## Trust to appeal Galiano decision

The Galiano Island Trust committee is going back to court in its dispute with MacMillan Bloedel.

The Islands Trust announced last week it would appeal the B.C. Supreme Court decision which ruled in favour of the forestry company and struck down four Galiano land-use bylaws.

"Lawyers acting for the Islands Trust were requested to submit a motion of appeal today," Islands Trust executive director Gordon McIntosh said Friday.

"In ruling in favour of MacMillan Bloedel," an Islands Trust press release said Thursday, "Mr. Justice Paris acknowledged that the facts of the case were unusual because of the significant amount of land on Galiano owned by MacMillan Bloedel and appeared to accept that, as a matter of policy, the public should have some say in the use of these lands.

"Nevertheless, he also held that the Trust committee acted beyond its jurisdiction and on the basis of improper planning considerations.

"The Trust committee is especially concerned that the court's judgment failed to appreciate the particular mandate of the Islands Trust to preserve and protect the land within the Trust's jurisdiction, and the need to afford local government-wide latitude in matters of legislative policy.

"The Trust is also concerned about the implications of the judgment in other situations where local governments throughout British Columbia face proposals to develop land that has historically been held for forestry purposes."

The Galiano Trust committee has asked the Islands Trust executive committee to help to make a presentation to Trust council, which will be assessing the situation and determining a policy, McIntosh said.

The presentation and discussion will take place at the quarterly meeting scheduled for Salt Spring Island September 25.

The Union of British Columbia Municipalities is being asked for advice or aid, McIntosh said, and

## Raccoons havoc on gardens, cats

If you have noticed a proliferation of night-time raids on your garden, chickens or garbage, you are not alone. Over-population and a lack of natural food are bringing

raccoons into closer contact with Salt Spring Island residents than some would like.

"The other day (for) the very first time in all my 13 years I've lived here, there was one in front of the house," Beddis Road resident

Grace Barks said. And her cat, Pussit, got even closer.

"I was away one night. I left Pussit out. He had food to eat. When I came back I didn't notice anything wrong with him until I saw the great hunk of fur missing on his side.

"I think it was a raccoon," she said. "They are around here as they never were before. We've got to do something about it."

According to Howard Byron, the numbers are up. "The last couple of years, numbers have been on the high side." As Capital Regional District animal control officer, Byron gets most of the calls to take a cornered raccoon out of a garage or to deal with a chicken thief caught in a live trap.

"Overpopulation and lack of natural food" are to blame for increasing contact between raccoons

and residents. But he said residents should still be cautious when confronting raccoons.

"Don't fool around with these things," Byron said. "They have sharp teeth and good claws. If you corner them they can be dangerous. You shouldn't play around with them.

"A raccoon is a bit like a deer," he said. "When they're hungry they'll eat anything: fish, poultry, fruit, everything.

"They'll strip a plum tree overnight, and they'll do it the night before you've decided to pick them."

Byron suggests several possibilities for keeping raccoons out of harm's way. An electric fence makes a good deterrent, and stove pipe on tree trunks will keep them

## Trailer fire takes life of Salt Spring man

A fire in a house trailer at 229 Old Divide Road Sunday night claimed the life of a Salt Spring Island man.

Don Hamilton, 45, died in a blaze which fire department officials believe may have been caused by a cigarette.

The front half of the trailer was completely gutted by fire, and the rear half — where Hamilton was found — sustained heavy smoke damage. The structure was not equipped with smoke detectors, the fire department reported.

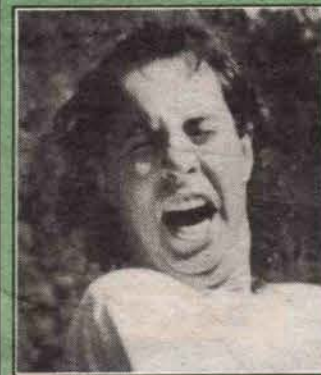

## Golfer scores hole in one windshield

Driving without due care and attention is a criminal offence under the Motor Vehicle Act—but only if you are driving a car. Driving golf balls does not count.

That was the lesson learned by a Salt Spring resident whose truck windshield was smashed by a golf ball Saturday.

"I thought somebody took a shot at me," Bill Luker said on Monday. "It blew all the glass off the inside and sprayed the side of the cab pretty well."

Luker was driving north on Lower Ganges Road about 11 a.m. Saturday when the accident occurred. He ducked behind the wheel and came to a stop. After seeing what had happened he went into the golf course and found a Victoria resident on the first hole who had lost his golf ball.

