## Salt Spring could lose public use of Crown Lands

Salt Spring Island's Crown Lands are in danger of being lost to the community for all time, says Crown Lands Coalition Chairperson Maureen Milburn.

Local Crown Lands comprise various parcels dispersed throughout the island. Although

most of them were formerly classified "Park Reserve," that category no longer exists, and they could be sold or leased by the provincial government to private interests.

"Of less than 46,000 acres that compose this island," says Milburn, "only 3780 are available for public use in the form of parks and un-

designated Crown Lands. Of that number, more than half — 2000 acres — are undesignated Crown Lands."

Coalition member Bob Andrew says the government has received several submissions from private parties, including at least one from the Duncan area seeking log supplies.

Milburn points out that, given its present rate of population growth and its increasing popularity as a tourist destination, Salt Spring can expect to have great need of those 2000 acres as time passes.

Last March, the Coalition approached the Ministry of Crown Lands and was assured the govern-

ment will make no decisions regarding the use of these lands until it conducts an opportunity study.

The Coalition intends to submit a report to this study, forcibly arguing that these lands should be retained for community use. This

## Community must indicate interest for creation of own SPCA branch

Salt Spring will be getting its very own branch of the B.C. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA), but interest in the project must be shown.

Currently, the island has an auxiliary to the Victoria SPCA with David Wooldridge as chairman. He told the *Driftwood* "this (is) the time" after 12 years as an auxiliary to the Victoria branch, for the island to have its own branch.

To that end, island auxiliary members — 160 strong — petitioned the B.C. SPCA for a temporary warrant in order to function as a separate branch. They will have a year to prove their effectiveness.

An organization meeting is slated for November 25 at St. George's Hall at 1 p.m. with Al Hickey, chief executive officer from the provincial SPCA in attendance to explain what is expected of the new Salt Spring branch.

Wooldridge would like as many people as possible to attend the meeting to show the depth of interest in SPCA matters on Salt Spring.

He said the local auxiliary

recently benefited from a legacy which stipulated the money be used on island. With that money and

# Group to lobby ministry with proposal

 proposal should carry a good deal of weight, because the Coalition has the support of the Capital Regional District (CRD) and the Islands Trust.

For 18 months, members of the Island Watch Society have been exploring the Crown Lands, inventorying each parcel as to its potential for hiking trails, nature walks, forest management, marine campsites, and so forth.

The Coalition intends to prepare a proposal to the Ministries of Crown Lands, Parks and Recreation, and Tourism.

Linda Adams, an environmental consultant and skilled cartographer with long experience on the island, has been retained to help prepare this proposal. The CRD has funded

her preliminary report, but the Coalition is seeking additional funds from individuals and groups to complete the program.

## Coalition hopes to garner public input

A body of knowledge about the natural and temporal history of these parcels exists within the community and should be tapped before any final proposal is written, says Milburn.

"If they had asked me, I could have told them all about it," is often heard after it is too late, she says.

To inform interested parties and get their input, the Coalition hopes to hold public meetings and perhaps publish and circulate a flyer/questionnaire, and take the responses into account in the final proposal.

The community will also benefit from a photo bank which will be created to accompany the proposal and add immeasurably to its credibility.

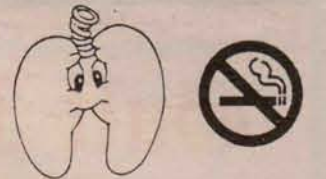

# Ladies Auxiliary gives \$40,800 for new items

Lady Minto Hospital will receive \$40,800 worth of equipment - thanks to the Ladies' Auxiliary.

The hard-working Auxiliary recently approved the gift of cash to allow the hospital to buy needed goods "for the well being of patients in the active and extended care units."

Diane Horvatin, administrator of Lady Minto, said of the gift, "We are fortunate to have a Ladies' Auxiliary as supportive of this hospital as ours is."

She noted that while the ministry of health supplies needed funds for hospital functioning, the Ladies' Auxiliary fills the gap between what Lady Minto Hospital can afford through government funding and what it needs to help patients. The donated money will purchase seven items which are needed at Lady Minto.

The hospital can now buy a physio ultrasound used to help treat muscle aches in patients. Also on the list is a coagumate — a laboratory instrument which measures the clotting rate of blood.

