Via water taxi

Group of islanders travel to Orcas to view Art Centre on that island

A group of about 15 people, most from the Island Arts Centre Society (IACS), visited the small American community of Orcas on Sunday for a first-hand look at a theatre complex the IACS thinks resembles it hopes to see built here.

Lawrie Neish, secretary of the Community Arts Council (CAC) and a member of the arts society, said the purpose of Sunday's trip was to give representatives from the three groups that make up the IACS - namely the Community Arts Council (CAC), the Festival of the Arts Society, and the Off Centre Stage Society - a better idea of the kind of facility being promoted in the group's own proposal.

So far, that proposal which calls for the building of a 10,600 square foot facility at a cost of \$1,314,500 (less \$174,500 in donated land) has been submitted to three potential

funding sources. Those include Go B.C. for \$434,000, CRD Windfall for \$200,000 and the Federal Department of Communications for \$185,000.

Neish says he expects to learn the status of the Windfall grant next month and of other two grants by March of next year.

The group also hopes to raise an additional \$161,000 through community fund-raising efforts and save \$160,000 in donated professional fees and reduced construction costs.

Other costs associated with the building include \$735,000 in construction costs and \$150,000 for additional land. The only higher cost would be \$185,000 for fixtures and equipment which would be covered if the federal funding comes through.

As it currently sits, the IACS is

proposing that the facility be built on a 1.17 acre site - or seven lots - on the corner of Seaview and Jackson Avenues and bordering both the Linear and Mouat Parks.

The complex would be built on two levels and cover a 7,500 square foot area.

The group has received tentative approval from the provincial Minister of State responsible for Parks that five of those lots, currently listed as provincial park land and falling within the Mouat Provincial Park, will be converted to community park status if a variety of conditions are met.

Some of those include agreement from the donors (the Mouat family) which has been given, and approval from the Islands Trust - something the group says it will not pursue until its funding is in place.

Islands honour Norget

A new ambulance en route to Nicaragua will bear the name of a Salt Spring Islander, who passed away October 18.

The people of Bainbridge Island (near Seattle) who, along with individuals in the Gulf Island have joined a co-operative friendship with the Nicaraguan Island of Ometepe, have paid tribute to John Norget by naming a new ambulance for him.

Norget, who was actively involved in the Ometepe project, lived on Salt Spring for three years before passing away two weeks ago.

He was well known by members of Trail and Nature Club, the Spanish Club, as well as the Gulf Islands - Ometepe Friendship Association.

Born in Germany in 1928, Norget emigrated to Canada in 1951. Before retiring to Salt Spring in 1986, he was head of the Manitoba Design Institute.

An enthusiastic canoeist and hiker, Norget loved languages and nature. He had a particular affection for Central America and felt deeply about the tribulations of the ordinary people there. One year ago, he

As it now stands, the IACS proposal calls for a three-phase development, the first of which would include a facility housing a 3,875 sq. ft. visual arts area, a 5,375 performing arts theatre with seating for 235 people and a 1,350 common arts area (or community room).

The common room, or lounge area, would be on the ground floor

with the remaining areas on the main level.

Island Trust representative Nick Gilbert, who accompanied the group on its Sunday tour, said that while he is in favour of an arts complex for the island, he has a responsibility to the site itself which would encompass parkland. He noted the group is proposing to

buy two lots which could enhance the existing park area.

In the meantime, Neish says the only thing the group can do now is wait until the group receives word on its funding. If that money comes through, however, he hopes to see construction started early next spring and finished within the following year.

became the advance guard of an initiative by the Southern Gulf Islands to fill a desperate need for potable water on Ometepe — an island of some 30,000 people in Lake Nicaragua.

He travelled there alone, and at his own expense, to "get the ball rolling" and, at the same time, delivered a large quantity of urgently needed medical supplies.

By the time he left, he had made an impression on many islanders there, and most particularly on those whom the committee would work with later.

His is credited with establishing the continuing sense of good-will and co-operation, necessary for the project.

When he returned from Nicaragua, he made several presentations to island groups.

He continued his work as

treasurer of the Ometepe Committee until the last, and one of his final acts was to make sure his records were transferred and in order.

Close friends say Norget found and dispensed laughter wherever he went: "Salt Spring is a poorer place without him."

