Former employees picket Fulford

Three of five former Fulford Inn employees whose positions were terminated in February set up an "information picket" outside the Inn last weekend.

Former bartender Judy Harper, and kitchen staff Brigitte Roberts and Gladly Hanifan said they decided to make their presence known in order to push for a formal Industrial Relations Council hearing on their terminations, which coincided with union certification of Inn employees.

Harper said she felt the picket action was successful.

"We seemed to have generally a lot of local support," she said. "We kept a fair amount of business out of there. It was a very successful Friday night."

Inn owners Peter Wilson and Leslie Shannon said Friday night

business was slow but Saturday and Sunday were about normal.

Harper said their union — the Hotel, Restaurant, Culinary Employees and Bartenders Union — did not sponsor the picket. "We decided to do this on our own."

Hanifan, who worked at the Fulford Inn for almost five years, said picketing "is what we have to do. It's not because we want to, we have to."

The women said they want a formal hearing on their terminations as soon as possible.

Wilson and Shannon said their lawyer informed them a formal IRC hearing had been set for April 9 and 10. Harper said they had not heard that from their union by Friday and that in any event they were promised an earlier date.

Harper was released by Wilson February 2, the day before employees voted 6 to 1 in favour of certification with local 40 of the HRCEBU, according to its vice-

president and business rep Lynn Hancock.

Leasing out of Inn kitchen operations, which resulted in job loss to four of the unionized employees, is also under dispute, she explained.

Hancock said the union believes those two actions violate conditions of the Industrial Relations Act which state an employer cannot change conditions at a place of employment for four months after initiation of certification proceedings.

"You cannot hire or fire or do anything, without just cause," she

Slug slow, mail slower

How slowly can a letter travel through the Canada Post system from Duncan to Salt Spring?

Salt Spring resident Lane Gromme has the answer, based on empirical experimentation.

Gromme observed a slug while working in his garden last weekend and, inspired by receiving a long overdue letter from Duncan on Friday, decided to measure the slug's normal pace.

The slug was able to traverse a distance of one foot in just over one minute, he said.

At that rate, figured Gromme, "it would take 76 days for the slug to get from downtown Duncan to Salt Spring."

Gromme received a letter Friday 96 days after his sister mailed it from Duncan.

By comparison, he had a letter arrive from Thailand in five days.

No pesticide spraying planned for Salt Spring

Pesticide spraying for gypsy moths on Salt Spring Island has not occurred and will not occur this summer.

Agriculture Canada program officer Shane Sela told the Driftwood that the department has not been able to find the exact area where the egg masses are located.

"We can't spray hodge-podge."

During the summer of 1992 they will be trying to find egg-infested areas by trapping gypsy moth males on the island.

"We know there is a problem there but we have to do our homework and isolate exactly where that infestation is."

This year Agriculture Canada has been searching trees and shrubs in the south end of the island where gypsy moth males were trapped last summer. "To date, we haven't found any egg masses in that area."

Agriculture Canada will be spraying for gypsy moths in Colwood in southern Vancouver Island in May, said Sela.

Gypsy moths are destructive moths originally from Europe and Asia. They were responsible for the destruction of about a million hectares of urban and rural trees in Ontario and Quebec in 1980.

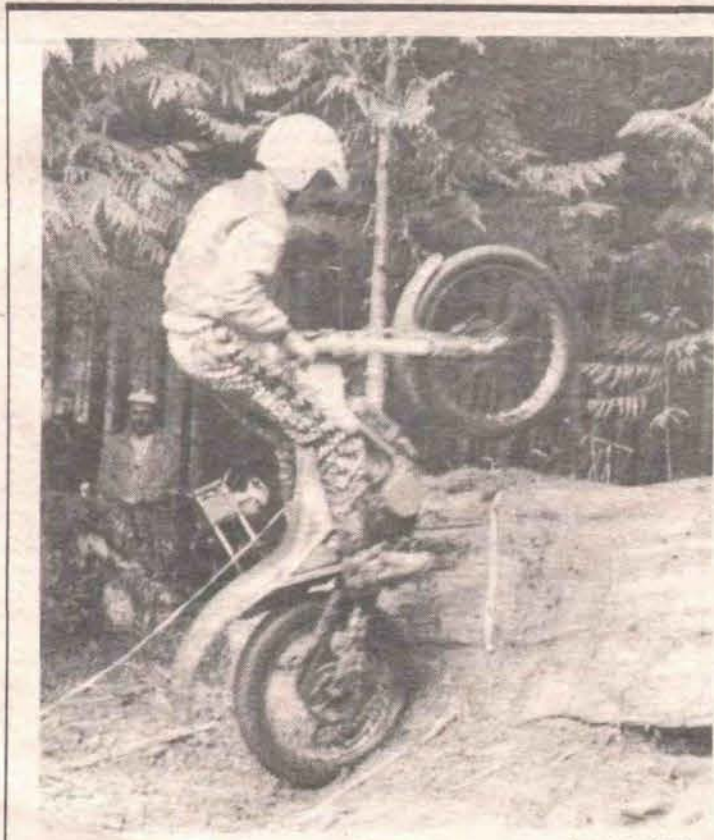

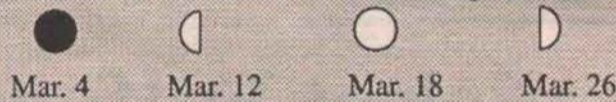

Study enters second round

Consultants on the Salt Spring Island Local Government Options Study will enter a second round of public consultations in late March.

They will reflect their findings from the initial workshops back to the public to confirm that they understand island issues as islanders see those issues, says study chairman David Borrowman.

"They will also have organized local concerns in terms of local government."

The purpose of the initial workshop-style meetings was for the public to speak directly to the consultants about local issues, he adds.

Consultants will identify problems which islanders cannot control locally and set them aside. "But more importantly, problems which can be eased by reform of local administration will be highlighted."

Once the consultants are satisfied that they understand local issues, they will begin identifying opportunities and options for change, says Borrowman. A further round of public meetings in May will be used to publicize a range of options for local government on Salt Spring.

"At present, it is planned to allow the summer for reflection, before a final report in the fall."

Times and locations of the public meetings will be advertised in next week's *Driftwood*.

kitchen staff.

Shannon said their position is that the lease with chef Dieter Horn to run the Inn kitchen was signed before the January 23 application for HRCEBU certification took place.

She said issues could have been resolved by an informal hearing held February 28 if time allotted for it had not been so short, with off-island parties anxious to catch an early ferry.

"We are trying to be fair," said Wilson, "and it has to take its legal course."

