## Mid-week vending may be reviewed

Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission should take another look at its mid-week vending ban for Centennial Park, one of its members said this week.

Bill Curtin spoke after presentations were heard from three people speaking in favour of mid-week vending at Monday night's PRC meeting.

"Obviously, we have some work to do," he said.

At its August 29 meeting, the PRC had voted to ban mid-week vending in Centennial Park in 1992.

Kathryn Steele, who operated her mid-week vending business, Natcho Wagon, until the end of August, said the PRC should abide by the results of a 1985 referendum favoured of midweek vending.

"They did a referendum in 1985 and twice they have passed motions against it," she told the commission. "The referendum represents the people who own and use the park and that is why I feel it should be binding."

The 1985 referendum question read: "Are you in favour of commercial activity (vending) at Centennial Park at times other than the Saturday Farmers' Market?"

Results of the poll indicated a majority in favour of vending, 1173 votes were cast for mid-week vending and 1143 against.

"Here we have a referendum by taxpayers and they have voted in favour of mid-week vending. What right or authority do you have to

## Trust Council discusses biosphere

A proposal to designate the Gulf Islands a United Nations-sanctioned biosphere reserve received a thorough airing when Saanich and the Islands MP Lynn Hunter met with Islands Trust Council in Victoria Saturday.

Hunter addressed many questions raised by the 22 trustees attending the meeting.

She stressed that rather than

making the Gulf Islands an instant park as some people envision the concept to mean, a biosphere plan would primarily encourage a change in peoples' attitudes towards preserving an area.

"What it does is encourages a change in mindset and gives it credibility," she said.

She said the word "reserve" seemed to be "a red flag" of concern. "I think the word *reserve* is a misnomer. It is not a park, although islands can have parks as part of them."

She pointed to the Waterton Lakes biosphere reserve in Alberta

where farmers, ranchers, Environment Canada, MacMillan Bloedel Ltd. and Shell Oil actively operate together.

John Stepaniuk wanted to know how "socioeconomics" factored into the biosphere plan. He said "because of proposals like this we are beginning to create an elitist society."

Saturna trustee John Money said "one thing that makes me nervous is we (Gulf island residents) already get to feeling we are living in a fish-bowl."

He said he could imagine "the new yuppie thing to do" becoming

"getting a piece of property in the biosphere."

Hunter responded by saying a biosphere region "has no legislative authority and no effect on private property."

Saturna trustee Harvey Janszen said he felt the biosphere plan needed legislation providing "real controls" in order to be effective.

Bowen trustee Graeme Dinsdale said the Islands Trust has a provincial mandate to preserve the islands but with diminishing resources. Only developers can afford the environmental impact studies that need to be done on Trust islands, he said. "How do you get recognition of the need that somebody has to pay for that?"

Hunter said she believed "the resources are there. It is a matter of government priorities and the political will."

Designating the islands a biosphere region would provide a stronger framework for establishing political priorities, she said.

Lasqueti trustee Barry Kurland said he appreciated what Hunter was proposing but that "the Trust has been trying for years things like protecting water resources and

## Dock recommendation denied

Salt Spring Island's local Trust committee will not recommend approval to Crown lands of a dock application for Vesuvius Bay.

Noting community opposition to an application from Josette Whist for a Crown lands foreshore lease, committee members made the decision at last Tuesday's regular monthly meeting.

In doing so trustees also countered

After discussing specifics of the case, trustee John Stepaniuk initially suggested any recommendation from the committee be deferred. Committee chairman Diane Cragg told him that was not possible.

He then decided to vote against granting approval to Crown Lands "in view of the fact the community spoke so loudly and shoreline procedures are well underway and certain

dures," Stepaniuk was referring to a Trust committee plan to rezone Salt Spring's foreshore. A shoreline study has recently been completed by local Trust staff.

Trustee Bob Andrew noted the contradiction between Salt Spring's community plan and opposition expressed by many people. The community plan allows construction of private docking facilities in Vesuvius

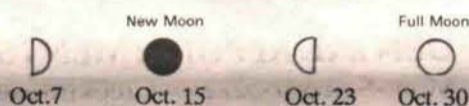

### Candidates coming for meeting

Salt Spring voters' one and only chance to meet all five North Saanich and the Islands election candidates in one room takes place tomorrow night.

A Community Planning Association-sponsored all-candidates meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 3 at 7:15 p.m. at the Activity Centre in Salt Spring Elementary.

Candidates are the Liberal Party's Clive Tanner, Don Hutchings for the Reform Party of B.C., Family Coalition Party member Thomas Ausenegg, Elsie McMurphy for the New Democratic Party and Social Credit Party candidate Richard Holmes.

Each person will make their pitch to voters followed by questions being taken from the floor.

Matthew Coleman will be meeting moderator.

forestry resources."

He said making more remote areas like Robson Bight a biosphere reserve might be more appropriate because "I don't see anybody around this (Trust Council) table who would pass legislation saying no more people are allowed to come here."

"Part of the problem is right now we have a biosphere, spelled b-u-y-a-sphere," he said.

Galiano trustee Margaret Griffiths compared the idea to the National Trust in England where "life goes on but it is all kept in balance." She added that because "we are at the whim of political parties" it was necessary "to connect with other non-political agencies like the U.N."

Hunter said "I hear desires for legislation from some and fear of legislation from others. Once again we have to have an open mind about things."

Trust chairman Carol Martin said "it is very heartening to know another level of government shares our concerns. I suggest we listen, learn and pool our resources."

Council appointed Mayne trustee Louis Vallee and Lasqueti's Janice McMillan to represent Trust council in future discussions on the biosphere concept.

"It is going to take all of you working and pushing for this idea to take hold," said Hunter, adding that it is time for her to step back. "I don't want this to be a Lynn Hunter, NDP government proposal."

"I put this forward as a means of resolving conflict," she added "and as a way to deal with development pressures in the Gulf Islands."

In Ottawa, she said, "they call me the MP from Paradise. We have got to find a way to preserve paradise."

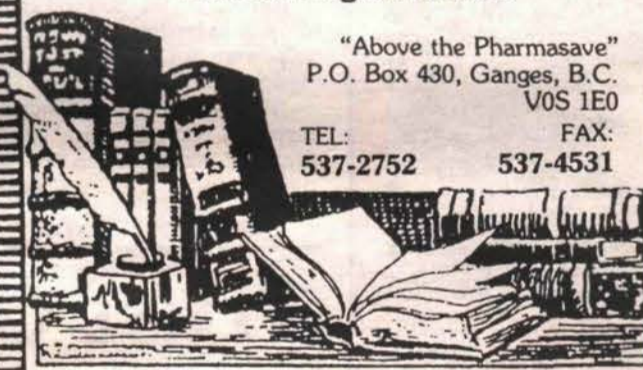

# Salmon ready to return

Salt Spring Island Salmon Enhancement Society is excavating and cleaning out a Ganges stream so salmon returning this fall will be able to spawn.

Spectators will have a clear view of the spawning salmon, which will be three to four feet long, near the juncture of McPhillips Avenue and Jackson Avenue, enhancement

society member Kathy Reimer said from the site Thursday.

Forty chum salmon are expected to return to the creek to spawn in November and December, she said. The fish, 4,000 of them, were released four years ago by students of Salt Spring Elementary and Gulf Island Secondary.

Numbers of salmon returning to spawn is based on an estimate that one per cent of the salmon released will return. "There could be more or less. If they survive it should be quite a sight," Reimer said.

Currently, society employees are clearing the west branch of the Ganges Creek of blackberry bushes, shrubbery, silt, mud and even rusted cars and farm machinery.

The creek channel will be covered in rock and gravel after the cleaning is complete. Aquatic plants will be introduced and trees and fall rye will be planted on the creek banks to prevent erosion, she said.

Work on the site will last until the end of October, at which time about 500 meters of spawning beds and rearing ponds will stretch from the funeral parlor to the fish plant.

Water is not running in the creek now, but "the creek becomes a raging torrent in winter," said Reimer. The river will be approximately two feet deep and four feet wide when the salmon return. "Perfect for spawning."

The creek restoration is a project of the Environment Partners Fund Project.

# Flyer questions support for landfill expenditures

Salt Spring island residents received a flyer in the mail this week regarding a proposed \$55,000 expenditure for an on-island landfill site survey.

Capital Regional District director Julia Atkins outlined her plan to canvass islanders at last Thursday's Community Forum sponsored by the Advisory Planning Commission.

Islanders have been asked if they support spending \$55,000 to identify three possible sites for an on island landfill. Included in the cost are soil and water testing on the proposed sites.

"This will determine whether proposed sites meet basic environmental and engineering requirements and will give us more reliable estimates of the cost to develop a specific site," states the flyer sent to Salt Spring residents.

"This flyer includes an informal counter-petition process which gives you an opportunity to express your

opposition to proceeding with this first step towards an on-island landfill," Atkins told the meeting.

"If you do oppose, however, you should be aware that our chances of establishing a landfill will be almost zero."

"What makes you think a majority wants an on-island landfill?" a man in the audience asked Atkins. "Are we not spending \$55,000 to satisfy an interest group?"

Atkins replied there is that possibility, and pointed to referendum results from 1989 that some islanders interpreted as indicating 97 per cent of islanders want an on-island landfill.

"I'm trying to satisfy a perceived demand by islanders that we want an on-island landfill," she said.

She said the \$55,000 is "not a lot of money in the overall scheme of things. It's a decision for islanders to make."

Fifty per cent of Salt Spring's garbage must be recycled by the year 1995, according to a Solid Waste Management Plan document produced by the Capital Regional District.

