Amateur operators test radio material

Members of the Salt Spring Amateur Radio Club have been busy this week testing their handheld radios at key locations on the island.

The purpose of the test is to make sure amateur radio equipment can be operated at or near the location without it interfering with radios already in place. A small handheld radio transmitter is used in the vicinity of an antenna, and at the same time an operator listens inside the building to make sure the signal is not picked up on the receiver.

All tests were successful and radio amateurs were pleased by the cooperation and interest shown at each location.

Many municipalities in B.C. have already erected fixed emergency antennas on key buildings, so that an amateur radio station can be quickly set up there should the Emergency Coordinator require it. The sites for an antenna are most often the firehall and the local hospital. The small, vertical antenna used is commercially built and installed by local contractors.

Radio amateurs point out that their equipment is not a substitute for the radios owned and operated by the RCMP, Coast Guard, etc. Those authorities will continue to make use of their own handheld radios and base sets. Instead, amateurs offer a message-carrying service both for the Island Emergency Coordinator and for the general public.

The amateurs' most important role is to provide a radio link between the Operations Centre and Response teams at the site of a disaster. At the centre will be a complete radio station with back-up emergency power, and communications equipment that will connect Salt Spring not only with other islands but with the mainland, as well as with all the countries of the world.

The cost of the equipment, which has yet to be purchased, will be about \$4,000, of which \$2,000 has already been received in the form of a grant from the Capital Regional District.

Meanwhile, local radio amateurs are helping authorities to work out an emergency plan which will have, in part, an effective back-up communications system, useful to the coordinator in providing a radio link to other response teams, and in giving residents a message-carrying service.

A sign dilemma

Use of election signs threatened to become a tempest in a teapot on Salt Spring.

Chamber of Commerce president Glenn Moores indicated he was asked to seek an agreement from various candidates for municipal office to refrain from using road signs.

He contacted Islands Trust candidates who agreed to honour the request. However, when he talked to Jack Frazer, candidate for the Capitol Regional District, the phone call came too late.

Frazer said his campaign workers had ordered signs and because he was relatively unknown, the signs would be used.

At that point, Moores decided if one CRD candidate used road signs, the other candidate should have the same privilege. He did not bother to contact Julia Atkins, who is seeking re-election as the island's CRD director.

When the Frazer camp began to put up signs, Atkins' workers followed suit.

However, complaints about the use of signs prompted a discussion within her organization and they

decided not to leave the road signs up.

Signs for both sides, however, can be seen on the sides of the local bus and supporters have smaller signs for use in windows of their vehicles.

"I have no trouble with that," said Atkins.

Frazer told a public meeting his signs would remain up until after election day when they would be gathered up and donated for use by Fulford Hall.

