Trust will participate in CRD study

Islands Trustees will have a say in regional transportation as they participate in a transportation study being planned by the Capital Regional District.

Highways minister Lyall Hanson announced joint funding between his ministry and the region for a \$500,000 transportation study at a CRD meeting last week. He indicated several highway projects now in progress will proceed, but all other work will halt until the study is completed.

Salt Spring CRD director Julia Atkins said Islands Trust participation in the study would come under local government involvement.

Islands trustee Bob Andrew, who attended the CRD meeting as an observer, said the transportation study would affect Salt Spring over the long term.

"Now the Islands Trust could have a voice in transportation matters in the region," he said.

CRD chairman Frank Leonard outlined the structure of a regional

committee to co-ordinate the study. Committee chairman will be Murray Coell with two subcommittees to carry out phases of the study.

A regional transportation task force will meet with municipal officials, including Islands Trustees, to determine needs of each area of the region. The study is expected to take two years to complete.

Hanson said work which will continue includes upgrading of Pat Bay Highway — MacKenzie Avenue in-

terchange as well as improvements to Pat Bay Highway joining the expanded facility at the Swartz Bay ferry terminal.

Each partner in the study, ministry of highways and the CRD, will contribute \$100,000 for 1991 and share the remainder of estimated study costs over the next two years.

Hanson stressed highway improvements for traffic safety would go ahead as needed.

Septic pit opposition heats up as locals await fisheries' word

If protests by neighbours of a proposed Beddis Road septic dump site, do not impress the environment ministry, a word from the fisheries ministry might.

Salt Spring salmon enhancement coordinator Kathy Reimer said she is reserving judgement on the proposed site — located in the vicinity of Cusheon Creek — until a fisheries official has inspected the area.

Area residents headed up by Margaret Allan and Cec Wakely have circulated a petition protesting the Gulf Islands Septic proposal. Eighty-eight people have signed the document and others have agreed to register their opposition by writing the environment ministry.

Protesters are questioning the implications of locating the pit in a residential neighbourhood and are concerned about odours and in-

tion could be rejected.

Gulf Islands Septic has applied for permission to dump septic waste on a 30-hectare (75 acres) parcel near the end of Beddis Road. The proposed site is covered by a layer of fine sand up to 15 metres (50 feet) deep but is also located near Cusheon Creek.

Gulf Islands Septic owner Ed Peterson said he had measured distances according to environment ministry specifications and the site comes within those guidelines.

When a truck-load is dumped, he indicated, a smell can be detected for up to 10 minutes.

"You do get an odour," he said. "But it doesn't last long."

On average, his truck makes three trips each day to the current site in Burgoyne Valley and the frequency would increase to about five per day during summer months, he explained.

The Burgoyne Bay septic pit site is located on land owned by Texada

"It was a corporate decision," a Texada spokesman said. "Due to the potential liability problem, Texada does not wish to participate in septic disposal in the long term."

Texada informed Peterson of that decision several months ago. He applied for a permit to cover a parcel of land off Musgrave Road but protests brought the application to a halt.

Peterson re-applied with the Beddis Road site as focus.

The proposed septic pit would be located in the Cusheon Creek Valley approximately opposite Arnell Park. The creek flows through the area with the salmon enhancement hatchery downstream.

John Finnie of the environment ministry regional office in Nanaimo said a technical survey of the area would be carried out in June to determine if the site is suitable.

He was unwilling to comment on this particular application at this time but added the survey would look at ground conditions, flow of ground water and note any wells located

Budget — good news, bad news

Rural property tax rates will decrease 24 per cent this year, according to last week's provincial budget. But increases in assessed land values should keep tax bills at the same level as last year.

Recently-appointed finance minister John Jansen unveiled the budget May 21.

Good news to Gulf Islands taxpayers occurs in an increase in the supplemental homeowner's grant. The grant helps cover some school district budget costs. Basic homeowner's grants cover part of school taxes and supplemental grants will now cover 50 per cent of what remains over, increased from 25 per cent last year.

Renters get a break as well. The renters' tax reductions can reach as high as \$225 per year depending on income and is calculated on the yearly tax

CRD approves local recycling

Recycling domestic waste on Salt Spring will become a concerted effort after August 1, with a nod of approval from the Capital Regional District.

CRD directors approved a move allowing the island to opt out of the regional recycling program and set up a pilot project on Salt Spring.

In addressing CRD board members on the issue, Salt Spring director Julia Atkins said, "The proposal represents a new direction for the CRD. It is indeed a pilot project which may well be expanded to other areas of the region."

Recycling on Salt Spring has been carried out under contract to Laidlaw Waste Systems which supplied the recycle bins. After August 1, the Salt Spring recycling group will have full responsibility for the program.

Following construction of a recycle depot on Crown land behind the cement plant on Rainbow Road, the recycle effort will be expanded to include many materials which are not currently accepted.

For instance, plastics will be recycled. Film plastics, such as dry cleaning bags or grocery bags for vegetables, and rigid plastics such as margarine tubs or liquid containers

will be taken in by the depot.

Organizers intend to establish bins in Ganges and Fulford. The bins, said recycling organizer Rick Laing, will be exchanged daily and sorted at the depot.

While many items have a market, other materials such as tin cans will have to be stored at the depot until a market opens up.

The group also intends to accept drywall. It will be bundled for shipment to a drywall recycling company in New Westminster, Laing said.

While the Crown land has not yet been turned over to the CRD, plans for the site will proceed, enabling the recycling effort to be in full gear by August 1.

The range of material to be recycled includes cardboard, office paper, magazines, non-ferrous metals, brush, yard and kitchen waste as well as household hazardous substances.

Capital costs of \$99,240 will be split one-third each by the province, the CRD and the local community. Yearly operating expenses, at a range similar to the approximately \$70,000 paid to Laidlaw last year, will come out of tipping fees at Hartland Road regional garbage dump.

Medical Services Plan premiums will go up. After July 1, single individuals will pay \$35 per month, \$4 more than the \$31 paid now. For couples premiums will be \$62, up \$7 from the current \$55 while families of four or more will chip in \$70, an increase of \$8 above \$62 paid now.

Smokers will feel an added pinch. Provincial tax on a package of 25 cigarettes went up to \$2, an increase

of 34 cents from the \$1.66 before May 22. Rolling-your-own will not save anything with provincial taxes accounting for 6.1 cents per gram, a one cent increase from 5.1 cents per gram.

Sitting at \$16.55 billion, the budget shows a \$365 million deficit. To help keep the deficit at that level, \$839 million was transferred from the Budget Stabilization Fund which was dissolved April 1.

The provincial government used that fund over the past few years to balance the budget.

For each dollar spent in the current budget, 33 cents goes toward health, 27 cents to education and 11 cents to social services. The remaining 29 cents is spread over justice, natural resources, transportation and includes four cents which cover debt interest costs.

In judging the application, his office would consider all comments, for and against the proposal. He indicated a number of protests outlining "social impacts" of the site had been received.


He also noted the ministry would consider but not necessarily act on protests from neighbours if the site proves to be an ideal location. It would take a technical objection outlining potential environmental problems to carry weight, he said.

Houses in the Creekside subdivision downstream from the site are serviced by the Beddis Road waterworks. There are no wells in use in the area, Reimer claimed.

