid is depressed about the state of the world? Write a letter first and then take them to Carmanah — it's guaranteed to blow your mind!
- June 27 is the cut-off date for submissions, so write to Dave Parker, Terry Huberts and Premier Bill Vander Zalm and skip school/work to join us for a rally, Thursday, June 22, at 4 pm at the legislative buildings in Victoria. Unlike the log-

gers/millworkers/foresters, we are not paid to rally.

I think, one would have to sell one's soul to Mac Blo to have the faith that this could ever come back. "AAAH" but forests are forever. "AAAMEN."

To infer that the company is the best one to handle the area is a laugh, and to suggest that they created the trails, the signs and other amenities is a patent lie — their major contribution was to do everything possible to prevent this, until they were forced by the courts.

I fear Ms. Kumi has come full circle and now actually believes what she says. Born again, one might say.

Background

The seawalk project, which was the subject of an article in the June 17 issue of Driftwood and of letters to the editor in the June 10 and 17 issues, refer to the section of the seawalk that will extend from the Coast Guard station at the end of the Fulford-Ganges Road to the north end of the harbour close to the junction of the Upper and Lower Ganges Road.

It is estimated that the total cost of the project will be \$432,061; \$133,974 of this total will be provided by a Lottery Fund grant from the provincial government; \$135,000 by an employment grant from the federal government; and the remainder by private sources. When completed it will extend and enhance the portions of the seawalk already built in Centennial Park, along Grace Point and in front of Mouat's.

The seawalk concept goes back

to 1978 when an amendment to the Islands Trust's Community Plan made reference to a seawalk that would connect the downtown core to the northern end of the harbour. It was further advanced by the publication of the Spar report in 1981. This report, which had been produced at the request of the Trust, contained preliminary designs for the seawalk and cost estimates for its construction. The concept was moved closer to reality when the Trust made Ganges and its waterfront a development permit area and developers were made responsible for the construction of the portion of the sea walk along the waterfront they wished to develop.

The building of the seawalk in Centennial Park was started in 1985 and finished in 1986. Its financing and construction involved a wide spectrum of interests including the ministry of fisheries and oceans, which contributed the pilings and rip-rap, the provincial Lottery Fund, Sea Capers, a federal employment grant, public works, the highways department and public donations of money and labour. The seawalk in front of Grace Point was built by the developer in conformance with the Trust's development permit regulations. Both stretches follow the designs recommended in the Spar report.

The costing of the portion that is currently under discussion, which also follows the recommendations of the Spar report, has been put together in a way that, it is hoped, will maximize the contribution of private developers and the public sector. The contribution of the private landowners has helped the project obtain a Lottery grant and a federal employment development grant. Any significant change to the structure of the project would drastically effect the financing formula.

It should be emphasized, however, that this approach has in no way reduced the costs of the developers, nor has it been a means by which they have been granted special favours. Rather, by combining and co-ordinating their efforts it has been possible to raise the funds needed to complete the northern portions of the walk. The uplands along which this portion of the seawalk is to be built (i.e., the portion from the northern boundary of B&B Marina to the northern end of the project) are so narrow that it is extremely unlikely they will ever be developed.

Some concern has been expressed about the amount of fill that will be used to construct the walk. Almost all of the proposed fill will be placed on the southern portion of the project — i.e., the portion of the seawalk that will be built south of the bluff at the northern end of the B&B Marina property. This is a portion of the harbour where previous use of the water had made the ocean bed sterile. The proposed fill will cover the area once used as a log dump and into which some amount of sewage drained over a long period of time. A fisheries' environment impact study confirmed that the area is indeed environmentally "dead" and that filling would have no negative effect on the marine environment.

Filling this portion of the harbour will allow the seawalk to be built over "24-hour water," to include a dinghy dock which will facilitate boaters' access to the village and which will not be viable

unless it is placed in an adequate depth of water and to create some three quarters of an acre of public park. Park — not a parking lot, as a number of people seem to believe.

It should also be pointed out that the private developers will be filling to the low tide mark in order that the seawalk can be placed at the optimum position. In these places the "toe" of the fill and rip rap cannot legally extend below the low water mark.

Furthermore any landowner who increases the size of his or her lot by fill must purchase back the filled portion from the government at "the prevailing price." The landowners are not receiving a free grant of land. Any building they may wish to place on their property after it has been filled will have to go through the normal, official approval processes of zoning and the obtaining of development permits.

A great deal of effort has gone into putting this project together. The laws that protect the upshore owner and his riparian rights are extremely complex. Permission and or agreement to proceed have had to be obtained from several branches of Fisheries and Oceans, Crown Lands, the Capital Regional District, the Islands Trust, the Advisory Planning Commission, and the Parks and Recreation Commission. Over two years of effort has already gone into the project and it has now reached the point where, after a little fine-tuning, construction can start.

