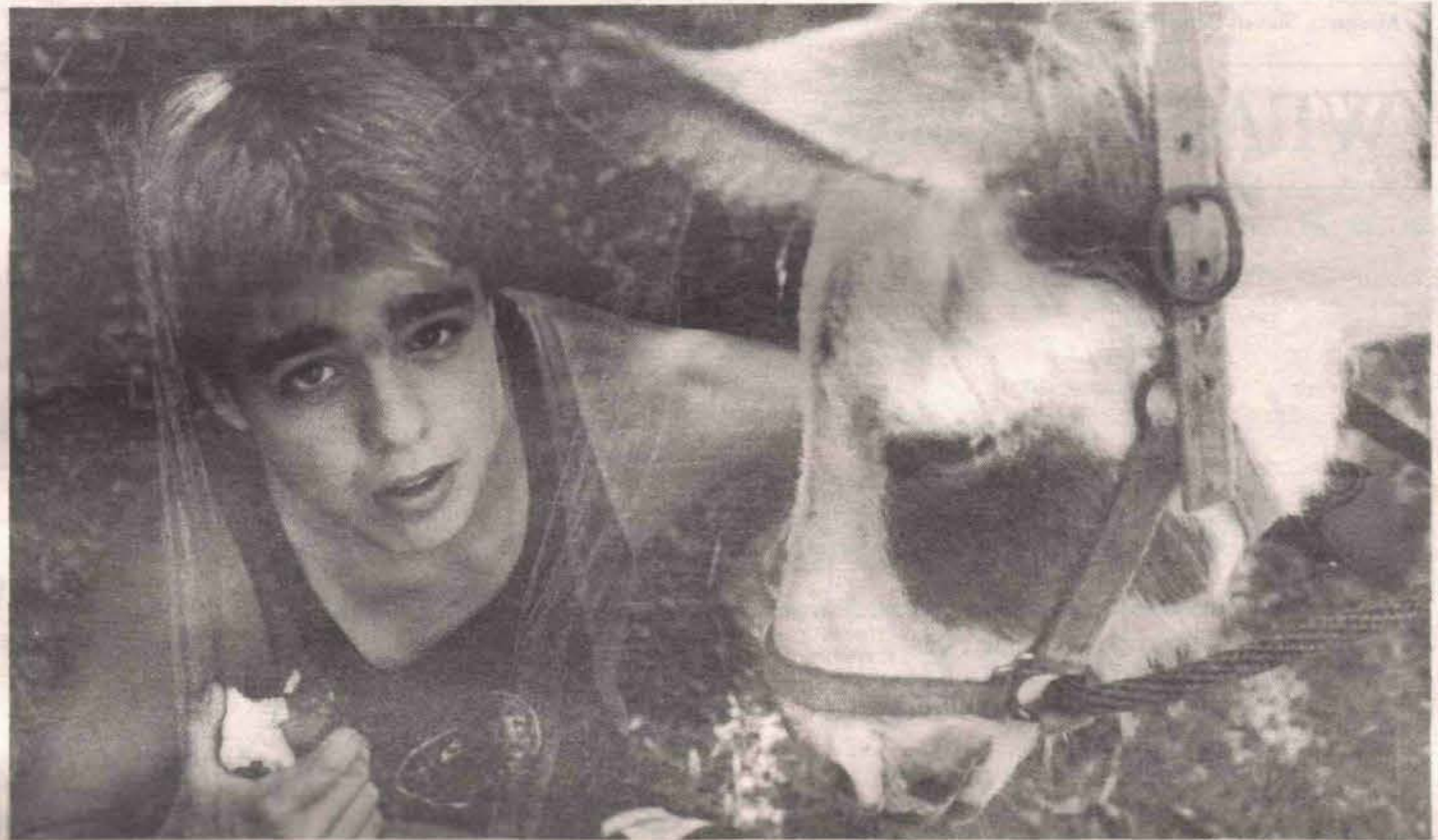

## Drummond Park enjoys Fulford daze

Perfect weather, eager participants and community spirit combined to make Fulford Day a success on Saturday.

Coordinator Dennis O'Hara said an estimated 1,200 to 1,500 people took part in activities at Drummond Park.

Besides being an opportunity for a summer celebration, events successfully raised funds for installation of a well in the park.

The traditional dunk tank raised about \$250 for the cause while providing ample laughs and some sweet revenge for those with polished aim.

Most food items were sold-out, said O'Hara, with the homemade pie sale prompting unprecedented generosity.

He said about \$2,800 was raised from the Fulford Day raffle. First prize winner of a Jack Avison painting was an Ontario resident with

Fulford roots — George Laundry. Strick Aust's ticket gave him second prize of a Kay Caitlin painting. Third prize of Cape Cod chairs went to Victoria resident Peter Barton (not to be confused with island realtor Peter Barton).

A Coast Guard hovercraft landed on the beach in the afternoon and gave an "open house" for over two hours and a fly-in took place on the Cudmores' landing strip.

People also enjoyed live music and the beer garden in the park. About 200 people stretched their fun into the evening at the Jimmy Roy and the Five-Star Hillbillies dance at Fulford Hall.

A planned tug-of-war between "north and south" was postponed until next year, said O'Hara.

## Local MLA chooses not to run Concern over wife's health cited as reason

Saanich and the Islands MLA Mel Couvelier has decided not to seek re-election in the upcoming provincial election campaign because of his wife's health.

"The leadership campaign and its after effects took a heavy toll on the health of my wife Milly, who recently underwent heart surgery. Another difficult campaign within weeks would be too much to ask of someone I love so much," Couvelier said in a statement August 15.

"I think the aftermath of the campaign was the coupe de grace as far as I was concerned," Couvelier told the *Driftwood* Monday. "I was asking too much of my wife. The personal price was too high."

Couvelier said he is no longer taking reporters calls about his decision to not seek re-election. "I'm not anxious to feed the grist mills any longer. My statement said it all.

"I'm not interested in any further public dialogue. It's time to put it all behind us," he said.

