## Released balloons honour memory of Jarrod Booth

More than 750 rainbow-coloured balloons danced skyward over Salt Spring Island last Saturday afternoon in fitting tribute to Jarrod Booth.

Islanders said goodbye to Jarrod at a moving memorial in Ganges United Church and when the service ended, the balloons were released. Each person at the service held a balloon and waited in the orchard of the church yard for Reverend Barry Cook to pay final tribute to the young boy who died last week after a four-year battle with cancer.

The balloons rose into the air and drifted west to follow the setting sun. Few people left until the spots of colour were lost to view. As background music, John Lennon sang *Imagine* and *In My Life*.

A large plywood panel holding photographs that captured various moments in Jarrod's life greeted those who entered the church. Although Jarrod smiles at the camera in each of the photographs, some of the more recent pictures

up to 170 people of all ages and all parts of island life. Volunteer fire fighters acted as ushers and Gary Lundy played piano for the service. Reverend Cook led the memorial.

Brian Harding, who initiated the plan which saw Jarrod flooded with a record number of Christmas greetings from all over the world, asked Reverend Cook to read his eulogy because he could not yet speak publicly of the loss he felt.

Harding met Jarrod only last November in the excitement of the card chase and over the intervening months had come to love and admire the young fellow.

Many people who met Jarrod experienced similar emotions. The initial feeling of sympathy for the youngster was typically replaced by admiration, respect and a deep caring for him.

Tom Bowler, a close friend of the family, knew Jarrod from the time he was born. He read a tribute to Jarrod:

"If the fullness of your life was measured by your courage and character, then your life was very full indeed.

## Societies to fight banning of EMO

### Case based on appeal court ruling

Constitutional experts and members of two Salt Spring groups will watch with interest this week as the B.C. Supreme Court determines the fate of the Electric Motors Only (EMO) regulation on St. Mary Lake.

The EMO regulation banning power boats from the lake was declared unconstitutional in June of 1986 when the B.C. Supreme Court decided it was not within federal power to regulate boats for reasons of water quality. However, a 1989 provincial Court of Appeal ruling upheld federal boating regulations as the authority for all boating issues, including water quality.

Members of the Salt Spring Water Preservation Society and North Salt Spring Waterworks District have subsequently scheduled a petition in the B.C. Supreme Court.

The case will be heard this Friday, October 5 at the Victoria Courthouse, beginning at 2 p.m.

Shady Willows Resort owner

Brian Jewell plans to oppose the petition.

The battle for the EMO regulation on St. Mary Lake began in 1982 when islanders met several times to discuss banning gasoline-powered boats on St. Mary Lake. The lake is the drinking water source for numerous north Salt Spring households.

In 1985, federal legislation formally banned the use of gasoline engines on St. Mary Lake.

A group of resort owners led by Blue Gables Resort owner Rick Rockcliffe challenged the ruling in B.C. Supreme Court on constitutional grounds. They claimed the EMO was placed on St. Mary Lake for reasons other than safety (water quality and pollution).

Mr. Justice Gibbs agreed with the petitioners and struck down the EMO regulation, ruling it was not within federal power to regulate boats for water quality, but rather provincial power.

## Trust considers new infraction procedure

Changes in procedure should soothe the frustrations of Islands Trustees and residents who report zoning bylaw infractions.

The Islands Trust recently approved a procedure for the investigation of alleged bylaw or permit infractions. Such matters will be dealt with as quickly as possible.

Lack of staff in the past has hindered the Trust's ability to deal with allegations of infractions. Islands Trust chairman Nick Gilbert noted that checking allegations used to take up to three months.

"We've had a fair number of complaints," he said.

The Trust will hire a technician to

work from the Ganges office. The individual will also double as bylaw enforcement officer.

If an infraction of a zoning bylaw or terms of a permit are suspected, the matter should be checked with Islands Trustees or the office staff. A discussion centred on the allegations follow with the property owner involved.

If the matter cannot be dealt with through discussion, a letter would be sent to the property owner outlining the expected requirements of the bylaw or the permit.

The last step would be to have the complainant and the property owner

## Hospital administrator resigns, intends to upgrade education

Diane Horvatin resigned her position as administrator of Lady Minto Hospital.

The resignation, submitted to the board of directors a couple of weeks ago, becomes effective June 30, 1991. The supervisors at the hospital were told last week and the staff learned of the resignation at a recent meeting.

Horvatin refused comment to the *Driftwood*, although the board of directors purchased an advertisement to release the information to the public.

The release states "Horvatin is leaving her position in order to continue her studies towards a Master's degree in Health Administration."

Horvatin has been administrator since 1985 when she was named as temporary replacement for Malcolm

Pinto. She had been acting as the assistant administrator in charge of patient care.

She was originally hired as a nurse by the hospital and worked her way up to the position of head nurse in the acute care section before being named director of nursing.

In her time as administrator, Horvatin served the board of directors as secretary-treasurer.

She is currently working on correspondence courses in an effort to gain her degree in health administration in preparation for her Master's degree.

Horvatin will stay on staff until next June to help the new administrator become adjusted to Lady Minto as well as to continue working on several projects at the hospital.

attempted to gain intervener status in the legal proceedings, but the court ruled the society lacked the standing to make the argument.

The federal government did not appeal the case.

The outlook changed for EMO supporters in 1989 when the B.C. Court of Appeal heard a case between petitioner Windermere Water Sports and the District of Invermere as respondent. The petitioner's case questioned the province's authority to regulate the operation of small boats on lakes and rivers to provide citizens with protection against noise and other forms of nuisance.

The district had passed a regulation prohibiting and regulating small boats. In an action similar to that undertaken by Rockcliffe and other Salt Spring resort owners, Windermere Water Sports petitioned the B.C. Supreme Court for relief of the regulation, claiming the regulation of boats falls under federal authority.

Windermere Water Sports won the case and the district appealed. In the appeals court, Justice Lambert upheld the lower court ruling, stating in his decision that the Rockcliffe case was wrongly decided.

Regulation of boating was clearly a federal authority for all reasons, he

said, including safety, nuisance and water quality.

The Salt Spring WPS and NSSWD are now petitioning the Supreme Court to order the RCMP enforce the existing EMO regulation for St. Mary Lake, declaring it valid in view of the legal precedent set by the Windermere case.

The Attorney General for Canada has entered the case and will support the WPS/NSSWD petition.

Brian Jewell has hired lawyer Peter Goult to fight the petition for the same reasons the initial ban was opposed in 1986. Jewell was one of the resort owners involved in the 1986 case declaring the power boat ban unconstitutional.

Jewell says Goult has told him "it's not going to be a problem" to have the WPS/NSSWD petition dismissed on the grounds being presented.

"They don't have a hope in hell of making that stand," says Jewell.

"I expect a whole lot of property owners with boats around the lake will be thanking me after this," he says.