The application would allow for up to 31 cubic metres (8,190 gallons) of septic waste per day. It would take seven trips each day by the septic truck to reach that total.

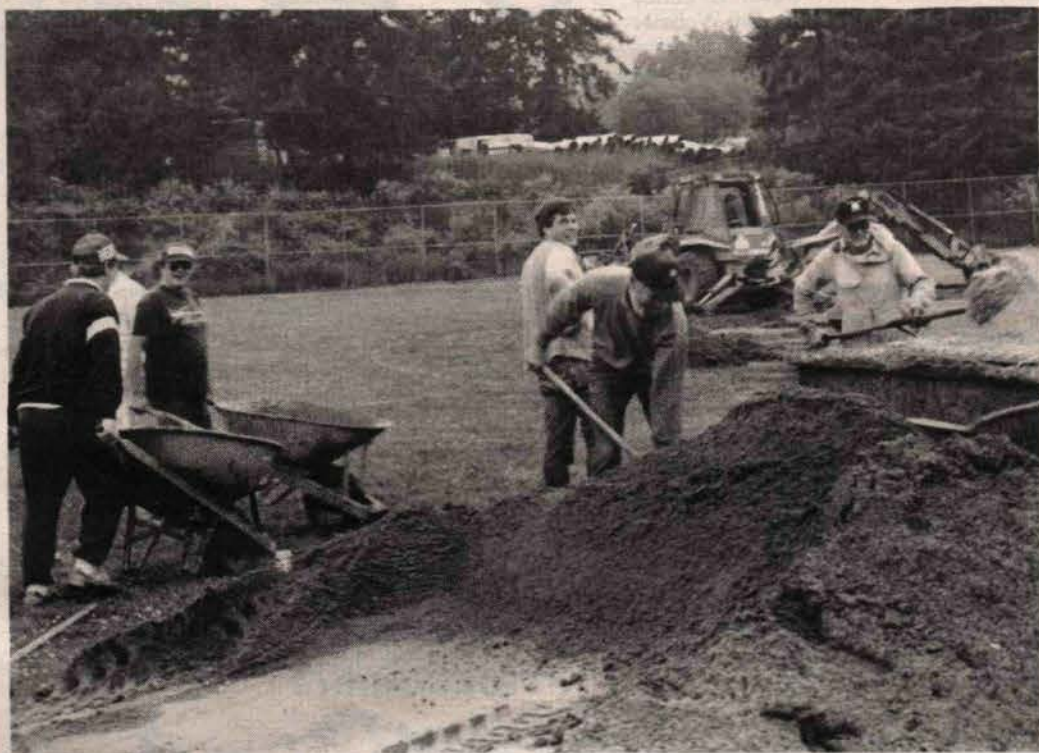

9,200 signatures ineffective in save Heal Lake campaign

"Shopping centre petitions" containing 9,200 names will not affect the fate of two Capital Regional District solid waste bylaws.

The names were collected by Save Heal Lake proponents but a ruling by CRD executive director Bill Jordan and backed by lawyer Galt Wilson meant the exercise had been in vain.

Jordan did, however, approve 650 counter petitions — including 644 from Salt Spring Island — opposing the bylaws.

"(The bylaws) had nothing to do with Heal Lake," Wilson told CRD board directors last week.

Bylaw 1903, which set out the service area for solid waste management, was initiated because the province had changed the rules and required a solid waste management plan to replace outdated supplementary letters patent.

Bylaw 1905 was established to obtain borrowing authority to cover capital costs of closing the current site and begin initiatives to reduce the amount of garbage entering the Heal Lake area.

Proposals to use the lake area were approved by the environment ministry in January 1989, Wilson pointed out, when the district's solid waste management plan was approved.

He said the petitions of names gathered by the Save Heal Lake group did not meet the format set out by the ministry. The petitions were headed "opposed bylaws 1905 and 1903 and save Heal Lake," which he indicated, created confusion about what the people opposed.

"That is my opinion precisely of what the government was trying to avoid when they passed 797," he said. (797 is the counter petition section of the Municipal Act).

The petitions were aimed at saving the lake and not against the bylaws, he concluded.

Victoria mayor David Turner told the meeting, "Democracy is involving people in an informed way."

He noticed some confusion about the counter petition process at the board table, he stated, and that confusion probably extended to voters, although the "spirit and intent" of

their petitions was clear.

He asked Galt what would happen if the board accepted the petitions.

Galt replied that the district could find itself facing court action for several reasons. If it ignored the acceptable results of the counter petition process or if it ignored the petitions containing 9,200 names, court action could result.

In addition, he pointed out, the ministry of the environment could order the bylaws approved, if needed.

Saanich alderman Carol Pickup said "We face a crisis in waste management."

The people who signed the petitions were misled, she said and called on the board to "get on with what must be done."

"It's unfortunate to have to use Heal Lake," she said, "but I can see no other solution at this point."

CRD directors had approved a bylaw setting out the entire region as a solid waste service area and a second bylaw authorizing a loan of \$22 million to pay for closing the current Hartland Road garbage dump and preparing an extension into the Heal Lake basin.

Opponents of the bylaws were given the opportunity to register counter petitions expressing their opposition. The counter petitions had been checked by municipal affairs official to ensure they met the requirements of the Municipal Act.

To file a counter petition, an opponent had to write a request for one and then file the petition with the CRD by May 6. At that time, Jordan approved 650 counter petitions: four from Saanich voters, two from Metchosin and 644 from Salt Spring Island.

In a memo to board members, CRD chairman Frank Leonard listed the events, beginning in May, 1986, which were "a reflection of the extensive public debate and discussion the issue has been the subject of," he wrote.

To allow opponents of using the Heal Lake area an opportunity to gather support, the board approved a series of three public meetings which were held in February, 1991. The meetings were held in Sidney, Saanich and Langford and attracted

The directors decided opposition to the waste management plan was not sufficient and passed the bylaws which set up the counter petition process.

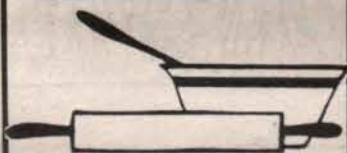
103 people. In addition, 53 submissions were presented.

The bylaws are currently in the hands of the inspector of municipalities for approval and will come back to the CRD for final approval.

CRD grant unfair to businesses

Food vendors at the Saturday Farmer's Market in Ganges recently benefited from a Capital Regional District grant of \$375 which subsidized costs of a mandatory food handling course.

We question the use of taxpayers' money to fund commercial ventures that directly benefit individual entrepreneurs. It seems unfair to island service organizations and local businesses which must pay the full cost of the course.

The money, granted to the Market Vendors' Association, subsidized the cost of a food handling course for vendors. With the grant in hand, food vendors paid only \$20 of the \$48 course cost.

Of the 90 permit-holding vendors in the market, 12 are food vendors. Market Vendors Association treasurer Ed Price was unsure if all had taken the course.

The course will be mandatory by next year for anyone handling food. This includes restaurants, church social organizers, fund-raising teas and community banquets such as Beaver Point Hall's annual bean supper.

Numerous islanders such as Legion Auxiliary members have already taken the course. In this case, the legion carried the burden of cost.

