Ganges seawalk now complete

Ganges seawalk is now complete.

Community vandals, who asked to remain anonymous, called the *Driftwood* this morning claiming responsibility for completing the seawalk which had been a source of embarrassment for many islanders.

Part of a linear park development proposed for the village area, the seawalk ran into difficulties when some upland property owners refused to allow construction of portions across their land. The upland owners in question have unresolved conflicts with the seawalk itself and other unrelated issues.

"We just got sick and tired of seeing that seawalk sitting there unfinished," the vandal told the *Driftwood*, "and we're tired of living in a community where no one can ever make a decision. So we made the decision."

Work to complete the seawalk took place during darkness, just as much of the original construction did more than two years ago.

"Unfortunately, we had to steal the material from a local construction site. But we hope the owner just considers it another community donation. They are always being asked to give to this and that, so this is just another donation, even though there was no choice in this one. Besides, he can write it off can't he?"

Vandals are tired of getting blamed for all the damage and negative things that happen on Salt Spring. His partner agreed with him. "We're tired of getting a bum rap, you know," she said. "It gets tedious. We are anxious to hear what is said about us now."

One person who is saying something is Chamber of Commerce president Sherry Irwin who had been working hard to get this project which she inherited from previous chamber boards finished.

"I have to tell you I am delighted with the situation. Sometimes you can talk until you are blue in the face and nothing ever gets done.

Here we have some community-minded citizens taking the bull by the horns and just doing it. They must wear Nike shoes. That's the company slogan now; *Just Do It.*"

Irwin said this may be the start of a new approach for Salt Spring. Instead of talking about things for weeks, months, and years, people will just do what has to be done and then worry about it later.

"Consensus has its place to a point but it can be overdone," she added.

Walking on the completed

seawalk this morning, visitors Shirley and Dick Morton from Seattle said it was delightful to walk along the harbour, listening to the sea gulls. "Last time we were here, we tried this but came to an abrupt drop off. I must say it was alarming. Now it is a lovely stroll in a beautiful seaside hamlet. You all must be very proud of this feature of your community."

A government grant will now be requested to examine the impact of the seawalk on humans, sea creatures and land animals.

New regional district set for Gulf Islands

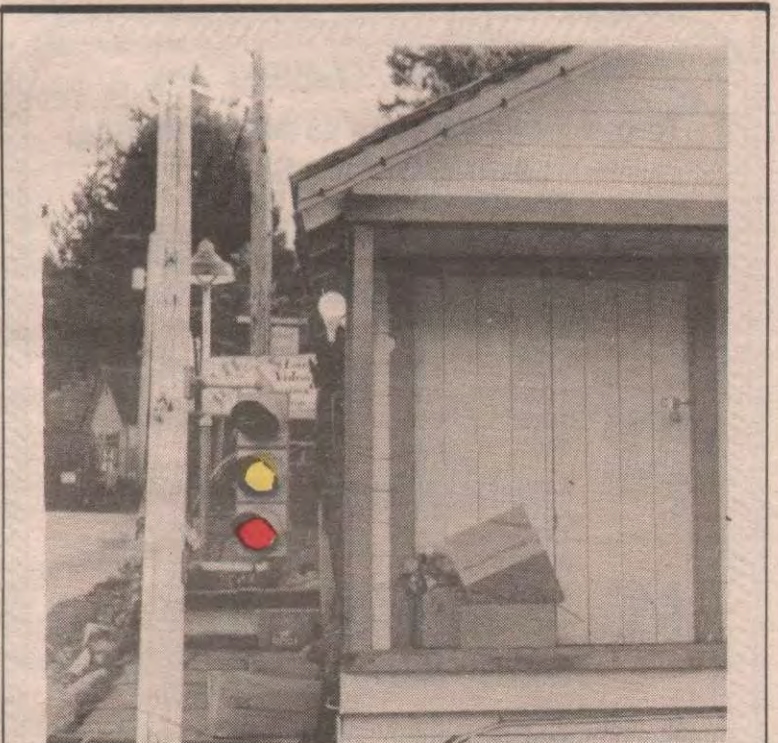
It is official. Salt Spring and the other Gulf Islands will become their own regional district as soon as an office is opened in Ganges, which could be as early as September of 1992.

