Timber cut to pay taxes by Galiano owner

While reaction by most islanders to this year's property tax bills has been quiet, at least one family on Galiano Island is having to pay the tax bill with timber this year.

"It breaks our hearts," Galiano Island ratepayers association president Frank Hillier said of cutting trees on his property. "We really didn't want to do it."

"I don't have anything else except the government pension. We're having some difficulty. On top of everything else, there's been a steady increase in taxes."

The Hilliers have been hit by having property whose assessment has increased dramatically in recent years. Increased taxes and

the elimination of grants have also had their effect.

"This year I lost all my homeowner grant — the normal one and the seniors' part of it," Hillier said. "My taxes have gone up to just under \$5,000. I didn't expect it to go up so high."

The Hilliers' property taxes two year ago were about \$2,300. In 1992, they lost the old age supplemental grant and the tax bill jumped to \$3,300. This year, they lost the homeowner's grant and their bill jumped again.

This year's property assessments caused a "sharp reaction" on Galiano, Hillier said. Galiano

Give policy teeth, meeting urges

"Highly idealistic and rather toothless" summed up much of the general feeling about the Islands Trust policy statement at an open house and public meeting June 1 at Ganges.

And "Not enough fish" was a more colourful but equally valid comment.

After three hours, Islands Trust representatives understood islanders wanted the policy statement to have "more teeth" and clearer, better-defined policies on growth and development and agriculture. There were also more than 60 requests for changes to specific policies.

"Growth and development is extremely important," island resident Bob Weeden said near the beginning of the meeting. "We see general directions (in the policy statement) but there are no teeth in the tiger."

"The public on the Gulf Islands needs and deserves a thorough revision of the options for growth and controlling growth: what techniques, what methods it would take, what agencies."

Island architect Henry Schubart

went a bit further.

"There are a lot of — I hate to say it — pious statements, none of which mean anything. It says all the right things but it doesn't go anywhere."

He said the Islands Trust is hampered by having no control or say at all in agencies and bodies such as B.C. Ferries, B.C. Hydro and the department of highways which affect the islands. The Trust

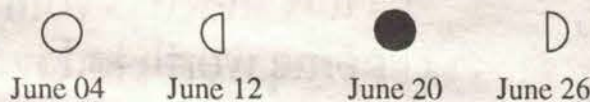

While ArtSpring awaits cash, Chemainus is set to open

While Salt Spring's new arts centre awaits completion for lack of funding, a community theatre on Vancouver Island is preparing to open its doors to the public.

Construction of the Chemainus Theatre Company's two-storey, 15,000-square-foot building began last July, with a price of \$3.5 million. The entire project is being funded by a family trust.

In contrast, ArtSpring has been funded so far by a variety of sources but still needs close to \$200,000 before it can open its doors.

Fundraising chair Peter Bardon said Chemainus was lucky to have its funding source. But he said the Salt Spring community has been generous by contributing \$1 million so far, with donations from individuals, businesses and organizations.

For example, Salt Spring artists and craft people donated \$200,000 with Robert Bateman donating half the sum. Island Savings Credit Union donated \$11,000, Mouat's and Windsor Plywood each donated \$10,000 and Pemberton Holmes donated \$14,000. As well, the Bank of Commerce recently donated \$2,500.

Bardon said once the Island Arts Centre Society raises enough money to open the gallery and the theatre, it will still have to raise money for lighting and sound equipment.

The Chemainus theatre is expected to hold its first performance in mid-June, with combined dinner and theatre seating. The building houses a theatre and dining room, banquet room, crafts gallery and offices. The facilities are designed to seat 270 people in the theatre and 240 in the dining room.

The Chemainus Theatre Company is affiliated with the Rosebud School of Arts in Rosebud, Alberta, and will offer an arts school as well.

"It is a guild school formed on the old medieval tradition of having apprentices, and those people will work with guild masters," marketing manager Daniel Deyell said. "There are people in music and theatre, acting, technical aspects of theatre production."

The theatre was funded by the Oswald Smith Foundation, a family trust in Vancouver. Deyell said the family has interests in Chemainus, and when they saw the Rosebud school in Alberta, they decided they wanted a similar facility in the Vancouver Island town. The foundation worked jointly with the Rosebud school and created the facility.

The theatre company's first performances will be *The Skinflint*, Harold Coucherne's adaptation of Moliere's 300-year-old farce *The Miser*. The company will also present *Talley's Folly*, a Pulitzer Prize-winning play by Lanford Wilson.

ratepayers who visited the British Columbia Assessment Authority offices were told to expect a 65 to 70 per cent increase in their assessments.

But when the notices arrived, increases were between 93 and 128 per cent.

The Hilliers own property which they bought more than 20 years ago. It has increased six-fold in value in that time and this year is assessed at more than \$400,000. The homeowner's grant of \$470 is reduced gradually for properties worth more than \$400,000. At

\$447,000 the grant is eliminated. Several other Galiano property owners report a similar experience. On South Pender, property owners association representative John Jones said residents were concerned about the tax increases and were looking closely at each levy

on the tax notice.

But South Pender has not had a major reassessment of property values yet, Jones said, and the

majority of waterfront lots, where increases have been most noticeable on other islands, are more modest in size.

Your property taxes: Where does the money go?

Many Gulf Islands property owners were wondering last week where they will find the money to pay their property taxes, as increased assessments have pushed up the tax bill.

But getting the tax notice generally raises another question as well: where is the money going?

The largest levy is the provincial school tax, which collects 14 per cent of the total costs for education in the province from residential property owners. Non-residential property owners provide a further 19 per cent of the

money for running schools.

In rural areas such as the Gulf Islands, a rural levy supports the cost of local policing, public road maintenance, snow removal and government agencies.

Of the local service taxes, the levy for the B.C. Assessment Authority and the Municipal Financing Authority are common to all property owners in the province. The first supports the property assessment office. The second supports the government agency that facilitates borrowing for all the municipalities and

regional districts in the province.

Many of the local service taxes are particular to regional districts or even electoral areas.

The Capital Regional District has a tax levy to support the cost of running the district, and the provision of services such as animal control and public health.