A CRD memo dated April 21, 1991, indicates "grants in aid are not limited to specific services but can be given to any organization which benefits the community."

We agree with CRD director Julia Atkins' hope that the course will improve food handling at the market. We also agree that improved food handling will benefit the community.

However, we believe subsidies for mandatory requirements such as the food handling course should be given evenly across the board — or not at all.

Poetry doesn't rate as "newspaper style"

Three months into journalism classes, I finally received my first "real" newspaper assignment — an article for the University of Victoria's *Martlet*.

I don't recall the thrust of the story. I do remember riding the library elevator past floors and floors of books to the very top level, where I was steered into a plush burgundy office full of grim looking, oil-painted men staring from the walls.

The oak desk stationed solidly in the centre of the room was too large for me to reach across it and shake the white-haired gentleman's hand.

Everything was so quiet as I whispered my first questions.

Although journalism classes had mostly focused on the history of journalism and ancient methods of printing (starting with the most useful information on paper-making in ancient China), I knew the three-C's rule (clear, concrete, and concise) and I understood the "lead" paragraph concept.

I hand-wrote one draft, typed

completed a prize-winning article that I submitted the following day.

Carly Simon's *Anticipation* beat on my brain for three full days prior to publication of the *Martlet*. I grabbed a copy and skimmed the pages, certain my story was a near-front pager.

I probably missed it the first time because it was so unrecognizable. The essence remained, but paragraphs had been moved around and sentences rewritten. My first encounter with The Editor.

As a reporter, I came to expect my copy would be adjusted. Improvement was measured by the diminishing number of changes. Sometimes The Editor would inadvertently

cause I'd get blamed for the mistake. More often, however, he'd tighten it up just enough to make it brilliant — and of course I'd get the glory.

People who submit items to the *Driftwood* are sometimes miffed (and other times downright snarly) by changes made to their "works of art." Unfortunately, many people believe "anyone" can write an article.

(I have received resumes that actually cite publication of poetry as useful reporter job experience.)

If I walked onto a construction site and started banging nails and sawing plywood, I expect the contractor would politely stop me and eventually un-bang every nail I'd touched. Otherwise the house would collapse

for constructing a newspaper article — is very different from fiction, essays, research papers, magazine articles and most definitely, poetry. The style has been created and evolves with a purpose — to draw the reader into the story, give pertinent information at the start and assume he may not read the entire piece.

Most newspapers in Canada follow CP (Canadian Press) Style which is documented in a thick, frequently updated book. We follow little style items such as spelling out numbers from one to nine and using numerical figures for numbers 10 and above.

The "lay writer" does not know this. And if he submits something to the *Driftwood*, someone (either me or a reporter) is going to change it into CP style.

Grammar: some errors are left in letters to the editor — if they are minor or add character (as in a child's letter). I'm sure the silent majority appreciates grammatical changes to letters. However, I have received messages that indicate the opposite:

from my letter in last week's *Driftwood*.

Makes you want to take up sky-diving without a parachute.

Occasionally words do get changed. Libel is a good reason for this. (I doubt they serve double chocolate muffins in women's correctional centres.) Illegible handwritten scrawls provide another possible reason.

Newspaper stories do not contain judgements or opinion. Therefore, adjectives in submitted works are usually deleted. (It's dangerous to write "the delicious meal" because someone might not have found it delicious at all.)

Unfortunately, all newspapers make mistakes. To err is human and humans operate newspapers. But the humans that run this newspaper are certainly not out "to get" any segment of this community. We try to meet a wide variety of interests that reflect a very diverse and highly dynamic community. We welcome submissions, news tips and story

Parking

On May 16, Salt Spring islanders were told they might as well push their cars off Mt. Maxwell because there just ain't gonna be room for 'em in Ganges.

The Islands Trust, Capital Regional District and Ministry of Highways commissioned a study which concludes that the best way to solve parking congestion in Ganges is to simply eliminate about half of the on-street public parking stalls.

Bravo! A 50 per cent reduction in public parking!

While we're at it, let's eliminate 50 per cent of existing sidewalks to solve pedestrian congestion. And to save time, let's eliminate 50 per cent of the downtown businesses . . . oh, but maybe that will be the end result anyway.

Get real, guys — island shoppers will tell you, if you had asked, that

Ganges needs better parking not less.

Sure, existing parking is not perfect and, in some cases, it's downright dangerous. No one, including me, wants anyone to get hurt. But if you think parking is dangerous today, think what it could become if the squeeze on parking gets tighter. Double parking? Blocked accesses? Parking on sidewalks?

The highways department has always held the view that its business is to move traffic and to hell with parking and sidewalks. The RCMP are the people who have to attend at accidents and who can fault them for wanting to eliminate any opportunity to replace bad parking with better? Ganges is sentenced to a lifetime of congestion.

The report leaves a hotel, the Ship's Anchor, with two parking spaces, the Pharmasave with none at its front door and reductions at the Red and White. The angle parking in front of Gulf Islands Realty is in clear, clear view of vehicles coming into Ganges and should remain, contrary to what the report states. Other locations deserve a second look — in some instances the moving of a yellow line can make the difference.

Downtown Ganges is finally coming together as a community. Improvements in Centennial Park, various beautification initiatives and the Linear Park project have all made Ganges a nicer place to shop and work. The proposed squeeze on parking increases the pressure for alternative shopping opportunities, ie of-island shopping and mounting pressure for sprawling centres outside the village.

Why are the CRD and Islands Trust stabbing Ganges in the back? Let's be creative. Let's talk. Let's solve this problem together. Slashing existing parking won't untangle our current snarl; it will only pave the way for future problems.

VICTORIA — The latest provincial budget is probably the best any government could have produced in uncertain economic times. With revenues falling and the cost of government services rising, someone's got to pay, and that someone is you, the taxpayer.

Once again, the "Average Joe" is taking it on the nose. So is the not-so-average Joe, but he's a little better at rolling with the punches.

By the time the record \$16.5 billion provincial budget is through picking your pocket, you will be substantially poorer. Here's what's in store for you:

Health care premiums will cost an additional \$96 a year for families, \$72 a year for couples or \$48 a year for single persons.

The provincial tax on a package of 25 cigarettes is going up by 34 cents, costing the pack-a-day smoker another \$125.10 cents a year.

Corporate income tax goes up by one percentage point to 15 per cent and \$80-a-year-plus wage earners will pay a surtax on their income tax ranging from \$100 to \$300 a year.

In addition to that, a multitude of fines, fees and licences are being increased "to keep in line with program costs," according to Finance Minister John Jansen.

Creative bookkeeping makes difference

That's the bad news. The really bad news is that there will be a budget deficit of \$395 million, according to the government, or \$1.2 billion, according to a lot of other people. Creative bookkeeping makes up the difference between those two figures.

When you get your next government propaganda leaflet, as you most assuredly will, you will see that the official estimated budget deficit is a mere \$395 million, rather low, compared with Ontario's \$9.7 billion deficit.

But there's more to the deficit than meets the eye. The \$395 million figure was arrived at after the transfer of \$839 million into general revenue from the infamous Budget Stabilization Fund. That's the fund which, according to most fiscal experts, excluding those who work for the government, never had any money in it.