"If we do recycle 50 per cent, can we support the costs of a landfill?" Atkins asked. "Is it not only suitable but can we afford to do it?"

Residents at the meeting also expressed concern that water supplies on the island may not be adequate for the population the island zoning may support.

Atkins tied this into discussions on the landfill, saying an on-island landfill may jeopardize some of "our last pristine water supplies."

### Allegation untrue

I read with interest your coverage of the Lady Minto Hospital annual general meeting and Mr. Colin Nicholson's letter to the editor of the *Driftwood*, of September 18, 1991.

I am not prepared to comment on the reference to Ministry of Health model by-laws or the ministry's policies with respect to employee representation on hospital boards. It is accurate that hospital by-laws must be approved by the minister.

I do, however, feel compelled to comment upon the allegation that the Juan de Fuca Hospital Society has an elected employee representative to its board of directors. This is quite simply, not true, and I have no idea

Fuca Hospital Society's by-laws, at Article 2, Section 8, stipulates as follows:

"No employee of the Society shall be eligible for membership in the Society, or for appointment as a member of the Board."

Consistent with that by-law, the Juan de Fuca Hospital Society has nine elected directors (elected by society members) and several members appointed by various agencies including the (Capital Regional District), the Ministry of Health, the University of Victoria and the Hospital Auxiliary. These individuals come from a wide variety of personal and career backgrounds including health care related professions. No director or society member is or can be an employee of the Juan de Fuca Hospital Society.

VICTORIA — My mother used to tell me that one can't be too careful in the choice of one's friends. She should have told the Socreds the same thing.

I mean, how would you like to be Rita Johnston and wake up to a Vancouver Sun front page headline, telling you that one of your candidates did research for Ernst Zundel?

Zundel is the Nazi disciple who claims that the Holocaust was a hoax. Zundel was convicted in 1985 of spreading false news. He appealed the conviction and won, but was retried in 1988 and again convicted. Zundel has since appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada, and his case is to be heard in December.

Asked about his involvement with Zundel, John Ball, the Social Credit candidate for Richmond East, said he has thought about the matter since and "those ideas abhor me."

But leaving aside for a moment his deliverance from evil, Ball, a geologist, said he was never really on the Zundel team. He only performed a professional service for Zundel, which consisted of analyzing aerial photographs of Nazi concentration camps.

Lame explanation

The discovery didn't exactly help an already battered Social Credit Party restore voters' confidence, even though Ball stepped down as candidate. Nor did Johnston's somewhat lame explanation that as she understood it, Ball didn't really share Zundel's beliefs. They'd have been better off letting former premier Bill Vander Zalm run in that riding, criminal charges and all.

Elsewhere on the campaign trail, things are starting to heat up as well. Angered by protesters bent on interrupting Johnston's campaign, the Young Socreds refused entry to the Rutland Community Hall to anyone they didn't recognize as a Socred supporter.

Even Johnston's press secretary, Ian Jessop admitted later that they were perhaps "more aggressive than they had to be," but Johnston said she looked upon them "as a welcoming party."

Meanwhile, the Socred television ad campaign is switching into high gear. As I mentioned in an earlier column, the main target of the Socred campaign is not Mike Harcourt but Bob Rae. Scores of Ontarians are telling us how terrible things have become in their province since the NDP has come to power.

But if the Ontario NDP's fiscal record is fair game for the Socreds, their own record on ethics seems to be taboo, which prompted a specialist on ethics to speak out.

Ethics record taboo

Paul Russell, a University of British Columbia professor who teaches social ethics, says it is bizarre that Social Credit claims NDP leader Mike Harcourt is responsible for the Ontario NDP government, but won't take responsibility for its own record.

"It concerns me that Social Credit is saying people should forget about the past. People like Rita Johnston are responsible for the behaviour of her government," Russell said.

Issues are coming to the fore, even some unexpected ones such as Johnston's promise to bring in legislation that would bar teachers who were found guilty of sexual abuse from ever teaching again.

It's a promise that should sit well with every parent, but one must ask why her government hasn't done anything about the problem until now. In fact, one must ask why the Socred government did everything it could to weaken the infrastructure that could have protected a lot of people, including children, from physical and sexual abuse.

Nobody argues that sex offenders must not be permitted to hold positions of trust, but where was Johnston's concern for children when her government gutted the financial resources that protected abused women and children? Does Johnston think her government helped matters when it cut down the number of family crisis workers and child abuse teams?

Something different

And now for something completely different — the B.C. Green Party. While it's probably safe to predict that the Greens won't form the next government, I should devote some space in this column to their platform which is, to say at least somewhat unusual.

First off, the Greens say if they have anything to do with it, everybody would have to vote, regardless of age. Five-year-olds? Why not. There would also be no medicare, no national health-care standards and no international or national trade agreements.

Regional control, they say is the answer. The province would be divided into ecological regions, each of which would be self-reliant in terms of food supply, the economy, trade relations, health services and garbage disposal. War toys, they say, would probably be banned.

The B.C. Greens hope to have candidates in all 75 ridings, although they say they would be happy with 60. They've targeted four ridings as winnable — West Vancouver-Garibaldi, Comox Valley, Surrey-Newton, and Vancouver Quilchena. I wish them

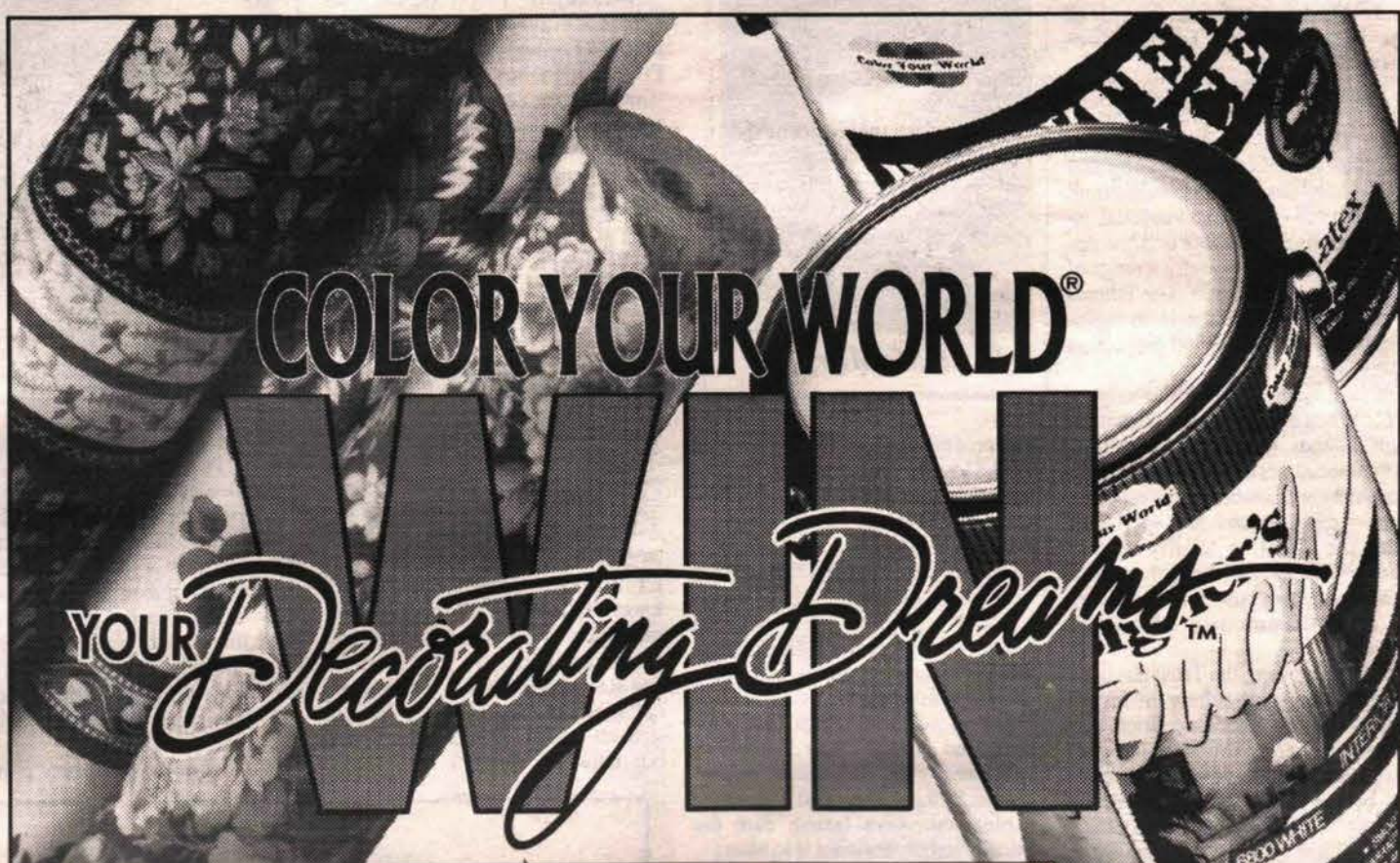

Voters in the Gulf Islands have questions about several critical issues for candidates in the October 17 provincial election. Because they might not have an opportunity themselves to ask the questions and hear answers, *Gulf Islands Driftwood* prepared an Election Questionnaire last Thursday and sent it via fax to all five declared candidates in Saanich-North Islands.

By deadline Monday, responses had been received from two candidates and they appear below.

**1. What do you see as the role of the Islands Trust in this constituency?**

**Elsie McMurphy, New Democrat:** New Democrats established the Islands Trust and I support it as an excellent model of participation and community-based decision-making. The balance between individual island planning processes and the approval process provides for a range of interests to be reflected. The Islands Trust has an essential role in maintaining the environmental protection of the islands.