Couvelier's plans for the future are uncertain, he said. "I don't know. We'll have to find something to

Couvelier's health probably played a role in Mel Couvelier's decision to step down, but she believes political motivations also affected his decision.

Milly Couvelier has been ill for a long time and it was a few weeks ago he was campaigning for the leadership of his party, a job which would have placed more stress on her, McMurphy said.

"He could probably read the outcome of the election and it wasn't favourable for him," she said.

The departure of a member as well known as Couvelier underscores the disarray of the Social Credit party, said McMurphy.

Bud MacLean, president of the Social Credit riding association, said the party will be holding a meeting to nominate a new candidate September 8 at Sanscha Hall in Sidney.

MacLean said he has heard of only one person who has expressed interest in being nominated so far, "but mostly nominations occur from the floor in that situation."

A number of people have called MacLean expressing interest in running but they wish to

# Annual Fox run slated for Sept. 15

Participants still have nearly a month to get in shape for the 11th Terry Fox Run for Cancer Research on September 15.

Those not wishing to run can walk, wheelchair, pushbuggy, or bicycle, said Salt Spring event organizer Sharlene Betts.

"A lot of people figure that they have to run. They don't have to."

For those who do want to run, Betts said the 10-kilometre course has "a bit of everything, but it is not a real difficult run."

Last year, the event drew 118 participants and raised about \$5,000 for cancer research, Betts said. This year, she hopes to raise \$10,000 and attract 200 participants.

Pledge sheets can be picked up at various island outlets.

Golfers, bowlers, and horseshoe enthusiasts can also join in the effort.

The golf club is holding a golf tournament Friday, September 13. A bowl-a-thon is scheduled for September 14 at 1 a.m. at Leisure Lanes, and Vesuvius Inn manager Jim Walsh is running a horseshoe tournament the same day.

The Terry Fox Run is sponsored by B.C. Hydro and the Gulf Islands Driftwood.

in his late thirties, because her daughter compared the man's age to her own father. The RCMP said the man was tall, wearing a red shirt and blue jeans, clean shaven and the red pick-up is likely an import model.

Ganges police said officers are writing down plate numbers of red pick-up trucks they see on Salt Spring. They have also advised other day-care centres of what happened.

The child would have gone with the man if the sister had not intervened, the mother said.

"You think you are safe on this island. It's very frightening."

RCMP Constable Chris Bomford said he hoped the incident was innocuous "but in this day and age we have to be on our toes."

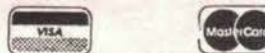

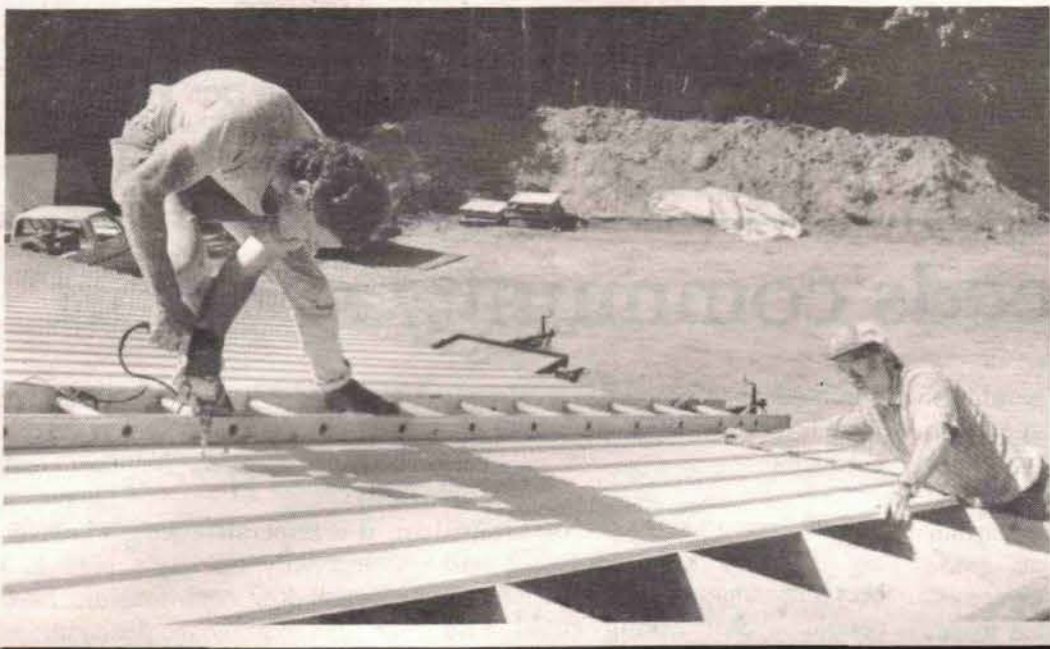

## Request to extend hours opposed by area residents

Croftonbrook residents "strenuously" oppose proposed changes to Harbour House Hotel hours of operation, and have sent a petition signed by 22 residents to the Harbour House, the Liquor Licensing Board, the RCMP, and the Capital Regional District director.

Though most of the Croftonbrook residents interviewed by the *Driftwood* said the noise from the hotel pub does not keep them awake at night, most cited the noise as the reason they signed the petition.

"In the summertime, when the windows and doors are open we get the full blast," Croftonbrook resident Margaret Madigan said. "When the noise is loud it comes right up here to us."

"It's nice music sometimes." Salt Spring Islands Trust planner Tony Quin said the Harbour House has asked for a change to the hours the pub can serve alcohol from 11 a.m. to 1 a.m. to the hours of 12 noon to 2 a.m. Friday and Saturday nights.

Croftonbrook is located behind the Harbour House.

Naidine Sims, also a Croftonbrook resident, said there is a lot of "noise and racket" on Friday and Saturday nights, and at closing time she can hear voices from the parking lot.

"In the middle of the night voices carry. Sometimes you hear it clear as a bell," she said. "When the wind is blowing this way, it is just like the people are in our backyard."

When she lived on the other side of the complex, she noted some pub patrons walked through Croftonbrook to get home.

