## Elders' council proposed for young offenders

Directing the attention of law-breakers — youngsters in particular — towards the consequences of their actions is one of the goals of a new initiative being explored at Salt Spring.

A local citizens' group has proposed further study of a concept currently being introduced in native communities in Canada, where offenders appear before a "council of elders" rather than the traditional court of law.

The Community Police Advisory Committee (CPAC) has decided to approach the attorney-general's ministry to study the idea.

The council of elders would bring together the offender, the victim and his or her counsel, a mediator or judge and community representatives. They would meet as soon as possible after the offence was committed and discuss what

effect the offence had and what the consequences might be.

Such a system, CPAC says in a written proposal, "would help the offender to understand that his or her actions affect others in a real and tangible way . . ."

So far the proposal is getting a warm reception, but its structure and mode of operation need to be considered.

Ganges RCMP Sgt. Don Smith compared it to a program run with success by native communities in the Yukon, and welcomed its implementation here. But several questions must be dealt with first, he warned.

Who chooses the council members, how long are their terms of office and under whose jurisdiction does it operate? The only local bodies to which the council could report are the Islands Trust and the

## Midden dig will precede roadwork

A lower mainland company will begin digging up a piece of land in Ganges next Tuesday to search for artifacts.

Arcas Consulting Archaeologist will conduct an archaeological dig at the junction of Upper and Lower Ganges roads, near the location of the old Harbour House tennis courts.

"The site is already known as a prehistoric shell midden . . . where aboriginal people lived in the past," Richard Browly of Arcas Consulting Archaeologist told the *Driftwood* in a telephone interview.

He said his company has been hired as a result of a proposed highways construction project on the site. The ministry of highways is preparing to reduce the grade of the hill on Upper Ganges Road where it meets Lower Ganges, and move the intersection slightly closer to the hotel for improved sight dis-

tance at the stop sign, highways area manager Mark Stevens reported.

Slated for the fall, construction will also include a left-turn lane on Lower Ganges Road.

Stevens said that whenever a highways project is proposed, the ministry of tourism and cultural affairs' archaeological branch reviews the project to see whether it will impact on any known archaeological sites.

Because there is an archaeological site registered at the head of Ganges Harbour, and part of it is going to be buried by the realigned road, the ministry of highways must have a study done.

"(The consultants) go in and do representative sampling and study the deposit to glean whatever information they can from it before it's covered over by the construction activity," Stevens said.

## Extra vessel only on five days

Gulf Islands ferry service has suffered some cuts in weekday runs under B.C. Ferries' new summer schedule.

The schedule which went into effect last Friday differed from last year's as it eliminated some Tuesday and Wednesday sailings.

B.C. Ferries uses a supplementary vessel to increase service, but this summer the vessel is not available on as many runs as last year.

"Last year we had it on seven days a week; this year we are only able to put it on for the five days. So, knowing that it was only available for the five days, we've targeted the five days that we thought were the busiest," B.C. Ferries spokesman Ed McKenzie said.

"We've designed it that way to meet the peak traffic period," he explained, which is between Thursday and Monday.

The 6:30 a.m. sailing on Tuesday and Wednesday from Tsawwassen to Sturdies Bay, Village Bay and Otter Bay was eliminated.

A new sailing from Tsawwassen to Saturna Island will run at 9:50 a.m. Monday through Friday.

Also eliminated from the schedule is a 3 p.m. sailing from Tsawwassen to Galiano, Mayne, and Pender islands on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Tsawwassen departures to Long Harbour were spared cuts under the new schedule. There are only some minor changes in sailing times from last year's schedule.

However, the 11:15 a.m. sailing from Long Harbour to Tsawwassen offered last summer is no longer offered on Tuesday and Wednesday.

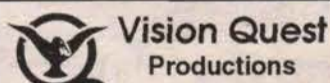
Travel between the Gulf Islands has also been changed, with the deletion of some runs and the rescheduling of others.

Capital Regional District, Smith pointed out.

The director of probation at the attorney-general's ministry welcomed the CPAC initiative.

"Facing the victim or a member of the community at large has a greater impact" on an offender, Les Reid said in a telephone interview.

He likened the proposal to an "accountability board" adopted in Nanaimo many years ago. An offshoot of the John Howard Society, it operates a diversionary program in which young offenders and their parents are interviewed by a community board which then decides on a penalty.

Diversion is a process employed for first-time offenders, who are diverted from the court system. Also operated by the John Howard Society, it takes pressure off the already over-burdened courts and deals more quickly with offenders, who are given penalties such as community work service.

But local police say diversion represents a "civil contract" between the offender and the justice system and is easily — and often — broken. Const. Pat Wilkinson says many young offenders do not complete the terms for their diversion.

However, it will happen only once. Diversion is not employed with a repeat offender.

While he did not offer any observation as to how the elders' council might function, Reid was optimistic about the potential for a

community-based system. He also had some thoughts about the treatment of young offenders.

"We're dealing with an awful lot of disturbed people who used to be dealt with by the health system and by psychiatric institutions."

The away from institutionalization means there is a greater chance they will end up in the court system.

Probation orders can include the requirement that they obtain counselling but in many cases they simply do not go, Reid said. It's important to look at more treatment-oriented penalties, he said.

A registered clinical counsellor with previous experience with young offenders described the CPAC proposal as "very solid."

"It should bring home a sense of the consequences (of his actions) to the young offender," William Manfield said. He also said youngsters often get into trouble as a means of attracting attention. The council of

elders, he said, would serve to focus a lot of attention on the young offender.

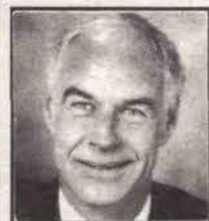

Now that the British Columbia government has passed legislation that will ultimately seek to influence how we think, it might turn its attention to some other, more pressing matters. With the Human Rights Amendment Act now law, the B.C. Human Rights Commission has considerably expanded powers to control what we say and write.

In classrooms across Canada, meanwhile, there are signs that our children's thoughts and views are being moulded along lines that not all parents might appreciate.

Take the matter of the teacher in a school district outside Toronto, whose white supremacist beliefs have enraged parents. The teacher has been active in promoting his ideas outside the classroom, which has led to an investigation of his activities within the classes he teaches.

He was exonerated by the investigation, which concluded that students were not being taught the white supremacist credo. Despite that, the school board reacted by removing the teacher from his class and transferring him to the adult education department.

Another Ontario teacher has been keeping her students informed about the Windy Craggy mine issue, following its development through to last week's conclusion. Premier Harcourt put a stop to the mine proposal by declaring the entire Tatshenshini region a park.

The teacher and her class were celebrating the decision, we were told, because they did not support the bid to mine the area's rich copper deposits.

Here at home, many teachers take an active part in various groups and causes, from the NDP Club to the anti-free trade movement. Teachers — along with others in the community — have been vocal about these and other matters.

In the first and last instance, the issue is not so

much what our children are being taught in the classroom, but one of perception. The racist teacher in Toronto, we must conclude, is passing on his beliefs to students. In the Gulf Islands, the teacher who is passionate about the harm that will come of the North American Free Trade Agreement must be leading his students to believe the same.

For most of us, it would be impossible to argue in support of the racist teacher. But for many, the free trade agreements which Canada has signed represent the right course for public policy. In both cases, however, the teacher has a right to his or her beliefs.

