School board proposes five-year capital budget

Trustees from Gulf Islands School District 64 will wait until spring for a ministerial decision regarding its proposed \$19.6 million capital budget for the 1991-92 school year.

The school board has also presented the Ministry of Education with a proposed five-year capital budget plan which includes construction of three new schools and major renovations to three other Gulf Island schools.

District secretary-treasurer Ken Starling told school trustees the province has set aside \$850 million for capital projects over the next five years, and various school districts across the province have submitted requests amounting to \$685 million.

School District 64 has plans for \$32.7 million worth of capital projects during that five year period. As the capital budget requests are approved by the ministry, the school district acquires the money through sale of debentures which are amortized over a 20-year period.

Each year, money to cover repayment costs is included in the school budget under the section Debt Services.

Of immediate concern to the district is the acquisition of capital financing to cover projects for the coming fiscal year. Trustees have requested \$14.9 million for construction of a new high school on Rainbow Road.

They are also seeking \$300,000 to purchase a site for a

replacement of Salt Spring Elementary School. The search is for a parcel covering 2.8 to 3.2 hectares (seven or eight acres) of land.

Funding required for the replacement school has been estimated at close to \$5.5 million.

Both projects carry a high rating on the ministerial scale of necessity.

The school board also submitted a list of minor projects. (A minor project is defined as carrying a price tag of less than \$1.5 million.)

CRD bylaw limits space for smokers

Smokers within the Capital Regional District have fewer places to "puff," following implementation of the district's new clean air bylaw.

Bylaw 1851 makes it illegal to smoke within any public premises or workplace except in designated smoking areas.

Strict definitions govern such areas in a workplace. A designated smoking area must be in "an enclosed room to which non-smoking employees do not require access or thoroughfare" and in a "ventilated area away from the rest of the

workplace."

It cannot be "within common areas, reception areas, washrooms, corridors, escalators, elevators and stairwells." A designated non-smoking area of equivalent size must be provided by business owners if the designated smoking area is a lunchroom, lounge or rest area.

As of January 1, 1992, smoking will be prohibited in all workplaces within the Capital Regional District.

A number of places must already be completely smoke-free under the bylaw. No evidence of smoking will

be seen in beauty parlours, health spas, retail stores, shopping malls, hospitals, financial institutions, laundromats and recreation centres.

Bowling alleys and bingo halls are exempted from total smoke-free status. Fifty per cent of the "observation area" in a bowling alley can be set aside as a designated smoking area, and up to 75 per cent of the floor area of a bingo hall will seat smokers.

Extended and longterm care facilities can still provide a designated smoking area "ventilated in isolation from the rest of the facility."

Smoking is still permitted in a maximum of 50 per cent of a restaurant or licensed premises' seating area, and non-smoking and smoking areas must be clearly indicated with signs.

With the consent of the driver and other passengers in a taxi, smoking will be permitted in taxis. Social functions in private and public premises are exempted from the restrictions. The CRD says the bylaw will promote a clean air environment free of tobacco smoke and improve the health of the area's population.

MacBlo deluged by calls

MacMillan Bloedel Limited has been swamped with inquiries regarding sale of its Galiano Island land holdings.

Manager of the company's timberlands and properties department Gary Kadatz told the *Driftwood* Monday he had spoken to about 150 interested people and had 30 more phone messages to return as of Monday afternoon.

"My phone started ringing last Wednesday (January 9) at 8:30 a.m.," he said, and the response "absolutely bowled me over."

He said he expected a flood of inquiries for "two or three days, maybe" after MB's Tuesday announcement to sell its properties, but did not expect to still be glued to the phone on Monday.

Interested parties may retain the services of a real estate agent if desired, said Kadatz, but offers will be made directly through him.

A descriptive list of the properties will not be available until MB has filed a disclosure statement with the provincial government, he said, which must be done unless the property is sold to a single buyer.

In a January 11 press release, the Galiano Conservancy Association says it intends to make an offer on the lands. It states that "the Galiano Conservancy Association believes the company should receive a fair return for the property. We remain confident of our ability to provide a business plan which meets the financial obligations for purchase of this land at fair value."

GCA administrative assistant Marie Hardy confirmed that the association plans to make an offer to buy all of the property and not selected parcels.

The GCA has developed a "community acquisition plan" which

Three-day storm buries island in 42cm of snow

Last week's storm dumped a potential record of 42.2 centimetres (16.6 inches) of snow on Salt Spring, leaving islanders to cope with power outages, slippery roads and a massive clean-up.

The rain followed. Between Wednesday and Sunday, Ganges weather observer Jim Bird measured a total of 75.8 millimetres (three inches) of rainfall.

The storm began Sunday, January 6 and persisted until early morning

Help offered to smokers looking to kick the habit

With National Non-smoking Week set for January 21 to 27, people are encouraged to join the ranks of the non-smoking majority.

Focus on the issue and support from several health-oriented groups

will be offered during the annual media blitz.

The B.C. Committee for National Non-smoking Week says that most people try to quit several times before they finally break the habit, but notes a 15 per cent decline in Canada's population of smokers in the last 25 years. Only 28 per cent of Canadian adults still smoke.

Driftwood will detail some tips for quitting in its next issue published on "Weedless Wednesday" or "Cold Turkey Day," when people are urged to stop smoking.

Local Canadian Cancer Society volunteer Jaci Sanders has organized a contest for those who quit smoking on January 23. Participants' names will be drawn to win goods donated by local merchants. The grand prize is a turkey from Gulf Islands Trading Company. To register for the contest, call Sanders at 537-2098.

Buttons, bumper stickers and

material on how to quit smoking can also be obtained from Sanders.

An eight-week "freedom from smoking" support group is available for some island smokers wanting help with their mission to quit. Susan Krug of the Community Centre will facilitate a series of Thursday meetings commencing February 7 from 7 to 9:15 p.m. at the centre.

Krug says the group will offer mutual support and behaviour modification techniques. Participants will be able to "see themselves in a more positive light and define themselves as a non-smoker," she says.

A similar kind of group was successful for Krug, who quit smoking about nine years ago.

Contact Krug at the Community Centre at 537-9971 for information and to pre-register. The cost is \$20 or \$5 for low-income persons.

Communications discussed

Communications between Gulf islands appeared to go down as fast as power lines during last week's snow storm.

At a January 9 school board meeting, Saturna Island trustee Lorraine Campbell asked why water taxis skippers were not informed about cancellation of schools and bus runs during the snow fall.

Superintendent of Schools Mike Marshall told the meeting the snow

storm came just as the district was breaking new people into the job of inter-island communications.

The storm, he said, caused unexpected problems which will be worked out in the future.

Salt Spring trustee David Eyles asked why each school is not equipped with a radio. Trustee Charles Bazzard, also of Salt Spring, noted an antenna for a VHF radio could be mounted on the roof of each school

for a cost of \$150 each.

Marshall suggested various service clubs might be interested in picking up the cost of antennas and radios.

"It's just the kind of community service a club would be happy to support," he told the trustees.

He stressed that in a storm, parents should tune to CKDA — 1200 on the AM dial — for information on school and bus run closures.

An addition to the Pender school to increase capacity to 50 kindergartners and 100 pupils in Grades One to Seven would cost \$1.1 million. The school is currently rated for 50 Kindergarten students and 75 youngsters in Grades One to Seven. December enrolment showed 12 children in kindergarten, and 76 pupils in the primary and intermediate grades.

Seven Grade Eight students also use the school and space is so tight, the computer lab is located in a hallway.