The Capital Region hospital tax supports the construction of hospitals in the regional district and other major capital expenditures. Capital expenditures are shared between the region and the province.

The health service credit offsets duplication in the levying of taxes for the provision of community health care. A portion of the provincial rural tax pays for community health care, but since 1975, in the Capital Regional District only, a portion of the Capital Region levy has also paid for community health. The health services credit balances this duplication in tax collection.

Property owners on Salt Spring will see three additional tax levies on their notices, relating to fire protection services, provision of recreation facilities and the Islands Trust. Those residents who live in water or sewage districts will also see specific tax levies on their notices for those local services.

Property owners on the other southern Gulf Islands may also see levies for fire protection and/or improvement districts which provide regional services in particular electoral areas.

Hunter reminded MPs of her proposal to give the Gulf Islands and area waters biosphere reserve status. She said she has been seeking solutions to environment and development concerns in the Gulf Islands, including concerns raised recently about a communications tower erected on Pender Island.

Her motion called for community involvement in approving anchorages in the Gulf Islands.

"Through advance consultation and seeking the approval of affected communities, expensive and time-consuming fights can be avoided. In 1993, it is unreasonable to expect that people will simply not notice or ignore threats to their local habitats."

"Right now, ships awaiting a berth in the Port of Vancouver often anchor off the islands," Hunter said in a press release. "What kind of impact do these anchorages have on our environment? We don't even have a clear idea of how many ships drop anchor or how long they stay. These are some of the questions a proper environmental impact assessment should answer."

Fire guts top floor in Monday blaze

Fire department officials are warning homeowners to be careful with wood fires after a house fire at Salt Spring Island Monday night.

The roof of Brian and Beth Holshoe's home at 105 Ontario Place caught fire after a spark landed on dry shakes. Fire gutted the top floor of the home, as well as destroying half the roof. The bottom floor of the house sustained water damage.

Firefighters had the fire under control within 10 minutes of arriving on the scene, Salt Spring fire department reported Tuesday morning.

A neighbour spotted the roof burning and alerted the occupants of the home, who escaped unharmed.

Welcome news from Canada Post

There was further evidence last week that Canada Post Corporation has communications problems that extend beyond operations in Vancouver and on Salt Spring Island. While Purolator Courier gave one figure for national courier business market share, its new owner offered another.

We'll have to assume for the time being that the correct figure lies somewhere between the two. But more important to Salt Spring Island mail customers is the fact that the straight goods on mail delivery have finally been delivered.

Like the mail, they were just a little late in coming.

A story published last week explained in more accurate detail how mail delivery would operate on Salt Spring once the changes have been introduced. Residents who had previously thought they would need go no farther than 600 feet to retrieve their mail, as Canada Post officials in Vancouver erroneously had us believe, will be disappointed.

Others should not be.

The plans outlined by Canada Post consultant Bob Campbell sound reasonable. Incoming mail will be pre-sorted by machine in Victoria for delivery directly to one of the eight new areas into which Salt Spring will be divided. The elimination of manual sorting at the Ganges post office will save time and reduce the opportunity for error.

Priority service will finally live up to its name here as home delivery of priority mail will be offered. No longer will such mail await pickup at the post office.

Stores where recipients of parcels or special delivery mail can pick up their goods will be of considerable benefit to residents in outlying areas.

But probably the most logical and most welcome addition of all will be a special mail box for outgoing, off-island mail. This simple but potentially effective solution, which has been urged by several residents during the past year or more, will keep local mail on the island.

The routing of local mail to Victoria and back — as is the practice now unless you're aware of the little box behind the counter in the post office — is patently ridiculous.

There is one more change that will serve to improve many an island intersection made drab by the rusty and battered green boxes currently in use.

The new community mail boxes, mounted on a concrete slab and reportedly rust-proof, will make a welcome replacement for the existing ones.

Should all these changes prove as successful as appears likely, we may have to find something else to complain about.



ArtSpring: At least it's ours

The opening of a new theatre in Chemainus must be a little frustrating for those islanders who have invested time and money in what was a very shadowy vision just a few years ago.

The Chemainus Theatre Company's new arts facility will open soon as a result of financial support from a private trust. Money from the trust and the vision of an art school in Alberta have combined to create a centre of which "the little town that did" can be proud.

On Salt Spring, meanwhile, we have a handsome new building with which nothing can be done until at least another \$200,000 has been raised.

But we, too, have reason to be proud. Funded in large measure by money from the community, it is indeed a community arts centre.

We own it. It's ours. Now let's finish it.

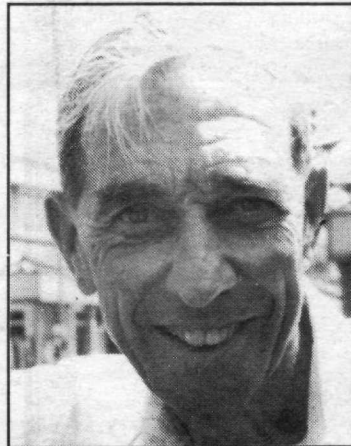

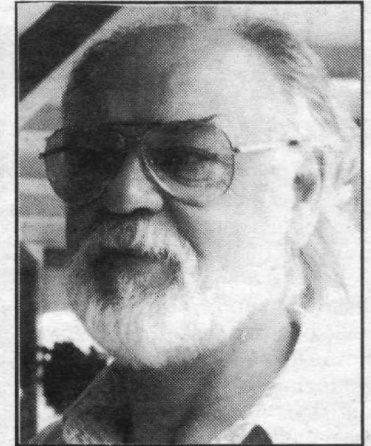

Ozone depletion

To the Editor,
A report on ozone depletion and climate change has been sent to government and media contacts and posted in various locations with a health alert, describing what people can do in response to the 25 per cent increase in ultra-violet sun we are experiencing now.

We have repeatedly asked Environment Minister Charest and Health Minister Cull to do an emergency nationwide alert and are waiting for action.

