Committee working to find seawalk solutions

The Cy Peck wheelhouse sits neglected under an orange tarpaulin while discussions on the fate of the Ganges seawalk continue.

Wild roses grow through the decking at the wheelhouse location and a stroll along the seawalk reveals the neglect it suffers while the talks go on. Refuse, empty beer cans, candy wrappers and plastics of various kinds begins to litter the walkway.

The seawalk committee, with two representatives of the Parks and Recreation Commission, met Friday, July 13, said chairman Glenn Moores, to talk about what has happened and what hasn't happened with the seawalk.

Discussions with upland owners are progressing, he said and ways are being explored to accommodate the concerns of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

One worry of the commission seems to have been solved. The parks group had been hesitant about taking responsibility for the walkway if the liability insurance added a strain to its budget. The Capital Regional District, however, can meet the liability under existing coverage with no added cost to taxpayers of the island, according to both Moores and Bill Curtin of the commission.

Curtin explained that the commission wanted assurances that the seawalk would be finished without the use of commission money. The commission's budget, he noted, is not large and it cannot afford heavy expenditures.

Moores stipulated the seawalk committee would be seeking additional funds to cover costs of finishing the project, as well as to landscape the bank. "There's still a commitment from the seawalk committee to complete their portion," he stated.

Concerns have been raised about the condition of the bank along the seawalk. It consists of shale and sandstone. At several places along the length of the seawalk, the highway runs close to the edge of the bank. Erosion is visible.

At another spot, two trees had tumbled down the bank close to the seawalk at the water's edge. Moores indicated the committee would be looking at stabilizing the bank where it is needed.

The Cy Peck wheelhouse could be moved to another location, Curtin said. It would be more appropriate in Fulford, he noted, because the old ferry served the southern village more than it served Ganges.

Curtin said the committee will be seeking a location to shelter the relic until it can be restored. The wheelhouse should be in a barn or some such shelter to protect it from the weather, he explained.

The seawalk committee has met about four times since discussing the matter with the CRD in the early spring.

Vendors to meet to discuss possible changes to market

Efforts are underway to ease the conflict centred on the Saturday market in Ganges.

The vendors will meet tonight (Wednesday) to seeks changes to the market as a means of easing the conflict.

Linda Quiring, president of the Salt Spring Market Vendors' Association, recently held lengthy discussions with the Parks and Recreation Commission, village merchants, the public and the vendors.

The market on Saturday, July 14, showed a more orderly face to the public. Executive members of the vendors group insisted that the centre aisle be kept clear of stalls. Visitors to the market thus had more space to enjoy the event.

But the parking problem remained.

Some vendors, particularly islanders upset at not being able to find space early Saturday morning, set out tables to mark their area on Friday evening. By 7:30 p.m., at least eight vendors had marked the space they wanted for their stall.

Overnight parking along the front of Centennial

Park was not as crowded as it had been the previous week. Several of the off-island vendors were attending other events elsewhere. When the vendors meet, their executive will ask them to consider how to ease the lack of parking space around the market, particularly at Gasoline Alley.

They will talk about the presence of vendors in the centre aisle of the market, the amount of space vendors should take up, and what should be sold there.

Other items to be discussed cover increased fees for vendors and the possibility of a permit system for those who want to be part of the market.

In a notice of meeting given to vendors, Quiring noted: "These ideas have been presented to the Parks and Recreation Commission and we are assured of their full support in implementing them."

Bill Curtin, of the commission, told the *Driftwood* the talks were aimed at "restoring peace, order and good sense."

The commission faces two problems in the

Mentally challenged find jobs with Community Centre's help

Two years ago, Eddie Waddell's goal in life was to pay taxes.

As a "mentally challenged" adult, he had spent several years at the Salt Spring Achievement Centre learning a variety of work-related skills which could be used in the job market.

Last November, he was offered a position at a local grocery store and his employers say Waddell outperforms the student he replaced.