Low-level flights discussed as Voice of Women meets

In a recent workshop, sponsored by the B.C. Voice of Women, local Marg Simons learned that Canada will be allowing four annual one-day, low-level bomber/flight exercises covering a 1,400 kilometre long route extending through the Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

The workshop was one of several sponsored by the B.C. Voice of Women and held in Sechelt. The event was attended by four members of the Salt Spring Voice of Women, who will provide reports at the local group's meeting, scheduled for November 6 at 7:30 p.m.

At Simon's workshop, she learned the B.C. low-level flight route was laid out by the U.S. Strategic Air Command - not Canadians - for the purpose of training U.S. bomber pilots to carry cruise missiles in the Soviet Union for nuclear strikes.

Simons noted Rear Admiral Eugend Carrol of the U.S. Navy was reported as saying the low-

level training flights in B.C. have no purpose other than to practice the delivery of nuclear weapons during nuclear war.

A story appearing in the June 1986 issue of *Defense Week* suggested that "the objective is to keep any superpower air battle away

from U.S. territory and heavily populated areas of Canada. You'd want to conduct a lot of battle further north. I'd rather not fight over Detroit."

According to information gathered by Simons, 20,000 people live along the B.C. route, none of

whom were consulted about the training exercise.

Said Simons: "the decision-making power of non-elected military NATO officials is frightening. Canada's testing of offensive systems, such as low-level bomber fighters, is helping to un-

dermine the entire process of nuclear disarmament."

Information about the environmental impact of low-level flights and what can be done regarding this action can be obtained at Crossroads.

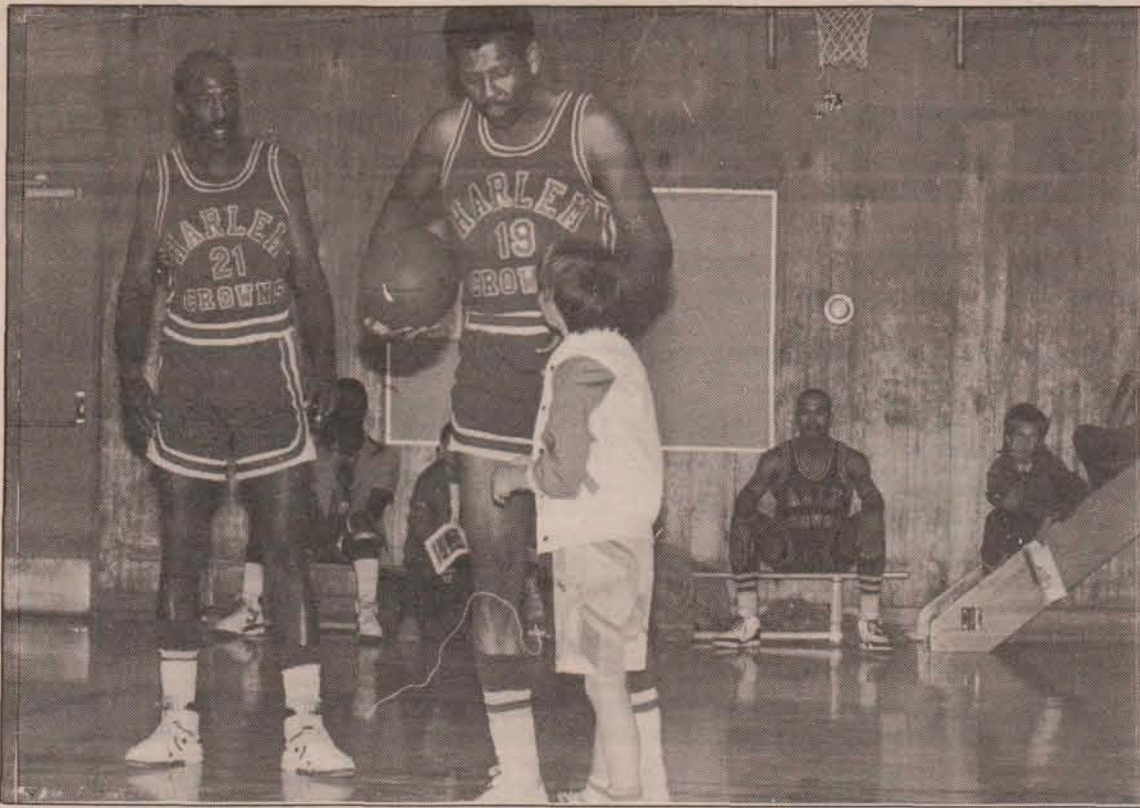

Feature by E. Roffe Thompson deplored pessimism among administrators and the general public during the depression. He recalled the Common Council of the City of London when it approved a resolution, about 100 years earlier, condemning those social conditions which were "inducing a starving people to regard the laws of their country with a deep sense of injustice."