And, in fact, if you look carefully, you'll find that the money which was transferred from the B.S. Fund was borrowed in the first place. All of which means that if you disregard the fudging, the actual budget deficit for the 1991-92 fiscal year will be about \$1.2 billion.

Still the best budget possible

Still, as I said at the outset, it's probably the best budget possible, considering British Columbia is still trying to climb out of the latest recession.

In his budget speech, Jansen points out that 24,000 more people were working in British Columbia in April this year than in April 1990, compared with the disappearance of 332,000 jobs in the rest of Canada during that same time period.

Nor will vital government services suffer as a result of the budget. Health care spending will go up by nearly \$600 million to a total of \$5.4 billion. That's about \$1,680 for each man, woman and child in British Columbia.

Education funding will reach \$3.3 billion this fiscal year, an increase of \$232 million.

The social services and housing ministry will spend nearly \$2 billion. That's an increase of \$273 million.

Spending by the environment ministry and the Sustainable Environment Fund will total \$184 million. New programs include vehicle emission testing in the Lower Mainland and province-wide tire and acid battery recycle programs.

Fiscal responsibility slogan

Putting the best slant possible on the budget, Jansen calls it a demonstration of the government's "commitment to deliver caring, compassionate and fair government," and that will, no doubt, be one of the Sacred slogans in the forthcoming election campaign. The other one will be a reference to fiscal responsibility. The theme was already present in the budget speech.

"Excessive federal spending and borrowing have damaged our economy. They have fuelled high interest rates that kept the Canadian dollar high, harming our exporters and helping to tip us into the current recession."

The budget isn't an "election budget" in the traditional sense. It doesn't make wild promises; it doesn't try to soften the voters up with the usual assortment of goodies, but it's not a bad budget to take into an election campaign.

The Sacred will have many handicaps in the coming election, not the least of which is their former leader, but I don't think that this budget will be a liability. Except for the B.S. Fund fudging, the budget is nothing to be ashamed of.

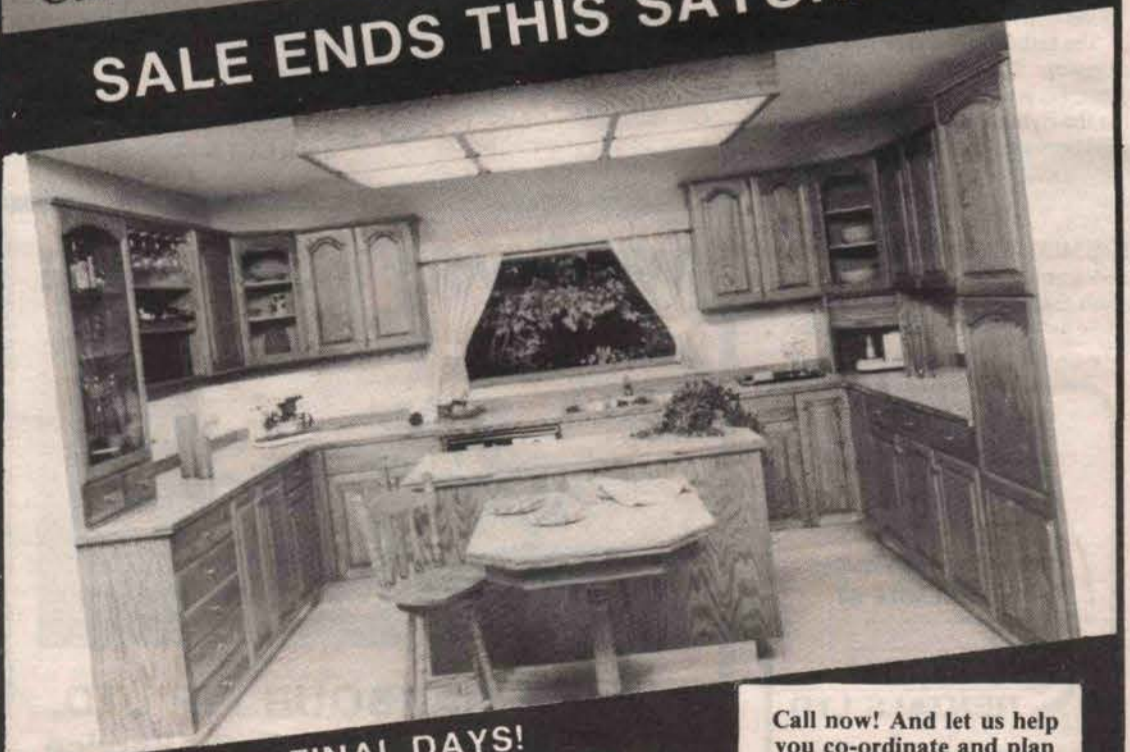

Couvelier addresses clubs

British Columbia and Quebec are the two provinces which best understand the needs of Canada, Social Credit leadership hopeful Mel Couvelier told a Salt Spring audience last week.

The MLA for Saanich and the Islands spoke to a joint meeting of the Salt Spring Lions and Rotary Clubs last week.

Part of the message he brought centred on rewriting the Canadian constitution, which Couvelier maintained must be done by Quebec and B.C. as leaders in the effort.

A roadblock to national unity is the mounting debt load, he stated.

Part of this problem comes from duplication of services between different levels of government, he added.

"We've got to stop wasting your money in stupid duplications." He questioned why there is both a federal and provincial ministry of parks when the major difference seems to be how high wood is piled at camp sites.

Originally, provinces were charged with providing "people ser-

vices" while the federal government cared for international relations. Over the years, the federal government began designing people programs on a national scale with shared funding from the provinces. While the programs are national, Couvelier said, no politician is responsible when the programs don't work as planned.

He said if a health program is not working at the provincial level, a provincial politician can blame the federal government. It, in turn, denies culpability because it funds the program while the province administers it.

Couvelier maintains the problem can be solved by determining which level of government can provide the service most effectively.

He went on to say he has detected a new "federal spirit of cooperation." He said the feds now claim to support "disentanglement" of service duplications between governments.

Divisions in the country are magnified when provincial governments ignore the needs of other provinces, he stated.

The deficit set by the Ontario government does not help, he added. When the richest province must go deeply into debt, the "have-not" provinces suffer.

The debt load will not go away overnight, he said, but will require effort over a number of years.

"All politicians must agree to do the same thing at the same time in Canada."

"We're a team in this country," he stated, "except for the largest province. The march to local empowerment is inevitable. It's happening all over the world."

Government must be simplified, he concluded, "so people know which politician is responsible for what."

Reform Party gathers for annual meeting

A video presentation of Reform Party leader Preston Manning's "Great Speech" was on the agenda at the Salt Spring Island Reform Party's annual general meeting.

The meeting, chaired by outgoing president Phil Fischer, took place at Central Hall, May 16, beginning at 7 p.m.

Secretary Judy Willet read the previous general meeting's minutes which were subsequently approved. The treasurer's report, by John Volc, was also read and approved.

A new slate of officers was elected: president, Jack Frazer; vice-president, Phil Fischer; secretary, Judy Willet; treasurer, John Volc; directors: David Stone, Vince Richards, Gary Lundy, Ron Clinch, Doug Dobson, Neville Smith, Don Clarkson.

