Jordan-Knox reflects on her nine years at centre

Barbara Jordan-Knox turned her attention to the view from the window of her corner office, smiled and said, "Nostalgia time."

It's a view with which the director of the Salt Spring Community Society has become well acquainted, and it's probably one which has drawn her reflective gaze before.

But in her nine years at the helm of the island's social services agency, Jordan-Knox would not have had much time for nostalgic reflection. Until now, that is.

Next week she will vacate her office in the community centre on Ganges Hill, bid farewell to 50 staff and nearly 200 volunteers, and embark on a new career in government-community relations. Jordan-Knox has been hired by the Capital Regional District as community relations officer, a new position created by the region in March.

The holder of a Bachelor of Arts from the University of B.C. and a Masters of Social Work from the University of Calgary, Jordan-

Knox arrived on Salt Spring Island in 1984, just as the director's position at the community society came open.

Located as it is today in the old hospital building across from the RCMP station, the community society was a smaller operation in those days. While it offered fewer programs then, there has been a significant increase in the population in the past nine years.

That means there are "a lot more

"state-of-the-art" depot. The society's counselling service is another.

"It offers a better continuum of service," for people with both long and short-term counselling needs. Jordan-Knox will feel very good about the society's affordable housing project, if it's approved. The proposal to construct housing on Ganges Hill property owned by the Catholic church has received rezoning but is still awaiting funding approval.

Over the years there has been some skepticism about the community society and its role on the island. Modelled after the community resource boards of Dave Barrett's NDP government of 1972-75, the society was long regarded by many as a fringe organization, a child of the welfare state.

That view has changed, Jordan-Knox feels. "A broader cross-section of the population feels that the community society provides a valuable service to the community."

She points out that a wide range of people utilize its services and offers the recycle program as an example. Moreover, the board of directors itself is a cross-section of the population, and ensures that a broad spectrum of views and interests is represented.

"The community society has been able to remain apolitical. That's really important because we're a service organization."

Those services are provided with the support of tax dollars from federal, provincial and regional governments. Funds are allocated to the different programs through contracts, most of which are year-to-year but some run up to three years in length. Local funding is obtained through the annual United Way campaign, but that brings in less than five per cent of the society's million-dollar budget.

It is the contracts that keep the society going and it's the director who must ensure their completion

bodies in and out" of the building, says Marg Simons, who was acting director of the society when Jordan-Knox arrived on the scene. She recalled that every one of the society's programs ran independently.

"It became quite unmanageable." Another headache was the building and the attention it demanded.

Today the community society operates with well defined teams which focus on the different types of program the society offers: community services, recycling, youth, developmentally handicapped and others.

And the building has undergone improvements to the tune of \$60,000, the amount of a matched-funding heritage grant from the provincial government.

So what is it that evokes nostalgia for Jordan-Knox? A question about her achievements of the past nine years.

"There are quite a few I feel really good about." The recycle program is certainly one of them, she says, citing the efficiently-run,

had grown up together it took time to break into the school environment.

But that changed with time and Rekha now finds it difficult to say goodbye to many good friends.

Her year on Salt Spring Island was not her first experience of life in North America. Her family lived in the United States for a few years, and Rekha went to school at an early age in Cincinnati. But this was her first time away from home.

Among the highlights of her stay, however, were the "supportive host families" with whom she lived on the island.

During the course of an exchange student's stay, three or four Rotary Club members and their families will host the visitor.

Rekha's first home was that of Mike Marshall and his family, as the exchange was a direct one.

That is, David Marshall travelled to Hyderabad as an exchange student from Salt Spring (*Driftwood*,

to the satisfaction of funding agencies, and their subsequent renewal. This is an area that occupies about 40 per cent of Jordan-Knox's time. But it is not one that will suffer following her departure, she adds, though some observers credit her with the organization's financial stability.

Keeping those contracts, she says, is a case of ensuring quality — making sure that programs are run well.

Jordan-Knox is obviously good at it because the society has not lost a contract during her nine-year tenure. She agrees that funding on this basis is somewhat tenuous: "We could lose one at any time."

Her job and the society's operation would be simplified through global budgeting, she says, where instead of operating under eight or

nine different contracts, the society would be given a single block of money.

Jordan-Knox offers two issues that represent significant challenges for the society in the near future. The first is affordable housing, an issue she sees as becoming extremely critical.

The second is in the possible restructuring of health services, and how the community society interfaces with the new structure. Among the models under consideration is a health council that would be responsible for all health services on the island, from Lady Minto Hospital and Greenwoods, to Meals on Wheels and the community society.

She will look at own country with new eyes

It was about fall fair time last year when the honeymoon ended, and Rotary exchange student Rekha Rao became "the biggest grouch on Salt Spring Island."

But the 17-year-old from Hyderabad, India, showed no signs of grouchiness last week. In fact, the ending of the honeymoon — six weeks after her arrival in Canada — was simply one of the signs of culture shock, a normal reaction to being transplanted into a different country and culture.

It didn't help Rekha that it took some time for her to get to know her fellow students at Gulf Islands Secondary School, where she studied grade 12 during the past year.

"School was initially not what I had expected," she said in an interview. Because many students

June 23) and stayed for a while with Rekha's family.

The Gulf Islands Secondary graduation ceremony was another high point for Rekha, particularly because of its novelty.

She found the school system different in that grades 11 and 12 in India — known as junior college — are very academically-oriented.

The courses you take are specific to your career goals, she said.

Rekha found that other interests could be pursued in school here, such as drama. "Working in drama was really good. I'd like to take up a bit of theatre when I get back."

But the pressure of school will also be on when she gets back. Rekha begins university within days of her return, and has chosen the humanities as her field of

study: history, English, political science and — as a second language — Sanskrit.

Like Latin, Rekha explained, Sanskrit is a dying language but is the root of many Indian languages.

Rekha's career plans are not firm, but the Indian foreign service is appealing, as is journalism. "I love travelling and interacting with people."

She vowed that she would see more of her own country too, being a little embarrassed that David Marshall had seen more of India than she had.

