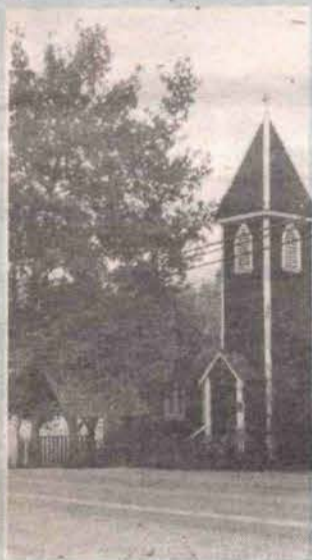

## Booths propose transfer station

A Salt Spring family has proposed a resource recovery and transfer station as part of a solution to island solid waste disposal.

Eric Booth and family members own a 4.61 acre parcel of property on Rainbow Road near Atkins Road. Last week they received local Trust committee approval to give public notice of a temporary use permit for their proposal.

The property is located between Gulf Coast Materials Ltd. cement plant and Rainbow Nursery Sales, and in front of the current Capital Regional District recycle depot.

Issuance of the permit requires public notice. Booth meets with Trust planner Tony Quin next week to discuss dissemination of information and holding a public hearing. They will also look at rezoning the property from Commercial Services (CS) to a new zone specifically designed for transfer/resource recovery purposes.

Booth says the proposal and rezoning would have been pursued at an earlier date if the family was aware a private facility could exist without CRD involvement.

The Booth proposal calls for an entirely private service. Initially it would accept solid waste for transfer to Hartland Road landfill as soon as possible in the new year after Blackburn Road landfill is closed.

However, says Booth, the operation's focus would be on "resource recovery" using existing

## Market deadline looming

Market vendors and Ganges merchants have until December 31 to resolve Saturday Farmers' Market issues or Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) will intervene.

Speaking at a PRC meeting Monday night, commission chairman Kellie Booth said the farmers' market joint committee has had one "unofficial" year of negotiations in 1990, and one "official" year in 1991.

"I feel there has been a reasonable amount of time for the two sides to get together and find some consensus," Booth said, adding she is determined to have market issues resolved by next summer.

If issues are not resolved by December 31, two courses of action the PRC could take were brought forth by Booth. Either the commis-

## Drake to be honoured on Remembrance Day

Bruce Drake will be honoured at Remembrance Day ceremonies held at the cenotaph in Centennial Park November 11. Parade marshals near Moutat's at 10:30 a.m. and proceeds to the park prior to 11 a.m.

When Drake was 18 years old he applied to join the Royal Canadian Air Force. In 1941, he was accepted and started training as a pilot. However, he was not able to complete his training partly because he did not solo within the required time.

Drake then applied as an air gunner, was accepted, completed his training and went overseas as a sergeant air gunner.

Shortly after landing in England in late summer of 1942, he joined Canadian Squadron Number 428. He flew on bombing raids over Germany and Italy as a rear gunner on a Lancaster bomber.

On March 3, 1943, the aircraft in which Drake was flying failed to return from a raid over Germany.

Drake was born in the old Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital on January 9, 1923. His father was manager of Salt Spring Island Creamery, which was located in the old stone building that now houses Embe Bakery.

Drake lived on Drake Road and attended school there in a building that is now the Catholic Church. He then went to high school on the island.

Derek Montrichard, president of the Gulf Islands Secondary School student council, will lay a wreath in honour of Drake.

and developing technology to recycle and reuse as much waste as possible.

Ideally, solid waste would be transformed into items which could be used on the island.

Booth sees the whole concept as addressing two important factors for islanders. "We want to be responsible global citizens and we want to find an on-island solution," he says.

Booth stresses the transfer station would not be a landfill. Waste would be accepted and dealt with in a covered warehouse space which is "animal proof, weather-proof and windproof."

Garbage would be shipped to Hartland by ferry an estimated three times per week in a 120 cubic yard trailer truck.

He believes the location is a suitable one for a few reasons. It is close to the majority of Salt Spring's population and near the likely end point of a future alternate route around Ganges.

The property is in an area designated for light industrial, warehouse or storage type operations in the Official Community Plan.

Its proximity to the Capital Regional District recycling depot is also a plus, says Booth, encouraging people to use both facilities and potentially resulting in resource sharing.

Booth hopes a private transfer and resource recovery operation would complement rather than compete with the CRD depot.

"The entire idea of the CRD's recycling program is not to make money; it is to reduce waste," he says, so whatever both operations can do to achieve that aim is desirable.

He addresses the possibility that people will stop using the CRD depot if they know goods will end up being recycled and reused by the Booth operation. Because the station would operate on a user-pay system, it would still cost less for people who dispose of less garbage. Secondly, he suggests a lower tipping fee could be charged to people who have done primary sorting of waste.

He also says the on-island landfill issue and private transfer station proposal are "two separate ideas." The CRD landfill site study is still proceeding and a transfer station does not replace a landfill, he says.

He says there have been several interpretations of what Salt Spring's referendum rejection of a transfer station meant. The vote did not address the option of a private station which people can choose to use or not, just as they choose to use Blackburn Road landfill or not.

"We are hoping to offer a solution acceptable to most people on this island," says Booth. "We hope people will try and understand what we are trying to do before they make up their minds about it."

Several transfer stations operate in B.C. under environment ministry guidelines, he says. Resource recovery ideas are also growing. Transforming waste into reusable materials creates "exciting possibilities" for new products and keeps as much waste as possible out of landfills regardless of their location.

Salt Spring could become "an example of what could be done" to effectively solve a community's solid waste problems, he says.

"It just takes imagination and creativity to come up with some of the solutions."

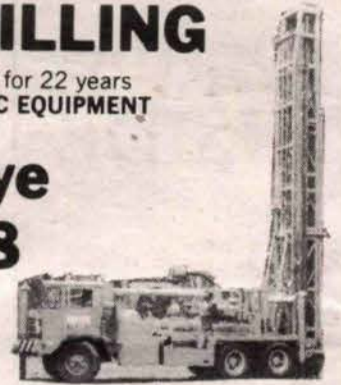

Ganges RCMP Sergeant Don Smith expressed his appreciation to all those who made Hallowe'en a quiet affair on Salt Spring.

Gulf Islands Secondary School teachers, parents, auxiliary RCMP members, storeowners and the majority of island teenagers deserved accolades, he said.

Some anonymous people were also helpful by directing RCMP to potential trouble spots on Hallowe'en night.

**Accidents**

A 92-year-old Ganges man was charged with failure to yield when an accident resulted from his left hand turn onto Lower Ganges Road from Ganges Village Market October 28.

His 1989 hatchback vehicle hit a 1967 flatdeck truck driven by a 20-year-old Ganges man.

An October 31 accident involving two male Ganges drivers took place at the intersection of Upper and Lower Ganges roads.

A pick-up suffered an estimated \$4,000 worth of damage when it collided with a van.

The pick-up driver experienced whiplash, while the other man was taken to hospital with abdominal injuries.

An investigation is continuing.

**Impaired/Refusal**

A 34-year-old Ganges male was charged with impaired driving and refusing to provide a breath sample after RCMP investigated an accident at 10:44 p.m. Saturday evening.

The driver went off Baker Road, resulting in \$4,000 damage to his 1988 van.

**Back door process  
concerns trustee**

Islands trustee John Stepaniuk expressed concern last week about what he called "through the back door" application processing.

Stepaniuk said he was against granting a temporary use permit to allow operation of a transfer and recycling station.

He told last Tuesday's Salt Spring Island Trust Committee meeting he felt applicant Eric Booth and family members should have applied for a rezoning of their Atkins and Rainbow roads property as soon as the transfer station idea arose two months ago.

"It appears to be pushing the application through the back door. What other applications are going to come up that receive this kind of treatment?" said Stepaniuk.

"I believe it should receive the full process and disclosure in a public hearing," he said.