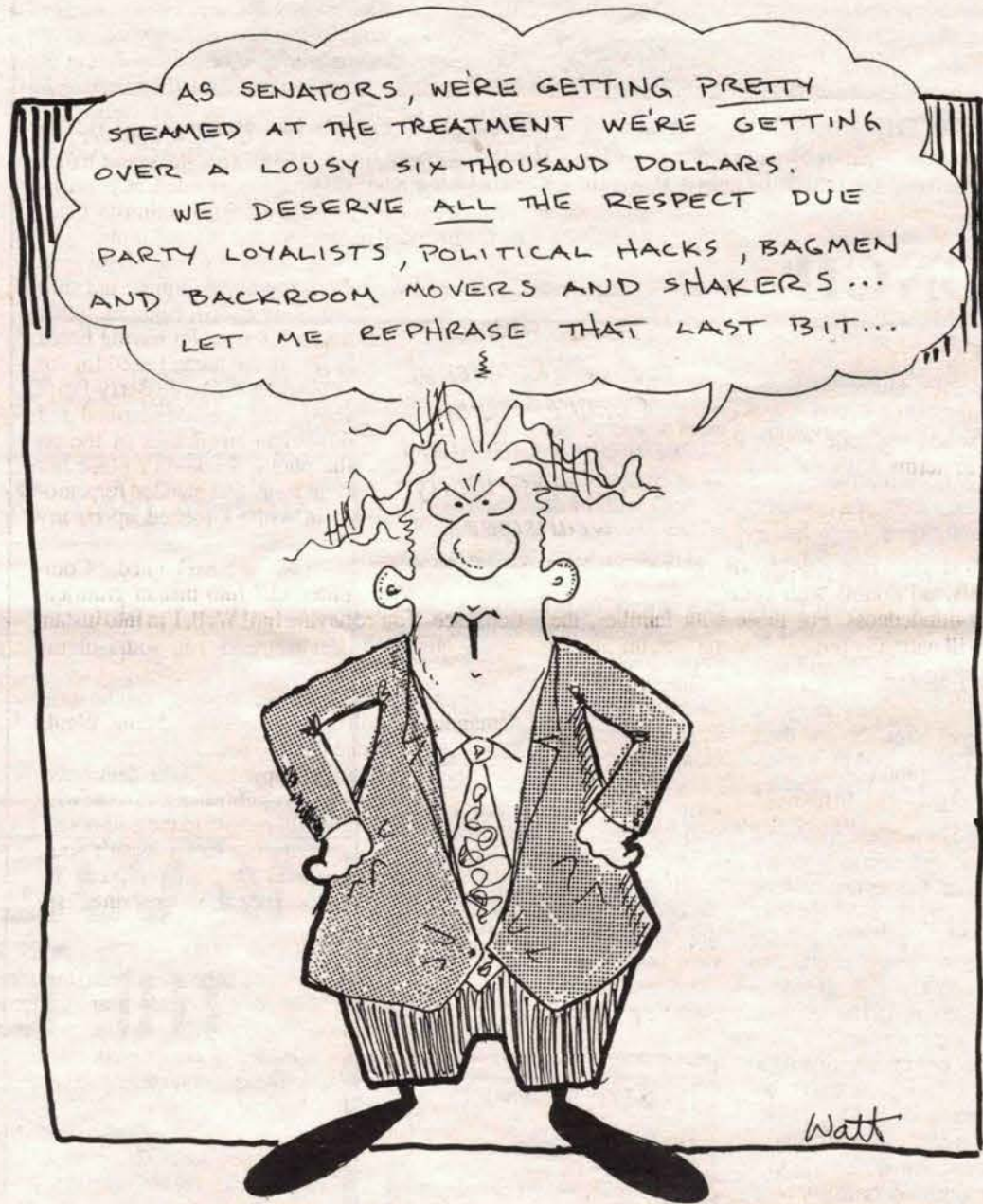
The best course for any teacher to follow is one of caution. If parents are going to question a teacher's conduct as a result of his or her activities outside the

classroom, then perhaps the teacher ought to take a less active role in those activities. Their position is not dissimilar to that of journalists, most of whom will strive to maintain distance between their professional and personal lives. Few will become politically involved because of the perception it might create among readers. The reporter's credibility would be placed at risk.

As far as the anti-mining teacher is concerned, this is the danger that parents perceive when a teacher becomes active in the promotion of a special interest. Her students have been taught to believe that the Windy Craggy mine was wrong, and that Premier Harcourt's decision was right and just.

The teacher has no business leading her students to such a conclusion, simply because it is not necessarily the right one. Every story has two sides. Every issue can have many perspectives.

It is up to teachers and parents to examine those sides and explore the perspectives with our young. And then an opinion is theirs — and theirs alone — to form.

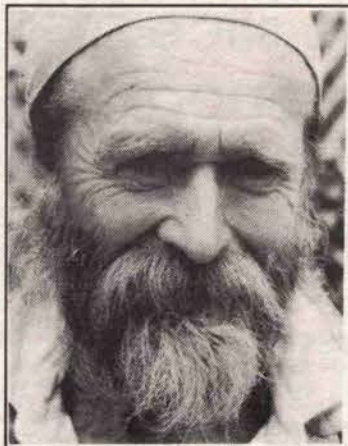

## Vengeful

To the Editor,  
Mr. Dick Royal, a Salt Spring Island farmer, had his farm "de-classified" last year and thus lost farm status for tax purposes. He then received a very large tax bill which meant that he had to borrow the amount from the province.  
Mr. Royal applied to the Court

of Revision to have his farm status restored. The court very reasonably made a visit to the property and found that the farm was, indeed, a farm having been farmed almost continuously since 1905. Needless to say the court ruled that the property should be classified as a farm.

They also wrote a written judgment containing the following:

"We take a dim view of a process which attempts to place the onus on a modest farmer like Mr. Royal, to have to fill in forms to obtain a tax status which should continue to be his as a matter of right."

The court added that it could find no requirement in law which compelled a taxpayer to "fill in forms."

At the hearing into Mr. Royal's

case a representative of the B.C. Assessment Authority threatened: "If this appeal is allowed, we (the Assessment Authority) will take it to the Appeal Court."

This vengeful, minatory and bloody-minded attitude by a servant of the public is not merely unseemly, it is obscene. The BCAA is carrying out its threat, and appealing the decision of the Court of Revision.  
Probably the BCAA will be as-

king for an order in council which legalizes their "rule" that an application must be made each year for farm status. One hopes cabinet will stay this process, since it would subvert the very sensible judgment of the Court of Revision.

If their judgment is allowed to stand, it sets a very desirable precedent, from the point of view of public policy.

## Poetic map an opportunity for this writer to have fun

The Gulf Islands: a place that spawns superlatives prolific like tulip-munching deer. How heavenly a heaven? One man's beatitude is another's backwater.

An illustration on a Richard Stine card depicts a crude circle resembling a clump of earth floating in an expanse of blue. It is divided in two equal parts, one labelled Heaven, the other Hell. A second identical clump to the side, without the division, is labelled Hawaii. Substitute the latter for the island of your choice and... well, you get the idea.

Visitors and newcomers typically go ga ga when their eyes dart across these relatively pristine rocks. But what happens when the initial intoxication wears off? Say around December.

What of the 20,000 or so inhabitants who call this home? The scenery for the most part isn't edible and life here, like a loving relationship, requires nurturing work. Besides grappling with the realities of economic survival, ferry schedules and limited options for kids' schooling, one needs to come to terms with the social milieu.

A balance must be struck between the expression of fierce individualism (the mettle of islanders, no doubt) with community-mindedness. For those with families, the latter will naturally prevail. For soloists, the luxury of anonymity, taken for granted in cities, becomes a quick casualty.

I'm entering my 10th year on the islands. After a sojourn on Salt Spring, I settled on Gabriola, bless its little commuter soul. It has been home, on and off, for eight years. In between, I've visited Galiano, Pender, Denman, Hornby, Cortez and most recently Lasqueti.

Every once in a while, I suffer from "the grass is greener..." syndrome. Bemoaning my perennially marginal income, I resolve to move elsewhere. Each time, for one reason or another, I change my mind. Inscribed indelibly on the inside of my forehead is the Zen-like maxim: No matter where you go, there you are.

Someone asked me recently for some information about the islands. Surveying the field of tourists, directories and novelty maps, I suddenly became nauseated with all the tinsel boosterism. Terminal rah, rah, rah. The ubiquitous realtor/Chamber of Commerce map, crammed with ads, I found particularly wearisome. I like realtors as a lot (pun intended). My brother is a realtor, but I have a real bug about what some of them do to the language. In their zeal to persuade they can cut a swath with their euphemisms; a carnage obscene as



clear-cut.