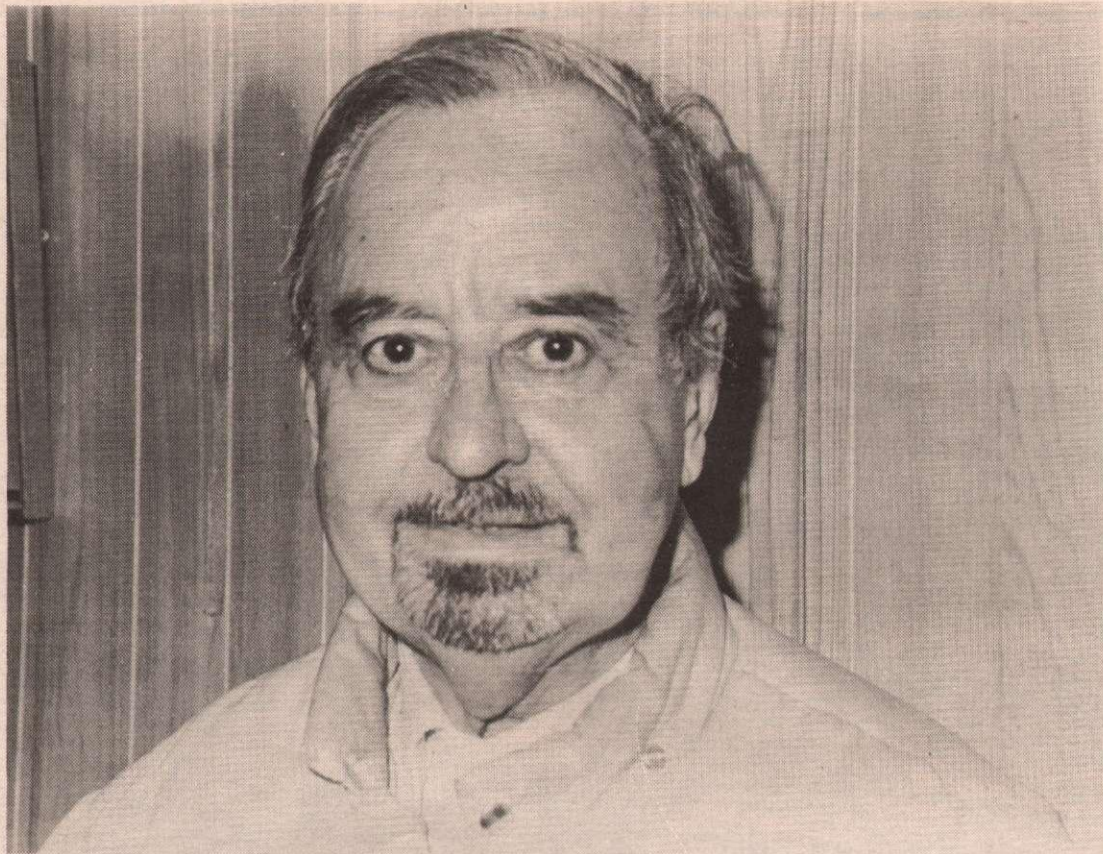

Toys can be dropped off at Patterson's in Fulford, Community Centre or North Salt Spring Waterworks office at Central.

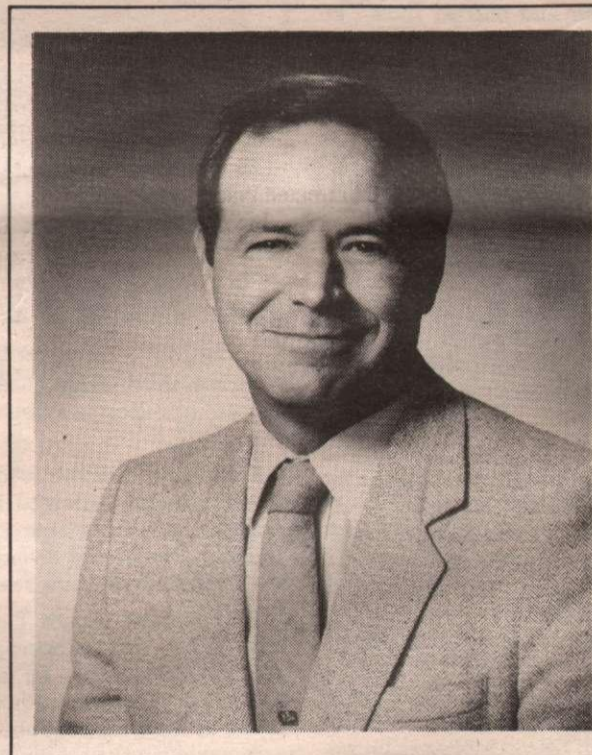

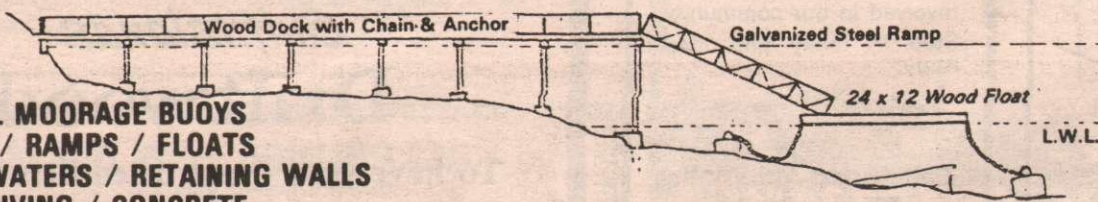

Regarding the federal government plan to slaughter all the bison in Alberta's Wood Buffalo National Park:

Could someone run that by me again?

The way I understand it, there are some 4,200 bison wandering around in the wilderness area 'way up on the sub-arctic forehead of Alberta. The bison comprise one of the last — and the largest — free-roaming herd in the world.

Our government wants them dead. All of them. Why? Because, according to the government, about 50 per cent of the herd is infected with either bovine brucellosis, tuberculosis or a combination of the two. They're concerned that the diseases could jump from the afflicted bison to healthy domestic cattle herds — and ultimately, to you and me.

