United Way helps islanders in need

A donation to the United Way in October will bring seasonal goodwill to islanders in need at Christmas time.

Through an annual United Way grant of \$38,000, the Salt Spring Community Society is able to provide administrative support to numerous island programs such as the food bank, Christmas hampers and Santa's workshop.

As the United Way fund-raising campaign gains momentum on Salt Spring, organizers encourage islanders to donate to the cause which benefits so many people in so many different ways.

Approximately 20 local volunteers hope to raise \$25,000 for the United Way this year. In 1988, Salt Spring donated close to \$23,000 and last year it raised \$19,570.

Community Society director Barbara Jordan-Knox says the money received from the United Way is essential to the organization. The \$38,000 helps fund support staff needed to run the Community Centre's nine major programs.

"It (the Community Centre) is the glue that brings the whole thing together," says Barbara Allard, who coordinated last year's Christmas

hamper program. "Without it, all the groups would have to operate on their own."

The Salt Spring food bank, Christmas hamper program and Santa's Workshop are three Community Centre-sponsored programs which help islanders in need.

Every Christmas numerous volunteers converge to send out more than 100 boxes-full of Christmas dinners, complete with all the trimmings, to those islanders who might otherwise experience a meagre celebration.

It is an enormous task which begins in October when organizers compile a list of those potentially in need. Those on the list (names are obtained from social services, local churches and the food bank) are contacted and asked if they would like to receive a hamper.

A committee of buyers meets with grocery stores and solicits donations from the community as it prepares to gather hamper ingredients (carrots, potatoes, fruit, tinned goods — corn, beans, cranberry sauce — coffee, tea, cookies, buns, margarine, juice, candy and a voucher for a turkey or vegetarian substitute).

Food lists are made for each hamper, according to the number, ages and food preferences in the family.

Alternate Grad Program leads in a new educational direction

Gulf Islands Secondary School teacher Scott Bergstrom sees public education moving in a new direction. He is currently co-ordinating a program leading the way in B.C.

Through the Alternate Grad Program, students who have quit or would have almost inevitably left school can now re-enter the system at GISS while maintaining a job. Their goal is the same as a regular student — to obtain a high school diploma.

Students in the program must complete the core courses required to

graduate from any B.C. high school — Grade 11 English, social studies and math, Grade 12 English and another Grade 12 academic subject. These are supplemented by Consumer Education and Career Ex-

plorations courses. All courses are completed by correspondence and students must pass the Ministry of Education's final exams in the core subjects. The rest of the credits

Society created for parents with special needs children

A new Gulf Islands society will organize parents of children with special needs.

The Special Needs Advocacy Group met October 1 to begin the process of establishing a society to provide information and advocacy for children with special needs in the school, community and province. It will also offer parent support and liaison.

Members of the group are particularly interested in becoming more

effective advocates and partners in the educational process.

Membership in the society — which will meet again on October 15 — is open to parents and other interested community members.

Special Education Consultant Dr. Ralph Miller addressed the October 1 meeting with a discussion on the new School Act and provincial educational programs. Miller also outlined special education guidelines

created by the Ministry of Education and the local school board.

Parents at the meeting explored ways they could best benefit from and contribute to the October 19 Gulf Islands School District conference: "Working Together for Special Education."

The group will meet again October 15 at 7:30 p.m. at Salt Spring Elementary School. Those wishing further information should contact Liz Anderson at 537-4979.

needed to obtain their diploma are derived from work experience.

Program co-ordinator Bergstrom says the program was developed to meet the needs of a specific group of people.

"It came out of our frustration of having a number of kids enter school every September and be gone by October because the economic reality was that they had to support themselves."

Last fall Bergstrom sat down with a group of 12 boys who had repeatedly tried to finish high school. They discussed possible ways to adapt the regular school system to their lives and needs. With eight of the boys enrolled at some point in Grade 11 or 12, the Alternate Grad Program commenced last Christmas.