Trustee Bob Andrew and committee chairman Diane Cragg supported issuing a temporary use permit and required public notice.

Booth said he and family members owning the property intend to apply for rezoning as soon as possible.

However, a temporary use permit option seemed the only way to have a transfer station established soon after Blackburn Road landfill closes at the end of this year.

Cragg disagreed with Stepaniuk's assertions.

She said the temporary use permit option was in the Municipal Act and available for use by Trust committees. Because the property was in the Ganges Development Permit area, it allowed for public input.

"I am prepared to say quite publicly it should not appear to be by the back door. It is a legitimate tool," said Cragg.

Trustee Bob Andrew said he believed it was an acceptable procedure and dealing with the application should not be delayed. Substantial public input would still be invited.

## Fair rates all we want

Driftwood is facing major increases in costs for mailing newspapers to subscribers outside the Gulf Islands.

For more than 100 years, a reader subsidy has been available from the federal Department of Communications to offset the cost of receiving a community newspaper. This subsidy has been paid to Canada Post to keep the mailing rates low. Community newspapers have been paying 5.2 cents per issue for mailing.

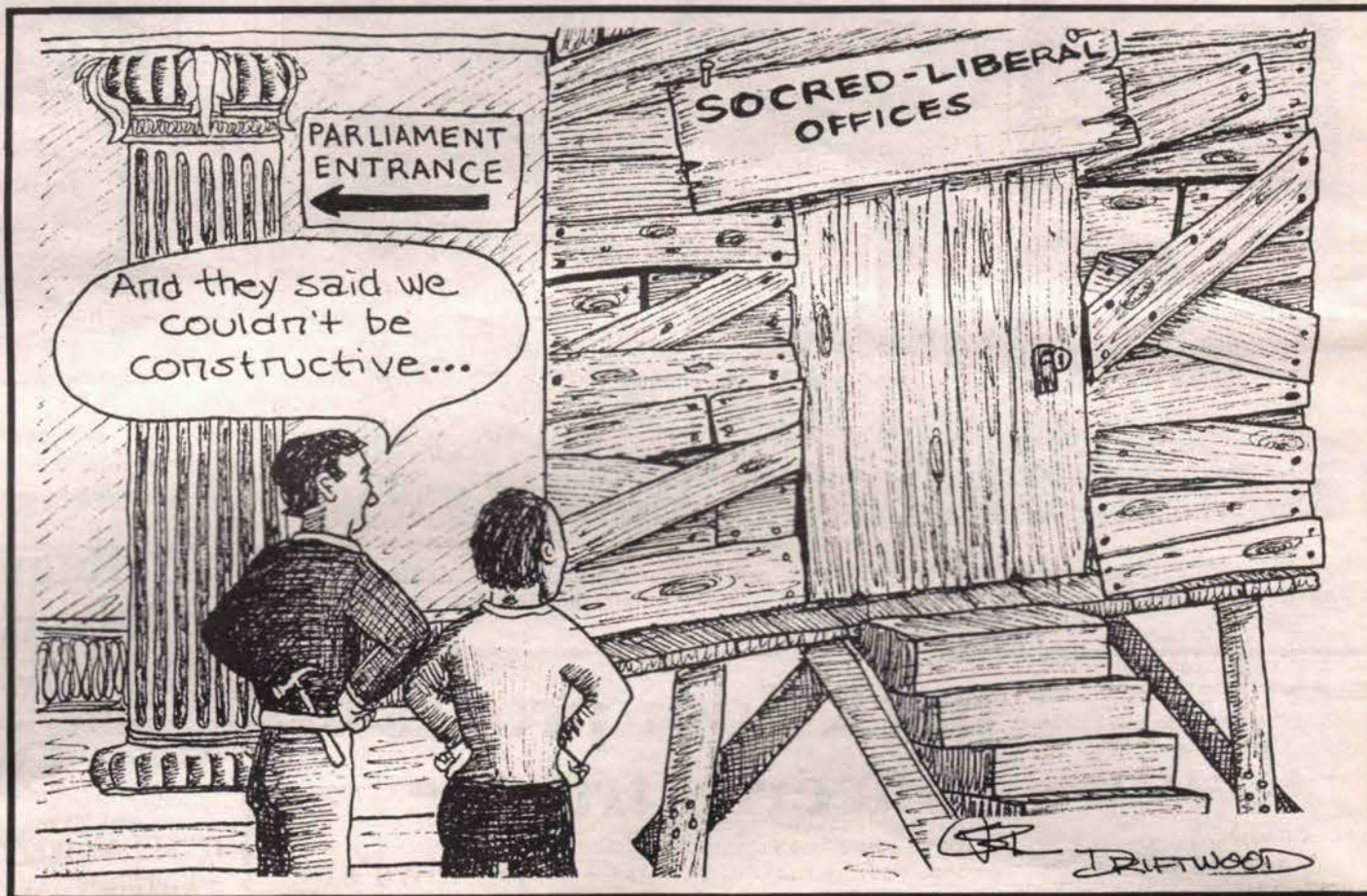
Now the federal department has eliminated the reader subsidy and Canada Post has increased the cost to mail newspapers to subscribers. Newspapers will cost an average of 51 cents per issue, based on weight.

The increases were supposed to come into effect in this year but community newspapers fought to have it delayed because many like Driftwood had embarked upon subscription drives before the increase was announced last December.

Community newspapers are not satisfied with their rates because a magazine like Macleans can be sent for 6.4 cents. We are asking why we are being discriminated against. Neither Communications Minister Perrin Beatty nor Canada Post have been able to give us an acceptable answer.

Like other Canadians, community newspaper publishers are greatly concerned about our national debt. While we commend the government for trying to reduce that growing monstrosity, there should be some fairness and equality applied to similar users of the postal service. Maybe you can give it a try. And, please, let us know if you get an acceptable answer.

By the way, there is no cost to send a letter to your MP or a cabinet minister.



## Time has come for last dance

Market vendor and Ganges merchants have been given a deadline to resolve areas of conflict regarding Saturday Farmer's Market. PRC chairman Kellie Booth says the two groups have been dancing around issues and they must reach consensus by December 31. If not, the commission will resolve the issues for the two parties.

In spite of meeting "unofficially" and "officially" for two years, the two sides have yet to finalize grievances.

Agendas have not always been provided, or followed, causing frustration among some committee members. The press has been shut out to prevent information reaching group members through a different avenue than personal presentation by representatives.

Hours of operation, parking and permits have been addressed, although not totally successfully. Last Saturday there was a vendor in the park taking down a stall well beyond closure time. (That's 1 p.m. according to merchants and 2 p.m. according to vendors.) We suggest when people do that, their permit be revoked, rather like getting a game suspension in sports, so they have to sit out the next Saturday market.

The major area of conflict revolves around selling commercial goods and a flea market atmosphere in the market. Association vendors are adamant about maintaining vendor rights to sell whatever they want. Merchants contend there should be some type of jurying system as there is for other markets in the province.

Vendors say the more there is to buy at the market, the more successful it is. Merchants reply they do not want to be faced with seeing merchandise in a public park that is not made, grown or significantly altered on Salt Spring.

We agree that goods for sale in a public park should be island goods.

If this issue cannot be resolved, PRC will have to make a decision, something it has avoided because its members have felt any decision should come from the two parties involved.

In some instances, this is an impossible task and "binding arbitration" is required.

The band is playing and time is running out.

# Capital Comment

VICTORIA — I hate to rain on Premier Harcourt's parade, for the second time, so soon in his mandate, but what is this nonsense about "sending a signal" to the people of British Columbia?

In what can be interpreted as little more than a bit of public-relations malarkey, the New Democratic Party invited some 1,000 British Columbians to witness the swearing-in ceremony of Harcourt's first cabinet.

The event was not to take place at Government House, the traditional venue for the Queen's blessing of the new power brokers, but at a University of Victoria auditorium.