At some point the idea for an alternative map popped into my head: "The poetic map of the Gulf Islands." I would seek out poetry that gave voice to the flavour and essence of each island from a native, non-commercial

point of view. And instead of identifying B & B's, stores, restaurants and marinas, I would simply feature poetry and the locale of each author. More importantly, the voices would be an expression of what the experience of living in a relatively isolated, and hence out of the main stream, life means.

I placed a small ad in *The Gabriola Sounder* and sent out some promo sheets. To date, about half a dozen Gabriolan poets have responded. A publishing concern from Salt Spring called enthusiastically, commended the project and offered input.

A local woman, who had made a written enquiry and subsequently called, came on like a docking ferry. Not having heard of me, or the name I used for the publishing venture (Berry Point Press), she seemed alarmed and downright suspicious of me on the phone. I couldn't place her right away and pleaded for a moment while I looked up on my database.

"Oh," she exclaimed, "Computer, eh? Into instant gratification, I see. You're having fun! Well, I'm into instant gratification too. Let me read you some of my poems."

I suggested that listening to poetry can be quite demanding, and that this wasn't a good time. Would she please just send them to me.

"And who owns the copyright?" she demanded. I explained that my role as publisher was somewhat like a midwife: copyright reverts to the authors.

Mollified, it sank into her that I wasn't some salivating capitalist (poetry publishing... was she kidding?) "But I'm concerned about misprints," she continued.

"I know, I know," I sigh. "One spelling... one punctuation error, can mean a holocaust." And then a shriek, "Don't you spank my children around! And when is the book coming out?"

"It's a map, not a book!" I persevered. "The project is very much in its inception stage and will evolve in time."

"Ahhh." It was if the Muse had tapped her on the forehead with a sparkling wand. And then the dismissive: "I can see you're just having fun."

**It's not two words**

To the Editor,  
The correct spelling of Saltspring Island was confirmed in 1905. Bob Campbell, coordinator of the new postal system, has absolutely no authority to change it to Salt Spring. Because we have received mail on the island under Ganges or

Fulford, variant spellings have just been a local custom.

However, since it now matters let's get it right, and also get mail sorting equipment set up to recognize both spellings. Islanders will continue to use both variations, even though Saltspring is the only correct version.

First a bit of history: in 1854 James Douglas named the island Chuan Island. However, officers of

the Hudson's Bay Company named it Saltspring Island on a map prepared in 1856. They were aware of the presence of salt-bearing springs on parts of the island. In 1859 Capt. G.H. Richards was exploring these parts and naming various spots after his crew. He decided Admiral Island suited us better. Those who preferred the 1856 version spelled it as one or two words as the fancy took them.

Because of this sort of unilateral naming and lack of authority the federal government set up in 1897 the Geographic Board of Canada. The board's mandate was to consider and determine all questions of geographical nomenclature, minimize duplication, provide uniformity, correct discrepancies and generally put an end to confusion. In 1948 the board was renamed the Canadian Board on Geographical Names in order to make clearer its purpose and mandate.

After due consideration of all the facts, in 1905, the board re-adopted Saltspring as the correct form. It appears on all government documents in that form including the official *Gazetteer of Canada: British Columbia*. One of the board's special publications is J.T. Walbran's *British Columbia Coast Names; 1592-1902*, published in 1909, and reprinted by the Vancouver Public Library in 1971. It is available in the local library and some bookstores and gives the historical details regarding Saltspring.

If Bob Campbell, or other islanders, want to go back to the unofficial Salt Spring (or Chuan, or Admiral Island) then they should take it up with the current board. Better still, leave it alone and carry on with garbage, sea walk and farmers' market issues! Or perhaps we could have the Original Saltspring island as a new version?

VICTORIA — On June 16, Geddes Resources announced the results of a public opinion survey, according to which 64 per cent of those surveyed supported the development of a mine at Windy Craggy.

The company might as well have saved itself the cost of the survey and that of spreading the news of the results because a week later, the B.C. government sank the project for good.

The entire Tatshenshini-Alsek region in northwest British Columbia will be permanently protected as a Class A provincial park and nominated as a world heritage site.

With that announcement, not only will British Columbia create a million-hectare park, twice the size of the Grand Canyon, but the world will probably witness the emergence of the planet's largest international protected wilderness area, approximately 8.5 million hectares in size, straddling the borders of B.C., the Yukon and Alaska.

It would be easy and tempting to not take a position on the issue, now that a decision has been made, but I happen to have championed the cause of preservation in this case, and I'm not letting the opportunity pass without congratulating the government for its courage and foresight. And believe me, the government needs all the moral support it can get on this one.

The two opposition parties certainly didn't waste any time attacking the government. "NDP Government Kills B.C. Mining Industry" crowed a Liberal press release. Socred leader Jack Weisgerber asked whether the NDP didn't care about the jobs and revenue lost by scuttling the Windy Craggy Mine.

We're talking about 500 jobs, but only for 20 years. We're talking about \$720 million in provincial revenue, including corporate and personal income taxes, mining, fuel and sales taxes over the 20-year life of the mine. It sounds like a lot, but with all due respect it's not. The 20-year revenue wouldn't even cover half of this year's deficit.

I have viewed with considerable amusement the company's attempts to describe the proposal as just another mine in the middle of nowhere. I have admired the company's brazen claims that mineral tailings can be safely stored under water, on a glacier, behind a dam.

All along, I have remained unconvinced that the company, any company, could deliver on these claims. The waste rock would have to remain undisturbed on the glacier, under water, behind a man-made dam not just for the next 10 or 20 years, but pretty well forever. If ever the dam broke, as a result of an earthquake or other natural event, the ecological results could be disastrous.

The industry's attempts to downplay the ecological risks of this particular mine proposal reminded me of the chemical industry's public relations theme some years back, according to which "life itself is chemistry." The reality is that the same industry is creating new chemical compounds at a rate of 6,000 a week, many of which are highly toxic. Bhopal certainly wasn't a manifestation of life itself.

The Tatshenshini region is too valuable to be disturbed by a mining operation, leave alone one that poses such a potential environmental hazard.

The region includes snow covered massifs, ice fields, endangered wildlife and two of the last rivers on earth that run from their source to the sea through an untouched wilderness.

Supporters of the mine proposal have advanced the argument that very few people will have the opportunity to visit the area. Wouldn't it have made more sense to protect areas closer to civilization?

That argument doesn't wash. What about 50 years from now, 500 years from now? Areas that are inaccessible to all but a few fortunate wilderness enthusiasts today are bound to be within much closer proximity of civilization in the future.

One of the problems of modern society is that most governments look no further than the next election and will try everything to avoid decisions that could get them into political trouble. I'm glad the Harcourt government bit the bullet and told the mining industry that the Tatshenshini is not up for grabs.

I would like to tell the mining industry, the Liberals and the Socreds that the decision doesn't mean the government is against mining. I'm not against mining, but I support the government's decision.

There are copper deposits elsewhere in British Columbia which can be mined without serious risk to the environment. Maybe they're not as rich as the Windy Craggy site, but still worth mining.

If the only way British Columbia's mining industry can survive is to place in jeopardy the incredible natural value of the Tatshenshini, then perhaps it was doomed to be a sunset industry a long time ago.

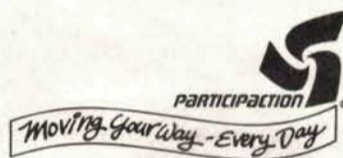

# 100 volunteers assist in gypsy moth program

After a final ground-spraying June 3 and the laying of the last of more than 1,000 traps on the weekend, the Salt Spring Island integrated gypsy moth eradication program is nearly done for the summer.

More than 100 individuals have spent more than 300 hours in the area around Weston Lake, helping Agriculture Canada officials search for egg masses, larvae and pupae and setting traps for gypsy moths.

