Centre honours members

The Achievement Centre held a dinner and awards night recently for those who took part in the program this year.

There were 17 certificates of achievement given out to the various participants.

To describe the work involved in the Achievement Centre, only one of the many activities sponsored by the Salt Spring Community Society in the white house on Ganges Hill, would require much space, time and research.

Suffice to note what Val Aloian said in her introduction to the awards evening for the Achievement Centre.

"Currently, the staff of the Achievement Centre is trying to develop programs that we believe will assist individuals to achieve personal life goals. How did we do this? Well, we asked the question. And we fine-tuned our skills of observation.

"The common thread throughout the answers was community involvement. People wanted jobs, people

Study indicates Gulf Islanders have 0 per cent illiteracy rate

An estimated one-quarter of Canada's adult population is functionally illiterate which means they read at or below the Grade Nine level.

As little as 10 or 15 years ago, people who left school at an early age could function well in society without pursuing more advanced education supporting themselves by fishing, mining or working in factories.

But as opportunities in all of those areas continues to disappear, the illiterate are becoming increasingly visible, showing up on the unemployment or welfare roles and worst of all, in suicide statistics.

A survey done by Southam news in 1987 used a variety of tests to determine individual performances. It found 17 per cent of British Columbians did not have basic literacy skills.

(Another study done by the Provincial Literacy Advisory Committee in 1989 found there is almost a zero illiteracy rate on the Gulf Islands compared to 10 per cent in Victoria.)

The Southam study also found the basic illiteracy rate increased from West to East reaching a high of 44 per cent in Newfoundland.

Linda Hackett, co-ordinator at the Adult Literacy Contact Centre in Vancouver, says the danger in all of this is that more and more people are getting left behind in an age where knowledge and information processing have become the key to survival.

That is one of the reasons why, she says, 1990 has been designated International Literacy Year. It is meant to remind us of the growing importance of education and that learning is a continuous and life-long process.

"The emphasis on literacy is unique to our times because it is the first time in western society we have felt the majority of people should read at a high level," says Hackett.

"There was a much greater (incidence of illiteracy) in preceding centuries, but it didn't affect people in the same way it does now. Almost any job now requires reading and writing."

The emphasis on education, she says, has almost created a crisis due to the vast amount of knowledge required in the labour field and because of the high demands now held by

employers. Where at one time, they would hire people with a Grade 10 education or less, Grade 12 typically serves as a baseline. And where training used to be provided on the job, workers are now expected to have all the necessary skills before they apply.

All of this has made it essential

Members of the Class of '90 receive scholarship awards

Close to 35 scholarships were awarded during the graduation ceremonies at the Salt Spring Secondary school Saturday night, including a \$16,000 Terry Fox Humanitarian Award presented to Lisa Koski.

Koski was one of only 42 students in Canada and three in British Columbia to win that scholarship.

Altogether, 56 students graduated this year during an almost three hour ceremony which was followed by the island's first dry after-grad. Scholarships were presented to about 20 students and 27 received between \$175

and \$675 in provincial grant money which will be used to cover college or university-related expenses.

Winners of major scholarships include Tara Martin, who received the \$9,000 President's Award from Simon Fraser University along with three other scholarships; and Suzanne Jacquest who received four scholarships, including two from Simon Fraser University, one being the \$6,000 Chancellor's Award plus the \$5,000 Premier's Excellence Award.

wanted their own homes, people wanted to go to Continuing Education classes or college, people wanted to do their own shopping, wanted to make new friends, wanted to access the libraries, the swimming pools, the theatres, and even the politicians.

"Luckily these aspirations also coincide with our belief that everyone wants to be valued as a friend, a worker, a citizen, a club member. The staff believes that helping the client to acquire the skills necessary to live a fuller life in the community, as independently as that particular person can, is an important role.

"The staff believes that by preparing people to make their own choices — like, choosing one's own friends; like choosing a career; like voting for political candidates; like sitting on the boards of societies that impact them — all of these kinds of choices empower and involve a person in the community. Choices make us live responsibly.