One current Fulford Inn employee is a union member. Another member is on maternity leave and one other has since quit, said Shannon.

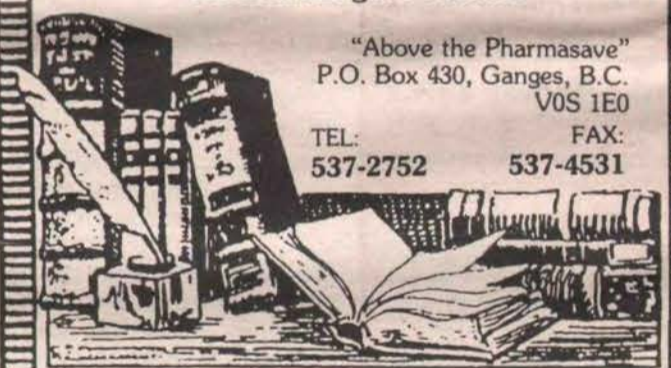

Clam harvesters hit beaches

A clam harvest opening March 10 had scores of clammers squatting in the sand at Bader's Beach, busily digging, searching and bagging the shellfish.

About 250,000 pounds of clams were taken from southern Gulf Island beaches during two days last week, federal fisheries district supervisor Kit Slater told the *Driftwood*.

Beaches from the top of Gabriola south were open although beaches with road access are favoured by clammers.

"There are quite a few on Salt Spring that are quite productive."

Not all beaches were open. Those with sewage contamination stayed closed.

Another two day opening will occur in area "E" southern Gulf Islands April 3 and April 7. Clammers can only pick during one tide each day.

Slater said problems in clamming started occurring in 1986 and 1987. Large numbers of beaches were being dug all year except during red tides. Over-digging led

to new regulations, he said.

Under the new "management plan" clammers pick one of five areas of the province where they want to dig for the year. They have to stay in that area all year and they can only dig during openings.

"I'm not saying there is no problems now but they are nothing like they were four or five years ago."

Most of the diggers are of Asian origin, often Vietnamese, Slater said. Clamming is hard work but it enables people to make money without being able to speak English or having an education, he added.

Liquid waste group will advise director

A task force for liquid waste has been formed to advise Capital Regional Director Julia Atkins on a liquid waste management plan for Salt Spring Island.

The task force is to look at all liquid waste management issues on Salt Spring, said Atkins.

"I've given them free reign but they may take an expansive or conservative approach."

A commission such as the sewer commission may be looked at for liquid waste, she added. However, to form such a commission "Salt Spring Island taxpayers would have to agree because there is a tax implication."

The first mandate of the task force is "to research alternative options for liquid waste management, including continuing with a private septage disposal function, or creating a new island-wide septage disposal or composting function, or amalgamating present sewer functions with a septage management function, in order to create an island-wide waste management function," according to terms of reference approved March 5.

Reviews of present sewer systems in Maliview and Ganges, and research into future systems that may be installed on the island in such locations as Channel Ridge, Fulford Harbour, and Vesuvius Bay, are to be conducted.

Individual sewer systems such as septic tanks, boats and recreational vehicles may be reviewed as well as alternate methods of septic disposal such as composting and

tion will be identified, and different methods of funding such as taxation, user-pay fees and grants will be researched.

Findings are to be communicated to the public on an on-going basis.

Task force members include representatives from the Ganges Sewer Commission, St. Mary Lake Task Force, Island Watch, Maliview Sewer and Beddis Road residents, who may have a septic pit constructed in their neighbourhood.

Members are chairman Neville Smith, Don Stevens, Tom Toynbee, Bob Currie, Peter Drummond, Hart Graham, Bob Potter, John Richardson, and John Sebert, with Christine Bradley as an alternate.

A \$500 grant-in-aid was approved for task force expenses by the CRD February 26.

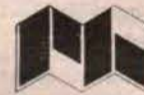

Wants issues clarified

To the Editor,

I want to clarify some issues raised in the March 4 *Driftwood* article on the Trust committee meeting of February 25. In that meeting, trustee John Stepaniuk made a motion to have the Trust accept an application by Norman Twa for rezoning of his Blackburn site for use as a transfer station.

Mr. Twa has been operating his transfer station illegally (according to Trust legal opinion) at this site since the closure of the dump by the ministry of environment.

Mr. Stepaniuk made this motion despite a contrary recommendation by the Advisory Planning Committee (APC), which could not accept the precedent of industrial use in a Watershed zone. Mr. Stepaniuk was also aware that, according to Trust policy, acceptance of the application would mean that Mr. Twa's by-law infraction would not be challenged until the review process was complete and a rezoning decision made.

Trustee Bob Andrew had no choice but to vote against Stepaniuk's motion and chairperson Diane Cragg deferred, thus killing it.

A separate motion was then passed instructing Trust staff to prepare guidelines for the operation of transfer stations on Salt Spring. This is all well and good, although guidelines are already being developed for the proposed Booth site. It should be made clear, however, that such guidelines will apply to any transfer station site regardless of its location. Therefore, they will not, as Mr. Stepaniuk suggests, help the Trust committee determine the best location for these facilities.

Surely Mr. Stepaniuk should be aware as an elected official of a land use planning agency that the first and most important criterion for the siting of any development is the zoning specified in the Official Community Plan.

I am very concerned that trustee Stepaniuk would even consider the possibility of industrial use in a watershed, clearly contradicting the community plan and the recommendation of the Trust's APC. I am even more disturbed that he would attempt to have the Twa proposal accepted knowing full well that it would preclude Trust enforcement of its own by-laws.

Then I went to the cafeteria and saw cash registers not working because of a lack of power. What do the inspectors and shore managers check out before a ferry is made safe and ready? If there is no power in lounges and cafeteria, what about the refrigerators? Does it meet health standards? Is there electricity to the captain's bridge? Does the ship have power for safety equipment? Just how safe is the ferry?

With the ferry accident occurring just that morning because of fog I didn't feel safe when I saw a ferry with no electricity to the lounges and cafeteria. What a joke to see a small adding machine used to take in the money. A small reduction in prices was offered because the cashiers didn't know the prices with GST.

We really can't blame the staff; they tried to offer some sort of service.

Safety is of utmost concern to passengers so why was this ferry not inspected by proper people and the shore catering managers? What do these people do when not in a ivory tower in the offices at Fort Street?

Year after year the same problems go on and on.

Thanks for the lower priced coffee, but safety is my first concern.