The continuous and increasing depression of the manufacturing, commercial and agricultural interests of the country and the widespread distress of the working classes had occasioned this concern. Manufacturers were without a market; shipping without freight, farmers faced high rents as the return for their produce fell while the working force increased as fast as demand for its services shrank.

But England didn't collapse. Fifty years later, wrote Thompson, Lord Randolph Churchill was crying the same blues. "Your iron industry is dead," he had charged, "as dead as mutton; coal industries are languishing; silk industry is dead; woollen industry is gasping, struggling. The shipping industry is at a standstill. Foreign iron, foreign wool, foreign silk and cotton are pouring into the country, flooding you, sinking you, swamping you!"

Prosperity defeated defeatism

But that Churchill was wrong, noted that British author more than half a century ago. Like so many pessimists and defeatists, he predicted wrongly and prosperity defeated defeatism.

Thompson recalled that in 1903 Joseph Chamberlain was one the same hustings. "Silk is gone, iron is threatened. Cotton will go. How long are you going to stand it?" asked Chamberlain. But, again, he was wrong!

Thompson might well have been writing for a later age when he explained, "I feel that General Smuts is profoundly right when he says that no national solution is possible. The world is rapidly becoming international, warned the South African leader."

He concluded, however, with a nationalistic theme that was not borne out, precisely, when he forecast that Britain was finished only when the Briton had relinquished the faith that built the nation and had lost the faith that developed it.

Concerned over safety of high heels

"That day is not yet!" he thundered. Did it truly come? Safety First Association was concerned over the dangers of high heels beneath so many women. The prevalence of such exaggerated footwear was held responsible for the great number of women suffering a fatal fall down the stairs in the home. At the same time, the reader was introduced to nine-year-old Jackie Cooper, new child star on the screen. If anyone wants to know who he is, I could summarize it some time.

Weavers and spinners plan 18th annual sale and show

Saturday November 11 marks the 18th annual Christmas show and sale of the Galiano Weavers and Spinners.

The group began in 1970, when the late Rosetta Lapham, an experienced weaver, got together with a number of her island friends to pass on her knowledge. The next

year the guild was formed with Mrs. Lapham, Corine Snell, Berthe Scarrow, Lucey Miley, Helen Smith, Fern Stewart and the late Beth Beach and Doris Tothill among the members.

The spider on a web was adapted as the group's mark of identification. Early on wool from the


Scarrow's farm at Retreat Cove was prepared and woven by the neophyte weavers, using primitive picture frame looms. As funds became available through sales and other money raising activities, new equipment was purchased. The group now boasts two jack looms, three counter-balance looms, a table loom, three spinning wheels and the same number of carders.

Of the original members, Fern Stewart is still active. She houses the weavers equipment in her cottage at "Seaview" overlooking Active Pass and the current members meet there weekly - Thursdays 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. At other times members are free to use the premises and the equipment to complete their projects. At the moment, the group has 20 members.

Current officers of the guild are Joan Sashaw (president), Mary Reader (vice-president), Marguerite Macintosh (secretary) and Vimmy Coffey (treasurer). Fern is loom mistress and, we suspect, a source of much knowledge and inspiration to the others.

The upcoming show will feature the group's latest work and include woven scarves, throws, stoles, rugs, knitting, crocheted items and Christmas crafts. Tea, coffee and goodies are always a part of Galiano Weaver's shows.

Irving Sinclair was a summer resident on Gulf Drive for many years. Son of Galiano's first teacher (the school was located near the corner of Bluff and Georgeson Bay Roads), Sinclair became a portrait and landscape painter of note. Among the works done during his summers on Galiano are portraits and landscapes, many still in the collections of island residents.

Two works given by Sinclair to the people of Galiano are noteworthy: one a crucifixion, is the property of St. Margaret's church, and the other, seen by many islanders almost every day, is in the post office. Given to Galiano in 1958 this large oil shows Active Pass and a passing B.C. Ferry, as seen from Bluff Park. In the background is Helen Point and Mayne Island.

This treasure — a reminder of him is ours, it belongs to the island.