**Clive Tanner, Liberal Party of B.C.:** When it was recognized that the Gulf Islands were both something truly special and, at the same time, extremely vulnerable to unrestricted development which could spell their ruin, the Trust, a locally-elected body, was given the job of administering land use which lead to Official Community Plans and zoning.

In the last year, the Trust has been strengthened, particularly in regard to its financing. In consequence, better facilities and extra planning staff have been made available and there has been a noticeable improvement in carrying out the Trust functions.

The Trust should continue with its present powers and responsibilities, ensuring that Community Plans are reviewed periodically with adequate public input, and should maintain this overall land use role even if some form of local municipal government is introduced to any of the Gulf Islands.

**2. What level of government should be responsible for solid waste management in the Gulf Islands?**

**Tanner:** The Ministry of Environment must be responsible for the policy and guidelines in respect to the handling and disposal of solid waste. However, once a management plan has been approved, the supervision of facilities should come under the Regional District. Even so, it is to be hoped that enough flexibility will be shown so that local requirements are met with due regard to convenience, common sense and costs.

**McMurphy:** All levels of government should emphasize the 3 Rs — reduce, re-use, and recycle — to limit the waste management problems. New Democrats are committed to helping local and regional governments speed up recycling programs

**3. How do you think we can control rising health costs and maintain the level of care islanders expect?**

**McMurphy:** Maintaining quality health care while controlling costs is a matter of priorities. Social Credit has allowed surgery waiting lists and ward closures while it has spent money on a doctors' pension plan and building hospital wings that have remained empty. New Democrats will identify the unnecessary expenditures in the system and will, at the same time, give health care the priority taxpayers want it to have.

**Tanner:** Create a ministry of community development to support local initiatives and keep patients in their own communities. Expand home and hospice facilities in the Islands, and encourage progressive community-based health care delivery systems. Improve preventative health care. Liberals think by this method costs will be reduced, enabling the investment of funds into needed resources. Negotiation of salaries and fees through co-operative consultation and mutual agreement would encourage medical personnel to be even more supportive of our medical plan.

**4. Considering the condition of Gulf Island roads, would you support the continuation of the current method of highways maintenance?**

**Tanner:** There seems to have been little purpose in privatizing the repair and maintenance of Gulf Island roads other than to satisfy a political philosophy. There does not appear to be an improved service and it is dubious whether it will end up costing less.

When it comes to up-grading roads on the Islands, the Ministry of

Highways should listen to the Islands Trust and not try to impose totally inappropriate standards just for the sake of extra speed or conformity with the rest of the Province.

**McMurphy:** People on the Gulf Islands are not satisfied with the current level of highways maintenance. Privatization has decreased public control at the same time that it has increased the costs. For such an essential service, it is important to have public setting of maintenance standards and for those standards to be met. This can be done more effectively when these services are run by government.

**5. Do you think Block Funding can serve the needs of rural school districts like the Gulf Islands?**

**McMurphy:** The current financing is clearly not adequate to meet the needs of the children in our schools. Sacred funding policies have not provided enough money overall. They have also created a system that does not meet the needs of special situations, such as those faced by rural districts. Local school boards know best the needs of the community, and New Democrats will return autonomy so school boards can act on behalf of the community's children. Education is an investment in the future of our society as well as our individual children.

**Tanner:** Block funding is acceptable if it is adequate. However, if it is under-funded and additional financing must be met from a local tax levy, insistence on a referendum to authorize such a levy will result in most cases, in a negative response. How is the general public able to make this kind of judgement without being heavily involved in all the ramifications of educational needs and costs? That is what the School Board is elected to do.

**6. How does your party plan to**

**balance spending and revenue in order to address taxpayers' concerns about growing deficits?**

**Tanner:** There must be fundamental government reform to eliminate duplication, waste, and overspending. Liberals think the establishment of an exchequer type dispensation of funds (single spending authority), the eradication of frivolous programs (for example \$29 million on self-promoting advertising) and wasteful duplication of government bureaucracy can reduce spending. Liberals believe federal funding (50 per cent in B.C.) of education, health and social programs should be spent on those programs, not on other less important schemes. We also think B.C. should negotiate with Ottawa on the income from GST to offset provincial sales tax. That is to say, some portion of GST income should come back to the province.

**McMurphy:** Social Credit priorities are wrong. There has been waste and abuse of power using air ambulances, empty offices and fat pay raises for political insiders while we have faced nursing lay-offs and overcrowded schools. New Democrats will give health, education and the environment the priority taxpayers want them to have.

New Democrats will keep taxes fair and under control. Under the Socreds, the average person's tax rates are up 18 per cent, while rates for corporations went down 12 per cent. New Democrats will place a surtax on high incomes and ensure that corporations pay at least a minimum tax.

override this referendum?" she asked the PRC.

She called the reasons for the ban of midweek vending, including food smells, noise and litter, "shallow. Is it your personal preference overriding the referendum?" she asked.

"Even though it won by 30 ballots it should be binding unless they want to do another referendum, which would cost more of taxpayer's money," Steele said.

Regional director Julia Atkins said the CRD does not have authority to go to referendum on a general question. "It may be the '85 referendum was illegal. I don't know. It might have been legal at that time. It would have to become a money matter to go to referendum."

Bev Unger, a former five-year member of the PRC, said the issue of mid-week vending was discussed when she was on the commission, adding Hugh Borsman would bring the issue to the commission's attention each month.

Borsman was against mid-week vending, she said. "Every month he would bring up the issue... and every month we would vote him down."

Unger said the current situation is another "elitist use of money to stop mid-week vending."

Because the PRC represents the total population, they have to respond to the total population, she said. "Take responsibility for the total population rather than respond to the squeaky wheels," Unger advised.

Real estate salesman Arvid Chalmers, who has his office in Ganges, said mid-week vending is an opportunity for the PRC to earn income to offset the costs of running the park, and for people to try out a business idea with little overhead.

"To me it is a proving ground for the community," he said. If a business succeeds, they become tenants, "and tax-paying tenants at that."

He suggested the committee put mid-week vending to the community

in a referendum.

PRC chairman Kellie Booth said there have been changes in the core area between 1985 and 1991. She said in 1985 there were few options for food. "Today there are quite a few."

As the population grows the demands being placed on the park are "enormous", Booth said. She ques-

tioned whether the PRC should be involved in commercial activity.

"Are we really in the business of renting commercial space?" she said.

PRC member Bill Curtin said Steele had agreed to put her notes for the meeting in writing and forward them to the commission. He said the issue needs to be researched further.

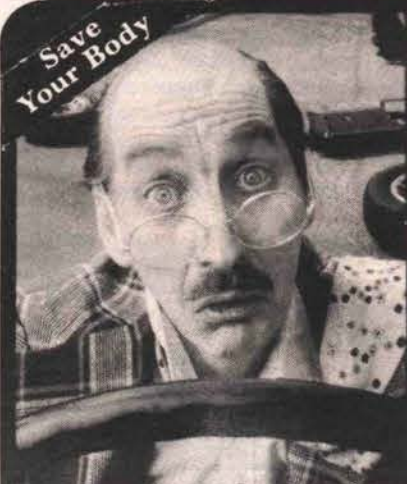

Andrew noted that "the community spent a lot of time on this relatively innocuous affair" and in criticizing the Trust's response to it.

"We have bigger problems at

hand and I wish the community would put that same kind of energy into those problems," he stated. He cited Georgia Strait pollution as an example of a problem that could use a similar level of commitment.

The local Trust committee is a referral agency for Crown lands use applications, he later told *Driftwood*. Offering to mediate and set up a meeting between applicant and community already exceeded normal procedures, he said.

Vesuvius Bay resident LeRoy

Jensen was present at the meeting and addressed trustees' comments.

He said he found the Trust's letter "pretty obscure" and noted the "slight change" in the Whists' proposal "did not mean anything."

"If you have received some nasty flack, this isn't nice," he said.

However, he added, "it is the greedy, grabbing, get the most for me attitude that has polluted the Georgia Strait and this is why we have pollution in that (Vesuvius) bay."

A decision on whether or not to grant a foreshore lease to property owner Josette Whist for private moorage use will be made by the Crown lands department of the lands and parks ministry.

**Bellyaching, bickering must stop, director says**

Salt Spring Islanders' tendency to "blame, bicker and bellyache" is the biggest stumbling block to effective local government, Capital Regional District director Julia Atkins told a Community Forum last week.

Atkins spoke Thursday night at a meeting sponsored by the Community Planning Association and attended by Islands Trustee Bob Andrew and about 20 island residents. She said Salt Spring is experiencing tremendous growth, with all the stresses and strain that growth entails, and more is on the way.

"If we are going to manage this growth in a positive way, that is in the interests of the island as a whole, both now and in the future, we are going to have to make much more use of cooperation, clear thinking and community mindedness," she said.

"We simply cannot afford to lapse into the bickering, blaming, and belly-aching at one another that has so often characterized our local decision-making process."

Atkins said she has seen cooperation work on Salt Spring regarding Shelby Pool, the Arts Centre, the Health Council, and the recycling program.

"But I have also seen the propensity for divisiveness and obstructionism ... and its disastrous effect on our decision making process. This tends to occur especially around issues such as solid waste, the Ganges sewer, forestry issues and land use."

She blamed "the local newspaper" (*Driftwood*) for focusing on the polarities of islanders' opinions. This is "unfortunate," as it leads to poor local decision making, she added.