Ozone concerns

To the Editor,

It is important that all of us write letters right now to the federal minister of the environment Jean Charest and our M.P., Lynn Hunter, House of Commons, Ottawa K1A-0A6 (no stamp needed) calling for total elimination of CFCs and halons that destroy the ozone layer and immediate end to their production.

Since the discovery of another hole in the ozone by NASA, the United States has said it will phase out production by 1995. Canada has targeted 1997 - "the availability of substitute technology and chemicals is the limiting factor". The alternatives are available - the problem is that these chemicals last for 70 to 100 years, eating the protective stratospheric level and altering our environment in ways we can't even predict.

The holes are increasing; in Australia incidence of skin cancer is way up, in Hawaii they are advising children to wear sunscreen all the time and telling everyone to stay off the beaches between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. The media say "there's no real problem" and the chemical companies lobby for more time.

Researchers in the departments of environment, both federal and provincial, agree CFCs, etc. should be banned but they "do not make policy".

The provincial ministry of environment is concentrating on a recycling program for CFCs and will soon announce programs for

public participation and feedback.

Reports by the standing committee on the environment entitled *Deadly Releases - CFC's and Out of Balance* seem to be ignored by the federal government.

Canada apparently is only responsible for about two per cent of ozone depletion. The U.S. defence department is a major user of Halon 1211 and CFC 113 which are responsible for 13 per cent of ozone depletion. NASA itself deposits 56 tons of chlorine with each launch of a space shuttle into the upper atmosphere. And the B-2 bomber relies on an ozone-depleting fuel additive, according to State of the World '91.

Please write the Canadian ambassador to the United Nations Louise Frechette, c/o UNEP DC 2 0803, United Nations, New York, N.Y. 10017, and ask her to support the resolution calling for total elimination of CFCs and other major halons immediately at the Earth Summit in Brazil this June, (a proposal for a global green constitution is also being put forward).

I have just returned from a trip south where the temperature of the ocean was 78 degrees and around 1,500 whales were spotted in their annual migration to mate and calve in warm waters. The ozone hole was directly above us, and my skin is still tingling, despite all the sunscreen applied.

It is a small, fragile and beautiful ecosphere we live on. We are not helpless, but predictions for our future are very serious. Please write those letters. Thank you.

VICTORIA — Hell has no greater fury than a slighted environmentalist. The ink was barely dry on a column I had written about the Sierra Legal Defence Fund, when the broadsides started hitting.

Letters to me, letters to the editor, phone calls, all of them from extremely irate readers.

To refresh your memory, the column dealt with the grant by the Law Foundation to the Sierra Legal Defence Fund, a grant that is being reviewed right now.

One of the points I made was that the Sierra Club was a well enough funded group and not in need of public money. More about that later. The grant in question comes from interest earned by monies paid into lawyers' trust accounts as, for instance, in real estate transactions.

The first person I heard from was Gregory McDade, executive director of the Sierra Legal Defence Fund. And if you think I am, at times, nasty to people I deal with in my columns, McDade makes me look like a kindly father confessor.

"Slavishly accepted contents"

"It appears that you simply slavishly accepted the contents of the submission of the B.C. Forest Industry Land Use Task Force, an organization which you knew or ought to have known was potentially biased."

Slavish, eh, and biased? As opposed to enlightened comment by columnists who attack the industry, I suppose.

McDade then harangues me for what he calls my "gross mistake of fact," which was to link the Sierra Legal Defence Fund with the Sierra Club.

"Our organization is the Sierra Legal Defence Fund Society, a B.C. incorporated society run by a board of directors and independent of any other organization," McDade says.

"We are not the Sierra Club of Western Canada, nor the U.S. Sierra Club, nor do we have any legal or financial relationship with those organizations."

Well, McDade is perfectly right. There is no "legal or formal" connection between the Sierra Legal Defence Fund and the Sierra Club. I put the above-mentioned terms in quotation marks because they are coming up in numerous letters and phone calls I am getting.

It's such a curious campaign

For some reason, folks all over the province seem to make the same point at the same time. Far be it from me to suggest that this is an organized campaign, but it's curious, nevertheless.

Still, if I erroneously inferred a connection between the Sierra Legal Defence Fund and the Sierra Club, I am hereby setting the record straight. They have no legal or formal connection.

But I might add that given the similarity in objectives and indeed, the similarity in the names of both organizations, it is an error easily made.

McDade also didn't like the fact that I never contacted him before I wrote the column. Well, when I wrote news stories, I religiously got in touch with anyone who might want to comment on a given story, but I am now writing columns.

I had the audacity to write about the Gulf War without actually talking to either President Bush or President Hussein. Columns are opinion pieces, and my opinion was and still is that the Law Foundation was well advised to review its grant to the Sierra Legal Defence Fund.

Don't hold your breath

As for the apology McDade is demanding, I suggest he not hold his breath.

From all this, you might infer that I don't like environmentalists. Not so. McDade's opinion of me as a slavish mouthpiece of the industry notwithstanding, I am a great admirer of the mainstream environmental movement, and I appreciate what they are trying to achieve.

I don't like zealots of any kind, and there is no shortage of them in the environment movement. Happily, they are the minority. Equally happily, I had the pleasure of meeting a very reasonable and no less committed environmentalist the other day.

In the midst of the open season on Beyer, Jim Cooperman dropped into the press gallery. Jim is managing editor of British Columbia Environmental Report, a magazine published by the British Columbia Environmental Network. The organization's membership comprises about 250 environmental groups, churches, native councils, unions and professional organizations.

That's what free speech is all about

No dramatic harangue from Jim. True, he disagrees with me at times, but hell, that's what free speech is all about. He left with me a copy of the magazine. It's first class. No rhetoric. Just good reporting and, yes, columns, which are every bit as opinionated as mine.

OAPO and cinema

We did not preempt the cinema either so no apology is due. It was the owners who cancelled the show without first contacting our president. If this had been done, none of this bally-hoo would have been necessary, nor would the petition have been taken.

The new owners of the theatre do not own the building so anything they wish to do, install or change must be by permission of the Central Hall Committee and likewise for us too.



Comes and Goes store going to move indoors

Evan Waite's Comes and Goes second hand store is moving indoors, as a result of Islands Trust bylaw enforcement proceedings.

Bylaw investigations officer Larry Olafson said he received a complaint about the state of the yard displaying materials for sale at the store on Lower Ganges Road next to Upper Ganges Centre.

Olafson said Waite is operating Comes and Goes as a home occupation and regulations state, "you can't have materials stored out in the open."

Zoning bylaw regulation number eight for home occupations

states: "There shall be no exterior storage of materials, commodities or finished products."