"But that's only one side of the coin. We also believe it is equally important to increase the public's awareness of the issues affecting people with mental handicaps. It is equally important to show the community ways that it can incorporate people with mental disabilities into its activities.

"Many citizens look with scepticism upon the current movement promoting community living and community integration. Many people doubt the potential of people with mental handicaps to govern their own affairs. Many parents fear that the community will not welcome their sons and daughters back.

"But we can be optimistic. The future is bright. Parents, caregivers, professionals and the government are all becoming more aware of the kinds of supports people with mental handicaps need.

"Policy makers have become more sensitive to the rights of its disabled citizens. They have also listened to the service givers across the nation who have had to come to the inescapable conclusion that without community willingness to welcome handicapped citizens into the workplace and its recreational life, the day programs, like the SSI Achievement Centre, is just another mini institution.

"There is the growing recognition that sheltered workshops and achievement centres are becoming obsolete for such programs, like institutions, that are segregated and isolated from the rest of society, are sterile and counterproductive.

"We believe that the individuals we serve need and deserve a job at the GVM or the Credit Union. We believe they would enjoy and contribute to clubs such as the weavers guild, the garden club or the Trail and Nature Club. We believe that special classes for special people are places to avoid. We believe that people with mental handicaps have the ability to give and help others, like those who sit on our Community Society Board, or those in Greenwoods or children needing love and care.

"We hope that soon there will be no need to operate achievement centres as each person with a mental handicap finds his or her own place in the community. As each individual is given the opportunity to share his or her gifts with others. As each individual can finally be free of the limitations others impose — because they cannot believe in this vision.

"Given the collective beliefs and values of our staff, we have tried to use our day program to empower people. We've tried to help people jump hurdles, become better equipped to deal with failures and

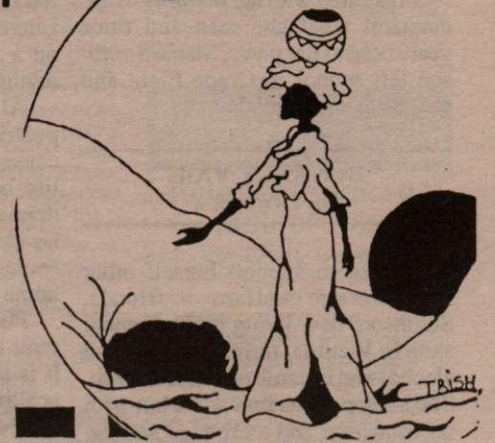

Society realizing need for basic literacy skills

Frustrated with her inability to understand what she read and three years behind her peers, Stacie Smithson left school in Grade Eight and moved in with friends.

Unable to support herself other than through welfare or friends, Smithson, now living in a basement suite in Victoria, turned to drugs and alcohol and became addicted to both. She attempted to find work but with no education and a crippled self-esteem, her opportunities were limited to house cleaning, dishwashing or babysitting.

"When I left school, I didn't know how to deal with life on life's terms I think education is the most important thing for anybody because without it you are stuck."

The income from those did not come close to paying the bills.

Smithson returned to school twice, once at 16 — for one month — and the second time at 21 when she failed both courses she studied for two years.

After the birth of her son in 1987, she became frustrated by her inability to read simple children's stories, and decided to make one more attempt to educate herself. She first attended the Belmont Learning Centre in Vic-

toria, and later went to the Project Literacy Centre which adults attend on a drop-in basis and receive individualized help.

Although she has had to temporarily postpone her education because of problems in her personal life, her reading skills have improved dramatically (from a Grade Three to Grade 10 level) and she plans to resume studies once her situation at home has settled.

For Smithson, education represents a way out of the welfare ghetto. It is a means of developing a more positive attitude to life.

Donna Miller, a co-ordinator at the learning centre, says the number of people returning to school to acquire basic literacy skills has skyrocketed since media attention focused on the problem four years ago.