Guest speaker was the newly elected Saanich and Gulf Islands Constituency President Lorraine Kirk. He updated members on Saanich constituency happenings. Those present were impressed with Kirk.

"He has great people-to-people skills, is personable and a doer," one member noted.

The group then watched the video of Preston Manning's "Great Speech" made in April at Assembly 91 in Saskatoon. Members described it as a "beacon of light in an otherwise politically fogged-in Canada."

Islanders encouraged to register in census

Gulf Islanders should expect a visit from an inquisitive neighbour this week.

Local census representatives will be dropping off Statistics Canada questionnaires at all island homes until June 3. A census of Canada's population is completed every five years.

June 4 is "Census Day" — when a snapshot of Canada is taken from the results of census forms. People are asked to complete questionnaires as of June 4. Four out of five forms are brief and request basic data. Every fifth household receives a more detailed questionnaire.

Data collected by the census method is essential for a multitude of important planning services and analysis of societal trends. Health care, education and transportation policies, for example, cannot be

formed without accurate information from Statistics Canada.

Census representatives can assist with questionnaire completion. All questions must be answered by law, and all information is kept confidential.

If you require assistance or clarification about the census form or any aspect of the census, or if you do not receive a form or want to make alternate arrangements for pick-up or delivery, help is readily available.

Answers are toll-free from the census telephone assistance service number at 1-800-267-1991. For more direct contact on Salt Spring, call area census commissioner Shilo Zylbergold at 537-4125. 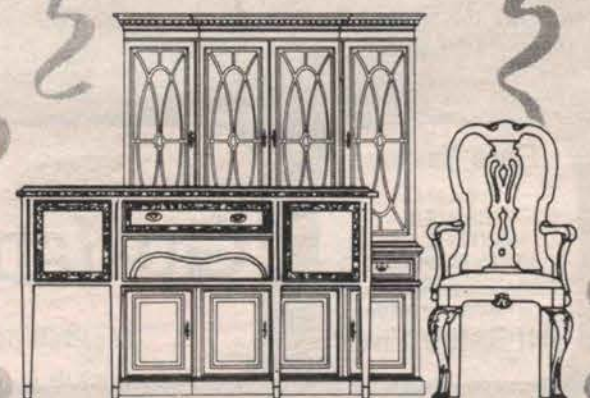

District approves grants

SSI loggers question accounts of logging

Who has cut what on Galiano Island was questioned last week after two stories on the issue appeared in *Driftwood*.

Ted and Pat Akerman said "heavy logging" is not taking place on property they recently bought from MacMillan Bloedel. Ted and his crew are selectively logging on about 20 acres of the 104-acre parcel, they said. They also wanted to confirm that while Pat is co-owner of the property, he is not involved in the actual logging.

Ron Spencer told *Driftwood* last Thursday that while he may remove a maximum of 200 acres of trees from the 293 acres he purchased, only 40 have been cleared in one spot to date.

Meanwhile, *Driftwood* Galiano correspondent Alistair Ross said the Galiano Island Trust Committee public hearing on Bylaws 82, 84 and 85 was "well-attended" at the Activity Centre on Monday evening.

The bylaws aim to maintain the former MacMillan Bloedel holdings on Galiano as managed forest land.

Bylaws pass without opposition

Four of seven bylaws recently considered by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee received no official public opposition.

Bylaws concerning Channel Ridge subdivision's village plan, correction of zoning boundaries in Bullman Road subdivision and one affecting preservation of Metchosin soil areas received second and third reading by the local committee after a May 13 public hearing.

A bylaw defining Trust agricultural land policy in Salt Spring's Official Community Plan was sent back to staff after receiving some criticism.

Bylaw 255 — guidelines for village area development in Channel Ridge caused little concern itself. A few residents asked questions about sewage disposal plans, road upgrading and the potential number of dwelling units within the village area.

Mark Lindholm, president of Channel Ridge Properties Limited, told Agnes Bacon the plan allows for construction of 302 townhouses, single family dwellings or combination of such "units" within the 75 acre development permit area.

The Official Community Plan amendment on agricultural policy in Bylaw 276 received questioning by some residents. That combined with trustees' concerns and requested alterations from the agricultural ministry led to it being returned to staff for minor revisions.

John Wilcox spoke in favour of the "intent" of the proposed bylaw but questioned a clause prohibiting "intensive" food production activities causing potential "stress" in designated areas.

Trustees Bob Andrew and John Stepaniuk agreed the clause should be re-examined. Stepaniuk said "it is much too broad and would cause problems for farmers and food producers."

Bylaw 278 corrected errors made in creating zoning boundaries in the Bullman Road subdivision. It was approved without opposition.

However, resident Colin Bisset asked that diagrams showing subject areas on a Notice of Public Hearing be made more clear in future. He observed that affected roads and property were "almost impossible to identify" in the notice.

A bylaw allowing some flexibility of lot size in case of potential subdivision while concurrently preserving Metchosin soil areas on several parcels of Salt Spring agricultural land was passed with commendation by some community members.

Merv Walde and Norm Mout spoke in favour of Bylaw 282. Mout said he "complimented the Trust and planner (Tony Quin) in going ahead to this point in making something

Islands Trust sets budget: \$1.8 million covers islands

Budget figures for 1991-92 have been released by the Islands Trust. Estimated revenue of \$1.8 million will cover expenses to run Trust services on 13 islands, plus operation of Trust Council and the Trust Fund Board.

Property tax levies on all islands will raise \$1,165,000 for the Trust and the municipal affairs ministry will provide \$494,145. A 1990-91 surplus appropriation of \$90,570, plus \$30,000 in interest income and \$30,000 in fees and sales collected complete revenues for this year.

The \$1,165,000 property tax levy figure is established by the provincial government.

The \$494,145 grant provided by municipal affairs will be spent solely on running Trust Council and its executive committee — at \$340,072 — and the Trust Fund Board (\$154,073). Trust chairman Carol Martin explained in a prepared release that provincial funds are allocated for protection of the broader provincial interest in the Trust area.

The \$340,072 figure will include monies required to produce the Trust

Policy Statement, which Martin said "will be used to guide the Trust in its decision-making and planning, ensuring that the mandate is fairly and consistently interpreted and followed."

Martin said the budget was formed only after "council deliberated for many hours during several meetings over the goal of meeting the needs and expectations of its Trust area constituents and of the public of B.C. while, at the same time, working within the parameters

of anticipated freezes by the province of both the local tax level and the annual contribution made by the ministry toward the Trust's program which protects the provincial interest."

Council passed its first budget bylaw as an independent body at a May 4 meeting in Victoria. Martin requested the information not be published until release of the provincial government budget to avoid any appearance of a "budget leak."

Health office on hold

Planning for a Capital Regional District health office on Salt Spring has again been delayed.

The issue was recently discussed by CRD health officials and representatives from Lady Minto Hospital and Greenwoods on Salt Spring.

Those present agreed the building should be located near the two island health facilities, but CRD officials wanted to know what groups would use the building.

Lady Minto board chairman Gordon English said the CRD could take over the little-used nurses residence as a health office. The hospital board previously indicated it had plans for the residence, but English said the cost of the proposed health centre prompted a changed of mind.