And whenever he sees Paula Snetsinger, a trainer and placement worker at the centre, he thanks her for the work. She has to remind him, though, that it is his own efforts that have kept him there.

"Eddie is a real success story. He is absolutely dedicated to his job."

Since the employment program was started early last year, the centre has successfully placed four clients and has 10 others it considers "job-ready." The program, says Snetsinger, is a way both to contribute to the clients' lives and part of the continuing effort to integrate the handicapped into the community.

"For years we have locked these people away in institutions and group homes but we want to see them (play) more of a part in the real world. The purpose of the program is to enrich their lives to the best of our abilities and to increase their abilities as much as possible."

While clients will take a variety of well-developed skills to their new positions, workers from the centre will also act as "coaches" accompanying them to their jobs and helping the clients adjust. In some cases, that may involve organizing a structure the client can follow and which will keep them busy.

"We help them learn the job and break it down to help the clients work the best way they can. Sometimes we

will arrange it so that we can make (the role) as easy as possible and as the person becomes able to do the work on their own, we fade out of the picture."

The ideal positions for the clients, she adds, are part-time — three days a week — and jobs with a workload steady enough to keep them busy throughout an eight-hour shift.

Of the 10 people Snetsinger is hoping to place now, she says one of those specializes in reception work, some have woodworking skills and others have gardening, cooking and restaurant-related skills. She adds that all of them want to work either to gain new life experience or to earn the wages they need to live more independently.

"In my experience, I have found these people, with the odd exception, are reliable for showing up when they are suppose to and following the requirements of the employer. A student will often go in, work really hard for two weeks and go, but these

people are dedicated to the job once they get it."

Snetsinger adds that 50 per cent of the wages paid to the clients during the training period — from three months to a year — is subsidized by the government.

Response to program the program has been slow this year, says Snetsinger, adding that while a few employers are "gung ho," many are still cautious. She adds, however, that the situation may improve once employers realize the work the mentally challenged can do.

"I think it is all part of the education — it's such a big part of this field. People have been afraid in the past, but the more active our people are in the community, the better off everybody will be.

"It's all part of the integration process."

issue, he said. Some of the vendors at the market have shown a selfish attitude, he explained. "They don't care about community concerns. They're just seeking a buck."

Some of the merchants have been abusive of commission members in the matter, he added.

"We shouldn't be yelled at," he stated.

The concerns of the merchants focus mainly on the parking problem in the village each Saturday.

Elaine Beattie, of Beattie's Burgers in Gasoline Alley, said her business remains fairly brisk on Saturdays. Her main concern centred on food vendors setting up in the parking lot across from the restaurant.

Parking was also a concern, she noted. Vendors set up their stalls and then park in the spaces set aside for the businesses of Gasoline Alley.

Norrie Outerbridge of Rainbow's End expressed the same concern. Some vendors move their vehicles when asked to do so, she said, but others refuse. Meanwhile, potential customers turn away because of lack of parking.

The commission handed an information sheet to the vendors at a recent market. Part of the information concerned parking. The vendors were asked to set up their stalls and then move their vehicles to Rainbow Road, Jackson, McPhillips or Hereford Avenues.

The notice also stated: "Bylaws concerning camping on streets will be enforced."

RCMP, however, find it difficult to enforce such a bylaw, said Sergeant Larry Wendel. The area around the parking is not posted with signs indicating parking restrictions. The police are confined to aspects of the Motor Vehicle Act, he said.

Vehicles can park on unposted roadways for up to 72 hours, he noted. If the vehicle does not obstruct traffic, the parking meets the requirements of the Act, he indicated.

Meanwhile, the concerns about the market flourish.

Beattie said she has heard from islanders who had been part of the market but who had backed away from it because of the controversy.

"Why bother getting into a fight to do something which used to be fun?"

A regular visitor to the island, who asked not to be identified, explained she used to go to the market but hadn't done so for several years.

"It used to be a farmers' market," she said, "but not anymore with all that junk and stuff."

Other comments from visitors concerned the "junk" for sale.