Other items include three geriatric chairs as well as a commercial blender to be used in the kitchen when meals are being prepared.

The x-ray department will benefit from an x-ray processor plus a densitometer and sensitometer.

The operating room gains a heat sealer which would be used to keep sterilized instruments sterile longer. Also on the list of purchases is a housekeeping cart which can be closed to prevent accidents such as a patient inadvertently taking the wrong substance when the cart sits unattended.

At the general meeting of the Ladies Auxiliary, the members present heard various reports from various committees as well as a report on the area conference held in Victoria in early October.

The groups is currently planning activities for the Christmas season.

# Battle won, but at great cost to Canadian Scottish

Although the battle for Normandy had been won, it was at a great cost to the Canadian Scottish. From D-day to August 21 they suffered a total of 627 casualties, of which 198 were officers and men killed in action. Many of these had been with the Regiment before the war or had joined in 1939 and 1940.

After Falaise, the Canadians crossed the Seine and on August 30 raced towards Dieppe, Boulogne and Calais. The capture of all Channel ports was an important factor in Allied strategy in order to reduce the supply times for the pipeline supporting the Allied advance.

After Lt. Col. Cabeldu was promoted at the end of August to command the Fourth Infantry Brigade of the Second Division, Major D.G. Crofton took over from him as CO of the Canadian Scottish, with Major Larry Henderson as second in command.

For them the month of September was taken up with the move towards Calais. On September 27, in the late afternoon, the Canadian Scottish captured the North-west bastion of Calais and then proceeded to capture the harbour facilities and forts.

At 2 a.m. on September 28, Lt. Col. Crofton, accompanied by Capt. Schejelderup and CSM Berry, met the commanding officer of Calais in a fort and accepted his surrender of the Harbour Forts and their officers and men.

The only fear of the Germans was that they would be turned over to the French.

With the Channel ports of Le-Havre, Dieppe, Boulogne, Calais and Ostend cleared, there remained the greatest prize of all, Antwerp,

50 miles inland from the sea.

Undamaged, it remained blocked to Allied shipping because the Germans held the approaches to it along the Scheldt River and Estuary and the Leopold Canal.

The attack on the Leopold Canal began at 5 a.m. on October 6 and by

nightfall the Scottish had secured a bridgehead about 1,000 yards wide. But on the following morning, the Germans counter-attacked and the battle raged all that day and continued for the next five days.

On October 12 and 13, however, the Scottish were able to penetrate

deeper into the canal zone and clear both sides of the canal. November 13 Platoon of "C" Company, commanded by Sgt. Terry Byron, captured about 30 prisoners although there were only 14 men in his entire platoon.

By October 18 and 19 the

bridgehead across the canal had been secured. Then followed a slugging match for the Scottish in mud and rain along the Scheldt.

It was during this time that Ronnie Hoole, a young private from Salt Spring, was killed trying to save a friend.

other cash, the auxiliary is in a position to achieve a long-standing ambition: to become an independent branch.

While the money is sufficient for the local group to act independently, members will not be rushing out to spend needlessly. Until such time as a shelter for stray or injured animals is needed, Wooldridge noted, the group will continue to use facilities in Saanich as well as Duncan.

In addition, he said, the group intends to continue to co-operation with the Capital Regional District (CRD) animal control officer on Salt Spring so it will not have to act as dog-catcher or create a pound for strays.

He praised island residents who have offered to shelter strays or injured animals and said the new group will continue to rely on the common sense and good will of Salt Spring Islanders.

"Our people are ready and interested," he said, repeating his hope for a good attendance at the special meeting. "There comes a time when one needs to cut the apron-strings."

"We need people to attend this meeting to show our visitor that interest is here," he added.

## your garden

It was almost 20 years ago that I first realized just how complex and interwoven all of our surroundings are, and just how little I really knew about the world around me.

Having finished high school in a small town in Southwestern Ontario, surrounded by farmland and small industries, I had taken just about every course available that dealt with the environment: biology, agriculture, chemistry, physics, and a pilot course on environmental studies.

We had done pond surveys, taken water samples all along the Thames River and done tests for pollution. Our class toured erosion-plagued fields and new sewage-treatment plants, talked about air pollution, soil conservation, and virtually every topic pertinent to the issues of the environment and pollution.