NDP spokesman Evan Lloyd said the government wants to send a signal that it intends to make good on its promise of open government.

"We want to open the doors of government to British Columbians on our first day in office," Lloyd said.

The media widely reported this little stunt as a "precedent" and a "sharp break from tradition." Well, it isn't. When Dave Barrett's NDP was elected in 1972, he was sworn in as premier at Government House, but his cabinet convened in the legislative chambers to be sworn in.

Purists, at the time, argued that it was totally inappropriate to use the chamber for that purpose, because it's the legislative chamber, not the executive room.

### Bone to pick

Be that as it may, Harcourt obviously has his own bone to pick with convention which, as I mentioned before, is somewhat surprising, considering his often proclaimed respect for parliamentary tradition.

So call me picky, but frankly, I don't like it when traditions are turned rear-end over tea kettle at the whim of one man or one party. What's wrong with swearing in the cabinet at Government House? Isn't it the most appropriate place, as long as the Queen is the head of state?

Following the official swearing-in ceremony, to be witnessed by up to 1,000 invited guests, including all B.C. mayors, federal Members of Parliament, native leaders, religious, educational and community groups, a wing-ding was to take place at the Parliament Buildings.

At a so-called "open house", all newly-elected Members of the Legislative Assembly were to assemble at the legislative buildings to meet "the public". There were to be refreshments and tours of the buildings. In other words, a mingle-with-your-MLA affair.

### Tea and crumpets

Give me a break. That's not what open government is all about. Aside from the fact that it would have been somewhat inconvenient for the Fort Nelson or Williams Lake or 100 Mile House public to show up for the tea and crumpets due in Victoria, open government involves a little more than a friendly tete-a-tete with your MLA.

Open government means giving British Columbians an opportunity to participate in the decisions that affect them. It means that neither government nor special interest groups dictate to the rest of us.

Open government means that neither the forest companies nor the environmental groups have a monopoly on our timber resources. Open government means that politicians stop lying to us.

True, Harcourt promised a number of initiatives that would bring us a lot closer to the ideal of open government. He has promised the "toughest conflict of interest laws in Canada."

He has promised to introduce "whistle-blower legislation" that would protect public servants who rat on their masters.

Harcourt has also promised to proclaim a number of sections of the Ombudsman Act that would considerably increase the powers of the ombudsman.

To do all that, of course, there has to be a session of the legislature, and that was the first thing Harcourt put on hold. No session until spring, he said.

### Political point of view

From a political point of view, I can understand Harcourt's reluctance to call an early session. Why should he give Gordon Wilson's Liberals a platform from which to attack him before he's ready? But if you take that argument to its ultimate conclusion, why call a session at all?

Answering to the people and to Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition in the glaring limelight of a legislative session, is part of the open government Harcourt has promised.

And the new premier has been in opposition long enough to know that he would scream blue murder if he were in Wilson's place and the premier refused to call a session for another four months.

It's time Harcourt stopped playing open government and started delivering it instead. Failing to do so will quickly wear down an awful lot of trust the voters invested in him.

Inviting a cast of thousands to swearing-in ceremonies and holding open houses in Victoria just doesn't cut it.

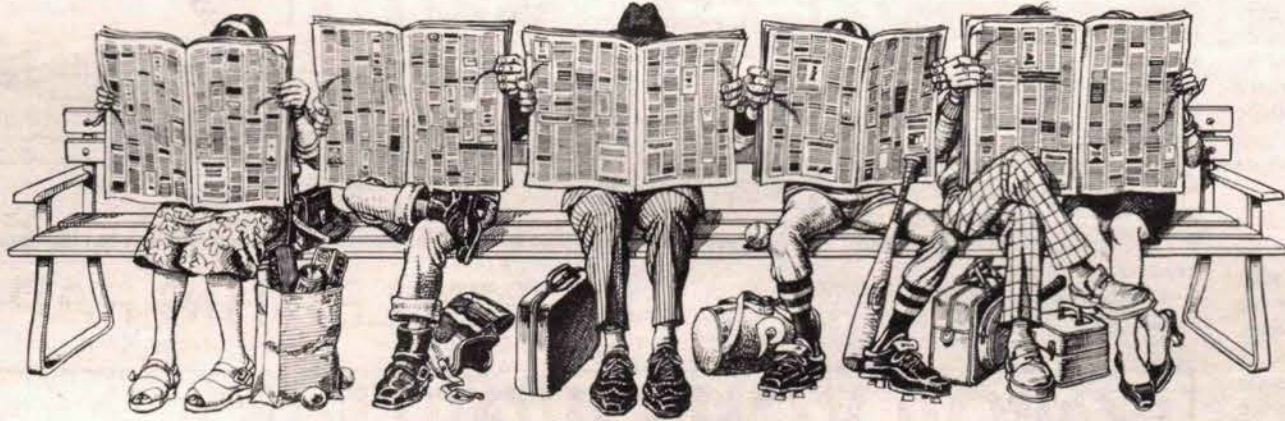

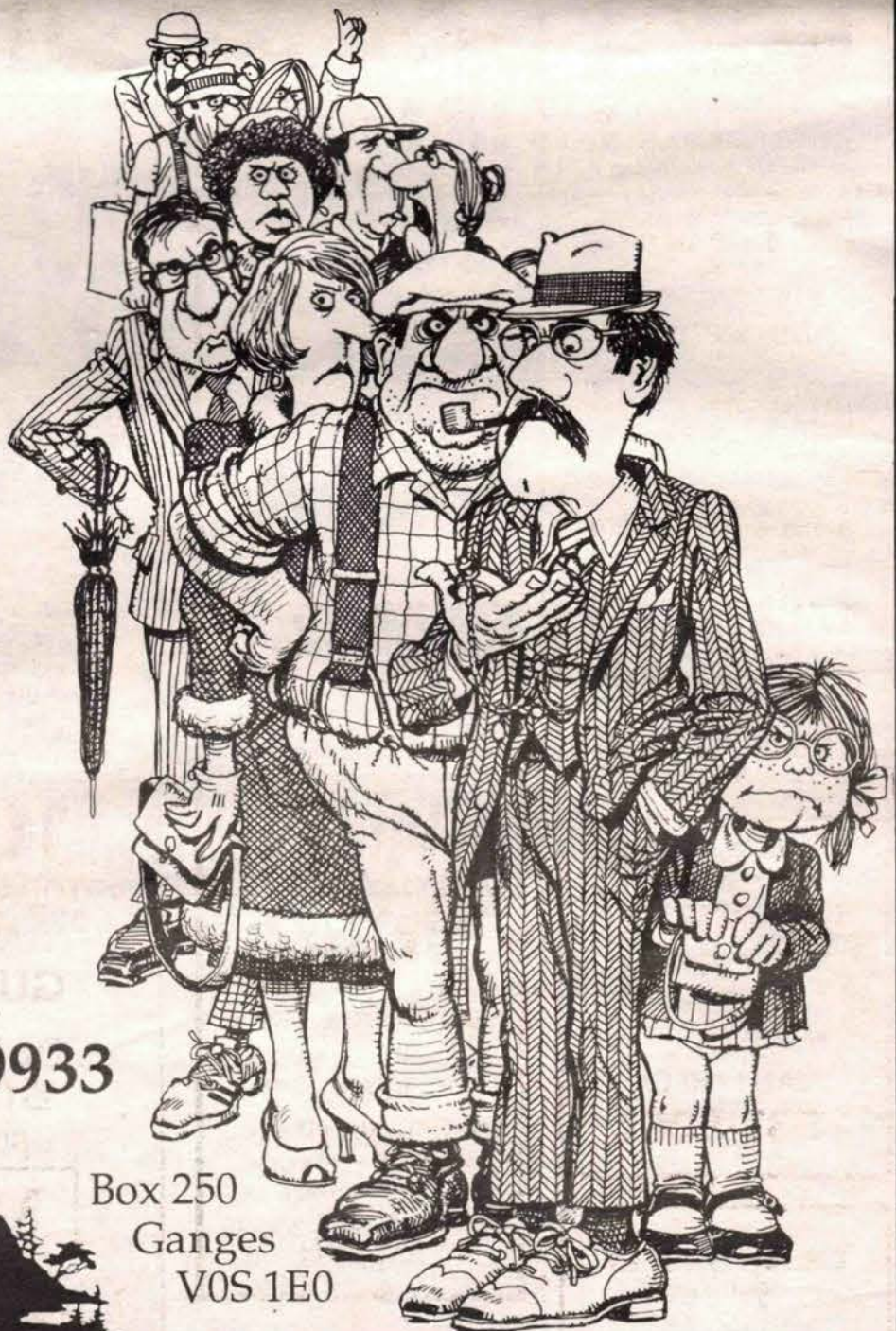

# Trustee claims study gathering dust on shelf

A study is useless if it sits gathering dust, Islands Trustee John Stepaniuk says.