Quin said the Harbour House proposal has drawn complaints from other area residents as well, and the Islands Trust has sent the Harbour House a letter suggesting it survey residents in a half mile radius of the pub, to get their input.

The Islands Trust has not made a decision on the proposal yet, Quin said.

Tracy Combs, part owner of the Harbour House, said the pub has requested the extension of hours because the pub does not fill up until 11 or 12 p.m. on Friday and Saturday nights "and then (they have) a hell of a time getting them out at 1 a.m."

People like to go to lounges such as Vesuvius, Moby's or the lounge at the Harbour House to eat and drink, and then go to the Harbour House pub to dance, she said.

"The younger crowd does come out later to dance and they would enjoy it."

"We need to do it for our business, but if the majority of people would be in an uproar, then it's best not to bother," Combs said.

To get the extension, the hotel needs approval of the Islands Trust, the CRD and the police, she said.

Now, they have the approval of the RCMP, but not the Islands Trust nor the CRD.

## Jessica is unchanged

Car accident victim Jessica Maron's condition remains "unchanged," according to the Royal Jubilee Hospital's patient information spokesman. The spokesman would not elaborate on that comment.

Maron was discharged from Vancouver General Hospital August 14 and transferred to the Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria.

Seventeen-year-old Jessica was taken to VGH suffering from severe head injuries after a truck she was driving went off Fulford-Ganges Road and struck a power pole July 29.

VGH reported that Jessica was in a coma in its intensive care unit July 31.

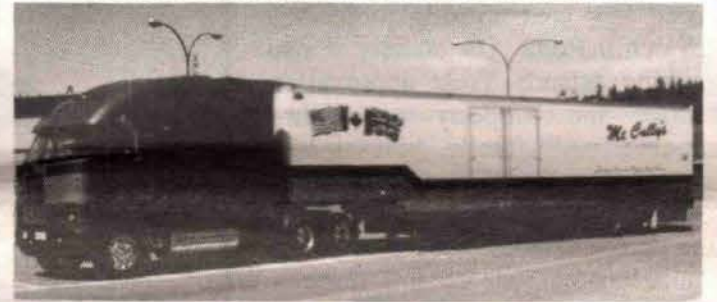

VICTORIA — British Columbia's former attorney general, Bud Smith, made an excellent point last week when he warned that Canada may soon be ruled by an appointed elite rather than duly elected parliamentarians.

The culprit, Smith told the annual Commonwealth Parliamentary Association Conference in Victoria, is the Charter of Rights which has shifted power from politicians to the judiciary.

As an example, Smith cited the recent Supreme Court of Canada ruling that a ban on cigarette advertising violated the rights of tobacco companies.

"Those judges determined the parliament of this country cannot pass laws to regulate one of the greatest social evils of our time," Smith said.

Smokers might argue with Smith's rather dramatic description of an essentially dirty and unhealthy habit, but his point was valid nevertheless.

Parliament should certainly have the right to ban the advertising of a product that has the potential to kill if used as intended, just as parliament has the right to tax smokers to death.

## Constitution inevitably limits rights

Politicians take their chances with the voters. If enough people are upset at what smokers consider unfair and excessive taxation, they may decide to turf out those who do the taxing. And thereby lies the rub Smith spoke of. Judges can't be sacked by the public.

While voters can unseat politicians who go against their directives, they are saddled with a judge for as long as 35 years, Smith said.

It brings me back to the problem inherent in every constitution. By specifying the rights of citizens, a constitution inevitably limits rights.

The British never had a constitution and don't feel any particular need for one. Democracy in the United Kingdom has thrived despite the absence of a constitution or, perhaps, because of it.

Canada did fine before Pierre Elliot Trudeau took it upon himself to patriate our constitution. Under the system of Common Law, which was the basis of our system before the Charter of Rights, Canadians had the right to do everything that wasn't specifically against the law.

## Gives the judiciary enormous rights

Now you might argue the rights of Canadians are limited to only those specified in the Charter of Rights. In cases of disagreement, the courts decide. And that gives the judiciary enormous powers.

Smith cited another recent Supreme Court of Canada ruling which upheld the Saskatchewan government's decision to change electoral boundaries. A lower court had ruled that the changes were unconstitutional.

The Saskatchewan government wanted to change the electoral boundaries in part to appease voters in thinly populated areas who felt that city voters in the same ridings had the upper hand at election time.

We have a similar problem in British Columbia. Northerners have always felt that even though they contribute much more to the province's economy through resource-based industries, they are sadly under-represented in Victoria.

They are right, of course. Ask anyone who lives north of Hope. Fewer than 20 of the 75 ridings are outside the major southern population centres.

Addressing such imbalances is as valid a reason as any to determine electoral boundaries, and I find it somewhat disturbing that in Saskatchewan, the courts even entered that fray. Changing electoral boundaries is a political decision that shouldn't involve the judiciary, but since the advent of the Charter, everything is up for grabs.

## Brings built in personal biases

Supreme Court judges, Smith said, are as likely to bring built-in and personal biases to the table when ruling on social policy issues as any other citizen.

In time, Smith said, Canada will develop a system of checks and balances, but first, he added, the public must realize that the power has shifted from the elected officials to an appointed elite which is not directly responsible to the electorate.

He said it is absolutely essential that those who interpret the Charter of Rights are appointed for a fixed term rather than life. At the very least, he said, the process by which judges are appointed should involve the public.

Unfortunately, I must advise Smith not to hold his breath. I remember talking to Smith about this very subject over lunch four years ago, and nothing has changed since then.

Judges will continue to have a large influence on our lives for some time to come, and lawyers will continue to get rich on the

We have used, and will continue to use, plywood, not chip board, in our project. We have taken pride in the quality of the workmanship, design and our attempt to create a retirement development we can be proud of for years to come.

As anyone who has lived in the neighbourhood for more than three years will remember, this property was an unsightly auto wrecking yard when we took possession.

As for the sewer making it possible, yes it made it possible, but, as Colin has obviously read the Community Plan, he should also know that the Plan, since its inception, designated area "A" (The Urban Residential Area) as appropriate for "additional higher density development . . . for the convenience of residents and to economize on the provision of sewers and other services."