To generally ease crowding across the school district, trustees are seeking \$347,820 for the purchase of portable classrooms. When classrooms space is straightened out with the construction of new schools and the adoption of the middle school concept, the portable classes would be resold.

Fixing the roofs on various schools will cost \$27,134 while bringing different schools up to seismic standards as outlined in a safety inspection report last year will cost \$126,524. Gulf Islands Secondary School requires \$247,676 to bring it up to earthquake safety standards.

All four projects have been rated high by the ministry.

Looking into the future, the school board will be asking for \$350,000 to acquire land for a new elementary school on Salt Spring in

the 1992-93 capital budget. The trustees also seek \$100,000 to begin planning the new elementary school. The three schools on the island are near- or over-capacity now.

Also on the capital budget list for that fiscal year is \$5.2 million required to build the replacement for Salt Spring Elementary School.

Planning the needed major renovations to GISS will cost \$141,000. Renovations are required to bring the school up to standard for use as a middle school covering pupils in Grades Six to Nine.

On the list of minor projects for that year is \$1.5 million to replace the school on Saturna Island and \$187,500 to buy more portable classrooms.

The following year, the school district will seek close to \$4 million to cover the cost of building the new elementary school on Salt Spring. Also slated for that capital budget is \$2.35 million to carry out the renovations at GISS in preparation for its use as a middle school.

On the list of minor projects for 1993-94 is \$1.4 million to construct additional classroom space at the Galiano school. That request has been given a low priority rating by the ministry due to enrolment not meeting the forecast level.

For that capital budget, a further \$150,000 for the purchase of portable classrooms has been included. The school district also intends to begin replacing its fleet of buses that year with an initial request of \$51,500. A similar request will be made in 1994-95 and \$89,000 will be sought in 1995-96.

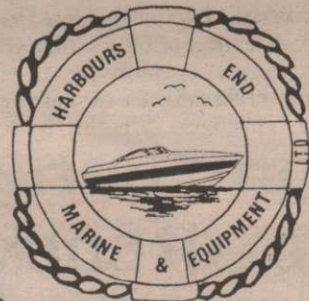

Elements cripple road limiting vehicular use

A portion of Walker Hook Road began sliding into the sea last Sunday.

The slide began 200 metres south of Hedger Road and continued for close to 800 metres along Walker Hook. Traffic has been limited to one lane in the section.

Victoria Highway Maintenance spokesman Bob Cole told the *Driftwood* that technical experts will be checking the situation this week to determine how the problem can be corrected.

School buses had been rerouted as a safety precaution for the children, said Ken Starling of the Gulf Islands School District. By Wednesday, the school buses resume normal runs along Walker Hook Road.

While portions of the road have been sinking for several years, the latest problem became evident Sunday. Local highway crews checked the situation and posted signs warning drivers to exercise caution in the area.

Gravel was trucked to the sight to fill the massive holes in the road.

Cole said a geo-technical crew will be brought to the site and a series of holes will be drilled along the road to determine where bedrock is located. He said the maintenance company is looking to lower the road up to two metres to ensure a more stable base.

"We don't know at this time if this is exactly what we're going to do," he said.

He speculated that this problem began with the heavy rainfall last week. A large tree was washed out of the bank on the seaward side and a large section of the bank shifted.

He expects to have sufficient information to make a decision on rebuilding the road by Friday of this week. He indicated the ministry of highways is aware of the problem.

Cole noted the price tag to rebuild the damaged portion of the road could run from \$80,000 to \$100,000.

School buses avoided the area Monday and Tuesday by running to Hedger Road on the north side of the slide area and Fort Street on the south side. Bus supervisor Wayne Duke

described the situation as inconvenient for only about six children who had to walk to the buses.

Cole said the situation is compounded by the presence of a water line which runs along the upland side of the road. Any repairs will have to take the line into consideration.

He went on to say he had never seen a slide such as this one. The fill for the road was dry, he noted. Usually, when a road slides, the fill is soaking with water. The bank between the road and the sea was saturated, he said, but not the road fill.

Traffic is limited to lighter vehicles. No heavy trucks or equipment are to use that portion of Walker Hook.

described the snowfall as "the greatest amount of snow in one storm" since he began keeping weather records on the island in 1976.

At Victoria Highway Maintenance (which serves the Gulf Islands), spokesman Bob Cole said the snow was the least of the company's worries. While road cleaning crews managed to cope with the heavy snowfall, the heavy rains of November and early December played havoc with road beds, he said.

Across the district, crews worked steadily to fill the resulting pot-holes, Cole said.

On Salt Spring, Aston recalled heavy snowfall in January 1984, when 68.1 centimetres of snow fell for the entire month.

He tested snow from the last storm and found the water content to be extremely high. Normally, one centimetre of snow is considered to be the equivalent of one millimetre of precipitation, he said.

Aston estimated the snow/precipitation ration was closer to the equivalent of 6.5 mm of snow to one mm of water.

According to statistics from Environment Canada, the 30-year average for snowfall in January stands at 33.3 cm. This figure is reached by averaging figures for the years 1941 to 1970.

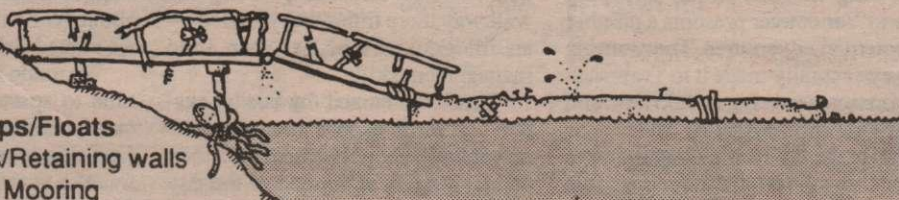

Discriminatory blow

To the Editor,
On April 2, B.C. Hydro will perpetrate an unusual discriminatory blow to many of its Gulf Islands customers.

On that date it will apply to the British Columbia Utilities Commission for a rate increase under the "ELECTRIC PLUS" program from 2.5 cents per kilowatt to 3.3 cents (32 per cent)

In the last three years, many people in the Gulf Islands and on Vancouver Island have responded to the appeal of B.C. Hydro to invest

(some rather heavily) in electric heating -- while keeping their propane, oil or wood fired system as a back-up, to qualify for the special low rate promised.

However, now that some 15,000 new customers have been hooked, B.C. Hydro plans to increase the rate.

A letter sent recently to all ELECTRIC PLUS customers advises people to switch to natural gas when it becomes available "as natural gas is the fuel of choice when it comes to home heating." The implication here is that natural gas is going to be cheaper even than the special ELECTRIC PLUS rate.

However, here is where they deliver the low blow to the Gulf Islands. They are not bringing natural gas to the Gulf Islands. In the next two years Vancouver Island will be almost totally served by natural gas thus allowing people there the privilege of choosing heating fuels. The Gulf Islands will not have this opportunity which means we are being discriminated against, and, with this rate increase, we will be forced to look at a much longer time in which to recover our investment in electric heating.

We will become one of the very few areas in Canada not to be served by what B.C. Hydro calls "the fuel of choice for home heating."

Perhaps it is not too late for some special consideration for Gulf Islanders. I urge all those who use electric heating to write a letter of objection to this increase application to The British Columbia Utilities Commission, 600-900 Howe St., Box 250, Vancouver V6Z 2N3, or FAX 660-1102, asking for at least a Gulf Islands exemption to the increase application.

VICTORIA — Having decided to go back to "trusting his instincts," Premier Vander Zalm will probably continue to surprise his fellow British Columbians, including his fellow cabinet ministers, with impromptu announcements.