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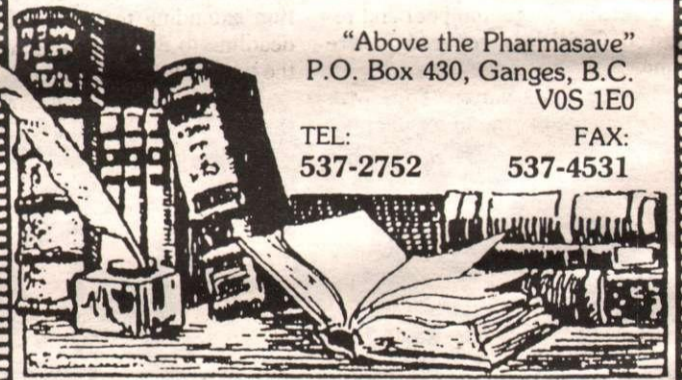

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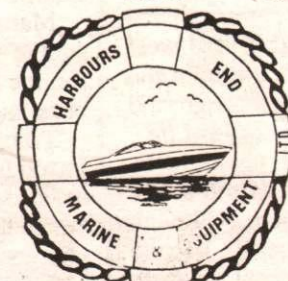

## Swimming pool group plans to test the waters

If work continues at its present pace, Salt Spring Islanders will soon be paddling in the Portlock Park pool.

Swimming Pool Society volunteers have taken up tools and paintbrushes to get the pool and required facilities prepared before winter.

Group spokesman Tom McKeachie says the frame for the pool is now in place and secured. The cement blocks were painted this past weekend. Change rooms have been scraped, painted and upgraded.

Half of the safety fencing has also been erected. In the interest of reducing expenses, McKeachie says, a co-operative fence will service the basketball court and part of the pool.

Expertise from a Vancouver lighting systems engineer has also been obtained.

McKeachie hopes construction material will be donated by one of the lumber companies on the island. An as-yet-undetermined service club may fund a washroom for the handicapped.

The pool itself will be wheelchair accessible, says McKeachie.

Islanders will be invited to test the pool waters on Monday, October 29. This trial run should give the society an estimate of heating costs for next year's budget.

Volunteers are now waiting for

CRD building permits to start construction of the pool decking and a pumphouse. At the Parks and Recreation Commission's September 24 meeting, members approved a motion extending the pool installation deadline to 60 days after receipt of the two building permits.

The commission had originally granted the society 60 days from the pool's arrival in the park to complete installation.

Because a shed at Portlock Park could not be converted to a pumphouse as initially planned, the society had to apply for a building permit for the new structure. Both the deck and pumphouse permits have not yet been processed by the CRD building inspection office.

Regarding the extension of the initial deadline, CRD director Julia Atkins told the PRC meeting "it's obvious they intend to complete the project. I don't see a problem with this."

McKeachie says anyone willing to contribute labour or materials would be welcome to assist the pool society. Interested persons should contact McKeachie at 537-5637 or 537-2932.

"The broader the base of participation, the healthier the project and the better it is for everyone," he said.

meet with the Trustees to talk about the concerns involved.

If compliance with the bylaw or the permit cannot be agreed to, a formal procedure begins.

The complainant must write a letter to the Trust outlining the concerns. Such a letter can be taken to the Salt Spring office or mailed to the chairman of the Islands Trust.

The Trust responds with a written confirmation of receipt of the complaint and sends an official letter to the property owner outlining the possible infraction and including a copy of the relevant bylaw or permit terms.

The bylaw enforcement officer checks the situation and reports to the Trust committee. The committee, by resolution, can decide to proceed with enforcement or let the matter drop.

If compliance is not carried out, a letter is sent to the property owner setting a time limit for compliance. The matter can proceed to legal action.

At various steps through the procedure, the Trust can drop the matter, change the bylaw or proceed.

In the memo outlining the procedure, the Trust notes: "Only the court can enforce local government regulations, including those of the Islands Trust."

With the new Islands Trust Act in force, the Trust finally has the teeth to deal effectively with bylaw and permit infractions.

## Driftwood ties for third spot

The Gulf Islands Driftwood tied for third place in its category in the overall general excellence section of the British Columbia and Yukon Community Newspaper Association's Better Newspaper Competition.

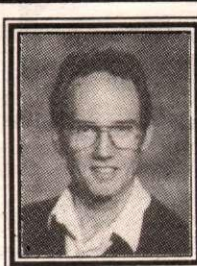
With a total 67 points out of a possible 100, the Driftwood fell seven points short of the winning figure — 74 points — achieved by the 100 Mile House Free Press.

The Whitehorse Yukon News placed second with 72 points, and the Whistler Question tied with the Driftwood for third place.

The general excellence category covered all tabloid newspapers in the province with a paid circulation between 3,001 and 9,999. The Driftwood's paid circulation is approximately 4,800.

The Driftwood scored high in the news coverage and advertising sections and tied for the highest points in the photography and overall appearance sections.

To judge the overall excellence category, the BCYCN randomly picks two publication dates and asks newspapers to submit editions closest to the dates for judging purposes. Dates in December, 1989 and May, 1990 were selected this year. (The competition "year" runs from June to June.)

Moore says "that means we can get it."

He notes the average contribution has been in the \$100 range. A total of 189 individuals or families have donated to the fund. He says most of the contributors have been from Salt Spring Island.

The actual transfer of land will not occur for some time. The survey and subdivision work will take at least a few months to complete. Some conditions will also have to be placed on the actual contract of purchase and sale when it is prepared.

Moore says a hiking group has already walked the property evaluating potential trails.

Donations to finalize the purchase are still required. Cheques made payable to the Salt Spring Island Foundation can be sent to Box 810, Ganges. Tax deductible receipts will be issued.

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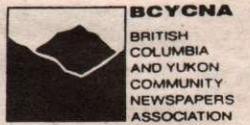
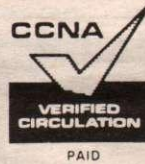

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## A time to honour dedication of firefighters

You wake up from a sound sleep, already half-dressed and with your adrenalin pumping. The high-pitched beeper has placed you instantly alert, ready to respond to instructions.

If you identify with the preceding paragraph, you are a member of the Salt Spring Island Fire Department. If you don't, you are a member of the public who depends on the local firefighters when an emergency arises.

Fire Prevention Week is October 7 to 13 this year. It is a week when communities recognize the personal commitment and dedication of their firefighters. On Salt Spring it is more than an annual week of recognition; this year is the 30th anniversary of the formation of the Salt Spring Island Fire District.

The history of firefighting on the island goes back farther than 1960. It began when the first residents came to the island and worked together in the event of a fire at their neighbours' homes. Forming the fire district and setting up a commission of elected officials to oversee its operation was a major step in the development of island firefighting.

Many islanders have served as firefighters; some for several years, others for a very long time. Fathers and sons have served together, brothers have fought fires side by side. And women pitched in for several years with their own brigade.