"A poorly informed, highly emotional electorate is not in a good position to influence the decision-making process in a constructive manner. Politicians at every level tend to ignore or discount politically polarized and emotionally based points of view."

Islanders must take more responsibility for decisions which affect islanders. "We've got to grow up, stand on our own two feet, and accept the challenge of mastering our own destiny," said Atkins.

Trustee Bob Andrew also spoke at the meeting and echoed comments made by Atkins telling islanders to learn how to cooperate and "grow-up", he said.

He also expressed a desire for stronger local government, saying the Trust is in a state of transition, "and not as powerful as I would like to see them in capability of making strong, solid decisions."

However, the Trust is starting to assert itself and is beginning to be recognized as a solid body, he said.

# Larger ferry coming next year

Islanders will have to wait until next year for a larger ferry on the Vesuvius-Crofton route, B.C. Ferry Corporation information officer Pat Stephens told *Driftwood* last week.

The *Howe Sound Queen*, which has nearly twice the car capacity of the ferry currently on the Vesuvius run, stayed on the Horseshoe Bay-Bowen Island route because a new ferry to come into service needed time "to get the bugs out of it," she said.

"We don't have the plans yet for next summer. I would assume they would plan to do this. They had

every intention of doing it this past summer," Stephens said.

The new ferry, the *Queen of Capilano*, was to take over the Saltery Bay-Earls Cove route. From there, the *Powell River Queen* was to go to the Campbell River-Quadra Island route, she added. The ferry on the Campbell River-Quadra Island route was to go on the Horseshoe Bay-Bowen Island route, and the *Howe Sound Queen* was to move to the Vesuvius-Crofton route.

Each of the above routes was to get a larger ferry to help for the summer season, said Stephens.

However, the *Queen of Capilano* is a brand new ferry with a brand new design. "It took us a while to get the bugs out," she said.

Because the ferry was not ready in time for summer, the reshuffling of ferries did not occur. Now, the tourist rush is over so the larger ferry is not needed until 1992 summer, she said.

Seventy cars can be transported on the *Howe Sound Queen*, while 36 cars is capacity on the *Vesuvius Queen* currently crossing between Vesuvius and Crofton.

## Agriculture issue back to trustees

Deciding how to regulate intensive agriculture on Salt Spring Island is back on their agenda, island trustees learned last week.

A permitting system to regulate intensive agricultural activities in watershed areas can not be implemented, planner Tony Quin reported to last Tuesday's local Trust committee meeting. He gained that information in discussion with the provincial municipal affairs ministry.

"It became very clear that the provisions for intensive agricultural systems being put in place in accordance with the Municipal Act have never been implemented by any local government since being introduced five years ago," he said.

Committee chairman Diane Cragg suggested a reporting letter be written to the Farmers' Institute explaining Quin's findings.

The committee agreed to investigate further possibilities for regulating intensive agricultural activities in watershed areas.

Cragg also said the committee might consider asking the municipal affairs ministry to consider giving powers described in section 933 of the Municipal Act to the Islands Trust. That section gives municipal councils and regional districts the right to regulate and define areas where livestock may be kept.

# Trust seeking highways liaison

An attempt to give the Islands Trust an official voice for all transportation matters on the area's 13 islands hit an unexpected obstacle at Trust Council in Victoria Sunday.

Council's transportation committee put forth a resolution that each island establish transportation and highways committees as part of their Advisory Planning Commission structure.

However, strong opposition to changing existing ferry committees on some islands reduced the resulting resolution to deal with highways matters only.

Committee chairman John Henshaw explained the resolution was made in response to a highways ministry request that the Islands Trust designate a group or individual responsible for communicating road matters on each island. Members suggested broader transportation committees be established, he told *Driftwood*, and thought the resolution "would go through like butter."

However, several trustees said their islands already had firmly established transportation committees with members who would not appreciate being directed to report to the Trust in any form.

Salt Spring trustee John Stepaniuk said he thought advisory planning commissions were directed to investigate road standards only and he did not think the Trust's mandate went beyond that.

Other trustees had a transportation committee which already had a solid working relationship and emergency services agreement with the B.C. Ferry Corporation.

Saturna's John Money also said if proposed transportation committee responsibilities were to include ferry matters, he would have to speak against the motion. He said he gave Saturna's transportation group a Trust-directed mandate two years ago and he could not go back now and change it.

"It is bad PR to come along and say this committee is no good now," said Money.

"I am not arguing the committees have not done a good job," Henshaw said, "and if you want your ferries group to stay independent, that is your prerogative." However, he added, "if you have a problem with ferries on Thetis, for example, you have more clout with the Islands Trust behind them."

Mayne trustee Louis Vallee spoke in favour of having a committee address ferry and road issues. On Mayne, he said, transportation matters are dealt with by one person reporting only to the Chamber of Commerce.

Denman trustee Rolf Ludvigsen said he felt island transportation groups should "at least, at a minimum, report back to the local Trust committee."

Galiano trustee Diane Cragg suggested the impasse be tackled by separating highways and ferries issues. She moved and council passed a motion that the Trust and B.C. Ferries issue be referred back to Henshaw and his committee, while highways committees be set up as planned.

Henshaw told *Driftwood* the committee's intent was to clarify communication channels between islands and highways ministry officials and not to suggest dissolution of existing transportation or ferry committees.

"It was just to make it easier for highways and easier for us," he said.

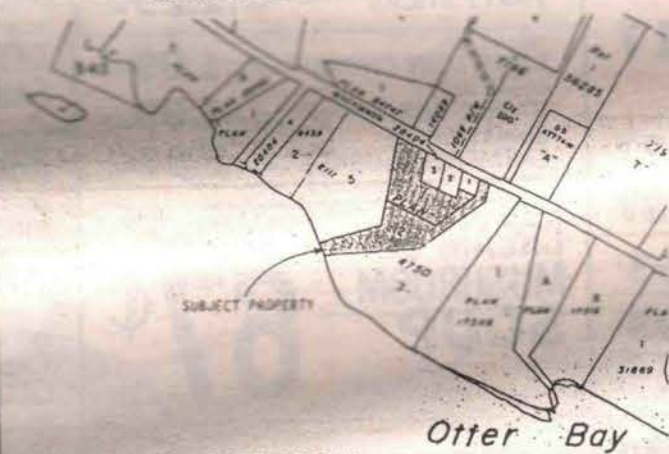

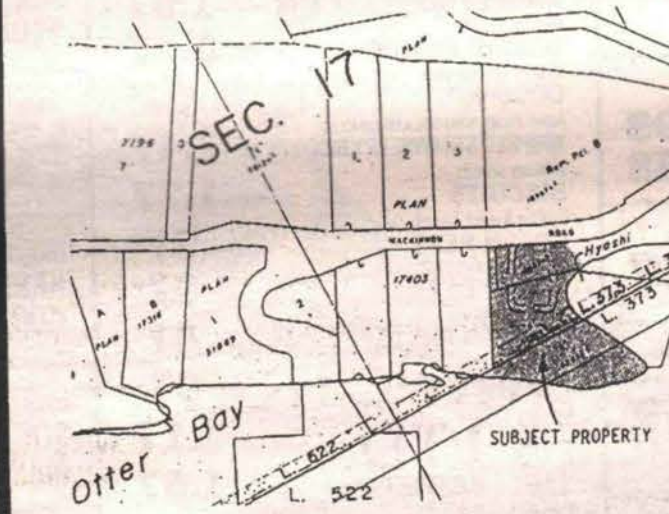
In general terms the purpose of the proposed Bylaw 58 is as follows:

- (1) The proposed bylaw provides for new definitions for the following terms: campgrounds, commercial guest accommodation unit, lot or parcel, marina, public, recreation facility, restaurant, and secondary uses.
- (2) The proposed bylaw provides parking standards for commercial guest accommodation units.
- (3) The proposed bylaw establishes requirements on parcels that are divided by a zone boundary.
- (4) The proposed bylaw repeals Section 11, "Commercial 2 Zone (C2) and substitutes a new Section 11, Commercial 2 Zone (C2). In general terms the new section
  - deletes restaurants and cafes as permitted uses
  - provides for laundromat, recreation facilities, restaurant, licensed liquor establishments other than neighbourhood pubs, retail sale of accessory marine equipment and fuel, and boat rentals, other retail use limited to 139.35 square metres of floor area, owner or operator accommodation within one self-contained dwelling unit, and accommodation of employees of a principal use within one self-contained dwelling unit, as accessory uses permitted if a principal use is established
  - Provides new specifications for site coverage, height and setbacks
  - establishes a site density of 17 commercial guest accommodation units per hectare on the first 2.02 hectares of a lot area and 12 units per hectare of lot area in excess of 2.02 hectares up to a maximum of 25 additional units (there currently being a site density of 24 units per hectare with no maximum)
  - establishes floor area limits for commercial guest accommodation units
  - establishes a maximum of 18 commercial guest accommodation units within a building