Rekha will see her country and culture "with new eyes" as a result of the exchange experience.

"The exchange gives you a chance to become independent and get out of your protected environment. It makes you grow up a lot."

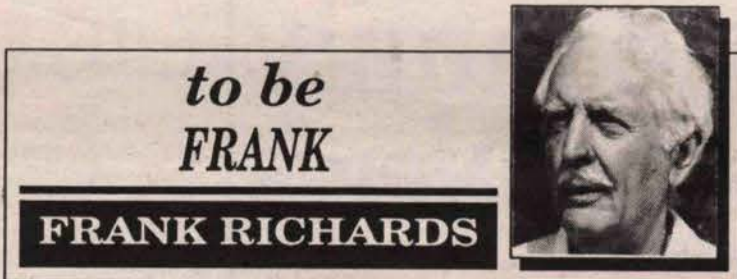
The language is changing here just as it does in Britain. While the evidence of such estuarism has not shown itself in British Columbia we are seeing our own little changes.

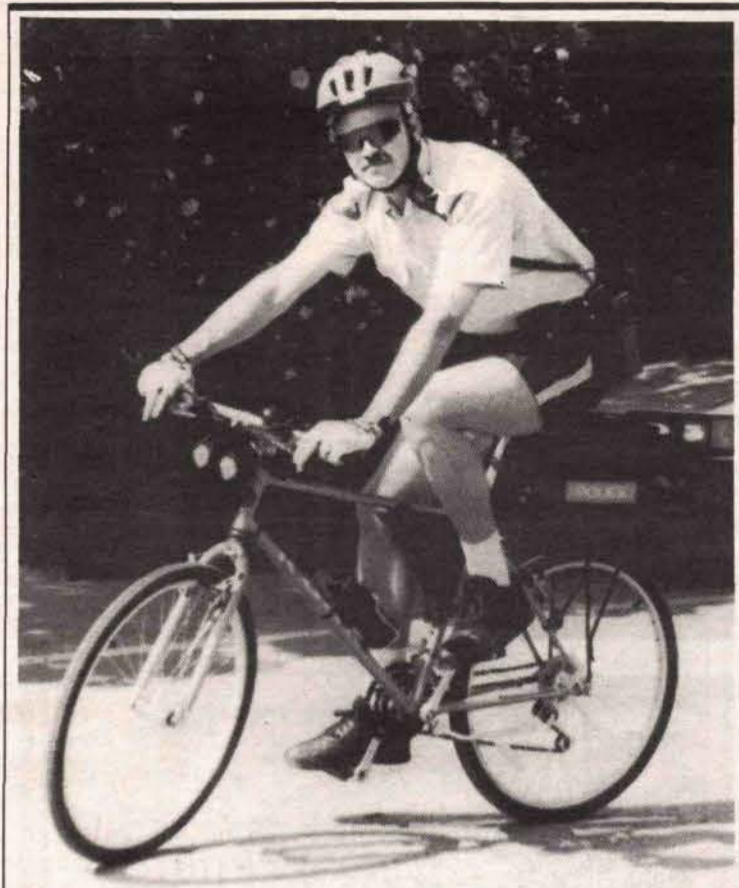

Big Brothers closing in on funding target

A group of Salt Spring Islanders is almost two-thirds of the way to their target for launching a Big Brothers/Sisters program here.

Diane Jonas, who has been elected to the board of the Victoria branch of Big Brothers/Sisters, says another \$7,000 is needed to help fund the first two years of operation.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters, she says, is one of the most cost-effective and successful methods of intervention for children at risk. "It is grounded in the belief that prevention is by far the best way to solve problems of alienation of youth. A caring big brother or sister may make all the difference by providing the direction and support which can supply a child with the self-esteem to enable him or her to develop into a productive member of society."

In addition to financial donations, the group is looking for

volunteer workers and people to be big brothers and sisters.

Once the money has been raised, the local group will be directed from the Victoria branch for the first two years, with staff attending here weekly to facilitate the program. Jonas, Tony McEwan and Tony Hume are local representatives.

Cross currents

I don't know many Christians who would suggest they don't want to see a revival. But often it's a revival that suits us. One that won't upset our time schedule. And definitely, one that won't be an embarrassment.

"I would love to see a revival, as long as it doesn't turn fanatical." It seems emotion is good for just

about anything but religion. A tinge of emotion in religion and the charge of "emotional outburst" is heralded.

Or, "These revivalists preach too long." Someone once commented on how long a sermon should be: "If it speaks to the heart, then one hour is not too long, but if it only addresses the head, five minutes is too long."

And what about preaching that

deals with judgement? "I would love a revival as long as they keep off that theme." Finney wrote that when he opened his heart and preached judgement for every evil and sinful way, warning of judgement to come, God broke through and revival broke out!

A lot of people don't like revival preaching because it's not status quo, it doesn't teach. Teaching is meant to appeal to the intellect. But God must be understood and loved in the heart before He can be loved and understood in the mind. Revival appeals to the heart of man, calling him to repentance, to love and restoration.

Revival leaves no place for mere human intellectual persuasion and understanding. It brings people face to face with God who says: "Come now, let us reason together."

And so it is. Not everyone who talks about revival necessarily wants to pray for one. But when revival comes it will sweep many into the Kingdom, bringing them to Mount Zion in humility and worship.

Island peacekeeper finds war's destruction in Croatia

It is hard to imagine what life is like in a war-torn country until you have actually been there. But a Gulf Islander working in Croatia as a United Nations peacekeeper is experiencing that life first hand.

In a recent letter from Croatia, Lisette Wilks outlined her duties in the former Yugoslavia and offered some personal insight into the destruction she sees every day.

Originally from Mayne Island, Wilks has been in Croatia since April and will spend a total of six months there.

She and her platoon are living in what used to be an old schoolhouse in a small town called Bijela, where the population is mostly Serbs.

One of her duties is to patrol door-to-door with her platoon and with the aid of an interpreter, talk with the locals.

"It is very eye-opening to go into these people's homes, hear their stories," she writes, "and we try to help them with whatever means we can."