"I expected the Salt Spring market to have Salt Spring products for sale," added another visitor who requested that names not be used.

Community groups vie for Crown lands

While the initial concern and controversy over the fate of 12 parcels of Crown land on Salt Spring has settled down since the issue was raised several months ago, a number of groups on the island have been preparing applications to have some of those properties turned over to the community.

So far, the ministry has received one application for a site at Musgrave Landing from the Gulf Islands School Board (see story below), and the Islands Trust is considering applying for several more parcels, depending on what other local government groups do.

The Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Board isn't prepared to say what parcels it is interested in, but chairman Kellie Booth says she expects a resolution will be brought before the board this month asking the Capital Regional District (CRD) to apply for some of the lands.

And in an effort to raise public awareness about the issue and give islanders a closer look at some of the

School board enters land bid

The Gulf Islands school board covets four hectares of Crown land on Salt Spring for its outdoor education program.

School board chairman Grace Byrne told the *Driftwood* last week that all of the formal applications have been filled in and filed with the department of Crown lands.

The site being sought forms part of a 35 hectare lot near Musgrave Landing, with access to the waterfront on Satellite Channel. Crown lands on Salt Spring cover approximately 830 hectares spread over 12 tracts.

Byrne had written, earlier this year, to the ministry of Crown lands to request "a grant of Crown land for educational use as a site for environmental and outdoor education."

The school district requested all, or part, of the parcel in question. If the district did not receive tenure on the entire lot, the remainder should be given to the community as a public park, Byrne said.

For many years, school trustees have searched for a suitable outdoor education site in the Gulf Islands. When the government announced plans to find a use for local Crown lands, the focus of the search shifted to various parcels on Salt Spring.

The land could be used for various nature studies such as examining life on the beach, checking the natural vegetation, and bird watching. The waterfront portion of the parcel could be used as a base for sea canoeing and kayaking and the upland portion used for camping trips for the students.

Currently, Gulf Islands school children have to go to sites on Vancouver Island for camping trips, which in recent years have been escalating in cost. The Musgrave site would allow them a similar opportunity without the high costs to parents or the school district.

Crown land, a group of concerned residents is organizing a hike into three of those areas this Sunday.

The issue surrounding the provincial-owned land on Salt Spring began several months ago when the Ministry of Crown Lands said it planned to divest itself of an estimated 2,000 acres of Crown land on the island. An "opportunities study" was done for the ministry by outside consultants and completed early last spring. It identified the locations of the sites and recommended uses for them.

A public meeting called last March to discuss the issue drew more than 120 people, whose overwhelming consensus was that the lands should be left as park. There has been

an ongoing concern on the island that if the community did not apply for those lands, they would be turned over to developers.

Mike McGrenere, a development officer with the Ministry of Crown Lands, said that the land would not be turned over to any group unless the group or company applying for a particular site planned to use it for one of the recommended uses contained in the consultant's report. He also noted that what happens to those lands is essentially under the control of local government bodies, since any developments proposed for the land must comply with local zones and bylaws.

"The Trust has quite a bit of con-

trol over what happens because it would have to approve" any developments on the site, he said, adding that any application that comes into the ministry has to be advertised in the local paper and that the local government would be notified.

"It is an independent and interdependent" relationship, he said, adding that "we are only one cog in the wheel."

Cynthia Hawksworth, manager of policy research with the Islands Trust, says the Trust is in the process of determining what the ministry wants to see in the management plans which must be submitted with the applications on each site. She noted that the Trust is negotiating with

other public bodies, such as the parks and recreation board, to see which areas they want. The goal, she said, is to have the land turned over to groups interested in "preserving and protecting the land."

In the meantime, organizers of this weekend's tour plan to take interested islanders to see several of the sites — one on Musgrave Landing, another on Cape Keppel and three off Satellite Channel on the island's southern point. The group plans to meet in Drummond Park at 11 a.m. for a preliminary discussion and a picnic, as well as to write letters encouraging the ministry to designate the land as provincial parks. The tours begin at 1 p.m.