At this time, it is advisable to inform friends, and relatives and in particular the young ones to protect their skin and alter lifestyle a bit if necessary because the nature of the atmosphere is changing. UV rays operate more like a laser on the skin; the moisture and texture of the air has changed and resulting immunity has been affected. They say one bad burn can lead to skin cancer. In Australia now they predict two-thirds of the population will suffer skin cancer in their lifetime.

What can we do? Wear broad-brimmed hats, long-sleeve shirts etc, UV block sunglasses, especially during intensely hot times of day. Some brands of sunscreen are more effective in cutting down sunburn than others; there's no proof they prevent skin cancer.

Glass cuts down radiation; build shelter areas using tarps, umbrellas for work and recreation. You can supplement your diet with things like garlic, in particular.

Our group of volunteers would appreciate any support you can show by calling your MP and MLA requesting an end to ozone-depleting chemical production and emissions (there are alternatives) and an emergency information campaign and task force set up to deal with this emergency.

Airport taxes

To the Editor,
I'd like to comment on Frank Richards' column in the May 19 *Driftwood*. Mr. Richards opens with, "Welcome to Vancouver! Five dollars please!" This was slightly misleading because he was charged \$5 to depart Vancouver not to arrive.

The Vancouver airport improvement fee is charged only upon departing Vancouver airport. It does not apply to arrivals or connections to other flights within the same day. The charge is \$5 for departures within B.C., \$10 for other North American destinations and \$15 if the journey is international.

Mr. Richards refers to the "fed-up Canadian travellers" who will use Sea-Tac to save money. Seattle airport, with 22 other U.S. airports, has had an airport user fee for over

one year. Other U.S. airports are being added to the list. The Seattle airport fee applies to all arrivals, departures and connections so you pay each time you use the Sea-Tac airport.

The other fact that should be considered is U.S. taxes on air travel. In Canada the tax is seven per cent plus \$10 to a maximum charge of \$40. In the U.S.A. the tax is 10 per cent with no ceiling for a maximum charge. This means any ticket over \$400 will have higher taxes in the U.S.A., i.e. taxes on a \$550 ticket would be \$55 in the U.S.A. and \$40 in Canada.

GST cannot be avoided! If the ticket is purchased in Canada or the U.S.A. for travel in Canada or transborder the GST must be paid!

Travel to Hawaii, all international destinations and travel within the U.S.A. is GST-exempt no matter where you buy the ticket.

I trust this will help clarify some of the points made.

Badly served

To the Editor,
Many of your readers will be unaware that Salt Spring Cablevision is presently applying to the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) to have its licence renewed.

This is not surprising since the CRTC has until now only advertised the fact in the Vancouver papers.

However, thanks to repeated objections from a group of Salt Spring residents, the commission is finally taking cognizance of the fact that many local residents do not feel all is well with the present situation.

Salt Spring Cablevision's application is being advertised, albeit belatedly, in the *Driftwood*.

To accommodate their oversight, the CRTC has extended the date for objections until the 26th of June.

In comparison with what is offered in most Vancouver and Victoria districts we are badly served. Even Pender Islands' new service offers 21 basic channels compared to our 16 and then there's some 13 more if you want them. So where are Salt Spring's missing channels? Arts and Entertainment, Discovery, CNN, and so on. We wouldn't have to watch them, but it is only right that we have that choice via the cable system.

The service element of the operation is poor if not amateurish. Salt Spring Cablevision gets away with providing a half-time office service which does not meet the

needs of the cable subscribers who wish to report faults.

In addition, there is a distinct need on the island for a community channel. Once 2,000 subscribers are reached, provision of such a channel is mandatory. Salt Spring is almost at that magic figure, and yet we still don't have one, despite the CRTC urging Salt Spring Cablevision to "promote interest in the community channel and to provide programs that reflect subscriber interests and concerns." That was the commission's suggestion in 1989 when the money-making franchise was renewed unopposed last time round.

To sum up, I believe that if the present licence holder is not prepared to fully undertake a comprehensive service to its subscribers then it should get out of the industry and make way for someone who will.