The taxpayer-financed pension plan and computerized billing system for doctors may have been only the beginning. Swimming pools for lawyers and Porsches for dentists may be next on the agenda.

Vander Zalm certainly knows how to pick his issues. I mean, if anything could have riled up people more than they were already, what with the GST and the resulting price increases, the pension plan for doctors was it.

And the premier's explanation made no more sense than the original announcement. On principle, he was in favour of pension plans, he said, but somewhere down the road governments would run out of money to pay for pensions. Therefore, the B.C. government was going to pay for doctors' pensions today.

Forcing the taxpayers to finance pension plans for doctors is bordering on obscenity. Doctors have always insisted that they are not employees of the government but rather free agents. And if that wasn't reason enough to make them pay for their own pension plans, their income is. I've yet to see a poor middle-aged doctor.

Doctors don't need a public-paid pension

Doctors are getting a good deal as it is. The taxpayers pay for their education, and, once in business, guarantee their income. Without doctors, stock markets would tumble. The last thing they need is a pension plan paid for by the public.

I'm obviously not alone with my sentiments. Public reaction has been outright hostile, but more important, two cabinet ministers were enraged when they heard of Vander Zalm's announcement.

Neither Health Minister John Jansen nor Finance Minister Mel Couvelier supported the idea. What's more, they had no idea the premier would announce the deal. True, it was discussed in cabinet, but neither of the two cabinet ministers were present when cabinet voted on it.

And that's not all. Couvelier and Jansen had no idea the matter was even under serious consideration. Neither of them knew that their staff had been discussing the topic with the premier's office.

One or two resignations possible

In a normal political environment, Jansen and Couvelier would have resigned immediately, but these aren't normal political circumstances.

The Social Credit Party is in deep trouble, and I can understand that Couvelier and Jansen don't want to make things worse. On the other hand, there's only so much humiliation anyone can be expected to suffer. So, I would not yet rule out the possibility of one or two resignations.

Would that make any difference to Vander Zalm? I doubt it. He'd probably dismiss the resignations as the actions of a couple of malcontents.

I also don't expect Vander Zalm to respond to a letter Jack Kempf, the Socred MLA for Omineca, sent him with regard to the doctors' pension plan.

Kempf said although he knows that no legislation is needed to implement the pension plan, he urges the premier to recall the legislature "in order that all people have their say in public debate."

Like I said before, Kempf should have known better than to return to the party fold. I'm sure he now feels like having insisted to get back aboard the Titanic after having been assured passage on another ship.

Not about to change his style

One thing should be clear to all Socreds: Vander Zalm isn't about to change his style. He's said as much during his recent radio and TV appearances. He's going back to trusting his own instincts again rather than conferring with advisers, he said.

Not only that, he'll be making important announcements here and there, he said, and no, he won't check with cabinet every time. Nor will he listen to the Social Credit membership, he added, because it wasn't just the Social Credit members who "voted for me as premier," but all the people of British Columbia.

He really believes that "the people" are solidly behind him. He also believes that he's the only one who is always right. If only he could bypass his caucus and cabinet and the legislature, all of which are only a hindrance to him, he could at long last fulfil his destiny.

You think I'm exaggerating? Like hell I am. He's said to me on more than one occasion that one man can make decisions a lot better than a group of people. In all the years I've known him, he has never, not once, shown any outward sign of respect for parliamentary tradition. And that's not funny.

Traffic charges dropped

Crown counsel Ed Ormheim was forced to withdraw traffic charges against a Salt Spring youth because there was no interpreter present in Ganges provincial court last week.

The 17-year-old youth attended the December court session to argue his case — in French. The hearing was postponed until an interpreter could be found.

When the case was recalled at last week's provincial court session, the officer who had issued the tickets was away on vacation and the Crown counsel had not obtained services of a French/English translator.

Under the Official Languages section of Canada's constitution, a subsection on court proceedings reads: "Either English or French may be used by any person in, or in any pleading in or process issuing from, any court established by Parliament."

Crown counsel Ormheim asked Judge Hudson to postpone the case until a later date because the RCMP Constable was not available to testify.

However, when Judge Hudson noted the absence of an interpreter, Ormheim withdrew the charges against the youth.

Possession nets fine

A guilty plea by a Salt Spring man charged with possession of marijuana resulted in a \$150 fine from Ganges provincial court last week.

Guy Joseph Menard, 29, was arrested after refusing to leave the premises at Harbour House Hotel, November 16, 1990.

Menard was searched as a result of the arrest, and RCMP discovered three grams (.10 ounces) of marijuana.

The court learned that Menard has been charged at least twice in the past for possession of marijuana.

Fine imposed for mischief

A Salt Spring resident discovered alcohol and glass doors do not mix when he appeared in Ganges court last week.

James Richard Hamilton, 25, pleaded guilty to a charge of mischief, after he was arrested for damaging property with a value of less than \$1,000.

According to Crown evidence, Hamilton was leaving the Harbour House Hotel November 12, 1990, by the main entrance at approximately 7:30 p.m. He used too much force in opening the glass doors and when he kicked one, the glass shattered.

Hamilton told Judge Hudson he was vague about the incident because of the amount of alcohol he had consumed.

The judge imposed a fine of \$125 and ordered Hamilton pay restitution of \$107.84 to the hotel for replacement of the glass in the door.

Once again we witness a typical Canadian reaction, eh? Ben Johnson ran fast in Hamilton, drawing various reactions from *who cares?* to the quasi-blase *he didn't win*.

Certainly, two years ago, for an all-too-brief and exhilarating moment, Ben was THE toast of Canada. He showed the world what speed on a 100-metre track was all about. And we, as Canadians, went joyously bananas at being a part of it.

Then, a sombre faced young woman announced to the world that Johnson — notice it's not Ben at this point — had CHEATED.

Suddenly, he wasn't Canadian anymore but an immigrant who had somehow found his way to the Great White North. We, collectively, wanted no part of him. He took drugs to win. He was not playing the game in the Canadian tradition.

Many folk who cheered his victory in the Olympics, cheered the decision to ban him from our track team. Yeah, that'll teach him not to CHEAT.

Now, two years and many revelations later, we find that almost all the so-called world class athletes use performance-enhancing drugs of some kind. Members of the awesome East German track team have been revealed as dopers with official sanction.

Really, what does it prove?

We were embarrassed in front of world

We discover people will cheat to win. That's news? Each of us, to a greater or lesser degree, cheat at the game of life. Cheating does not bring dishonour until one is caught.

And that's the pity of the situation.

The reaction against Johnson reached its depth of animosity because we, collectively, were embarrassed in front of the world. One of our athletes was caught cheating. Mark the difference: the reaction came not because he took steroids but because he was caught doing it.

Who among us does not seek an advantage as we play this game of life? Who among us would not slip over that fine line to cheating if the benefit accrued to us was great enough?

Canadians exist as a strange breed and nowhere is it exhibited more than in sports. Canadians cheer for two baseball teams made up predominately of Americans. Our football teams live and die on the ability of American players.

Our national game (hockey being the popularly accepted game over the official lacrosse) is dominated by teams playing out of American cities. In the National Hockey League, only seven of the 21 teams represent Canadian cities.

Played as amateurs despite payment

As a youngster, the trypewriter fanaticised about a supposed amateur team called the Kirkland Lake Blue Devils. That team played in the late 1930s to great success. It won the Allen Cup in 1938-39 as the best amateur team in Canada.