To the western eye, looking angrily over the rim of the prairies, the banks and the manufacturers and the protective tariff and the railroad and the Ottawa government all merged into one distorted image — the East.

Oh, you don't want to get a Western Canadian talking about the East. Westerners keep a whole corral full of complaints about the way they've been misled, bamboozled and outright swindled by smooth talkers with soft hands and sharp suits. The oldtimers even had a word for it: TOMfoolery — TOM signifying the Eastern lairs where the misleaders, bamboozlers and swindlers lay thickest and deepest — Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal.

The West (as any Westerner is only too happy to tell you) has been double-crossed and dry-gulched by the East more times than Bill Vander Zalm has teeth.

Bad enough that Westerners have to suffer the smirks and slurs of arrogant Easterners who don't know their trembling aspens from a gopher hole in the ground — now they've been stung by a viper nestled in their own bosom!

Sorry — make that a sidewinder in their saddlebags.

Sundry other sartorial affectations

What am I talking about? Hah. What's nearest and dearest to a proud cowboy's heart? Cattle, right? Good solid, western range, grain-fed beef cattle, whence cometh plump, juicy, melt-in-your-mouth, taste-this-and-die Western beefsteak.

Can you think of a better way to earn yourself a ringside seat in the Albertan version of Hades than to bad-mouth beef?

Folks, there's someone doing just that on the nation's TV screens right now.

Well, as a reluctant carnivore who once worked in the Ontario Public Stock Yards and has seen more of the inside of a slaughter house than I needed to, I'd have to agree with the vegetarian from Consort.

I guarantee that if the shoppers pawing through shrink-wrapped pork chops and veal cutlets at the supermarket meat counter ever saw how that stuff got from on-the-hoof to in-the-freezer, Canada would become world famous overnight as the noisiest nation in the world.

Just imagine the sound of 26 million jaws all chewing celery at once.

Drinking, driving earns fine, suspension

Conviction on an impaired driving charge means a Ganges man will be without a driver's licence for 12 more months.

David Cates, 22, of Ganges, was also fined \$700 by Judge Hudson in court last week.

He appeared to answer the charge of impaired driving which arose from a police roadblock in Fulford on December 27, 1989. The court heard that the police officer determined Cates to be impaired.

The subsequent breath analysis provided a reading of .14. The legal limit for a driver is .08.

Cates could have been sentenced to imprisonment for not less than 14 days because this conviction was his second in a short time. He currently is under driving suspension as a result of a conviction of impaired driving earlier this spring.

Judge Hudson warned Cates he could face a 90 day jail term if he is

Good reason needed for absences

Parents can keep their children out of school but the absence must be for a "valid reason."

Mike Marshall, superintendent of schools for the Gulf Islands, recently reported to the school board about regulations regarding school attendance.

The new School Act notes: "A person (a) who is of school age, and (b) who is resident in a school district is entitled to enroll in an educational program provided by the board of that school district."

The Act recognizes educational programs as presented by independent schools, provincial or federal schools as well as Native Peoples schools as being valid.

School age begins when a child is five years of age and continues until the child reaches 16 years of age.

Complaints had come to the school board regarding the children who had camped on Mount Bruce during the recent logging controversy.

Marshall explained the new School Act allowed for greater latitude for parents than had been previously the case. Schools can make rules about required attendance, he said, but such rules might not stand up to a determined challenge from a parent.

Children can be kept out of school for short periods of time, if the non-attendance was shown to be of an educational nature. Illness also rates as an excuse for children not being in school.

Charles Hingston, school trustee for Salt Spring, said of the issue: "The parents have rights (to keep children out of school) but it would be nice if the kids did, too."

While parents do have rights, he noted, they also have the responsibility to ensure the children get an education. The education can come from attendance at school or through a home study course.

The regulations to the School Act defines education as an organized situation of learning activities, Hingston explained.