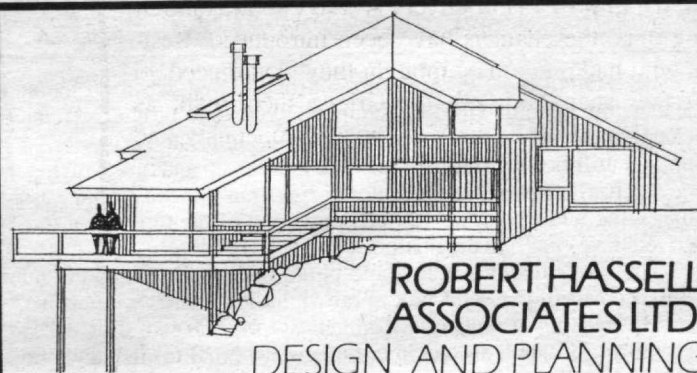

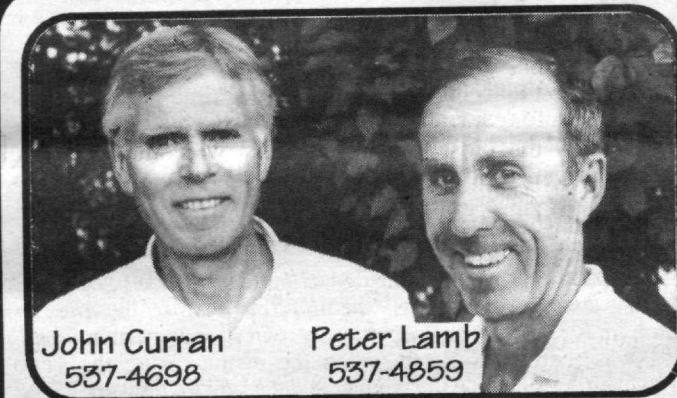

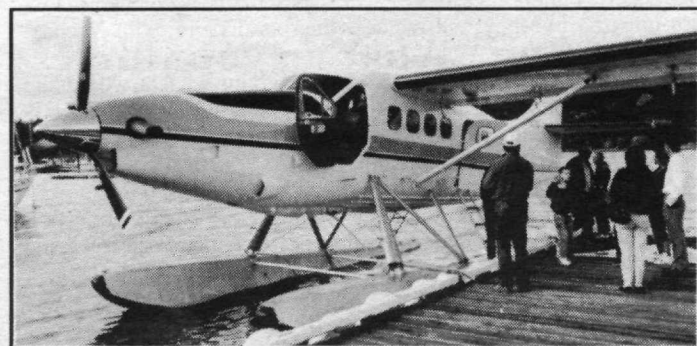

3. Amount of "you knows" outnumbering actual English words in a conversation (three bulbs).

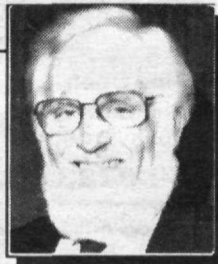

VICTORIA — I've got some unsolicited advice for Liberal leadership hopeful Gordon Campbell: get your brother off the campaign team. And while you're at it, make him stand in the corner until he learns the difference between journalism and muck-raking.

Michael Campbell is the editor of *Equity*, a Vancouver business magazine whose current edition sports one of the most offensive covers I've ever had the misfortune to lay eyes upon.

The cover features a doctored photo of Premier Harcourt and Finance Minister Glen Clark in brown military shirts with leather straps crossing their chests. Clark is wearing a gun. The photo montage goes with an article criticizing the NDP for its attack on wealth.

Asked about the photo, Harcourt was visibly angered. The close resemblance of the uniform the magazine put on him to that worn by Nazi brownshirts wasn't lost on the premier.

He said he found the picture offensive in the extreme. His father, he said, fought in the second world war, and he had fought for democracy during his career.

"It's unfortunate that Gordon Campbell's campaign worker, his brother Mike Campbell, is bringing back the Bud Smith style of politics to this province. I don't think British Columbians want to see that happen," Harcourt said.

Asked for comment, *Equity* staff member Ashley Ratee admitted that Michael Campbell "most likely played a role" in the unsigned article, but he rejected charges that the uniforms on the cover resemble Nazi attire.

Well, Mr. Ratee, I recognize Nazi uniforms when I see them. And these are most definitely the uniforms worn by the S.A., an acronym for Sturm Abteilung, loosely translated as storm troops.

I was there, Mr. Ratee, when the men wearing the same brownshirts you put on the premier and the finance minister looted the homes of Jews during the Kristallnacht. I was there when they arrested not only Jews, but the Social Democrats, whose political philosophy was pretty well identical to that of this country's NDP.

Don't tell me those shirts on your magazine's cover aren't Nazi shirts. I'm not buying your diatribe about "visual presentation of an attack on success."

If Gordon Campbell doesn't know it yet, I can tell him that this nasty little episode can't help but hurt his campaign for the leadership of the provincial Liberal Party. Canadians may be tolerant, but not to the extent of tolerating this garbage.

I would be very surprised if *Equity's* advertising revenue dropped off for a while. I would think that even the die-hard right-wing business community doesn't want to be linked with such cheap and offensive attacks on the government.

Things like this also don't do much to enhance the image of journalism which is somewhat tarnished at the best of times. And if other news outlets have the slightest regard for the need of journalistic impartiality, they will reassess their association with Michael Campbell.

Campbell can be seen daily on BCTV, giving what he would like viewers to believe is an impartial and apolitical view of matters economic. He can also be heard regularly on CKNW radio in the capacity of economic commentator.

You may think that I'm making too much of this, but I think not. I felt the same way on a number of previous occasions, and expressed my anger. Like during the restraint days of Bill Bennett, when posters were distributed showing the premier adorned with Third Reich uniform and regalia, giving the Nazi salute.

A few years later, Rita Johnston, during her short-lived career as premier, gave a speech in which she compared the NDP to the Nazis. I pointed out on that occasion how offensive her remarks were, in light of the persecution Germany's Social Democrats had suffered at the hands of the Nazis.

And finally, I recall Bill Vander Zalm's ill-conceived remarks that our system of justice reminded him of Nazi Germany, a strange statement coming from a premier, although I must say it was perhaps not so strange coming from this particular premier.

No matter how much we may dislike a certain government, there is no excuse for likening it to the most ruthless state that ever existed. There are accepted parameters to any political debate, and they don't include the kind of journalistic trash that emanates from the cover of this month's issue of *Equity*.

If I were Harcourt, I would be furious. And if I were Gordon Campbell, I'd fire brother Mike from the campaign team.

have been spent over the years, do not yet seem to achieve them.

On a more positive note, Bob Weeden said islanders should understand what a unique document the policy statement is.

"I've been to lots of meetings like this in Alaska. I've never been at a meeting at which the underly-

ing legislation has so clearly spelled out the preference of a community. You should cherish and nurture this entire process."

Islanders still have the opportunity to submit written comments and suggestions about the policy statement to the Islands Trust office on Salt Spring or in Victoria.

Some suggestions:

More than 60 additions, clarifications and remarks were noted at the June 1 meeting held to discuss the Islands Trust policy statement. Some of them are listed below:

General comments:

- document should be shorter;
- document should be more action-oriented;
- policies should be more enforceable re private land-clearing;
- definitions should be added — what is the difference between "oppose," "shall not permit," "support" and "encourage;"
- need to seek effective authority over island land-use and resources — subdivision approval authority, building permits
- recognize speed and nature of population growth as major hazard — address this specifically.

Comments relating to Part I: The Islands Trust's Object, and Elements of the Policy Statement:

- biosphere reserve proposal should be included.

Part II: Ecosystem Preservation and Protection:

- opposition to introduced non-native species — specify;
- fish-bearing streams, estuaries/watersheds and aquatic animals should be mentioned;
- need direction to local Trust committees to compile maps of environmentally sensitive areas (ESAs);

- need mandatory environmental impact studies in ESAs subject to rezoning.

Part III: Stewardship and Management of Resources:

- are we preserving and protecting the status quo or moving towards sustainable viable communities — what is the policy intent?
- agriculture should become a Trust council priority;
- need to define potential for agriculture;
- fibre, medicinal herbs and decorative plants should be added to agricultural list;
- policy on piping water from off-island should not apply to existing development that runs dry;
- Trust should oppose clearcuts, not discourage;
- need incentives for conservation covenants.