Slowly the pollution around us started to become an issue. Mercury poisonings and methyl mercury in Lake St. Clair, the burning river in Toledo, the erosion of soils and stream siltation, garbage crises, and the rapid loss of productive farmland, all brought it home to us. I realized then we were doing a lot wrong and doing it to ourselves.

### *Only related with each other in minor ways*

In the fall of 1971, at the ripe old age of 19, I headed off to higher education in Toronto, fully believing I was aware of much that went on around me. How naive. School ran six days a week and the staggering number of courses each required intense study, but as before, they related with each other only in minor ways.

As first year passed, a new professor from the States arrived to disseminate the news about *ECOLOGY*. After eight years in Central and South America studying the destruction and depletion of the rainforest, we were given inspired, impassioned lectures on the global issues.

That was 1972. For many of us, Dr. Bob Fisher fit together the pieces of the puzzle which we had been studying so intently, and we attempted to apply those lessons to our "Canadian" situation. I suppose we must have missed the bigger issue or we would have gone running out into the streets spreading the word of the imminent global crisis, but our small-scale minds extracted the elements of the new-to-us science of ecology in an effort to apply them to our situation.

### *Armed with fractional enlightenment*

Now we were armed and dangerous; we had a bit of information, and a bit of knowledge. What could be worse?

Armed with only fractional enlightenment we next went to logging, soils, silviculture, and forest management lectures to ask questions as well as to learn. What we heard and soon realized was that the answer to each question was attended by another unanswered question.

Ecology wasn't a new science in early 1972 but for certain, the superstructure had a lot holes in it, and fleshing it out was to be an issue for our generation to deal with.

Our professors were educated, learned scientists and leaders in their fields of expertise, but what we had always thought to be an ancient established science, was actually evolving and changing all the time. Management by crisis was, is and probably always will be my personal style of management, but for the environment it just won't do.

It was in our fourth year, on a field trip to do management plans, armed with more knowledge and more dangerous than ever, that we met George, a man of the woods, a forester by experience, not only education.

### *Told the story of each ecotype*

As we walked he spoke his mind, scraping up the soil and squeezing it, then kicking aside the duff to reveal the humus-enriched horizons. With his hand lens pressed to the mosses he told the story of each site or ecotype, pouring out his wealth of knowledge, not for our amazement but just to show us how complex it all was, and how much information there was right in front of our noses that we couldn't see.

A few people said George was visionary or inspired, but to the practical folks he was perceptive, and could do what a computer could never come close to doing. He had an intuitive ability to read the land, and its plants and wildlife. In the space of a few days with George many of us came to realize that the complexity of the ecosystem was almost overwhelming, as the uncountable variables had to be entered and factored to yield the correct outcome or management decision. We all went away with a bit of apprehension as to how we would ever be able to fit all of the pieces together correctly, every time.

In the year of my graduation, I was hired and sent out to be trained in the fine bureaucratic art of becoming a Unit Forester. Thin on experience but "armed and dangerous" with a little knowledge, and soon to be laden with a great deal of responsibility, I travelled north to the vast forests north of Lake Superior, not too far from George's neck of the woods. ...To be continued...

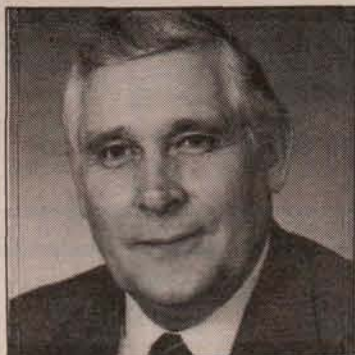
## Chamber welcomes Frederick

# Need for Galiano Health Centre increases as doctor leaves island

The need for the new Health Care Centre for Galiano Island came into sharper focus last week, with the announcement by Dr. John Hales that he and his family will be leaving the community at the end of this school year.

Dr. Hales expects to move to the

Saanich Peninsula where he will practice in his specialty of Pediatrics in that area.

His departure will mean that a new doctor will be needed for this community and that facilities will be required for his or her practice here. While the custom in the past,

followed by Dr. Hales, has been for the resident doctor to use his home as a surgery, the new Centre will present an attractive alternative to someone setting up a new practice on the Island.