At joint Capital Regional District and Islands Trust meeting last week, he claimed a Ganges traffic circulation study was taking too long to bring to public attention.

"I think it took too long and now what appears to be the number one issue some months ago now has been

decided as a non-issue."

"We promised; we promised through the summer we were going to deliver that to the public. It never did come about."

He later told *Driftwood* the Trust indicated the report would be released to in June. It is now November, and it still is not forthcoming.

"What is the use of a study if it is gathering dust. Put it before the people," he said.

Trustee Bob Andrew said in a telephone interview with *Driftwood* the study is taking longer to bring to the public than anticipated because Salt Spring engineer Philip Grange was hired to study impacts of potential routes that would bypass Ganges.

Andrew said a report done by UMA Engineering Ltd. for ministry of transportation and highways outlines options to bypass Ganges from an engineering perspective. But it does not account for social, environmental and "people concerns" as in-depth as Islands Trust would like, he said.

"We wanted to present all information from planning staff and engineers so we could best answer any questions from the public," Andrew explained, adding the study is to be put in a format that will be easily understood.

"All this is something we have never done before and it is therefore time-consuming," Andrew said. "I think John was overreacting. There is certainly nothing hidden or amiss. It's just a matter of time."

Andrew said he has no indication when information will be available.

He said the Trust had not set a time to bring forth the study, however "we had indicated to the public we had hoped to get it out this fall."

At the meeting Trust planner Tony Quin said Grange was hired to look at alternate study routes because "from a staff point of view there was other information required over and above what the consultant had done in order to provide an understandable product that can be presented to the public."

# University student studies paper mill pollution effects

Effects of Crofton pulp mill pollution on Salt Spring beaches are being studied as part of a undergraduate research paper by an Stanford University student.

Shannon Bard told *Driftwood* the purpose of her study is to look at pulp and paper pollution and how it affects the intertidal zone. She has just completed her second summer of research, although she has not compiled all the information from this summer.

However, in the summer of 1990, she surveyed three beaches on Salt Spring — Vesuvius, Ruckle Park and Fulford Harbour.

"Ruckle Park was probably the best site we had. It had crabs and sea cucumbers. In most of the other areas there is no way you will find a sea cucumber."

She said a surprising number of whole dead crabs were found washed up on Vesuvius Beach. While the beach was once used to collect clams and oysters, they now are contaminated. She also noted that residents have reported salmon and herring have stopped spawning in Fulford Harbour.

A more diverse community of marine life was found at Ruckle Park, Bard said, including porcelain and shore crabs, purple, pink, and mottled sea stars, cling fish, red sea cucumbers, and several varieties of seaweed.

Her research findings were presented to the Save the Georgia Straight conference on February 22, 1991.

This summer, she did a survey of Southey Point as part of her research. "You could see die off there as well.

Sea lettuce and rock weed looked sickly."

In the future more in-depth studies will be done, she said.

Called the Save Our Shores project, Bard's study covers the intertidal zone which is the area between the high tide mark and the low tide mark. She began working on intertidal pollution and the marine environment in 1985.

However, her Stanford University study, for which she has received three grants, started in 1990. Shorelines around both the Crofton and Howe Sound pulp mills are included in the studies, which she expects to take two more years.

To determine what organisms live where and in what numbers, Bard employs a system known as a quadrant study. At each site, an area representative of the beach is selected in the middle tide zone. The number of different organisms, the "per cent cover" and the relative abundance of each organism is recorded.

Along with the above statistical surveys, Bard also interviewed long-time residents, fishermen, and divers from each area to discover how the areas have changed.

"Though not strictly scientific,

anecdotal evidence is important none the less," she states in her 1990 student summary.

Bard would also like help from anyone interested in supplying information on what the beaches and ocean off the B.C. coast looked like in the past and how they have changed.

No long-term ecological studies have been initiated in the Straight of Georgia and there are no scientific records of the state of the marine environment in the past.

"One of the advantages industry has is that no long term studies have been done to a particular site," she said. "There are no sea cucumbers here but was there ever?"

Another goal of Bard's is to involve community groups and children monitoring beaches in their area. "It is important children learn about plants and ocean life before it is too late."

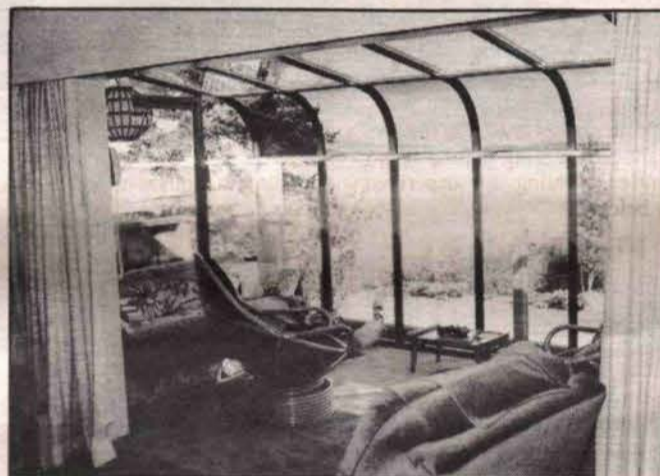

sion would undertake to decide how the farmers' market would be run, or a referendum would be held to let the public have input on future market operations.

However, neither course of action was included in the commission's motion to inform market vendors and merchants of the deadline.

Joint committee merchant representative Sharon Crouse said Tuesday "I don't see why things can't be worked out in a reasonable manner before December 31."

Market vendors representative Wendy Beatty said she does not know if an agreement can be worked out by December 31. She was surprised but not upset by the imposition of a deadline.

"I think they just picked a date out of the hat because they want something done on it," she told *Driftwood* Tuesday. "If they want something done they have to work with us." That means working on a contract between the PRC and the market vendors, she added.

Before vendors can enter into a contract with the PRC they have to become a society and adopt a constitution, which vendors are in the process of doing, said Beatty.

Kellie said the joint committee has not addressed the important issue of commercial goods in the market. She said it has "danced around" that issue long enough and now it is time "to sit down and get to business."

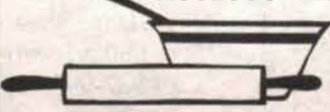

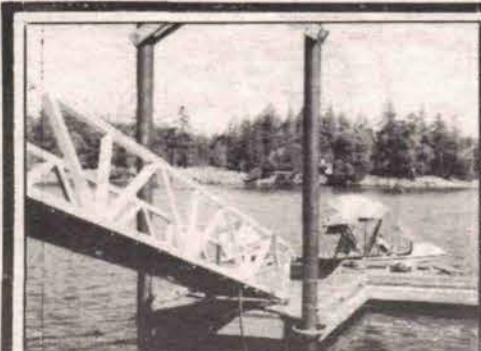

## Rezoning on hold

Salt Spring Island's Trust Committee will not consider any rezoning applications changing properties to multi-family zoning until Ganges sewer planning is complete.