A legitimate concern if Wood Buffalo National Park sat in the dairy country of rural southwestern Ontario, or if it bordered on cattle range near the foothills of the Rockies.

Obscene and stupid

It doesn't. Wood Buffalo National Park is 17,500 square miles of primal wilderness between Lake Athabasca and Great Slave Lake. Finding a Holstein or a Hereford in Wood Buffalo Park is about as likely as finding a herd of bison grazing on the astro-turf of Skydome.

Even if there was a cattle ranch next door, it would be a lot cheaper and simpler to string a fence or clear a buffer zone around the park than to try and track down and destroy such a colossal herd of animals.

Think of it: four thousand, two hundred shy and survival-savvy wild animals with a wilderness area almost as big as Nova Scotia to hide out in. How many hunters will the government send in? How will they possibly know if they killed every last buffalo? They've allocated 20 million dollars for this macabre massacre. If they miss just one infected buffalo, they might as well have thrown the 20 million bucks in Great Slave Lake.

Will wipe out most diverse bison gene pool

Ecologists are protesting Ottawa's apocalyptic approach to the "bison problem," not just because it's obscene, but because it's stupid. After all, the government's been aware of the situation for some time. Since 1925, in fact, when government officials knowingly introduced infected bison to the area.

That was 65 years ago. The bison, infected or not, have thrived. And today, after the better part of a century, there has not been a single documented case of one cow or one human being contracting brucellosis or tuberculosis from the animals in the park.

This is wildlife management?

It's ironic. When white men first came to the western plains they found them carpeted with herds of buffalo as far as the eye could see. Our rifles soon fixed that. People used to shoot the buffalo from moving trains, not even stopping to take the meat or the hides. In no time, the huge herds were just a memory. Soon the only place you could see bison was in zoos, or stuffed in museums or, in winter, rendered into coats to keep Winnipeg cops warm. That's partly why Wood Buffalo National Park was created — as a refuge for the largest remaining herd of bison in the world.

Now we're bringing out the rifles again -- for the animals' own good. Of course. You bet.

What of the wolves in the park? What are they supposed to eat once the bison are gone? Well, the feds say if the wolves turn to moose or fur-bearing (read commercially valuable) animals then the wolves too will be slaughtered.

A suggestion to Ottawa: why don't you end the controversy over Wood Buffalo Park once and for all?

Why don't you just pave it?

Admission to the auction at Central Hall is a non-perishable food item. Pre-auction entertainment at 7:30 p.m. will relax the audience into a benevolent bidding mood, and coffee and desserts will be available.

Arvid Chalmers is head auctioneer for the seventh annual Christmas auction and Dave Phillips will serve as his "apprentice."

Some of the items already donated to the auction include firewood, crafts, paintings, bed and breakfast accommodation, a dinner cruise and merchandise from books to hardware.

One of the auction organizers Lois Phillips says "the response has been

totally positive and absolutely overwhelming with people contributing."

Last year's benefit raised \$4,700 for the year-round food bank and annual Christmas hamper program operated by the Community Centre Society. About 100 families received Christmas hampers in 1989.