Enzio's bells

Galiano sculptor Enzio von Rezori has been designing and casting bronze bells for the past year. The shapes are beautiful, likewise the tone of each bell when struck. They have been a very popular sale item at the island's Dandelion Gallery. Galiano people will be interested to learn that *West Magazine* will print a feature article on Enzio and several other craftspeople in their December issue.

This year Helen and John grew their own wheat on their ranch in the valley. For their Thanksgiving dinner, she collected the wheat, threshed it, ground it and made her bread. It is a good thing for the commercial outfits Helen is not in competition — nothing could have been more delicious.

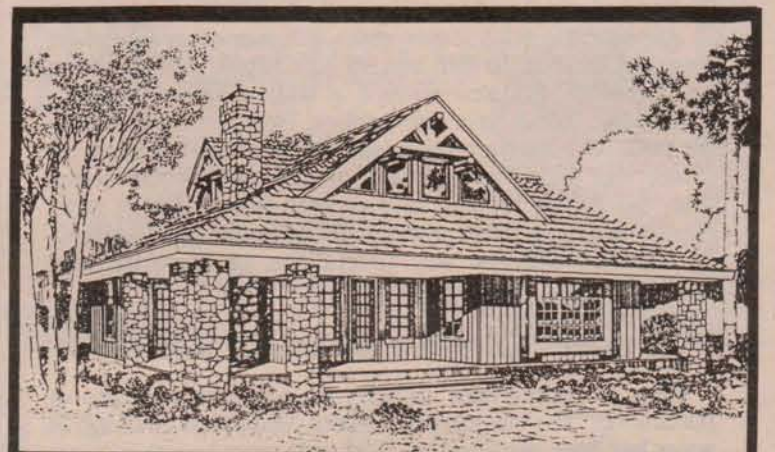

country gourmet

by **john edwards**



"We understand that certain noble Roman ladies have been accustomed to tasting venison for breakfast and have thus been free of colds." Pliny.

I have met a few people who seemed impervious to cold infection, and without exception they were moderate but seasoned whisky drinkers." M.F.K. Fisher.

Every occupation has its hazards. Football players get broken bones. Politicians get cartooned. Evangelists get caught. I am a primary school teacher. I get colds. My profession is not so august as theirs, but let me assure you, the colds can be magnificent.

My colleagues, consequently are (cough!) great collectors of cures for common (sneeze!), and uncommon (hatchoo!) colds.

The intellectuals I know are disciples of Linus Pauling. Five times a day, in answer to an inaudible dietary muezzin, they throw down their sticks of chalk and salaam in the direction of Southern California before swallowing a gram of orange flavoured ascorbic acid.

Huddled in overcoats and blankets

The athletic favour long distance runs after school, presumably in the expectation that the germs can't keep up. (They can.)

Environmentalists believe that malevolent microbes lurk in serpentine hot air ducts that writhe in the ceilings of our school building, an edifice which has the appearance, and sometimes the aroma, of the Potala Palace in Tibet. This conviction forces them to sit, huddled in overcoats and Hudson Bay blankets, next to open windows during autumn gales and winter blizzards, while their students watch them curiously from the warmer regions of their classroom.

In my quixotic career I have taught with garlic-eaters, herbal tea drinkers, venison-slicers, marathon runners, fresh air worshippers, and vitamin C crunchers. But there has been no escape for any of them. The sneeze of an otherwise innocuous six-year-old will undermine the most fanatical regimen.

There is only one thing you can do. Give up. Go home to bed with a Paul Theroux, the latest issue of *Gourmet*, or, if you feel exceptionally grisly, *Richard III*, and tuck into a bowl of my mother-in-law's Tarragon Chicken Soup.

Diana's Tarragon Chicken Soup

Cooked chicken bones, a chicken carcass, or a left-over stuffed chicken with the stuffing removed; 1 quart vegetable stock, but not potato water; 1 onion, diced; whole bay leaf; broccoli stalks; lettuce leaves; sprigs of parsley; celery tops; grated carrots; a few chopped olives; 1/2 C pre-cooked rice; 2 or 3 lovage leaves if you have them; 1/2 t tarragon; salt & pepper.

Simmer the chicken bones for one and a half hours in vegetable stock seasoned with onion and bay leaf. Now remove from heat, cool and strain.

Now add greens (slashed broccoli stalks, ripped lettuce leaves, riven parsley sprigs and rent celery tops), and carrots. If you like them, throw in a few chopped olives. Finish up with pre-cooked rice, some torn lovage leaves (although more celery tops will do in winter), the essential tarragon and the inevitable salt and pepper.