Players on the team qualified as amateur because they were employed by the Lake Shore gold mine. Despite being paid by the mine, they did not mine gold, they played hockey. And won.

No one at the time held the players up as a bad example to children. They won, therefore what they did was okay.

For many years after the Russians arrived on the international hockey scene, the Canadian angst centred on what we were doing wrong. Why weren't we winning at the game we invented?

It took many years for the reluctant admission to come that mayhaps the Russians, as a team, were better than Canadians, as a team. The excuses for them winning were many. The players were in the Russian army, not as soldiers but as hockey players. They were playing the game 11 months of the year and being paid by the government to play.

Slowly it dawned on Canada that to play games at world level, we needed more than talented amateurs. A Percy Williams shows up only occasionally. And so the government started subsidies for athletes to train to world standards. But we weren't getting the gold with the frequency demanded.

Athletes pressured to win

Winning became the ideal. Our athletes were pressured to win. The track athletes knew winning regularly was not possible without the widely administered extras. Blood doping helped. Steroids helped. Training wasn't enough.

Gone were the days when just having someone compete at international meets was somehow good enough. The Canadian flag had to fly from the top mast. Our national anthem had to be played in honour for — not the athletes — us.

And then the gold medals began arriving and we knew Canadians were as good as anyone in the world, if we trained properly.

Yet, when Ben Johnson trained to prove he would run as fast as the best without chemical enhancement, he was criticised. He went to Hamilton to race and came in second.

It mattered not that he hadn't raced for two years. It mattered not the man is 29 years-old. He came in second and somehow that wasn't good enough for some people.

Johnson should not be maligned for his effort. It should be noted that he dug deep in himself and decided to give it his best shot — not a drugged shot, but his own. And his performance in Hamilton, indeed his performances in track meets yet to come, should be applauded as a measure of him as a person.

Kids saved by former islander

A former Salt Spring Island student made *B.C. Report* magazine for his part in rescuing two boys in his community of Kelowna.

Kyler Jukes, 11, son of former island residents Ian and Anne Jukes, was surveying the thickness of ice on a frozen pond near his school in West Kelowna with his two friends Darren and Graham Genge, when he saw two younger boys walking on the pond.

One of the younger boys picked up a rock and threw it on the ice to show Jukes and his friends it was thick enough to skate on. Instead, the rock forced a hole in the ice and the boy fell through. The second boy went to pull his friend out but also fell into the frigid water.

Jukes and the Genge boys retrieved a long thick branch from the woods and extended it to the boys in the water. When the youngest of the two finally reached shore, he was nearing hypothermia. Jukes and his friends quickly took the wet pair back to their school where the principal was alerted.

Rose Valley Elementary School principal Brian Harms credits the three rescuers with saving the youths' lives.

details intended use of the land if purchased by the non-profit society. Its release says "areas significant to the province for their ecological, geological and archaeological features would be managed in their natural state, while the bulk of the land would remain in productive forest use. Rather than simply exporting raw logs, the Conservancy foresees new economic benefits from the forest to the community."

Kadatz said MB would consider a GCA purchase proposal the same as any other party. "All they have to do is make an offer," he said.

If property remains unsold after B.C. residents "have eaten their fill, so to speak," he said, sales will be opened up to Canadian residents.

Hydro delays planned Electric Plus rate hike

An application to substantially increase B.C. Hydro rates charged to Electric Plus program customers will be delayed due to the negative response it received.

A January 7 letter from Hydro's vice-president of customer services, John Sheehan, says Hydro will "delay any action with respect to the rates pending further communication with customers and the British Columbia Utilities Commission."

B.C. Hydro notified EP customers in October of its intention to apply in April for a 32 per cent rate increase (from 2.5 to 3.3 cents per kilowatt hour).

In the January 7 letter, Sheehan

said feedback indicated a sense of "confusion" regarding the potential rate increase. People also felt the rate should not rise the full 32 per cent at once, he said.

"One alternative," he said, "is to phase this increase over two or three years and this delay will allow time to review these possibilities."

EP customers are those who had electric heating installed in their homes as a "back-up" heat source after a 1987 promotion by B.C. Hydro. These people invested money to change to electric heat, with a guarantee from Hydro that rates would be fixed at 2.5 cents per kilowatt hour until at least March 31,

1991. This was 56 per cent of the rate charged to other customers in 1987.

The agreement also stipulated that the rate charged to them would not exceed two-thirds of the price of electricity charged to regular customers.

In his January 7 letter, Sheehan said Hydro would "stand by that commitment" to not raise rates beyond two-thirds of its standard price.

Lower rates were promised to compensate EP customers for the capital cost of installing electric heat and because in the event of an electricity shortage, EP homes could have their supply "interrupted." No

shortage occurred since implementation of the program.

Ganges Hydro office spokesman Trent Ward estimates 220 Gulf Islands homeowners are on the EP program. He noted that regular Hydro rates rose slightly last year, adding to the total amount of the proposed EP increase.

At least one Salt Spring resident is concerned about the proposed rate hike and feels it discriminates against those living in the Gulf Islands.

In its October letter to EP customers, Hydro suggests clients could now switch to natural gas, which it calls "the fuel of choice when it comes to home heating."

EP customer Mel Sumner points out that a natural gas pipeline will never be constructed to the Gulf Islands, so EP users here do not have that option. "I don't think they (Hydro) gave any thought to that," he said.

He suggests local EP customers write to the B.C. Utilities Commission to register opposition and at least request an exemption to the increase for Gulf Islands residents.

Sumner told the *Driftwood* Monday he felt that "if a lot of people write, then they will certainly take note of it."

Islanders call for peace in the Gulf

A small group of people attending regular Sunday peace vigils in Centennial Park ballooned into more than 100 people at last week's meeting as war in the Persian Gulf became imminent.

The Salt Spring Island Coalition Against War in Gulf evolved from this gathering of people which later met at Ganges United Church.

The coalition condensed its Sunday night message to state: "Yes to sanctions and diplomacy, and No to war."

Speakers noted that the move to escalate the violence in the Middle East makes a "travesty" of Canada's traditional peace-keeping role. They said Canada's "rush to war" was undertaken without input from the people, and stressed the greatest number of war casualties will be civilians, almost half of whom are children under the age of 16.

The potential for "massive" environmental damage cannot be calculated, it was noted.

The coalition adopted several courses of action:

- To express concerns to Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, Liberal leader Jean Cretien and New Democratic Party leader Audrey McLaughlin by sending public opinion telegrams (\$3.50 for 15 words) by calling UNITEL (1-800-361-1872), or by telephoning the main switchboard at the Ottawa Parliament Buildings (1-613-954-8211);

- To call local Member of Parliament Lynn Hunter. This can be achieved by telephoning her office at Zenith 2022 (dial operator) and leaving a message. Concerns will be forwarded to her office in Ottawa;

- To show personal solidarity by turning off electricity or other power and not using a gasoline engine Thursdays between 11 a.m. and noon;

- To join the Canadian Physicians for Prevention of Nuclear War's intention to light a candle each night at 7 p.m. and not use any other power for the next 10 minutes to one hour.

The coalition plans to stage another peace vigil in Centennial Park this Sunday, January 20. A follow-up action meeting will take place at 6 p.m. in the Ganges United Church. Those wanting additional information should phone 537-4500 or 653-4353.

Hunter expresses opposition to war

Local Member of Parliament Lynn Hunter has urged the Canadian government to speak out against war in the Middle East.

At a press conference in Victoria last Wednesday, Hunter and Victoria MP John Brewin released the text of a telegram delivered to the Prime Minister's office.