He took the man's phone number to get payment for the window, but discovered later the number had been disconnected. Luker's truck is not covered by comprehensive insurance so he is out of pocket to replace the window. That makes him angry.

"It's not the first time it's happened," he said, though this has never happened to him before. "There was quite a controversy a few years ago and then the golf club planted a row of poplars.

"It's an amazing unsafe situation. I just think something should be done."

But that something is left to individual golfers, said Gordon Fergusson, manager of the Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club.

"The person who actually did it is responsible for damage to the car," he said. Damage to vehicles on golf club premises in cases where the golf club is negligent is the responsibility of the club.

When asked whether netting along the road would resolve this kind of problem in the future, he said it would be too expensive.

"(Hole 1) exactly parallels the road. It's 515 to 520 yards long. To put a fence 40 to 50 feet high to run the whole length of that hole would cost a lot of money."

Local police said several people have reported being hit by golf balls along Lower Ganges Road this year. But damage of less than \$1,000 to a vehicle is a civil offence and they can do nothing about an accident of this nature.

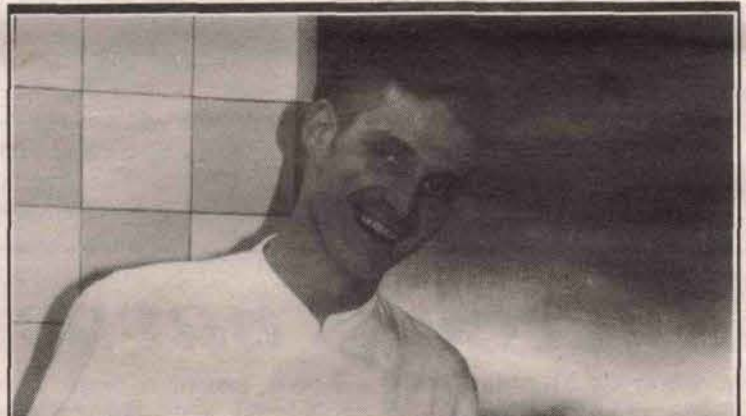

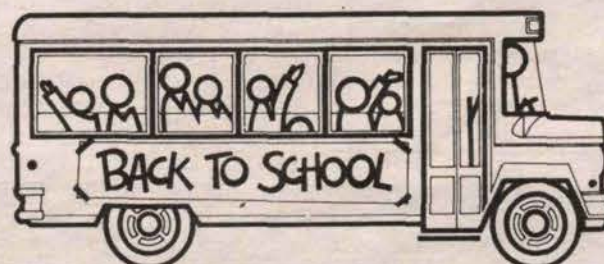
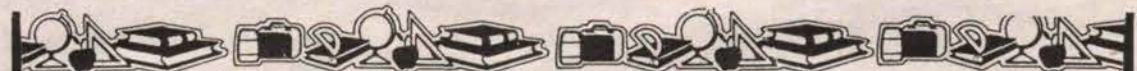

out of fruit trees. A dog helps keep raccoons away from the house. Most poultry farmers will already know all about raccoon-proofing. "Chicken wire is no good," Byron explained. "They'll bite that up like store string. People with poultry should keep them inside at night."

Byron does not recommend feeding raccoons. If you stop or

even go away for a while, the raccoon starts to look somewhere else in the neighbourhood for food and gets into trouble.

"A neighbour of mine lost every chicken she had to raccoons," Barkes said. "People should not make pets of them."

"There are all kinds of things to make pets out of without making them of raccoons."

## Three Tories in race for Saanich-Gulf Islands seat

Three candidates have declared for the Progressive Conservative Party nomination for Saanich-Gulf Islands. The nomination meeting will be held at 2 p.m. September 11 at Sanscha Hall in Sidney.

A party spokesman said Friday the three candidates are Dr. Paul Yewchuck, who contested the 1988 election as a Victoria candidate, Ian Jessiman and Marilyn Loveless.

The seat is currently held by

New Democrat Lynn Hunter. She beat former Conservative MP Pat Crofton in the 1988 election in a redefined Saanich-Gulf Islands riding. Before the boundaries were redrawn the Gulf Islands were part of Cowichan-Malahat-The Islands, which was represented by New Democrat Jim Manly.

## Help wanted to maintain spaces

Salt Spring Island is "handicapped conscious" and most of the credit for this can go to the Gulf Islands Association for People with Disabilities, representative Bill Best said.

The island had only eight handicapped parking places when the association assumed responsibility for developing and maintaining them in 1988. Now there are 35 spaces scattered from north to south in every centre of activity which are permanently reserved for handicapped drivers.