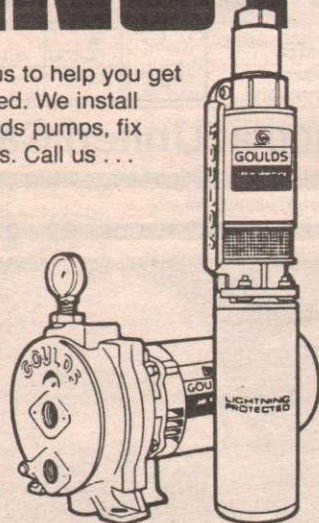

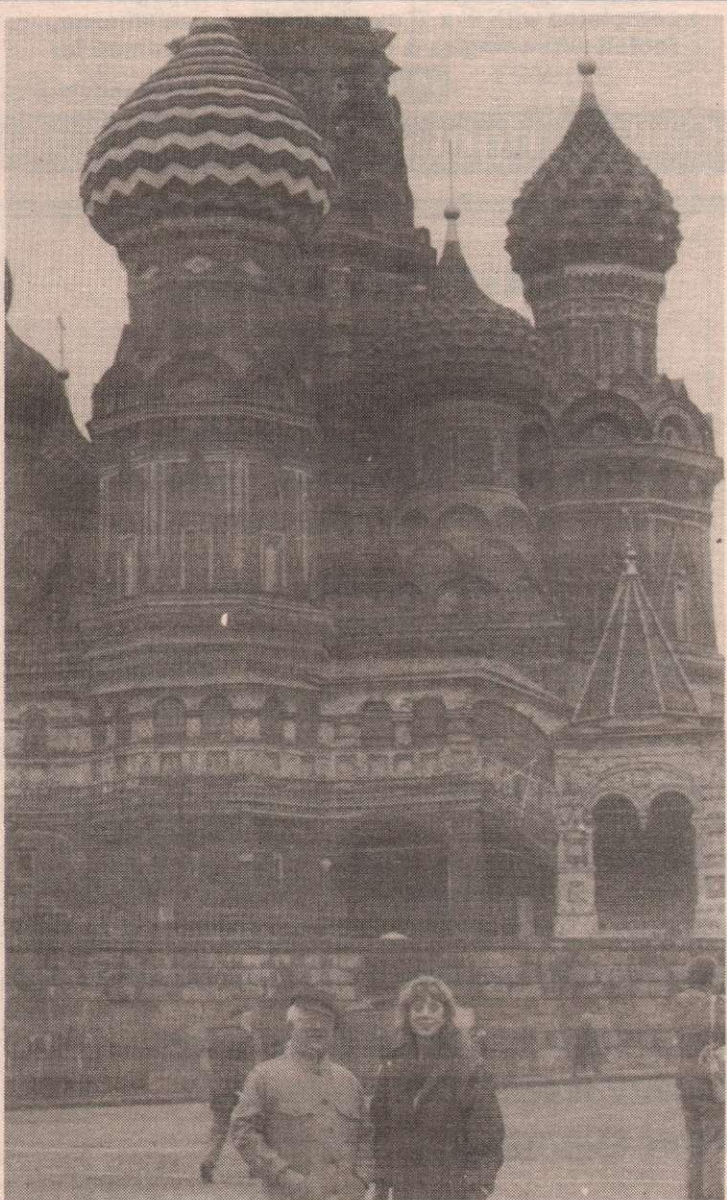

Defibrillation machine

Service clubs working to purchase equipment

Emergency treatment within minutes of a heart attack can mean the difference between life and death.

On Salt Spring, ambulance crews called to offer assistance to a heart attack victim are limited to resuscitation at the scene and must race to Lady Minto Hospital to use a defibrillation machine.

If the ambulance was equipped with a portable defibrillator, emergency treatment could begin much earlier and chances of survival would increase. The cost of such a machine is \$7,500. Various service clubs and community groups on Salt Spring are looking at raising money to purchase a portable defibrillator for use by ambulance crews.

Currently, two of 12 local ambulance attendants are qualified to use such a machine but training is available so each emergency response team member could use it.

When attached to a heart attack victim, the machine gives a readout on heart action and, based on that information, ambulance attendants would know how to proceed.

In jurisdictions where portable defibrillators form part of ambulance equipment, survival rates of heart attack victims have shown a marked increase.

Just another number!

AIDS misinformation is prevalent

While much information is available to explain what AIDS is, just as much misinformation is circulating.

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is the final step in infection caused by Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). Death results in almost all cases of people who progress to AIDS. The illness disrupts the body's immune system which fights disease.

HIV infection is transmitted from person to person through sexual intercourse with an infected person, sharing contaminated needles or syringes or by a mother to an unborn child.

HIV infection cannot be transmitted through casual, everyday contact between people such as shaking hands, hugging, crying, coughing, sneezing, swimming in a public swimming pool, toilet seats or other normal means.

Blood donors and recipients, since blood testing began several years ago, cannot acquire the infection because a new needle is used for each donor or recipient. Each pint of donated blood is checked carefully for presence of HIV.

People at greatest risk of infection include homosexual and bisexual men, drug users who share needles or

syringes, haemophiliacs, someone from outside North America, sexual partners of any of the mentioned people or unborn babies.

When an individual contacts HIV, the infection does not show up through testing for up to six months. HIV infection is progressive in that it breaks down the immune system over time until AIDS develops.

Persons infected with HIV do not

normally show symptoms. When, after several years, symptoms do appear, they can be mistaken for many other conditions. When AIDS develops — not everyone with HIV infection develops AIDS — it affects the immune system to such a degree that other diseases, known as "opportunistic infections", take over.