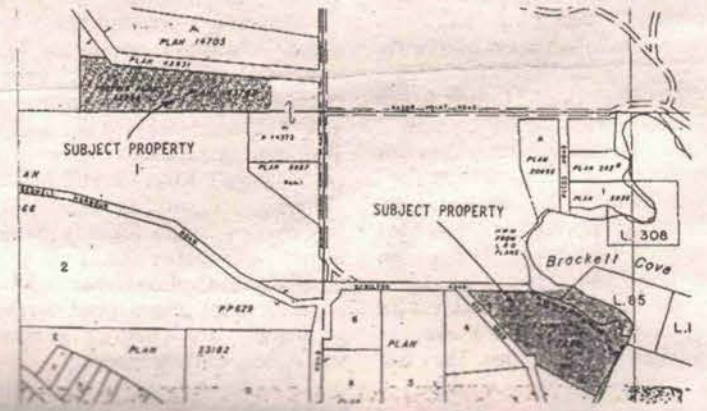

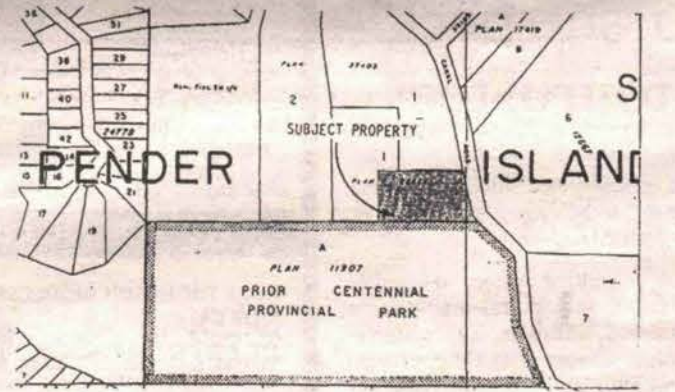

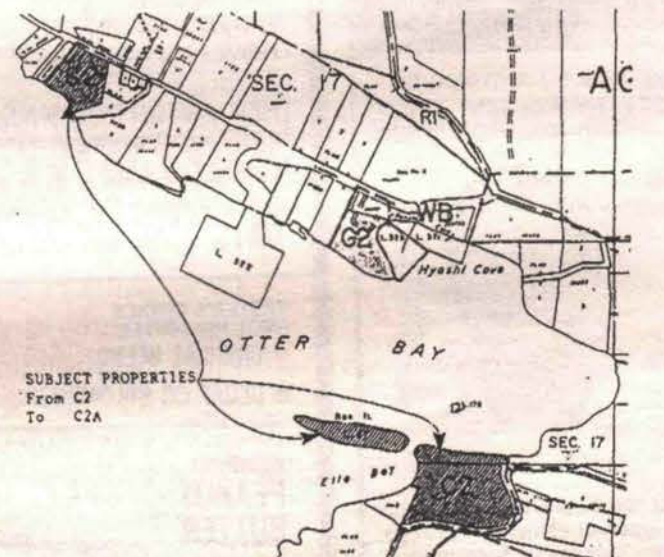

## Market vendors planning campaign to attract visitors

Market vendors are setting aside \$1,500 to for a campaign starting January 1, 1992 to bring more off-islanders to Salt Spring.

Vendor Michael Robb said press packets to newspapers will be sent out consisting of a brochure with text and photos which will hopefully induce newspapers to write articles on the market in their travel sections.

"Chances are it will do us a great deal of good," he said at a Market Vendors' Association meeting Wednesday. "We're certainly not wanting to promote a Coney Island or that kind of thing. We're shooting for sophisticated tourists."

Robb said a September 8 story in the *Victoria Times-Colonist* brought

people over to the market. He said he asks people who stop at his booth where they are from and in the past two weeks, the majority have been from Victoria. "I think it did bring in people."

"Generally, business is up when off island crowds are up," he said.

Local talent will be used to do the graphic work for the brochures, he said. Local businesses and the Chamber of Commerce will be approached to be part of the campaign, which will target people within a day's drive of the island, he said.

"I don't think it will do much good to send it to Prince George."

The Ministry of Tourism will be asked to include the market in their publications and promotion programs, Robb said. Locally, market advertisements may be posted on the bus.

Robb said a summer promotion campaign aimed at introducing market vendors to the public was positive even though it was a response to criticisms from local merchants.

The campaign ads carried in the *Driftwood* were to show islanders that vendors are mainly Salt Spring residents and not from off island, he said. A brief biographical sketch of the vendor featured was included in each ad.

"I personally was upset that we were perceived to be a negative influence and we had to respond. In the long run I'm glad we did it because it has been positive."

"Hopefully, we did some good for ourselves. It made us feel better about ourselves and convinced the membership advertising is a good idea."

"The parks board is feeling positive toward us and we have better relations with the chamber and merchants. The emphasis will now be on bringing in tourists."

## Trust reps ask for hold on foreshore leases

Local Trust representatives want Crown lands to put a hold on Salt Spring foreshore lease applications unless they are "in the public interest" while a shoreline report makes the bureaucratic rounds.

A shoreline study recently completed by Salt Spring assistant Trust planner Linda Adams was officially received at the Trust committee's regular monthly meeting September 24.

Planner Tony Quin suggested the committee request Crown lands not entertain future applications until the referral process was complete.

Committee chairman Diane Cragg noted this was to prevent a flood of foreshore lease applications when people heard the island's shoreline was up for rezoning.

Trustee John Stepaniuk said he was uncomfortable with requesting a "blanket moratorium," and said he would like to allow for recognition of possible "public interest" in foreshore lease applications.

He and Trustee Bob Andrew agreed to request Crown lands not

approve applications unless they are in the public interest.

The study will be referred to the Advisory Planning Commission, Parks and Recreation Commission, Crown lands, ministries of environment and agriculture, fisheries and food and the Coast Guard for comment before it is drafted in bylaw form.

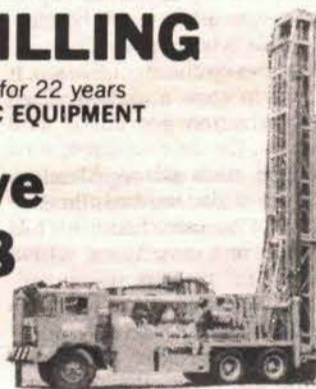

# Setback does not deter aid project supporters

An aid project sponsored by Gulf Islanders to bring fresh water to residents of an island in Nicaragua has lost much of its funding.

However, Ometepe-Gulf Islands Friendship Association (OGITF) is trying to raise funds so the project may continue, supporter Ron Pither of Mayne Island told *Driftwood* Monday.

He said OGITF is one of a major charitable organization's many projects which lost funding when the Bank of Credit and Commerce had its Canadian assets frozen earlier this year.

The organization has asked that its name not be used. "We have decided that because this is something that is totally beyond our control we did not want to go public with it," said an organization representative who asked not to be identified. "This is board policy."

"It screws up donor confidence. It is enough to know a well respected aid organization got hurt," said Pither.

He said other aid organizations and churches also used the Bank of Credit and Commerce because it had branches in many third world countries and therefore was a convenient bank to use.

OGITF's project receives funding from the organization which had \$600,000 deposited with the bank. Only \$60,000 of that amount was recovered from insurance, he said.

"We're one of the charitable organization's many projects and we're one that really got hurt," Pither said. "Some of them were not in mid-stream like we are. It has to be carried on otherwise you really hurt people."

The organization's board has to decide how much each project will receive. Pither said the staff had recommended the project be given \$5,000, and he is confident that will happen. An additional \$12,000 will be needed for the project.

An organization staff member confirmed Monday OGITF will be getting \$5,000 "pretty well for sure." She said \$17,000 had been committed to the project before the assets had been frozen. "That money was literally in the pipeline for Ometepe. The people in Nicaragua were expecting the money."

Pither said a cheque in the amount of \$17,000 earmarked for the project was written before the bank's assets were frozen, but the director of the organization was away in India, and when he came back, the doors to the bank were locked.

"We would have had the money if the director had not been away," he said.

The aid staff member said the director was in charge of disseminating large amounts of money, and usual practice is for the director and a board member to sign such cheques.

Criminal activities in the bank's operations in some countries forced the bank's closure. "The Canadian bank was solid and there was no criminal activities associated with the Canadian branch. It had to be closed to protect the depositors," said the staff member.

A liquidator has been appointed by the government to sell off the bank's assets and distribute funds received, said the staff member. She does not know how much or when the organization will receive funds.

Because money is needed, now a fund raising campaign has begun on

the Gulf Islands to raise the \$17,000. Four thousand dollars has already been collected, and that is to be added to the \$5,000 from the aid organization, said Pither.

The money will go toward supplying the southern part of Ometepe Island with clean water for the inhabitants. Ometepe is a Salt Spring size island in Lake Nicaragua in the Central American country of Nicaragua.

Construction on the project was to begin earlier this year. Money pre-

viously raised in the Gulf Islands was used to supply the northern end of Ometepe Island with power and water.

Funds were doubled by the charitable organization and then tripled by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), said Marg Simons, who collects Salt Spring donations for the project.

**A BYLAW TO ESTABLISH A LOCAL SERVICE AREA WITHIN THE OUTER GULF ISLANDS ELECTORAL AREA OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT FOR THE PURPOSE OF ESTABLISHING, OPERATING AND MAINTAINING A LOCAL SERVICE FOR THE COLLECTION, REMOVAL AND DISPOSAL OF SOLID WASTE FOR GALIANO ISLAND**  
 \*\*\*\*\*

**WHEREAS** the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District may, by Bylaw, establish and operate a local service under the provisions of Section 788 of the *Municipal Act*;

**AND WHEREAS** this Bylaw has received the assent of the electors under Section 795(2) of the *Municipal Act*;

**AND WHEREAS** the approval of the Inspector of Municipalities is required under Section 795(1)(a) of the *Municipal Act*;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1. The Local Service being established, and to be operated, is the collection, removal and disposal of waste and noxious, offensive or unwholesome substances.
2. The Local Service Area is contained within the boundary of Galiano Island.
3. Only the Electoral Area of Outer Gulf Islands includes the participating area for this local service.
4. The annual costs for the local service, net of grants and other revenue, shall be recovered:

(a) Debt servicing costs, by the requisition of money under Section 809.1 of the *Municipal Act* by the imposition of property value tax to be levied and collected under Section 810.1(1) of the *Municipal Act*, and

(b) by the imposition of parcel tax imposed under Section 810.1(2) of the *Municipal Act*, and

(c) by the imposition of fees and other charges fixed by separate Bylaw.