He describes the situation of one of last year's participants as an example. The student was taking three blocks of shop courses when he quit school and went to work for a carpenter. When he joined the AGP, the skills learned on the job were applied towards construction, woodworking and work experience course credits.

The courses are designed in 10-

week modules, with most of the work done by the students at home, and direction provided in class from Bergstrom on one or two afternoons a week.

This year there are 12 young men and women between 17 and 28 years of age in the program. They represent 20 per cent of the 1991 graduating class and might have foregone their chance to complete high school.

Bergstrom says Ministry of Education statistics indicate 30 per cent of Grade Eight students currently enrolled in B.C. schools do not graduate. On that basis, of the 110 pupils in Grade Eight at GISS, 33 would drop out at some point. Of the remaining 77, only 26 (or 23.6 per cent) would continue on to a post-secondary institution.

One of the three boys who graduated from GISS under the AGP program in June is now taking mechanics at Camosun College. Another is writing his entrance exam to the college.

Bergstrom says "probably the most rewarding thing in my career was to see those three guys, up there in their tuxedos, who wouldn't have graduated otherwise."

He adds that participants in the

AGP program generally take their schooling more seriously than most students. "They're here by choice."

Other students have approached him about joining the Alternate Grad Program, but he stresses it is there for the ones who wouldn't otherwise finish school.

"It has taken them from wandering around down and depressed and put them back in the mainstream again," he says.

Lorri Cinkant, 17, is a new participant in the program this year. She says she "may have" quit school if the AGP option was not available to her.

Cinkant works at the Hastings House and the Waterside Bistro in addition to doing her schoolwork. She says "you get a lot of homework, but as long as you do your work, you're okay."

Gulf Islands School District Superintendent Mike Marshall, former GISS principal John Wellingham and parents are given high marks by Bergstrom for their support of the program's development.

Salt Spring Island employers have also been co-operative, he says, for both the AGP and regular work experience program Bergstrom co-ordinates at the school.

Island programs fill tables at Christmas

The actual packing begins about three days before Christmas, when volunteers gather with wrapped hamper boxes, lists and tables of food at the Ganges United Church. Numbered boxes are set around the room, usually on top of chairs, with individualized lists attached. (There are no names on the boxes.)

The hampers are packed over a two-day period and then delivered by an army of volunteer drivers on the third day.

Allard says each box is worth between \$45 and \$50. Money and food comes from community donations, while the coordination and administration is sponsored by the Community Centre.

A number of community groups and individuals combine efforts to make Santa's Workshop — which operates alongside the Christmas hamper program — a success.

This Christmas, Community Centre office volunteer Bob Appleton will organize Santa's Workshop for his fourth consecutive year. Already, he has boxes of donated toys — dolls, stuffed animals, games — ready for distribution with the Christmas hampers.

Yearly assistance comes from the Golden Hands ladies who sew new clothes for and re-dress used dolls. Other volunteers repair broken toys and clean and redecorate stuffed animals. A wood-working class makes toys for Santa's Workshop as a learning exercise, and islanders donate toys throughout the year.

Just prior to Christmas, Appleton sets out the toys — according to use by age groups — on large tables. He then receives a list from Christmas hamper organizers who indicate the number and ages of children in families receiving hampers. Appleton packages the toys in bags and marks them according to their destination (i.e. six-year-old boy or three-year-old girl).

Last year, Santa's Workshop had enough toys to give 100 children four gifts each.

The Community Centre supplies Santa's Workshop with a coordinator, storage space and support.

The third service offered to needy islanders is the food bank which operates year-round, with peak usage in September and the month following Christmas.

Coordinator Manson Toynbee says the food bank provides emergency assistance to people in need — it does not provide a regular source of food but offers a temporary reprieve. Toynbee says people often need the food bank in September when money has been spent on school clothing and supplies, leaving the food budget short.