Part IV: Sustainable Communities:

- strengthen communication between Trust council and local community;
- clarify references to hazardous waste;
- growth and development section should be made stronger — need a thorough review of options for controlling growth.

Part V: Implementation of the Trust policy statement:

- should clarify actions for implementation.

"This document doesn't reflect what's going on on Salt Spring right now. How do local trustees deal with that?"

With regard to the proposed development of 40 acres of agricultural land for 24 units of affordable housing and 22 new houses, he said, "I am not opposed to having lots to sell (some laughter). I am not opposed to low-income housing. I am not opposed to the Catholics who own the land. I am opposed to a 22-fold increase in density on agricultural land."

Another practical point, and one which has not been given much thought in this kind of community soul-searching, was raised by island resident Bev Unger. She asked where the money would come from to implement these policies and where the staff time would come from.

"We can't achieve all these policies at once," said the Islands Trust manager of long-range policy. "The Trust will be prioritizing which policy items they will be focusing on, which they will be budgeting for. Implementation will be reviewed each year," Cynthia Hawksworth said.

This raises a point made by local government options study chairman David Borrowman about the policy statement "always being a bridesmaid."

The desires of residents are always the same — controlling growth, protecting the environment — but Official Community Plans (OCPs) and policy statements which express these desires and for which time and money and energy should take on a more advocacy-related role to protect the environment.

His comment that the "greatest hazard to the island is more people" brought applause from the audience.

"How is this document going to create sustainability?" island farmer John Wilcox asked. "Fifty per cent of the economy is coming from retirement income. Ninety-three per cent of land is residential. Thirty-eight per cent of land is owned by off-islanders.

"Are we trying to preserve and protect that or trying to create a viable community? To preserve and protect the status quo of agriculture we'd be doing nothing. If we wanted to go back to 1920 and recreate that, we'd be doing something.

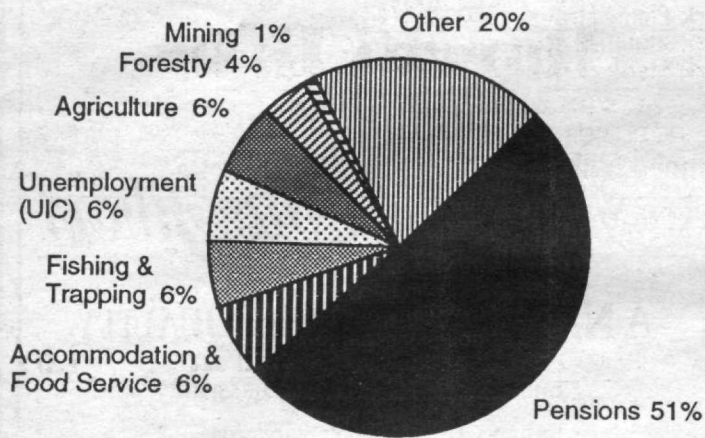
"We need to make this a viable community, not just a residential community. I think we really have to look at that."

Common lunch hour elusive in school schedule

Students at Gulf Islands Secondary School should know this week their daily schedule for September. Teachers, parent groups and administrators have been working to revise the school's schedule in an attempt to address concerns over the allocation of courses. Principal Eric McMahon told

the *Driftwood* the school originally wanted to implement a schedule which would give students a common lunch hour in which to hold club and other meetings. However, designing the schedule has not been without its problems. McMahon said that under min-

istry of education guidelines, class time can total only five and a half hours. When combined with teacher contract allowances, structural limitations, as well as travel considerations for Outer Islands students, designing the schedule has been a challenge.

By implementing a schedule which gave the school a common lunch hour, students would only be able to choose eight courses from eight time slots. McMahon said that schedule would have been a setback for students. Students used to be able to choose their eight courses from 10 selections, with a staggered lunch. Under the proposed new schedule the school will operate on a schedule that will allow students to choose eight courses from nine blocks, with three staggered lunch hours. Instructional time will also be increased as time originally allocated for student management will be used for instruction. Interest in the academic courses for grade 12 increased this year, with the highest number of physics

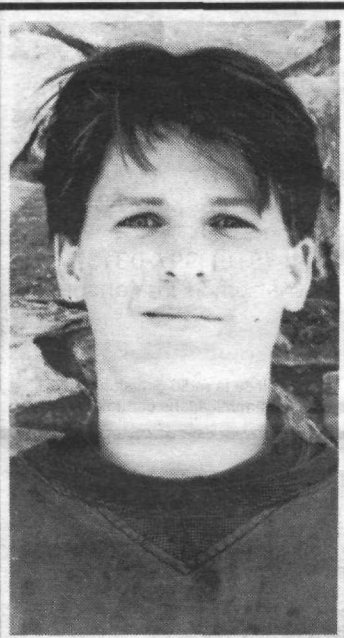
12 students GISS has seen in a number of years, McMahon said. McMahon said GISS is funded by the ministry to offer eight courses to students. He added that if a student wants to take an additional course, the school will try to accommodate them. Some students were planning a walkout last week, but decided to wait for a revision to the schedule instead.

Mixed reaction among students to schedule

It sucks. That's how Gulf Islands Secondary School student Kristi Kallip described next year's class schedule, which was presented to students last week. But reaction was mixed among students interviewed about the changes, and there was a great deal of confusion. Grade 11 student Mathew Reed favoured the proposal. "Many grade 11s could not graduate before the change, but now they can."

Student input — or the lack of it — was a concern for two students. "It's an abomination (that) the students involved are not consulted when it's their future that depends on the system," said Sarah Brooks. Sholeh Wrate agreed. "It's not fair that the teachers and parents are planning it all and we don't have a say in it." Many of the students the *Driftwood* spoke to did agree on thing, however. Lunches are too short.

System to clean up soil contamination

Gasoline Alley is in the process of installing a system that will remove contaminants — believed to be petroleum related — from soil on the property. Property manager Strick Aust told the *Driftwood* that Seacor Environmental Engineering Inc. from Vancouver drilled test holes on the property and found an area of contamination. As a result of its findings, Aust said, the company is installing a system which over the next 18 months to two years will clean the soil.