Each of the firefighters joined to perform a community service that not everyone can do. For each must have the

confidence and trust in the abilities of his fellow firefighters, so that they can work together in life-threatening situations.

When you enter a burning building with someone, you must feel secure about their skills in handling whatever may occur.

Dependability is a requirement for firefighters in emergency situations, practices and community service work. Answering fire calls on a 24-hour-a-day basis is a commitment for each member of the department.

People depend on firefighters; their fellow workers and members of the community. The department depends on firefighters to show up for practice and training in addition to the fires and emer-

gencies. Residents expect them to show up promptly and ready to perform in an emergency situation.

What do the firefighters receive in return for this major commitment? They feel good when they have done their jobs, when no serious damage or injuries have occurred. They feel they have done their best when serious damage or injuries have taken place. They feel proud to have been able to assist their friends and neighbours.

Firefighters also should receive our congratulations and appreciation. Let's make a special effort to let them know how we feel during Fire Prevention Week.

### Generous response

Last summer, Salt Spring Islanders responded very generously to my request for children's clothing to be sent to the Tibetan Children's Village in Dharamsala, India. The response was so generous, in fact, that I was unable to send all of the clothes due to the prohibitive cost of postage. Seven large sacks of shoes, jeans and wool sweaters were sent and the remainder was offered for sale at the Saturday market, which generated \$200 in cash.

I recently received a letter from Tashi Lhamo at the village informing me that both the money and the sacks of clothing have arrived intact (no mean feat considering their precarious passage through Indian customs!) and caused much excitement and gratitude.

The money has been used to buy material to make warm pyjamas for the winter and the shoes and jeans are particularly appreciated.

Students from Fulford Elementary School also collected clothes which were sent to the village but I have not yet heard if they arrived safely.

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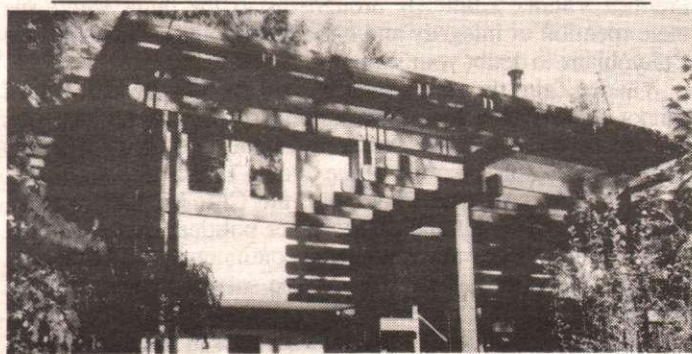

To the Editor,  
I would like to respond to M. Cyprus' letter in the September 26

Driftwood, regarding his proposal to stimulate the development industry on the island by "simplifying" the zoning process. There is no doubt that develop-

ment (I assume he is referring primarily to land development and related construction) is important to Salt Spring's economy. However, it is likely that, in total, tourism, retirement incomes, crown corporations (e.g. ferries, hydro), public institutions (e.g. schools) and fishing generate many more jobs directly and indirectly.

Therefore, a slowdown in development isn't the economic catastrophe which Mr. Cyprus claims, and in fact, might make the Island more attractive for tourists and retirees. It is possible to have a strong, and stable economy by planning and controlling growth and development. It would be foolish to trash the Community Plan or the Islands Trust in a knee-jerk reaction to inevitable, cyclical downturns.

In any case, it is not clear that Mr. Cyprus' proposal to create one rural zone (presumably with the goal of creating more lots) would result in a significant increase in construction activity, since in the short term, demand for real estate is determined by external factors such as interest rates and the state of the off-island economy.

"Simplified zoning" would undoubtedly mean the creation of windfall profits for large landholders like Mr. Cyprus, placing his criticism of hypo-critical anti-everything activists in an ironic light.

Mr. Cyprus did make one interesting suggestion concerning developers bearing all costs of rezoning applications. This should include direct and indirect costs of development such as government administration, incremental water supply costs and new school construction, particularly for rezoning developments which increase population density.

None of these costs are adequately reflected in current application fees, but are real costs borne by the community at large. Consideration of measures to stimulate the development industry on Salt Spring should also take into account that the industry may already be subsidized by the public.

**VICTORIA** — The political and judicial systems are under siege in British Columbia. Cynicism is taking the place of trust. The public is losing confidence in the institutions that separate parliamentary democracies from autocracies, benevolent or otherwise.

After four years of blundering from one scandal to the next, Premier Vander Zalm has brought us to the point where the mere mention of integrity and honesty in politics causes British Columbians to doubt your sanity.

Vander Zalm promised integrity and open government, but I cannot remember a four-year period in B.C. politics that was marked by more scandals, embarrassments and public disgrace than Vander Zalm's term in office to date.

Let's skip the David Pool story, the Cliff Michael debacle, the Bill Reid scandal and all the other political calamities that have rocked this government almost continuously, and deal only with the last two controversies — the sale of Fantasy Garden World and the subsequent discovery that the premier had never relinquished his majority shareholder status in the family business.

**Dragging the queen to his private dwellings**

Vander Zalm's total disregard for or, at best, ignorance of tradition manifested itself in the way in which he sold Fantasy Garden World. Instead of being far away on the day of the sale, addressing some chamber of commerce on the benefits of investing in British Columbia, the premier rolled out the red government carpet for the purchaser of his Richmond theme park.

Treating the billion-dollar woman, Emilia Roxas, like some head of state, he even took her to see Lieutenant Governor David Lam, thereby, in a very real sense, dragging the queen into his own private dealings.

That wasn't the intent, the premier said later. The deal had already been signed, and he was only trying to woo a potential investor in British Columbia. What the premier forgot was that appearances are as important as reality. What he also forgot was that it was he who spoke of the great importance of appearances, shortly after becoming premier.

And just when this particular controversy had died down a bit, we got hit with another. An enterprising reporter checked the company records at his lawyer's office and found that Vander Zalm had never relinquished his majority ownership of the family business until it was sold to Roxas.

**Blamed the press initially**

The papers showed the premier owning 83 per cent of the shares in Fantasy Garden World Inc., when all along he had told British Columbians that it was Lillian's business.

Initially, the premier blamed the press, saying they had only assumed that he didn't own the majority of shares. Then he changed his tune, blaming his "stupidity" for the mix-up. When he relinquished his directorship in the business in 1986, he was led to believe that there was also a transfer of the shares.

Opposition leader Mike Harcourt accused Vander Zalm of a "monstrous lie." I also find it hard to believe that a man who parleyed a relatively obscure nursery business into a \$15 million theme park with castle and all, wouldn't know that he still owns the place. Stupid people don't make million-dollar profits in business.

**Public trust in the system is failing**

I watched in some agony as some of his ardent supporters tried to make light of the matter. What was the big deal anyway, asked Cliff Michael. What indeed? It was, of course, Michael who was sacked by the premier for mixing private business with public duties when he tried to peddle recreational property to people with whom he was dealing as highways minister. This is probably Michael's way of paying his debts to the premier for letting him back into cabinet.