But maintaining the places, after five years, is becoming increasingly difficult for an organization made up of people with mobility handicaps. So Best wrote to the local Trust committee before the August 17 meeting asking for some other body to take on the task.

"In other small communities this is all done by ministry of highways," Best said, at least when the parking places are on highways land. "Businesses are pretty well on their own."

He said businesses were pretty good about making room in their designs for handicapped spaces and most businesses have voluntarily designated them. The ferry terminals all have designated handicapped spaces, too, where once only Long Harbour had them.

A meeting has been proposed with the Islands Trust for mid-September to try to find a solution to the maintenance problem.

## Display open to public

the possibility of intervenors — third parties who may join the Trust at this point in the case — is not being overlooked either.

"If Trust council determined the resources were not available, then alternate sources of funding would have to be found."

A Supreme Court appeal could cost between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

## Table statement

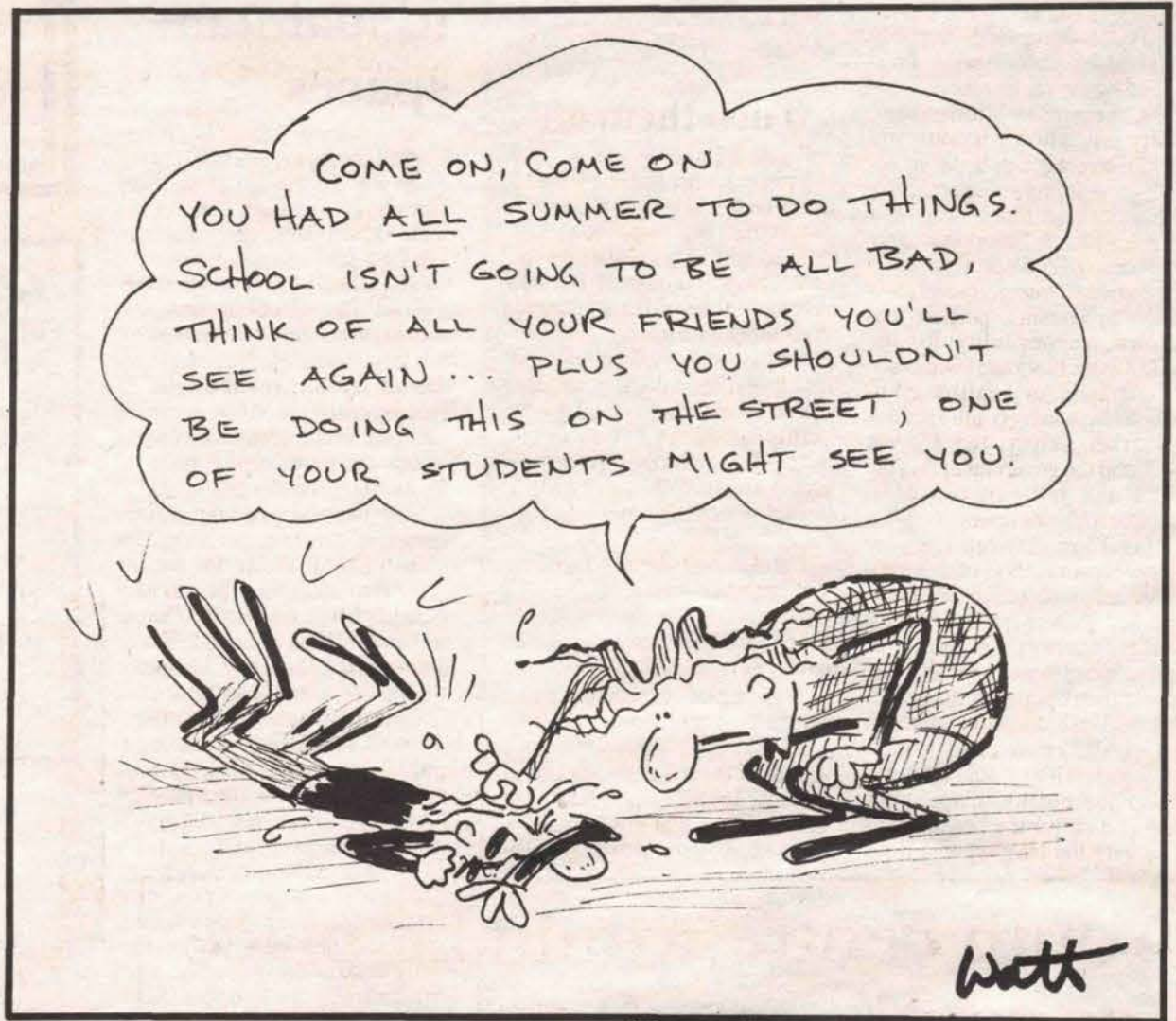
In an examination last week of the evidence of growing dissatisfaction with local government, we suggested the Islands Trust policy statement was the catalyst that spurred many islanders to action.