"We do not have the manpower, supplies or time to act as sufficient relief, but a loaf of bread, some fruit, water, or even a truckload of chopped wood makes a huge difference."

Wilks says that many people require medical attention, while others are just looking for a chance to talk. However, the important fact still remains: the reason the UN peacekeepers must talk with the people is to seek information about armed soldiers who may be in the area.

Wilks' platoon is in charge of a large portion of the eastern border of the UN-protected area and Serbian and Croatian troops are on the other side.

Wilks says it is relatively safe for both the locals and the peacekeepers. But everywhere she looks she sees the destruction of war.

"Towns and roads are filled with blown-up and shot-up homes, buildings, monuments and cars. As the war passed through these villages, many people fled, leaving everything behind."

The brave people who returned to their homes are the ones the peacekeepers are there to protect. Wilks described a visit to the home of an elderly couple who told stories of the town's destruction by war.

When the town was shelled and mortared, they recalled, the residents fled into the streets and were rounded up by soldiers. Men, women and children were raped and murdered here.

While patrolling through this town called Gornji Borki, Wilks says, they still see the images in their minds. What used to be the backyard of someone's home is now a mass graveyard, filled with old wooden crosses.

By meeting with the residents, the peacekeepers learn vital information about Serbian soldiers who are violating UN laws by being in the area.

A war between races is impossible to understand when you are on the outside, but for the people living it, it is even worse. Wilks writes the comments of an 87-year-old woman she has met, and her opinion on the confusion. "World War II was terrible, but at least we knew who the enemy was. This war was about religion and that never made any sense to me."

In their first week in Croatia the peacekeepers learned first hand

about land mines. One of their tanks drove over an anti-tank mine but luckily nobody was seriously

hurt. The mines are everywhere, but many are marked with various objects.

From land mines to live fire, Wilks and her platoon have experienced a lot. She describes a time when the troops were preparing their defensive in trenches located near a Serbian position about three kilometres from the Bosnian border. Some soldiers shot near the peacekeepers to scare them.

"All we did was replace our ball caps with helmets, cock our weapons, and put our flak vests back on. They don't shoot UN soldiers over here, they aren't that stupid."

After reading Wilks' 14-page letter, I have found a renewed appreciation for the country in which I live, and a realization that no matter how bad things may seem, we as Canadians are very fortunate.

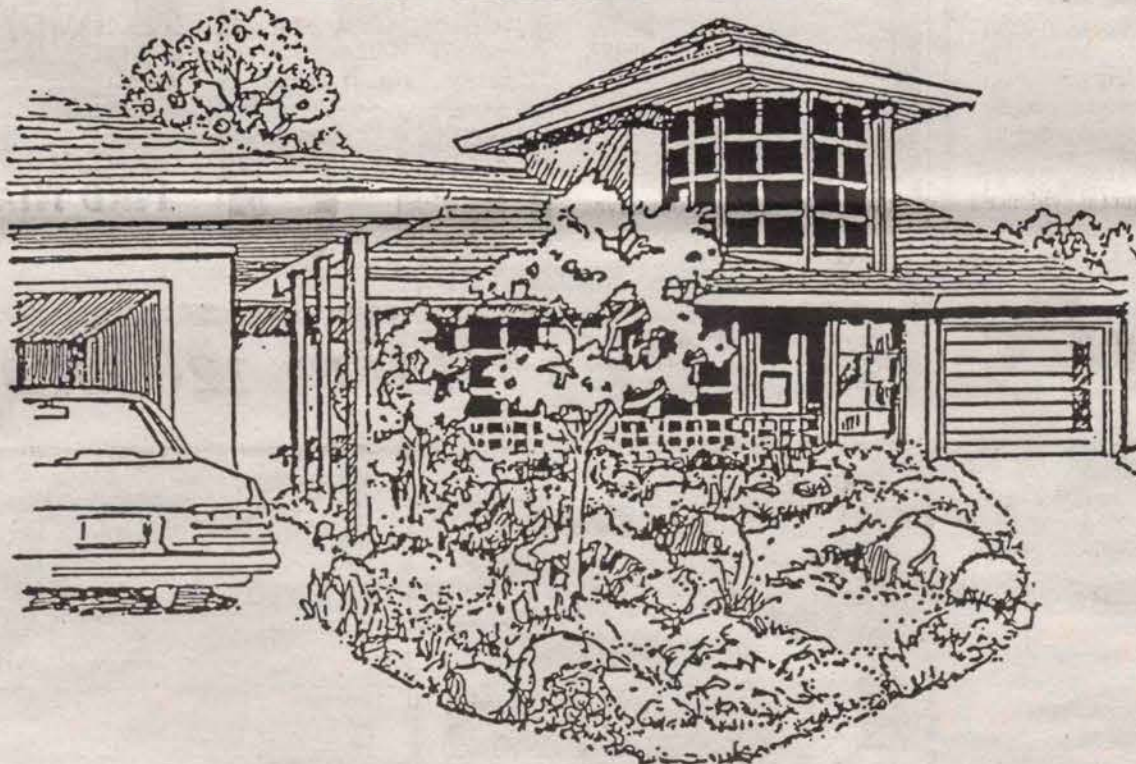

Book offers thoughts on father-son relationships

After hearing the tape of a lecture by Guy Corneau entitled *Absent Fathers, Lost Sons*, I bought the book which describes itself as the search for masculine identity.

While some are wondering about violence and crime among young people, this book puts forth a very credible reason for it.

It begins with Hubert Wallot, a physician and professor appearing before a parliamentary commission on mental health issues. He was wondering why the government had not established a council on the status of men.

He outlined the precarious condition of men's general health: during childhood and adolescence boys are more likely (than girls) to suffer from slow mental development, a short attention span due to hyperactivity, behaviour problems, stuttering, sleepwalking and nightmares and dyslexia.