For "body" I sometimes add a little chopped thyme. Cook with just the suspicion of a simmer, for at least an hour. If you want a thick soup, use some flour or cornstarch.

Also for guests who rejoice in good health

It will seem to the acute reader a waste of time for me to go on about the flavours of a salubrious dish designed for people whose temporary ill-health has deprived them of all sense of taste. Indeed, to those unfortunates this whole article may already have seemed a waste of time. I don't care. It's not inappropriate, you understand, also to serve this soup to guests who rejoice in good health.

The crucial element in the recipe is the presence of tarragon, a herb which Elizabeth David agrees has "a quite remarkable affinity with chicken." It also has a quite remarkable etymology. Tarragon is derived, by various linguistic hiccups, from the Latin dracunculus, which means a small serpent, or "dragonet," (not to be confused with a disgusted wife of an inebriated dragon).

Regardless, for those who wish to go beyond the mysteries of language, there are also tarragon vinegars, tarragon creams, tarragon salads, tarragon liqueurs and, of course, roast chickens cooked with tarragon leaves, butter, olive oil, garlic, salt and pepper.

Now (sneeze!) I'm going directly to bed, to sleep off all those tarragons I just said.

Mayne

A gift of \$1,000 from the Capital Regional District (CRD) has been used to purchase a ghetto blaster for Mayne Island's Neighbourhood House.

NOTICE is hereby given that all persons who deem their interest in property affected by the following proposed bylaws will be afforded an opportunity to be heard on the matters contained therein at a Public Hearing to be held in the NORTH PENDER ISLAND SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY HALL, NORTH PENDER ISLAND, B.C. on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 1989, commencing at 7:00 PM.

In general terms the intent of the following proposed bylaws is as follows:

- Proposed South Pender Island Trust Committee Bylaw No. 28 cited as "Official Community Plan Bylaw, 1989" is a bylaw to adopt the Official Community Plan for South Pender Island, Blundon and Skull Islets and the surface of the sea within 1000 metres of the shoreline of South Pender Island and mid-channel between North Pender Island and South Pender Island. The Official Community Plan provides goals, objectives and policies to guide development and maintain the rural character and environment of South Pender Island. The proposed bylaw would replace the Official Community Plan (South Pender Island) Bylaw 1973.
- Proposed South Pender Island Trust Committee Bylaw No. 29 cited as "Official Community Plan (South Pender Island) Bylaw, 1973 Amendment Bylaw No. 1, 1989", is a bylaw to delete Subsection (h) under the heading Rural Residential and replaces it with the following:
"only one single family dwelling shall be permitted on any one land registry parcel which is less than 0.8 hectares (2 acres) or less in size,"
and adds a new section that allows:
"only one single family dwelling and one cottage shall be permitted on any one land registry parcel which is 0.8 hectares (2 acres) or more in size."
- Proposed South Pender Island Trust Committee Bylaw No. 30 cited as "Zoning Bylaw, South Pender Island, 1980, Amendment No. 1, 1989" is a bylaw that deletes section 5.1(2) and replaces it with the following:
"one single family dwelling per land registry parcel which is 0.8 hectares (1/2 acre) or less in size,"
and inserts a new Section 5.1(3) which allows:
"one single family dwelling and one seasonal cottage per land registry parcel which is greater than 0.8 hectares (2 acres) in size."

Down the years

Thirty Years Ago

Thirty years ago this week teachers in the Gulf Island School District were asked to take a seven per cent pay cut effectively rolling their wages back to 1959 levels. Teachers had asked for a five per cent pay hike.

An article appearing in the *Driftwood* at that time noted "one member of the trustee's representative made the statement that when we can pay teachers on class room achievement rather than university achievement, there would be virtually no limit to what the board would pay to a teacher of merit."

The controversy over road conditions continued. Reads the *Driftwood*: "... the first part of Graham Shove's run is on our good paved road. . . At St. Mary's Lake the gravelled, pot-holed road curves around the bluffs.

The bluffs where the road department worked so industriously some months past. Where they took down the telephone lines and got prepared to do the needed work. Where nothing happened and the road department went off to do something else. The bus goes on, around these blind curve and comes to where the North End road branches off the Fernwood road...Here begins a series of wicked, senseless, blind curves that are fraught with danger even for slow moving cars. It is nothing short of criminal to provide such dangerous pieces of road for a school bus. The bus barely creeps, pokes its nose cautiously around, hoping that at this moment no car is coming...there is no place to pass."