All the while, public trust in the system is fading. Cynicism and the suspension of disbelief are, so far, the greatest legacy of the Vander Zalm years. And that is the greatest danger to which our system of parliamentary democracy can be exposed.

"The rule of law in a democracy requires the public's ongoing consent and confidence to survive," Stephen Owen said in his interim report on the Bill Reid affair.

"Any widespread unease with the essential fairness of our system can cripple it. Perception becomes reality when suspicion of injustice is allowed to fester. The system must be capable of quickly and convincingly resolving any such doubt," Owen added.

The validity of the ombudsman's remarks isn't confined to the justice system; it applies to the entire process of parliamentary democracy which has been crippled time and again.

There can and should be no more well-meaning excuses for Vander Zalm's blunders. He must be held accountable, and the

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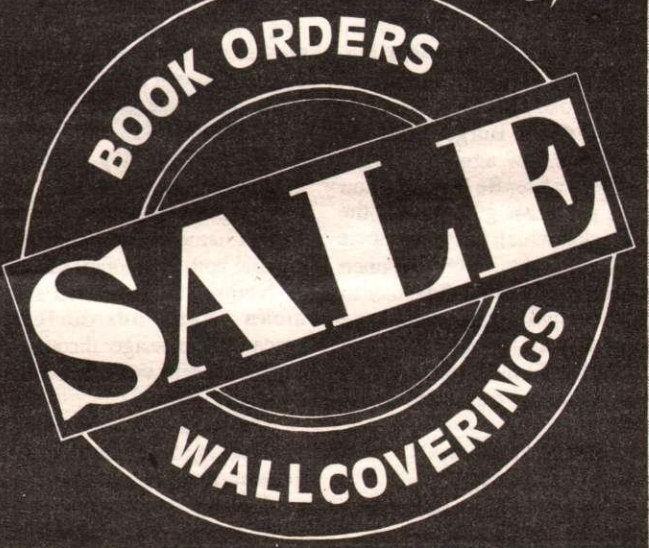
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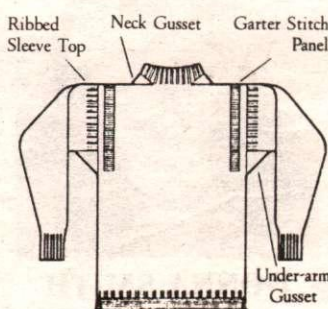
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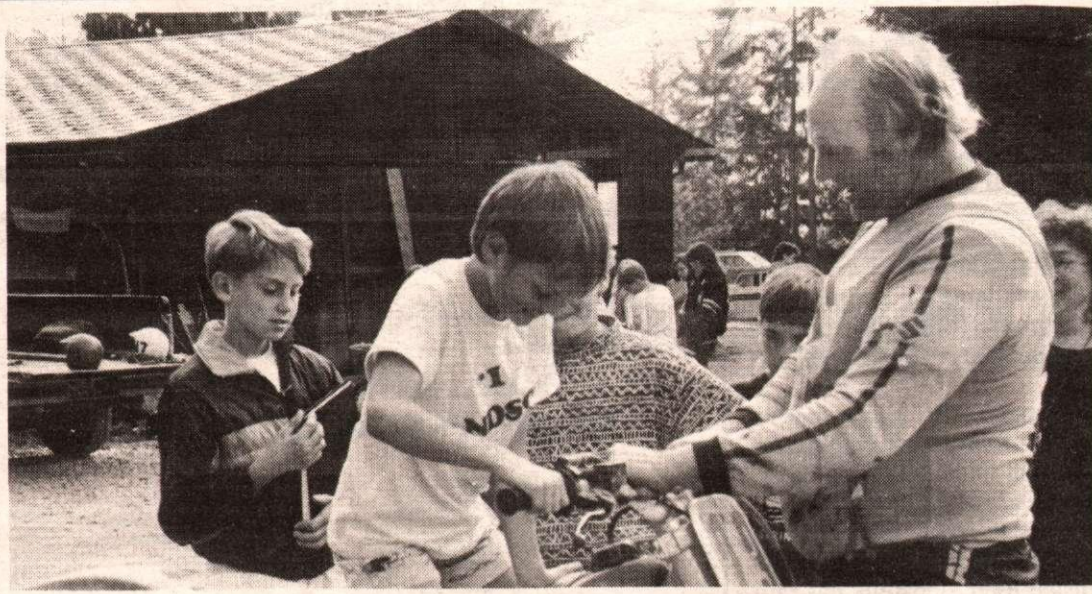

And, thankful for being given the privilege of living on an island such as this and within a community we can truly call home.

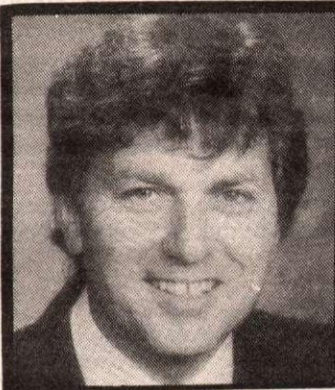

# Dates slated for election all-candidates meetings

Community Planning Association members have announced the dates for two all-candidates meetings in November.

The two meetings will focus on all three election races, including the Capital Regional District, and not just the Islands Trust and school board, as indicated in last week's *Driftwood*.

All elected municipal terms across the province have expired this year. Newly elected officials on each of the school board, Trust and CRD will serve for three-year terms until another across-the-board election is held in 1993.

Claire Nutting will serve as moderator for the first all-candidates meeting on Salt Spring. The November 8 meeting will focus on candidates for the five school board positions.

Four of the five current school trustees are seeking re-election, including chairman Grace Byrne,

David Eyles, Charles Hingston and Charles Bazzard. Ian Fraser was unavailable for comment as the *Driftwood* went to press. (Candidate profiles will be included in upcoming editions of the *Driftwood*).

The second CPA-sponsored all-candidates meeting will take place the following day, November 9, and hear from Trust and CRD candidates. Gordon Sloan will operate as moderator.

Salt Spring Island Trustee and Trust chairman Nick Gilbert has announced he will not run in this year's race, while Trustee John Stepaniuk has said he will stand for re-election.

CRD director Julia Atkins plans to announce whether or not she will seek re-election later this month.

Both meetings will be held in the Activity Centre in Ganges, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

## Weldwood refutes selling out rumour

Weldwood of Canada does not intend to sell its holdings on Salt Spring Island.

A rumour which swept the island late last week suggested Weldwood was attempting to unload its 300 hectares of land on Mount Bruce.

Bob Wilmott, property manager for the timber company, told the *Driftwood* bluntly, "No. It's not for sale."

Weldwood had hired logging contractor Mike Hamilton to log close to 50 hectares earlier this year. The cut was almost completed when the

forests were closed due to extremely dry weather.

Hamilton's logging equipment was sabotaged when unknown persons poured sand into the cranks.