Those infections include

pneumocystis carinii pneumonia as well as brain infection.

AIDS is a growing problem and in some areas of the world has reached epidemic proportions.

The Canadian Public Health Association urges "our best defense is to take action now, to improve our knowledge and adopt safe behaviours to avoid infection."

Bureau suggests caution

Caution is required when dealing with telephone solicitors and special phone and television offers, says the Better Business Bureau.

The bureau has issued warnings to consumers who receive calls from telemarketers or postcards urging a call to a certain number for a bargain.

People are advised to never give out their credit card number over the phone, if they did not initiate the call, and to get details of any offer in writing.

The bureau says one can protect himself by being suspicious and asking, "why would someone you don't know offer you an opportunity they claim could triple your income?" If in doubt, the bureau says, just hang up the phone.

Using "900" numbers is also not a wise idea, says the BBB. Unlike toll-free "800" numbers, the caller is billed for "900" numbers at rates much higher than regular long distance rates and can run from \$2 to \$45 per minute.

"If you are calling a 900 number, find out first how much the call will cost and remember to add that to the product's price. It might be a lot more expensive than you think," says the bureau.

The Better Business Bureau also reminds consumers to watch out for television "infomercials" — commercials that are presented like normal tv shows. Infomercials are usually 30 minutes long and resemble a talk show or investigative program. While many infomercials identify themselves as advertisements, others do not.

"Be suspicious if one product is the only topic of discussion on the show and also the only advertiser, especially if they offer a number to call to place an order" says the

Mayhaps all the information, if delivered at a steady pace, could cause sensory overload in any particular islander who actually listened or read it all.

One group of islanders say one thing. Another group, naturally, say another. The major domos at the Capital Region kick in with other phrases and the provincial environment minister changes the rules, the better to prolong the game.

Actually, the heat generated when the two CRD candidates and their supporters faced off in the Activity Centre got a bit much. It was a relief to listen to words of ironic wisdom from Deitrich Luth.

Whether agreeing with him or not, the people at that meeting agreed with each other that he possesses a quick wit. Perhaps if voters lack faith in him for the Trust, the Hysterical Society will move him from behind the curtain to centre stage in their next adventure for the island.

Disagreed politely on several issues

When pondering the point, acting and politics aren't really that far apart.

The meeting of the school board candidates, Thursday evening, can best be described as a meeting of school board candidates. They disagreed politely on several issues but agreed profusely on many more.

The best debate occurred, not at that all-candidates meeting, but at a steering committee meeting for the new high school when an attempt to define the term community school got a tad out of hand.

Too bad the participants didn't save their show for the more public occasion on Thursday.

More dead spots than the Bermuda Triangle

Islanders with long memories, look askance at rhetoric claiming community involvement. We have a community activity centre in the Ganges elementary school. But just try to get the space for a community activity.

The stage, merely a cave in one wall of the gymnasium, possesses more dead spots than the Bermuda Triangle. Performers attempting to be heard while more than 10 feet from the edge of the stage face an impossible task.

Designers of the activity centre never heard of the word acoustics.

But then again, maybe this time they'll do it differently. One hopes.

It can be done, however, as proven in other places. The new high school can become an integral part of community life. But the effort will require some changes in thought, in the community and at the school board level.

But back to more mundane items.

Seventeen folk have proven me partially wrong. They chase eight elected positions and voters truly have a choice. Now it's up to voters to finish the task.

Will any one give odds that no more than 40 per cent of the eligible voters turn up? A larger turn-out at the polls will, indeed, bring true humility to this space.

Hydro urges Gulf Islanders to conserve energy

With Middle East oil supplies under threat and the possibility of a recession looming, Gulf Island residents are doing just the right thing says Wally Craig, Hydro's Vancouver Island marketing manager.

Craig said that the Gulf Islands played an important role in reducing energy consumption on Vancouver Island by 116,000 kilowatt hours over the past year.

"Since Hydro's Power Smart conservation programs were launched

about a year ago, the island has saved enough electricity to power more than 1,100 homes," he said.

Craig explained that Hydro's Power Smart conservation concept, launched in March of 1989, is designed to promote energy savings by applying the right technology in the right place.

"There are hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of energy to be saved on Vancouver Island by both individuals and companies simply by

applying the right technology," he said. "And if difficult economic times are approaching, now is the time to look at energy cost-cutting."