The adult learning classes at Belmont and Camosun College in Victoria are full. The learning centre at Project Literacy works with about 15 adults at any one time — upwards of 120 students went through the centre during its first full year of operation in 1989.

Miller suggests that about 14 per cent of Canada's adult population is "functionally illiterate," however some educators say that figure is closer to 25 per cent. (Linda Hackett, a co-ordinator at the Adult Literacy Centre in Vancouver, notes a study done in British Columbia reported Salt Spring Island as having a zero illiteracy rate.)

One thing educators agree on, though, is the "functionally illiterate" are becoming increasingly visible as employment opportunities for those without advanced education disappear.

"Eighty per cent of the jobs (today) are information oriented, so it is changing the whole criteria for which people are employed."

The inability to read and work with written material can be devastat-

ing. Illiteracy is thought to be a major source of suicide.

And as Smithson's situation shows, there is generally a link between income and education levels, but worst of all is the negative attitude and outlook generally fostered by a person's inability to read.

Smithson herself attempted suicide several times.

"When I left school, I didn't know how to deal with life on life's terms — I was a very negative person. It's hard learning to live in reality."

Since having her son, Smithson has given up drugs and alcohol and joined a support group which she hopes will help her change, develop and take a more positive approach to life.

Says Smithson, "Sometimes I wish I could get a higher paying job so that I could get off welfare. I want my son and me to be happy and be able to live properly instead of how we live now."

"I think education is the most important thing for anybody because without it, you are stuck."

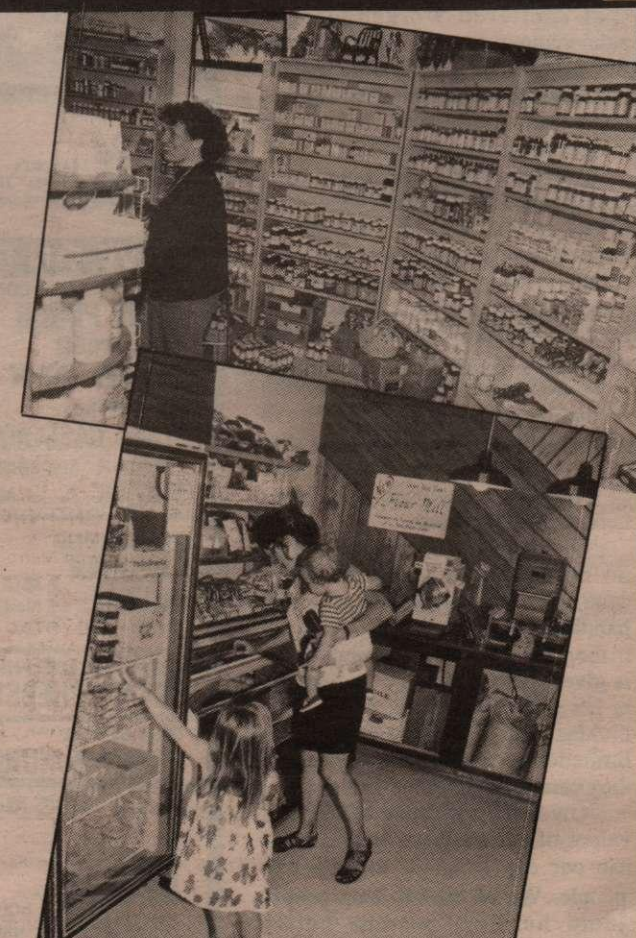
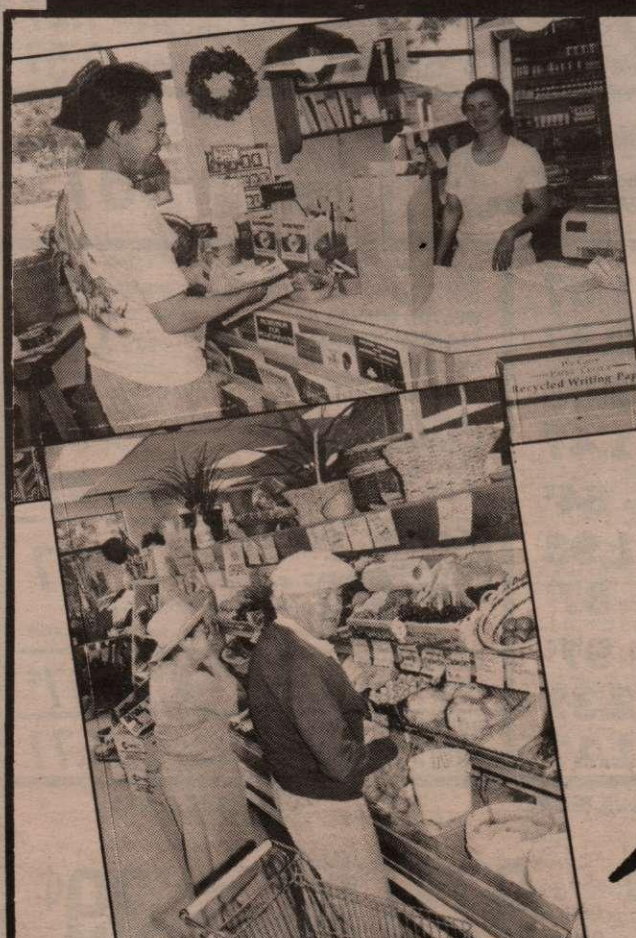