"We want a community which is informed," Parents for a Safe Environment member Gail Richards said. "We'd like to take the responsibility for ourselves and do the work that needs to be done to make spraying unnecessary in the future. "We've shown we can do this. We said we could do this and we have."

Agriculture Canada agreed March 5 to work with members of the community in a gypsy moth eradication and monitoring program. Members of groups who were opposed to a large aerial spray of *Bacillus thuringiensis* var.

Kurstaki have made up most of the volunteers.

Under the direction of Agriculture Canada and only where property owners assented, volunteers looked for egg masses, mostly near Weston Lake.

They also burlap-banded trees in areas where gypsy moths had been found before. That meant putting a foot-wide piece of burlap around the trunk of a tree — tied with jute or something biodegradable — and folding it over. The gypsy moth larvae like to have a cool place to rest after eating and are attracted to the burlap, Richards said. Monitors can easily lift the fold to see if gypsy moths are there.

More active gypsy-moth hunting included the tapping of trees. Large canvas cloths were placed under trees and the branches tapped gently with sticks to make bugs, especially caterpillars, fall.

"There were hardly any bugs," Richards said, and no gypsy moth larvae.

Agriculture Canada plant protection officer Shane Sela said

no gypsy moth egg masses, larvae or pupal cases have been found during searches since March.

The latest spate of activity, and most time-consuming, was the set-

ting of more than 1,000 gypsy moth traps. Eight traps per hectare have been set within the 73-hectare zone identified in the ground-spray application.

A lower concentration was set within a 350-hectare zone around that. There are 114 gypsy moth traps scattered throughout the rest of the island.

All in all, Salt Spring's integrated gypsy moth eradication program — unique among all such programs in B.C. — has gone well. "Agriculture Canada has said this has never happened anywhere else: where people get involved themselves, where people come out en masse and volunteer to do the work," Richards said. "We can do a much more thorough job than they can."

Sela said the government appreciated the help given by islanders, particularly in trap-setting, which would have been impossible without their help.

But there are some concerns about the program. Richards said they had hoped to have signs posted at ferry terminals to warn visitors from gypsy moth-infested areas about the pest.

Literature on the ferries and in places where visitors were likely to go was another idea, as was an inspection service of specific property or vehicles. Agriculture Canada

has not come forward with any proposals to bring these ideas to fruition.

There is also concern that Agriculture Canada is not being open about finding gypsy moths. Two days before a public information meeting March 10, six egg masses and nine pupal cases were found near Weston Lake. But the egg masses were removed from the island before any larvae hatched.

Sela said the egg masses were removed to a government laboratory for safe inspection and disposal.

Lastly, volunteers are worried about the commitment of Agriculture Canada to an integrated eradication program. Despite the need to monitor 1,000 traps around the island, Salt Spring lost its part-time Agriculture Canada inspector this week.

## Eligible tenants sought

Families and individuals who would qualify for reduced-rent housing on Salt Spring Island are being invited to register with the Community Society.

While funding for the society's 24-unit affordable housing complex has not yet been approved by the provincial government, additional proof is being sought for the need for such housing.

Families and individuals with incomes under \$23,000 qualify for one-bedroom units, those with incomes under \$29,000 for two bedrooms, under \$37,500 for three bedrooms and under \$39,000 for four.

Rental price is based upon 30 per cent of a household's gross income, with a minimum applying.

Located on a site behind the Community Centre, the project will include four units for disabled people. The units will have harbour

views, one to four bedrooms, one or two bathrooms, living and dining area and kitchen.

The complex will be built around a "village green" and will include a community building containing laundry facilities, recycling area, meeting room and play area. Garden vegetable plots are also planned.

A trail network and bicycle path will link the development to Ganges village. A survey conducted three years ago produced a list of 130 people who would qualify for affordable housing.

Those who wish to register may do so by calling in at the Community Centre or by phoning the centre at 537-9971. Registration forms are also available at KIS Office Services in Ganges and at Patterson's Store in Fulford. They can be mailed to the Community Society.

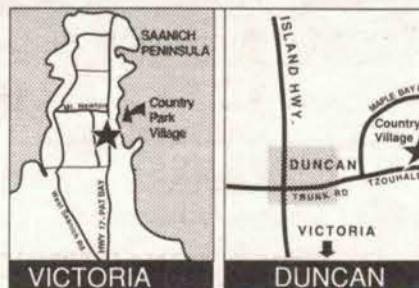

## Recommendations follow primary program survey

A recent survey of parents, teachers and school administrators within the Gulf Islands has found strong support for the primary program in district schools.

Over 600 surveys were sent to each primary and first year intermediate student's family, the program's teachers and school administrators. Twenty-four per cent were returned.

A primary task force made up of a volunteer teacher from each of the Salt Spring elementary schools, an Outer Islands representative and Barb Aust, the primary coordinator, conducted the project.

From the surveys received the task force found there was a large amount of evidence indicating the importance of a humane environment for children. This environment, the task force said, could be facilitated through a variety of means including: smaller class sizes; creating a safe, friendly environment; positive interaction between teachers and students; program flexibility; increased parental involvement; and better communication between parents and school.

The task force made recommendations in relation to a number of areas, and the school board's programs committee made a few recommendations of its own.

The first area involves parents as an integral part of education. The task force recommended that a meeting be held in September at which interested parents, primary

teachers and administrators develop a brochure or handbook addressing the ways that parents can be actively involved in their children's education.

A district parent day was also recommended to be held in early October to address some of the concerns that were expressed in the survey.

The programs committee recommended that the district parent day be handled by local parents advisory groups.

The task force recommended the school board assign an employee skilled in interpersonal and public relations to the position of parent/community liaison.

Under the focus area of discipline and responsibility, the task force recommended that there be a district-wide focus on responsibility and that it involve administrators, parents, students and teachers.

Dealing with disruptive students was another concern addressed by the task force. Recommendations were made asking that the school board provide clear guidelines to teachers on what support they have in dealing with disruptive students.

This area is also being addressed by the personnel committee of the school board and a code of conduct is being considered.

Problems with information and communication between parents and schools were addressed in a number of recommendations.

Teachers should continue to

send out weekly newsletters and schools should send out monthly bulletins as they have had good response from parents. Administrators are urged to include a section in every newsletter on one aspect of the primary program.

Concerns about report card procedures were addressed with the recommendation that report cards have clearly defined focus areas, and that time be provided in each school to present reports in person and to explain and discuss the contents.

More invitations and opportunities for parents to provide feedback to schools were recommended to help with communication and information.

The task force recommended that school trustees visit schools on a regularly scheduled basis so they could better understand the program and become more informed spokespersons for it.

To address a concern over support for the program, the task force recommended that a request be sent to the ministry asking that it take a proactive rather than reactive role in informing the public about the initiatives of the program and the Year 2000.

Transition from primary to intermediate levels was also addressed. Administrators and teachers should be urged to create combination classes that span the primary and intermediate years, offering a transition between the two levels.

## Ministry releases details of calendar

A standardized school calendar for all B.C. schools has been prepared by the ministry of education.

The calendar, which will be in place for the next school year, has been designed for the next five years.

Since 1989, when school districts were able to create their own calendars, there has been a great deal of confusion as many districts started and finished school on different days.

In an information package, Education Minister Anita Hagen said the new standard school calendar will enable schools, families and other members of the community to plan for vacation periods around the opening and closing dates of school.

The calendar provides for 192 days in which schools will be in session. Those are the days on

which teachers and administrative officers are scheduled to be available for instructional, non-instructional and administrative activities.

The minimum number of days of instruction is 184. In the upcoming school year, the maximum number of non-instructional days the ministry is allowing is seven.

School will be in session for a minimum of 40 weeks.

Elementary school teachers will instruct for 23 hours and 45 minutes a week, and secondary school teachers for 25 hours and 45 minutes a week.

All schools across the province will open September 7.

There is some flexibility under the new law. Schools may adopt a local calendar which is not consistent with the standardized one, with the approval of the school board, parents, teachers and other board employees.