The committee had received rezoning applications for two properties — one owned by Jim Stevens on Atkins Road and another owned by the Community Society on Churchill Road. The latter property was proposed by the society as an affordable housing project site.

Currently zone Rural 1, the Stevens property is designated within the Ganges Development Permit Area in the Official Community Plan. Churchill Road property is Rural Residential 1 and outside the development permit area. Neither is within the sewer service area.

Trustee John Stepaniuk said the committee should not exclude the Stevens property from consideration because it was within the Ganges Development Permit Area.

Committee chairman Diane Cragg said not considering the application "at this time" did not preclude it from consideration at a later date when Ganges sewer issues and planning had been dealt with.

Multi-family developments must be serviced by a sewer system.

## TRUST Briefs

Some items dealt with at the October 29 Salt Spring Island Trust Committee meeting are described briefly below.

### First Reading

Three zoning amendment bylaws received first reading and will be prepared for public hearing later this month.

Bylaw 285 will rezone a Blackburn Road property from Care Facility and Watershed 1 to Rural and Watershed 1. The Trust committee considers the move a form of downzoning.

Two lots on the corner of Jackson and Hereford avenues will change to Commercial 1 zoning from a Rural 1 designation under Bylaw 286, consistent with the Community Plan.

A boundary adjustment of property at the junction of Beaver Point and Fulford-Ganges roads in Fulford Harbour will be affected by rezoning it from Rural Residential 1 to Rural in Bylaw 287.

### APC appointments

Leslee Quesnel was appointed alternate Advisory Planning Commission member representing the Chamber of Commerce. Dee Kinney is the regular member.

Members are appointed by Salt Spring Island Trust Committee. Specific individuals belonging to APC member groups such as the Chamber of Commerce are recommended for appointment by those groups.

### Strata conversions

Planner Tony Quin reported that, contrary to initial beliefs, the local Trust committee did have approving authority over conversions of property to strata ownership.

When Cusheon Lake Resort owners Rosemary and Helmut Boehringer had inquired about Trust involvement in such conversions earlier this year, it was believed the Trust had no control over the change except to comment as a referral agency.

Quin said strata conversions were a new matter for the Trust and a system would have to be put in place.

He also said the Boehringers would be advised about the change in approval.

### Bylaw enforcement

Trustee John Stepaniuk said bylaw enforcement was more frequently being brought to trustees' attention by island residents.

Noise, hours of work and home occupation use were some areas he said caused concern.

Planner Tony Quin said he would be setting up a meeting with Trust Bylaw Enforcement Officer Larry Olafsen to discuss enforcement procedures.

## Workshop deals with comatose

Relating to people in coma and remote states is the subject of an upcoming workshop at Salt Spring Centre.

Victoria residents Stan and Judith Tomandl and Salt Spring's Ann Jacob are conducting a workshop designed to give participants specific skills for use in the home and workplace on November 15 to 17.

A centre brochure describing the workshop says both professional and voluntary caregivers of people who are comatose, autistic, mentally handicapped, afflicted by Alzheimer's or similar states will gain several techniques.

They will learn to "recognize subtle clues to the inner worlds of those in coma and remote states; actually support and foster those clues to assist people to learn from their inner states and hopefully to move through and complete those states" and "enhance communication skills and increase awareness to perceive life on deeper levels."

Stan Tomandl has worked extensively with those in coma and remote states and the terminally ill. He is a diploma candidate with the Research Society for Process Oriented Psychology in Zurich.

He and his wife, Judith, and Ann Jacob trained with Dr. Arnold Mindell, author of *Coma, Key to Awakening*.

## Reformers plan funding drive

Doug Dobson will head up a campaign team of Reform Party of Canada canvassers on Salt Spring Island.

"We should be in the best possible position to get our message heard across Canada," he said.

Reform Party of Canada will give income tax receipts to anyone donating money to a \$12 million fund raising drive despite the party's opposition to such credits.

"If we don't make use of the political tax credit like other people are doing, we will find ourselves at an incredible disadvantage," said Cliff Fryers, party chairman and chief operating officer.

"In order to maintain a level playing field for the next election we are going to take advantage of that mechanism. We will take away the political tax credit if we ever have the opportunity to do so."

Reform Party of Canada has stated it is opposed to allowing income tax deductions for money donated to political parties.

Roger Gibbins, a University of Calgary political science professor said the decision to give deductions is not "inconsistent and illogical. The party will play within the rules of the game, even though it might argue those rules should be changed."

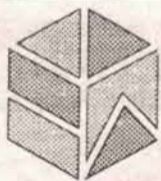
Fryers told a news conference the

two-month fund-raising drive has been labelled the "Save Canada Campaign" because the next federal election will be fought over Canadian unity.

More than 3,000 volunteers across Canada will canvas the party's 90,000 members and sympathizers. Each member would have to give \$134 to reach 12 million.

Gibbins said the party will have a chance to trumpet its grassroots support, if it reaches its \$12 million goal.

"If they can pull it off, it's going to be a pretty incredible feat," he said.

# Family environment sometimes deadly

Family violence: the statistics are alarming and the results can be deadly. One of the most serious problems, both socially and criminally occurring in Canada and around the world is abuse which occurs in the family unit.

Estimates indicate one in 10 women in Canada is assaulted by her husband or partner, that one in four girls and one in 10 boys are sexually abused before the age of 16 and at least four per cent of elderly persons are victims of some form of significant abuse.

What the statistics don't show however, is the long term consequences of these acts. It is now believed that family abuse is linked to subsequent alcohol and drug abuse, delinquency, suicide, juvenile prostitution, mental health problems and violent crimes.

The most prevalent form of abuse in the home is wife battering, which accounts for 72 per cent of the violence occurring within the family unit. Wife battering, by definition is "violence, physical and or psychological, expressed by a husband or a male or a lesbian live-in lover toward his wife or his/her live-in lover, to which the wife does not consent, and which is directly or indirectly condoned by laws and attitudes prevalent in the society in which it occurs."

The Gulf Islands are, unfortunately, no different from the rest of the country when it comes to this problem. According to Susan Krug, counselling co-ordinator for the Community Centre in Ganges, wife battering is as much a problem here as it is elsewhere.

"It is happening here pretty much the same as it does everywhere else. If someone contacts us needing help, we try to move quickly."

She noted the Community Centre has two trained community workers ready to help women in trouble on very short notice.

"We will arrange for medical assistance first, if necessary, and then we try to get them to just sit down and talk to us. One of the best things we can do to begin with is just have a

sympathetic ear and a shoulder for them to cry on."

The Community Centre also offer the victims information on legal matters concerning their plight. If necessary, women and children can be put up in shelters in either Duncan or Victoria to protect them from an unpredictable mate. They can stay there for four to six weeks while they try to piece their lives back together.

"Counsellors at the shelters will help them look at their options and to see where they can go from there," said Krug. "The woman's self esteem is usually very low by the time we see them. They have been beaten either physically or psychologically or both. No matter what they tried to do, the results ended up being the same.

*"It's happening here pretty much the same as it does everywhere else."*

It ends up being very demoralizing for them. They begin to believe that the problems are somehow their fault. If only they did this or that differently things would have worked out. What these women want most is for the marriage to work out. They just want to love and be loved back."

According to psychologists and social workers involved with wife beating cases, the abusers usually come from homes where violence was the norm. As many as 80 per cent of wife batterers saw their own mothers being beaten or were abused themselves as a child. Men who do this usually suffer from low self esteem and beating makes them feel powerful. They also have little or no control over their impulses and no skills in tolerating dissension or conflicts.

There is, however, some reason for optimism. The majority of wife-abusing men who have completed counselling never beat their wives again. In Victoria, there is just such a program offered. Called The Victoria Family Violence Project, it offers group treatment for men who have battered their wives or girlfriends and want to stop.