Meanwhile, the lengthy subdivision procedure required to enable the Society to take possession of the land on Burrill Road is nearing its end and the Galiano Lion's Club should soon be able to turn over the property so planning and construction can begin.

Besides the Health Care Centre itself, a licensed helicopter pad and possibly an ambulance garage will be constructed on the site.

During the past summer, a fund drive aimed at Island residents has been carried out. In addition to almost \$112,000 in grants and lottery funds already secured, approximately \$60,000 in cash and pledges has been raised to date.

Fund drive Chairman Lloyd Hoole is currently planning a clean-up campaign to reach those people missed in the main canvass. Still underway is the business canvass with about half the businesses reporting in so far.

Just beginning is the "off-island" owner's section under the direction of Marion Sutherland. It is expected this phase of the campaign will continue throughout the winter.

While expressing his regret at the coming departure of Dr. Hales, Society President Art Wood noted it was just such a problem that the Centre was planned to address.

"Dr. Hales told us months ago, before we began planning the Centre, that he would some day leave and that we should get busy and build a central health care facility," said Wood. "We took him seriously and began our planning and our fund drive. Now it looks as though it will be needed sooner than we thought but hopefully we can make interim arrangements prior to its completion," he added. The fund drive continues.

# CRD gives green light to creation of Mayne park

A 77-acre site on the eastern slope of 700-foot Mt. Parke promises to become the "jewel" of Mayne Island.

The Capital Regional District (CRD) last Wednesday, following a year of consideration, has given the green light to the CRD parks committee to develop the pristine crown lands into a regional park.

Simon Joslin, CRD property officer, says the CRD's request that the 77-acre site be developed, was granted on condition the district complete a boundary survey at a

cost of \$5,000 and build a \$50,000 extension to Montrose Road, leading into the park site. It is expected the road construction will not be undertaken until 1991-92.

Jeff Ward, regional Parks Planner, who has hiked over the 77-acre parcel together with Mayne Island's Parks and Recreation chairman, Ed Williams, and fellow local parks member, Doreen McLeod, says plans call for the

development of hiking trails, nature walks, a parking lot and the construction of garbage receptacles and toilets. No overnight camping will be allowed.

Ward says it is more than a year since Ed Williams first approached the CRD with the suggestion for a park development. Williams, who spearheaded the development of Dinner Bay Park on the shores of

Sutil. Bluff Road park is already under consideration.

The proposed Mount Parke regional park will be only the second such park in the Outer Gulf Islands. The other is the 300-acre Mt. Norman park on Pender Island which has already been selectively logged and is in the process of growing back to a wilderness state.

Ward reports public meetings will be held on Mayne Island to determine how residents want the site developed before any construction is undertaken.