When convocation ceremonies were held at the University of British Columbia earlier this month, five islanders received diplomas.

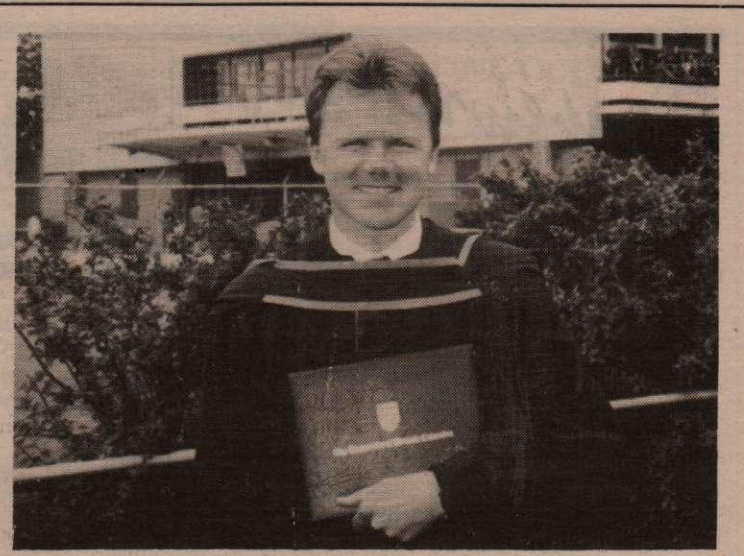
Bruce Cobanli was granted a Master of Fine Arts. Ross McFadyen received a Bachelor of Science degree in physical therapy.

that people have basic literacy skills.

Hackett notes there is a direct correlation between a person's literacy and income level. The majority of the prison population, she adds, cannot read.

Illiteracy is also considered a major cause of suicide, an action brought on by the shame people feel at their inability to read and function in the workplace. But as Hackett notes, illiteracy results from a myriad of problems, including early experiences in the education system, social or environmental background and/or learning disabilities.

Many people believe reading is an inherent human quality. But it is not, Hackett says: it is a cognitive skill which can be hard for some people to learn.

"Linguists believe literacy is not intrinsic, yet we as a society have this belief that one automatically learns how to read and write. A lot of people don't like to read, yet it is the only skill we expect everyone to have."

The good news is that educators have developed testing methods which are better able to determine if a person is learning disabled.