Alayne Hamilton, executive director for the project told Driftwood the success rate for men who complete the three-phase program is quite high.

"The short term results are really quite amazing. Somewhere between 80 and 90 per cent of the men who complete the course become non-abusive toward their partners. The

long-term result figures we have show that approximately two-thirds remain non-abusive, and hopefully the others will realize they have slipped back into their old patterns and will come back for some additional help."

Another hopeful sign is the fact that two-thirds of the men taking this program are doing so voluntarily.

"It is usually a case of the spouse saying take this course and learn to deal with your problem or I'm gone. It's a good motivator."

The other good motivator is the court system. One third of the clients taking the program are there on a court order. "It sends out a powerful message to these men and to the public that there is no justification for abuse and society will no longer stand for it," said Hamilton.

Although these signs are encouraging, Hamilton says there is still a fairly high drop-out rate among those men who come voluntarily. "They will take a few sessions and then think they have the problem beat and so do their spouses, unfortunately, until the problems arise once again."

But yet another encouraging sign is the fact that Hamilton says every seat in the group sessions is filled in advance.

"Yes we do have dropouts, but there are others waiting to take their places."

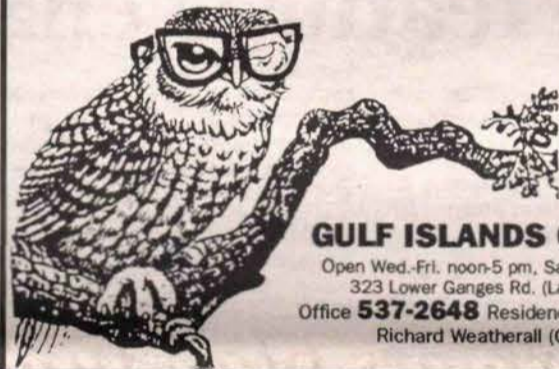

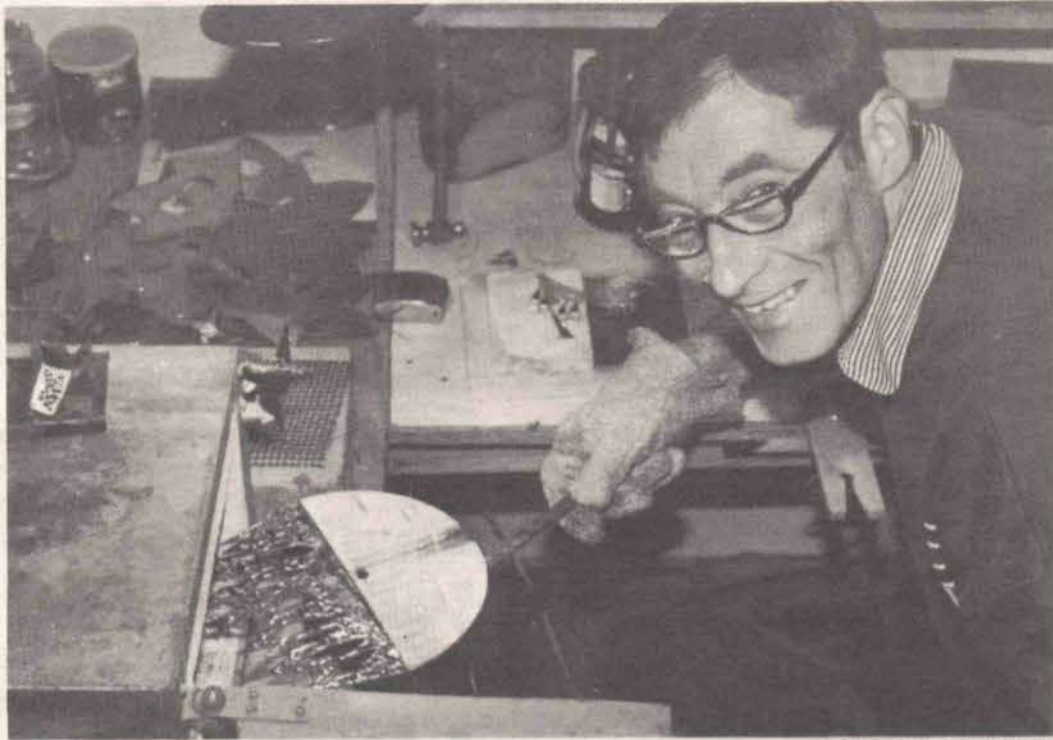

## Sale features enamelling

Jewellery enamelling is the craft of Salt Spring resident Jean-Marc Billaud.

His work will be presented at the five-guild craft show at Mahon Hall November 15 through 17.

Most commonly referred to as "cloisonne", the craft actually includes a variety of other techniques used to fuse vitreous compounds (the enamels) to a metallic support, according to Billaud.

"Those who were fortunate enough to see the King Tut exhibition on tour a few years ago were presented with some of the very earliest examples of enamelling. It is an ancient art, refined in Persia and then Europe."

Billaud is a native of Limoges, France, a town renowned for its enamelists. He began toying with the

craft 20 years ago. "The craft renaissance of the late sixties was going strong in Europe. It was an inviting epoch for creative energies in every area.

"Minds came bubbling through hands, as the way of the intellect was being challenged and traditional techniques were being revived while conventional styles were being crucified and crucible."

Billaud shunned formal training, and instead travelled extensively gaining exposure to artists and craftsmen from many cultures. California had a dynamic arts scene, and from there his work acquired "more solidity" and "affirmed itself."

Billaud returned to his craft two years ago after a long break. He does not use pre-cut shapes or findings and does all his metal work himself.

In fact, the metal support's shape and texture have become increasingly prominent in his work and competes for attention with the rich colours of the enamels.

Being partial to "working big," he is presently applying the techniques used on jewellery to larger items. Clocks, lighting fixtures, switch covers, and door and cabinet handles are in the works, Billaud said.

## Culture helpers sought

A Gulf Islands cultural volunteer could receive national recognition through a special award to be presented during National Volunteer Week next April.

The nomination period for this year's Cultural Volunteer and Benefactor Recognition Program, the Lescaobot Award, has been extended to November 30, 1991.

Launched in June of this year, the program has generated considerable interest. The deadline was moved to provide organizations and individuals more time to submit names.

The program is intended to honour those who have contributed significantly, as volunteers or benefactors, to Canada's cultural life.

Named for Canada's first cultural volunteer, Marc Lescaobot, the award is comprised of three categories — community, regional and Canadian.

There are some 213,000 volunteers contributing time and talent to Canada's cultural organization. The annual value of their work is estimated to be \$182 million.

The Task Force on Funding of the Arts also estimated that the amount donated by benefactors, or patrons, is expected to top \$100 million by the year 2000.

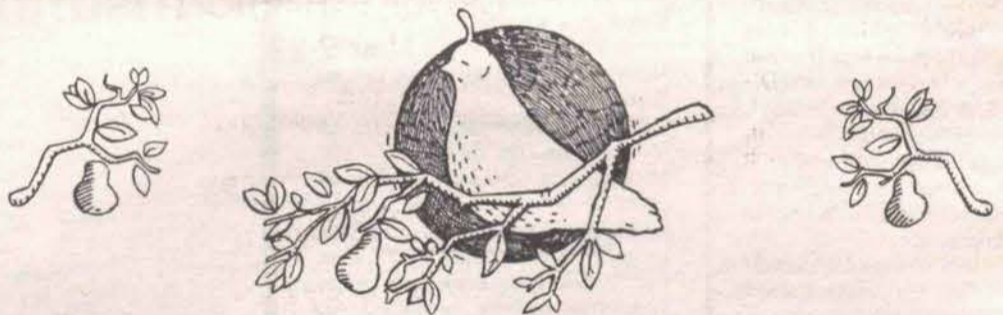

# Islander records personal best in annual Victoria marathon

A Salt Spring long distance runner achieved a personal best recently in the 12th annual Victoria Marathon.