At Christmas time, families receiving social assistance obtain their cheques early and usually have more expenses. Often they run short in January.

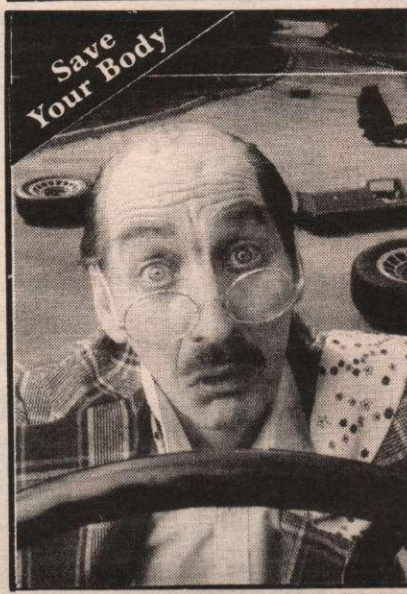
The food bank operates from a room at the Community Centre. Toynbee purchases the bulk of food, keeping an eye out for bargain prices, and using money raised from the GVM tape program which donates one per cent of tape totals.

The food bank is also sponsored by food donations plus the annual Food Bank Auction.

Every week, the food bank supplies between five and 25 individuals or families with enough groceries to

Toynbee notes the United Way-funded Community Centre provides the food bank with facilities, office volunteers to distribute packages, plus receipts and thank-you notes for donations.

This year's United Way campaign is being organized by Susan McNair. Personalized letters requesting donations have already been sent to several island businesses. Islanders will have the opportunity to contribute to the campaign after October 17, when a "mail-in" donation card is distributed through the *Driftwood*.

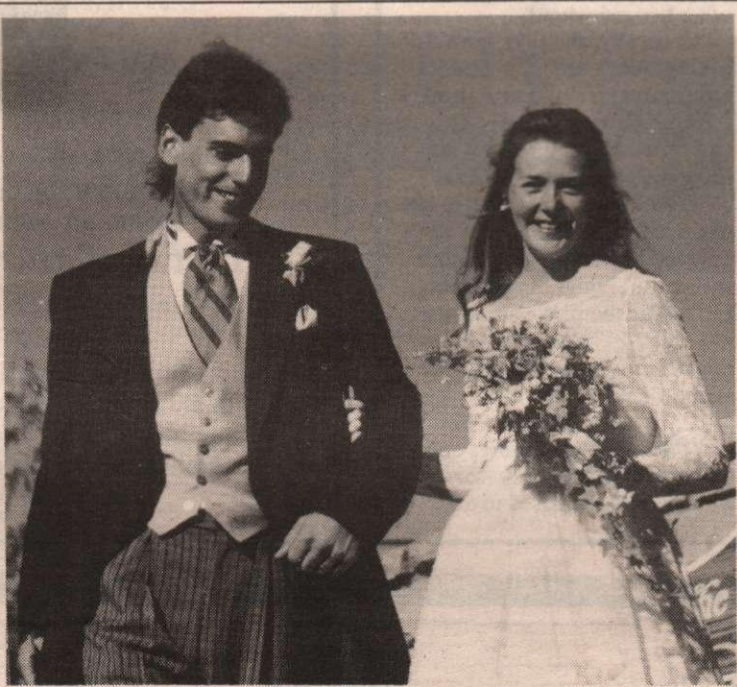
When they retired, the two sold the farm and moved to their home at 107 Castle X Rd. Gardening is an important part of their days as is evident by the huge garden patch in front of their home.

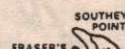

Gaggle of geese fattens-up fan club for island golfers

It's too bad they can't be trained as caddies or groundskeepers.

The Canada goose population at the Salt Spring Golf and Country Club has increased this fall with the winged golf fans stopping in at their favourite winter resort. While club officials say the geese are an annoyance to some people, there are no plans to forcibly remove them.