Education, such as that provided at the Project Literacy Centre in Victoria, is now presented in a more tailored way. Adult students can learn on a drop-in basis, learn from material they choose and be taught by individual tutors.

Adult education classes are also available through a number of schools, and colleges, such as Camosun and the Open Learning Agency.

The hard part, Hackett notes, is getting people through the door.

"There are many different models for adult education. People often think it will be the same as when they were in school, and it is a wonderful relief for them to find they can learn.

"As an adult, you get to make that choice about what you want to learn — it is not mandatory to stay with a program if they don't like the teacher or the material. Adult education is much better at serving people's needs," she says, adding that once people discover they can learn, they typically go on to pursue more advanced education.

Most of the people enrolled in adult education courses at universities and colleges have already been through a secondary institution once and have become, as Hackett notes, "hooked."

And that, she adds, is another message of International Literacy Year — that education is a life-long process. Some people have the mistaken notion they only need to go through the education system once, but statistics indicate people will change jobs seven times and work in three careers during their working years.

Learning has become a continuous process.

"We are really at an age of life-long education. Even for those who are highly educated, there is pressure to keep retraining.

"I wish we could think of education as a continuance . . . it has become a factor of living now."

The Adult Literacy Contact

Centre provides people with information on where they can find programs to upgrade their skills. While many callers are looking to acquire basic literacy skills, the centre also offers suggestions to others looking to upgrade the education they now have.

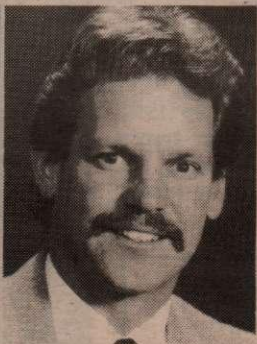

Life's a Meech, eh?

Watching the furore over the attempts to wedge Quebec into the constitution reminds one of how not to settle a dispute.

Quite frankly, the entire Meech Lake Accord was wrong from the beginning.

Quebec is a distinct society. Everyone knows and admits that. But, with Canada's smorgasbord makeup, almost every place in this wide land bears distinction.

What's more distinct than Newfoundland? Is there another Toronto anywhere else? Mind you, Vancouver preens in self-deluded attempts to be Toronto West but comes up a tad short. Victoria, on the other hand, dowagers as Victoria, simply. But distinctly.

Travelling from Atlantic to Pacific introduces one to what this nation really is: a collection of disparate parts which somehow work as a whole.

That Canada exists is amazing. What Canada is, produces another unsolvable question. National navel-searching to describe a Canadian is a game best reserved for the intellectuals.

Could split into several sundry parts

We mere folks get on with life, knowing we're Canadian without bothering with the nicety of definition.

When the Meech Lake Accord is examined, the reason for Quebec's intransigence becomes clear. It doesn't want Senate reform in fear of losing what perceived clout La Belle Province wields on the national stage.

It wants unanimity on creation of new provinces because Quebec itself could split into several sundry parts. The south shore of the St. Lawrence bears scant resemblance to the North Shore. Gaspé exists on its own and Montreal is a world apart.

When the James Bay hydro projects bring dollars to Northern Quebec, those people could decide to go it alone without big brother in Quebec city telling them what to do and what to think.

Plays funny games with the rules

If Quebec, needing the experience of being truly distinct, decides to split from Canada, how long will it be before the various parts of that province decide they, too, need something more?

Robert Bourassa claims the accord is needed to ensure "Quebec constitutes within Canada a distinct society." The Accord also notes "English-speaking Canadians, concentrated outside Quebec but also present in Quebec, constitute a fundamental characteristic of Canada."

Quebec, ignoring the rights of English folk within that province, plays funny games with the rules in the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Signs must be en Francais. No English allowed.

Canada is English and French. Both languages share equality, just as it should be, in theory, at least. Reality, however, finds the situation far from the ideal.

Rednecks on both sides hoot and holler that their language should dominate.