Renovations to the nurses residence would amount to less money than the proposed capital cost of a new building, he said. CRD plans call for capital expenditure of \$447,000 on the health facility.

The matter of user groups was referred to the Salt Spring Health Council. Each of the council's 15 agencies was asked to submit a written brief listing space needs in time for a May 28 meeting.

The briefs will be presented to the CRD health office as a rough proposal June 18. The two sides agreed to meet June 25 to discuss the matter further.

The building proposal was recently discussed by the CRD health committee and sent back to Salt Spring for further discussion.

When a health office was first planned in 1990, the cost stood at close to half of current estimates.

However, money earmarked for the Salt Spring health unit was diverted to pay cost overruns on a similar facility in Esquimalt. Under cost-sharing agreements, Salt Spring taxpayers would be liable for 2.8 per cent of the health unit cost, while taxpayers in Saanich, the largest component of the CRD, would cover 28.98 per cent of capital costs.

Plans call for a building of 311 square metres (3,350 square feet) containing private offices, a multi-purpose room and specialty treat-

Alliance meets politicians

Delegates from the Islands Alliance met May 23 with representatives of the Social Credit Party, New Democratic Party, Liberal Party and Green Party to discuss community forestry concerns.

The focus of the Islands Alliance is "community self-determination with environmental responsibility," according to a prepared release.

The alliance represents forestry committees and groups of residents from small islands and coastal communities in the Strait of Georgia and Howe Sound.

It advocates longterm ecologically sustainable land use in our delicate and finite ecosystems. The Islands Alliance is committed to "developing creative strategies to enable diverse human communities to find healthy and sustainable relationships within the natural world."

The alliance believes that residents of local communities must be the primary decision-makers in matters affecting surrounding ecosystems. It also acknowledges the need for over-riding regulations to

ensure the longterm well-being of these ecosystems and the need to recognize the interests of the wider community.

The following areas of concern were raised with political representatives:

- trees and forests must not be assessed for property taxation;
- the removal of land from forestry classification, managed or unmanaged, other than for conservation purposes should provide financial recompense to the taxpayer for the tax breaks owners have received over the years;
- property tax incentives should be available for land held and managed for the conservation of natural ecosystems;
- local communities must be empowered through legislative change to make decisions about their local forest.

The release concluded by noting, "political will and political action are necessary to ensure the longterm well-being of our communities."

Postal price increase delayed

An expected June 1, 1991 price increase for *Gulf Islands Driftwood* subscriptions will be delayed until March 1, 1992.

The increase was tied to a planned increase in Canada Post rates for community newspapers. That increase has been delayed to next March as well.

Community newspapers were informed last December that an increase would be initiated March 1, 1991. In some cases costs for mailing newspapers would have risen between 800 and 1,000 per cent. *Driftwood's* rates for off-island subscribers would have gone from \$31.03 per year to \$50.95.

Community newspapers across Canada lobbied extensively for a delay because many had developed subscription drives late last year to allow readers to renew without paying the goods and services tax. In addition to individual lobbying by publishers, the resources of regional and national newspaper associations were used to convince politicians that the increase timing was too short to allow proper planning.

Driftwood publisher Joyce Carlson said she was pleased to hear the announcement by Communications Minister Perrin Beatty that the request for a delay had been ap-

proved.

"We now have time to plan for such an increase and inform our subscribers more fully."

She also said she appreciated the time and effort expended by Lynn Hunter, Saanich and the Islands Member of Parliament.

Currently a reader subsidy allows

newspapers to mail issues to readers within a 65-kilometre zone of their offices at no charge. That will be eliminated in March 1994.

For more than 100 years, subsidies have been available for readers of publications such as community newspapers, daily newspapers, special interest newspapers and magazines.

Salt Spring's transportation committee is changing its direction.

The committee's interim chairman Kathy Scarfo says members have been meeting almost weekly to complete the "housework" of redefining the group and its priorities.

As a result, the committee will be officially "re-mandated" by the Salt Spring Islands Trust Committee and hopefully in bylaw form.

The committee was initially charged with handling all island transportation issues. However, as Scarfo explains, dealing with B.C. Ferries took most of the previous committee's energy. With that relationship on a healthy footing, more issues can now be addressed.

"Re-mandating" is underway

Transportation committee travels new path

"Now we need some kind of overall plan for transportation," she says.

One perennial planning problem is the provincial government's separation between ferry and road jurisdiction, says Scarfo. This traditionally creates "borders" between ferry terminals and the roads leading to them.

She sees a potential attitude change indicated by the recent announcement of a joint Capital Regional District-B.C. government study into regional transportation

planning for southern Vancouver Island. Salt Spring's CRD director Julia Atkins will be a member of the committee overseeing that study.

The government also appears to be more in favour of "spreading out" traffic and terminals as recommended by its own Freedom to Move survey, says Scarfo.

One suggestion made to the transportation committee by B.C. Ferries at a recent meeting was that a "Bowen Queen sized ferry" could be tried on the Vesuvius-Crofton route.

The committee believes pressure on Fulford Harbour might be alleviated if more people used the Vesuvius-Crofton option. At the same time, increasing demand on the smaller Salt Spring Queen could be accommodated with a larger boat.

Scarfo says that suggestion will be looked at, noting it requires consideration of the road leading to the Vesuvius terminal. Whether or not that road can handle more vehicular traffic must be determined and if it needs upgrading, to what standard.

She says the community must still decide issues like how wide it wants its roads to be, if a paved shoulder constitutes a "bicycle path" or if separate paths are needed.

In any event, she stresses, "we don't want it (Vesuvius) to become a problem like Fulford."

The Islands Trust's transportation philosophy has been to encourage "adequate service for what the community needs," says Scarfo.

Salt Spring's transportation committee is trying to better define "adequate," acknowledge future demand while recognizing "we don't need a Swartz Bay ferry terminal on Salt Spring right now," she says.

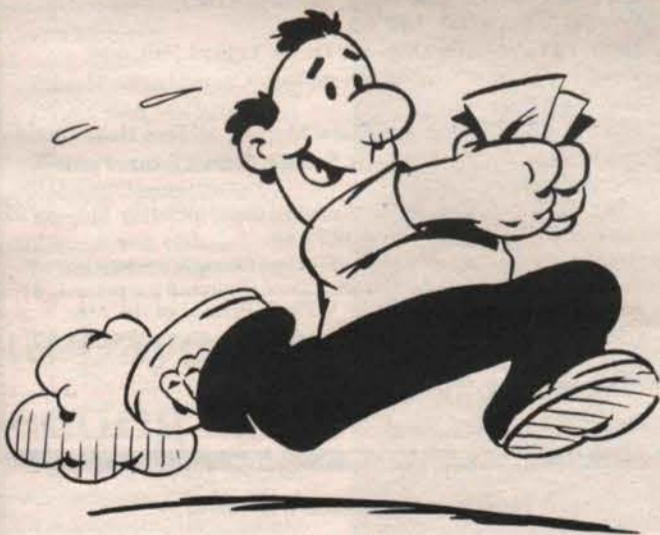

Steps taken beyond love

Loving a person suffering from a dementing illness is not enough, says Moyra Jones. Caregivers, families, the entire community need knowledge to "make the magic happen."