He went on to read the definition of learning activities, which must "enable learners to develop their individual potential and to acquire the knowledge, skills and attitudes needed to contribute to a healthy society and a prosperous and sustainable economy."

When asked what he would do if he learned of children who were not in school and who were not being educated, Marshall stated: "I'd step in."

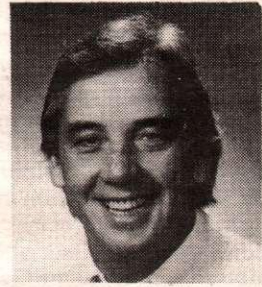

Booth Bay ceremony says goodbye to Charlie Gould

A July 8 ceremony in Booth Bay paid final respects to Dr. Charles Gould, a Salt Spring resident who died recently.

A flotilla of boats — including the *Astrocyte*, a 50-foot ship Dr. Gould built in the 1960s and later sailed around the world — gathered for a remembrance ceremony, and to scatter the deceased's ashes over the waters near his Booth Canal home.

(The *Astrocyte* sailed to Booth Bay specifically for the ceremony; it is now owned out of Portland, Oregon.)

Bill Garden delivered the following address at the ceremony:

"We have come to say goodbye to Charlie and, at his request, to scatter his ashes downwind and on the flood tide for a last, earthly voyage.

"He has given us all much to remember him by, always fun to be with and a real rock in times of adversity. A 10 on the scale of a man for all seasons: boat-builder, healer, musician, navigator, voyager and, best of all, a true-blue friend.

"His lively mind was always fun to poke into, a great spirit that we will all miss, and that has enriched the lives of those he has encountered.

"It seemed fitting to actually send Charlie off in the cannon, but we lack a gun of his calibre, so we'll settle for a simple salute. Fire the cannon."

Dr. Charles Gould was born in Vancouver on September 29, 1908. He received his early education there and earned a bachelor's degree in arts from the University of B.C. in 1928. Later, he attended the University of Southern California and graduated in medicine in 1938.

During the Second World War, he served in the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps in England, North Africa and Italy. From 1944 to 1945, Lieutenant-Colonel Gould was stationed in the division of neurology and psychiatry in Basingstoke Hospital in Hampshire, England.

After the war, Dr. Gould stayed in England and took post-graduate training in the National Hospital for Nervous Diseases in London.

He returned to Canada and assumed directorship of divisions of neurology in both Vancouver General and Shaughnessy Military hospitals; three years later, he joined the faculty of medicine at UBC.

Dr. Gould chaired the medical board of Vancouver General and was elected president of the North Vancouver Medical Association in 1961. Along with his membership in the Canadian Medical Association, he contributed actively to the Canadian Neurological Society and the North Pacific Society of Neurology and

Psychiatry. He also acted as medical advisor to the local Multiple Sclerosis Society and chaired the medical advisory board of the National Society for Multiple Sclerosis.

Despite his busy schedule, Dr. Gould still found time to build the *Astrocyte* in his back yard. Constructed of hand-picked yellow cedar with oak ribs, the ship took five years to build and was finally launched in 1965.

In 1966, Dr. Gould and his wife, Ruth, left Canada aboard the

Astrocyte for a five-year voyage around the world. During that time, he practised medicine in Suva, Fiji, and for six months was a pension examiner in the Australian Rehabilitation Services.

On his return to Canada he entered private practice in neurology and his practice demanded a great deal of his time. Still, he sailed regularly, and it may be no wonder that his mailing address was the *Astrocyte*.

In 1980 Dr. Gould retired to the peace of Salt Spring Island, but still gave of his time and expertise for the benefit of local doctors and their patients. When he developed Parkinson's Disease in 1985, failing health caused him to stop working.

Dr. Gould will be remembered with much affection and respect by many doctors and patients who were helped by his great knowledge and compassion, and by his many friends for his sensitivity, love and great sense of humour.

Success of job training program found in placements percentage

There may have been larger graduating classes but none prouder.