In the telegram the two New Democrat MPs express their dismay at the "failure of the government of Canada to speak out against war in the Middle East at this crucial time in the history of the world."

The telegram also urged Prime Minister Brian Mulroney to recall Parliament immediately to deal with the crisis. (He has since taken this step.)

As NDP Defence and Disarma-

ment critic, Brewin said the Canadian government must speak out before it is too late.

"War is simply insane. It must not be considered an option. Sanctions must be given time to work," he said in a prepared statement.

Hunter, NDP Global Environment Critic, warned of the potential for a world-wide ecological disaster if war breaks out in the Persian Gulf. She said that if even one-quarter of Iraqi oilfields are set on fire, "a nuclear winter will overtake the entire region with devastating results for the planet."

The telegram to Mulroney said war in the Gulf would be a catastrophe for the people of the region, the military personnel on both sides and their families, the global

environment and the people of the world.

"Canada must make it clear, particularly to the government of the United States," the telegram stated, "that the cost of a military attack on Iraq far outweighs the gain."

The two MPs urge the government to consider the eventual effect of economic sanction on Iraq: "Sanctions can force Iraq to conform with the directives of the United Nations Security Council."

"As long as there is a chance that sanctions might work, the use of military force is unjustified and illegal in international law."

The telegram concludes with a request for an immediate recalling of Parliament to deal with the matter.

B.C. Ferry Corporation fare hike will offset rising operational cost

Cost of ferry travel increases 25 cents as of February 1, 1991.

In making the fare increase announcement, transportation minister Rita Johnston said the hikes would help cover rising operational costs which resulted from a new contract recently signed with the ferry workers' union.

Other costs come from the higher price of fuel, grants in lieu of taxes being paid to municipalities as well as planned service improvements and acquisition of new vessels.

Danny Evanishen of the Salt Spring Transportation Committee said the boost in fares was expected. At the same time he stressed that transport via B.C. Ferries costs less for travellers than any other system in the world.

The increases cover fares on all routes served by B.C. Ferries in the Gulf Islands.

Foot passengers travelling from Salt Spring to Vancouver Island will pay an extra 15 cents with the new fare set at \$1.75 compared to the current cost of \$1.60. Travellers going between Gulf Islands face an added 25 cents with the fare going to \$1.75 from \$1.50.

Children under five years of age will continue to travel free while those youngsters between five years and 11 years of age will pay 75 cents

for each ferry trip. The price for children is now 60 cents on routes between Salt Spring and Vancouver Island. Children travelling between the Outer Gulf Islands will pay 60 cents, whereas now they are charged 65 cents.

Students using ferries to get to school will continue to travel free as will those students going on school events.

B.C. Ferries will continue its policy of allowing seniors to ride free Monday through Thursday.

Cost for vehicles on the Salt Spring runs rises to \$6 from \$5.50 while Outer Gulf Islands traffic will pay \$6.50, up from \$6. Travelling from one island to another will cost \$3.25, compared to \$3.

Motorcyclists will pay \$3 for Salt Spring runs, \$3.25 for the Outer Gulf Islands to Swartz Bay route and \$1.50 between islands. If a side car or trailer is added to the motorcycle, the fare is doubled.

For cyclists, 15 cents has been added with the new fare set at \$1.25, regardless of the route compared to a current price of \$1.10.

Use of the ferry to the mainland from the Gulf Islands poses the largest raise for islanders. Passenger fares go to \$4.25 from \$4, while the vehicle price rises to \$17.25 from \$16.

Bulk rate tickets also fall victim to the fare increases. For Salt Spring travel, a book of 10 passenger tickets rises to \$12.25 from \$11.50. Bulk tickets for passenger and vehicle will be set at \$43.50 for 10, up from \$41.

Passengers on Outer Gulf Islands boats travelling to Swartz Bay will pay the same price as Salt Spring foot travellers. Combined vehicle and passenger tickets on the bulk rate tickets for those islands goes up to \$45 from \$42.50.

Books of commuter tickets will continue to be sold at the current price until stocks run out or until February 1. After that time, the tickets purchased now will continue to be honoured without a surcharge being added to reflect the price increase.

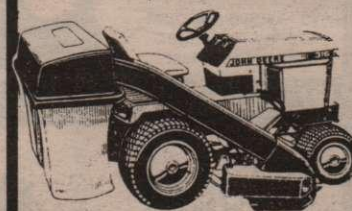

A Native focus enriches vision of the audience

The year 1990 will be remembered by many as the year the Native Indian people of Canada spoke clearly to the rest of this country about their desperate need for recognition and justice. This is an issue that has festered for many years and is gaining momentum.

In keeping with long-standing artistic traditions, the arts community throughout North America has taken on the painful and powerful subject of telling the real story of past and present realities for the Native Indian people.

The recent Hollywood, blockbuster film *Dances with Wolves*, recreates the history of the settling of the American west, and the irrevocable consequences this held for the Native people. The film is the brainchild of actor Kevin Costner, who also stars in it.

Sensitive and beautifully rendered views of Native Indian people are not just the subjects of Hollywood. Salt Spring Islanders will be treated this weekend to readings from *The Comfort of Angels* by

Sandi Johnson. Before coming to Salt Spring Island, Johnson worked with Ojibwa Indians in Ontario, and has written a book based on her experiences.

Lynda Jensen, Sandi Johnson, Dawn Luker and Yarrow Sheehan will read excerpts from Johnson's book *The Comfort of Angels* this Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, 8 p.m. at Mahon Hall.

Johnson's writing is sensitive, poignant and at times borders on poetry. The images that she evokes while describing glimpses of her various characters will make you laugh at one moment and then stop you short not long after, feeling the deep pain of these tragic lives.

The Comfort of Angels is a remarkable piece of work, providing insight into the simple, sad and beautiful lives of the Native Indian people.

The four women reading from *The Comfort of Angels* bring seasoned acting skills to the performance, breathing life into Johnson's characters. It is a moving piece of work, with the words of street politician and philosopher Moses Bottle saying "the heart is your greatest treasure, don't let anyone demolish it," not easily forgotten.

Johnson has the ability to write words that communicate a deep understanding of the people she had the privilege of working with. She is able to help us feel the pain and the joy of these people and to have a momentary glimpse of "the people who knew the wind."

This is a rich entertainment opportunity as well as a chance to gain some understanding of this unique culture. *The Comfort of Angels* — not to be missed this weekend.

The Purcell String Quartet will give a benefit concert for the Galiano Conservancy Association at the Woodstone Country Inn on Galiano Island.