"A Gulf Islands Regional District only makes sense," said Ed Smith of the municipal affairs ministry. "The Gulf Islands have unique attributes and concerns, and

need more power to make local decisions."

Local Islands Trust trustees liked the idea. By having regional district employees and directors on the islands, decisions should be made quicker and with more understanding for the islands, trustees stated in a press release dated April 1, 1992.

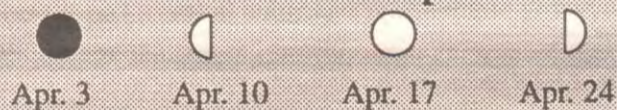

being islanders themselves, will have a better grasp of the island's political life, they added.

Regional district committees and commissions also applauded the idea. The Parks and Recreation Commission said that to have the regional district office in Ganges would be a benefit and contribute to the commission's efficiency.

For example, commission members could carry the new agreement between the market vendors and PRC to the regional district's lawyers in Ganges to be approved, instead of spending \$8.27 "of already overburdened taxpayer's money" to courier the agreement to Victoria.

Under the new plan, each island will have one regional director for every 1,000 people permanently residing on the island. That means islands such as Galiano, with a population of 800, will receive one director. Salt Spring, with 7,500 residents, receives eight.

Some Outer Gulf Island residents are worried that Salt Spring, with its large number of directors, will dominate the district's decision making process. "We'll be watching them," said Galiano resident Sue Jackson.

"Don't try to pull any fast ones," she warned future Salt Spring directors.

The futures of the current Salt Spring and Outer Islands CRD directors are not yet known. Some have suggested they be given directorships on the Gulf Islands Regional District board in an effort to take advantage of their experience gained at the CRD.

Others are not so sure.

Many Salt Spring dilemmas should receive a "boost" when the board is organized, say proponents of the new regional district.

The sewer expansion or non-expansion should garner more attention as it requires both regional district and Islands Trust participation, as does the problem of sewage and septic tank waste disposal, they said.

Significantly, Salt Spring residents will once again be responsible for their own garbage disposal as the CRD's Hartland Landfill is for "Capital Regional District refuse only," said the CRD board chairman.

One suggestion has been to use the northern half of Prevost Island as a dump site for all Gulf Islands. New directors, who will be elected August 30, will tackle that issue when the time comes.

Luth again in midst of lions

Islander slings carcass on T-Bird roof and hauls it away

Even without his big white truck on the road, Dietrich Luth can still keep island beaches free of rotting sea lion corpses.

"It fits on a Thunderbird," quipped Luth Monday, displaying a relatively odour-free dead sea lion on top of his blue Ford.

Luth received news that the corpse was on Bader's Beach on Sunday afternoon. It was only 50 feet off the high water mark close to the boat ramp, so he was able to tow it up to the road with his car.

After finding a home for the corpse with the Sidney Museum Monday morning he fetched a forklift to load the estimated 1,000 pound animal on top of the car where it was secured with rope and cable.

"This one has a happy ending," he said. "They are going to dissect it and save the skeleton."

Last year a dead sea lion found on Vesuvius

Beach had to be dumped in the ocean.

The Bader's Beach sea lion could not have been dead for long, he said, because it was in such good shape and did not smell.

The local highways department was contacted by an area resident who saw the animal wrapped in a cable on the road near the beach early Monday morning while walking her dog.

The *Driftwood* also received a report Monday from Pierre Menard of a dead sea lion and what appeared to be a seal at Burgoyne Bay.

"I was concerned to find them both at once," he said.

Menard contacted the protection services branch of Fisheries and Oceans in Victoria. Staff there told him they would pass the information onto their Duncan office.

Hospital strike imminent

A strike can happen at any time at Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital.

Union members do not want to strike but "at the same time we do want a better contract," Hospital Employees Union spokeswoman Simard said yesterday (Tuesday). "We have to let them know we really mean it. We are in solidarity."

Yesterday, Lady Minto's HEU employees held a "study session" to "ask questions and clear the air", then went back to work, Simard said.

HEU communications director Geoff Meggs said job action could entail a day of study sessions, sit-ins and bans on overtime. "There is a wide range of options union members can take."

"A province-wide strike is a last

resort," he said.

Lady Minto administrator Vicki Curtis said there is no difference between job action and a strike. Job action is an "unknown entity" and "we will have to adjust as circumstances arise."