When the walk is in place residents and visitors will be able to walk the waterfront from Gasoline Alley to the north end of the harbour. Pedestrians approaching the village from the north will no longer have to walk the edge of the highway.

In order to expedite and control the project three committees have been set up. A construction committee, an administrative committee and a co-ordinating committee. The construction committee — Geof Swift, Philip Grange, Hans Hazenboom, Laurie Hedger, John Stepaniuk, John Charlton and Neville Smith — will be responsible for construction matters. The administrative committee — Glen Moores, Bard Brown, Oliver Knopp and Tom Toynbee — will be responsible for the fiscal and accounting aspects of the project. The co-ordinating committee — Jonathan Oldroyd, Glen Moores and Jack Cherry — will, as its name implies, co-ordinate the efforts of the other two committees.

In the near future it is hoped that working plans for the project can be presented to Driftwood for publication. Meanwhile the undersigned are available to answer any questions interested citizens may wish to address to them. It is their belief that the effort that has been expanded putting the project together will produce a seawalk which we can all enjoy and from which we can all derive a great deal of pleasure and pride.

It also describes its program as "a unique family experience whose rewards multiply with time."

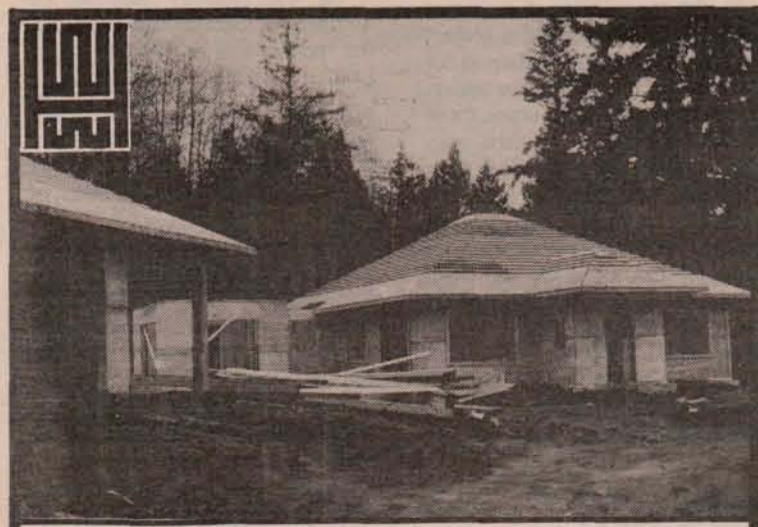
Interculture Canada is part of AFS Intercultural Programs, founded in 1947 and currently operating in 66 countries. It aims to promote intercultural understanding and international development.

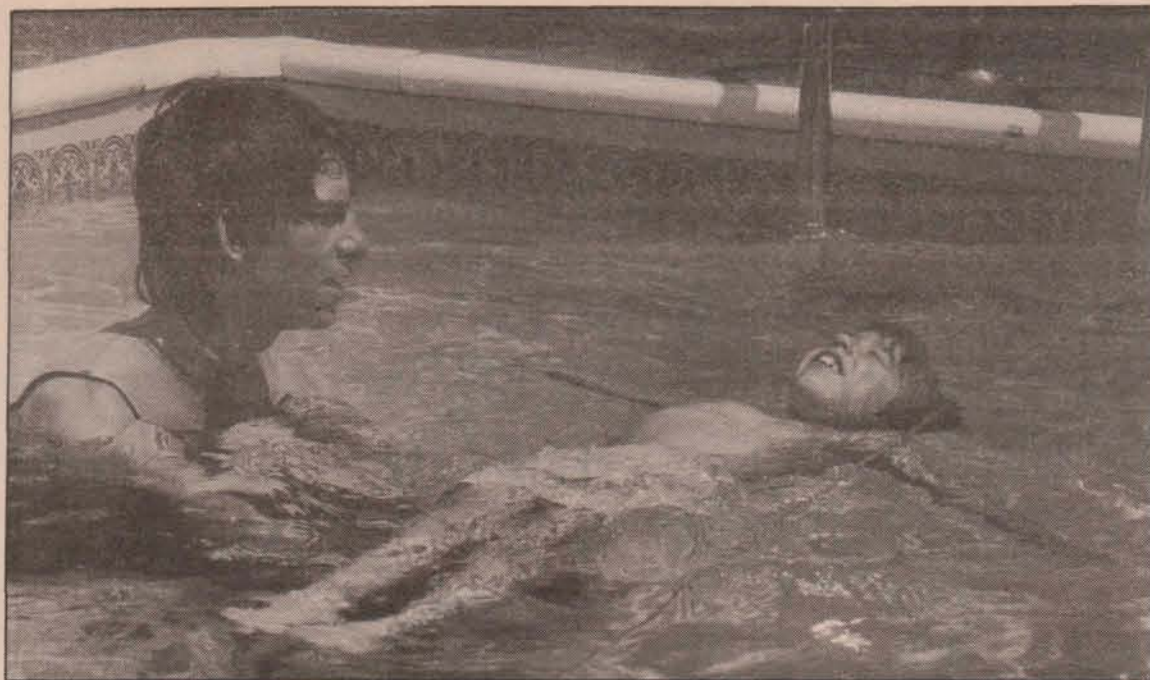

'Learn-to-swim' program offered to school children

Children at two Salt Spring Island schools are learning how to swim.

