Plan proceeding for youth centre

Plans for a youth centre are unfolding on Salt Spring, prompted by the Community Society.

A committee of adults and teens have been meeting for the past eight months to discuss the needs of Salt Spring youth. They concluded "a priority is a space where youth can participate in activities and planning of events."

The quote comes from a letter written to the school board by Community Society director Barbara Jordan-Knox. The letter asks trustees if they have any further plans for the cabin located behind the community centre.

That space was previously used for the Gulf Islands Program Serving Youth (GIPSY) which catered to youth who, for a variety of reasons, might otherwise have dropped out of school.

GIPSY is now housed in a house on Kanaka Road behind the Ganges school complex, which school officials consider a better location as it is closer to school facilities.

The trustees agreed the Community Society could use the cabin for a youth centre.

The Community Centre, the original location of Lady Minto Hospital, was turned over to the school district when the hospital moved to its current location. The

district leased the facility to the Community Society and recently sold it the building and grounds.

Jordan-Knox also informed the board on recent progress toward developing a youth program for the island.

Salt Spring's director to the Capital Regional District Julia Atkins offered a \$10,000 grant toward renovations of the cabin previously used by GIPSY. A further \$7,500 grant to cover costs of a youth peer counselling training program could come from the Vancouver Foundation.

Local support for the concept comes from service clubs: Rotary, Lions, the Legion, and from the Anglican Church. The Parks and Recreation Commission has agreed to allot staff time toward programming and supervision.

The society itself would allot time for the alcohol and drug youth worker to aid in supervision and development of the youth program, while the staff of the centre would donate time to administration duties.

Application for a grant has gone to the provincial alcohol and drug program to allow hiring of a youth counsellor and to cover the budget for youth peer counsellors. Part of the grant would also be used for main-

Commission seeks forestry input

Public input solicited by the British Columbia Forests Resources Commission has been assembled and released by the commission in its *Options Paper* summary report.

The report looks at several aspects of forest resource management and presents options for dealing with each area in the future. Written response to the *Options Paper* is now invited

Workshops to discuss forestry is-

sues and options are also planned for seven B.C. communities in October and November. The Lower Mainland and Parksville are the two workshop locations planned in southwestern B.C. Based on further information received, a final report will be issued by the commission in the spring of 1991.

According to the *Options Paper*, most people responding to the BCFRC wanted further refinement of

the land management system to improve forest stewardship for all values and uses.

Environmental quality and community stability were cited by the public as important considerations in land management. It was also felt that land use classifications should reflect and rank all forest values and consider biogeoclimatic zones and regional diversity.

Concern about the present forest tenure system allowing harvesting companies to use Crown lands without overall forest management responsibilities was high, says the report. It outlines several potential modifications requiring further response.

Tree farm licences could be expanded to permit licence holders to "roll over" volume-based quotas into area-based TFLs. Forest management agreements could be included in current and future TFLs. Such agreements would make harvesters responsible for managing all values of a forest.

All present licence holders could reduce the area of their TFLs with a resource management agreement in place, making forest use available to

Hold the wisecracks. Election time — municipal variety — is upon us.

We, the rock folk, hold this truth to be self-evident: we bear the right to be represented by our chosen few.

Of course, there are times in the course of human events on these rocks when sundry and more individuals assume the mantle of representation, whether we want them talking for us or not.

Mayhap, the way out of the quandary lies in a universal election. I'll vote for you if you vote for me. Islanders will pair off and vote for their twin. When the ballots are counted, everyone will have one vote for them. Then, we can all indulge the island penchant for speaking out on any issue.

Seriously, if one can be serious about elections, we'll discover, the day after ballots are cast and counted, only three of every ten of us have bothered to indulge in the whimsy of voting.

Go ahead islanders: prove me wrong.

And more's the pity, really. We, the rock folk, are relatively helpless in the face of political decisions, whether the decisions are made at a meeting of the Islands Trust, the Capital Region or the school board — except at election time.

Debate makes for a healthy situation

The choice rests with us. To be sure, we'll have campaigns for the Trust and the CRD but in the arena which affects us and the future most closely, the school board, we'll see acclamations.