Club president Gary Coulter estimates 150 of the distinctive birds are hanging around the course now. He says the board of directors has decided to ignore them. "They've become part of the golf course and we wouldn't want to harm them."

SPCA representative Christine Wooldridge says the island's permanent flock consisted of 80 Canada geese at last count — up from 18 four years ago. She says fellow geese migrating south for the winter no doubt stop at the golf course

for a short time, adding to the resident population.

Course pro Gordon Ferguson says the geese can sometimes be "a real pain in the neck," leaving their "calling cards" on the greens. He adds, however, that many people from off-island comment on how nice it is to see the birds on the course.

Of several golf clubs in the area canvassed, only one said it had any number of geese to contend with. Linda Jenkins, of Metchosin Golf and Country Club, says Canada geese and golfers have been co-habiting happily on the course for years. "They're kind of used to golfers and they just step out of the way."

Other courses have reportedly tried using dogs, swans and remote control explosions to scare the geese away, without success.

Some geese have been hit by golfers' shots or suspected to be injured in some way and SPCA

staff have been called to attend to them.

Wooldridge says she frequently receives calls regarding the geese but is unable to catch them with usual methods. Three were once treated for paralysis which she thinks could have been caused by ingestion of fertilizer used on the golf course greens. One bird died and the other two recovered.

Generally, she says, the Salt Spring geese are in a healthy environment. "I don't think those geese are suffering. They can protect themselves and there is a good supply of food."

Wooldridge does say it is unfortunate man has encouraged some birds to ignore their natural migrating patterns by feeding them. We are seeing the third generation of non-migrating Canada geese on the island, she says.

"When you alter things on a few generations they forget what they're supposed to do."

Increased taxi fares combat higher costs

Taxi fares on Salt Spring will increase.

Barry Scotton, owner of Salt Spring Taxi, has asked the motor carrier commission for a fare increase. Taxi fares have stayed at the same level for at least the past three years, he explained.

Scotton seeks an 30 cent increase in the flag rate to \$1.70 from \$1.40. The flag rate is the amount which is on the meter before it starts to register the amount of the cab fare.

He is also seeking a 20 cent increase in the kilometre rate which would be \$1.30 per kilometre, up from the current \$1.10.

Scotton cited increases in the cost of fuel, repairs and insurance as reasons for the fare increase request. He stressed the matter is subject to approval by the commission and would not come into effect unless a favourable ruling is handed down.

Watching the frantic antics in Ottawa these days brings home a live lesson on how politics should not be played.

Our esteemed prime minister, Brian Mulroney, offers an example of how not to lead.

Democracy has proven to be enduring if everyone plays by the rules. However, when the rules get bent, democracy suffers. Essentially, that's what transpires in the capital city these days.

The Tories seem intent upon forcing the Goods and Services Tax on a country which does not want it. Mulroney used his majority in the House of Commons to pass a piece of legislation which is not only flawed and unpopular, but also misunderstood.

What most Canadians see is government, once again, reaching into their wallets to grab more hard-earned dollars. We pay. They spend.

As for Mulroney's Senate shenanigans, they stink.

Questions about Buchanan's conduct

Priming the pork barrel to control the Senate grates on one's sense of the ridiculous. He got so carried away with his stupidity, that New Brunswick ended up with more appointed representatives than elected folk.

Senate reform was a big appeal when, back then, Mulroney reached for the PM's job. He scored large points across the country by belittling John Turner who went along with cushy jobs for many of Pierre Trudeau's cronies.

Now, we see a sterling, upright, honest individual such as John Buchanan named as a Senator. Never mind that the RCMP and other justice officials have serious questions about Buchanan's conduct in office.

If, indeed, Senate reform is on Mulroney's agenda, he blew it.

He could have let the Liberals in the upper house talk the GST dead. Then he would have had a guaranteed issue to force reform.