The Parks and Recreation Commission's aquatic director, Brent Phillips, and instructor Jared Shutty have been giving swimming lessons to primary grade students at Fernwood and Salt Spring elementary schools.

The lessons, conducted in privately-owned pools, are co-sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Swimming Pool Society. No program is in place for elementary school students at Fulford, because no pool is available in their area.

The program, for children in Kindergarten to Grade Three, has so been taught to 110 Fernwood students,

and to 150 students from Salt Spring Elementary.

Helping the two instructors provide the learn-to-swim course and move students to and from classes were about 80 parent local volunteers.

Once the program has been completed, Phillips and Shutty will swing over to handle the Parks and Recreation Commission's extensive summer swimming instruction courses.

Both Phillips and Shutty are certified instructors. Phillips taught for four years in Tsawwassen, including a few years when he volunteered to provide instruction for handicapped swimmers. Shutty, meanwhile, recently completed one year instructing swimming courses in Hudson's Hope, B.C.

Driftnet opponents asking for signatures

An environmentally concerned group in Victoria says islanders' signatures on a petition currently circulating on Salt Spring will pressure the government to take action against Asian driftnetting.

The petition, established by the Victoria based AWARE (Association for Wildlife Research and Education) and brought to the island by Salt Spring member Liz Gay, asks the federal government to "do everything in its power to stop the driftnet fishing in the North Pacific Ocean."

The petition, which has been signed by numerous islanders, requests the government denounce driftnetting as an "ecological disaster being perpetrated by Japanese, Korean and Taiwanese driftnet fishing fleets."

The petition says seabirds and marine mammals are being slaughtered "by the thousands," the westcoast salmon fishery is being damaged by this fishing practice, and "there is a great possibility of this practice having a horrendous impact on the global ecosystem and upon our own environment."

The subject of Asian driftnetting has been introduced to numerous school children on Salt Spring by Gay, who helps generate discussion after showing an EarthTrust video tape.

A pamphlet, distributed by AWARE, says every night during this summer there will be some 1,500 ships of the Red Squid driftnet fleet deploying over 30,000 miles of pelagic driftnets in the North Pacific Ocean. The vessels will operate in international waters, where unprotected seabirds, mammals and other species are vulnerable to the nets.

Last year, AWARE says, over 44,000 Dall porpoises were slaughtered, along with over one million seabirds.

The Association further notes that Japan has banned the use of driftnets in its own waters, "knowing first hand the devastation caused by this fishery."

AWARE is currently operating a membership drive and, at the same time, encouraging people to sign the petition. By obtaining signatures and presenting the petition to elected representatives in the House of Commons, the association says, "we shall create the pressure necessary to effect an immediate and positive result."

Thirty Years Ago

The Vancouver Island Branch of the B.C. School Trustees Association held its annual meeting on Salt Spring. Representatives from school districts throughout Vancouver Island attended the meeting, which was chaired by Pauline Touzeau of the Qualicum school district.

The body of Fulford postmaster Jimmy Grosart was discovered at the bottom of a cliff at Mt. Maxwell, following a three-day search by RCMP and friends and neighbours of the deceased man.

The Farmers' Institute took out an advertisement in *Driftwood* requesting members of other island organizations to volunteer to serve on the Fall Fair committee. A front page story referring to the ad says it is the Institute's "last desperate effort to find someone on the island who thinks a Fall Fair is an asset to the island, and who is willing to pitch in and help."

Twenty-Five Years Ago

As the island prepared to go to referendum on expansion of the school, *Driftwood* ran a front-page editorial on the need for taxpayer approval of the scheme. An affirmative vote would see construction of a new high school, leaving the current school building for the use of elementary students.

The Harbour House Hotel in Ganges had been sold to a group of businessmen from Vancouver. The Salt Spring landmark had been in operation since 1916. Colonel D.G. Crofton would remain as managing director. The new owners planned to expand the facility.

A competition between Fulford and Ganges continued, but this event was held on the snooker table. Grant Cruickshank and Nels Westin defended the honour of Ganges against Alex McManus Sr. and Thomas Duncan of Fulford. The combined age of the four pool players was 292 years.