Charles Hingston, school trustee for nine years, board chairman for a number of those years and veteran of a stint as chairman of the provincial trustees group as well, stands as a firm believer in contested elections.

Candidates, when the elections are contested, must state publicly their positions on and ideas of school board efforts. The various issues are aired and the voters can choose which candidate best expresses their concepts of those issues.

The debate, says Hingston, makes for a healthy situation and can result in an active atmosphere when the trustees gather to contemplate matters educational.

Every decision of the school board ripples through the local education system with direct effects on how our children learn. And how our children learn, now, affects how our world evolves in the future.

One-issue CRD vote?

Meanwhile, heat threatens the other two races.

The campaigns for Trust on the Penders, North and South, should prove interesting. Needless to say, but it will be said, the Salt Spring effort will supply more than passing interest to casual observers all over the map.

The CRD vote, both on Salt Spring and the Outer Islands, will feature garbage. Not that those who seek office will be speaking rubbish, the issue will be whether we pile our garbage on the rocks or ship it to the dump at Hartland Road.

Both campaigns threaten to become focused on single issues and that ain't as it should be.

At the CRD level, the islands are looked upon as unwanted addendum to the region. Island affairs, for the most part, are dealt with in a less than friendly manner. Jokes about island life and attitudes prevail.

On any given issue, the wishes of islanders come secondary to the dictates of those who have not taken the time to look beyond the seemingly discordant clamour on the islands.

Ensure island voice is heeded

At the Trust level, falling trees will litter the campaign landscape. Forestry, its care and feeding, occupies other minds than those on the Islands Trust. To be sure, the Trust has attempted in the past to put some semblance of sanity on logging these rocks. But to no avail.

Did anyone notice how quickly the provincial cabinet acted on the Trust call for a logging moratorium?

The Islands Trust stands for more than just an obstruction to the use of chainsaws. The Trust should be concerned with the quality of life here-about. Land use, and how it affects today and the days to come, should centre Trust debates. Trees are but a small portion of the issues of how island land should be used.

Perceptions exist on the real or imagined lack of substance afforded island affairs by both the CRD and the Trust. The individuals who are chosen face two tasks. They must not only come up with a method of gathering consensus on various issues, they must convince islanders they'll speak to that consensus.

Then they have to carry the message to the CRD and the Trust to ensure the voice of the islands is heeded.

Island life thrives on an equal measure of free-form anarchy and accepted restriction. Many don't understand how such a mix works. Unfortunately for islanders, some of those folk who don't understand the contradiction of island life, live here and

tenance and utilities in the renovated building.

Jordan-Knox explained what comes next in the process. She will call the committee to a meeting to determine if sufficient funds are available and to determine if funding will continue.

"We want to do it so that it's successful," she said. "We want it set up right so it doesn't collapse."

She referred to plans made in the past to help Salt Spring youth which began with a flourish and ended in disappointment when funding dried up.

She indicated that if secure funding could be assured, both youth and adults would be involved "in the planning and in making it happen."

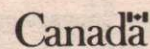

Continuing Education presents "foodsafe"

Continuing Education will offer the Ministry of Health's Foodsafe course on Salt Spring as part of its fall program.

Foodsafe is a sanitation program for all public food handlers in the province. It was developed for industry members wanting to improve their employees' knowledge of safe food preparation and food-borne diseases.

The course is divided into two levels. The basic course for employees will be offered on Monday, October 22 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Harbour House Hotel banquet room. Managers and food preparation staff can take the advanced course on October 23 from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Sheri Nielson will be the instructor for both classes.

"This course is for all people who handle food for public consumption," she said. "This includes dishwashers, sales staff, cooks — everyone in the restaurant industry as well as grocers, butchers and bakers in retail food sales, and hospital and care facility staff."

The basic course addresses microbiology, food-borne illnesses, and the importance of personal hygiene and health. Storage, preparation, serving and dispensing of food is also discussed.

Participants in the advanced level course will learn about food poisoning and protection, housekeeping and pest control. Facilities and equipment and management of sanitary practices in a food service operation are other course topics.

All people who pass Foodsafe receive certificates and are registered with the B.C. Ministry of Health. The cost for each course is \$45.