# Pathfinder program seeks \$90,000 budget

The Pathfinder program consists of a computer lab where students do course work at their own pace. A computer system helps monitor their progress.

System operator Lawrie Neish presented a report on the program to the Gulf Islands school board last Wednesday, outlining how the program has been operating, and where he sees it heading in the future.

A typical student on a regular

Pathfinder path who began the program in early February would have completed 35 to 40 hours and would be about one-third of the way through the course material.

"This correlates well with the normal course progress of a student in a regular classroom situation and goes a long way to addressing a concern some of the school staff who were worried lest a student complete a path in less than the accepted time," he wrote.

The Pathfinder system covers core academic courses to grade 10 using a wide variety of resource material which Neish says is both a

limitation and a strength.

The cost of resources is a concern.

A group called B.C. Consortium is using standard B.C. texts to write course material and currently has a few courses available in grade 11 and 12 subjects as well.

Neish said the B.C. Consortium material is currently at a "bare bones" stage in development and since GISS is a member of the group, he feels the school should do its part in developing programs.

In a memo to high school officials, Neish outlined his desire to join Pathfinder Labs in Burnaby,

Victoria, and Sooke in developing course material/paths at levels below grade 11. He will develop Math 9 and 10 material while the other labs work on Math 9a, 10a, and 11a.

Neish said he anticipates writing a considerable portion of the path for Math 10 during the summer vacation and also wants to fine-tune some of the other B.C. Consortium courses.

He outlined a number of possible directions the Pathfinder program could take in the future, including moving it to the new secondary school facility as well as

potential extension to the Outer Islands.

Neish recommended that one teacher (himself) and one paraprofessional (Henry Braak) be assigned to the Pathfinder lab on a full-time basis. With that recommendation, Neish included an operating budget of nearly \$90,000 a year.

Of that, salaries for the two staff members would total \$80,280.

The board did not make any decisions on the program, but referred the issue to another committee-of-the-whole meeting for further discussion.

## School develops policies

Gulf Islands Secondary School has a new set of policies and procedures, developed through a coordination of efforts of administration, teachers, and parent advisors.

Presented to the Gulf Islands school board last Wednesday, the document covers topics from organization to student fees to student dances.

Portions of the document relating to students will be presented in a book that students will receive at the beginning of the year.

In other school board news:

- The personnel committee reported the district will have a net reduction of 10 teachers this year, and district officials are recalling teachers who were recently laid off.

- Contracts for bus service on Pender and Mayne Islands were extended. Gulf Excavating Ltd. was awarded the Mayne Island contract for the 1993-94 school year at a cost of \$36,750.

At Pender, Driftwood Service (1983) was awarded a contract for \$39,302 for the 1993-94 school year, and \$40,048 for the 1994-95 school year.

## Lions purchase hospital equipment

Lady Minto Hospital received a new piece of equipment last week thanks to the generosity of a local service organization.

The Lifepak 10 is a heart monitor and defibrillator donated to the hospital by the Salt Spring Island Lions Club. Acute care head nurse Marg Pickard told the Driftwood the \$12,650 machine will serve two main purposes at the hospital.

With a built-in external pacemaker, the machine can be used to help someone waiting for an operation to have a permanent pacemaker installed. It can also be used to monitor a patient with chest pains.

The new machine replaces equipment that is 10 years old.

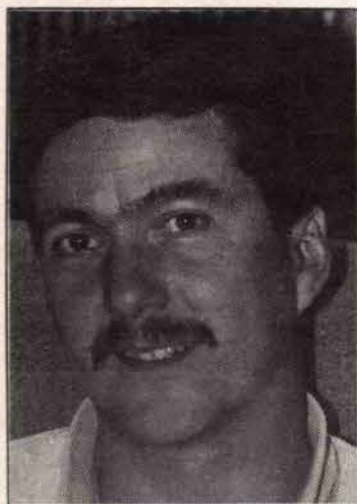

## Portlock Park field will be open for soccer in September

Playing fields at Portlock Park will be open in time for the soccer season in September.

Parks and Recreation Commission administrator Tony Hume told the *Driftwood* last week that even though the fields may look like they are ready for use, the commission wants to make sure the roots of the new grass are fully developed before the field is opened.

"We're being particularly cautious about letting people on (the field) right now in order to get the roots as well established as we can because once soccer season starts it gets very heavily used.

"We're going to be pretty careful over the summer as the roots get based in . . . it takes quite a while when you are seeding to get the

roots really well established on a sand-based field."

The first three or four inches are sand, which the roots have to pass through to firmly establish themselves, he said.

Areas on the field which were once quite thin are slowly starting to fill in, and some of the bare spots have been reseeded, along with a damaged portion of the field.

Damage to the grass took place in the spring when a vehicle was driven over it. "It is another reason why we are being particularly careful. The part that was damaged by the car on the field is taking a little while to come in, too."

The field will officially open September 11 with a community party. Any community groups that are involved in recreation on the island will be invited to participate, Hume said.

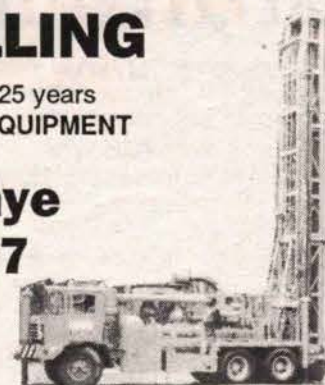
The event will be a fair for anybody who is involved in recreation to demonstrate to the community what they are doing.

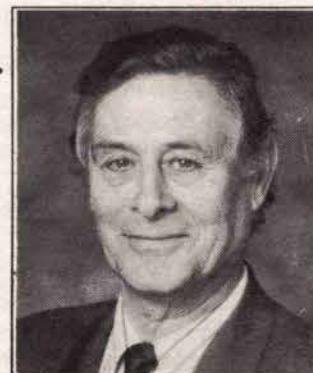

## Salt Spring building is down, Outer Islands up

Building activity last month was down on Salt Spring Island and up in the Outer Islands compared to the month before.

There were 12 building permits issued on Salt Spring in May, all for single family dwellings. Value of the construction was \$1,211,295.

On the Outer Islands there were nine permits issued — all for single family dwellings — with a value of \$517,752.

During the first five months of the year, construction on Salt

Spring has totalled \$20,754,885 in value.

This represents 49 single family dwellings, 16 multiple family units, a mobile home and 12 industrial, commercial or institutional buildings.

During the same period, construction has totalled \$3,868,623 on the Outer Islands. Permits were issued for 58 single family dwellings, one mobile home and three industrial, commercial or institutional.

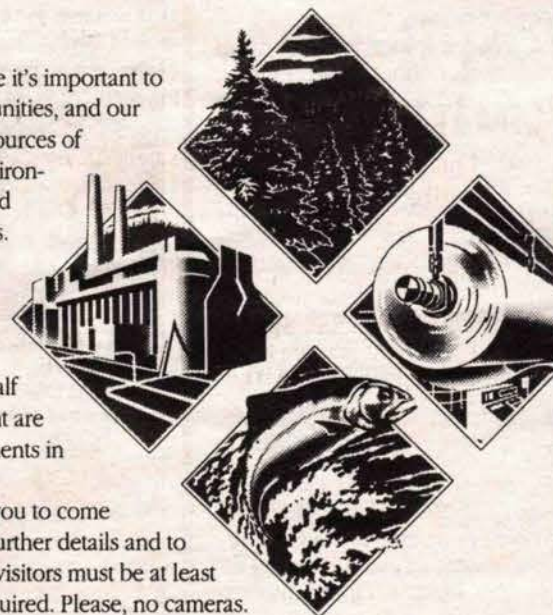

# Program gives meaning to textbook situations

## 55 students participate in career education

Career education at Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS) is as diverse and challenging as the real world can be — and that's what makes it succeed.

"I was right in there, doing everything," Trevor Besson said of his work experience at the Salt Spring Island highways maintenance yard. "I learned a lot."

Besson was in the cooperative education part of the Career Explorations 12 course this year and said he would recommend the program to anyone.