Many of the Power Smart programs involve subsidizing consumers to encourage the right technology. "We have more than 20 different programs ranging from free audits of compressor systems in plants to a \$50 rebate for the purchase of an energy-efficient refrigerator."

He added that Hydro offices

throughout the island are supplied with free Power Smart brochures describing the programs.

"A lot of people question why Hydro would encourage people to decrease the use of the produce it produces," said Craig, "but the answer is simple: It's economical for Hydro and it reduces the pressure on our environment."

He said that for every year we can put off building a major electrical generating project, we can save the

taxpayers of B.C. hundreds of millions of dollars in interest charges alone.

"Not only that, but by deferring or reducing projects, we minimize the impact on the environment," he said.

British Columbians are big power users, said Craig, and demand is growing quickly — about three per cent a year right now.

He said Hydro's long-term strategy is to work toward establishing a new energy efficiency ethic.

Flu Vaccine suggested

Autumn has arrived, and with it comes the flu season. The British Columbia Lung Association (BCLA) recently issued a flu alert and suggested preventive measures to help avoid this year's virus.

Influenza is a serious respiratory infection caused by a virus that usually produces symptoms much more severe than the common cold. According to Kelly Ablog-Morant, BCLA director of health education and program services, there are two ways to prevent getting the flu: immunization and luck. Neither are fail-safe, but with the former you get better odds.

Without a flu vaccine, individuals may contract the virus and suffer from a variety of symptoms, including a dry cough, chills, watery eyes, sniffles, and a fever.

Influenza is one of the most contagious viruses known to medical science. One simply has to be in the same room as somebody with influenza to be a candidate for the illness.

"When a flu victim coughs, sneezes or even talks," said Ablog-Morant, "the virus is sent out into the air where other people are likely to breathe it in. Furthermore, the flu virus is active and incubating in your system before you start to feel ill, so that before you know you have it, you are already contagious."

As a result, influenza can rapidly spread to the extent that 25 per cent of the population or more usually contracts the disease during an outbreak.

The Lung Association urges seniors and others suffering from chronic medical conditions to see their doctors to receive the vaccine.

Ablog-Morant adds, "the best way for individuals to survive this year's outbreak of the flu is to develop an immunity. The best way you can do that is with a vaccine."

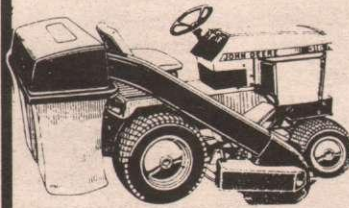

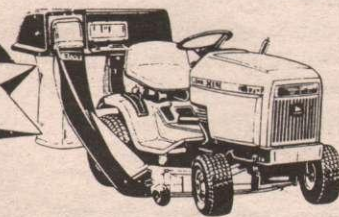

DOWN THE YEARS

Thirty Years Ago

- Mrs. H. Barner replaced Mrs. E.I. Scoones on the Gulf Islands school board at its annual meeting held on Galiano. Chairman George Heinekey's report revealed that all district schools except Salt Spring Elementary and the high school experienced increased enrolment from 1959 to 1960.
- Remembrance Day was observed on Salt Spring with a service at the Cenotaph. Honourable chaplain of the Salt Spring Legion G.H. Holmes conducted the service.
- Steve Morrison, Morrie Akerman and Ted Akerman won matches at a boxing card in Surrey. Six members of the Salt Spring Island Amateur Boxing Club participated in the event.
- Walter Mailey and Bob Atkins met with recreation and conservation minister Earle C. Westwood to discuss the unemployment problem on Salt Spring Island. They were told work could be available during the coming winter months on the park site donated by G.C. Mouat.

Twenty-Five Years Ago

- A scale model of the proposed Ganges boat basin and Centennial park was unveiled by M.F. Peiler, chairman of the committee managing the project. The model included a children's playground, space for lawn bowling and outdoor checkers and a clamshell path with benches around the Cenotaph. Completion of the project was set for Canada's centennial year.
- Salt Spring Lions Club officials reported approval of Pioneer Village plans by National Housing Act authorities, clearing the way for construction.
- Scouts and Cubs groups were to be organized on Salt Spring. The Lions Club met with Scouting officials to arrange Sea Scout and Cub divisions.
- The Islands Joint Council Transportation committee was studying proposed changes to Gulf Islands ferry schedules. The council was rumoured to be recommending removal from the schedule of "things like Monday and Thursday only and except Sundays and holidays and all those other little tricky phrases that sometimes leave us standing open-mouthed watching the last ferry pull out for home."