Colin's comment that "Salt Spring Islanders need to be very observant and to squelch every sign of an attempt to get land rezoned to multi-family," appears to be based on the perception that Salt Spring residents do not need townhome projects.

In reality, there will soon be need for multi-family housing and not by people moving to the island, but by

residents already here. This may seem to many, given the recent history of townhome sales on the island, unlikely. However, if you examine the history of the housing market on the island over the past three years you will find that Brinkworthy Mobile Home Park's popularity took

off about three years ago, and will be full within months. Last year alone about 40 modular homes were brought in, and sold to a majority of retired islanders unable, or not wanting, to keep up with their existing larger homes.

A statement in the Gulf Islands Driftwood dated August 7, 1991, from the Trust Meeting of July 30, 1991, about a remark from the Trustees asking staff to prepare a response to a recent letter received from Audrey Buitenwerf again asking for justification as to "why her Rainbow Road property cannot be rezoned from its Agriculture designation".

I am Audrey Buitenwerf and my letter was asking for "Clarification", which is different from the Trust remark "Justification". Then this word—"Compatible"—to get along together? The reason!!! My late husband and myself, we were the good neighbours!! —Which was not always the fact from the people from the adjacent properties.

The Farmers' Institute in 1989 placed four outhouses, the old fashioned way, four holes in the ground on the side of the seasonal creek which comes from their land to my property, and polluted one of my wells. The health inspector advised me to stop taking water from that one well for **one half year**. I had to spend extra money to have a ditch dug to get the polluted water away from that well. But—the Farmers' Institute in many ways is a service for the community at large. They received through the years, for the good of the community, several money grants.

Another adjacent property is the Gulf Coast Materials Ltd. We were always the good neighbours!! But over the years we have watched, with concern, the cement coating building up in the ditch on Rainbow Road. Is it not high time that this busy operation be told to have a holding pond? This is the first time I have criticized this company. All these years **we were the compatible neighbours**.

I would also like to know—when was the rezoning hearing held for the properties which were bought from Mr. Alan Gear and Mr. Jim McClean for School District #64? Are the two houses removed from their grounds before or after the public hearing? Then the question about the property which is already rezoned for the new school—the location between the two school grounds is puzzling me. First the hydro office, then the busy Windsor Plywood. Is this firm in the Agricultural Land Reserve? Or is the land commercial? And why are the Agricultural Land Commission and the Trust not concerned at all about pollution for the grounds? After all, a plywood company has a lot of treated materials in their ready-to-sell products. But my property over the last two years is ignored!! **The owner is only an elderly widow!!** That makes all the difference.

This has been the prime reason the existing townhome projects as Nick Gilbert is quoted as saying, are "in small demand." Now that Brinkworthy is full there will be an increased interest in the existing townhome projects, primarily because there are no alternatives close to Ganges.

I find it unlikely that Colin would want another mobile home park in his back yard, however, I don't hear him offering any solutions that meet the goals of the Plan "to provide for a choice of dwelling types, both permanent and seasonal, in a variety of locations and catering to a range of income groups" while staying within the set guidelines.

It will be necessary to re-zone more property in Area "A" to multi-family to accommodate more islanders, however, I will agree with both Nick and Colin that the Churchill Road property in question is not an appropriate site for any multi-family project, nor as he states, does it conform to the Plan.

In response to Colin's question "is it any of the Society's (Salt Spring Community Society's) business" to rezone this property, "or is this merely another attempt at empire building by some public servant?" - it is my understanding that there is an ever increasing need for rental housing for both senior citizens and families on the island, and that the society has decided to try and address this need.

This project requires an enormous amount of time and energy, and, as a community, we should applaud the effort.

However, what concerns me the most about Colin's letter is the fact that it falls into the category of letters warning us that "the sky is falling." The knee jerk reaction among those less informed is to spread the word as truth (it's falling!). And because it makes wonderful "righteous conversation," there is a tendency to get creative and add "informed opinion" along the way.

Questioning the validity of any statement (how do you know its falling?) is usually frowned upon, and offering to help reach a solution to the perceived problem (if it is falling can we stop it?) rarely happens. Instead, we are all too willing to accept statements, that are consciously or unconsciously, designed to create fear, anger, emotional polarization and "tabloid gossip" in the community, and revel in the dirty laundry, straining to keep our ears open wide.

Many on this island, regardless of the issue, are quicker to condemn, when they perceive a problem, than they are to take the time to investigate the matter thoroughly, offer positive ideas, or, heaven forbid, come up with some creative solutions.

You will notice that whenever you find major issues like pollution, rampant development, racism etc., you will also find misinformation, ignorance, and emotionalism, used not only by those who stand to gain, but also by those who believe they are acting in the best interests of the "other side."

Unfortunately, the tactics of both sides cloud minds and issues with untruths.

From the mire and confusion rises apathy, created as a by-product, allowing those who rely upon the adage that "no one really cares," to triumph.

## Trust awaits ministry approval for submission on Trust Fund

A vital part of Islands Trust Fund operation came to life last week when its first official plan was submitted for approval to the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Recreation and Culture August 16.

The Trust's acting general manager Cynthia Hawksworth said Monday completion of the Islands Trust Fund Plan is a "significant step" in development of the relatively new agency.

The Trust Fund Board was created last year in the Islands Trust Act as a body with legal powers to hold money and interests in land for the purposes of carrying out the objectives of the Islands Trust. Creation of a plan is mandatory under terms of the act.

Hawksworth said the Trust Fund Board, its advisory committee, and staff began work on the plan soon after the act became law in April of 1990.

A rough draft was approved by Trust Council in September of 1990 and was then referred to other government and private agencies for comment. Because it is a unique and "fairly unusual" document, Hawksworth said they garnered extensive input from across the country.

"We wanted to get the best advice we could," she said.

The plan outlines the objectives and operating policies of the Trust Fund Board.