Errors come back to haunt you

Imagine the lost opportunity. Mulroney could have stood before Canada, hand over his heart, and cried: "Are we to let appointed Senators dictate to elected representatives of the people?"

What he's done is set it up so appointed people will force unpopular legislation on those same people he needs to reform the Senate. He would have had support.

Support from all corners of the country — except Quebec.

An old saying states your errors will come back to haunt you. Mulroney's error in Meech Lake now haunts Canada. He played the oily politician when he should have been a statesman.

And his game-playing has severely dented the concept of democracy as practiced in this country.

Where to now?

Mulroney has looked at the short term to try to ensure his name in history. While he was looking, his name entered the books as perhaps the worst prime minister we've had.

He has blown unity in the country. He has rendered Senate reform next to impossible. He has widened and deepened the gap which isolates the Native population of this country.

When the Tories were elected, more as a relief from the arrogance of the Liberals than from any great endorsement of their policies, the country looked to good times.

As Mulroney practiced his strange version of leadership, the citizens gained, not those good times, but an unsettling feeling of betrayal. When the next election comes, the people will speak and the person who assumes the mantle of leadership will face a country which is fragmented.

Where does Canada go from here?

Catholic Women's League hosts fall council meeting

Members of the SSI Council of the Catholic Women's League gained insight into local, provincial and national issues as they hosted the fall interim meeting of the Victoria Diocesan Council of the CWL.

The October 2 gathering took place in the parish hall of Our Lady of Grace Church in Ganges. Over 50 delegates from the various councils in the diocese arrived by 9:30 a.m. to partake of muffins and coffee and have a brief visit with old friends before the conference began.

SSI Council president Jean McCaffery welcomed the visitors.

Diocesan president Margaret Beardon called the meeting to order at 10 a.m. The new executive for 1990-91 started the proceedings by taking part in the Prayer of Commitment of Officers.

Special guest Jo Bremault from St. Albert, Alberta, was introduced. As a convener on the Alberta-Mackenzie Diocesan Council, she brought greetings from her council to the meeting.

During the business session, the convenors' reports gave a most interesting insight into the work of the various councils as they deal with local, provincial and national issues.

The Eucharist was celebrated in Our Lady of Grace Church by diocesan spiritual director, Monsignor Philip Hanley, and Fr. Bernard Hanley of Victoria. In his homily, Msgr. Hanley spoke on the role of angels in the belief of Catholics.

The afternoon session opened with the blessing of the new League

flag by the spiritual director. The focal point of the flag is the League crest, the official insignia designed and adopted in 1922. The colours of blue, white and gold are arranged in a diagonal composition symbolic of the membership moving forward in faith and action, for God and Canada.

Margaret Beardon gave a brief report on the national convention held in Montreal last August, and Elaine Lynch reported on the provincial convention held in Salmon Arm in June.

The conference ended with the delegates forming six small groups to share their ideas on the follow-up of the resolutions passed at the provincial and national conventions. The topics covered were: "Peace in El Salvador," "Rights of the Unborn Child and Euthanasia" and "Refuse: Reduce, Recycle, Recover."

The spring interim meeting of the Victoria Diocesan Council of the CWL will be hosted by St. Mary's Council in Ladysmith, on Tuesday, March 12, 1991.







Fishing closures announced

Fisheries Canada has closed more areas to shellfish harvesting as red tide spreads.

In addition, salmon fishing has been restricted at two areas on Salt Spring.

The latest shellfish restriction affects all of the southern Gulf Islands and runs along the shore of Van-

couver Island from Chemainus to (and including) the Saanich Inlet.

Cusheon Cove, inside a line from two boundary markings along the shore, has been designated a sanctuary and salmon fishing is not allowed. The first sign is north of Cusheon Creek outlet while the other sign is southerly along the shoreline.

Fulford Harbour, inside a line running from the government wharf in the village across the bay to the old log dump, has also been closed to salmon fishing. Cutthroat trout can be taken inside Fulford Harbour but only a single hook, less than 15 millimetres from shank to point, can be used.