History research discussed

At their first meeting of the season, more than 40 members of the S.S.I. Historical Society enjoyed a talk by Ruth Sandwell, aural (sound) history expert, who discussed her methods of researching and recording island history.

Interspersing the prepared address with short segments from taped recordings of talks with pioneers, Sandwell displayed the patience required of a researcher, and showed some of the difficulties inherent in working with the recording apparatus while encouraging people to talk about "the old days" or the old ways,

which, when put into context, enrich the island mosaic.

The nodding of heads and sudden bursts of laughter indicated the close attention her audience paid to the taped interviews. It showed their personal recognition of events, nodding at a man who spent much of his childhood with lumbering, instead of attending school, and another who ran a sawmill cutting railroad ties that were sent world-wide. They smiled in sympathy with a woman's remark that in winter the farmhouse was cold and they moved to Victoria for the months of January and February, and in agreement with another's story about walking miles to school only to have to walk home again and get on with the chores as well as homework, before bedtime.

Sandwell was given warm thanks at the conclusion of her talk and it was noted that she is a part-time resident of Salt Spring.

Tony Farr, a member of the board

of directors, who had been serving as the society's historian, expressed himself as very pleased with this expanded program of aural history.

Sandwell gained her Master's degree in history at the University of Victoria. She worked on the Historical Atlas for Canada, for the Vancouver Historical Society's historical atlas, and on the Vancouver Centennial Bibliography Project. Her involvement with urban research, as in Vancouver, is being enriched by this opportunity to record rural island life, she indicated.

Refreshments were served and memberships in the society renewed. The president of the S.S.I. Historical Society is John Crofton, vice-president is Peggy Tolson, secretary, Mary Davidson and treasurer, Mort Stratton. Its membership shows a cross-section of islanders with one interest, Salt Spring and its people, past and present.

communities, individuals and wood-lot associations. The report also suggests the possibility of all current and future tenure licences being put up for bid, with a restriction on the sale, transfer and amalgamation of licences.

Tree farm licences presently govern harvesting rights and forest land management in 25-year agreements between a forest company and the provincial government.

With respect to timber harvesting methods, three options are presented by the commission. The current status — natural forests being primarily clear-cut and replaced with managed stands — could be maintained. Option B is the use of selective logging, where possible, and no harvesting in other areas. Sensitivity to "a much wider range of concerns" and consideration of tree species and biogeoclimatic areas is the third option.

The economic impact of the forest industry is also discussed in the *Options Paper*. The commission says community stability from sustained employment and greater local control of forest land was of public concern. Increasing community management of forests is put forth as a detailed option.

Public education of forestry issues and the education of foresters and forest workers are also addressed in the report.

Noting "good information is the key to informed debate," the commission says the availability of unbiased information must be increased. Improvement of university and college forestry programs to reflect more intensive forest management practices is suggested in the report. Educating all people employed by the forest industry in basic forestry practices is another possibility.

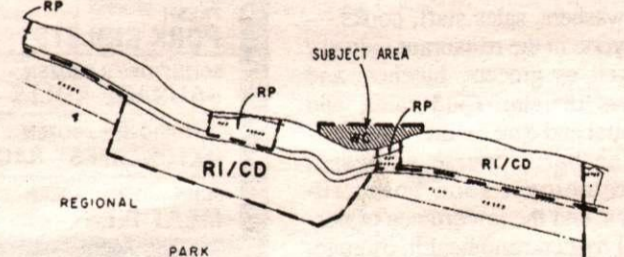

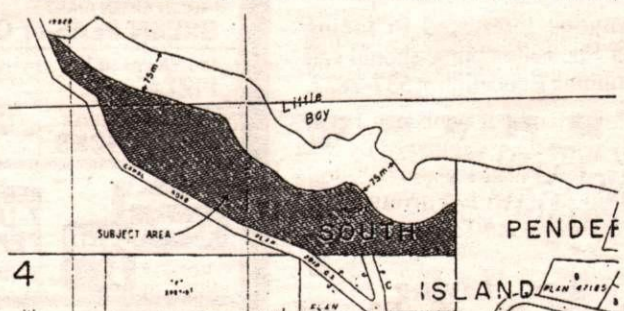