Jones says a two-day "Beyond Love" seminar, planned for Salt Spring June 18 and 19, will provide a warm and supportive atmosphere in which islanders can gain that necessary knowledge.

While "doom and gloom" seem to surround information on dementing illnesses such as Alzheimer's Disease, Jones promises the seminar will focus on positive ways to improve the lives of dementia sufferers and those who care for them.

Jones and local organizers hope the seminar will attract a broad community representation. Sponsored by the B.C. Association of Longterm Care, Beyond Love is offered free to participants. Pre-registration and a \$7 fee for lunches and coffee breaks can be achieved through Greenwoods.

Beyond Love was developed 18 months ago after Jones, who counsels families of dementia sufferers, became "appalled at how sick" caregivers are becoming. These

people — 70 per cent of whom are elderly women — are suffering various illnesses and even death, she says.

"It is a social problem rather than a health problem and it affects the entire community."

Jones says caregivers, families and communities can use skills they already have to effectively deal with dementia patients. But the first step is to become informed. Family members and the community need to understand what the caregiver is combatting.

"Few people are aware of the devastation that accompanies dementia," Jones says, noting patients typically undergo a complete personality change. Caregivers are often reluctant to admit the people they love are making them angry and frustrated.

Once people are informed, they can devise methods of helping the caregiver. Instead of regarding dementia like a medical disease from which the patient will recover, one has to acknowledge the patient will not recover.

"You can't make him well, so you must adapt his environment to his needs."

Most caregivers have raised families in the past, Jones says. Now is the time for them to put those child-rearing skills in reverse. Instead of

withdrawing support as the child grows, the caregiver must increase support as the patient's disease progresses.

The caregiver must also be prepared for the inevitable: the day the patient is admitted to a care facility.

One of Beyond Love's strengths, according to Jones, is its ability to successfully train professionals and "lay people" together. Too often, caregivers leave planning and services to professionals who need and appreciate input from those living with dementia patients.

"Professionals can develop more gentle ways of dealing with caregivers after a connection of this type is made," Jones says. "It sets the stage for more effective change."

Jones hopes the seminar will draw in the community's "movers and shakers"—those individuals making health care decisions such as politicians and service organization leaders.

The spiritual community is especially important to many caregivers who have attended church all their lives, Jones notes. If this group suddenly abandons a caregiver, it could undermine her faith which is in itself a "health sustainer."

In some ways, Jones says, Beyond Love serves to "empower seniors," who are somewhat "disenfranchised" from the community. The program draws on seniors' "wisdom, compassion and organizational skills."

Beyond Love's initial grant allowed presentations in three B.C. areas. It has since been extended to three additional locations, including Ganges.

Jones says a "poignant plea" from local organizers plus interesting island dynamics led the Beyond Love group to choose Ganges as a seminar site. She describes Salt Spring as a retirement community with an indigenous and active (as indicated by the Seniors for Seniors group) older population.

Jones is also interested in the potential of "networking" and inter-island communications; she envisions Salt Spring as a base for Outer Gulf Island connections.

Beyond Love has the ability to change the lives of many Gulf Islanders, Jones says. Most importantly, it offers hope and encouragement. It shows caregivers that their love can be used to enhance their own lives plus the lives of those suffering dementia.

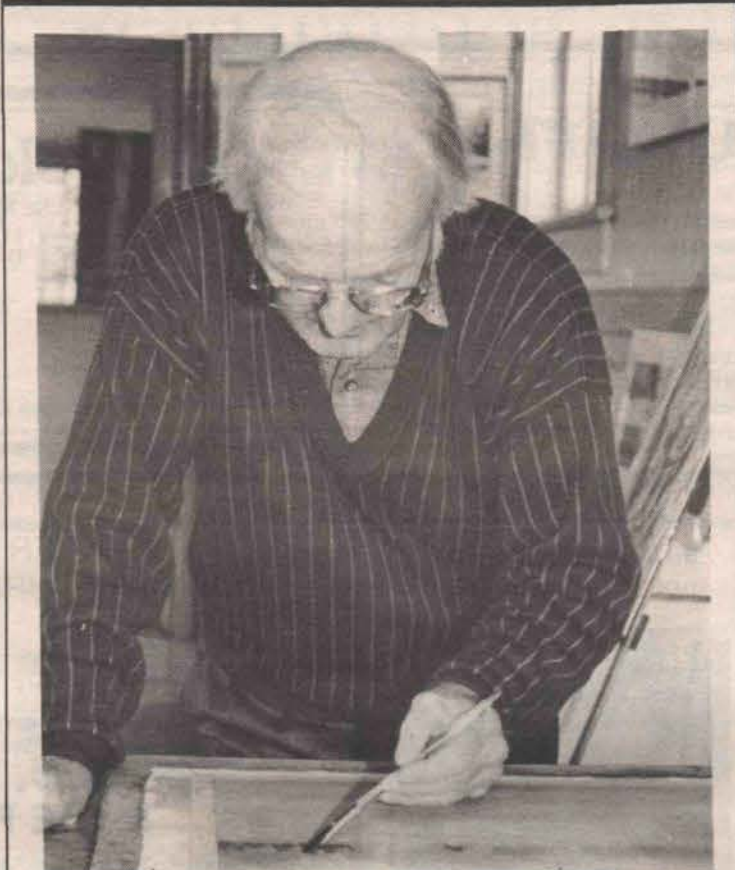
Ratepayers meeting set

Garden is a work of art

The season for going outside and digging in the earth has arrived, another time and place where art and nature come together.

According to *The Compleat Anachronist: Gardens*, "paradise as a garden is a theme that stretches back through antiquity. The images of greenery, rich earth, shade trees and flowing water are the elements of that vision, which has appeared in every major civilization — in its art, literature and religion."

In ancient Egypt, gardeners were honoured and believed to enjoy the fruits of their gardens in the afterlife.

Persian gardens are depicted in literature, paintings, manuscript illustrations and carpets. For centuries stylized images of Persian gardens formed the basis of carpet designs. Throughout history, gardens have been a source of food, beauty and inspiration, providing sacred areas for meditation, communion with nature and healing.

Medieval gardens were often formed of intricate designs. A number of gardens were circular shaped, with raised beds forming patterns such as knots and labyrinths. Garden seats were sometimes created from raised beds with turf seats, comprised of either a grass seat or herb seat, with chamomile, pennyroyal and thyme recommended.

Arbours were often built over a turf seat, supporting climbing plants and providing shade. Fountains fed by springs and various other ornaments were incorporated into the setting.

Marcia Jeanne's Everlasting Summer garden business on Salt Spring Island is a wonderful culmination of the cumulative wisdom of gardening lore. Jeanne has dedicated a large part of her life to the study and cultivation of flowers and herbs.

After originally studying art at college, making beautiful things with plants has become her creative expression.

"I grow my palette, originally with wildflowers and now I've researched seeds and sources enough that I can grow any colour I need," says Jeanne.

Everlasting Summer, located in the south end of the island is a natural paradise. Fertile fields surrounded by large old trees, streams and a pond with abundant wildflowers and plants, form the setting for this home-based business.

A parent with the responsibility of raising two children, Jeanne has managed to build a successful business from scratch. Her work accommodates her family needs as well as her creative passions.