Friday afternoon a special ceremony was held for four graduates of a local job development project.

Sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, the project was designed and co-ordinated by T.G. Agencies and managed by Terry Romeril.

Three of the four graduates have started jobs this week as a result of the skills they acquired, and the fourth is close to obtaining a position.

Romeril feels that is the best indicator of the project's success.

Honoured at the afternoon ceremony were trainees Maria Cherry, Jacquie Hull, Leslie Shields and Ardith Walker.

Special guest in attendance was Henry Leong of Victoria, who works with the Canadian Job Strategy Operations Centre. He oversaw the project for the Canadian Employment and Immigration Commission, which provided funding.

Instructors for the various components from the project were Mary Paul and Barb Isles, grooming and personal hygiene; Bev Unger, life skills; Susan Monahan of T.G. Agencies Ltd., secretarial/clerical, job-seeking and computer skills, payroll; Trudy Challborn, manual bookkeeping; Jewell Edlstrom and Carol Gay of Island Savings Credit Union, banking; Wilma Cottom of CEIC, UIC requirements; and Dee Kinney, Helen Tara and Sherry Irwin of the chamber, Super Host Training.

Also invited to take part in the afternoon's activities were representatives of the work host companies — McColl's Shell Service, The Travel Shop, School District 64, Gulf Islands Driftwood, Salt Spring Automotive Parts, Mouat's Trading Company, NRS Salt Spring Realty, Community Centre, T.G. Agencies, Chamber of Commerce and Cowichan Marine Services.

Super Host certificates from the three chamber representatives and job development project completion certificates were presented to the graduates.

Hosts, homes sought here for student visitors

Parlez-vous Francais? Or are you interested in helping French-speaking students develop their English-speaking skills?

NACEL, a non-profit organization in Vancouver, is looking for 18 host families in the Vancouver Island area for French students coming to British Columbia for a four-week visit on the 28th of this month.

Altogether, 85 students will be coming to B.C. through the program this summer, and in fact a number have already arrived. Thirteen of them have found accommodation on Vancouver Island and two on Pender.

Volunteers with the organization are hoping to find families in this area for the remaining students so they can spend time with each other as well as with their hosts.

The NACEL exchange program was started in France in 1957 and introduced to Canada three years ago. Its purpose is to give students from France, Germany and Canada the opportunity to develop their foreign-language skills and learn more about other cultures.

This summer, 85 students from this province went to France through the NACEL program — a figure which mushroomed from the 40 which had been expected to participate at the start of the year. Altogether, participants pay \$1,750 and are expected to carry \$200 in spending money.

Jungen said host families are not required to have children or teenagers of their own and that both parents can be working. She added that while hosts are not expected to arrange special activities for the guests, the students should not be left alone.

Program organizers hoping to continue

Success is no guarantee to continuation.

In spite of a first-time job development project sponsored by Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce and co-ordinated by T.G. Agencies that saw three of its four trainees employed the week after the project ended, there is no funding to run a second one.

Lack of government funding is not stopping project manager Terry Romeril from planning a way to train more island residents.

"It's our responsibility to start it, not sit back and wait for the government."

Funding for the initial project came from the federal Canadian Employment and Immigration Commission. However there is no more funding available this fiscal year, Romeril has been told.

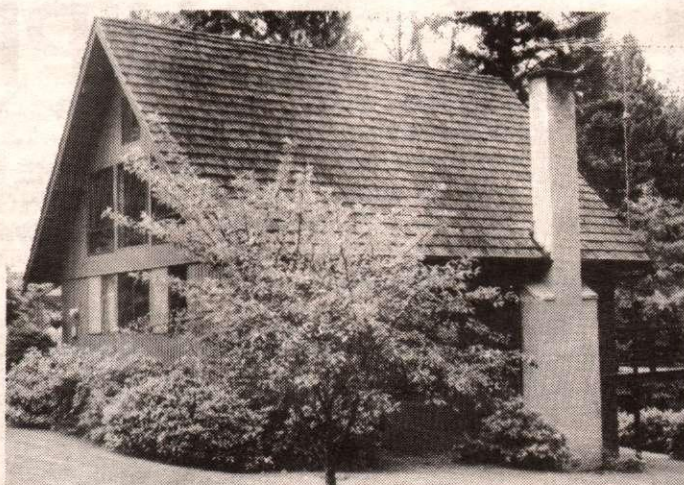
His response is to find five businesses on Salt Spring willing to put up \$1,000 each to start a local business training program. In addition, each business would provide a member of a board of directors for a society to oversee the operation.