"Really, a lot of the area of Ganges is probably similar because it is all the same fill that was brought in 50 years ago," Aust said. "... I know that (part) of the source was our tanks, which we have changed, and there are probably lots of other sources as well. At any rate, this will solve the problem on our particular lot." The engineering firm doing the work would not comment on the particulars of the system or the nature of the contamination without written permission from the land owner.

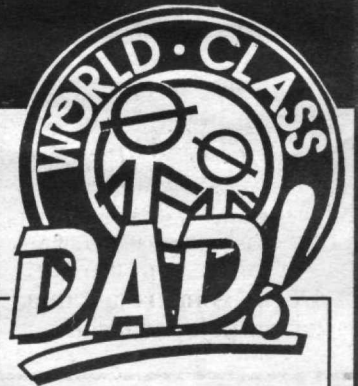

Brew and island pets sport locally-made accessories

Can you picture your rottweiler in a paisley collar? Or see yourself parading down the street with your poodle on the end of a tartan leash? If so, a Salt Spring resident has just the product for you.

Custom Collars is an island business created three years ago by Diana Lindley.

Her collars and leashes for dogs and cats are made of durable nylon webbing covered with bright colourful fabric, and they fill the front room of her home. Lindley uses plastic Fastex buckles so the collars will snap together and apart easily. On the cat collars, she uses a breakaway buckle that comes apart should the collar become caught.

The products are strong and durable, and completely washable. Not only has she made them for conventional household pets, Lindley has even created collars for

pigs. Now she is looking into products for horses and llamas as well.

A Salt Spring resident for the past two and a half years, Lindley sells her pet accessories at the Saturday Market, from her home, and in pet stores and veterinary clinics in Vancouver and Victoria.

"As fast as I can make them, they get sold."

One British Columbia celebrity even owns one of Lindley's collars. Brew, the Kokanee dog well known for retrieving beer in TV commercials, has a special collar of his own. "It was so exciting," Lindley recalls of selling Brew's

collar. "I almost fainted. I thought that I had hit the big time," Lindley said.

Although Lindley had to teach herself to sew when she first began, she has perfected her technique and uses every type of fabric imaginable to create her collars.

But these are no ordinary collars. These pet accessories are made with love.

"People's love of animals is a thread through society," Lindley says. Because her products are made with love, the animals pick up on it, and so do their owners, she said. "They are symbols of faith in the world."

Minister's award for Walde

Salt Spring resident Bob Walde has been presented with a Minister's Environment Award.

Presented by Environment Minister John Cashore at a special dinner June 8, the award was given to Walde for his work and commitment on behalf of people with multiple chemical sensitivities.

Walde himself developed multiple chemical sensitivities when, as a B.C. Ferries employee and volunteer fireman, he was involved in cleaning up a diesel spill in Long Harbour September 2, 1985.

He has been unable to work since the accident and has been fighting to get a pension. Neither the Worker's Compensation Board nor the provincial health ministry will recognize the condition or pay for treatment at a centre in Texas.

The environment minister's award was made because "in spite of his disabilities, he has helped others in his own predicament overcome associated problems. He encourages these people to seek counselling."

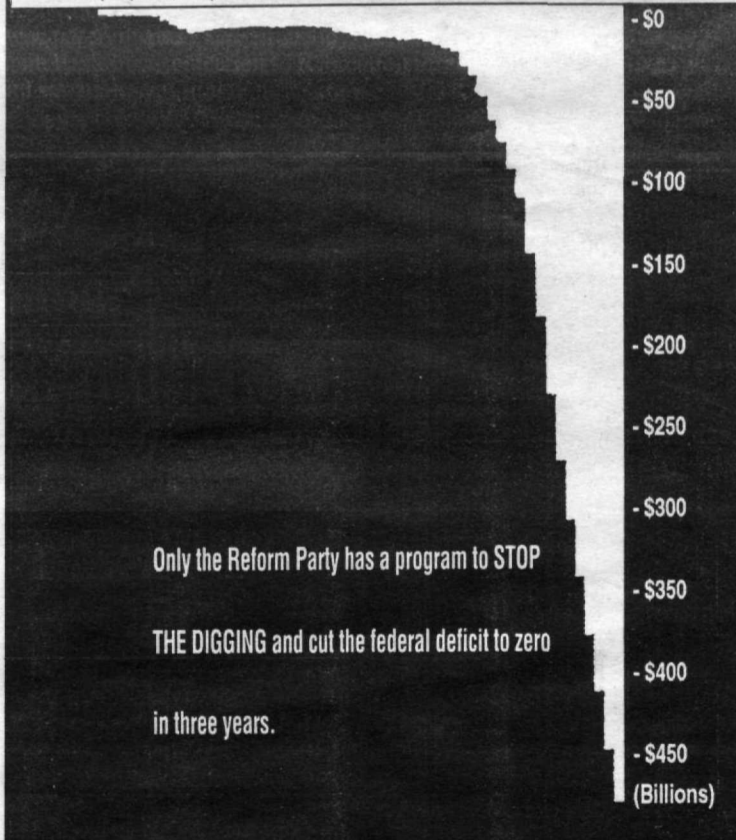

The log jousting competition is sure to test the balance and stamina of local log jousters. For newcomers to the sport, log jousting consists of jousting on a log in the water.

An event that tests one's adaptability to the marine environment is the walk-on-water contest. Participants will challenge current champion Russ Murcheson.

For those who want to dry off after spending all their time in the water, Sea Capers has an assortment of land events.

Youngsters can enjoy the lark in the park, as well as a demonstration of skills by the members of the Salt Spring Gym Club.

Teams are invited to form up for the annual treasure hunt, while sculptors ought to be planning now for the sand-sculpting competition at Drummond Park.

The Great Driftwood Contest promises to be bigger and better than last year with two categories: decorated driftwood with seaside materials, and natural.

Representatives of the Red Cross from Project S.O.S. will be on hand to demonstrate new safety techniques and answer questions

on safety precautions. Local members of the Coast Guard will also be present with literature and advice for boating enthusiasts.