Waite has been moving goods indoors and generally tidying up for the past two weeks, leaving some outdoor masonry item displayed outside.

"I thought I would clean the place up and put a few of the better looking things out front," said Waite after asking islanders via the *Driftwood* to not leave unwanted goods on the property for him to sell.

"I don't want to make a mess out of the place, but you can't do what

I'm doing without it being a bit of a mess."

He said "a lot of people leave stuff here and I have to dispose of it and the best way to do that is to sell it."

"A lot of people feel I'm doing a good service."

Olafson said the real problem with Comes and Goes is that it is operating within the Ganges Development Permit Area without

a development permit.

Terms of business operation like materials display would be outlined in a development permit, he explained. "He could work that out in the permit."

Ferries need better signage for disabled

A ferry accident Thursday involving a B.C. Ferries ship and a deep sea freighter emphasizes the need for improved elevator location signs for the benefit of the disabled, Gulf Islands Association for People with Disabilities coordinator Bill Best said Monday.

Improved signs were promised by B.C. Ferries four years ago, claimed Best, but when travelling on the *Queen of Esquimalt* recently he noticed new signs had yet to be installed.

In the mass confusion that follows an accident like Thursday's "if elevators are not properly marked, how are people going to find them?"

"Most of the major vessels, if not all, are equipped with elevators. It's just a matter of finding the damn things."

"The accident simply points out the need for improved directional signage."

B.C. Ferries was asked to provide overhead elevator signs mounted or suspended above the passenger aisles and write "elevator" in large letters on elevator doors, said Best.

On the *Queen of Esquimalt* "instead of the recommendations we have clearly outlined in the past, the elevator door still carries no other identification than the small (and virtually meaningless) international symbol for no children permitted without parents," said Best in a March 12, 1992 letter to B.C. Ferry Corporation general manager Rod Morrison.

Both the *Queen of Nanaimo* and the *Queen of Tsawwassen*, which serve the Long Harbour to Tsawwassen route, are properly signed, Best said. "That didn't happen by accident. We had to write letter after letter after letter. But it was finally done."

Best is not sure whether other ferries travelling the major Vancouver Island — mainland routes, such as the *Queen of Alberni* which was involved in Thursday's accident, have proper signs or not because he does not travel those routes often.

B.C. Ferries public relations manager Bill Bouchard said he does not know about the lack of signage on the *Queen of Esquimalt*. "If there is something missing we will check it out."

If signs are missing "that should be corrected."

The *Queen of Esquimalt* is currently undergoing a refit, he added.

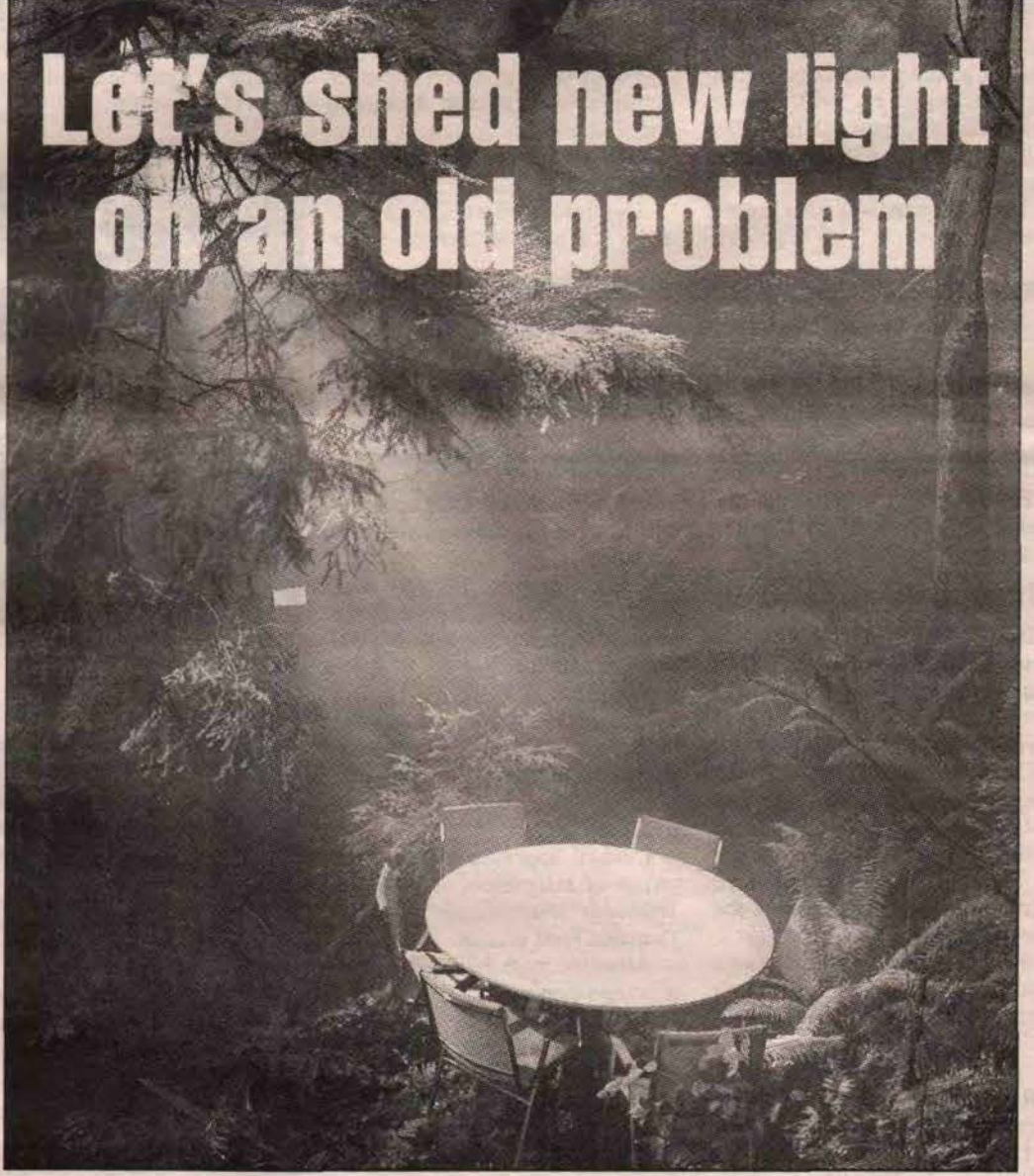

Policy statement needs input

Public input into the Islands Trust policy statement will begin this summer, Trust Council decided March 7.

Trustees approved a process for developing the policy statement which will see public meetings on all major islands and invited input from various government agencies.