Career explorations was particularly important for Besson, because he had decided three years ago he wanted to be a mechanic. But last September, when only two grade 12 students signed up for metalwork, the shop was turned into a computer room.

Career explorations offered Besson the chance to get the knowledge and experience he was after even though the facilities were not available at the high school.

Program co-ordinator Scott Bergstrom calls this "expanding the school's walls into the community."

"(The) whole purpose is to link the school with the community," he

"The idea is to parallel and enhance what goes on in the classroom," he said. "They get to use the skills they're learning in the classroom in a real sense."

"One of the goals is to have the students understand the relevancy of what they are doing in the classroom."

"So, business education students get a chance to work with accountants or administrators or managers and see how situations in textbooks work in reality."

"Most kids come in and don't know what they want to do. The majority of them have some direction afterward."

Sean Hill enrolled in the performing arts career exploration program for his final year at GISS.

"I knew where I was going. I know my career course," he said. "I used it to get more experience."

"In school, the academics are always emphasized. I don't see it that way. (Career prep) lends validity to drama or art which are usually considered extras in school."

Since grade eight, Hill has been in the high school theatre program. In his final year, despite the pressure from his academic courses, he enrolled in career explorations to get even more theatre experience. It paid off, because the extra-curricular show he was part of — Arthur Miller's *Crucible* — was one of the best to be seen on the island all year.

And, program facilitator Margaret Allison said, more and more students are seeing the value in the program. Grade 10 students who spend a week in a work study program get a taste of what 100 or 200 hours might give in grades 11 and 12.

And where do they do work experience?

"Wherever places can be found," Bergstrom said. Many businesses and individuals on Salt Spring Island take part, as do others in Duncan, Sidney, Victoria and even Vancouver.

Many island businesses have taken part in the career explorations program — including the *Driftwood*. Victoria Highways Maintenance mechanic Russ Murcheson has had two students working with him for more than four months this year.

"These two guys were really great," he said. "They knew what they were doing. They got right in there doing things: tearing things apart, cleaning, putting things back together."

One week a vehicle engine broke down, providing an excellent opportunity for more in-depth instruction. Trevor Besson spent the whole week there, pulling the engine apart and putting in things like new pistons, liners, bearings and rings.

"At the end I had to evaluate them on attitude, thoroughness, skills and tardiness," Murcheson said. "I provided a list of what we

touched on, like steering and brakes.

"They got the idea you're there certain hours, things have to be done. It's not quite like school."

Another industry student has had a taste of radio broadcasting at CKKQ-FM radio in Victoria — known as "100.3 the Q" to rock fans.

"We try and give them an honest

look at a broad perspective of the industry," program director John Shields said of the work experience students. "They may think they are excited about broadcasting, and by spending some time here they find out 'Hey, I'd love to get into promotion or marketing.'

"That's what the program is for too."

said. "I think the success of education will be on building these linkages. It sounds corny but it's true. The sooner we break down those boundaries the better."

Career exploration has been going on for about 10 years now, and started at GISS with the agricultural program. Now there is the co-operative education program and five career preparation programs: graphic and performing arts, business, community recreation, humanitarian and technical education.

Last year there were 55 students in the program. Next year, Bergstrom is planning for 140.

# Trust will accept input till August 8

Preparation of the Islands Trust policy statement will proceed on a revised schedule, Trust council decided at its quarterly business meeting last week. More money was allocated for completion of the policy statement and public input is being encouraged until August 8.

Sustainable communities committee chair and Mayne Island trustee Larry Holbrook moved that a new, enlarged task force be struck from among trustees to complete draft three of the policy statement based on input received from the Trust council workshop and public information meetings and submissions. Salt Spring trustee Bob Andrew volunteered to join the task force, as did South Pender's Jane Perch, Lasqueti's Chris Ferris and Denman's Roxanna Aitken.

The policy statement will be given top priority on the Trust council agenda and was allocated a further \$15,000 from the council's operating contingency for meeting costs of the task force, technical assistance, public notification and printing of the draft.

Meanwhile, two Bowen Island residents addressed the council Friday afternoon with a petition by 265 residents asking that the policy statement be held up until the Bowen Island official community plan review (OCP) is finished.

Residents were concerned that the time and effort spent by many individuals on the community plan

would be negated by the policy statement, which will be completed before the OCP review. Bowen residents were also concerned that a policy statement public meeting was not scheduled for their island and had to be arranged upon demand and at the last minute. They want another opportunity to review the document before final submission to the ministry of municipal affairs.

For his part Bowen trustee Graeme Dinsdale said of the 75 to 100 people at the hastily scheduled policy statement meeting June 3, only two had not been involved in the OCP review and had not yet seen the policy statement draft document.

He also said that only one direct conflict had been seen between the policy statement and the community plan. It was with regard to sewage outfalls and could easily be clarified.

Trustee Janice McMillan pointed out to the Bowen delegation that if the policy statement were to wait until all OCPs were finished, it would be a very long time coming.

Draft three of the policy statement will be presented to Trust council in late September.

On October 29 and 30 a special meeting of the council will determine whether to send the third draft to the minister of municipal affairs for approval.

# 62 applications keep Trust busy

While many islanders kick off their shoes and prepare for a laid-back summer, Islands Trust officials have no such luck. There are currently more than 62 applications for rezoning, development permit variances, private moorage referrals and subdivision approval working their way through the land-use planning process on Salt Spring Island.

Some applications have been waiting a long time, like the five-lot subdivision at Cape Keppel which was initiated January 13, 1989. Another dozen have been outstanding since November 1992. But the bulk of the applications were initiated in March, April and May this year with the last three days of March seeing a small flurry of applications.

On March 29, 30 and 31, five rezoning applications were submitted, proposing a total of 92 new lots on the island, and four subdivision applications were submitted for 11 new lots. New, higher rezoning application fees starting April 1 may have prompted the wave of applications.

Of the 62 applications outstanding, four relate to agricultural land. One, on Booth Canal Road, seeks permission to remove land from the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) in order to rezone, subdivide and build houses. Two applications seek to subdivide, but not remove, land within the ALR.

Another application, concerning land for the liquid waste disposal site in Burgoyne Valley, is for non-farm use of agricultural land. These four referrals from the Agricultural Land Commission were approved by local trustees June 15.

The 62 applications currently on the Islands Trust books would lead to nearly 300 new lots on the island — more than 100 from subdivision applications and nearly 200 from

rezoning applications.

In land-use planning terms, subdivision applications seek to divide land according to allowable minimum parcel sizes dictated by Salt Spring zoning bylaws. For instance, one home is allowed per 20 acres in the Upland and Forest zone; eight mobile homes per acre in the Mobile Home Park zone.

Rezoning applications seek a change to current zoning, often to increase the number of lots possible for a given piece of land.

# 19-year volunteer fireman hired

Growth on Salt Spring Island and the extra demands placed on the fire department have prompted the fire protection district to hire an additional firefighter.

Island resident Erling Jorgensen will begin his new position Friday as Salt Spring's third full-time firefighter. Jorgensen has been a volunteer firefighter for the past 19 years, giving him the experience required for the position.

"He's well qualified to fill the position as a full-time fireman," district chair Ben Martens said.

The increase in building on the island means extra work for the fire department in overseeing house numbering, doing inspections and handling the routine maintenance of fire hydrants.

The addition of a new fire hall at Central will also require additional manpower, he said.

## Commission to drop four lake accesses

After months of fruitless negotiations with local community groups and highways officials, the Salt Spring Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) has decided to abandon four lakefront beach accesses.

Safety and potential liability problems were the main reasons cited for the decision, made at the PRC meeting Monday.

The beaches, at Cusheon, Stowel, Blackburn and St. Mary lakes, are outside the jurisdiction of the PRC, administrator Tony Hume said. The properties are under the jurisdiction of the ministry of highways, which has not yet indicated any interest in maintaining them or being responsible for them as recreation areas.

The commission could no longer support spending taxpayers' money where it had no jurisdiction, and the liability risk was considered too great.