For those who would like to see Ganges Harbour without building their own boat or attempting to walk on the water, free harbour tours will be offered by Gulf Islands Water Taxi.

Car goes through fence at Thrifty's

Ometepe coffee comes to islands

Nicaraguan coffee — grown on Ometepe Island — is now available in the Gulf Islands.

The Ometepe-Gulf Islands Friendship Association (OGIFA) is arranging for the sale of the fresh-roasted, co-operatively grown coffee. Mayne Open Market on Mayne Island already has it; several outlets on Salt Spring have been asked to sell it.

"The Magdalena Coffee Co-op produces the coffee," OGIFA member Marg Simons said. "It's way up the volcano and is in an area where we have done the water project."

The Gulf Islands and Ometepe have been twinned for more than five years. Last month the second phase of a project to supply several villages with fresh, clean water was completed. The sale of coffee beans from the island co-op is another way in which help is being offered to the Nicaraguan islanders.

The green coffee beans are bought in bulk by another friendship group on Bainbridge Island in Washington State. Small quantities of coffee — enough for Gulf Island consumption — are shipped to the Coffee Roaster in Vancouver for custom roasting.

All profits from the organically-grown coffee will be returned to Ometepe, Simons said. That might be as much as \$3 per pound.

The coffee should be available on Salt Spring in time for a slide show and talk June 17 by the Ometepe water project leader, Scott Renfrew.

Watercolour artist is orchestra conductor

Watercolour gets Jill Campbell very excited. In fact, she is quite as animated, whimsical and colourful as the animals and landscapes she paints. Islanders will have a chance to see her work in a show at Pegasus Gallery June 11 to 20.

"Painting is like conducting an orchestra," Campbell says. "I just stand there and let that colour go."

"I really believe in the positive — the power we all have inside of us. I express that in my painting."

"It's like a memory of a children's illustration, of that time when you believed you could do anything. I like to get back to that magic (and) watercolour is a medium that to me is a perfect way to express that magic."

Her studio on Salt Spring Island looks across the water, and she likes to have music playing when she works. Time stops, she says, when she paints.

"I don't know why I choose the colours I do. With watercolours you can be so very soft and translucent."

"I don't dilute. I use a lot of colour — a lot of pigment. I also use liquid gold. It's quite compatible with watercolour. I use silver too and pen and ink."

"My colours are not realistic," she said. "I'm not matching green on the trees to a green on my palette. I'm not technical or mathematical, but it works."

"I love patterns. I remember being fascinated by the colour of water — yet we all know water is clear."

In 1991, Campbell and her family spent the whole year in a small village in Provence, southern France.

"We lived in this little magical valley with a landscape of rock," she said. "Particularly in the evening (there was) this mauve, mauve light."

There, she said, she felt very vibrant and had the freedom to explore and paint. She fell in love with the landscapes and country life. Sheep, roosters, birds and country scenes are common in her recent prints.

"Roosters are part of the country, they are part of life," she said. "They are lovely, proud

beasts. I love animals."

A recent painting called *Salt Spring Arbutus*, features the swirling, curling branches of that famous island feature.

"I love the way the branches go with their lovely curlicues," she said. "The leaves have different colours — pink, turquoise and bright green. Every time I look at them I see another shape."

After returning from France, the Campbell family chose to live on Salt Spring.

"We wanted a community that was supportive of the arts, by the ocean and a community which was wonderful to bring children up in. There's a lovely magic here."

Since that time, she has put her animated, vibrant style to work for ArtSpring. The result is a \$1,000 donation to the island arts centre.

"It was a way of promoting the arts and making my contribution to ArtSpring," Campbell said. Prints of her *Sheep Fantasy* were sold by herself and through Heritage Boutique since last summer. All the money raised after production went to ArtSpring.

Campbell will be at her Pegasus Gallery show June 12, 13, 19 and 20 between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Thursday fundraiser for dancer's Vienna trip

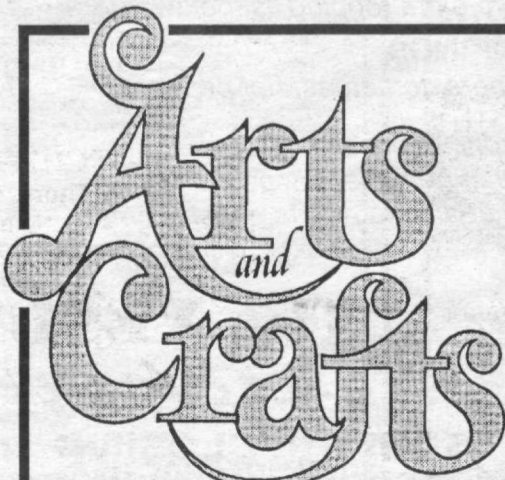

John Inglin looks back on 90 years

"I do not know how the hell I survived some of the things I did." That's how Salt Spring Island resident John Inglin describes his experiences after moving to Canada from Switzerland almost 70 years ago.

Inglin recently celebrated his 90th birthday with his family, although by looking at him, you would never know it. His outdoor jobs and hard working experiences have kept him looking young.

The prairies became Inglin's first home when he came to Canada in 1926. Youthful curiosity and a desire for change took him to Saskatchewan where he worked on a farm.

Inglin did not like Canada when he arrived from his mountainous home. After landing in the flat prairies of Saskatchewan, he recalled, he would have gone back home if he had had enough money.

He was not impressed with the absence of trees and colour on the prairies, as well as the lack of activity. He said Sundays were incredibly dull, with nothing to do but sleep. Compared to Switzerland, it was boring.

The prairies were Inglin's home for only two years and then he moved on to his next adventure.

The headwaters of the Churchill River, that runs into Hudson Bay, were to become his home, where he braved the cold to fish. "It was cold, but you got used to it," he said.

"It was all rough, nothing was easy, but it was good. You learned a lot. You have got to get away from the cities to learn."

When the ice on the lake became strong enough, a cabin would be moved onto the ice where the fishermen would stay. Inglin said the cold froze everything. "The potatoes in their sacks felt like rocks."