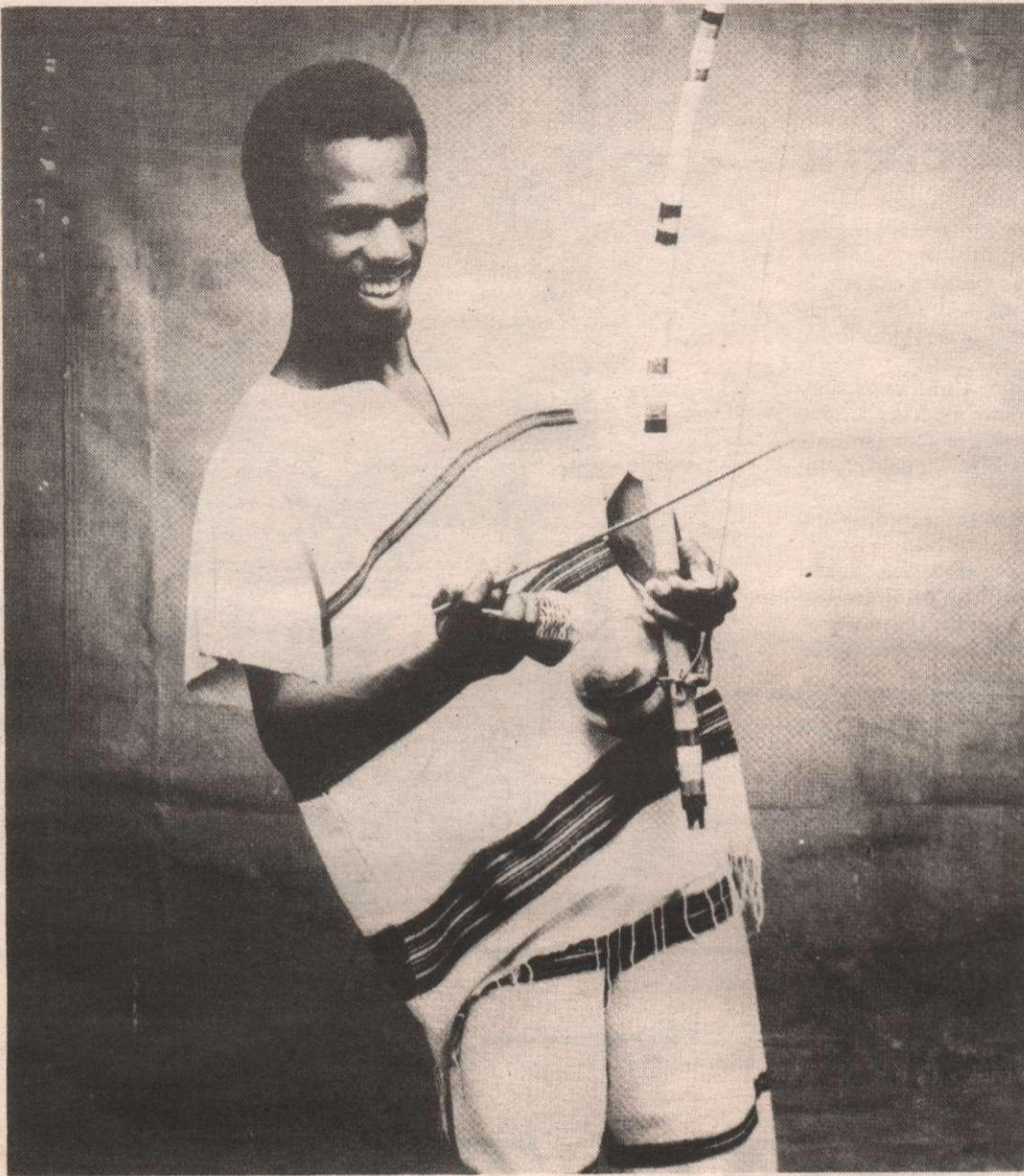
The event will take place Sunday, January 27, beginning at 2 p.m. It will feature the music of Beethoven, Purcell, Schumann and Webern.

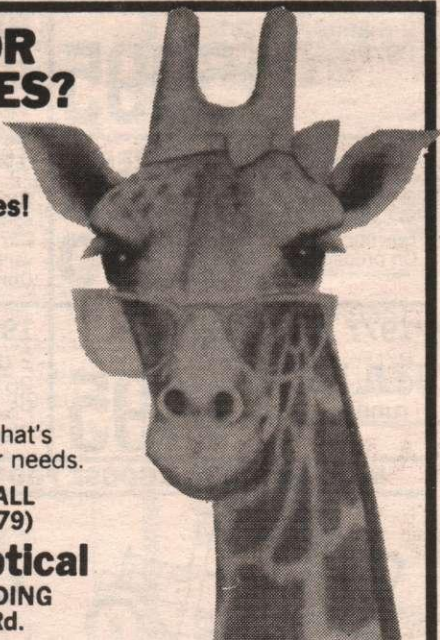

New Trager Approach helps relieve stress

Islanders have a new option in bodywork for alleviating stress and chronic physical and psychological pain.

Nirmal Dryden is a certified practitioner of the Trager Approach, a form of massage therapy differing from traditional Swedish massage. She has recently set up her practice in Dr. Peter Bennett's office in the Lancer Building.

The main difference in Trager is the use of lighter, non-intrusive, hands-on movements to relax the client's mind and body. Joints and body tissue are manipulated and massaged with varying pressure, and oils are not used as in regular massage therapy. An average session takes one hour to complete.

Dryden says the gentleness of her bodywork reduces feelings of being threatened which normally cause tension. Clients develop a sense of being in "a safe environment."

"Once the fear of threat is out of the way, people get a lot out of it," she says. Trager allows the conscious mind to relax and take a break from its usual vigilant duties. As a result, she says, "the subconscious is reached and it picks up on the lightness."

Sensations of lightness and relaxation can rest in the subconscious and be recalled later outside of a therapist's office, explains Dryden.

One of the aims of Trager, she says, is to "re-educate and learn a softer, looser way to be and live." It is particularly beneficial for relieving stress, anxiety, lower back pain, joint

and muscle problems, she adds.

The mind's control over the way the body feels is acknowledged in the Trager Approach.

After a few Trager sessions, says Dryden, people begin to realize "they don't need to hang onto old pain and injuries." Some of Dryden's clients have spontaneously remembered childhood incidents or pain during a

session, and the burden of such memories is released through her work. She says her role at this point is to be "non-interfering yet supportive of what they want to experience."

Dryden's techniques were developed by Dr. Milton Trager, who observed the movement of his hands on a person's body provide a tangible

release from anxiety, pain or disabilities suffered. He then developed a series of bodywork movements which form the basis of Trager therapy.

Dryden has practiced Trager for two and one-half years, receiving training in Boulder, Colorado, San Diego, Toronto and Vancouver. As a certified practitioner, she undergoes an annual tutorial from a Trager Institute member who reviews her work.

She is classified as an "advanced" practitioner and is also certified to practice "alternative techniques." One of these techniques is providing therapy to people who cannot lie on the therapist's table due to severe back problems.

She has found that older people particularly benefit from Trager sessions. Many seniors, she says, suffer unnecessary pain because they cannot exercise to loosen up joints and muscles.