Twenty Five Years

Residents on the island were angry to learn that over the weekend the island had been visited

by hunters who shot two deer at a local tame deer farm run by Bruce Campbell.

Reads the *Driftwood*: "At 7 a.m. two men were observed shooting from the road towards the Campbell buildings after which they drove off and left the Island. The two deer were left dead on the lawn.

"Police report that the persons responsible have been apprehended and that charges involving several infractions of the Game Act are pending."

Disappointing news for commuters working in Victoria. Renovations to the Swartz Bay terminal means that ferry users lose their access to "shelter from the rain or to the convenient rest rooms...since these major renovations will not be completed until next Spring, it may be a cold wet winter for Gulf Island travellers waiting at the terminal for a ferry unless some feasible arrangement can be found..."

Another lead article in that week's edition of the paper indicates that the public interest in local affairs was as dismal then as it often is now.

Says the story: "The School District Annual Meeting of the North Saltspring District Tuesday night was attended by a mere half dozen ratepayers, the members of the Board itself and three persons directly involved in education. This situation resulted in the Board itself re-electing itself.

Twenty Years Ago

This issue of the *Driftwood* is not available.

Fifteen Years Ago

Four candidates from Salt Spring Island vie for one of two seats in the upcoming Island Trust elections. It become clear that

preserving the environment was as important then as it is now.

Candidate Mike Larmour says the following: "I (have) developed a keen concern for the preservation of our environment in the narrower sense of air, land and water pollution." He learned something of the complex inter-relationships between living creatures and their environment, he told the *Driftwood*.

"As a member of the Planning Association, this concern was extended to include aesthetic, social and economic factors that are important to our quality way of life on the island."

In terms of development, however, a front-page story on this week's issue notes that a the new \$350,000 business block in Ganges should be in use by the spring. The facility is the work of the Valcourt Building Centre Ltd. which plans to build a block of eight office suites and three or more stores.

As the demand for French instruction grows throughout the province, a local school board official commented that one of the biggest barriers to instituting French programs was bigotry. An editorial in this week's paper notes that "Learning French does not threaten the supremacy of the English language in the western world. It merely offers students an opportunity to exercise their minds a little more.

A century ago a man who was without Latin and Greek was considered a boor. French was expected of any man who was not a moron, or, of course, a pauper. Today, we boast of our impoverished learning. We rejoice that we have eliminated Latin and linguistics from our schools. But, of course, we are fools!"

Ten Years Ago

Islanders breathed a sigh of

relief this week after learning that local eggs had a PCB level lower than levels considered acceptable in the United States. The eggs were tested after another sample taken three weeks earlier showed that PCBs from a chemical spill in Montana had contaminated tallow used to feed local chickens.

The regional health officer this week said he plans to clamp down on malfunctioning septic tanks and disposal fields that may be contaminating water in the Capital Region.

An editorial running in this week's paper notes that "On Salt Spring Island alone, the Environmental Protection Services has identified over a dozen locations where sewage is leaking in to the sea...Now, perhaps, we will see some action taken on cleaning up those disposal problem. Maybe we can even look forward to the day when those signs warning that the taking of shellfish is prohibited start coming down."

Finally, Salt Spring Island's first Vietnamese refugees, the Lam family from Saigon, arrive in Ganges this week.

Five Years Ago

No butts...the pressure is on. A front-page story, outlined in red, reports that today (October 24) is day two of a bylaw designed to control the places where people smoke.

While the CRD has offered to provide establishments covered by the bylaw with 10 free signs, it's suggested that the bylaw has no teeth. The bylaw, says the story, "has all the teeth of a toy tiger."

Another front-page story reports that money spent on education in the Gulf Islands increased by 90 per cent over a five year period while enrolment went up by only 14 per cent.

According to that article student enrolment on the Island went from 1,013 students in 1980 to 1,156 in 1984 while the education budget went from \$3,280,778. to \$6,273,753.

Finally, cable television comes to Pender Island thanks to a B.C. Ferries cleaning lady who wants to retire to the island but wants a job when she gets there. Setting up the company - even though it's going to cost between \$80,000 and \$95,000 - seemed to be a good solution. Says owner Carolyn Ferris, "I won't be getting rich...but it's going to be a fun thing to do."