In short, many men are looking for their fathers — and many of them are in need of help

As adults, men are more likely to have personality disorders related to paranoia and compulsive or anti-social behaviour (as evidenced by large numbers of them in prisons). Men also far outnumber women in frequency of transsexuality and sexual perversions. Four times as many men suffer from alcoholism and drug addiction as do women — three to one in suicides — five to one in longevity.

Dr. Wallot concludes that the frequent absence of the father or the masculine models for young male children "seems to explain certain behavioural difficulties connected with men's affirmation of their sexual identity."

In short, many men are looking for their fathers — and many of them are in need of help. Corneau organized a group of 21 men for a one-day workshop. These included fathers, married and divorced men, bachelors, gay men, a punk, a cook, a decorator, an accountant, artists, welfare recipients, therapists, civil servants, and teachers. The question of the day was, "Do you feel like a man?"

The summation of the experience came in the statement, "I do not know what a man is, and know even less what a man should be. Rather, I try to feel what he is and get to know him from inside. I try to let the man within emerge into the light."

Another revealed: "My father was afraid of discussing things with me because my values were too different from his. All he did was elicit my guilt with his silence. I sat there in my mother's chair waiting for my father to speak. I felt timid, tongue-tied; I was begging for confirmation of my manhood."

"My father's silence, though, commanded me to remain always a little boy, in awe of his reserve — which I mistook for strength."

The law of silence. Fathers are subject to a rule of silence that decrees that fathers who speak are a threat to male solidarity.

"Our fathers fled into the woods, or taverns or their work. They sought refuge in their cars, newspapers, TV programs. In the

past and in the present, men have succumbed to the powerful seduction of the mass media. Like a drug addiction, it lets them avoid speaking, avoid inhabiting their bodies, avoid entering into relationships.

In the United States, one in five children lives in a fatherless home, and 89 per cent of these families are headed by women. In Canada, one in seven lives in a fatherless family. In France, 1,700,000 children are living without fathers. These are figures indicating physical absence, but it is not known if fathers who are present are adequate or not.

Biologists affirm that at the embryonic stage we are all initially female: at the very beginning, the masculine characteristics cannot be detected. This suggests masculinity must be added by constant reinforcement. Dad must set limits to create a secure container for the child's harmonious development. He must not impose his opinions and decisions by hiding behind his mate: he must reveal his strengths and weaknesses and not be simply evasive, or worse stubbornly authoritarian.

Corneau encourages taking part in men's circles as this may act as a symbolic womb in which a second birth takes place — a masculine rebirth. Men can no longer get away with attributing to women a weakness that is actually their own. Emotion is part of all human beings.

The void left in us by our missing fathers itself gives us the opportunity to become men — on condition we stop our eternal complaining and provide ourselves with the care and attention we never received from our fathers.

He concludes: "It is difficult to forgive our fathers, yet most of the time they did what they could. They protected us, many of them were good breadwinners. Still they were

not available to talk to us and guide us."

It is also a fact that they had absent fathers, and how far back should we go to assign blame.

"It is not fathers and mothers that I judge in this book — it is the silence that envelops us all. The role of sons now is to break through this silence finally."

"The soul of the world always goes into hiding wherever there is trouble and disorders: this hidden soul is tormenting men today. More than ever before, we are sitting in the hot seat of change."

Permaculture is more than just agriculture

Farmers, foresters and builders gathered Friday for a whole day of seminars, slides, songs and even a bit of mulching as part of a Salt Spring Island permaculture workshop.

The term permaculture is derived from the idea of a permanent, sustainable agriculture and culture. It was coined more than 15 years ago by an Australian named Bill Mollison.

"A lot of people think permaculture is organic gardening or balcony gardening," instructor Michael Pilarski said. "Permaculture means housing systems, energy systems, forestry systems, but most of all how to put them together so they work."

"It's not about wilderness. It is not just about agriculture. It is the design of sustainable human habitats."

"The word design is crucial," permaculturist and Sunshine Coast homesteader Peter Light said. "Permaculture is designed agriculture and we are looking at nature as one design method."

"All of the needs of the system are provided by the system. That's the ideal. I think it can be achieved."

"Once you have the principles,

It's the design of sustainable human habitats

you can apply them anywhere: a balcony in New York or a desert in Botswana."

Permaculture is first and foremost about looking after yourself in your own community. If a community can be made self-sufficient in all its needs — food, shelter, water — the surplus will follow.

'An organic farmer wants to reform the agricultural system,' Pilarski said. 'A permaculturalist wants to reform everything.'

"We think way into the future," Pilarski said, "at least we try to. Productivity — what can I sell, eat, use — goes up over time. There's another kind of productivity — nature's productivity. The biomass increases over time; there is more and more species diversity."

Pilarski said permaculture homesteads are different from small farms because of the way

they are designed. Permaculture sites are designed around production, aesthetics, healing and health and ease and proximity of access.

"An organic farmer wants to reform the agricultural system," Pilarski said. "A permaculturalist wants to reform everything."

Plants, animals, insects, humans and buildings have symbiotic relationships that must be studied and utilized. Everything in the permaculture ecosystem helps one another. Everything has a multiple purpose.

Perennials are chosen over annuals. Plants are arranged in mini-ecosystems, not acre-long rows. Trees and tall shrubs shelter smaller plants that need shade. Herb borders provide a medicinal and culinary crop and serve as an insect buffer between wild ground and garden. Vines grown over buildings keep them cool.

Part of permaculture is knowing what plants can co-exist with each other. Certain trees and plants do not grow well together; others do. Maximizing productivity depends on knowing these sorts of symbiotic relationships.

Pilarski said design concepts which are used in permaculture in-

there was an over-abundance of knapweed. Rather than see it as a problem, Pilarski discovered knapweed is an excellent source for honey, paper and compressed fuel.

20 years for Meals on Wheels

For some members of the community preparing meals is a difficult task but thanks to local volunteers, hot meals are delivered right to their door.

Meals on Wheels celebrates its 20th anniversary this year — 20 years of assisting people who are unable to cook for themselves by providing a hot nutritious meal.

Three times a week, a lunch consisting of a hot entree and a dessert are delivered to their door by

volunteer drivers.