5. The maximum amount that may be requisitioned under Section 804(1) of the *Municipal Act* for the annual cost for the Local Service will be the greater of:

(a) ONE HUNDRED EIGHTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$180,000.00), or

(b) an amount equal to the amount that could be raised by a property value tax rate of \$1.72 per one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) applied to the net taxable value of land and improvements within the Local Service Area.

6. This bylaw may be cited as the "Galiano Island Refuse Disposal Local Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1, 1991".

**WHEREAS** pursuant to Section 788 of the *Municipal Act*, the Board of the Regional District has, by Bylaw, under Section 794 of the *Municipal Act* established the local service for the collection, removal and disposal of waste;

**AND WHEREAS** it is deemed desirable to provide proper disposal facilities hereunder described in accordance with the local service;

**AND WHEREAS** the work shall include the acquisition of landfill facilities, construction of roads and other improvements at the Galiano Island Sanitary Landfill site, construction of remote transfer stations, water supply facilities, composting facilities, watershed management, and all related ancillary works and equipment deemed necessary by the Board as a result of managing Galiano Island solid waste;

**AND WHEREAS** the estimated cost of the refuse disposal facilities and improvements, including expenses incidental thereto, is the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) which is the amount of debt intended to be created by this Bylaw;

**AND WHEREAS** it is proposed that the financing of the said facilities is to be undertaken by the Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia pursuant to proposed agreements between that Authority and the Capital Regional District;

**AND WHEREAS** the amount of existing, outstanding debenture debt of the Regional District authorized at the 31st day of May, 1991:

- (i) Under Sections 813 and 813.1 is \$56,901,414.65, and
- (ii) Under Section 815.1 is \$47,027,875.50;

**AND WHEREAS** the amount of debenture debt that is authorized, but is not issued as at the 31st day of May, 1991:

- (i) Under Section 813 and 813.1 is \$11,353,150.00, and
- (ii) Under Section 815.1 is \$40,206.00;

**AND WHEREAS** the amount of principal or interest that is at the date of this Bylaw in arrears on debt created either under Sections 813, 813.1 and 815.1 is nil;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1. The board is hereby empowered and authorized to undertake and carry out or cause to be carried out the acquisition, design and construction of works for the provision of the facilities and equipment hereinbefore described and to do all things necessary in connection therewith and without limiting the generality of the foregoing:

(a) to borrow upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding \$500,000.00, and

(b) to acquire all such real and personal property, easements, rights of way, licenses, rights or authorities as may be requisite or desirable for or in connection with the acquisition, design and construction of the landfill facilities, roads and improvements at the Galiano Island Sanitary Landfill site, construction of remote transfer stations, water supply facilities, recycling facilities, composting facilities, watershed management, and all related ancillary works and equipment deemed necessary by the Board for the management of the Local Service authorized under "Galiano Island Refuse Disposal Local Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1, 1991".

2. The maximum term for which debentures may be issued to secure the debt intended to be created by this Bylaw is 15 years.

3. This Bylaw may be cited as the "Galiano Island Refuse Disposal Facilities Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 1, 1991".

## Auxiliary aids hospital

Lady Minto's Hospital Auxiliary only has only two main sources of income; its thrift shop and a hospital knitting showcase. Still, they earned nearly \$70,000 towards new hospital equipment in 1990.

"It's surprising where the money comes from," auxiliary president and Thrift Shop convener Daisy Gear told *Driftwood* last week. "A big day for us is \$300 at the Thrift Shop."

Auxiliary donations were used to purchase a steam cooker and four geriatric chairs ("a sort of deluxe wheelchair") for Greenwoods Intermediate Care Facility.

For the hospital, the auxiliary purchased 10 electric beds at a cost of \$35,000. Buttons on the side of the bed enable patients to adjust the bed themselves without the aid of a nurse, Gear explained.

The feet, head and middle rise to whatever position the nurse wants the patient in. "One patient didn't want to get out of bed because she was so comfortable. Not like the old beds," Gear added.

A \$10,000 sigmoidoscope was also purchased. This item shines a light through the colon to observe

tumours on the colon, Gear said.

Two scholarships are awarded by the auxiliary each year to graduates of Gulf Island Secondary School who want to further their careers in medicine in areas such as nursing, pharmacy, or as a doctor.

Gear said "the aim of the auxiliary is to supply equipment for the comfort of residents and patients that is not supplied by the government.

"If the government will buy something, we won't buy it. We buy the extras the government won't supply."

Gear said she enjoys working on the auxiliary and in the Thrift Shop, though it takes up a lot of her time. "I like to see things done for the betterment of patients in the hospital."

The auxiliary has 169 volunteers, said Gear, and meets on the fourth Monday of each month at the United Church Upper Hall.

In 1992, the Lady Minto auxiliary will be host for the Vancouver Island Hospital Auxiliary Convention when 23 auxiliaries will be represented during the two-day event.

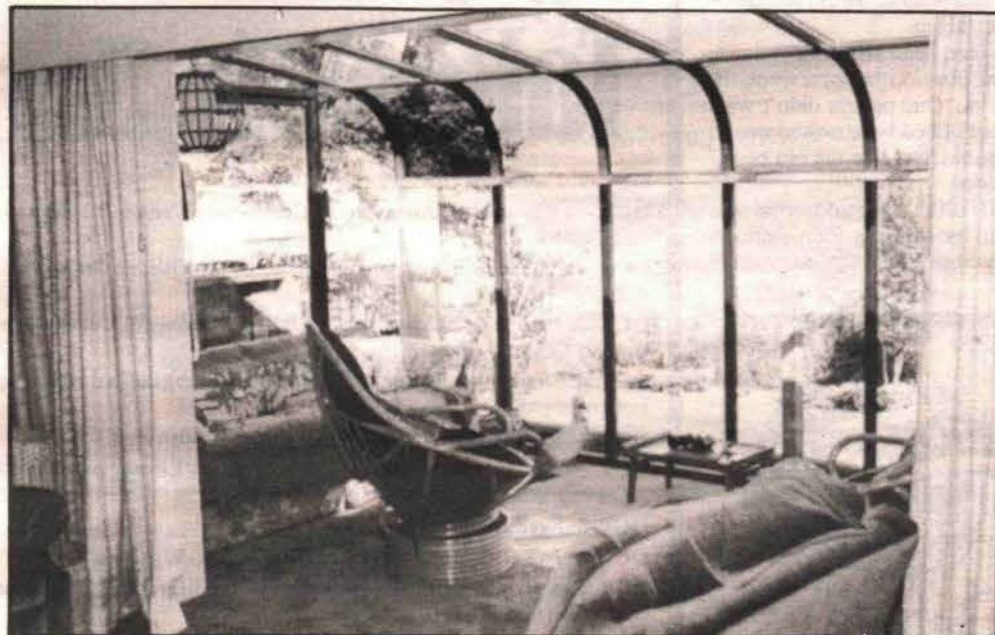

## United Way drive helps youth centre

Volunteers are needed "now and continuously" for the new Youth Centre, one of the beneficiaries of this year's United Way campaign, according to centre coordinator Kathy Towne.

The Parks and Recreation Commission has booked the Activity Centre for the use of the youth Friday night and events for the space are now being organized, she said.

As well, work parties are held every Thursday at the Youth Centre for those interested in lending a hand.

### Firefighters ready and willing to do inspections

Salt Spring Island residents wanting an inspection of their homes during Fire Prevention Week are invited to call the local fire department.

Chief Les Wagg is asking people to call 537-2531 to set appointments. Meanwhile, he has some suggestions for each day of Fire Prevention Week October 6 through 12.

On Sunday, October 6, the chief advises people to clean up their attics, basements and crawl spaces. Next day, Monday, October 7, he advises that smoke detectors should be installed or existing ones be checked. On Tuesday, October 8, he wants all heating appliances checked and serviced.

Wednesday, October 9, is the day to plan family fire escapes from the home and practise getting out alive. A special television presentation is scheduled for local channels at 7 p.m.

Thursday, October 10, Wagg is asking that house numbers be displayed prominently at the property line if they are not already in place and Friday, he wants electrical cords on all appliances checked.

Saturday, October 12, Wagg invites islanders of all ages to attend an open house at Ganges Firehall from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. to meet fire fighters and see the trucks and equipment.

A Plan to Get Out Alive campaign is currently underway in local elementary schools, targeted primarily at Grade 3 students. One from each school will be named fire chief for a day based on the escape plan they provide for their family. A final student will be selected to attend special ceremonies in Victoria which include a ride on Victoria Harbour's fire boat.

### Teachers set for learning

Many Gulf Islands, Sooke, Saanich, Victoria, Cowichan and Lake Cowichan primary teachers will be spending a day and a half in a learning situation.

October 16 and 17, they will meet with world-renown educator and researcher Brian Cambourne of Australia. Twenty district teachers also will speak on their specialty areas during the sessions scheduled for Spencer Junior Secondary School in Langford.