Trust council was mandated by the 1990 *Islands Trust Act* to produce a policy statement governing its activities by 1993. The act states that no Trust island bylaw will be approved if it is contrary to the policy statement.

The statement will also present Trust recommendations to govern-

ment agencies whose activities affect the Trust area.

Discussion at the council meeting centred on the best methods to get public involvement in the process of policy development.

Thetis Island trustee John Dunfield said people should have a document in their hands to work with before public meetings are held.

Policy and research manager Cynthia Hawksworth disagreed and said a better document would result if public ideas were gathered first.

Dunfield then suggested staff and a few trustees take some time

to make a rough policy draft to work from.

"We have the talent in hand to sit down and come up with a pretty comprehensive plan," he said. "Otherwise I see the possibility we will not meet that deadline of 1993."

Council voted to approve the plan as laid out by staff and proceed with public meetings this summer, aiming to complete the whole statement in 15 months.

TRUST Briefs

Following are some items discussed at Islands Trust Council held recently at Yellow Point.

Groundwater control

Islands Trust Council members decided to pursue having the Trust area designated "a groundwater control area" by the Ministry of Environment.

Council vice-chairman Diane Cragg explained that while the concept had not been defined in detail by the provincial government, "if the Trust area wants to get some attention in this sense, now is the time to flag it."

Groundwater control areas will be subject to regulations protecting groundwater sources.

OCP updating

Review and update of all Trust island Official Community Plans over the next three years was given high priority by council.

Staff is now working to complete an OCP guidebook for use by

island communities. OCP updating will involve extensive public participation.

Only Denman, Hornby and South Pender islands have adopted new OCPs under the new Islands Trust Act to date.

Provincial funding in the amount of \$100,000 is anticipated in the 1992-93 Trust budget to assist with community plan updating.

Lesser islands

Council approved a policy for review of assignment of so-called Trust area "lesser islands" to one of 13 major Trust islands.

All of the more than 450 sparsely or non-populated islands in the Trust region are "assigned" to the jurisdiction of a local Trust committee on a nearby major island. Any contemplated change of those designations will invite public input from all affected islands and Trust committees and require a report on implications of reassignment.

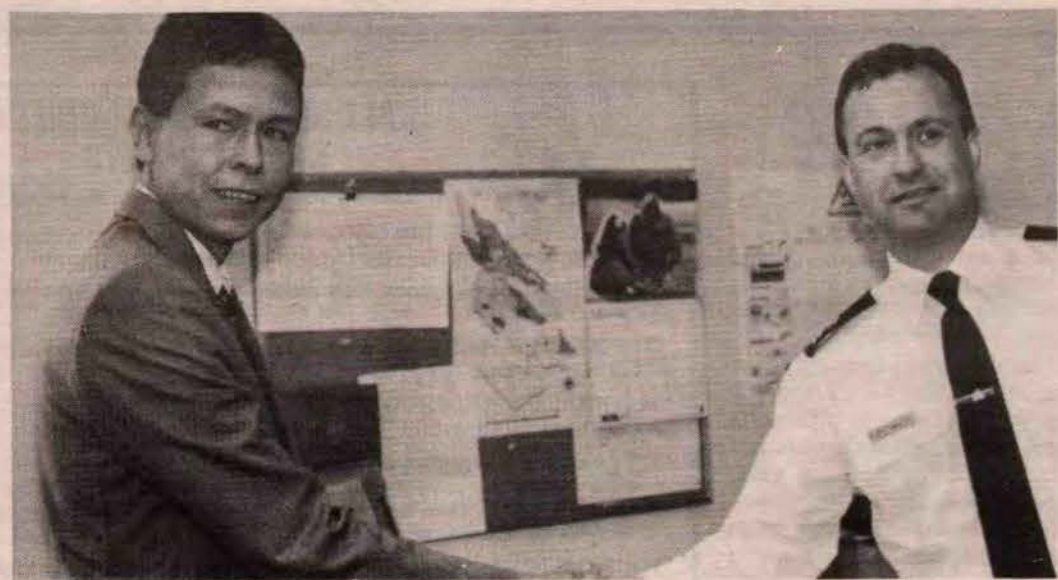

Alcohol given blame for assault

A man convicted in provincial court March 10 of assaulting his wife received a conditional discharge and six months probation.

The discharge was given because Salt Spring Island resident Douglas Chapman did not have any previous assault charges and the case was not of a severe nature, Judge Hudson told the court.

Chapman was given the dis-

charge on the condition he get alcohol and substance abuse counselling because, Crown counsel Anne Wallace said, his problems seem to be drug and alcohol related.

RCMP constable Brian Brack testified he attended a Fernwood Road residence at 3:28 a.m. May 31, 1991. An abandoned 911 call had been received from that

residence, he said.

When he arrived at the residence Brack said he heard an argument between a man and woman in progress. Brack said a woman walked outside to the porch area and Chapman followed her outside.

Brack said Chapman kicked the woman in the buttocks with his foot. She fell to the ground and appeared to be stunned, Brack said.

Chapman was not "falling down drunk" but he was definitely under the influence of alcohol, said Brack, adding the woman was "more upset than anything."

Chapman said the woman slipped going out the door. "I never laid a hand on her and I never kicked her," he said.

Man enters impaired plea

A man who said he rarely drinks and does not like the taste of alcohol pleaded guilty to impaired driving, saying he could not afford the costs involved in fighting the charge.

James Hawkins was travelling south on Fulford-Ganges Road at 1:12 a.m. May 18, 1991 when police witnessed him driving erratically and weaving continuously over the centre line, Crown counsel Anne Wallace told provincial court last week.

Police noticed his speech was slurred and he had trouble standing when performing sobriety tests, she said.

Wallace said Hawkins was celebrating a new job and was driving to get money from a local bank machine when he was stopped by police.

Two breath samples obtained from Hawkins provided blood alcohol readings of 160 milligrams of alcohol in 100 millilitres of blood. The legal limit is 80 milligrams.

Hawkins said he would have pleaded not guilty to the charge but because of "costs involved in fighting it I have to plead guilty."

He was fined \$400 and lost his drivers licence for a year.

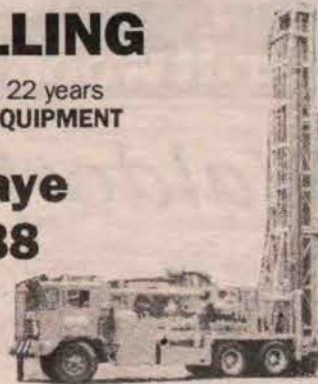

Waldorf holds open house

Visitors were introduced to a colourful learning environment led by teacher Sarnia Guiton at a recent Rudolf Steiner Waldorf school open house.