Weldwood currently has a crew on the land conducting cleanup operations of the site in preparation for replanting next spring, Wilmott noted.

"We have no plans to put the property on the market," he said. "It's a tree farm and we won't be selling it."

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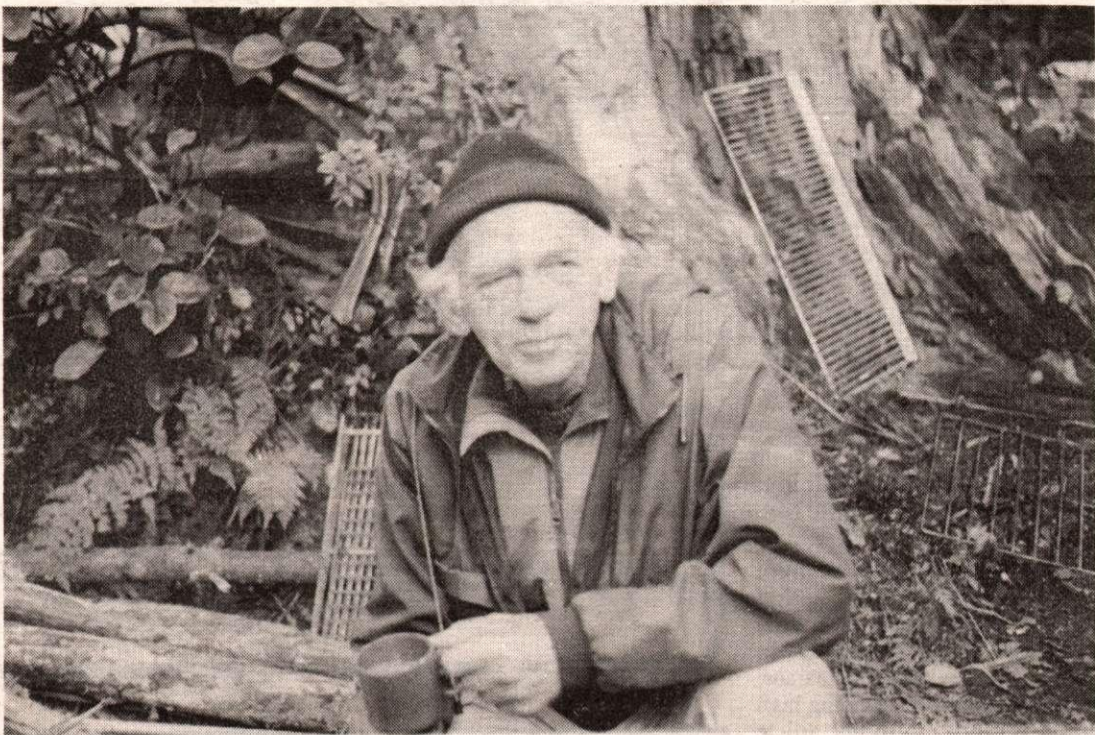

## Local artists support Tsitika

Once again artists are rallying around an environmental issue.

The Victoria branch of the Western Canada Wilderness Committee has organized about 100 British Columbia artists to work on a project based on the Tsitika Valley and Robson Bight area.

In late September artists travelled to northern Vancouver Island to tour the lower Tsitika Valley and do some whale watching in Robson Bight. Images from these memorable experiences will be recorded in their artwork.

Jan Sharkey-Thomas, Anthony Marcano, Simon Camping and Diana Thompson, and myself, participated from Salt Spring Island. Jeremy Borsas, from Mayne Island was also part of the expedition.

In 1978, the Tsitika Valley was the last untouched watershed on the east coast of Vancouver Island. That year, MacMillan Bloedel started to log the upper part of the valley. This happened in spite of the fact that in 1972 the B.C. Fish and Wildlife Branch had proposed that the entire watershed be made into an ecological reserve.

A narrow strip along the ocean currently is designated as an ecological reserve, with MacMillan Bloedel recently receiving Ministry of Forestry permission to log most of the lower Tsitika Valley, up to the ecological reserve.

The unique characteristics of the remaining watershed as well as the close proximity to the whale rubbing rocks of Robson Bight have caused a great deal of concern regarding this government decision.

The situation is deemed "critical," with roads being blasted into the area at present. The artists' expedition is a last attempt to draw public attention to this important issue and pressure the government to reserve its decision.

Similar to the Carmanah artists' project, an exhibit of the artwork will take place at the Crystal Gardens in Victoria, November 26 to 30, and at Robson Square Media Centre in Vancouver, December 6 to 9. Money raised from the sale of the artwork will be used in the struggle to preserve this wilderness area.

A book documenting the expedition is also in the works. It will not be on the same scale as the Carmanah book due to time constraints.

Many accomplished and well-known British Columbia artists par-

ticipated in the artists' expedition, including Phyllis Serota, Carol Sabiston and Gwen Curry, from Victoria.

It was a special treat to get to know some of these artists in a relaxed setting and to enjoy the spectacle of approximately 50 Orca whales gliding and jumping in the water in the Robson Bight area. We were given informative talks by researchers from the Hansen Island whale research station — an education for all of us.

Orca pods are matriarchal in nature and are totally peaceful and harmonious groups, with very well-developed communication skills. Only the transient whales who stray from their family pod eat marine mammals, which is where the name killer whale comes from. There are some definite lessons here.

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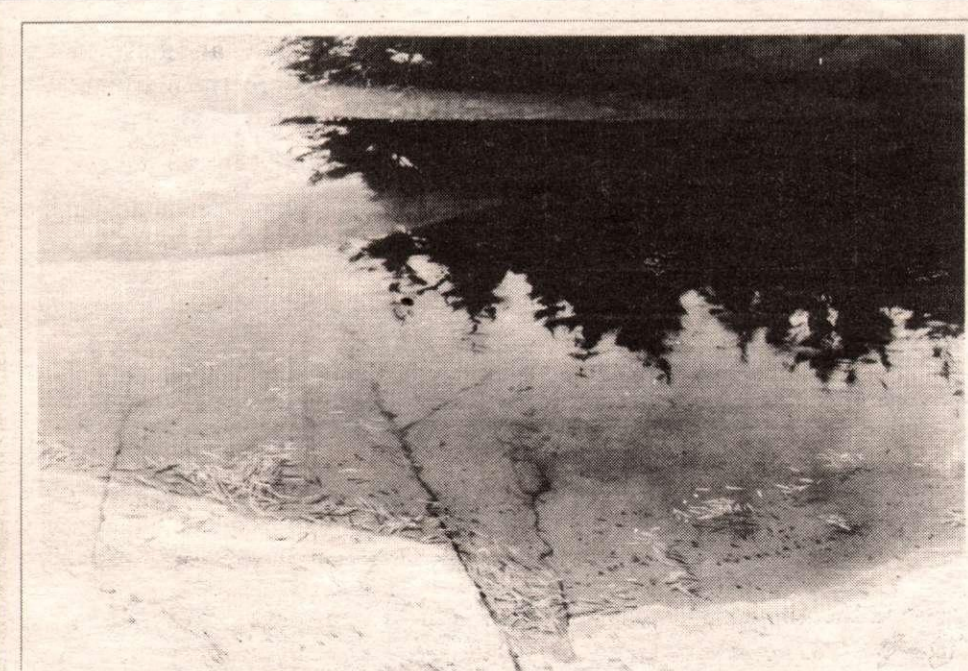