If the union goes ahead with job action Lady Minto will provide emergency services. "If a person requires immediate emergency care we would provide that," she said.

"We would maintain our acute care component with arrangements for early discharge of as many patients as possible."

All extended care residents will be maintained and family members and friends of patients may visit and assist their relatives as they normally would, said Curtis.

HEU members voted 78 percent

to reject the latest contract offer from the Health Labour Relations Association (HLRA). Mediator Stephen Kelleher has suspended talks because the two sides remain far apart, said an HEU press release dated March 29.

HLRA president Gordon Austin said "we are still miles apart."

Turn clocks ahead Sunday

Looking at the whole

To the Editor,
Water districts on Salt Spring Island are not only dependent on lake water, some rely on well water and so do a lot of private homes.

The issue of locating a transfer station in a watershed area has raised some concerns.

My point is that if the facility is to be built it must meet the highest environmental, social and health standards, no matter where it is situated.

Islands Trust does not have a zoning for transfer stations. I contend that any area to be either zoned or designated for that use should be clearly defined and accompanied by guidelines, so that those who wish to apply would have a clear knowledge of what to expect. No doubt that as the island grows it will require more than one transfer station.

I am opposed to arbitrary decisions and I do respect due process. In the case of Norm Twa's application, after more than 26 years of service to the island, backed with experience in handling refuse, I believe that his application for a transfer station merits public input and discussion. The proposal for Rainbow Road that was received and endorsed, so far has not lived up to its initial submission.

With respect to the Advisory

Planning Commission's vote, neither the Trust nor the other agencies supplied them with the necessary information to base their land use decision on. Had the definition for a transfer station been in place prior to approving the resource recovery station on Rainbow Road, the vote could have been different.

Many people are frustrated because their environmental and social concerns are not always translated into policy on specific issues, but collectively decisions are based on sound environmental judgement and social needs, and the fact that we live on an island.

Such decisions must always take into consideration the island as a whole, and consensus among the residents.

VICTORIA — It could only happen in British Columbia — a left-wing government bringing down a right-wing budget.

If you strip Finance Minister Glen Clark's budget speech of its rhetoric and political clap-trap, you're left with a budget that would make any self-respecting Tory proud.

Consider the irony of Clark's announcement that the government will use \$100 million from the Privatization Benefits Fund for investments in business enterprises, including venture capital. The Socreds had planned to use that money for a pension fund for homemakers.

I'm not doubting the merits of using part of the privatization proceeds for venture capital creation, but it is an interesting reversal of roles.

Mind you, there isn't even the faintest hint of eliminating the deficit. The closest Clark comes to dealing with the deficit is to make it smaller than last year's.

The NDP government's first budget calls for expenditures of \$17.98 billion. Revenues are estimated at \$16.19 billion, leaving a projected shortfall of \$1.79 billion.

Clark says that's "far below the \$2.8 billion deficit forecast by the independent financial review." True, but it's still a deficit, and not a small one.

Apart from that, the budget is about as left-wing a fiscal document as the Fraser Institute newsletters, and in keeping with the reaction from a hard-nosed U.S. banking executive to Premier Harcourt's recent speech in New York. Any Republican, he said, could have held that speech.

No new taxes

And what was it Harcourt said during the election campaign? No new taxes. Hey, he didn't say no tax increases, and there's a few whoppers in the budget.

The personal income tax rate will go up by one percentage point. The surtax rate will be increased and kick in at the \$60,000 income level. These two measures will generate additional revenues of about \$147 million.

The corporate income tax rate will be increased by one percentage point, putting an additional \$268 million into provincial coffers.

The supplementary home owner grant will be eliminated, while the basic grant will be increased by \$20 to \$450. The net effect could be an increase in property taxes of between \$100 and \$200 a year.

Liquor stores will mark up their prices to squeeze an additional \$50 million out of consumers.

Last on Clark's list of tax grabs are fees, licences and fines, a number of which will be increased during the fiscal year. Like I said, it's a very conservative budget. The revenue measures are traditional and bland.

In fairness, however, it should be mentioned that the new government really didn't have enough time to come up with what the NDP has always referred to as "innovative tax measures."

Modicum of pay equity

Conspicuously absent from the budget are any major programs that would have appealed to traditional NDP supporters. Aside from \$61 million earmarked for achieving a modicum of pay equity in the public sector and wage parity for lowest-paid public employees, there is nothing in the budget.