One of the board's first goals is to compile an inventory of "areas and features of greatest significance to the Trust Area and those which are in danger of being lost irretrievably through alienation, change of use or landscape alteration," states one section of the plan.

Owners of property identified in this inventory will be contacted and informed of both their lands' significance "and of mechanisms available to owners for protection of the valued areas and features."

Several methods and incentives for property owners to protect and bind lands have been established.

Relationships with other government departments, Trust bodies and private organizations with conservation aims are described in the plan. Cooperative effort and assistance from all quarters will be encouraged, it says.

Management plans will be created for areas held or occupied by the Trust Fund Board, using local knowledge of the property. Some issues laid out in management plans will be "the extent and nature of protection required for the property, area or feature, determination of most appropriate use or uses, provision

and management of access" and safety, insurance, monitoring and zoning requirements.

Hawksworth said the board was optimistic the plan would be approved by the municipal affairs ministry.

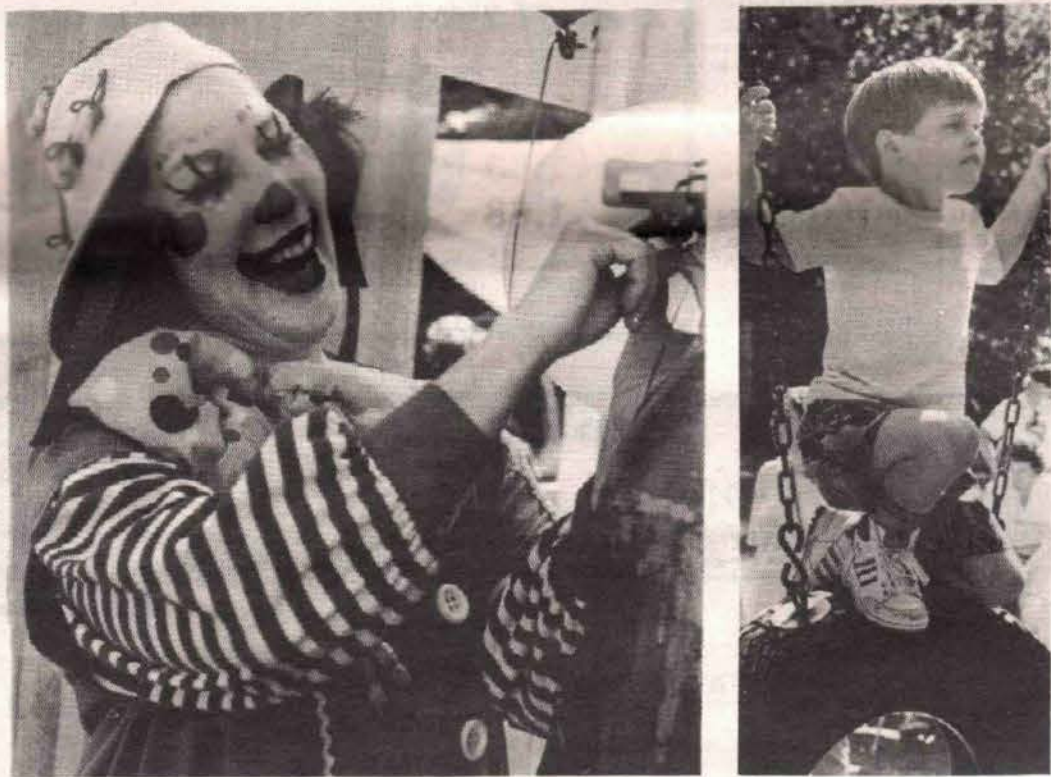

# Dioxins, furans lead to extended crab closures

Areas closed to commercial crabbing due to the presence of dioxins and furans in crabs around the Crofton pulp mill have been extended by 65 square kilometres.

The announcement was made earlier this month by the Canadian Fisheries and Oceans department.

High dioxin and furan levels were also found in livers of ling cod residing near Fletcher Challenge's Crofton mill, a fisheries department release said. The release recommends limiting the consumption of crab hepatopancreases in crab caught around the Crofton mill.

"The results issued last week build upon results of earlier samples," Pat Chamult, of Fisheries and Oceans, told the *Driftwood*.

"The results are basically saying closed areas continue to be contaminated and contamination is showing outside of existing closed areas," Fisheries and Oceans biologist Steve Samis added.

A Crofton mill spokesman does not, however, believe mill effluent is responsible for the dioxins and furans, and cited several other potential sources of contamination.

New areas closed to commercial crabbing are bordered by Parminter Point on Salt Spring Island, Chemainus and Ladysmith Harbour on Vancouver Island, and the southern tip of Thetis Island.

Maple Bay is also now closed to commercial crabbing.

Closures previously enforced include an area bordered by Parminter Point, Chemainus, a point immediately south of Vesuvius Bay on Salt Spring and a point on Vancouver Island directly across from Vesuvius.

Burgoyne Bay on Salt Spring and Cowichan Bay on Vancouver Island also remain closed.

In most of the areas closed to commercial crabbing, recreational and native crabbers can still eat the crab, but should limit their consumption of crab hepatopancreases.

In Burgoyne Bay the limit is 50 grams per week, and in Vesuvius Bay the limit is 25 grams per week.

Biologist Samis said a typical crab hepatopancreas is the size of an egg yolk, and weighs 20 to 30 grams.

Chamult explained the hepatopancreas is a digestive gland that appears as a greeny, soft textured organ in the main body of the crab.

"It's fairly evident," he said.

Dioxins tend to accumulate in the hepatopancreas because that organ is fatty (dioxins are fat soluble) and the digestive processes occurring in the organ concentrate dioxins there, Chamult said.

Recreational crabbers are allowed to crab in areas closed to commercial crabbers because people buying crab from commercial crabbers may not know where the crab was caught, and eat portions of it they shouldn't, said Chamult.

"Recreational crabbers know precisely where the crabs come from," he said.

Fisheries and Oceans recommends that bottom fish, such as ling cod, caught in the vicinity of coastal pulp mills, be "properly gutted" and that the liver not be eaten.