And Canada suffers.

Everyone forgot the Native People

The Meech Lake Accord may have been, or may not, be the answer.

However, Bourassa and the Prime Minister waffled the issue for many wasted months and, close to the deadline, began arm-twisting to achieve acceptance of that flawed document.

But everyone forgot the Native People.

Is it any wonder Manitoba MLA Elijah Harper stalled the Accord in the legislature of that province?

As in many other endeavours in this land — political, economic and social — the original Canadians stand, forgotten, ignored and unheard, while decisions are decided. If there is to be distinction among the disparate parts of Canada, the native people deserve that recognition.

But while one praises Harper and sympathizes with his stand, one also wonders why he waited until the last moment.

Again, we see politicians playing politics while Canada teeters on the brink of disaster.

Where are the statesmen when we need them? Why, at this point in our history are we saddled with political hacks such as Bourassa, Mulroney and Bill Vander Zalm?

Is this the end of the dream of 1867?

Oh, Canada we stand in tears for you.

New legislation will govern offenders of Fisheries Act

Proposed amendments will make it more expensive for offenders of the federal Fisheries Act.

The amendments, currently before Parliament, increase fines for various offences and widen the power of the courts to issue orders on conviction for items such as clean-up costs.

Polluting the sea, for instance, will carry fines of from \$300,000 to \$1,000,000 and allow the courts an option of sentencing the offender to up to three years in jail.

Under the amendments, officers and directors of corporations can be held liable for offences.

Ticketable offences, usually applied to sports fishermen, will also carry increased penalties. Fines, upon conviction, could increase to a maximum of \$1,000 from the current

maximum of \$100. Conviction on a ticketable offence in future will also entail the automatic forfeiture of fish and gear.

Fisheries officers will have increased powers to ensure compliance with quotas for commercial fishermen. They will be allowed, with a court order, to seize books and

records when questions of compliance are being checked.

The proposed amendments bring the Fisheries Act in line with provisions of the Environmental Protection Act as well as the Coastal Fisheries Protection Act which governs foreign fishing vessels in Canadian waters.

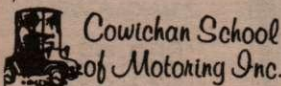

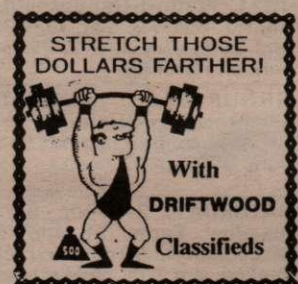

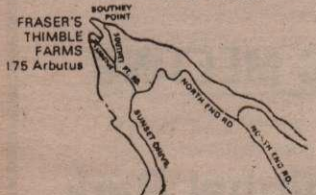

Down through the years

Thirty Years Ago

- The provincial cabinet would meet at Salt Spring in mid-July. Premier W.A.C. Bennet expressed interest in bringing the cabinet to the island for a meeting after which he would speak to islanders. The Chamber of Commerce planned to present two briefs to express concern about the province taking over the Gulf Islands ferry service and urge that a park be acquired for the island.
- The minister of the United Church at Salt Spring, Reverend Daryl Logan, would be moving to Selmo. The congregation gathered to say goodbye and wish him well. Nels Vodden was spokesman for the congregation. Mrs. J. Tomlinson led the group in singing while Mrs. H.C. Noakes played the piano.