There isn't a penny set aside for the implementation of access to information legislation, a major plank in the last NDP election platform.

On the plus side, the government is off to a good start in cutting down waste. The Cloverdale transportation museum, pet project of former premier Rita Johnston and former Socred MLA Bill Reid, will be closed down.

There will be a one-year freeze on the salaries and allowances of all cabinet ministers and MLAs.

New bidding procedures and other changes in the Purchasing Commission are expected to save about \$5 million a year.

Finally, a little more about deficits. This year's shortfall doesn't tell even half the story. By the end of this year, British Columbia's total deficit will be about \$23 billion.

That figure is made up of direct government deficits, including the projected one for this fiscal year, as well as outstanding Crown corporation debts. Some of those corporations, like B.C. Hydro, are self-financing. Government isn't.

Costly debt

The part of the total deficit created by shortfalls in the government's day-to-day operations, now stands at \$6.5 billion. To appreciate the need for reducing that deficit, keep in mind that financing \$6.5 billion at seven per cent interest is costing taxpayers close to half a billion dollars a year.

Discretionary funds may go to sewer plan

Salt Spring Island Trust Committee discretionary funds may go toward the Ganges sewer action plan if the Islands Trust budget is approved by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

Trustee John Stepaniuk told the *Driftwood* Monday the discretionary funds will be used for Salt Spring projects specifically and are allocated to projects by the island's trust committee.

"There is a general consensus and agreement we should have a better understanding of the sewer

Commission anxious to take action if Trust approves

action plan and participate in a way," he said.

"We don't know where we stand exactly but are hopeful the present budget will be adopted."

Stepaniuk said a decision on whether to approve the budget will be made by municipal affairs sometime in May. "It could happen sooner but we were told not to expect anything until about May."

The first part of the action plan

calls for a study into the sewer's requirements for the next 10 and 20 year periods, which requires a review of the Official Community Plan by the Islands Trust.

"We can't really proceed with this until the Trust can," said Capital Regional District director Julia Atkins at a recent Ganges Sewer Committee meeting.

At the same meeting, the Ganges Sewer Committee decided to

request that the CRD board make \$170,000 available for the entire action plan, which includes establishing receiving water and effluent discharge standards, and determining capital improvements to the system required to meet these standards at present and in the future.

"They did not approve the expenditure of the funds, just that the funds be made available," CRD en-

gineering operations manager Jim McFarland told the *Driftwood*.

Higher than anticipated interest rates on a fund for servicing the debt of the Ganges sewer plant has resulted in a surplus that can be used to pay for the action plan, said a CRD engineering staff report dated January 21, 1992.

The CRD board received more interest than expected when the fund was set up, said McFarland.

"We are anxious to get on with this project," said committee chairman Tom Toynbee.

Centre remains closed; youth ponder its future

Salt Spring's youth centre will remain closed for now, pending more involvement by island youth to strengthen its base.

Young people attending an open community meeting at the centre Friday night recommended the facility not re-open until it was "100 per cent" ready to run with a wider representation from youth groups.

Perhaps by the time Jean Davis' grade three class members are old enough to use the centre, needed transformations will have taken place.

Centre coordinator Kathleen Towne received a letter from Davis' class last week. In it they wrote: "Please hang in there because we want that place when we grow up. We won't wreck it, we'll treasure it."

An initial meeting called by interested youth took place last night, after *Driftwood* went to press.

At Friday's meeting it was

agreed a committee of mainly young people should spearhead centre programming and policy formation with input from their peers and invited concerned adults.

About 50 students, centre volunteers, staff and community members met at the centre Friday to recap and analyze events to date, and discuss ways to avoid problems like those that occurred March 18.

Community Society youth worker Wendy Fields said the meeting was called to get dialogue going with the youth, see what changes might need to be made and figure out how to make the centre a safer place for everyone.

Towne said "we want to have a place where youth and adults feel safe, where anybody can come in and feel safe in this place." A brainstorming session drew many ideas. Having more volunteers on duty for busy nights, on-call back-up volunteers, providing more training in how to diffuse conflict situations and having youth set rules and enforcement policies were some ideas put forward.

Grade 12 Gulf Islands Secondary School student Dave Marshall

stressed the need to get youth from all "cliques" — including those that often cause problems — involved in running the centre.