## Mayne Island

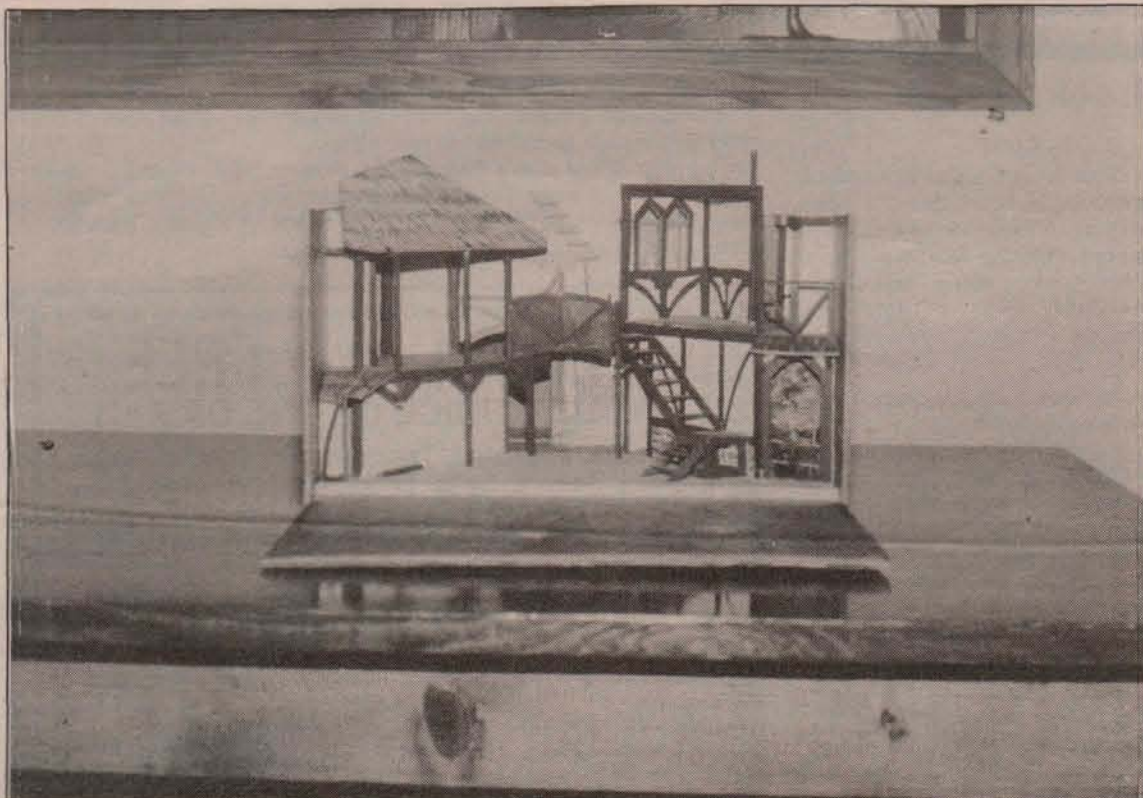

## Mayne Islanders asked to test water for possible coliform contamination

Mayne Island's Community Chamber of Commerce is encouraging islanders to test their drinking water to determine its coliform count.

In an effort to facilitate such testing, Chamber members have

provided water test kits, available at three main island outlets: The Trading Post, Market and Centre Store.

The kits come with easy-to-understand instructions. Users are asked to fill the vial with cold

water, insert a slide and wait one minute for contact time before removing the slide and emptying out the vial. The slide is then replaced again in the vial, and left in a warm place to incubate for 24 hours. The cap is then to be unscrewed and the slide examined in bright light.

Growth resembling grey-white mould, indicates the presence of coliform bacteria. Some Mayne Island residents have already discovered they have an unacceptable coliform count.

Chamber members believe such testing on Mayne is extremely important in view of the positive results already reported. They believe such preventative measures will protect the health of islanders. Residents are urged to share their findings with Chamber member Sidney Brennan at 539-3126, or deliver this information to her at the Village Market.

## Mayne Island recycling stats well above national average

Mayne Islanders are reclaiming nearly twice as much of their waste material as other Canadian communities.

Eleven per cent of all waste on Mayne is recycled compared to the Canadian average of 6 per cent, according to Robert Irving, vice president of the Mayne Island Recycling Society.

Irving reports that during the first nine-month-period of 1989, 20 tons of glass, tin and paper were recycled on Mayne, thanks to volunteers who donate Saturdays to this effort.

The Japanese, on the other hand, recycle 70 or more per cent of their waste material, which makes us realize we have a long way to go.

The Mayne Island Recycling Society is hoping to up their recycling effort within the next three years to include 20 to 25 per cent of all the island's waste.

Irving points out that since the Recycling Society realizes no revenue from its recycling efforts it has been necessary to up the garbage pick-up fee from \$2 to \$3 per bag to cover the costs of operating the garbage truck.

"Actually," Irving says, "Mayne Island residents are getting garbage pick-up plus recycling service for merely \$3 per bag."

Well, maybe things were different in your time, Abe. I live in an age where people line up each week to spend millions of dollars buying lottery tickets — even though their chances of winning are worse than their chances of being struck by lightning.

I live in an age when people voted for a Prime Minister who promised to save passenger trains and cut government spending.

Government spending has never been higher. Passenger trains are all but dead.

We have a cleverer class of over-the-eyes wool-pullers these days, Abe. Maybe in your day you just didn't have enough George Bushes and Brian Mulroneys around to fool all your people.

Bet you didn't have any Michael Watersons or David Tomlinsons either.

**Hoodwinkers Hall of Fame**

Who they? Well, Mister Waterson is director of research for the Advertising Association of England. David Tomlinson is president of the National Firearms Association of Canada.

And I plan to make them my 1989 nominees to the Hoodwinkers Hall of Fame.

Mister Waterson gets my nod for his impressive courtroom performance in a case before the Quebec Superior Court last month.