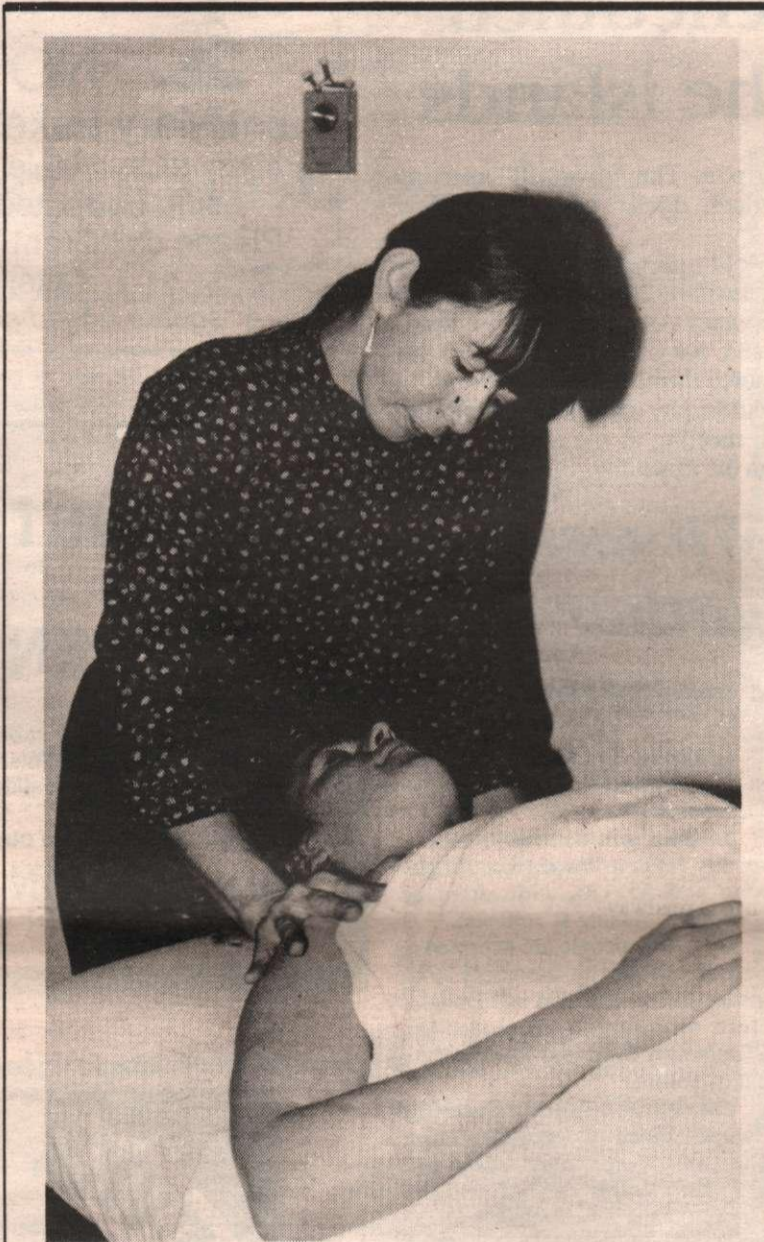
"Trager can help you stay loose without doing heavy exercise," she says.

After analyzing a client's specific problems, Dryden gives instruction on movements that can be done at home to advance the effects of her work.

From travelling extensively throughout the world, Dryden says she has been immersed in a number of different philosophies and ideas. The study of Trager was a path that felt right for Dryden.

Expanding her practice and developing roots on Salt Spring, her primary home for over a year, forms the basis of a new direction.

Dryden can be reached through Dr. Peter Bennett's office number (537-4419) until January 21 and at 537-2400 after that date. Sessions cost \$40 and are not covered by the B.C. Medical Plan; however, Dryden says she will consider a discount in certain situations.

CB radio operators sought

A member of Salt Spring's emergency measures group urges islanders with CB radios to get back on the airwaves.

Rick Saunders, who voluntarily monitors the emergency Channel 9 with his own CB equipment, says radio operators could be an important communication link in the event of a civil disaster.

While general information of area conditions might be available on Victoria radio stations, he says, if phone lines went down, the state of Salt Spring Island would be unknown. CB operators would have the only direct access to what is happening.

Saunders wonders, however, "if there was an emergency on the island, how many CB radio owners would turn them on?"

Saunders says even when Ganges Hill was closed to traffic for a short time on December 17, a few more active CB radio operators could have spread the word and reduced the number of vehicles attempting to use the road.

He estimates between 20 to 40 CB units are owned by islanders, "but the thing is, they don't use them." Many people have them in their vehicles to use only on hunting or fishing trips. Otherwise they are stored in the back of closets collecting dust, he says.

A list of equipment owners would be helpful for emergency planning, says Saunders. He invites Salt Spring CB owners and operators to contact him at P.O. Box 1456 in Ganges, describing the type of equipment

"I'd be astounded if this planet is still going 50 years from now. I don't think we will reach 2000. It would be miraculous."

The great British-cum-American journalist Alistair Cooke made the foregoing prophecy away back during the darkest days of World War II. He was, it appears, unduly pessimistic. The millennium is just nine years off and we're still here. (So's Alistair, come to that).

But we owe our survival more to good luck than good management. We still treat the earth as a combination candy store/garbage dump. Every so often a government flack comes to the parapet wall to announce glorious new plans to save the environment, but if you look around it's still business as usual.

In some jurisdictions the government doesn't even pretend to mean well. In Karnataka, a state in southern India, a project to study the dwindling population of Royal Bengal tigers has been abruptly cancelled by the Minister of Forests.

"If nature wants tigers to die out, who are we to save them?" snapped the Minister in an interview. "Have you ever heard a tiger complain?"

Shades of Ronald Reagan sleepily philosophizing "If you've seen one Redwood, you've seen 'em all."

Trying to "save" the dolphins

Things are not a lot better in Japan, where last month the Foreign Ministry issued a press release announcing that coastal dolphins were suffering from "massive depression." How did they arrive at that diagnosis? Well, the dolphins were committing suicide, you see. In fact, 600 of them had thrown themselves ashore just a week earlier.

What's that? All those Japanese fishing boats out there? Oh, no — they weren't trying to drive the dolphins ashore to protect their fishing grounds, they were trying to "save" the dolphins and lead them out to sea.

Uh huh. Unfortunately, Japan does not have a lot of credibility in off-shore environmental circles. These are the same folks who use driftnets and factory ships to strip mine the oceans of everything that floats. Last month the Japanese whaling fleet set sail for the Antarctic over the protests of the International Whaling Commission.

Whale meat selling for \$200 per pound

And whale meat is now selling in Tokyo restaurants for more than \$200 a pound. All told, the Japanese plan to "study" 300 minke whales.

Yep, when it comes to sheer perversity, the old two-legged hairless Homo Sapiens is hard to top.

Not that you have to be Asian or Oriental to participate. Last I heard, our own beloved federal government still had plans to slaughter 3500 bison in Wood Buffalo National Park.

Official reason for slaughter: some of the animals have tuberculosis and brucellosis and we wouldn't want those diseases to spread to domestic cattle.

Actual reason for slaughter: under the terms of the Canada/U.S. Free Trade agreement, Canadian livestock must be certified brucellosis-free.

Which they are — and will remain so. Wood Buffalo Park is far too remote to pose any infection threat to domestic cattle.

But why take a chance, eh? So what if it means obliterating the largest herd of wild bison on the planet?

We wouldn't want to offend Big Brother.

Dr. Brodie Cupples has been elected to represent the Gulf Islands on the Inter-Island Sheep Breeders Association board of directors.