He said the community had to help find ways for some youth to burn off energy and anger. "I think we have to find out what these people want."

Marshall put forth the concept of a youth committee with members appointed from various groups of teens, requiring a serious commitment from all involved.

"I think it is something that needs to be set up and I think a lot of the problems would be solved after that is done."

Parks and Recreation Commission administrator Tony Hume agreed with Marshall that the centre's impetus had to come from youths themselves. He said other communities have formed successful youth councils with representatives from different groups and support from adults.

"It is very difficult for adults to do programming for youth," said Hume. If kids do it themselves, "a calendar of events will start unfolding before your eyes."

Centre volunteer Alex Turkington said a youth-driven centre was always the "vision" but everyone involved in getting the facility open was simply "burnt out."

Many people agreed with Turkington that more help is needed from youth and the general community to make that vision happen.

Towne told the *Driftwood* Monday the current period of evaluation while the centre is closed is "a great opportunity for the rest of the community to get more involved" in its growth.

"We need to lay a firmer ground with more support from the community," she explained. Volunteers able to offer any kind of commitment — especially as back-up support on busy nights — are needed.

She said achieving an ideal centre "is a long-term thing. We aren't going to just start up and solve all of the inter-generational issues that have been going on in this culture for the last 100 years."

"We need lots of dialogue and education about how to talk to each other and how to work with each other."

The next open community meeting takes place Friday night at 6:30 p.m. at the youth centre. All concerned people are welcome to attend.

Towne said she or a centre volunteer is also available to speak to community groups. She may be contacted at the Community Centre at 537-9971.

Tanner pans budget for being backward

New Democrats "have got it backwards," Liberal MLA Clive Tanner commented about the provincial budget brought down last Thursday.

Instead of spending money in the areas of health services, education and social services, they should be spending in areas such as mining, forestry and tourism.

"If we don't invest in those, we won't have money to spend on others."

As tourism critic, Tanner panned the provincial budget for taking money out of highways and reducing tourism dollars. By failing to invest in infrastructure and roads, tourism will be hurt and small businesses will have more difficulty making a profit, he said.

The NDP have "done the popular thing. It is a cop-out."

Errors concern politicians

Inaccuracies found in government options study info

Elected Islands Trust and Capital Regional District officials will send a letter to the Salt Spring Islands Local Government Options Study committee expressing concern about accuracy of information presented at a public meeting March 26.

Errors were contained in a report entitled *A Guide to Local Government Services on Salt Spring Island - An Overview* presented by study chairman Bill

Lane, Islands Trust trustee Bob Andrew said at a joint meeting Monday between Salt Spring trustees and CRD director Julia Atkins.

Andrew, who attended the study's public meeting, said Lane indicated Portland and Moresby islands are under Salt Spring jurisdiction "which they are not" and that Advisory Planning Commission members were elected.

"His knowledge of the APC was in error to say the least," Andrew told the *Driftwood*. "They are small problems but indicative of not going to the right sources for information — namely the local sources."

Atkins said she is "disappointed" mistakes were contained in the report and she hopes in future study consultants will consult with local agencies.

"The public loses confidence in them and in the process when the inaccuracies are that blatant," she said.

Lane told the *Driftwood* Monday he received APC information from a handout in the Islands Trust

Grace Point office. He said the report stated the APC "may be elected. In fact this particular one is appointed."

He added that the report "should have gone on and said" the APC is not elected.

Material in the report was intended for discussion at the March 26 meeting. He said the report is a "useful first step in spotlighting what local government is on the island."

Lane said the study meeting was to confirm what the issues on Salt Spring are. "Armed with the issues I will go to the people in the CRD and Islands Trust. There will be a lot more interviews after we have confirmed what the issues are."

The March 26 meeting highlighted the importance of the federal government in local politics and the role of volunteers on the island, said Lane. The next local government meeting will be in May.

"At that point I hope to have sketched out some of the options," Lane said.

Lottery gives seniors \$10,000

Seniors for Seniors has received \$10,000 from B.C. Lotteries for a new seniors centre on Greenwoods intermediate care facility land.

Reg Reid, director with the Seniors Lottery of British Columbia, said the \$10,000 grant was the most the lottery is able to award to a project.