Elementary level students weave the subjects of art, music, reading, poetry, mathematics, emphasizing quality and creativity.

As Waldorf parent Cynthia Bennett explained, learning takes place in the child's world of the imagination, appealing to their attraction to fables and myths, colours, games and creativity.

One of Meera Bennett's notebooks is a storybook containing her brightly coloured depic-

tions of mythical characters, accompanied by descriptive text. Meera learns to synthesize reading of fables and illustrates them with original artwork.

While encouraging use of children's imaginations, parent Reyanne Kanne notes Waldorf schooling is very structured, contrary to some images of alternative education. "The quality and integrity of teaching is there. It's not an open, free school."

They have made "popsicle people" whose decorated wooden stick bodies become "Princess Multiply" and other helpers teaching mathematical principles.

Colour plays a large part in lessons. Parts of speech are learned by identifying and shadowing them with colour in text copied down by the children.

As Waldorf literature states: "At the elementary level the child is an artist at heart and learns through everything that speaks to his/her imagination in picture and story, colour, rhythm and movement."

Games, rhymes and singing are other fun learning tools supporting the Waldorf premise that, "a vigorous life of imagination and creative play in the early years provides the basis for physical well being, enthusiastic learning, intellectual growth and self-esteem."

Kanne chose a Waldorf education for her two children aged nine and six for several reasons. They had been previously home schooled and the Waldorf approach seemed closest to providing a home setting, she said. "I feel we push our children out into society too quickly," said Kanne, adding that home schooling "made us stronger as a family so we can go out in the world and cope with anything."

Kanne also notes her daughter resisted reading for quite a while, but since attending Rudolf Steiner School "she reads with such understanding and so much. Her own world in a month has opened up."

Kanne also said she likes "the individual instruction they receive, and I appreciate that everything they use is from the earth -- all natural materials."

The first Waldorf school was established in Germany by Rudolf Steiner in 1919 and the movement has grown to include 500 schools throughout the world.

The school currently operates from a home on Harrison Avenue but would prefer a location closer to Ganges village, said Bennett.

Kids require concrete plan when reacting to violence

Since a violent assault at a Weston Lake cabin and another south end break-in, Salt Spring Island parents have had to think about how to help their children deal with their fears, feelings of vulnerability and their sense of loss of safety.

We would like to share with them several methods in meeting some key emotional needs of children affected by this recent trauma in our community.

- Take care of your own emotions as a parent. Acknowledge and talk about your own fear, anger and sadness with another adult. Do not deny, avoid or stuff your own feelings, or you will likely find that your children will become the receptacles for them.

- Avoid putting your children in the parental role: express the intensity of your feelings to other adults and maintain calmness with your children.

- Encourage your children to talk about their feelings. Do not minimize or negate their fears by telling them that there is nothing to worry about or by telling them not to be afraid, even if you see their fears as unrealistic, exaggerated or imagined. Encourage them to talk in detail about their real or imagined fears and listen in an active way but without interruption, censorship, judgment or argument.

- Recognize that this is a time when your children will have more of a need for control, more of a need to feel powerful, more of a need to release their tension, fear and anxiety.

If they are crying, shaking or raging for any reason, support them by staying with them and telling them they are doing a good job at getting their feelings out. They may need to be held at this time but respect their need to have more space if they ask for it.

Do not punish them for changes in behaviour or for temper tantrums or for increased demands for your attention but rather encourage them to talk about what is bothering them.

- Give your children concrete information about "what we are going to do if a scary man comes to our house." Answer all of your children's questions with a concrete plan. Your children need to know that you have thought about this and that you have some concrete ideas for how you would address the situation. Children in crisis need to know in concrete terms exactly what you are going to do to protect both yourself and them.

In spite of how comforting religious, metaphysical or spiritual solutions may be for some adults during times of crisis, it is not advisable to substitute such abstract solutions for concrete reassurances to fearful children. Pre-adolescent children think in concrete terms at this stage of their cognitive development.

Although praying for disturbed people may be an important part of your own spiritual practice, it is not advisable to substitute it for concrete reassurances to fearful children.

It is both appropriate and normal for your children to feel the full range of emotions, especially fear, anger and sadness and to need repeated reassurances following an event of unexpected loss of safety. Rehearsing your emergency plan will reassure your children.

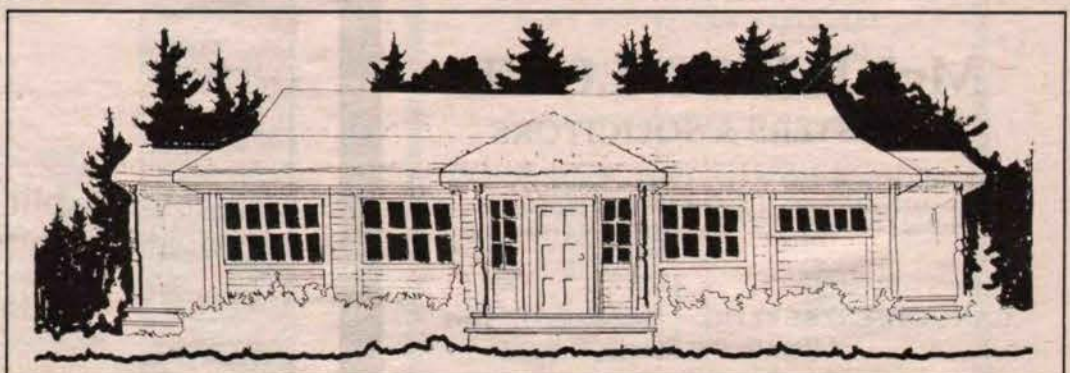

Waste challenge starts Friday

Organizer looking for 20 per cent reduction in one month

An island-wide challenge to reduce Salt Spring's waste stream by 20 per cent kicks off this Friday.

A Salt Spring Island Community Society project spearheaded by Sheila Harrington, Islands Earth Day Challenge '92 is asking schools, businesses and families to set up systems that will reduce their garbage at least 20 per cent by Earth Day, April 22.

Harrington has been working with schools since January to get new systems ready to roll when students return from spring break

March 23.

Each school has a recycling committee which made a school-specific plan for reducing waste. Harrington notes Fernwood Elementary's committee estimates it can eliminate 95 per cent of its waste.

All elementary schools will have a major collection area, where classroom waste will be brought by students.

Several classrooms will be receiving "red wiggler worm composters" with additional education-

al benefits.