Steven Mitchell finished the 26-mile race in 28th place out of a starting field of 977 runners on October 13. He was also seventh over the line in the open men's category.

With a time of 2:47:25, Mitchell was only 21 minutes and two seconds behind marathon winner Jacques Bilinski of Vancouver.

Commenting on the effects of running 26 miles non-stop in less than three hours, Mitchell conceded: "It's a long way. It's a killer."

He entered his first marathon in Portland three years ago. He has also raced in Vancouver and his native England.

His latest race was the Shawnigan Half Marathon where he placed eighth out of 252 starters.

The 25-year-old Mitchell said he learned in his second marathon in Vancouver that participants never stop running before the race is finished. "At the 20-mile mark I did what is called *hitting the wall*," he said. The game is over at that point, he stressed. "Your muscles just seize up."

Marathons provide enjoyable competition, he said, "and it is good fun as well."

People of all ages can get involved in the sport, he noted. Several Victoria Marathon runners were over 60 years-old. "Anybody can do it," he said.

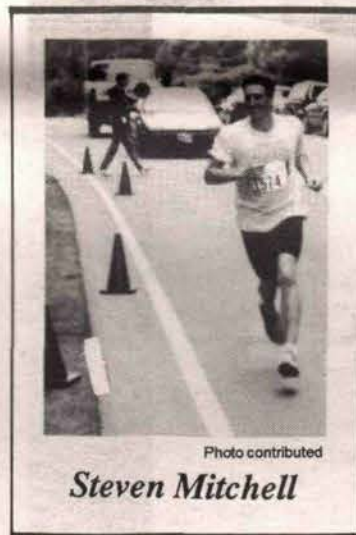

He runs "everywhere" on Salt Spring, about 40 to 50 miles per week. In order to further improve his marathon times, he estimates needing to increase that distance to between 50 and 60.

Some runners do up to 140 miles per week, he said.

His coach is Salt Spring chiropractor and runner Michael Lax.

"In the last year Steve has really improved a lot," said Lax, "and I think with some extra work and some more structure to what he is doing, he can become someone who is up there in the final standings of any of the local events on the mainland and Vancouver Island."

Lax himself placed 15th in the Shawnigan Half Marathon last weekend.

Mitchell also runs with Salt Spring's younger runners and track club athletes. Club coach Rae-Anne Huth said "Steve is really good with the kids" and will often help them with their pace.

"He is solid and he is there for the kids. He helps out wherever he can," she said.

Lax said he and Mitchell "would like to have a (running) club that can interest more than simply the serious athlete."

"There are quite a few people who are active on the island and who do run. We are trying to get enough interest to get a nucleus of a club," said

Lax. One goal of a running club would be "to try to have people interested and happy with what they are doing but also feeling as if they aren't being pushed into more than what they want to do or can handle."

Dispelling the occasionally-heard myth that running is harmful to peoples' bones and joints, Lax said "the evidence is otherwise. If you don't have any severe biomechanical problems, if you wear the right shoes and if you approach your running in

a sensible way, it can be an excellent exercise." While Mitchell continues training and hopes to enter a London marathon — which can contain up to 26,000 entrants — in April of 1992, he also admits he is simply infected with "the running bug."

This means that while others may be ready for bed when they finish a tiring day at work, Mitchell takes an average six-mile run and has ample energy for the rest of the evening. He invites anyone interested in running at any level to call him evenings or weekends at 653-2315.

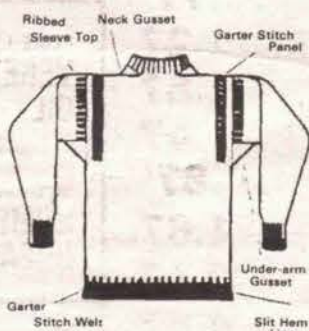

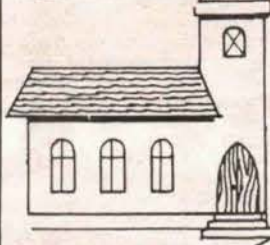

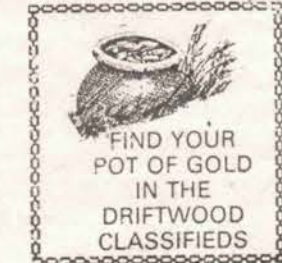

# Searching for best quote

Well, the end of the century is less than a decade off, and you can bet your Bartlett's Quotations editors of Maclean's, Time and Newsweek will soon start pumping out special "commemorative" issues, summing up the highs and lows of the past 100 years of human achievement.

They'll talk of Bell's telephone and Edison's lightbulb. They will remind us of Gandhi's grace and Hitler's infamy.

Editors will quibble over the most famous phrase of the twentieth century. Some will say it was Churchill's "blood, sweat and tears." Others will vote for Neil Armstrong's "one small step for man..." One or two might give the nod to McLuhan's "the medium is the message."

Not me. My vote for most significant phrase of the twentieth century goes to a children's poster that appeared back in the 1960s. It was a simple question scrawled naively in black poster paint on a piece of green construction paper. I asked:

**What if we gave a war and nobody came?**

The poster didn't get a lot of national attention in the sixties. I saw it reproduced on tee shirts at folk festivals once in a while, but that was about it.

The slogan disappeared, but not the sensibility. The notion that war's something that each of us can choose not to fight sank beneath the human consciousness like one of those delayed-reaction depth charges destroyers dropped on submarines.

## Heritage supported

Support in principle has been given to establishment of an Advisory Heritage Committee for Salt Spring.

The concept was discussed at the local Trust committee's October 29 meeting.

Draft provincial legislation introduced by former Social Credit administration proposes ways local governments can protect buildings, structures, land and trees.

A release from the ministry of municipal affairs, recreation and culture states the legislation aims to provide "a community heritage tool-kit which will provide a framework for the planned management and conservation of heritage resources in communities."

It also tries to increase "protection afforded to aboriginal heritage sites and archaeological artifacts," while including "many new provisions to protect the rights of the private property owner."

Trustee John Stepaniuk said he thought the legislation could be particularly useful in conjunction with Ganges village development.

Committee chairman Diane Cragg pointed out the legislation was "not well adapted to the Islands Trust Act" but that Trust Council had passed resolutions to suggest amendments to the proposed legislation.

Architect Jonathan Yardley offered to assist with any Advisory Heritage Committee work needed on Salt Spring.

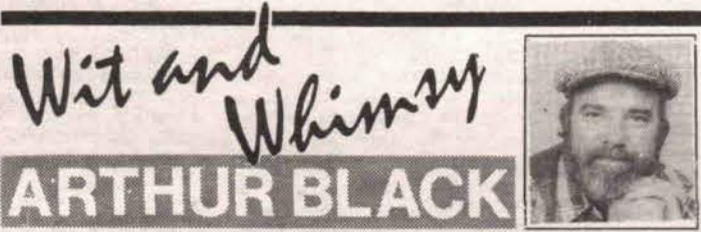

If you've been listening closely over the past few years you might have heard detonations.

There was a loud one in the courtyard of Malacanang Palace in the Philippines a few years back when Ferdinand and Imelda Marcos tried to crush a popular movement that eventually drove them from the country. It all came down to one moment when the Philippine army, its tanks and soldiers massed and menacing, was ordered to fire on demonstrators in front of the palace.

Troops refused, and the Marcos dynasty shuddered and died in that instant.

Who can forget the Chinese student, white shirted, standing calmly in front of — and stopping — a line of government tanks in Tiananmen Square?

It happened in Romania when the disgustingly corrupt Ceausescu regime ordered troops to massacre protestors.

Once more, the troops refused.