Properly gutted means taking out the stomach, liver and anything else

in the body cavity, said Chamult.

"It simply means doing what you would probably do normally."

"Dioxins, together with furans, constitute a family of 210 chemically related chlorinated organic compounds, some of which are extremely toxic to laboratory animals," the fisheries release says.

In Canada, they are a threat to human health through consumption of contaminated fish and shellfish, a threat to fish because they are affected by exposure to very low levels of dioxins, and a threat to the ecosystem in general where dioxins accumulate through the food chain.

Dave Haywood, industrial relations manager for Fletcher Challenge's Crofton pulp and paper division, said the Crofton plant is no longer discharging measurable amounts of dioxins in its effluent and has not for more than a year.

"Through chlorine dioxide substitution in place of the previous chlorine bleaching system it has eliminated detectable traces of dioxins in our effluent discharge," he said.

He said the mill effluent has traditionally flowed south and most of the new closures are north of the plant.

"We don't know where the

dioxins and furans originated from," he said.

Previous methods of discharging effluent from the mill "may very well have had an effect," he said, but he pointed out there are other causes of dioxins, such as garbage incineration and forest fires, which could have affected test results.

"There is no evidence to substantiate any claims of cancer in humans as a result of dioxin exposure," Haywood added.

# Assault nets probation

Former Salt Spring resident Brandon Tarodi, 25, was convicted of common assault after a shouting match with his girlfriend escalated into a physical confrontation.

Tarodi pleaded not guilty to the charge in Ganges provincial court August 13.

Jeannette Gysbeers, Tarodi's former common law spouse, accused Tarodi of choking her, swatting her cheek with the back of his hand, and twisting her leg in a fight in a house near Fernwood.

She said she was on crutches for two weeks after the assault, could not talk for one and one-half weeks, and had bruises on her face.

Dr. James Buchan, who examined Gysbeers the morning after the incident, told the court he found nothing unusual with her except a slight bruise on her throat, bruising on her left cheek and upper arm, and a hoarse voice.

He said she needed no medical attention.

Tarodi said both he and Gysbeers had ingested three beers each before they fought but "alcohol wasn't a factor."

Yelling escalated into finger pointing and pushing, he said.

"I'm not sure who struck the other first. We were both doing it."

Gysbeers kicked him in the groin,

he said, adding he did not choke her. He said he sat on her to calm her down, and told her he would not let her go until she did.

Tarodi said they reconciled their differences and spent the night together. Gysbeers said she spent the night with Tarodi because she was scared.

After the incident the two kept seeing each other for the next six months, before Gysbeers filed charges against Tarodi in connection with the fight.

Judge R.E. Hudson ordered a suspended sentence and one year of probation.

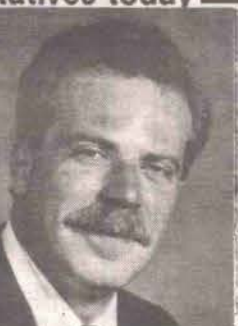

## GANGES COURT Docket

### Vehicle infraction

Salt Spring resident Jake Vandort pleaded guilty to driving without a licence and without due care and attention August 13 in Ganges provincial court.

The charges stemmed from an incident May 31, 1991 in the parking lot near Beattie's Burgers.

Vandort backed a friend's pickup truck into the restaurant, causing \$100 damage and came close to hitting a woman, said Crown counsel Edward Ormheim.

Vandort said he was just moving the vehicle, and didn't realize the car was in reverse.

"I'm sorry to say I came close to causing a major accident," he said.

He was fined \$175.

### Intoxicated

A Salt Spring man was ordered to obtain alcohol counselling after pleading guilty in Ganges provincial court to causing a public disturbance June 22, 1991.

Crown counsel Edward Ormheim said Matthew Hutchinson, who was 18 at the time of the incident, was "extremely intoxicated" at 2:29 a.m. and could not be reasoned with.

"He was out of control trying to fight anyone and everyone," Ormheim said.

Defence lawyer James Pasuta said the incident occurred after a grad party, and his client was drunk to the point he was out of control. Pasuta

said Hutchinson did not remember anything that happened but he heard it was not good.

Pasuta said Hutchinson apologized to the arresting officer, and has undertaken alcohol abuse counselling.

The judge gave Hutchinson a conditional discharge, put him on probation, and ordered him to obtain further alcohol abuse counselling.

### Impaired driving

Salt Spring resident Geoffrey Townsend pleaded guilty to driving with a blood alcohol content of more than 80 milligrams per 100 milligrams of blood, receiving a stiff fine and licence suspension because of previous impaired driving convictions.

tions.

Crown counsel Edward Ormheim told Ganges provincial court that Townsend had been convicted twice before of impaired driving in Edmonton, once each in 1987 and 1988. He said the accused served a jail term for the second conviction.

Crown evidence indicated that on March 3 of 1991 at 2:23 a.m., Townsend was observed operating a vehicle on Salt Spring without the headlights on. He provided two breath samples which both recorded a reading of 133 milligrams of alcohol. The legal limit is 80 milligrams.

Townsend was fined \$1,000 and his licence was suspended for 18 months.

## Red tide

Federal fisheries department has closed the Gulf Islands area to harvesting of all bivalve molluscs due to high levels of red tide.

As of August 16, all areas previously open to harvesting of clams, oysters, mussels and scallops in the Gulf Islands area are now closed.

The order came about after high levels of Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning (red tide, PSP) were discovered at Ganges on Salt Spring and Campbell Bay at Mayne Island.

Saanich Inlet and Sansum Narrows were closed July 5 due to red tide. These areas remain closed.