Twenty-five Years Ago

- Graduation ceremonies for 26 students of Gulf Islands Secondary School were held at Fulford Hall. Guest speaker was local MLA Dave Stupich. Valedictorian was Karen East and the farewell to the graduates was given by Bruce Fiander. J.M. Evans chaired the event at which Theresa Mollet was awarded a citizenship trophy and Colleen Lee and Andy Whitmore received service awards.
- The campaign to raise money for Pioneer Village continued with donations for the week amounting to \$161. To help the efforts, Mac, Laurie and Colin Mouat gave Pioneer Village Society a parcel of land which was on sale for \$2,200. The campaign had reached its initial objective of \$12,000 and organizers had decided to try for the full \$17,500 needed.
- A cruiser hit a rock while travelling from Captain Passage to Fernwood at Salt Spring. The visitors came from the state of Washington. The 23-foot boat was towed off the rocks and into Ganges Harbour for repairs.
- The annual meeting of the Gulf Islands hospital improvement district was held on Mayne Island. Lt. Col D.G. Crofton was re-elected chairman and S. Green was chosen as secretary. Art Ralph, Saturna, and E. Bowerman of Pender were re-elected to three-year terms as trustees. The chairman reported that the mill rate had gone down to .55 mills.
- Bea Hamilton, who reported on activities in Fulford for *Driftwood* was elected president of the Vancouver Island branch of the Canadian Women's Press Club. Hamilton had been a historian for the club.

Twenty Years Ago

- The Capital Region withdrawing the controversial interim zoning bylaw for Salt Spring. The bylaw zoned most of the island as rural which angered businessmen because businesses outside Ganges, Fulford or Vesuvius would be nonconforming. The interim bylaw had been intended as a stop-gap measure until a comprehensive plan could be adopted.

- The walkathon on Mayne Island involved 100 eager marchers who set out on the 10-mile jaunt. Adrian Valiran the course and crossed the finish line 57 minutes after starting. Tommy Douglas, national leader of the New Democrats, walked with provincial NDP leader Dave Barrett. Mrs. W. Piggott had the most pledges with more than \$290. Oldest walker was Jennie Botterill while Derrill Imrie, 6, was the youngest.

- Papajohn reported from Saturna that the annual awards day was held at the school. Principal Taimi Hindmarch was in charge of the event while Clarice Warlow conducted the music with the young singers entertaining the audience of parents.

- The Labrador retriever was becoming famous. Lou Yellowlees returned from a trip to Fort Langley to report that Mossbank's Salish War Drum had won first place in field trials against 20 other retrievers. Drummer now had 11 first-place ribbons in various local competitions as well as 12 from licensed trials staged by the Canadian Kennel Club.

Fifteen Years Ago

- The Islands Trust heard a proposal calling for the sale of development rights from Salt Spring architect Hank Schubart. He suggested that if a property owner wanted to keep a tract of land intact, subdivision rights could be sold to the owner of another parcel and the density transferred to allow further subdivision of the second parcel. Capital Region director George Heinekey said the scheme had been considered by the CRD and rejected as unworkable.

- Anne Foerster, a trustee with the Gulf Islands School Board, was honoured for her work with the Advisory Planning Commission of Central Saanich. She had lived in Central Saanich before moving to the island and had been a trustee on the Saanich School Board.

- Papajohn reported from Saturna that the Lions Club held an installation night with special guest Tom Portlock of Salt Spring. President would be Tom Davidson and John MacDonald became past-president. The "generalissimos of ye kitchen" were Lori Bouch, Myrt Maskow, Laura Coombs and Granmarie McMahon.

- Two youthful fishermen, Dal Thirlwell and Douglas Elliott, caught a 12-inch bass in Cusheon Lake at Salt Spring. Cusheon Lake was thought of as a trout lake and the catch marked the first time in many years bass had been hooked there.

- ArtCraft '75 took over Mahon Hall at Salt Spring. The display of art and crafts would be on view until the end of August. Organizers of the show were Marg Simons and Jessie Peck.

Ten Years Ago

- The Lions Club of Salt Spring held its installation ceremonies and celebrated its 21st anniversary. Don Cunningham became president and Fred Brookbans was past president.

Master of ceremonies Bryan Smith introduced district governor Colin Mouat who officiated at the installation. Brookbans was honoured for his work on Pioneer Village, the Lions Club's housing project for senior citizens.

- Ken Gaylor was appointed to the position of principal at the Galiano school. The Gulf Islands School Board named Gaylor to replace Ken Maneker.