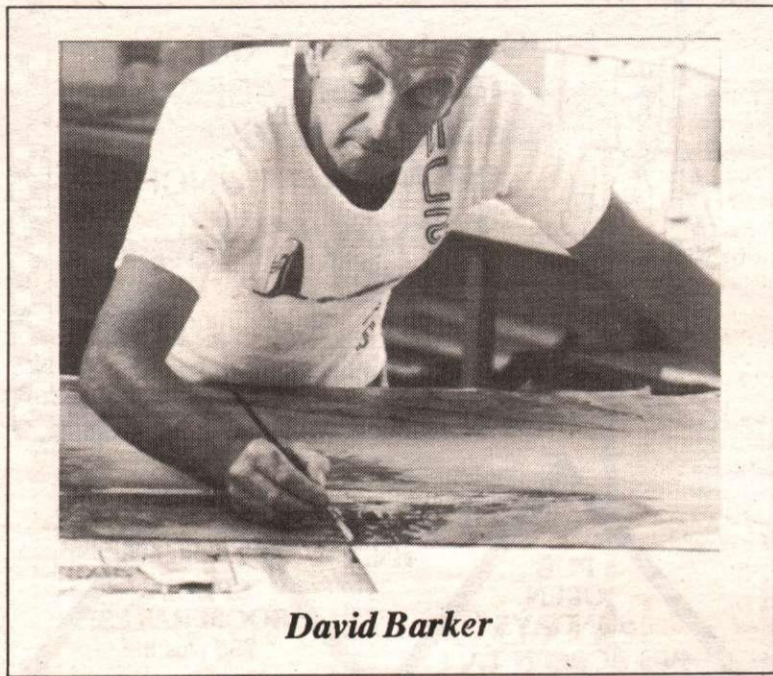

# Acclaimed artist prepares for a one-man exhibition

Fans of the Salt Spring Players can rest assured the coming theatre season will offer something for everyone.

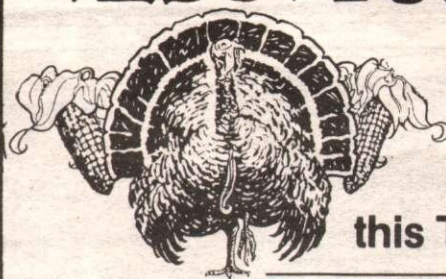

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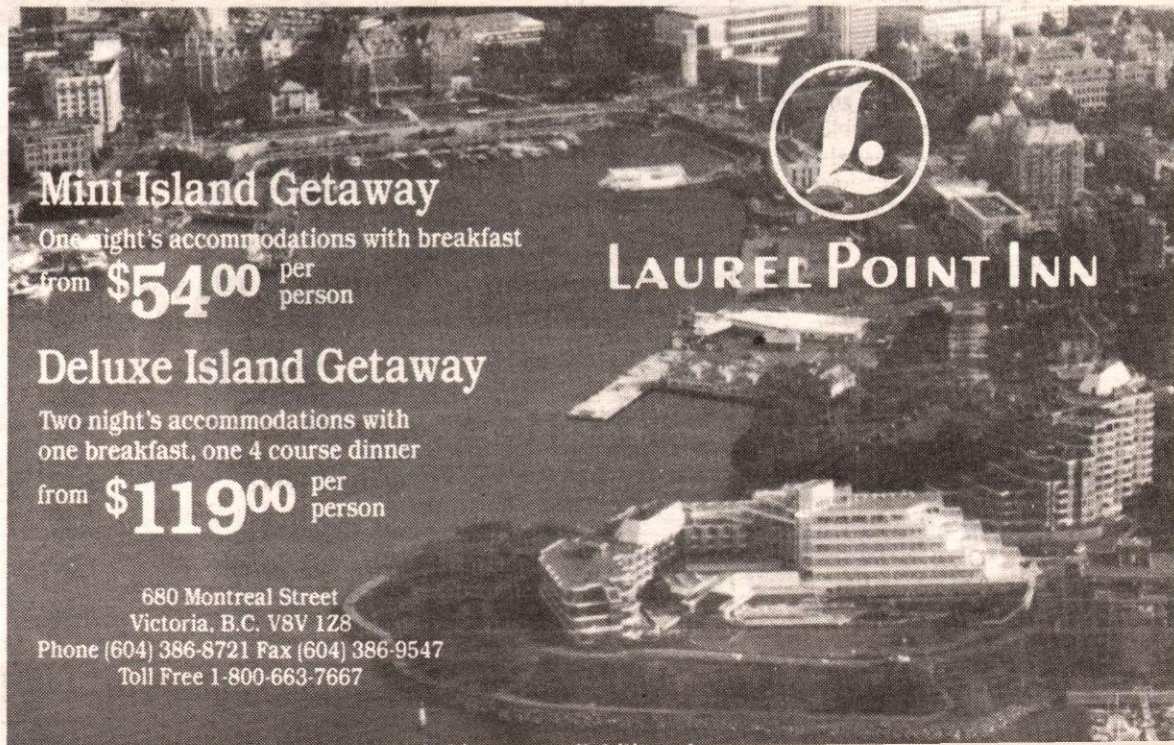

Salt Spring firefighters rushed to the scene of an blaze last week, quickly getting it under control. Owner of the property started the fire in an attempt to burn grass in a ditch. Within minutes it spread to consume close to one-quarter of an acre.

## Island Pathways is promoting alternative means and routes

Increasing the use of local roads by non-motorized means is the focus of a Salt Spring Island committee now known as Island Pathways.

Members originally organized themselves as the Safety Path Committee in the spring of this year. They recently changed their name to the catchier Island Pathways.

The group is a citizen's committee formed to promote on and off-road routes accommodating bicycles, pedestrians, vehicles for the disabled and equestrian traffic.

At its meeting held September 27, Pathways members discussed its plan of action and confirmed its five-point mandate.

Spokesman Kathryn Macdonald says lobbying various governmental bodies is a key component of their plan.

Quoting from the group's written mandate, Macdonald says Pathways will "urge the Islands Trust to adopt a policy favouring cycle paths as an alternate form of transportation and an integral part of the highway system" on Salt Spring Island.

Part of this policy would ideally see the Trust encouraging developers to include cycle and pedestrian paths in their subdivision plans.

Another point in their mandate also ties private land use to the creation of public paths. Pathways will "locate areas where private land owners along highways might dedicate lands or provide easements to make separate paths not attached to the highway."