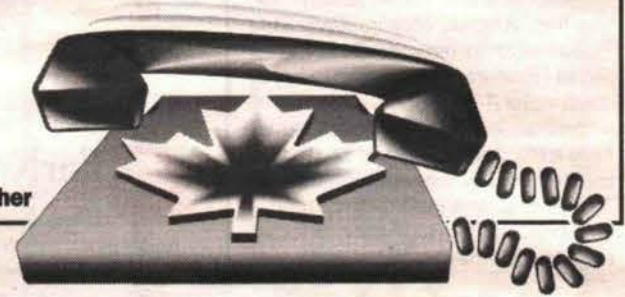

# Communication critical says new administrator

Lady Minto Hospital's new administrator is adjusting to her new position and a new community.

One of the first things Vicki Curtis faced was the hospital society's annual general meeting.

While she does not have strong views on the issue of allowing hospital staff to be members of the society, she does believe good communication between staff and hospital administration is important.

Employees should not have to go through a prolonged communication route such as the hospital society to get anything done at the management level, said Curtis.

"If employee relations are open and representative, then that is the ideal situation," she said from her Lady Minto office Wednesday. "And I think that is the case here."

At the Lady Minto Hospital Society meeting September 11, a motion to allow hospital employees to be society members was hotly debated and eventually defeated, though more members voted for the motion than against it.

"I can say the hospital should provide the opportunity for community members to be involved on the hospital society and the hospital board," she said.

Doctors are allowed to be members of the society but can not sit on the board, she said. "Most hospital bylaws are changing to deny medical staff involvement in the society."

At Lady Minto she said, if nurses have a problem, then they speak to their head nurse. If the problem still is not solved, then the nurse goes to the assistant administrator.

"It's easy to get problems solved. Staff have the opportunity through various channels in the hospital and have direct and immediate access through this route," Curtis said.

Previously, Curtis worked at Peace Arch Hospital, a hospital that had 10 times the staff and budget Lady Minto does, located in a fast-growing community.

She said she enjoyed her demanding job as the hospital's chief executive officer. "I worked 12 to 15 hours a day. I found it a challenging and rewarding experience."

As administrator at Lady Minto, her duties will be similar to those she performed at Peace Arch, but on a smaller scale. Her job includes operating the hospital, public relations, and policy decisions regarding auditing and purchasing procedures.

"In a small hospital the chief executive officer becomes more involved with decision making and with staff which is a very positive change for me," she said.

In the short term, Curtis said the goal of Lady Minto Hospital is to provide effective primary acute care to the patient and, for people who require them, to make sure referrals are done expeditiously.

"We have to look at what acute care services this hospital can provide effectively to Salt Spring and Gulf Island residents and strengthen those services so people on Salt Spring don't have to go off island."

Acute care is any kind of emergency or surgical treatment, or acute medical illness that requires a short term treatment such as appendicitis, Curtis said.

She added the hospital will never be able to provide cancer facilities, specialized children's services, or facilities for heart and brain operations. "Those are examples of services we have to find off island. We have to work out referral plans and know exactly where to take patients."

tive care to provide emotional support and promote independence as long as possible for those who are terminally ill, Curtis said. Details of the program have not been finalized yet, she added.

The hospital would like to be able to keep patients at home as long as possible, she said, and to do that health agencies such as Meals on Wheels, home support services, and health care nurses must work cooperatively together.

"Each agency used to work in isolation and without good communication," Curtis said. "They have to work with other home care agencies to avoid gaps in service."

"We have to coordinate and integrate care better than in the past. People want to stay at home. We will have to gear our services to provide more home care."

Curtis said 23 per cent of the Salt Spring population is elderly, and theory says that the elderly use hospital services eight times more than others. "Still, we can't gear our hospital specifically to that age group," she said.

She said the hospital also will be reviewing and developing its obstetrical and birthing processes.

"It seems we have very few deliveries coming to the hospital,"

she said, though her observation is based only on the three weeks she has been at Lady Minto.

In the long term, Curtis' goals for the hospital are to see it expand its acute care services, provide a "continuum of services that promote people staying as independent as possible in their homes", and look at health promotion and illness prevention.

She said hospitals are going to have to provide more cost-effective care. "We'll have to be really creative so we don't lose the excellent standard of health care we have in Canada."

The move to Salt Spring was a lifestyle change for Curtis, who enjoys gardening, golf and walking. "I enjoy working in a community hospital. The hospital in White Rock had become a large hospital. The opportunity of being more involved and living on Salt Spring are two appealing factors."

## Wednesday jam sessions open to various musicians

Things just keep on shaking at the Wednesday weekly jam sessions at Harbour House Hotel.

Manager Oren Combs told *Driftwood* the jams have been taking place for the past two months and they "keep getting stronger. It's a lot of fun and very interesting entertainment."

Combs expressed amazement at the talent there is on the islands. In addition to the regular music sessions, he said there has even been a poetry reading.

A piano, acoustic guitar, and wind instruments have been part of the musical fare. At time musicians share their instruments with others who do not have their own but wish to play.

"We get a lot of crowd participation and have had comfortably full houses each week," said Combs.

He invites any musicians from the Gulf Islands or visitors to drop in and add their name to the list of entertainers.

## Dolby sound comes to cinema

Alberta Evans is so excited about the new sound system at Salt Spring Cinema, she has been stationed at the rear of Central Hall, jumping up and down during movie presentations.

A new Dolby system was installed early last week but there were problems on Friday night "and we had to send 70 people home. It was terrible."

But after many hours of work Friday night by theatre staff, the system was in use Saturday night for the first time. "People have told us they really notice a difference."

Prior to installation of the new system, the theatre was equipped with a sound system comprised of two guitar speakers and one amplifier.

"We've put carpeting in the front of the sound booth and around the window frame," Evans explained.

The new system has a large

speaker right in front of the theatre, behind the large screen and eight smaller speakers on the side and back of the hall.

"Background sounds are separate from voices," Evans said, adding that the sound now seems to come directly out of the mouths of actors speaking. "There is none of that muffling

we used to have." Evans said movies with Dolby sound have special decoders right on the film which sends messages to the appropriate speakers instantaneously.

The Dolby systems are very expensive, Evans said, but the cinema is renting to cut down on the costs.

# Special needs group marks first year

After a year of working together as an advocacy, support and educational group, the Gulf Islands Special Needs Association is celebrating its first anniversary with a public video presentation and discussion October 7.

*Why Can't My Child Pay Attention?* will identify and explore strategies for dealing with some learning disabilities. GISNA members Judy Boylan and Liz Anderson say it will be valuable to parents and anyone working with children.

The video will be shown at 7 p.m. on Monday, October 7 at Salt Spring Elementary School library. Tea and coffee will be served.

GISNA was formed a year ago for parents of children with special needs. It has 15 active members in the Gulf Islands and communicates with several others.

Boylan says "our main interests are in advocating for our children in the school district and supporting each other."

Giving parents the strength and skills to lobby school and government bodies for what their children need is also an aim of the group.

School staff can do a lot for special needs children, says Boylan, "but as a parent, you are the only person who will be with that child all the way through school, so you have to be a good advocate."

However, few people have had a chance to develop or use advocacy skills in their day-to-day lives, she says.

GISNA meetings motivate and help parents improve advocacy techniques. Solutions to specific problems are often formulated using the experience and input of other parents.

"It is difficult because parents have all kinds of guilt and denial," says Boylan. "It is really hard to recognize that your child needs help and really hard to be an advocate for them."

Anderson and Boylan note that because Salt Spring is a small community, the disabilities and problems to deal with are diverse. However, they say a lot of common ground is

uncovered between parents.

Boylan's 20 year-old son Patrick has an auditory memory problem which means he may not remember a verbal instruction the first time it is given to him.

She says while she worried how Patrick might function in the working world, he has developed effective strategies for himself.

Unfortunately, notes Boylan, her son's problem was not diagnosed until Grade 5, after he had been labelled "stubborn" throughout his first six years in the public school system.

It is not easy being a parent to a child with special needs, says Anderson. Her six-year-old daughter Suzy McEwen is mildly mentally handicapped.

Anderson says behaviour and socialization are two significant problem areas, "but we are seeing improvement all of the time."

Her classmates, teacher and teaching assistants at Salt Spring Elementary have been extremely helpful to Suzy, notes her mother, and integration has really worked.

"The school district has been great in that it is very personal," she says. "Everybody knows you and becomes personally involved." Anderson adds that she and Suzy are taking a signing course offered through Continuing Education this fall.

The group is in the process of becoming an incorporated society, with funding help from the island's Rotary Club.

GISNA also invites parents to an October 17 lecture called *Understanding and Effectively Educating Children with Attention Deficit Disorders* at the Newcombe Theatre in Victoria.

Symptoms to watch for in children include hyperactivity, swift mood changes, difficulty remembering, coordination problems, reversing letters in writing or speaking;

words and trouble using "logical" thinking.