Island families will be encouraged to accept the challenge through information and pledge sheets sent home with students. Harrington and SSCS executive director Barbara Jordan-Knox add that making "a garbage-free lunch" is a strong campaign thrust aimed at parents.

With the Earth Day Challenge fresh in their minds, "students are in the mood to talk to their parents," says Harrington.

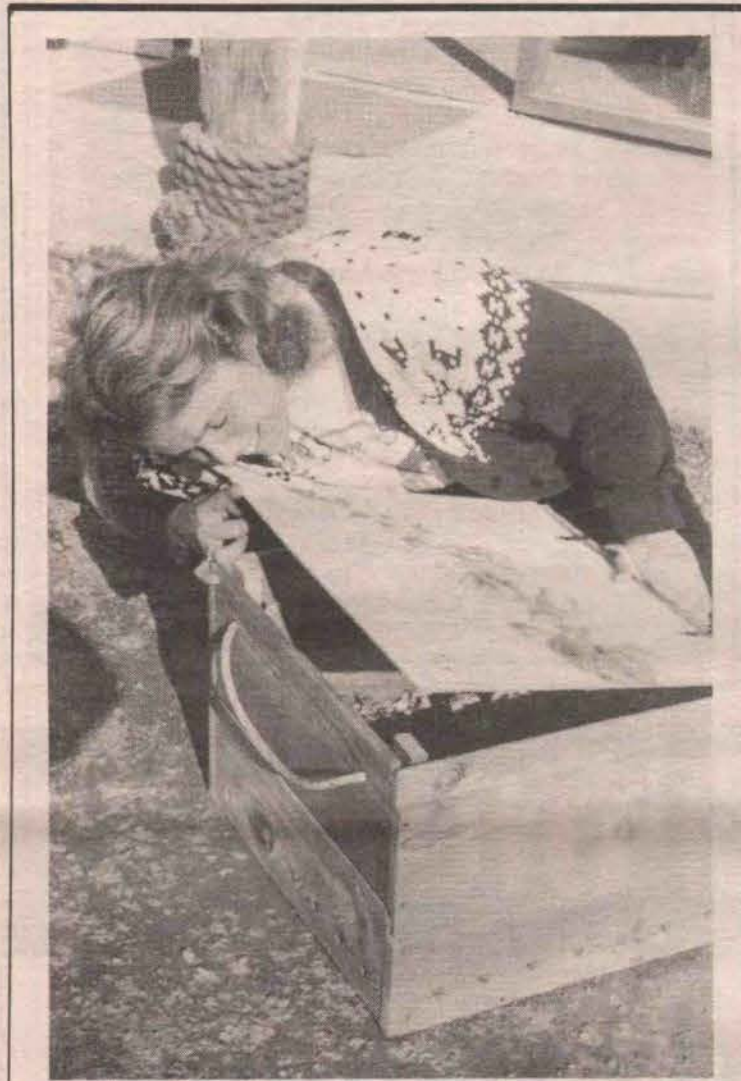
Four creative contests offering cash prizes are planned for children with information distributed through all island schools.

More than 450 island businesses have also been contacted and asked to participate in the program. Those who register their intent to reduce waste will receive a poster and buttons indicating their support.

She also reminds people they can not only reduce the amount of waste going to landfills but can be environmentally responsible by not buying toxic household cleaners.

"If every business did that it would tremendously cut down on the number of toxic materials and if each home did, it would be incredible," says Jordan-Knox. For more information on Islands Earth Day Challenge '92, Harrington may be contacted at the Community Centre 537-9971.

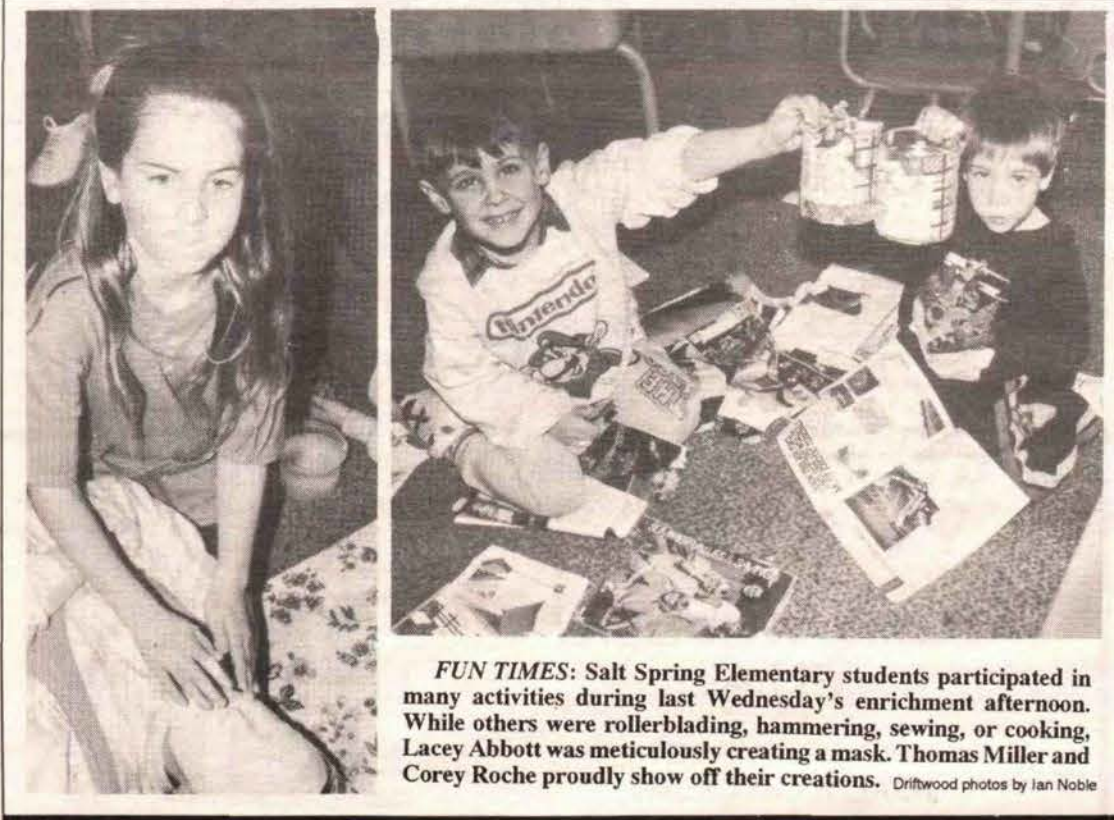

Cat found caught in leghold trap alarms SPCA

Finding a cat caught in a leghold trap near Greenwood's Intermediate Care Facility last Tuesday has alarmed Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals representatives.