And it's just been revealed that, but for a handful of soldiers, the recent attempted Soviet coup d'etat would have been a bloodbath. One of the coup leaders, chairman Vladimir Kryuchkov, ordered a KGB anti-terrorist unit to storm the Russian parliament building and capture President Boris Yeltsin. The troops refused. "We couldn't fight against our own people," said a KGB officer, "and this our former chairman didn't take into consideration."

All these moments show great bravery on the part of unarmed protestors, but that's not the point. We've always had handfuls of brave people ready to die for their beliefs. What's revolutionary is that each incident features *soldiers thinking for themselves.*

What a frightening prospect for the military mind.

If I had my way, I'd flood the world with T shirts with the slogan *WHAT IF THEY GAVE A WAR AND NOBODY CAME?* emblazoned on the front. And on the back of the shirt I'd print a photo from one of the Gulf War videos that the U.S. military censors refuse to release. It shows Iraqi soldiers being sliced in half by helicopter cannon fire. A senior Pentagon official explained the censorship, saying: "If we let people see that kind of thing, there would never again be any war."

Gosh, we couldn't have that, could we?

**Bylaw No. 1978**

The following summary of the text of Bylaw No. 1978, cited as "Capital Regional District Park Disposal Bylaw No. 1, (Salt Spring Island), 1991" is hereby published as at third reading and prior to submission to the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

\*\*\*\*\*  
**A BYLAW TO AUTHORIZE THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT TO DISPOSE OF A PORTION OF LAND DEDICATED AS PARK AND TO PLACE THE PROCEEDS OF DISPOSAL IN A RESERVE FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING PARK LANDS WITHIN THE SALT SPRING ISLAND ELECTORAL AREA**  
\*\*\*\*\*

WHEREAS pursuant to Supplementary Letters Patent issued August 28, 1975, the Capital Regional District may acquire, develop, operate and maintain community parks for the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area and the provisions of section 685 and 686 of the *Municipal Act* apply, mutatis mutandis to the Capital Regional District with respect to the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to section 685 of the *Municipal Act*, the Regional District is entitled to possession and control of an area designated park by Subdivision Plan 18964 deposited in the Land Title Office in Victoria on the 4th day of August, 1966;

AND WHEREAS the Board of the Regional District considers the above-mentioned dedicated park to be surplus to the needs of the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area and considers it advisable to dispose of the above mentioned park and use the proceeds of disposition for the purpose of acquiring other park lands;

AND WHEREAS section 686 of the *Municipal Act* authorizes the Regional District to, by bylaw approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, dispose of a portion of land of which the Regional District has possession and control and place the proceeds of disposal to the credit of a reserve fund under and subject to section 378 of the *Municipal Act* for the purpose of acquiring park land;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled hereby enacts as follows:

- The Board of the Capital Regional District is hereby authorized and empowered to subdivide and dispose of that area designated park on Subdivision Plan 18964 deposited in the Victoria Land Title Office on the 4th day of August, 1966.
- The proceeds of the disposal of the land shall be credited to a reserve fund for the specific purpose of acquiring park lands within the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area.
- The Chairman and Secretary of the Capital Regional District are hereby empowered to do all acts and things and to execute all documents necessary to carry out the disposal of land authorized by this Bylaw.

A copy of the complete bylaw may be viewed during normal working hours, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday to Friday inclusive, from October 30, 1991 to November 12, 1991 at the offices of the Capital Regional District, 524 Yates Street, Victoria, B.C., and at the local building inspection office in Ganges, B.C.

•An unpredicted northwest storm hit Salt Spring Island causing power failures and boats to be torn from their moorings. In Vesuvius, where the full force of the storm was felt, Dr. Elwood Cox's boat smashed on the rocks. The *George S. Pearson*, the Vesuvius - Crofton ferry was unable to leave the dock and missed most of the day's sailings due to high winds and heavy seas. Commuters using this route were forced to take the Fulford - Swartz Bay ferry to get to their destinations.

## Twenty Five Years Ago

•Dr. William Lockhart - or Doc, as he was affectionately known died. He once said "I'll do my best to reach 100. After that I don't give a hang." He didn't quite make it; he would have turned 99 the next February. His passing left islanders with a hollow feeling that was mingled with disbelief, because he was not only a fine old man, but almost as much as part of the island as the trees and lakes.

## Twenty Years Ago

•Two Salt Spring Island groups were pressing for a footpath between Pioneer Village and Ganges commercial centre. The ratepayers association reported a committee was negotiating with the department of highways in Victoria. Salt Spring Island Lions Club indicated that Saanich and the Islands MLA John Tisdale had been a guest at a recent dinner meeting and promised his fullest co-operation on the footpath.

## Fifteen Years Ago

•"It was the first war - time for a plane to have crashed at Ganges without being wholly demolished," said George Maude, of Sidney. Maude dropped into *Driftwood's* office displaying two old pictures of a Hawker Hurricane aircraft of the 135 Squadron, RCAF based at Patricia Bay during World War Two. He recalled the fighter plane had been piloted there by Flight Sergeant W. Heller, when it encountered engine trouble while flying over Ganges on November 30, 1942, and was forced to land in a field near Beddis Road. Both the pilot and plane escaped serious injury.

## Ten Years Ago

•Gulf Islanders had fun on Halloween and the RCMP had an easy night. According to police sources, not one complaint of mischief was

reported on either Salt Spring or Galiano islands.

•Contract talks between Gulf Islands teachers and the school board had broken down, maybe. Michael Hayes, president of Gulf Islands Teachers' Association, said negotiations with the school board had come to a halt. School board chairman Strick Aust, on the other hand, said the two sides were still talking. The executive of the teachers' association had requested a meeting with the full board, he said, and the two sides had scheduled another meeting.

•Thanks to the vigilant actions of Del Somerville and Eric Fisherboth, the wildlife and human populations of Mayne Island could once again

sleep easy. The two men were credited with helping the RCMP apprehend and arrest pit-lamping deer hunters on the island. Firearms were not permitted to be used on Mayne Island even in the daytime.

## Five Years Ago

•Announcement of another study of St. Mary Lake was made at the annual general meeting of the Salt Spring Island Water Preservation Society. Vice - president Mike Larmour told the meeting the study would bring together relevant information from a wide variety of sources which would be needed to fully identify existing and future potential problems with the lake.

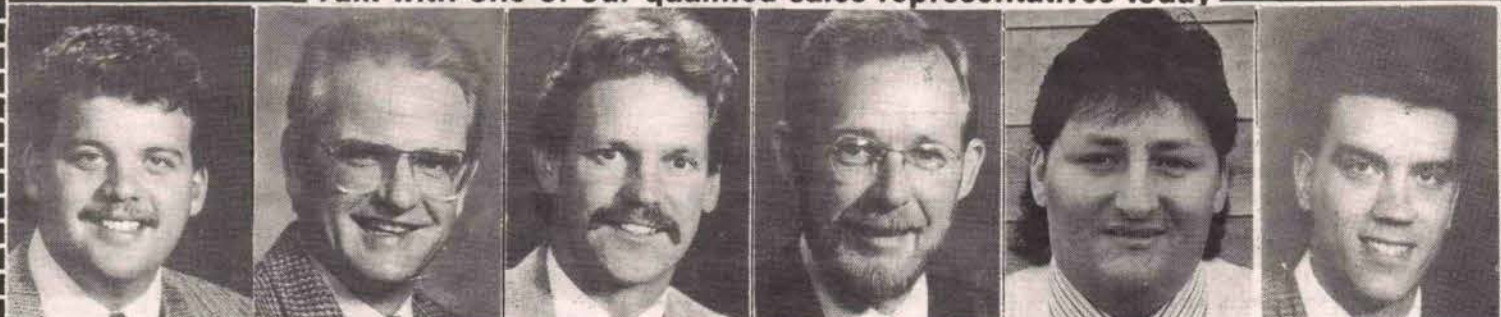