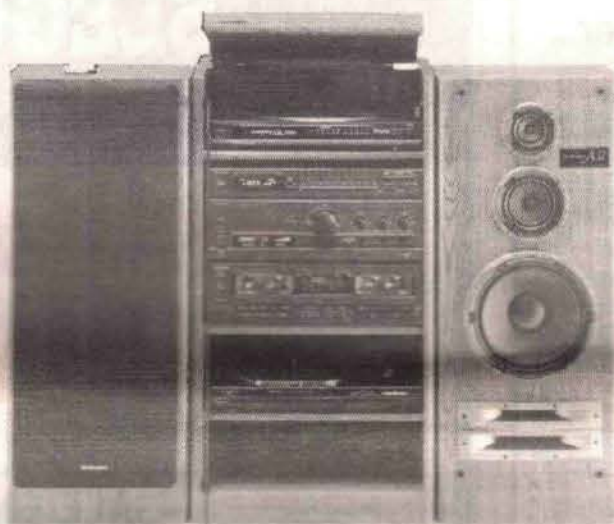

## Gas tax refunds

Available for the disabled

Gulf Islands Association for Persons with Disabilities has received new information on gas tax refunds.

Under the Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Act, people considered handicapped are eligible for a refund of tax paid on fuel purchased for their vehicles.

Effective August 1 of this year, people with severe visual impairment are now included in the program, and the requirement that handicapped people hold a valid drivers' license has been removed.

To be eligible for gas tax refunds (limited to \$200 per year), a hand-

icapped individual must own or lease a vehicle. Applicants who qualify will be sent information regarding the refund. These individuals are also eligible for a 25 per cent discount on their ICBC (Insurance Corporation of British Columbia) premiums.

Those wishing to apply for the refund should write to the Director, Consumer Taxation Branch, Attention Refunds Section, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C. V8V 2L9.

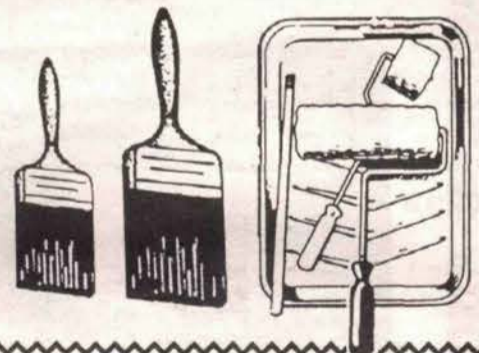

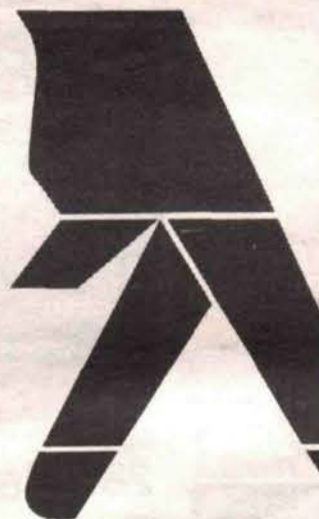

Children from age three to five can attend the pre-school, learning arts and crafts skills, methods of socialization, and "a great deal of fun and games," according to a press release issued by the pre-school.

The school is unique because it is entirely funded by parents through various fund-raising events, the release notes. These events include the "sizeable" apple press effort staged two days annually at the island's fall fair. The press is donated

by Foxglove, the apples by residents, and labour, cookies and cakes, are provided by parents.

Other fund-raising events include garage sales, bake sales, raffles and most recently, a "Romantic Weekend Getaway," compliments of Sun Rise Bed and Breakfast and the Bay Window.

In addition, Salt Spring's Rotary Club has recently constructed and donated a play house for pre-school children.

Along with teacher Johanna McLaughlin, parents (who provide alternate supervision at the pre-school), determine what activities children will do, how funds will be distributed, and how the school will be organized.

"Mothers agree the cooperative system enhances firm friendships for children and parents alike," the release states. "It's wonderful to see your child approach any number of trusted parents with day to day chat, or problems in your absence."

Members also believe the system gives parents and children a sense of security and community. Furthermore, they believe it gives parents a "great insight" into the events of their children's early school experiences.

**Ashland offers focus for arts**

I am always curious when I travel to discover how other communities appreciate, support and promote the arts.

Having recently returned from a week-long stay in Ashland, Oregon, I experienced the milieu of a small, West Coast town, whose core seemed to be based on the arts and culture.

Ashland is home to the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, a yearly event, commencing in February and finishing at the end of October. This festival attracts culture seekers from all over North America, with high season tickets sold out weeks in advance.

Two indoor theatres operate the whole season, with one outdoor Elizabethan theatre open in June, July, August and September. The festival offers traditional Shakespearean theatre as well as contemporary adaptations of Shakespeare and other contemporary and classic theatre.

During our brief sojourn we were offered the choice of Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar*, *The Taming of the Shrew*, *Henry VI* or a contemporary staging of *The Merchant of Venice*. Other offerings were Thornton Wilder's *Our Town*, Bernard Shaw's *Major Barbara*, Jerry Sterner's *Other People's Money*, and Richard Nelson's *Some Americans Abroad*.

After a race to an early morning line-up I managed to procure standing room places for myself and my two children for that evening's

*Taming of the Shrew* at the outdoor Elizabethan theatre.

My experience in that line-up was a true education. I overheard people talking about hiring teenagers to camp overnight outside the box office to be first in line the next morning when it opened.

The general consensus was that you had to be lined up by 5 a.m. if you wanted a chance at the few seats that became available each day when the box office opened at 9:30 a.m.

People were milling about with signs that said "Two for Caesar." In my ignorance of the culture panic, I initially thought these people were part of some protest or picket line. I learned quickly they were seeking tickets and would probably pay a lot to get them.

There are numerous art galleries in Ashland. The artwork that I saw was generally of high contemporary quality, with work that would be considered risk-taking in our culture. I viewed a wonderful exhibition of monoprints with an earth spirituality

in them that really impressed me as a printmaker.

An abundance of art and live music performances was offered in the restaurants and pubs. There was a great deal of community-sponsored promotion of the arts and it was obvious that they are of high priority and importance to the community.

Ashland, Oregon, is roughly twice the population of Salt Spring Island. The arts are a fundamental part of the community, in an economic as well as cultural sense.

The community has had the foresight to set aside over 100 acres of park and forest in the centre of the town, known as Lithia Park. Walking paths, a rushing stream, picnic tables, tennis courts, playground equipment and an open air bandshell all border on the Shakespearean Theatre.