Twenty Years Ago

- Gulf Islanders could no longer catch a bus to Victoria from the ferry terminal. Vancouver Island Coach

Lines had eliminated the Deep Cove bus which formerly transported foot passengers into the city.

- Four Volkswagen Beetles were "borrowed" by thieves or joy riders on Salt Spring Island. Owners of the cars reported them stolen and subsequently returned without damage. Tools were missing from one of the vehicles. A \$50 reward was offered for information leading to the conviction of the thieves.

- Representatives of the Salt Spring Island Resident Land Developers Association presented a brief to municipal affairs minister Dan Campbell. They said restrictions on island subdivision were exerting hardship on the construction industry.

- Membership at the Salt Spring library stood at 455 people. Regular membership fees were \$1 per year while "sustaining" supporters paid \$5 annually.

Fifteen Years Ago

- Capital Regional District chairman Jim Campbell and planner Michael Bennett narrowly escaped death when the aircraft carrying them from Mayne Island to Victoria plummeted into the waters of Miners Bay and rolled over. They were treated for facial lacerations and bruises.

- Ferries were tied up when a storm hit the islands with torrential rains and winds of up to 70 miles per hour whipping through many areas. Unseasonal lightning also struck a number of spots on Salt Spring Island.

- Gulf Islands School District planned to spend \$1,106,790 on a school building program.

- A referendum on the proposed recreational complex set for election day on November 15 was postponed again. The Salt Spring Recreation Commission recognized preparation would take too long and asked approval of the Capital Regional District to hold the referendum in February.

- Gulf Island voters were getting ready to vote in regional school board elections. On Salt Spring the school board candidates for three vacant seats were Charles Baltzer, Dr. Rob Dixon, Isabel Goodman, Ione Guthrie and Roma Sturdy. Pearl Brau and Edward Thomas Easton were vying for one Mayne Island school board seat. On Saturna, Lorraine Campbell and Thomas Davidson were competing for one seat.

Ten Years Ago

- Ganges' recycling depot would have to find a new home only three months after the Community Society was required to move the shed from

its former location in the K & R parking lot. Permission was granted by Art Hudson to locate the shed behind the liquor store on McPhillips Avenue.

- The creation of leasehold farms covering 969 prime agricultural acres at Burgoyne Bay was proposed in a tentative application before the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee. T.W. Loney and Associates submitted the application to construct an additional 19 homes on Texada Logging Company land partially located in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

- Expenditure of \$4.1 million on the Ganges sewer project was approved by the provincial government.

- Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce reported a record 9,373 registrations at its summer tourist information kiosk in 1980, up from 5,991 the previous year. Tourism committee chairman Doug Foerster commended Marjorie Cuttell and her volunteer staff for their efforts at the booth.

Five Years Ago

- A Salt Spring all-candidates meeting for school board, CRD and islands Trust candidates was characterized as "dull" by some of the 100 people in attendance.

- Pender Island parent Clifford Hunt appealed to the Gulf Islands school board to provide a bus to transport students to the water taxi

landing. The cost of a bus would be roughly the same as payments already made to parents to drive their children to the wharf each day, he reasoned.

- Pat Byrne and Bill Webster were competing for the vacant Islands Trust seat on Salt Spring Island. David Williams and incumbent Hugh Borsman were running for the island's Capital Regional District director position.

Pharmasave accepting all outdated drug vials

Salt Spring residents are being asked to check expiry dates on prescription drug vials in their medicine cabinet and unload outdated ones at Ganges Pharmasave.

As part of National Seniors Safety Week, Pharmasave has organized a "medicine cabinet clearance."

Maureen Ramsey says the purpose of the drive is "to encourage people to get rid of medications they are no longer using." She says outdated medications are "occasionally" dangerous and almost certainly ineffective.

She advises against the hoarding of drugs by people who think they might need them someday.

Pharmasave will donate 10 cents to either the local Seniors for Seniors group or the United Way fund for every vial of outdated drugs received. The choice of charity is decided by donors when they bring in their excess goods.

Ramsey says the Pharmasave regularly disposes of expired vials of prescription drugs. More dangerous varieties are sent to an incinerator.