Five Years Ago

- The Capital Regional District gave approval in principle for a pub at Gasoline Alley in Ganges. Chuck Beasley, owner of Dagwoods Restaurant, said that seeking the opinion of the CRD was one of eight or nine steps involved before the pub could be built.

- The recently approved capital budget for the Gulf Islands School Board represented only 40 per cent of the priority items requested and 14 per cent of the total capital funds asked for by the board. The ministry approved capital spending of \$137,264 while the board had requested high priority spending of \$225,000 and a total capital budget

for the year of \$959,000.

- Lady Minto Hospital ended the fiscal year with a deficit of \$34,486 compared to a surplus of \$204,321 a year before. Next door, the cost associated with operating Greenwood had risen to \$856,068 from \$806,213.

- Over 300 boats floated into Breezy Bay on Saturna Island for its 30th annual Lamb Barbecue. Twenty-six lambs were served at the event which was held on the property of Lorraine and Jim Campbell and attracted 1,200 people.

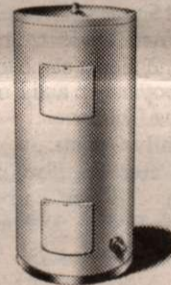

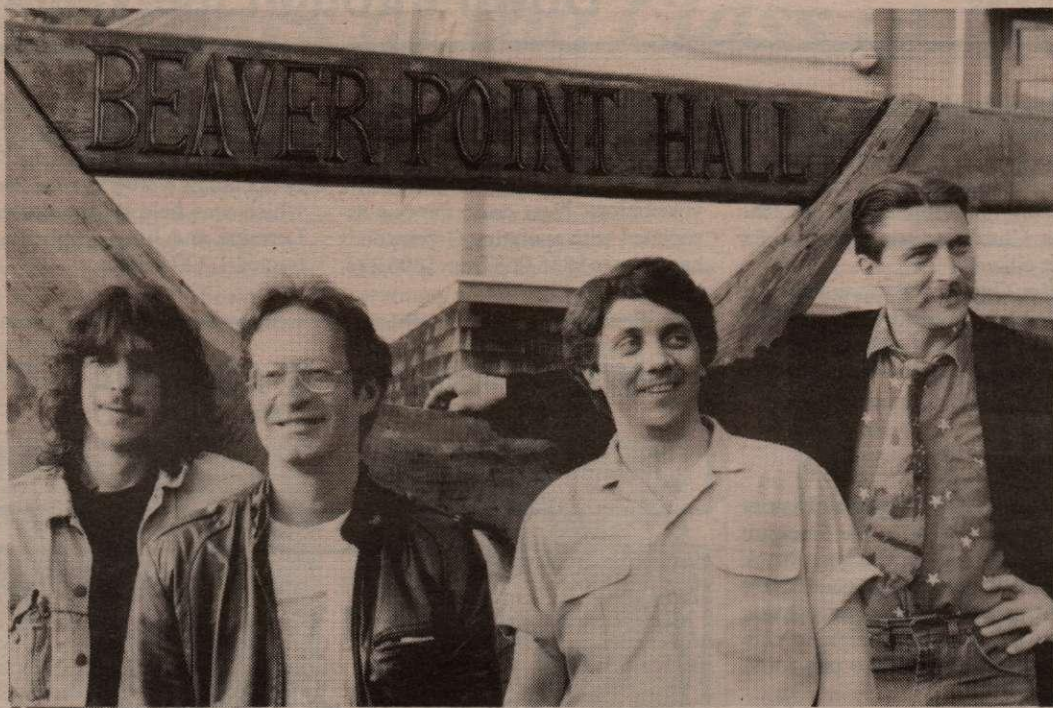

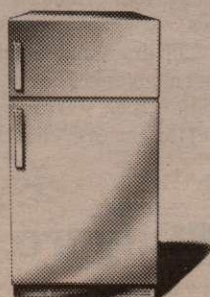