Although the service is available for anybody who requires it, Meals on Wheels coordinator Corinne Cordoni said it's mostly elderly people on Salt Spring who use it.

Meals on Wheels operates as part of the Salt Spring Island Home Support Services, which is designed to assist individuals and families in their own homes.

Cordoni said for some clients having a volunteer come to their home to deliver a meal is the only

form of social contact they may have.

To take advantage of the program, a client must be referred by a doctor, home support worker, or the head nurse at the hospital. There are currently 27 clients on Cordoni's list who pay \$3.75 for each meal, with 23 volunteer drivers signed up to help deliver the meals throughout the month.

Planning began for Meals on Wheels in 1973. A survey on the need for the service as well as written support from medical practitioners on the island landed a concerned group of citizens a start-up grant from the ministry of social services.

Meals were initially prepared at the Ganges Crest restaurant in early 1974. Not long after the meals were supplied to clients by Lady Minto Hospital. Two years later, the program was combined with the visiting homemakers program and began operating under the auspices of the Salt Spring Island Community Society where it remained for one year.

In January 1978, all homemaker services in the province came under the ministry of health. On Salt Spring, Margret Kaufman became supervisor for the homemaking services and also carried on as coordinator for the Meals on Wheels program.

Through the 1980s, Meals on Wheels saw a variety of changes. Donations from Branch 92 of the Royal Canadian Legion enabled the program to continue after government funding was reduced. Greenwoods looked after meal preparation for three years until the number of clients became more than they could handle.

Meals on Wheels tried a contract with a catering firm but it was not very successful, and in 1988 a new agreement was signed with Greenwoods, an agreement that continues to this day.

Government support for the Meals on Wheels program increased in 1990 when the ministry of health announced it would allocate a grant for funding per meal. Salt Spring now receives \$3,580 per year in government funding.

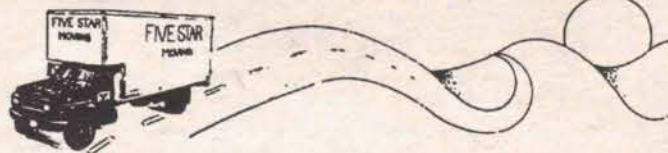

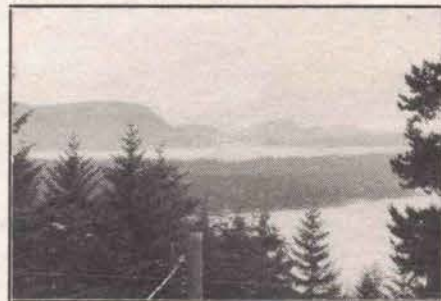

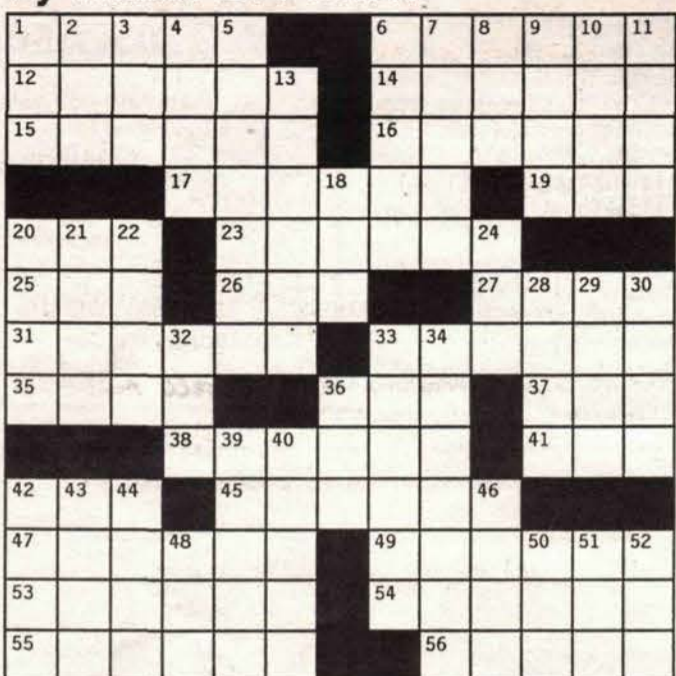

Witch is speaker Sunday at Beaver Pt.

Duke has obtained a full-time position with the B.C. Ambulance Service and will work in Vancouver.