The case is being pressed by two large Canadian tobacco companies — RJR Macdonald and Imperial. They want to overturn the federal ban on cigarette advertising. Which is where Michael Waterson comes in. He assured the court that advertising cigarettes is harmless because it doesn't really work.

Mister Waterson testified that in the United Kingdom, consumption of beer, cigarettes and milk have all declined over the past few years, even though advertising of those products has increased.

**His philosophy is no less breath-taking**

"You don't turn on the advertising tap and expect consumers to respond like Pavlov's dogs," explained Waterson.

David Tomlinson's philosophy, albeit in a completely different field, is no less breathtaking. The president of the National Firearms Association of Canada was recently lamenting in public over our government's myopic decision to ban the importation of assault rifles — automatic and semi-automatic weapons designed for soldiers to kill other soldiers — into Canada.

"Sucked in again" was Tomlinson's rueful assessment of the Justice Department decision.

"The more firearms control you bring in," opined the NFA prez "the more violent crime occurs." Why? Because, he says, the average Canadian is "helpless and defenceless" at home.

Oh yeah, right. That's why there's so much murder and carnage in places like Regina and Moncton, while bucolic dens of democracy such as Belfast and Beirut are havens of peaceful domesticity.

**How dumb do they think we are?**

Just pause for a moment and ponder the fur-brained philosophy these two jokers are attempting to peddle. Michael Waterson would have us believe that cigarette advertising is innocuous because it doesn't work.

Which begs the question: if it doesn't work, why in hell do corporations waste hundreds of millions of dollars a year on advertising campaigns?

Tomlinson's contention is even more outlandish. He's arguing that an absence of murderous weapons — the only purpose of which is to wreak violence on human bodies — will lead to more violence to human bodies.

How dumb do these guys think we are?  
Gentlemen, please.

Go ahead and flog your cancer sticks Mister Waterson. It's not against the law. Keep plugging to make Canada as friendly and pacific as downtown Detroit on a Saturday night, Mister Tomlinson — that's your democratic right.

But if you expect to make converts from anyone but the terminally brain dead, you'll have to be just a wee bit more subtle about it.

**Lack of taste**

To the Editor,

Last week I heard more ethnic jokes in 24 hours than I'd heard all year. As soon as the Vant/Zalm humour hit the headlines, racial slurs were coming out of the woodwork wherever I went — including a "correct" version of the "Chinaman" story, which makes more sense than the garbled one we got.

I'd like to put the folkloric record straight (and it is folklore, believe me) by summarizing it. A Chinese and a Jew (n.b.) are drinking together; the Jew slaps the Chinese. When asked why, he says "For Pearl Harbour." "That was the Japanese!" "Chinese, Japanese, what's the difference?"

After this we have Vant's half: the Chinese slaps the Jew, for sinking the *Titanic*. Punchline: "Iceberg, Goldberg, what's the difference?"

As you'll see, this joke has some symmetry to it and its own logic. Vant's greatest sin, to my mind, lay in not telling it properly. But the racial side of it is essential to its logical without an oriental (of whatever kind, except Japanese) and a Jew, it couldn't exist.

Vant showed a lack of taste, judgement, and tact in telling this story, and also a deal of insensitivity. The fact that he used the term "Chinaman" is the least culpable of his errors, however.

Actually, many older folks think the word has no pejorative connotation at all, and are surprised to find that some Chinese take offence where none is intended. I admit that the term has more of a homely sort of air about it than "Chinese"; but it's a far cry indeed from the condescending distrust of an expression like Bret Harte's "heathen Chinese" — I wonder if one would be prosecuted for reciting "A Few Words from Truthful James" these days?

It is a slightly different story when we look at the Premier's joke about the rabbi who prayed to win the lottery, to be upbraided by God because he hadn't bought a ticket. Notice one important difference here: the story would work if a Jew were not involved. Tell it about an Aberdonian minister, and it's just as good (or bad). (Of course, all true-hearted Scots would bridle at yet another calumny on their thrifty nation; but somehow jokes about Scotsmen never make headlines — have you noticed?)