Macdonald says the fourth point in their mandate is "to promote the paving of road shoulders and the addition of white lines where possible on existing roads." Pathways has already had preliminary discussions with the Ministry of Transportation and Highways regarding paving and the construction of paths on the island.

Finally, Island Pathways will

work "to educate the public and promote and facilitate the use of alternate pathways". The aim of this educational effort is "to promote the health of residents and visitors" and to reduce the negative impact of vehicular traffic on the environment.

"This is a big one for me," says Macdonald.

Local artist Patricia Brown is currently designing a logo for the committee.

Brown is also organizing a fund-raising triathlon tentatively set for next May. Pledge-gathering participants will swim one mile, cycle 25 miles and complete a six mile run, with funds being split between Island Pathways and the Salt Spring Island Swimming Pool Society.

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## Parkland sought

If all expectations are met, Salt Spring could have more than 830 hectares (2,055 acres) of parkland including at least three new ecological reserves.

The Islands Trust council recently approved a motion to support a bid by the Crown Land Use Coalition (CLUC) to declare park status for at least 276 hectares (683 acres) of Crown land covering six parcels adjacent to Satellite Channel.

In another move supported by the Trust, CLUC is also seeking park status for a large block of land — 162 hectares (400 acres) — on Mount Bruce.

In addition, the Trust is considering making its own request for another parcel, 19 hectares (47 acres), at the westerly end of Cusheon Lake.

The Trust is also asking Crown lands officials to have the Channel Islands and the Isabella Islets declared ecological reserves. In addition, the Trust would like to see land adjacent to the ecological reserve at Isabella Point become part of the reserve.

The Parks and Recreation Commission, through the Capital Regional District, is seeking 285 hectares (704 acres) covering three parcels, two of which are on Mount Sullivan and Mount Bruce and the third in the Ford Lake valley.

CLUC and the Salt Spring Foundation are trying to buy land on Mount Erskine. The groups have requested the 88-hectare Crown land parcel there to be turned over to the community.

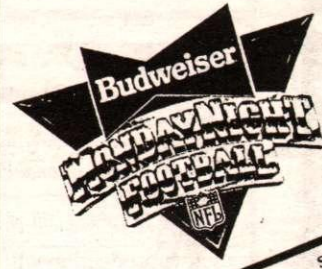

PRC Briefs

Several items of business were discussed at the Parks and Recreation Commission's regular meeting held at the school board office on September 24.

The PRC planning committee will solicit the input of students in its upcoming survey of recreational needs.

Committee chairman Peter Lamb said he received a favourable response for the idea from GISS principal Tom McMahon. The school's business education class will be designing the student survey and analyzing the data received.

PRC's parks committee has also added a section of questions regarding the Farmers' Market to the initial survey.

Applications for Crown lands on Mt. Bruce/Mt. Sullivan and near Ford Lake are nearly complete, reported member Linda Adams.

The draft development concept plans still need to be modified with suggestions made by CRD staff.

Commission members appointed Adams as the formal PRC representative to the Crown Lands Use Coalition.

A facility joint use agreement between the CRD and the school board is in its final drafting stages. Once ratified by School District 64, it will be sent to the CRD for approval and examination by its solicitors. The agreement governs PRC use of school property and the school district's use of commission parks and facilities.

Bill Curtin reported on his meeting with Ganges RCMP regarding the enforcement of bylaws for the operation of the Farmers' Market. He said as a result of the meeting the commission should be well-informed about what is enforceable when new bylaws are drafted.

CRD director Julia Atkins said "the easiest way to enforce the situation is with a licence system" as planned by the market vendors association. Potential vendors would be denied a permit to sell at the market if licence conditions were not met. Unlicensed vendors could then be ticketed by the RCMP.

Atkins told members the CRD is hoping to set up an office on Salt Spring in the government building. She suggested the Parks and Recreation Commission could use a portion of the space when available.

Commission members and CRD director Atkins plan a full-day retreat meeting on October 14 to discuss the 1991 PRC budget, their role in planning the new high school and future staffing matters.

The CRD has requested a preliminary budget from the commission by October 19.

"Adopt-a-park" idea received favourably

Parks and Recreation Commission members discussed a "bloomin' good" idea at their meeting on September 24.

Parks committee chairman Bill Curtin told fellow board members of Malcolm MacLean's "adopt-a-park" proposal to have volunteers look after the flower beds in Centennial Park next year. Curtin and commission member Ian Fraser met with MacLean in September to discuss the concept.

Board members agreed funds for the project should be made an item in the 1991 parks committee budget.

MacLean says he was motivated to suggest the "adopt-a-park" plan for two reasons.

Beautifying the village's seaside park is a definite concern. While there are a few flowers in Centennial Park now, MacLean says he didn't like seeing "that beautiful park with not a blossom in it."

MacLean also thinks senior citizens without their own gardens to tend might like the opportunity to re-green their thumbs in a community effort. People living at Greenwood or Pioneer Village could be approached to get involved.

"If there are some people who don't have a chance to do gardening, where better could they do some gar-

dening than in raised beds with a bench beside them?" he asks.

He has enlisted the aid of the Seniors for Seniors organization to give him feedback on the plan.

MacLean hopes each individual would take responsibility for the maintenance of "their" planter of flowers in the park. He notes it is always possible to get a group of volunteers to work hard to get any project started. Finding volunteers to manage the day-to-day upkeep is often more of a struggle, he says.

MacLean is also considering the adoption of Vesuvius Beach next year. Since no group is responsible for its maintenance, volunteers could clean up the beach for and during the summer months. He has talked to staff at Vancouver's parks board to get ideas for that project.

He says both plans are in their preliminary stages and no action will be taken until next spring.

He says he was pleased to get "a very positive response" for his ideas from the Parks and Recreation Commission.

At the PRC meeting, Curtin said he felt volunteers' work in Centennial Park would create "a standard that is significantly higher than what is there now."

Vision of pizza prompts neat Fulford classrooms

Pizza was the reward for pupils of three classes at Fulford Elementary School for keeping their classrooms neat.

School custodian Mark Rae challenged the youngsters to pick up waste paper and such as well as keep the classes in good shape when school ended each day.

At the end of the school year in June, Rae rewarded the children of three grades with sufficient pizza to go around.

When the school trustees heard about the effort, they unanimously agreed to send the Rae a letter of commendation and a thank you from the school board.

Obviously, the children thanked him as well.



# Community gives approval to bylaw

Islands Trustees Nick Gilbert and John Stepaniuk gave fourth and final reading to Bylaw 162 at their Trust committee meeting on October 1.

The bylaw increases the minimum size of lots requiring proof of potable water in future subdivision applications on Salt Spring Island.

Stepaniuk said he received one phone call asking for clarification of the bylaw, but no other response or concern to it was voiced.

A land owner applying to subdivide property not serviced by a community water system must now prove potability of water on parcels three hectares (7.6 acres) or less in size. Lots two hectares (5 acres) or smaller were previously governed by this stipulation.