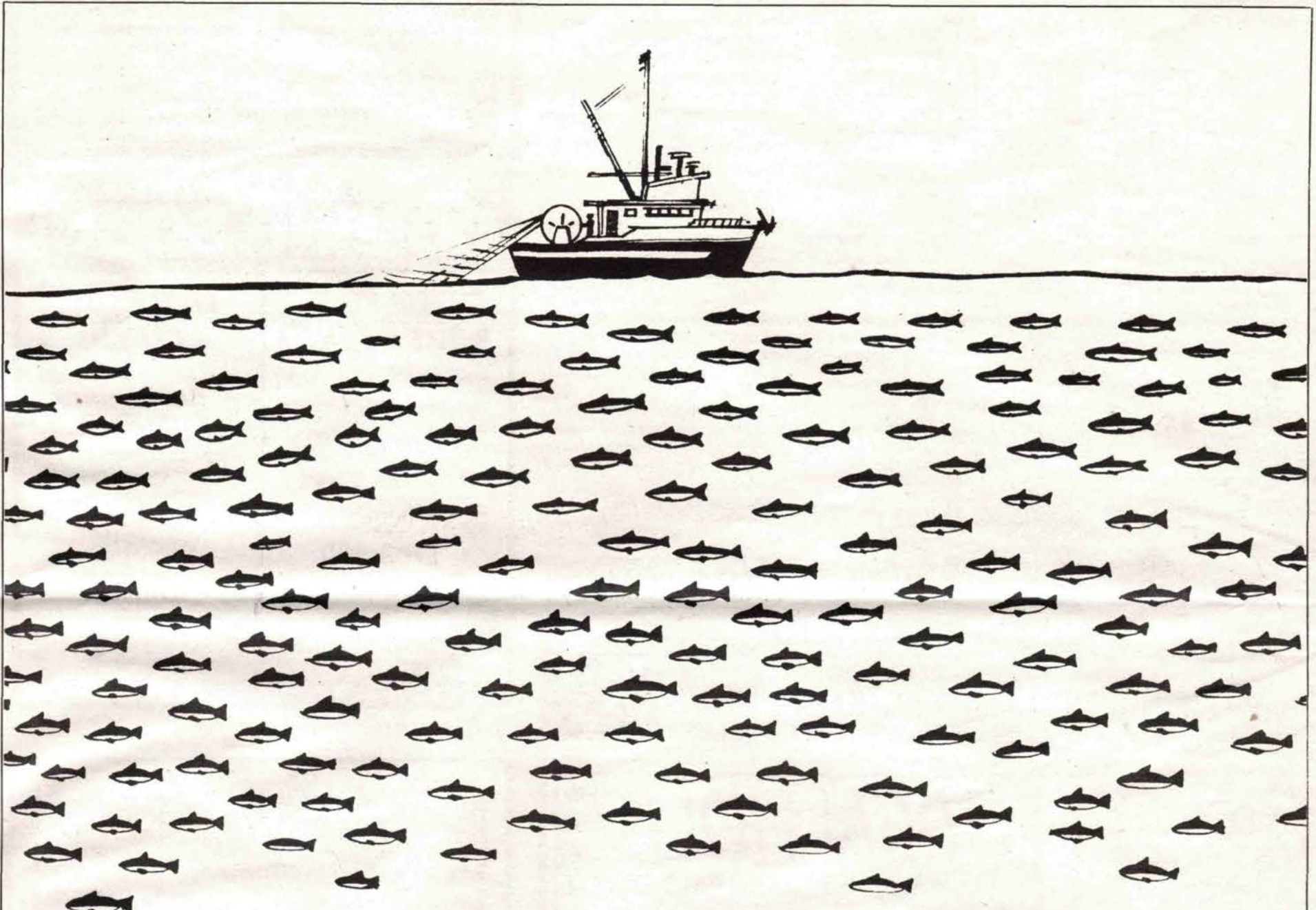
The occasion was a sad one but the barbecue was not when Ken Barnes was feted on his retirement. Barnes had worked with the ambulance service on the island for 14 years.

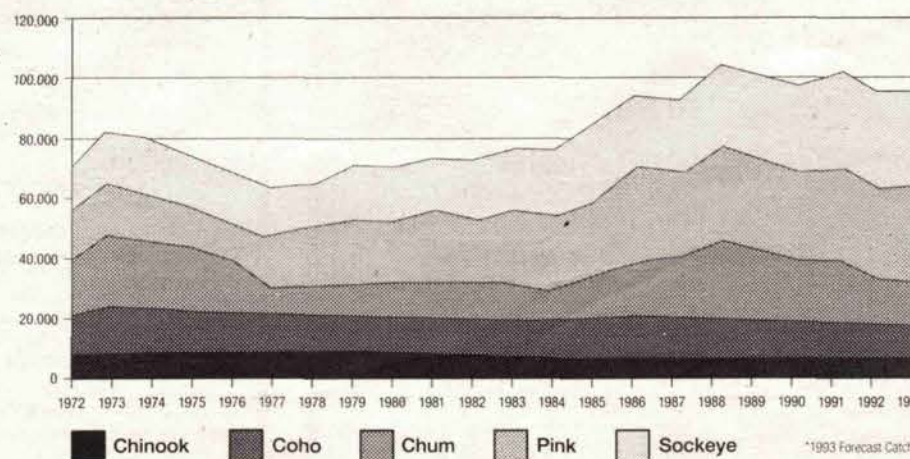

Jordan-Knox argues that that model, which would see all those services operate under one board of directors or trustees, doesn't allow for the different perspectives that community-based volunteers now take to the different organizations and their respective boards.

Under the one-board model, she says, "you are limited to the knowledge base, experience and energy of just one board of directors." Though Jordan-Knox agrees

that better coordination of services is important, she maintains that there's a wealth of resources in each of the island's health-related service organizations that would not be as readily available as now.

That wealth of resources — and a wealth of opportunities as well — is a community asset of which her successor must be aware.

Her advice to that person: "Be open to it and be yourself. Just be open to it."