Vander Zalm's error lay in choosing a Jew to represent lazy greed, and a great error it is; compounded by his position as leader of his party (thus throwing all Socreds into a bad light) and as premier of this province (thus ex-

His apology was necessary, but very ill-phrased: he seemed to be saying that if his words had offended, he was sorry. He should have been more abject: "I know I have given offence, and apologize

# Biography of Hornby Island takes the reader through time

How often have you wanted to climb into a time machine and explore the past? To see, feel and hear the world, the universe in its many moods and stages eons ago? I have contemplated such a dream in many places and at many times, and I have pondered the many decisions that would have to be made: where to go, which ages, for how long, and in which sequences. What would be my priorities?

A recently published little book presents one author's experiment in time travel, and in it she defines her priorities. Her focus as she dances through time is Hornby Island. She moves us back and forth between the present and a series of carefully selected stages in the geological and biological history of that land we now call "Hornby Island."

It's a delightful dance she weaves and plays for us, and anyone interested in the Strait of Georgia will be as fascinated and caught up in the music as much as I was.

It is no easy task to capture the complex measures of time. In music and in photography some interesting metaphors of moving time can be created. Through time lapse photography we can reveal the

growth of a plant or a cloud; by speeding up the photographic process and then playing it back in slow time we can see the stages of movement that normally are far too fast for the human eye to discern. In music it is relatively easy to create the illusions of the seasons, and the shift from fast, to slow, to real time can all happen in moments.

To do the same thing in prose is difficult in the extreme, partly because of the temporal problems imposed by the mechanics of reading. To some extent you can use implicit sounds, as in poetry, to create the illusions of various dimensions of time. One can play with the setup of paragraphs, type size and style, to create some effects. Not easy, but well worth trying.

Many writers have wrestled with the challenge. Like Michener, most simply report in episodic yet linear fashion an abstract of the presumed prehistorical past until they reach a stage at which their human history begins. I can recall no writer who, beginning with the period some 350 million years ago, with a series of progressive flashbacks between the present and a sequence of selected temporal anchor points, moved us into the historical present.

Fletcher strives to create the sense in which we are free to dance back and forth from the present to the author's carefully selected stages in the evolution of the island.

The temporal anchor points are selected from various theories of plate tectonics, geological change and biological evolution. While the perceptual anchor points are those of the present structural features of Hornby and adjacent islands — Texada, Vancouver, Lasqueti, and Gabriola — you could be almost anywhere on the west coast. As you walk around Hornby and note the present features, your eyes are drawn back in time to see the origins of those visual events.

While delighting in the experiences Fletcher encourages, I felt somewhat frustrated that the dance was not always easy to follow. As I read the book again, I think I have discovered the problem: the voices in time are not always clear; I'm not sure what I am hearing. I reflect on the technical problems of creating the illusions, and know how difficult it is.

But still I feel it doesn't quite work, until I find myself trying to solve the problems the task imposes, and I begin to realize that her song is still singing in my head, so something worked after all.

And then, the other day as I walked the beach near my house on Lasqueti I thought again of the spaces through which our islands have travelled. I marvel. I look at the familiar rock formations with new eyes and yearn for Fletcher's time machine and wish I could use it on Lasqueti.

Then I remember her story is of any place, and as all the islands in the Strait of Georgia are probably part of the same processes and events ascribed to Hornby, I discover the task is not that hard. With *Hammerstone* as a guide, perhaps you can begin your own experiments in time.

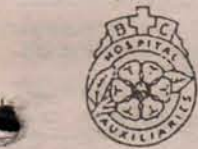

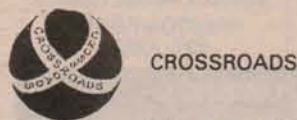

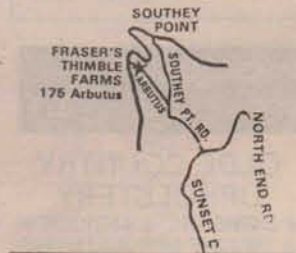

## Down the years

with Driftwood

### Twenty Five Years Ago

The Gulf Islands waiting room at Swartz Bay was removed to make way for the expansion of the ferry terminal facilities, said Ferries general manager M. Aldous.

Necessary facilities would be provided for the exclusive use of island travellers, he said. Renovations to the complex were expected to be finished by spring.

The Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce had accepted a lease for the fill area at the boat basin in Ganges. The price had been set at \$10 per year. The Centennial Committee proposed developing the site as a park to commemorate 100 years of Canada.