A training area for the recent project could house the new program. Romeril said the federal government supplied \$3,500 worth of equipment to go with the \$5,500 from T.G. Agencies. That federally-provided equipment could be turned over to the society, he explained.

Vital to the success of the program would be community input. "Islanders can say this is what we have. And this is what we need."

THE FIRST DENTAL VISIT

Your child's first visit to the dentist should be at 2 1/2 to 3 years of age when all, or most, of his teeth have erupted. It is in this important introductory appointment that your child will establish the beginnings of what we hope is a lasting relationship as he meets his "partners in dental health" for the first time. And when he first steps foot into that dental office, any preconceived notions he has of what to expect will be mostly of your making.

As a parent, it is your own thoughts and actions that will be most instrumental in molding your child's perceptions and attitudes. You have the opportunity to instill him with a long-lasting positive attitude towards dental care or make him forever apprehensive about seeing a dentist. What impression are you giving? Subtle phrases like "it won't hurt much" and "Oh, no, I have got to go to the dentist today" are not lost on children.

A natural fear of the unknown is cause for children to experience some uneasiness about their first dental appointment. One way to help your child overcome this concern is by having him accompany you to one of your own dental appointments - as long as you aren't too anxious about visiting the dentist yourself. However, given that overpreparing an anxious person only serves to fuel their anxiety, be as matter-of-fact about their first visit as possible.

In fact, dentists have found that many of their younger patients enjoy coming into their offices because they enjoy both the break from the normal routine and the attention they receive from the dental staff. More and more children are cavity-free, and the preventive treatment that is required can be administered without discomfort.

Unfortunately, there are still occasions when first dental visits are delayed until serious dental problems have developed. At that point extensive treatment may be required that could thereafter have the little patient equate trauma with visits to the dental office. The number of children requiring extensive treatment is decreasing through education and awareness; however, future generations will only continue to benefit from good dental health if regular checkups and preventive care are initiated at a very early age.