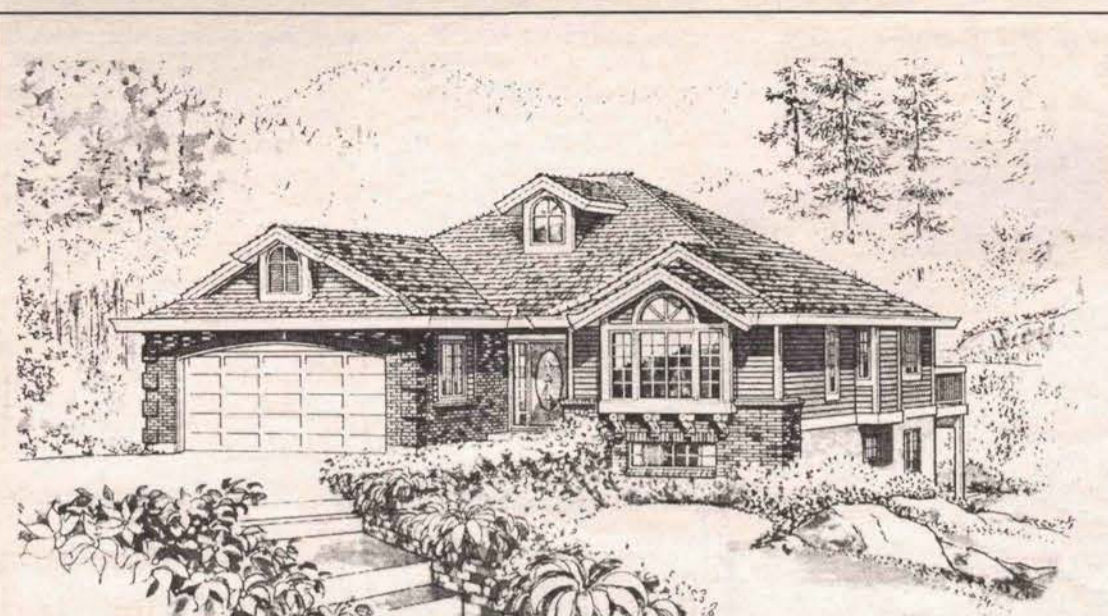

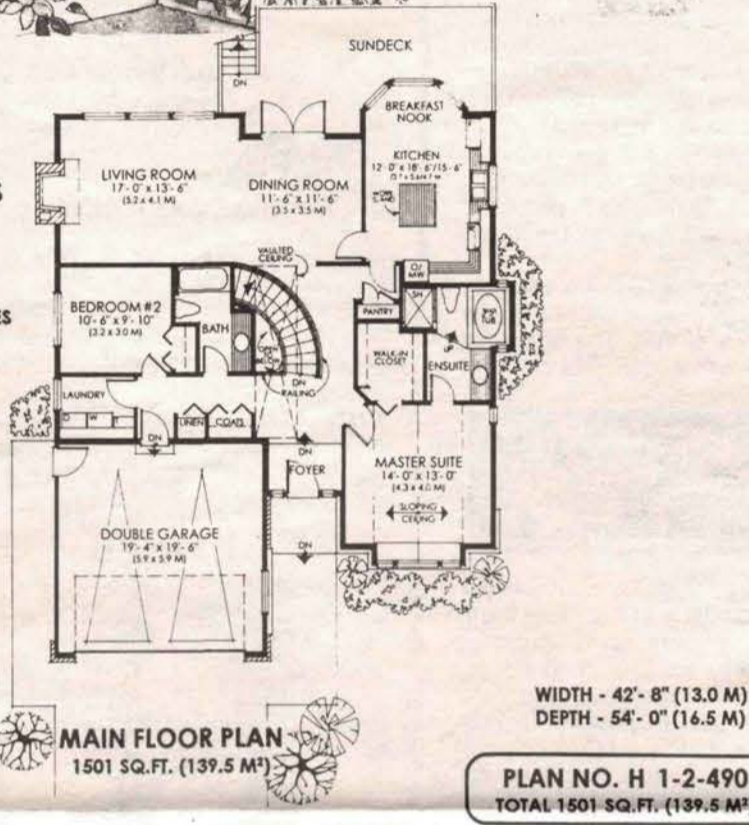

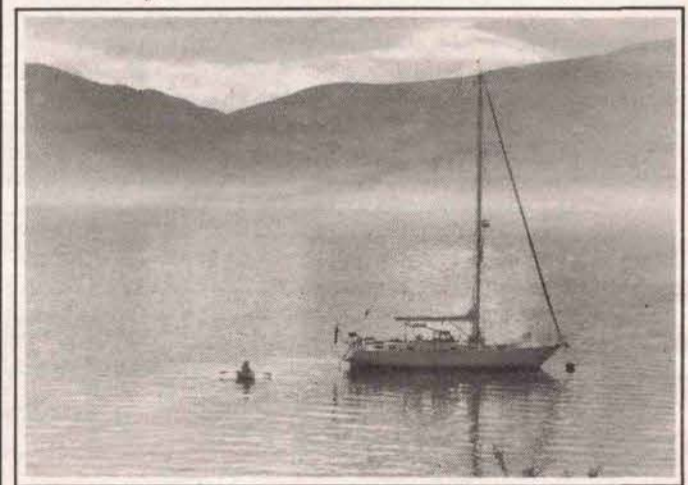

The quarterly meeting of the Saturna Community Club was held June 21 at the community hall. Several interesting items of business were covered during the meeting.

A motion was passed to officially close the community dump. Although the dump is on private property and has not been in use for several years, official procedures must be undertaken to return the land to its original state.

The maximum cost for these steps is estimated at \$20,000, although at least part of that amount can be made up of donated labour. John Gaines offered the use of his cat and dump truck for fuel costs. The recycling committee will organize any other volunteers. The actual costs will be announced at a meeting in September.

Al Sewell reported for the fire department. Application has been made to have the department run as a local improvement district. However, since we are part of the Capital Regional District (CRD), we must first accept or decline having the fire services operated by them.

An information meeting will be set for September. The question may be settled by a ballot in

November.

The Lions Club Building Society unveiled their plan to purchase land for future use. They have looked at several properties and will make a decision in the near future. The land will be held in trust as a building site for a recreation centre, library, and/or a new community hall.

Although the Lions are looking at land in a central location suitable for such a building, they will be flexible if needs change in the future. They feel that land is the best investment for this project.

Ruth Farrow stepped down as our representative to the Greenwoods long-term care facility after several years of faithful service. Laura Paul was acclaimed our new representative.

Jacques Campbell reported for the CRD that we will have one primary care nurse to serve all the island's needs. The new position was created by amalgamating existing nursing services into one position.

The change was requested by the community to have enough work to attract and keep a resident nurse. A minimum number of hours is needed to retain certification.

Although we have had excellent service in the past, the community felt it was important to have a nurse living on the island and therefore able to attend to emergencies. The new position will be posted in the near future.

A motion was made to allow Madeline Abbott to organize a weekend market at the hall this summer on an experimental basis. The market will be restricted to local merchandise and must be flexible to allow community functions to be held at the hall.

A donation was agreed upon to support the bursary fund. The club promised \$1,000 plus 10 per cent of the proceeds from the 1993 lamb barbecue.

The Crescent Beach Yacht Club is now the official host of Winter Cove Marine Park. This means that someone from the yacht club will

be present every weekend. The representatives will tie up to a permanent float and display a banner identifying who they are. They are supplied with uniforms and will do daily park patrols, and will be available to provide information and keep watch on the park.

B.C. Hydro has invited a member of the community to attend a

workshop on buried Hydro lines. If anyone would like to accept their offer and attend for the community call Pam Johnson for details.