### Twenty Years Ago

The department of highways crew was busy removing the hump

The speed limit near schools was the subject of debate among islanders. Some people claimed that the 20 miles-per-hour limit was illegal, while the department of highways indicated plans to do away with the speed limit signs and replace them with others showing

children in blue silhouette, on Lower Ganges Road near the Anglican church when it struck a water line. The geyser shot high into the air.

When not dodging water, the crew removed the hump and levelled the hollows to create a flat roadbed.

The 10-acre freeze in the Gulf Islands was causing some people problems. Gavin Reynolds, president of the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce, wondered if subdivision plans which had been approved but not implemented would be subject to the freeze. He intended to ask Dan Campbell, Minister of Municipal Affairs, to explain exactly what the freeze meant.

A new elementary school on Salt Spring had been approved. Cost would come to \$472,200 of which Gulf Islands' taxpayers would cover \$236,100. The school board had an option to purchase 10 acres of land at Central.

### Fifteen Years Ago

Elections in the Gulf Islands featured 30 people chasing 12 seats on the Islands Trust, as well as three

seats on the Gulf Islands School Board. There would be ballots cast on each island with Salt Spring and Pender island residents voting for both the Trust and the school board.

The boys of the First Ganges Cub Pack would be out collecting bottles. Cub-master Martin Ogilvie explained that half the money collected would be kept by the cubs for projects and travel, while the remainder would go towards the recreation complex planned by the Lions Club.

The Pearson Care Tree on Pender Island was being prepared to light the nights for another Christmas season. Lights would go on December 15 and stay until after the New Year.

It was 15 years before that George Pearson decided to illuminate the lights to raise money for CARE of Canada. The first year, 1960, he had collected \$102.50. By 1973, that amount had risen to more than \$3,000.

### Ten Years Ago

The volunteers of the Galiano Fire Department were to burn down a house to try various techniques for putting out flames. They arrived at the building and lit the flames and tried the techniques while the blaze burned. But later they discovered it was the wrong house. Basil Bengert reported the incident but would not say if it was truth or fiction.

Voters could vote for candidates for school board, Islands Trust and the Capital Regional District. There would be ballots cast for school trustees on Saturna, where Tom Davidson faced challenges from Carol-Flynn Fisker and Jonathon Guy.

The Islands Trust seat on Mayne, where Isabel Geehan had resigned, was being sought by George Douglas and Helen Joan Sprague.

The directors of the Capital Region from Salt Spring and the

Outer Islands would also be chosen. Jim Campbell, incumbent from Saturna, was up against Vern Roddick of Pender and Weldon Pinchin of Mayne. On Salt Spring Mike Clement was seeking re-election while Yvette Valcourt was also in the race.

### Five Years Ago

Two stories on the front page of the *Driftwood* are about crime in the Ganges area. One of those stories reports that thieves made off with a safe taken from the *Driftwood*, the other one notes that the Chamber of Commerce decided to express its concern about the high incidents of crime on the island to the RCMP detachments in Ganges and Victoria.

Addressing the Chamber of Commerce, Tom Gossett of Foxglove Farm and Garden Supplies said this had been his worst year since 1981, adding that he had been the victim of numerous break-ins and acts of vandalism.

Then I began to suspect that maybe it was being treated by the Post Office and *not* returned to the sender.

Lately, to my delight, many of these people enclose prepaid envelopes. These I fill in, sometimes saying a polite "No thank you!" Sometimes being more offensive.

Some of these people do not put a return address on the outside which makes it necessary to cheat by steaming it open before returning it.

Nothing that I did dissuaded "American Express" until I gave up using my rubber stamp, gave up putting rude messages in return envelopes, figuring that the people who open the mail had probably got a collection of such replies. I used a postage stamp to appeal directly to the Vice-President in charge of something or other to stop his minions sending me all this stuff and assuring him that I would never want an American Express card, nor want to buy anything else he sold. That worked! I got no reply but the flow stopped.

There is a problem in that the junk mail largely finances our postal services, and the flyers in the newspapers help to finance the newspapers.

If we ever succeed in throttling this type of advertising, it will be at the expense of a higher cost for postage stamps and for our weekly news, and even for the daily news. Meanwhile, if all else fails,

persistent offenders are worth a postage stamp.