The amount of water considered adequate on subdivided land is also defined in Bylaw 162. Each three hectare lot must be capable of producing 1,590 litres (350 gallons) of water per day.

# Society donates grant

Green Islands Society of Salt Spring plans to contribute a recently awarded grant towards the community purchase of a Mount Erskine property.

Greens Islands was awarded the \$120 grant by the New Society Publishers, based in Philadelphia and Santa Cruz. Members of the New Society Publishers pay a voluntary "green tax" which is used to "help restore, protect and educate others about the environment."

A Green Islands press release indicates publishers throughout North America who participate in the New Society Publishers "conceived of a voluntary green tax that might give back to the earth some of what (they) as businesses take away."

"The green tax is not viewed as an answer to environmental degradation in itself but as a symbolic step, a call for imaginative solutions to problems created by the very functioning of contemporary economic systems."

Greens Islands Society was awarded the grant to continue its work of protesting against "forestry malpractice on both public and private lands and in helping to coordinate a lobby for adequate regulation of private land logging in B.C.," the press release states.

Green Islands decided to contribute the money towards the community purchase of the Mount Erskine property.

# Park given official park status

Peter Arnell Park on Salt Spring is now officially parkland.

The Ministry of Crown Lands announced last week it was turning the 12.65-hectare site over to the Capital Regional District as a free Crown grant for use as a park.

The land has been unofficially considered a park for many years. Trails, campsites, latrines and a look-out point have been developed on the property. The park is located on Stewart Road above the Cusheon Creek valley.

Peter Arnell, for whom the park is dedicated, worked for a number of years as a surveyor on Salt Spring and the Gulf Islands. He died while undertaking survey work on Galiano Island. The park was created and dedicated to his memory.

Crown lands minister Dave Parker noted in a prepared statement: "It . . . makes sense to transfer the jurisdiction, maintenance and development of a recreational area to the community that uses it."

**Ferry corporation plans improvements, terminal**

B.C. Ferries called for tenders to upgrade the *Queen of Westminster* and will seek public opinion on a new major terminal on Vancouver Island.

The *Westminster* will be given a new engine and have a second car deck added. The ferry, built in 1964, currently carries 192 vehicles and 1,183 passengers. When the second deck is added, there will be room for an additional 155 vehicles.

The added deck will also have head-room to permit use by recreation vehicles. With the newer engine, the boat could be used on the Strait of Georgia runs.

The call for tenders for the overhaul closes on November 12.

The study into the possibility of creating a new major terminal on Vancouver Island has reached the stage of soliciting public opinion.

The ferry company is looking at the area between Crofton and Yellow Point at the head of Ladysmith harbour. The concept centres around easing the load at both Swartz Bay and Nanaimo.

The reconstruction of the Island Highway would aid in accommodating the expected traffic from the new terminal.

**CRD offers free flu vaccinations**

Free flu shots will be available in Ganges to eligible persons in the next two weeks.

The Capital Regional District Health Department has received a supply of the influenza vaccine for distribution in several communities.

Injections will be given at the CRD health clinic located behind Lady Minto Hospital in the former nurses' residence on Thursday, October 11 and Tuesday, October 16. Appointments must be made in advance by calling the clinic at 537-5541 from Monday through Thursday.

Certain groups of people receive the vaccine at no charge by being more at risk from influenza. These include adults and children with certain chronic medical disorders such as lung or heart disease, immunodeficiencies, chronic renal or

metabolic diseases, residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities and all persons over 65 years of age.

Injections can also be obtained from family physicians. People who are not eligible for the free vaccine should discuss treatment with their doctors.

CRD Community Health Services says adults require one injection only, while some children may require two injections one month apart.

Influenza is a highly contagious disease characterized by sudden fever, severe aches and pains and the usual development of coughs and sneezes. It is important for those wishing protection to receive the vaccine early in order for adequate immunity levels to build up prior to the arrival of the virus.

Bills for water from the North Salt Spring water system will be going directly to home owners as a means of saving time and money.

North Salt Spring Waterworks District manager Mike Larmour explained the changes to the *Driftwood* last week.

He said the bills were sent to each house on the system but some of the houses were being rented. Tenants move and often do not let the water district know of the move.

Consequently, when the bills go out, a new tenant receives a bill in someone else's name and faces costs for water which someone else had used.

In addition, when the district was informed about a move, someone had to go out and read the meter to determine the use and the consequent cost.

Under the new system, recommended by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, bills go to the property owner who can pass the cost on to the tenant.

Each property on the system, which stretches from Beddis Road north to Southey Point on the westerly side of the island, pays a flat rate of \$17 every two months which covers consumption of 27,276 litres (6,000 gallons) of water. The cost for water above that amount is billed at 35 cents per 455 litres (100 gallons).

Larmour noted that most other water districts bill property owners. The new system comes into effect with the January/February billing in 1991.

## DOWN THE YEARS

### Thirty Years Ago

- A turkey supper hosted by the Fulford Community Hall raised over \$300 for the hall committee. It was hoped 50 or 60 chairs could be purchased with the funds raised.
- The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce planned to request the construction of a shelter for foot passengers at the Swartz Bay dock or the allowing of Gulf Islands passengers to use the Swartz-Bay Tsawwassen waiting room. Gulf Islands ferry passengers were not allowed to use the waiting room or coffee shop unless they bought a \$2 ticket at the toll gate.

### Twenty-Five Years Ago

- The Gulf Islands Hospital Board unanimously approved a petition for sewage disposal in Ganges village.
- *Driftwood's* Fulford Harbour correspondent Bea Hamilton noted a number of tourists still circulating on Salt Spring. "All kinds of cameras are taking in the scenery and people. You can't always tell a tourist by the camera, but you can by his pants, if they're short, there is a tourist inside 'em — so go by the pants not the camera, and the colourful hat bands and dashing shirts."

### Twenty Years Ago

- Winnie Watmough was named Citizen of the Year by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce.
- A Capital Regional District report urged mobile homes be allowed on private lots within the regional district. CRD planners recommended that mobile homes be accepted as an alternative to the ordinary single-family dwelling and that all regulations applying to single family dwellings be applied to mobile homes.

### Ten Years Ago

- The Capital Regional District board moved that the Gulf Islands be excluded from the bus transit levy. It was the continuation of a see-saw which had seen the islands in and out of the levy area.
- Gulf Islands school trustees gave themselves a 100 per cent raise. Trustee remuneration was increased to \$4,000 per year, with the chairman and vice-chairman receiving \$6,000 and \$5,000 respectively.

### Five Years Ago

- A man's life was saved by islander Jim Buckley. Henry Schroeder had been fishing on St. Mary Lake when his dinghy tipped over. Buckley was driving to work and heard Schroeder's screams for help. Without hesitation he dove into the icy water and swam out to Schroeder.
- An information meeting discussed alternatives for garbage disposal on Salt Spring Island.