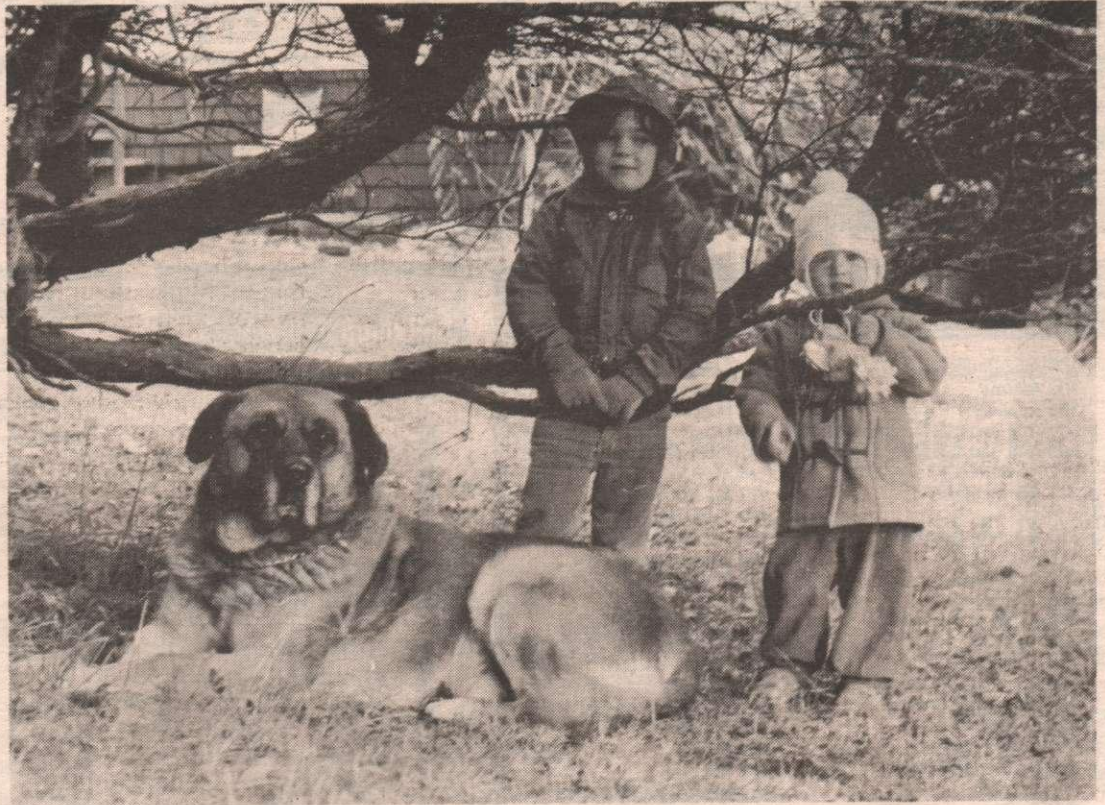

It's not too early to start toning muscles and preparing for a "real athletic event" scheduled for this July.

Salt Spring Islander Patricia Brown has initiated plans for an island triathlon July 28. Money raised from the event will be split between the Salt Spring Island Pool Society and Island Pathways, a group working to incorporate bicycle paths on island roadways.

Although the triathlon does not take place until July, Brown says participants should start training well before the event. The planned race will involve a one-mile swim, a 20-mile bike ride and six-mile run.

Because organizers are looking for maximum participation, the event will allow team and individual entries. Although Brown intends to participate in each leg of the triathlon, she says three-member teams — with an athlete for each part of the race — will also be welcome.

Participants will raise money by seeking sponsorship of their participation.

Early plans for the triathlon use Cedar Beach Resort on St. Mary Lake as a focus point. Swimmers will leave from the resort, swim across the lake and back.

The cycling part of the event will then leave from the resort, follow a northern route and circle back to the starting point. Cyclists will complete the 10-mile route twice.

The six-mile run will begin after the cycling leg is completed.

Brown says a bikathon staged in conjunction with Earth Day last year raised approximately \$5,000 for Is-

land Pathways. (That money remains in the bank while the group plans implementation of the bicycle paths.) Brown hopes money raised from the triathlon will exceed this amount.

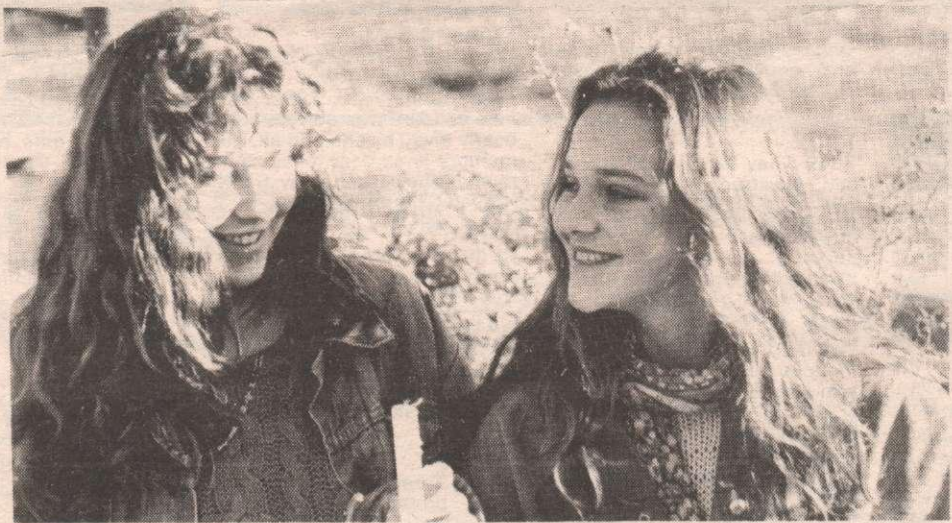

Government adopts NDP policy

Five years after the NDP first embraced the concept, the Socred government has decided to shelve plans for the Site "C" dam project in the Peace River region in favour of energy conservation programs and small-scale energy-producing projects.

In 1985, the NDP tabled legislation that proposed to move the province's future energy planning away from massive projects such as Site "C", but like every opposition bill, this one, too, was rejected.

Anne Edwards, the NDP's energy critic, said the dam project would have destroyed about 7,150 hectares of land, including about 3,000 hectares of prime agricultural land.

The land in question, Edwards added, should be put back into the Agricultural Land Reserve immediately.

Trees for 100 Mile House

The B.C. Forest Service will provide 50,000 seedlings to be planted in an old burn site at the entrance to the village of 100 Mile House, Forest Minister Claude Richmond said last week.

Wildfires burned the hillside area in the mid-1960s and since then, the area has been only partially restocked. Because of the very dry southern exposure, lodgepole pine have been prescribed for the area.

Literacy program

British Columbia and Ottawa announced joint funding of about \$900,000 last week for a number of provincial literacy projects.

The projects include native literacy tutor training, improved learning materials for adults, a province-wide public awareness campaign to strengthen the literacy network, and an assessment centre for adults with learning disabilities.

Investigation becomes probe

Highways Minister Rita Johnston was eager last week to correct earlier reports that the ministry was "investigating" a number of highways maintenance contractors because they were doing a lousy job clearing highways of ice and snow.

"What I said was that normal procedures were being followed to ensure a proper job of snow-clearing was being done during the unusually heavy snowfall in many parts of the province," the minister said. "No one is being investigated," she added.

Airport makes money

Vancouver International Airport's latest annual report says the airport made a \$20 million profit last year. Revenues rose to a record \$64.3 million; expenditures came to \$44.3 million.

More housing starts

Despite the current recession, house construction is expected to start climbing again in the second quarter of this year, the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation said last week.

The sharp downward trend in housing starts that marked the last half of 1990 is showing signs of easing, according to CMHC, but before the recovery begins, the number of starts is expected to be a low of 1,400 units a month. That compares with 1,675 units last November.

More economic indicators

Average earnings in British Columbia were \$532.66 a week in October, up 1.3 per cent from September and six per cent higher than the previous year.

Meanwhile, retail sales during the first nine months of 1990 were 8.4 per cent ahead of the same period the year before, while manufacturing shipments reached \$2.1 billion in October, a 5.8 per cent increase over September.

Environment charges

Charges were laid last week under the Waste Management Act against the pulp mill operated by MacMillan Bloedel in Port Alberni. The charges follow a ministry investigation into a spill of weak black liquor on September 19 which exceeded the Waste Management permit requirements.

The maximum fine for two of the three counts the firm has been charged with is \$1 million; the maximum fine for the remaining count is \$200,000. The first court appearance has been set for January 30 in Port Alberni Provincial Court.