Graham Clark from Harbour ferries wrote to thank the Community Club for their interest. He is continuing to work on a more detailed proposal for the Saturna ferry run.

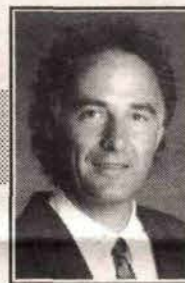

Chamber considers vision statement, goals

The Galiano Chamber of Commerce held a meeting recently to hear a report on what the group's goals should be in relation to life on the island today. A vision statement prepared for the meeting favoured "encouraging the highest standards and attracting the widest participation."

It went on to state "the Galiano Chamber of Commerce strives to create a vibrant business community working from an informed position and sensitive to island needs. We will strive for a more self-sufficient economy, consistent with the character of the island and harmonious with the Official Community Plan."

A number of chamber members have expressed concern with some aspects of the new Islands Trust Policy Statement, seeing it as restrictive for island businesses. The chamber welcomes comment on this from its members and from all who share these concerns.

The chamber's new visitors' brochure is now in circulation and has met with favourable comment from many. The group's tourist information booth is now open for the summer months. It is located near the Sturdies Bay ferry terminal.

Projects for which the chamber hopes to strike study groups and committees in the near future concern transportation and ferries, parks and recreation and community development. The group also hopes to establish a business file and directory.

Membership in the chamber now stands at 65, much higher than it has been for the past few years.

Patchworks presented

It was the privilege of the writer during the last week to present a copy of Gulf Islands Patchwork to each of the 16 youngsters about to complete their education at Galiano School. He did so as a Galiano member of the Gulf Islands Historical Federation. Others made presentations to graduating students on Pender, Mayne and Saturna Islands.

Patchwork is a collection of stories and reminiscences on pioneer life in the Gulf Islands,

written by the settlers themselves or by their descendants. The book was first published in 1961. Now in its seventh printing it is still available for sale at a number of stores on the islands.

A second volume, *More Tales from The Gulf Islands*, was published last year. It deals with the "second generation" of island settlement, and adds stories missed when the first volume was published last year.

Firemen attend simulated fire

Four Galiano volunteer firemen took part in a recent educational forest fire simulation staged on Vancouver Island for members of about two dozen community fire departments. Attending the one-day event from Galiano were three members of the South Galiano Volunteer Fire Department and one from the North.

According to one of those in attendance, the fire, which began in a "forested area", spread quickly towards a group of houses, the whole effect produced very realistically from the cab of a truck by technical means. The firemen attending the simulation were expected to react to what they saw on the screen, and very quickly as the effects of wind and the terrain aided in the development of the fire.

"It was all very realistic and very exciting to watch; we learned a great deal," according to Walter Roots, the North Galiano representative.

In a small community

As provincial health authorities try to do more for us with less, and with administration costs getting bigger and bigger as they attempt to do so, it is good to see a community need being solved in the old way.

We have had several examples of this being done here at North Galiano in recent weeks. A neighbour was confined to hospital for a length of time. Released, she arrived home to find a neighbour had arranged "meals on wheels" for a week or so until she was well enough to cope once more.

People can still be caring — political, religious, and ethnic

backgrounds don't mean a thing in the small rural community, and the services rendered by the volunteers cost the taxpayer nothing. Yes, there is something to be said for rural life.

Annual summer art show

The Galiano artists' summer invitational show is to be held in the south Galiano hall on the weekend of July 10 and 11, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. A preview will be held the previous evening, Friday, July 9, 6 to 9 p.m.

It is expected a great number of artists and craftspeople will exhibit their work at the sale.

Dandelion Gallery shows

A series of small feature shows by gallery members has been instituted once again at the Dandelion Gallery for the summer months. Each of the 15 members will in turn fill the allotted wall space with examples of their work: paintings, textiles, jewellery, etc.

Member Keith Holmes started off the series on June 18 with a collection of his recent acrylic paintings of local landscapes and garden scenes. On view until July 1 are works by Ingunn Templeman, followed by Brian Mitchell July 2-8.

Official Community Plan review

Displays of material relative to Galiano's revised community plan are to be on view to the public in the activity centre on Friday evening, July 9 (7:30 to 9 p.m.) and Saturday, July 10 (10:30 a.m. to noon).

Public meetings will be held on Saturday afternoon and Sunday for public input.

Islander in charge of Peace Bus 93

A Galiano Island resident is helping provide more than 1,000 young Canadians of different ethnic origins and faiths a chance to learn more about Canada's native people. The youths will visit native Canadian youths, live in native communities and learn about other cultures and religions in a nationwide project this summer.

Marks McAvity is the director of Peace Bus '93, a joint venture of two interfaith religious organizations, the World Inter-Faith Education Association (Canada) and the World Conference on Religion and Peace (Canada), which aim to bring together native and non-native Canadian youth.

Youths aged 16 to 25 can join one of two bus tours which originate from the east and west coasts, or they can participate in one or more individual camps hosted by native communities.

"Peace Bus '93 will demonstrate to all Canadians that young people can reach across cultural and community barriers to reach out to each other, develop respect and understanding and share personal experiences," McAvity says in a press release.

"We urge our young people to

join and take part in this valuable experience."

Base camps will begin simultaneously in British Columbia and Newfoundland July 1 to 5. B.C.'s camp will be held at Squamish First Nation.

Camps will run throughout the month of July across Canada. At the same time, two buses will travel through the provinces from the east and west coasts to the interior. The arrival time of the Peace Bus will coincide with the base camp scheduled for that province. Each camp is expected to have 100 to 120 participants.

The eastern and western halves of the project will converge in a special "Wanaki" finale at Golden Lake First Nation near Ottawa from July 26 to 29. Wanaki is an Algonquin word meaning "peaceful place."

Last summer, the World Conference on Religion and Peace organized Peace Bus 1992 for Quebec youths. "In the wake of the tensions after Oka during the summer of 1991, Peace Bus 1992 sought a spirit of healing and understanding," McAvity said. "Peace Bus '93 will extend the same spirit across the country."