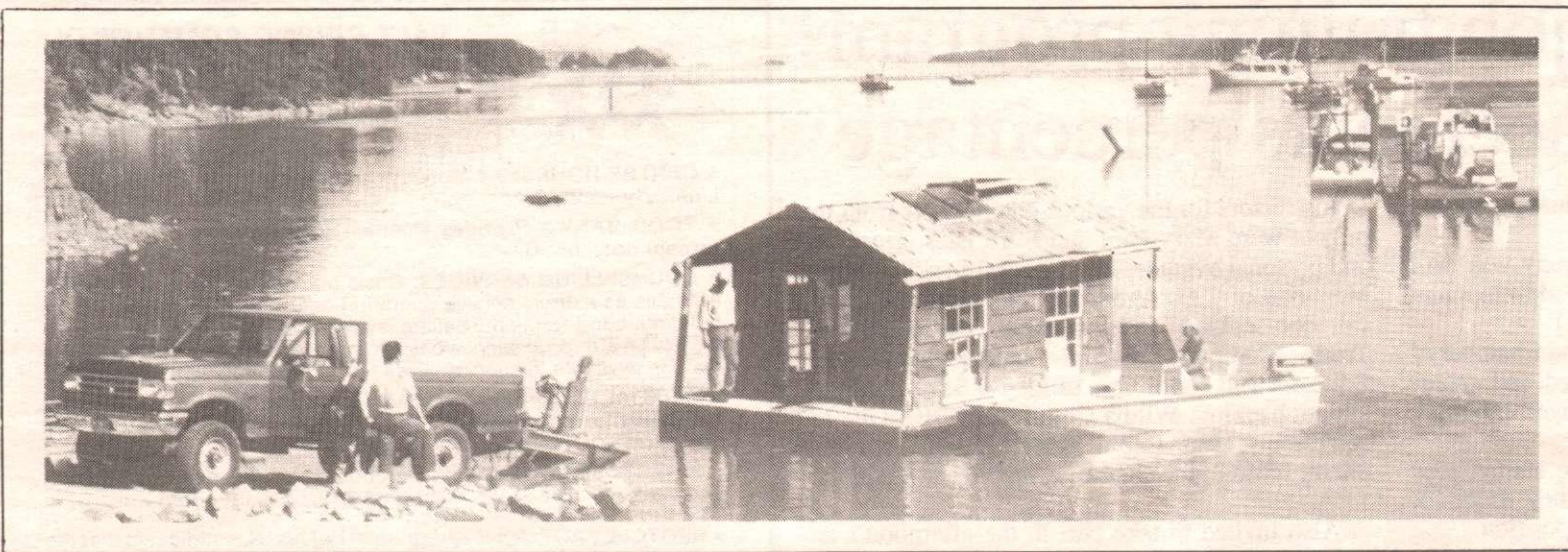

Miner's Bay suffers break-ins

A triple break-in on Mayne Island early Sunday morning has resulted in the loss of a large quantity of cigarettes, plus considerable cash, as well as damage to three Miner's Bay commercial outlets.

RCMP Cpl. Don Clark, responding to the initial alert sounded by trading post proprietor Wayne Bryant, reports the thief (or thieves) broke into the Active Pass Auto and Marine station, the Island Savings and Insurance Office in the Mayne Street Mall, and the Trading Post.

According to Cpl. Clark, the thief threw a rock through the glass front door of Island Savings which gave access to the door lock and the \$240 stolen.

Entrance to the gas station was gained by smashing the window at the adjoining Century 21 Office, then kicking through the gyprock wall to an adjoining vacant store, before again kicking through that wall to gain entrance to the gas station where three cartons of cigarettes were stolen, along with money from the video machines.

Largest haul was at the nearby Trading Post, where it is estimated \$3,000 worth of cigarettes were taken. Cpl. Clark reports he was first alerted by Bryant at 8:20 a.m. Sunday. Personnel from the RCMP Identification Section in Victoria have been called in.

As of Monday Cpl. Clark reported there have been no leads. No local residents have reported seeing or hearing anything which alerted them.

Fire hazard set at high

The danger of forest fire increases with each rainless day, and on Salt Spring the hazard rating is set at high.

Fire Chief Les Wagg said high rating means that while incinerators and campfires are allowed with a permit, open burning such as slash fires is not.

In addition, industrial work must be accomplished in the morning and stop before 1 p.m. Job sites, where heavy machinery is used, should be watched for a two-hour period after work has stopped for the day.

Wagg said the situation could change daily and residents are advised to check with the fire department or watch the fire warnings posted near the fire halls.

Failure to stop at sign nets \$50 fine

The Salt Spring resident had the Judge's sympathy but he also had to pay a fine.

Gordon McLaughlin, of Ganges, appeared in court last week to argue a traffic violation of failure to obey a stop sign. He had been observed turning left from Elizabeth Drive onto Chu' An Drive in Vesuvius.

The court heard that McLaughlin slowed his vehicle but did not stop as directed by a stop sign at the intersection.

McLaughlin told the court the sign is further up the road than the area where a left turn is made. He did not consider it necessary to stop.

Judge Hudson agreed with McLaughlin. "It's confusing," he said, pointing out that other intersections on the island have a similar layout.

But, said the judge, the stop sign is "there to control traffic moving from one road to another. You have to give it a bit of thought."

He affirmed a fine of \$50 for the offence.