The town is oriented to the relaxed enjoyment of both adults and children with encouragement of walking and cycling.

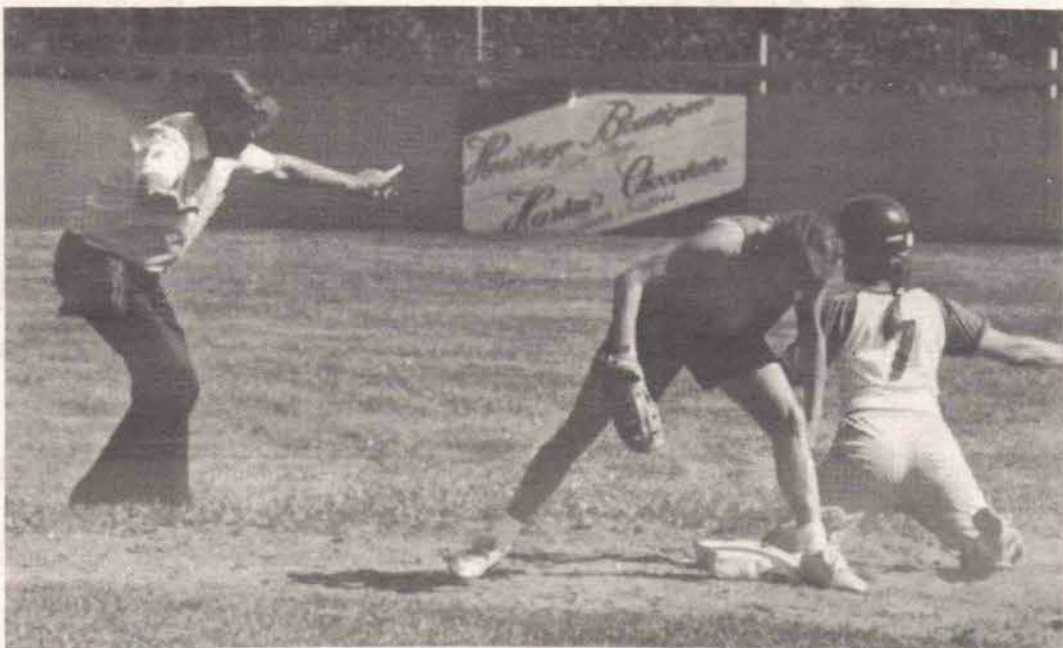

## DOWN THE YEARS

### Thirty Years Ago

• Salt Spring Island firefighters doused a blaze that threatened to consume valuable timber on Scott Road. The fire, confined to a grassy area by the quick action of the fire crew, was blamed on the careless discarding of a lighted cigarette.

• Apricots and pears, in 15-ounce tins, sold for 41 cents for two cans, or \$4.75 for a case of 24 cans.

### Twenty-Five Years Ago

• The Great Centennial Canoe Race down the Fraser River and across to Victoria was interrupted about five miles into the Strait of Georgia. Faced with high winds, the canoeists were plucked from the water and transported to Montague Harbour by police boats and private crafts.

The race was to have been an authentic reproduction of the method fur traders used to get around west coast waters.

• The school board considered plans to add new classrooms and an industrial arts wing to Gulf Island Secondary School. A decision to proceed with construction was delayed until September to allow trustees time to study the plan.

### Twenty Years Ago

• A referendum seeking approval for a fire district on North Pender Island met with success. With the yes vote secured, \$50,000 was to be used to provide a fire hall and buy equipment. The money was to be repaid over 15 years at three mills per year per ratepayer. After the referendum's approval, South Pender became the only Gulf Island without fire protection.

• Taki Suzuki of Mayne Island cleaned up at the fishing derby on that island. He had the largest salmon — at 26 pounds, six ounces — as well as the largest cod, at just over 27 pounds.

### Fifteen Years Ago

• Plans to create five-member advisory councils to represent each large Gulf Island were proceeding, Capital Regional District chairman Jim Campbell said.

The membership on each council was to be drawn from the island represented, and would advise the CRD on matters of planning affecting that island. The councils were to have no other responsibilities or authority, Campbell said.

### Ten Years Ago

• Transporting children to various schools in the Gulf Islands would cost the school board more money for the remaining four months of that year. The price tag on water taxis to move the children increased by \$3,160 effective that September. Until June, the total monthly costs for the taxis was \$5,740.

• Doreen Sampson, 35, and Claude Rondeau, 33, pleaded guilty in provincial court for taking under-sized clams and using a water pump without a proper licence. Rondeau pleaded guilty for taking clams

without a proper fishing licence. The pair was fined a total of \$350 by Judge D.K. McAdam.

### Five Years Ago

• A bylaw limiting industrial uses on Salt Spring Island was to take care of the "immediate problem" of asphalt plants, said Island Trustee Pat Byrne. The longterm question of industrial use was to be answered by a task force.

The Trust issued a call for residents interested in sitting on a task force to investigate industrial uses and appropriate land sites. The move came in the wake of the asphalt plant controversy and just months after some objections were raised to a used car business that located on industrial land on the Fulford-Ganges Road.

Trustee Nick Gilbert said both incidents underscored a need to improve current bylaws governing industrial land-use.

• Cookies, ice cream, candy, and the polka; that was Gertie Morris' recipe for longevity.

the house each Saturday morning.

• Local MLA Hugh Curtis welcomed his change in provincial cabinet duties, saying his move from finance minister to provincial secretary "gives me something to sink my teeth into."

The shift was announced as B.C.'s new premier, Bill Vander Zalm, named his cabinet. Vander Zalm assumed responsibility for the finance post held by Curtis since 1979.

Many political observers interpreted the change as a demotion for Curtis, one tied to his support for candidates opposed to Vander Zalm at the Social Credit leadership convention.

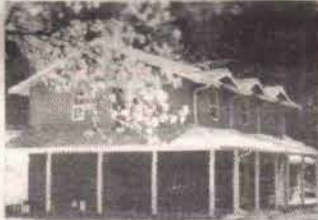