In addition, Hume said, "The over-riding concern is that the locations are simply unsafe and always will be unsafe."

The accesses all have portable toilets paid for by the PRC. Some have floats and some have docks. Stowel, Cusheon and St. Mary lake accesses are on busy main roads.

In April, a 10-point plan was adopted which listed a number of steps the commission could take to resolve lake access issues. By last week, the PRC had pursued as many avenues as it was able, to no satisfactory conclusion.

The PRC met with representatives of local water boards and the Water Preservation Society. While those organizations expressed sympathy with the wishes of locals to use the beaches, Hume said none of them would offer financial assistance to local community groups to pay for dock maintenance or portable toilet

costs. The idea of swimming in a potable water supply was against their mandate and they could not support it.

The ministry of highways would not support a seasonal reduction in speed limits for Cusheon Lake or Beaver Point roads near the beaches and a Capital Regional District (CRD) lawyer advised that the liability problem is severe. The CRD has removed all floats and docks that fell under its jurisdiction elsewhere in the region.

"It's a disappointment to all of us sitting around the room," CRD director Julia Atkins said at Monday's meeting. "The growth rate of the past will continue and intensify the pressure on all these resources and demand an increasing sophistication in the way we manage them."

What was good 20 years ago, or even five years ago, she said, is no longer.

Local community groups have come forward from each of the affected areas, but will now be asked to take over complete control of the accesses or negotiate on their own behalf with the ministry of highways. Failing that, the toilets, docks and floats will be removed from the sites.

"If we are unable to find neighbourhood groups that are able to take over services," Hume said,

"we would have to withdraw."

Atkins said there was information available to local community groups about limited-liability societies and funding available through CRD grants.

An immediate on-site inspection of public facilities at each of the four lake accesses will be carried out by commission members in

conjunction with members of local community groups interested in taking over responsibility for them.

## Trading Co. ends 81 years of service

Gulf Island Trading Company closed its doors last Wednesday, after 21 years of business in downtown Ganges. The closure marks the end of 81 years of produce and grocery businesses at the site.

The building at the corner of McPhillips Avenue and Lower Ganges Road went up in 1912, built by a group of islanders who banded together in friendly competition with the Mouat Brothers store down the road.

Henry Bullock, Frank Speed and the Scott brothers incorporated the Salt Spring Island Trading Company Limited, as it was then called. It has remained almost the

same as it was in 1912, except for additions on the north side and the closing in of the veranda on McPhillips Avenue.

Grant and Binda Carignan bought the grocery store in 1972, shutting it down 21 years to the day after they opened. While the Carignans now make their home in Victoria, other Trading Co. staff have been hired by Thrifty Foods.

The new Thrifty Foods store, under construction at the corner of Purvis and Lower Ganges roads, is expected to open July 7.

The Trading Co. building is owned by Mouat's, who have plans to renovate it so it appears as it did in 1912.

## Skateboard site lease agreed on at \$1 a year

An agreement has been reached between Leon Aptekmann and the Capital Regional District for a skateboarding facility in Ganges.

Aptekmann, owner of the vacant lot at the corner of McPhillips and Jackson avenues, where Luigi's patio used to be, has agreed to lease the property to the regional district for \$1 per year for the purpose of allowing skateboarding.

"The youth loved it," Parks and Recreation Commission program director Ross Huff said this week. "But it does need some resurfacing."

"Twenty youths are very interested though many more will come on side when there's a place to go."

The skateboarders have formed an executive with a parental co-signer to open a bank account. They

will now start raising the \$2,300 needed to resurface a portion of the lot.

# Site profiles, biosphere reserve among topics

The provincial government is bringing in legislation to require contamination studies as part of the local development application process. Bill 26, the Waste Management Act, adds a new pre-conditional check to require site profiles to be completed on property that is developed.

Regulations concerning how site profiles are to be carried out, who pays for it, which properties are exempted and how contaminated properties might be cleaned up are to come in early 1994.

At its business meeting last

week, the Islands Trust council decided it wants input in setting up the regulations and recommended a letter be sent to the waste management branch.

In other council business:

- The concept of a biosphere reserve designation for the Islands Trust area was put on hold. The biosphere reserve depends on the establishment of various core or protected areas within the Trust area, Lasqueti trustee Janice McMillan said.

"It would be wiser to put our energies into co-ordinating with various agencies to protect areas

and not pursue at this time the idea of a biosphere reserve."

The lack of protected areas currently in the Trust area and the time and money required to create or map them were cited as reasons for deferring a decision until the conservation strategy has been completed.

- Trust council considered amendments to the local Trust committee meetings procedures model bylaw. All members of a local Trust committee should be given 48 hours' notice of special meetings.

Trustees also voted to take out

the clause which specifies that the chair of the local Trust committee must be addressed as Mr. Chairperson or Madam Chairperson.

The bylaw would only act as a guide to local Trust committees, which are free to adopt or amend the procedures bylaw as desired.

- Trust council requested the federal minister of the environment to close all ocean dumping sites in the marine waters of the Georgia basin. Marine water quality has been identified as a critical requirement for the protection of the environment and the dumping of material pollutes those waters. The provincial minister of the environment was asked to support the request.

- Trust council instructed the executive committee to write to the federal minister of parks urging the acquisition of Jedediah Island as a national park. The island, near Lasqueti Island, is currently for sale, Lasqueti trustee Janice McMillan said, and the owner is willing to sell the land to the government as a park for considerably less than the residential market value.

- Trust council recommended the Union of British Columbia Municipalities develop a common, practical policy with other levels of government on boat holding tanks, bilge pumpouts and safe onshore storage and disposal facilities for same.

## Council debates possible Trust Act amendments

In anticipation that the Islands Trust Act may be amended early next year, the Islands Trust council last week debated a list of ideas for amendments to the legislation. A list of 15 broad topics and some 33 more specific areas was drawn up.

"We are trying to get the minister to deal with the problem," Islands Trust executive director Gordon McIntosh said. "Between now and next March we will be looking at solutions."

"The ministry is asking, 'What do you need to fix the current legislation for? Don't ask to add new elements. Tell me where you're

having problems with the Islands Trust Act.'

"We need to say, 'Here are the areas; here are the key themes.'"

The key themes identified were: clearer definitions with regard to local Trust committee, Trust council and Trust Fund board functions and authority; providing the possibility of expanding the executive committee from the present membership of three; clarifying how municipal incorporation within the Trust would work within the framework of the Islands Trust Act.

More specifically, the Trust would like, among others, greater

co-operation with regional districts over issuance of building permits, a procedure for adding or deleting islands in the Trust, provision for dedication of access to water and trails, the ability to allow forestry as a land use, clarification of budgetary authority of Trust council with regard to local Trust committees, clarification of liability exposure for not enforcing bylaws, capacity to increase numbers of trustees on the executive committee, and ability to allow the Trust Fund board to accept cash-in-lieu from parkland dedications, rather than regional districts.

## Events planned to mark Canada Day

Several events will take place in the islands this week in conjunction with Canada Day tomorrow (Thursday).

The annual lamb barbecue will be held Canada Day at Winter Cove Marine Park at Saturna Island. Serving will begin at 2 p.m.

On North Galiano, the annual Jamboree will also take place on Canada Day, July 1.

Salt Spring Island residents and visitors will have an opportunity to make a donation to the Lady Minto Hospital Foundation and do some sightseeing at the same time. Hanna's Air Salt Spring will offer scenic flights on Thursday, with proceeds (less fuel costs) going to the foundation.

On Sunday, musicians and storytellers will gather at the market adjacent to the Harbour House for a Canada Day party. Vendors from both island markets are also invited to join the party.