"The board was very impressed by this project and gave the maximum amount to Seniors for Seniors."

He said that more than 800 island seniors will be served by the project and the senior's organization volunteers. Seventy percent of those benefitting from the project will be more than age 65 which is important because that shows "seniors helping seniors is the case here."

Total cost of the new building is estimated to be \$127,000, he said. Reid added all projects funded by the B.C. Seniors Lottery are seniors projects.

Seniors for Seniors president Dan Davies said "with some reserve funds I think it is pretty well

assured we will be able to go ahead with the building."

Along with the \$10,000 from lotteries, the organization has received approval for a windfall grant of \$60,000 from the Capital Regional District and \$500 from Islands Savings Credit Union.

Wrigglies invade schools

Salt Spring schools and businesses are rising to the challenge to reduce solid waste in simple and novel ways.

Part of Islands Earth Day Challenge '92 increased Salt Spring Elementary's population by 12,000 bodies last Thursday — the slimy bodies of 12,000 red wiggler worms.

Worms and seven composters were delivered to the school from Vancouver by schools superintendent Mike Marshall. Students Chris Langdon and Willy Egeland shredded paper, collected soil and deposited the worms and leaves into the new wooden composters with help from secretary Yvonne Fee and challenge project coordinator Sheila Harrington.

Composters and worms were also delivered to Gulf Islands Secondary School and Fulford Elementary School. An outdoor composting system is being set up at Fernwood Elementary and will support the school's *Grow With It* greenhouse project.

Marshall said he believes Gulf Islands schools have more worms working for them than any other. "From all of the worm districts, we are the champion."

He said worms have been the subject of language arts and science projects in other districts. One class created a song called *Pretty Worman*.

"Teachers have been really great in working with the kids," said Marshall.

All schools "have seen quite a decline in the amount of reusable, recyclable materials," he added.

Wood explained that the Arcott was created to have great reproductive potential. Although "Arcott" rings slightly of the British Isles, its name is derived from its real birthplace — the Agricultural Research Centre of Ottawa.

"The sheep looks exactly like it was designed by a committee," says Wood. "It looks like a camel." "Its only useful trait is that it has a lot of lambs."

This is Wood's first year of raising sheep.

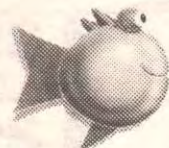

New art gallery opens

Another art gallery has opened in Ganges. Jennifer Rosling and Matt Steffich, with help from Gary Thurber, open Thunderbird Gallery today, April 1, in the new phase of Grace Point Square. Thunderbird's focus is high quality Native art, balanced by a variety of other work with an indigenous West Coast feel. The current collection includes pieces by high profile artists like Kwa-guilth artist Stan Hunt and Don Peters of the Ontario Saulteaux tribe. Original and vibrantly-coloured watercolours of Norval Morrisseau — who Rosling says

was "one of the first Native artists who really made an impact" — are also represented, along with several exhilarating newcomers. Native pieces include silver jewellery, painted pots, original paintings, prints, cards, masks and drums. Local artists represented include Thurber, Gwen Butcher, Gloria O'Hara, Robin Haworth and Judy Borbas. Well-known sculptor Thurber, who has worked for 25 years as an artist and in the gallery business, brings his knowledge of contemporary art to the gallery. Rosling describes Native

legends as "really the driving force behind all of the art they do." It is those mystical stories which have fed love of Native art. She has spent the last year learning about Native art, while Steffich has had a 20-year involvement. Rosling says both have learned a great deal from Salt Spring writer Reg Ashwell and "once you start learning about something, you want to learn even more." Public education in all Native art is important, she says and the gallery hopes to offer space for guest speakers and artists to share insights and knowledge. A Grade Four class is already scheduled to visit the gallery as part of a Native studies program.

One of the gallery's main thrusts is to have art "available to people from all walks of life," she says, which is why it covers work "from \$5 up to investment art." "As long as people have a part of it, that's what is important — to enjoy art and spread it around," says Rosling.

Women's centre receives support

Plans are now under way to form a women's centre on Salt Spring following two meetings last month.

Overwhelming support for the concept was expressed at the meetings attended by more than 50 local women and sponsored by the Salt Spring Island Community Society's Women's Project.