SPCA Inspector Christine Wooldridge reminds people trap use is strictly regulated in licensed areas only "and it is certainly illegal to set traps in that area."

Greenwood's staff reported seeing the cat March 9, with the leghold trap on a front leg, dragging about five feet of chain and wire along with it.

Wooldridge had a brief look at it then and returned the next day with help to catch the animal.

SPCA inspector Kellie Booth, Colin Nicholson, Derek and Susan Duffy, Paul Harsey and Teddy

Aves all worked to rescue the cat, to the extent of removing floor boards from a building where the cat was hiding under a crawl space.

"We saw a hole in the floor, pulled up the boards and were able to get the cat out."

Wooldridge said the older, male unneutered dark tabby "had multiple fractures on its front leg where the trap had been, plus infection in

the foot." It was examined and subsequently euthanized at Gulf Islands Veterinary Clinic.

She said the cat likely suffered terrible pain for at least 24 hours.

If the person who set the trap was hoping to catch one of the several rabbits living near Greenwood's, Wooldridge comments "there are other humane ways of keeping populations down. This is

not a humane way to catch any animal."

A reward has been offered for information leading to the apprehension of the person(s) responsible for setting the trap. Anyone with information regarding this matter is asked to call either the RCMP or the SPCA.

Doggydoo unwelcome

One of the people who maintains Ganges village landscaped areas is making a request to resident and visiting dog owners — please don't let pets do their business in his works of art.

Harold Repen looks after several spots downtown planted with various shrubs in bark mulch.

Not only does he have to deal with dog excrement on the plants and mulch but "everyday I go there and find new branches broken off."

Many of the plants used, like rhododendrons, are brittle, he says, and can be easily broken when leashes catch on them.

Dog excrement and urine itself causes "burn damage and dead spots on junipers and other little shrubs," says Repen. Those plants must be replaced, "which adds to the cost of maintenance and that's a cost that is being passed onto the customer" through rents paid by Ganges merchants.

"People think it is only their dog and they don't realize that half an hour later it's another dog and then another dog and another."

Repen estimates maintenance costs are increased by about 50 per cent due to damage from dogs.

He says if people are made aware of the problems it causes, they may not use village landscaping for canine toilet facilities.

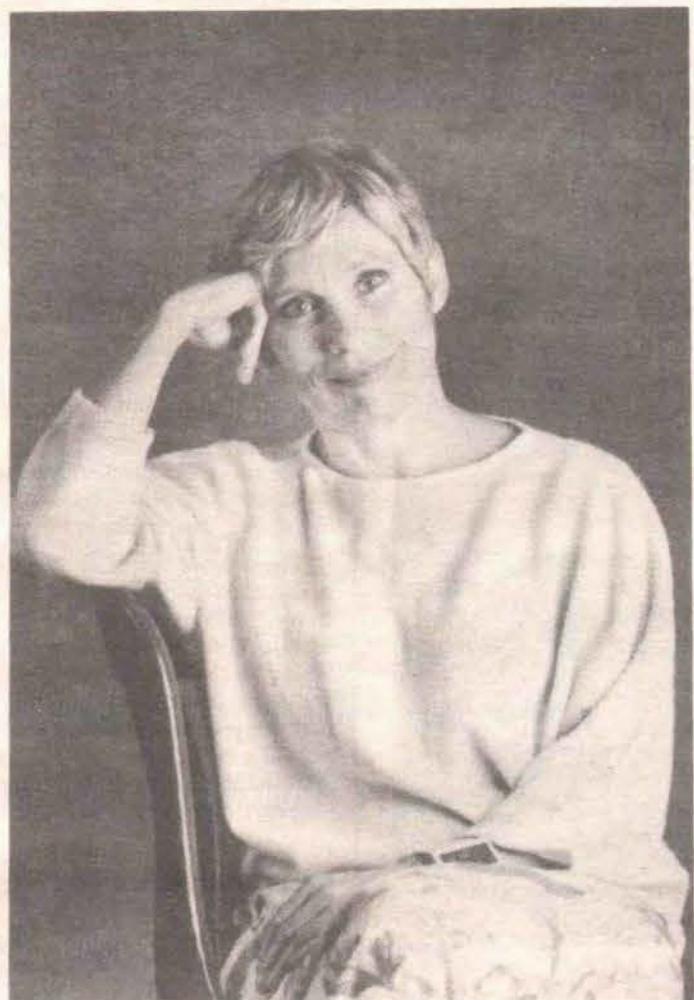

Touch workshop next week

Hall group changes bylaws

Changes to Central Hall Community Society bylaws have been approved by the Registrar of Companies in time for its annual general meeting March 22.

Current CHCS president John

Volc said last week a desire to make the organization more open to Salt Spring residents was the reason changes were made.

"They were basically made to give the interested public more ac-

cessibility."

Length of CHCS board of directors' positions has been changed and in most cases reduced. President, vice-president and secretary-treasurer terms will now be for two years only. The latter position may also now be split into two, with one person acting as secretary and the other as treasurer.

Directors' terms will result in staggering of appointments. One will serve for three years, one for two and three for one year each.

The president and treasurer positions are up for re-election at the March 22 meeting.

Another bylaw change sees proxy votes now accepted in writing if presented to the chairman before a meeting.

Old Age Pensioners' Organization privileges have also been written into the bylaws, said Volc.

Article 13 states that: "The OAPO shall have use of the hall on the second Wednesday and fourth Thursday of each month and the first Saturday in November. The lower hall is for the exclusive use of the OAPO. There is no rental fee for the above uses of the hall."

CHCS membership has also been defined, explained Volc. An individual becomes a member by submitting an application and paying a one-time-only, non-refundable \$2 registration fee.

Members must have attended at least one meeting within the previous year in order to become a voting member.

"We are hoping for a good turnout for the annual meeting," said Volc. "We especially invite any person connected with any organization in the area to stand for a director's position to represent their organization."

Registration starts at 1:30 p.m. this Sunday, at Central Hall, with the meeting set for 2 p.m.

Starting early has given Guns extra experience over other riders. "I learned how to crash at an early age. No broken bones — yet."

Guns practices 11 hours a week and keeps riding because the sport allows him to compete with himself as well as others. "I love it. It's a part of me."

• An eight-mile Lions walkathon course was completed first by Bill Arnold in a time of 51 minutes. He was followed by 19-year-old Arthur Buitenwerf in second place and Jim Talman running third.