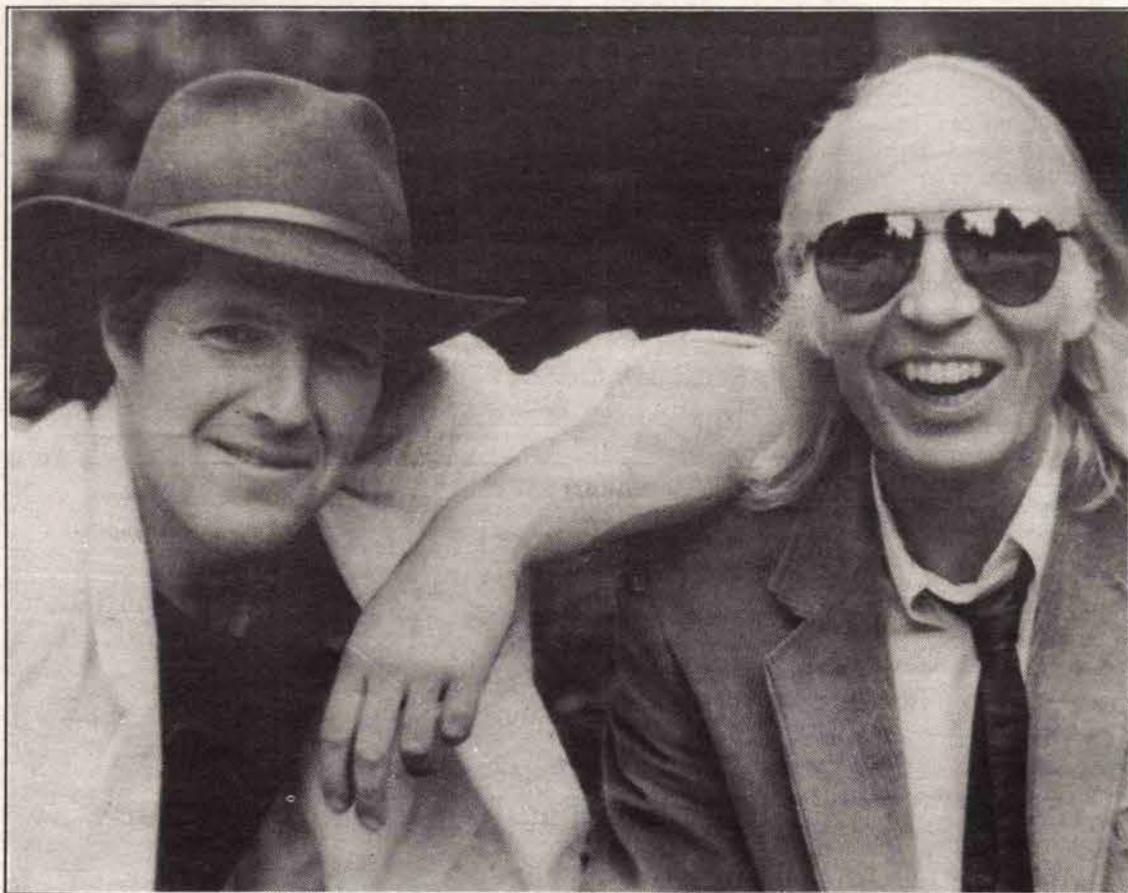

# Music, dance open festival

Salt Spring's Festival of the Arts is set to begin this weekend with dance and musical performances.

Turnagain Dance Collective will present an evening of dance Saturday and Sunday with their production, *Take Back the Body*. It will feature a series of pieces by members of the collective, formed in 1989.

Mike Krayenhoff will present *Barbie*, which deals with society's attitude toward the body image. "Advertising — the stereotypes or model images that we live with —

affect how we view ourselves," Krayenhoff said in a press release. "From body-building to Barbie and Ken, and the perfection of the prima ballerina, we develop dissatisfaction with what we see in our own mirrors. *Take Back the Body* for me is the acceptance of and ability to enjoy my body in whatever shape it is."

For her, to "take back the body" means to take control of our lives and not be afraid to direct the course we want to take.

Yarrow Sheehan takes back the body through evaluating and dealing with interpersonal relationships in her dance piece. Through movement, she shows the struggle felt when one is unconnected or isolated from others and the peace that can be obtained when taking back the body and resolving the situation.

## Five years ago

June 29, 1988

• Gulf Island Secondary School graduate David Jacquest walked away from the graduation ceremonies with \$19,000 in scholarships. After a number of offers from universities across the country — the University of Toronto to flew Jacquest to their campus to attract him — he took up Simon Fraser University's offer of a \$14,000 scholarship. In addition, he received a prestigious \$5,000 premier's award.

• The ink used by Island Publishers, who print the *Driftwood*, was switched from a petroleum-

based to one based on biodegradable soybean oil. The manufacturer, Sun Chemical Canada, said the product is odourless and completely non-hazardous.

• Islands Trust chairman Nick Gilbert advised four members of the Advisory Planning Commission (APC) not to be concerned about calls for their resignations. The members, who belong to the Island Watch Society, were accused of being in a conflict of interest as members of the APC. The APC is made up of members of various local interest groups and Island Watch, Gilbert said, supports the mandate of the Trust.

## Ten years ago

June 29, 1983

• Embezzlement was suspected in the loss of an estimated \$39,000 at Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care Society. RCMP commercial crime officers from Victoria were called in to investigate the situation at Greenwood's. Safeguards were instigated to prevent a recurrence.

• A passenger-only ferry demonstrated its abilities among the Gulf Islands for local newspeople and dignitaries, including MLA Hugh Curtis. The Vosper Hovermarine hovercraft went from Sidney to Port Washington on North Pender in about 20 minutes, from there to Ganges Harbour in 17 minutes and then back to Sidney in about 25 minutes. The ship was 60 feet long, accommodated 84 passengers and could travel at speeds of 34 knots. It was priced at \$2 million.

• Water users in the North Salt Spring Waterworks District were under sprinkling restrictions. Gardens could only be watered for two hours in the morning and two hours in the evening. Distribution problems from Maxwell Lake were blamed for the shortages. In addition, the low level of St. Mary Lake had been blamed for complaints of "offensive odours" emanating from that water.

## Twenty years ago

July 5, 1973

• Fulford was busy preparing for the third annual clambake in Drummond Park. Seafood, games and entertainment were being organized, including Scottish dancing and log-rolling.

• Water bombers doused a fire on Galiano Island attributed to careless hikers. The fire was in the deep woods at the head of Georgeson Bay. A smaller plane with a public address system warned people in the area to get out of the way of the bomber. The fire was put out with five passes.

ing — was built shortly after the second world war and served all the islands. In 1968 forest service staff were withdrawn from the island.

• Interest in Centennial Park in Ganges was very weak. Only six persons attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting at which trustees were named for the park fund. The flags at the cenotaph were taken down by persons unknown for the third time in a year.

• Community Gospel Church on Drake Road was packed and overflowing with congregation and visitors when it was officially opened. Rev. M.V. Gilpin introduced the various people who helped in the construction of the building. Rev. L.A. Pritchard of the Evangelistic Tabernacle of Vancouver officiated.

## Thirty years ago

July 4, 1963

• The *Queen of the Islands* arrived at Ganges dock on its maiden run between Tsawwassen and the Gulf Islands. The new vessel was 236 feet long, travelled at 12 knots and employed a crew of 12. The vessel carried 40 cars and 400 passengers.

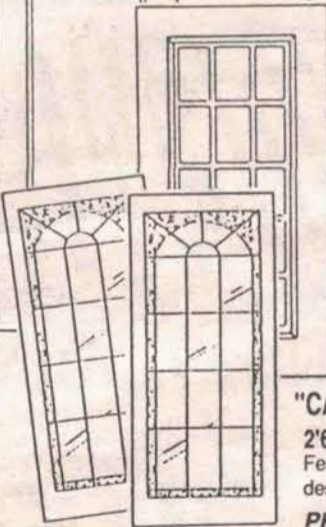

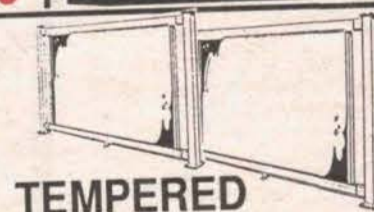