To have something to eat that was not totally frozen, the fishermen used to cut out the fish livers and put them in their pockets. Then they would take the livers back to the cabin and fry them up.

Living on a frozen lake took some getting used to as all night you could hear the ice moving, Inglin recalled. The pressure was so strong, it would make a huge crack in the ice. "The pressure was so hard, and when it goes, it sounds like a cannon shot."

Fighting fires was another job Inglin did in the north, and flying with bush pilots could be quite an experience. On one particular trip, "I looked at the plane we were supposed to take . . . and said, 'Geez, that thing does not look very safe.'"

The pilot's response was, "Oh yes, it is perfectly safe. We put new braces in."

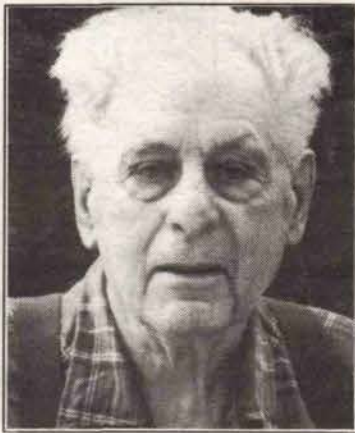
"That gives you a lot of comfort," Inglin said.

Sometimes the planes were too heavily loaded and had difficulty taking off. The passengers had to rock the plane until it lifted off.

From the cold hard climate of the north, Inglin moved to British Columbia where he worked as a

logger.

He has fond memories of the logging camps in which he lived for part of his life. He described living in bunkhouses with other loggers, and had nothing but praise for the cooks. They would get up early and light the fires in the houses so the workers would get up to a warm

room. "They even made our beds and cleaned the floors."

Inglin logged throughout B.C., but the Queen Charlotte Islands had the biggest timber. He has pictures of Sitka spruce that were eight or nine feet across at the butt. They were "the golden days."

In 1945 Inglin moved to Salt Spring where he met his wife Mary, who was his landlady at a rooming house. "When you travel so much, you get to a certain age and you want to settle down," he said. So settle down he did.

Inglin worked as a logger on Salt Spring for Joe Lautman. Those were the days "when we still had the big timber in Canada. Now it is gone."

He has seen a lot of changes on Salt Spring over the years, one of the biggest being the influx of people to the island. Now Inglin feels there are too many people here.

"It was a wonderful life, and

quiet. I do not like the way it is now."

However, Inglin said he understands that change is inevitable. Even though new residents arrive each year, "that is change, and you can not help it, I understand that."

"Everything is subject to change. Some for the better, some not." Inglin can recall driving up Ganges Hill in winter, back in the days when Embe Bakery was a creamery. If a snowfall had left the hill slippery, you could get up by driving in a zig-zag pattern back and forth.

"You could not do that nowadays. That is what I mean about so much change."

down through the years

Five years ago

June 8, 1988

• School site suggestions were being considered. Gulf Islands Secondary would stay at its present site, school board chairman David Eyles said, but everything else at the school site was open for discussion.

• The fish hatchery was nearing completion at the corner of Cusheon Lake and Stewart roads. The cost of the project was kept minimal — about \$20,000. The hatchery will eventually be able to handle 400,000 new fish each year.

Ten years ago

June 8, 1983

• More than 200 people helped in a softball work party sponsored by the school district and the Parks and Recreation Commission. It brought 35 teams together that used the existing diamonds.

• A firm was chosen to study the sewage disposal problems of Ganges. A completion date had not been settled.

• A Buddhist teacher was to come to Salt Spring every two weeks from Vancouver. His duties would include visiting Mt. Tuam to see the people at the three-year retreat.

Fifteen years ago

June 14, 1978

• Membership in the South Salt Spring Residents' Association had more than tripled. A meeting with regard to Stowel Lake watershed and the proposed neighbourhood pub at Fulford was the reason behind the swelled numbers. There were more than 160 members of the SSRA.

• Erling Jorgensen put his best foot forward during Sea Capers and won the water-walker contest.

• The first annual Captain Cook Bicentennial Sea Capers was a grand success. The island was packed with visitors for the two-day event and the school grounds and waterfront were crowded with spectators and contestants.

• More than 200,000 acres of rural land was urbanized between 1966 and 1977 as Canadian towns and cities continued to expand, according to the federal environment department. Of this land, 63 per cent was some of Canada's most productive agricultural land.

Twenty years ago

June 14, 1973

• A drug abuse research program on Salt Spring Island was to be closed, according to the federal

government news service. Community Training Centre at Welbury Bay was to shut after complaints by a Vancouver open line radio show. The staff of the centre learned of the closure when it was announced by Jack Webster on his show.

Heading the program were Doctors Maureen Bendick and Guille Libresco. Webster threw a wrench into the works last year when he protested that Dr. Libresco and other members of the staff were not Canadian citizens.

• House numbering on Salt Spring Island was put into low gear. Originally supported by the Salt Spring Island Fire Protection District, numbering of island homes was taken over by a committee of the ratepayers association.

Twenty-five years ago

June 6, 1968

• Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce asked for a complete reversal of highways restrictions. Earlier, signs were erected at ports of entry to the island advising drivers that Salt Spring was restricted to 30 miles per hour for all traffic except in those areas otherwise posted. The effect of this system, T.W. Portlock said, is that the speed limit in British Columbia is 50 miles per hour except on Salt Spring Island. The chamber then asked the provincial highways department to change the limit and the signs to 50 miles per hour unless otherwise indicated.

Thirty years ago

June 6, 1963

• Fire destroyed the wharf at Village Bay. The fire started at 4:30 in

the afternoon just as the work crew was quitting. It was believed that sparks from a cutting torch set the blaze. Vancouver Pile Driving and Contracting Company, contractors for wharf renovations for the new ferry *Queen of the Islands*, were working on the dock. • The new addition to the Royal Canadian Legion (Salt Spring Island Branch 92) hall in Ganges was to be opened. A 40-foot extension to the building was constructed

mainly with volunteer labour and financed by individual donations from Legion members and branch activities.