DOWN THE YEARS

Thirty Years Ago

- Captain George A. Maude, senior captain of the Gulf Island Ferry Company, was honoured by a dockside presentation at Ganges. The ceremony marked the occasion of his 30th anniversary as skipper on ferries in the area.
- Thirty people from Salt Spring Island were part of a group of 658 people who toured the Crofton pulp mill on national Pulp and Paper Day.
- The island's hospital issued its report for the month of September. Fifty-seven patients had been under care, eight children were born, and 10 patients were admitted from Pender, Mayne and Galiano Islands. One major and 39 minor operations were performed.

Twenty-Five Years Ago

- The new government building in Ganges was open for business. The building was said to show all the modern trends in office design and utility. First session of the Magistrate's Court was held on October 8.
- The Fathom Phantoms awarded Don Irwin the second quarterly trophy for the largest cod caught during the previous four months.
- The Parks and Recreation Commission formally thanked Eleanor Deacon for providing swimming classes to children in the community.

Insects have flourished in warm weather of fall

Large, fat spiders appear to spin webs in the most unlikely places, but 1990 is not a special year for the eight-legged predators.

Dr. Richard Ring, of the University of Victoria, told the *Driftwood*: "It's been a good year for many kinds of insects."

What with the warm weather, lush foliage and other abundant sources of food, insects have flourished. Spiders, being predators, find the abundance good for survival and so, with more insects to eat, more spiders survive.

"It's the time of year when they are noticeable. They get big and fat, lay their eggs in preparation for winter," Dr. Ring explained.

Morning dew clings to the webs like jewellery but later in the day, the

web remains to trap food or startle the unwary who stroll into the clinging threads.

Twenty Years Ago

- Galiano Islanders met to discuss the stench from the Crofton pulp mill. Letters of protest were to be sent regarding the mill.
- Tom Harcus submitted a report on incorporation to the Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association. The report concluded that a municipality covering all of the southern Gulf Islands could be run economically but separate corporations for Salt Spring and the Outer Islands would create a large deficit.
- New signs were springing up on Salt Spring Island. Some drivers were getting used to the stop sign outside the fire hall. A "no left turn" sign at the Ganges Pharmacy turn and road signs on other parts of the island had also been erected.
- Two burglars were caught red-handed by Ganges RCMP. After being alerted that Ganges Pharmacy had been broken into, RCMP attended at the scene and found two men inside the building.

Fifteen Years Ago

- B.C. Forest Products Ltd. put over 1,100 acres of its Gulf Islands land on the market. BCFP was asking between \$600 and \$1,100 per acre for isolated 60- to 240-acre parcels of land on Salt Spring and Saturna islands.
- Funding for a daycare facility for the Salt Spring Island Community Centre Society was approved by the

Ministry of Human Resources.

- A fish scow at the north end of Galiano sank loaded with 4,500 pounds of salmon and six tons of ice after it sprung a leak at the seams. The scow was towed at high tide by Lloyd Baines to the head of the bay where 2,000 pounds of the fish were salvaged.
- The Harbour House Pub had been closed for more than a month due to the Pacific Brewers Distributors strike. Beer was still available in some Victoria-area establishments.

Ten Years Ago

- CRD director Yvette Valcourt told the Parks and Recreation Commission she felt ratepayers should have the opportunity to vote on the expenditure of the commission's \$30,000 annual budget.
- The Ganges post office had to deal with two heavy loads of mail after a work stoppage prevented movement of mail to the island.
- A petition was filed in B.C. Supreme Court to set aside the order of the Pollution Control Board requiring the construction of a proposed \$4 million sewer outfall in Ganges Harbour.
- Galiano residents were upset when a logging contractor inadvertently removed 150 trees from Bluff Park. The contractor agreed to sell the logs and give the proceeds to the Bluff Trust as compensation.