Starting with dried flower arrangements, wreaths and swags, Jeanne is expanding more into the growth and use of herbs. Her latest project is the creation of a butterfly-shaped herb and flower garden.

"People come to Everlasting Summer and they want to walk through my gardens, and so filling that need, providing a beautiful place to walk through is my focus right now."

The large butterfly-shaped garden will have sections for tea herbs, culinary herbs, medicinal herbs and in-

sect repelling herbs. The entrance to the garden will be a long arbour with old, scented, climbing roses covering it.

Jeanne says "gardening touches your soul, especially a beautiful garden. It touches people in ways they haven't known before. City people come here and it changes them."

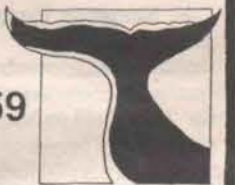

Entertaining the ship's crew, performing in ports of call along the west coast, the Wingnuts eventually began performing at playing house parties, cafes and halls. The two left the navy and sought "greener pastures" in Vancouver in 1982.

In 1986 the Wingnuts expanded to include five musicians. The group won a battle of the bands competition and released a cassette. During this "short but memorable" phase, the band headlined at various local clubs and opened for Tupelo Chainsex, Doug and the Slugs and Long John Baldry.

More recently, Junger and Radelfinger have been featured on local cable television and accompanied Bob's Your Uncle on national tours.

Chilean group will perform message of hope in Ganges

A Chilean group urging pressure on an upcoming United Nations vote is coming to Salt Spring with its acclaimed artistic-political dance and music presentation.

The Folklore Group of the Families of the Disappeared have long been involved in human rights activities in Chile. Group members were some of the first people to question the whereabouts and fate of "disappeared" family members beginning in the early 1970s.

The 15-member group will bring "A Message of Hope" to Ganges United Church on Saturday, June 8 at 8 p.m. under sponsorship of Salt Spring Voice of Women and Festival of the Arts.

Salt Spring found its way onto the group's cross-Canada tour map through local VOW's strong connections to that country. The island group initiated the Canadian promotion and distribution of Chilean arpilleras and have given ongoing support to the women's cooperatives making them.

As VOW member Lynda Jensen notes, this is a rare small-community stop on the group's national tour.

The group's first major international trip is deliberately timely. United Nations delegates will decide this fall whether or not to let stand a controversial amnesty law passed by the regime of former Chilean president General Pinochet. The law currently forbids prosecution of Chileans who tortured and murdered people on behalf of the Pinochet military government.

VOW member Sheila Reid, an initiator of the Salt Spring arpillera project who now lives in Vancouver

is familiar with the Families of the Disappeared movement and experiences of its members.

Most of them have been active in pressuring the Pinochet regime to account for its human rights abuses, she says, and "their lives have become their politics."

Because these people suffered deeply personal losses and the agony of not knowing if their husband, parent or child was dead, detained, how and why, their folklore presentation fuses the personal and political.

The group consists of 12 female performers, two interpreters and a guitarist. As the narrator explains in the performance text: *From pain were born those fast running rivers that nourished us in our hunger and thirst for justice. We opened the door to them with the same love that one opens a book—and we invited them to come in. What we could not say with words we said with music, what we could not demonstrate we wrote with the guitar.*

Interpretive dances, songs and stories describe the Families' emotions, experiences and hope for justice in their country.

One of the dances performed in A Message of Hope is the *cueca sola*, which Reid calls a form of a "national dance" in Chile. A *cueca* is normally executed by a couple, she explains, but since "in so many families there is no partner," — one has "disappeared" — a solo version was developed. It has become a quiet dance of protest in the streets of Chile.

Reid notes how frequently artistic media have been used to express political dissension in Chile where speaking out loud has been so dangerous. Silent dances, street murals and arpilleras all pass on the message from an oppressed society.

She also says that while the folklore presentation deals with a serious subject, it is inspiring and hopeful rather than depressing. Its intent is to increase awareness of human rights abuses in Chile and elsewhere, prevent it from happening anywhere again and not permit amnesty for those who perpetrated abuses during Pinochet's rule.

"These women have dedicated their lives to try to assure this can never happen again," says Reid.

A potluck dinner will also be held at 6 p.m.

Admission at the door for the 8 p.m. show is \$5 for one person or \$10 for a family.

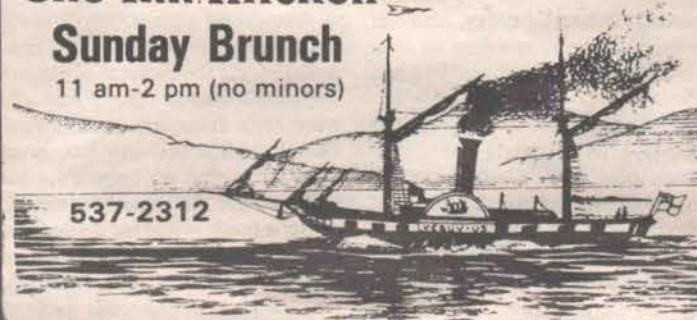

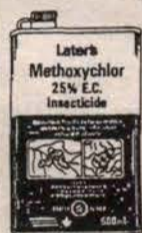

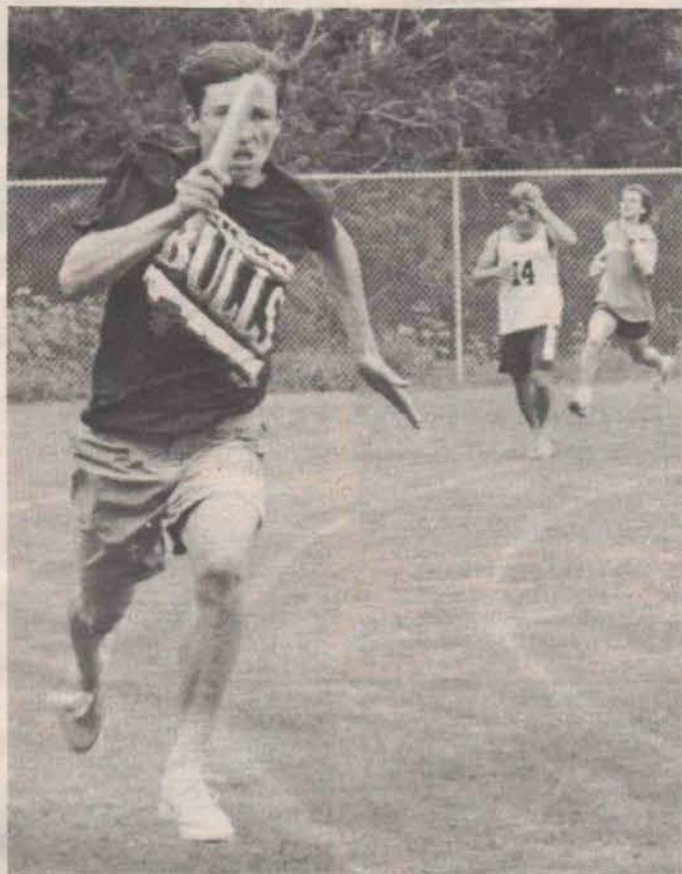
The shoot-out winners were goalie Mike Rowland of Lakehill and