Twenty Years Ago

Islanders were concerned over shortcomings in planning and zoning controls. The Capital Region was being petitioned to offer assistance to Salt Spring, North and South Pender and Mayne Island to draw up community plans, allowing local control of planning.

Kanaka Road would stay. The Gulf Islands School Board had requested department of highways permission to close the road, which separated two parts of the school's playing fields. The proposal was turned down when residents in the area complained.

The community hall at Port Washington on Pender Island became the site of a delve-in. The event depicted the history of the Gulf Islands, with children from the Pender school presenting various displays. Among the contest winners were Philip Dersen, Patti Long, Lorrie Aimes, Lynette Kent, Eileen Grimmer, Debbie Moore, Randy Moore and Debbie Auchterlonie.

The Mayne Island fun-walkathon organizers received the first entry form. MP Tommy Douglas was the first to sign up for the competition.

Fifteen Years Ago

The Capital Regional District bought 1.75 acres of land adjacent to the Lady Minto Hospital on Salt Spring. The CRD planned to construct an intermediate and personal care home for seniors. The proposal called for a 40-bed unit. The CRD would check the

costs before making a decision on the matter.

Yvette Valcourt of Salt Spring was elected president of the Victoria diocese Catholic Women's League.

The school at Mayne Island would get a flagpole. The Legion on that island had commented on the lack of a pole and the Lions Club looked into the situation. When school trustee Pearl Brau brought the matter to the school board, chairman Charles Baltzer agreed a flagpole should be installed.

Sabot races for children 13 and under were held in Ganges Harbour. There were nine competitors representing five sailing clubs and Robbie Canon of Salt Spring took the top spot. Alex Neish, also of Salt Spring, placed third.

The *Driftwood* office moved again. The staff of the Gulf Islands weekly newspaper moved to the end of the yellow dirt road behind the Ganges liquor store. The first office was on Fulford-Ganges Road, but had moved next door to the old liquor store. It remained there until the current move.

Ten Years Ago

Greenwoods had a piano, thanks to the efforts of the Salt Spring Volunteer Fire Department. A dozen of the fire-fighters delivered the piano and stayed to listen to various residents of the senior's home play music on it.

The Saturna Island Lions Club had finished work on the tennis courts at the school on that island. The courts could double for use in basketball and badminton. While the men worked on the courts, the Lady Lions supplied refreshments.

Mahon Hall on Salt Spring was spruced up. Ernie and Elma Rubright joined Hugh Cummings to paint and scrape and fix. The paint had been purchased by the Community Arts Council (CAC) and the facelift was undertaken in preparation for Artcraft '79.

The Red Cross fund-raising drive on Pender Island drew in \$1,095, reported co-ordinator Jean Hinton. She had nine canvassers going door-to-door, collecting funds during the drive.

The industrial arts class at the high school on Salt Spring would construct crow-proof garbage containers for Ganges. The Rotary Club approached Lawrie Neish with the idea, and he put the students to work making the aggregate concrete containers.

Five Years Ago

Tenders for construction of a two-room addition to Fernwood School on Salt Spring were called. The project was to be under school board management, with sub-contractors supplying the work. The classrooms were needed to ease overcrowding at the school.

Once again, islanders let down their hair for three days of Sea Caper enjoyment. Numerous people turned out to stroll around the village and watch the antics of the many more who participated in the various events.

The Pender Island Lions Club was negotiating with the ministry of transport, in co-operation with the department of highways and the Pender Island Health Care Society, for a heliport for the Penders. Plans are for a medical evacuation airfield which will accommodate twin rotor machines.

Island beaches 'safer' than most

A release indicating fecal coliform levels at beaches within the Capital Region shows levels at Gulf Island beaches are well below the maximum allowed for safe use.

The fecal coliform count is an indicator for sewage pollution of water. High levels of coliform in the water increases the risk of gastro-intestinal disease for swimmers.

The Capital Regional District (CRD) recently announced it will release coliform figures on a weekly basis throughout the summer months. Fecal coliform counts will be taken at all recreational beaches

in the district.

Beach warnings will be posted when counts consistently exceed 200 fecal coliform per 100 ml of water, or when levels fluctuate dramatically. The CRD has already posted signs at two beaches in Saanich, two in Oak Bay and one in Victoria.

The beaches showing the greatest fecal coliform pollution are Shoal Bay (562) and Ross Bay (403).

Only beaches on Salt Spring are listed in the Gulf Island section of the release. Fecal coliform counts at these beaches are as follows:

Blackburn Lake, 4; Weston Lake, 10; Cusheon Lake, 11; St. Mary Lake, 16; Stowe Lake, 19; and Vesuvius beach, 35.

The average count for district beaches registering less than 200 fecal coliforms, per 100 ml of water is 26.

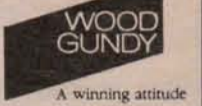