Aim of the meetings was to determine potential uses for a \$10,000 Community Initiatives grant. Funds provided by the Ministry of Women's Equality and Minister Responsible for Families are for a "community-based project addressing women's needs."

Women's project coordinator Shannon Classen said "women also discussed needs for affordable counselling, daycare, support services for new mothers and safe houses. A women's centre was selected as the option through which women could network and organize to meet all the identified needs."

The women's project committee is now searching for suitable rental space with preference for the downtown Ganges area. Other sites and funding sources to help defray rental costs are being explored. The group has tax deductible status as a non-profit society and accepts donations for this project through the Community Centre.

Classen said "we plan to hire a facilitator qualified to lead support groups and counselling sessions and organize workshops. Initially our hours and space may be limited by finances but with all the enthusiasm expressed by island women, I think this centre can really grow."

Planning meetings are held every Thursday at noon at the Community Centre and all interested women are welcome to attend.

Carol Fast of the Victoria Women in Need Society will ad-

dress the meeting tomorrow, April 2. WINS financially supports transition houses and educates and counsels on family violence.

The WIN Society is considering opening a second hand clothing store in Ganges. Fast will discuss this proposal and the possibility of a liaison with the proposed women's centre.

Woman nets dumping fine

An incident involving garbage being dumped from a car at Mouat Park has two provincial parks maintenance and security contractors concerned.

"Since the dump shut down we've had a big problem of people dumping household garbage," Kerry Akerman, who shares Salt Spring Island duties with Jim McBride, told the *Driftwood*. "We used to get it in the garbage cans, but now we get it on the side of the road, heaved into the ditch."

"The park opened March 15, and here we are a few days later with garbage in the ditch."

A Salt Spring woman was fined \$50 for depositing litter in a park in connection with the incident, said RCMP constable Chris Bomford.

Garbage cans in the park are for park users to use,

said Akerman. "It's illegal for people to bring garbage in the camp ground and dump it, even in the bins."

Transporting waste into a park is a \$100 fine, said Bomford.

The problem of people dumping garbage occurs in all parks but Mouat is the worst "by far," said Akerman.

Both Akerman and McBride believe the problem will get worse with the disposal fee for each bag of garbage at \$2. They also think people will dump garbage in other parks and roadway ditches.

"I'm sure it's not going to be just our problem," said Akerman.

Pathways face money obstacles

A meeting between Island Pathways and road maintenance foreman John Charlton March 13 produced a stark view of reality for those wanting to build a test bike path strip along Lower Ganges Road by the golf course.

Island Pathways representative Bruce Grey said one of the obstacles to the path's construction is that the ministry of highways has no money.

"You can't squeeze blood from a stone unless there is a tremendous public outcry. We're a bit more aware of the situation highways is under now than before."

Charlton said that, as maintenance foreman, he is in favour of the bike path. Highways wants paths on both sides of the road and wants to see the path as part of the road's shoulder, he added.

To put the path on both sides would require the removal of the power poles and the use of fill. "It becomes quite the proposition. I know how costly constructing road shoulders is."

Grey said he wants people to know Island Pathways is still trying to make the path happen. He said group representatives are scheduled to talk to highways area manager Mark Stevens about the strip.

They are getting cost estimates from a company called Shoulder Rite, which Charlton said is the most cost effective way of shoulder widening.

Grey feels there is still some hope for the strip.

Island addresses changing

Salt Spring Island postal addresses are being transformed along with many growing areas in Canada, a Canada Post spokeswoman said Monday.

Anyone coming into the post office requesting a new address is now being advised of their "site number" along with a compartment number. They are also being asked to include their house number and street in their postal address.

Compartments are also being renumbered with each set of green boxes receiving an alphabetized letter. An individual compartment will have a number label.

"We are doing this across the country as areas start to grow," said communications officer Ilona Beiks. "At this point we are slowly turning this over."

She said the new system is supposed to be more efficient and will "make it easier for sorting."

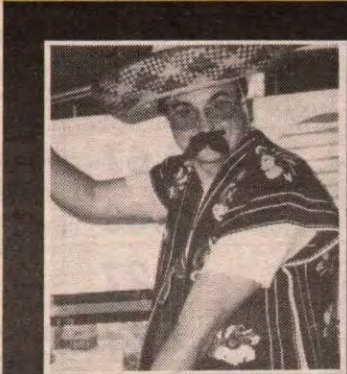