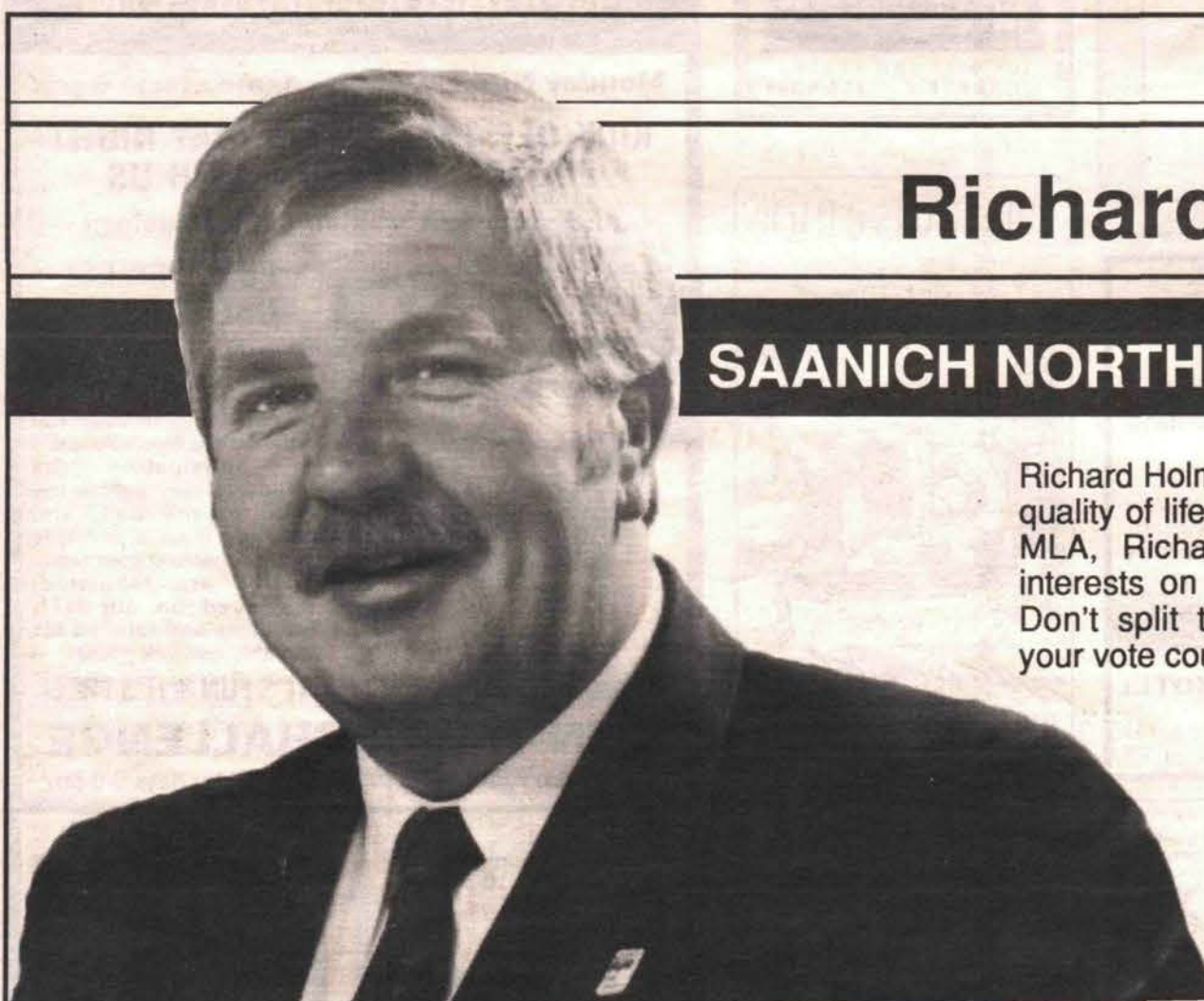

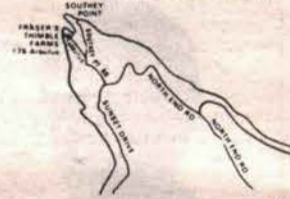

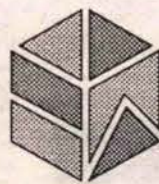

# October offers special programs

Along with the usual offerings at Continuing Education, October features some very special programs for everyone in the community.

Linda Dares and Randy Hooper bring together their vast experience in nutrition, organic gardening and food service to teach a series of ethnic vegetarian cooking classes starting with the foods of North India on October 10, followed by Southern Indian cooking on October 17, and North African cooking on October 24. All menus are carefully developed to be nutritionally balanced and include a wide variety of native foods and preparation techniques. More ethnic cooking follows in November.

Also in October, well-known chef, Don Wallace, will introduce a class to more of his Souper Soups on October and to Gourmet Game Night on October 22. His Delicious Pastry Deserts will be offered in November. Participants are advised not to eat before attending any of these classes.

Mid October will also be the start of Build Your own Electric Guitar with local craftsman and musician, Terry Warbey, who builds Celtic Heart Instruments. This course is proposed for Tuesday evenings throughout the rest of the year, until the project is complete. Students will work with Warbey to build their own instruments from kits put together by the instructor. The cost of the kit (this is the total cost of the course) is \$150. There may be some financial assistance available for students. This is an exceptional opportunity for youngsters and others to learn from and share with a master craftsman.

October 16 is the date set for the Joy of Music with internationally acclaimed conductor, Maestro Laszlo Gati. This illustrated lecture will introduce the audience to classical music through the eyes of the performer and the ears of the listener. This evening is an opportunity to join a celebrated conductor on a musical tour of Verdi, Rimsky Korsakov,

Liszt, and other favourites. Maestro Gati will also address the study of music from the perspective of a performer and a student.

Laszlo Gati has conducted orchestras throughout Europe and North and South America. He is the former music director of the Montreal Chamber Orchestra, Victoria Symphony, and Windsor Symphony Orchestra.

Theatre buffs will not want to miss out on the opportunity to attend Vancouver Arts Club Theatre's Tea Matinees October 16, November 20, and December 20. Each performance, including a bus to and from the ferry and afternoon chat and tea with the performers costs only \$23. The October show, "The Club," by Eve Merriam, is a spoof on a turn of the century men's club. The November show is Kurt Vonnegut's latest piece, "Make Up Your Mind," and the December show is the timely "It's Snowing on Salt Spring," with Nicola Cavendish. Participants should register early for any or all of these trips to the theatre.

Many other interesting courses have October start dates at Continuing Education. These include dance workshops, desktop publishing (using PageMaker on IBM and Apple), a variety of woodworking workshops with Illyd Perkins, first aid, natural cosmetics with Linda Quiring, food safe courses 1 and 2, and save a bundle on heating and ecological Architecture with Baron Fowler. It's still possible to join several on going classes including yoga in the morning, Feldenkrais, painting, and a wide variety of computer courses, and children's art. A Conversational French course in Ganges is also on the books.

Continuing Education's office also offers help with preparation for the G.E.D. exam and English as a Second Language. 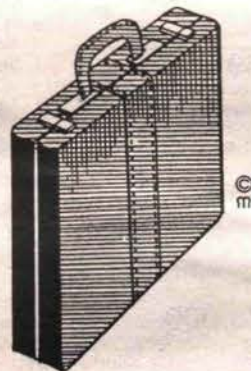

## DOWN THE YEARS

### Thirty Years Ago

• Assessment of waterfront properties is expected to rise between 25 to 400 per cent under the new Assessment Equalization Act. The increase is intended to reflect the tremendous increase in the value of waterfront property over the previous years.

Under the new scheme, non-waterfront property will show an assessment decrease of approximately five per cent.

• Irene Hawksworth's prize sheep dog, "Peg", won second place in the B.C. Open Sheep Dog Trails held at Matsqui last weekend. In winning the cup, she was beaten out by only 2.5 points for first place by Mike Williams of Langford. W.P. Evans of Salt Spring Island tied for third place. Mrs. Hawksworth is the only woman competitor in B.C.

### Twenty Five Years Ago

• A committee investigating the feasibility of village status for Ganges has prepared a sample budget to cover the financial requirements of the area. The sample budget came to \$11,300, compared to \$23,889 in current tax levies. Services would cover fire protection, water mains, library and include road maintenance and snow removal if necessary.

• "Coffee Grounds A Go Go," Salt Spring Island's first coffee house for young people opened this week in the basement of the United Church in Ganges. A general appeal was made to the inaugural crowd of 25 people as to ways and means of decorating the coffee house. A juke-box was donated by Dave Parsons to provide needed background music. The place will be open every second Friday.

• Residents of Galiano are upset at the apparent carelessness of hunters. Islanders claim off-island hunters are shooting around homes, yards and churches. Several children were reportedly shot at on their way to the school bus, and other incidents of a similar nature have been reported.

• A three bedroom cabin on approximately three acres of land located on Mansell Road was listed for sale in the newspaper for \$4,700.

### Twenty Years Ago

• After inspecting Salt Spring Elementary School, the fire marshal has expressed concerns over its lack of fire protection. Calls for reconstruction of the elementary school followed the inspection of the building, board chairman Mrs. Ione Guthrie told the Gulf Islands School District at a meeting this week.

• The new Ganges Post Office opened this week. Built on the former Salt Spring Lands property, the brightly lighted lobby now provides mail service and mail boxes, all in one section. The old post office will become part of Mouat's Trading Company.

• The biggest single jump in the price of any island service came about this month when the inter-island telephone rates were hiked up 66 per cent. The rates between Salt Spring Island and the other Gulf Islands has risen from 15 cents to 25 cents for three minutes.

### Fifteen Years Ago

• The recreation grounds at Central on Salt Spring Island have been officially named Portlock Park in honour of Tom Portlock, who worked for several years to make the facility a reality. Several Salt Spring Island residents asked Capitol Regional Board Director George Heinekey to seek the formal naming of the park in recognition of the death last week of the man considered the moving force behind the park's development.

• Sidney S. May of Furness Road has won first place as grand overall winner in the amateur photographic

### Five Years Ago

• The *Pacific Swift*, Canada's newest tall ship will be launched

from Expo's Old Salt Shipyard on October 11. The 96 ton vessel is built entirely of B.C. timber, yellow cedar and Douglas fir. At 78 feet on deck and 110 feet overall, she is the largest

wooden sailing vessel built in B.C. for many a year. Head shipwright for the *Pacific Swift* is Greg Foster of the Whaler Bay Boat Yard on Galiano Island.