Referred to by some as a constitution governing the Trust islands, the statement can be interpreted as giving sweeping powers to the Trust council. Where matters of land use are at present dictated by zoning bylaws, the policy statement gives the Trust a lot more power to rule arbitrarily on the basis of environmental considerations. One of the more disturbing features of the document is its references to the stewardship of resources. For those residents who feel strongly about the supremacy of private property rights, stewardship has some very distasteful connotations.

On the other hand, much of the policy statement's content is logical and desirable. If one supports the basic mandate of the Islands Trust it follows that some guidance along these lines should be laid down for the benefit of trustees. We feel, however, that priorities have been misplaced. On Salt Spring Island the pressing need is not for a statement on policy with respect to land use, but for a more effective form of local government. The Trust as it is now structured was not designed to accommodate the needs of a population of 8,500.

It is unfortunate that the examination of local government options will await the review of the community plan. We believe that neither the plan nor the policy statement are as important as action on providing Salt Spring residents with more representative government. Not only that, but this island's place within the Trust council needs to be carefully considered as well. Should an island such as Lasqueti have equal say on matters relating to Salt Spring?

We think not. Salt Spring trustees should be lobbying to have the policy statement tabled while their island makes a choice between a restructured, more representative Trust and some form of municipal government.



## Let's promote debate, not stifle it

You're entitled to your opinion, but don't broadcast it.

Too frequently that seems to be the underlying sentiment of those who feel so strongly about a particular issue they call to complain. It's not the opinion with which some people take issue, but the fact that you voiced it.

One such caller last week expressed his disgust at our editorial, "Problems for the Trust." It reminded him of why he never read the paper, which he likened to trash. (He didn't explain how he'd heard about the editorial. Perhaps someone read it to him).

My response, that the editorial was simply our opinion, counted for naught. I can only conclude that his position was based upon the premise that we are not entitled to opinions that differ from his own, his being correct.

I pointed out that one reason for publishing editorials is to encourage public debate, to provoke public discussion about issues that affect the islands. My observation seemed to fall

on deaf ears.

He went on to imply that developers control the Trust, and cited the opening of the "DQ" as a sign that Salt Spring was going down the tubes. He regarded the editorial as anti-Trust and wished to state that he strongly supported it. (Faith in government isn't lost yet).

I urged him to write a letter to the editor to air his views, and take issue with our editorial, but the suggestion was not greeted warmly. That's unfortunate because when one has an opinion and feels strongly enough about it to call the editor (and when one's opinion is so obviously correct), others should hear it.

Many people will disagree with that because of the afterstrike-by-letter syndrome. That's when an opinion is presented by one islander, who subsequently finds him or herself the victim of an unfair torrent of verbal abuse in the letters section a week later.

Many an islander will admit to not having the gumption to voice an opinion on a local issue for fear of the

nasty attacks that inevitably follow. That fear can be traced back to the sewer debate and lingers on to this day, to the community's great loss.

But it is only through wide-open public debate, in which a diversity of views from a broad range of perspectives is heard, that we can establish common ground and consensus. But when people of opposing viewpoints can only respond with scorn, ridicule and invective, debate becomes stifled and we resolve nothing.

In this particular case we have an islander who called to defend the Islands Trust. Yet he will not write publicly in its support. He will not add his perspective to the debate so the rest of us are sufficiently informed that we can make up our own minds. But I don't think the afterstrike syndrome applies here. He's right, we're wrong and we should put a sock in it.

And so, I suppose, that ends this rather one-sided little debate, as my caller refuses to read the paper because of the opinions it holds.

What a pity.

*we asked:* Do you think the number of real estate signs should be regulated?



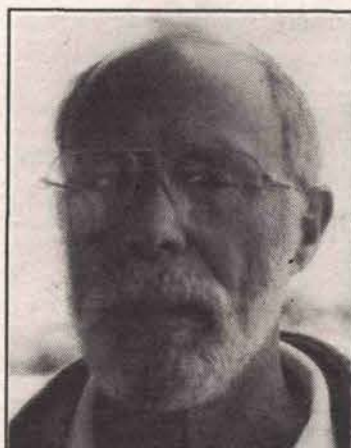
**Dorothy Rich**

Absolutely yes. When do the rights of the Chamber of Commerce and the realtors infringe on the rights of residents?



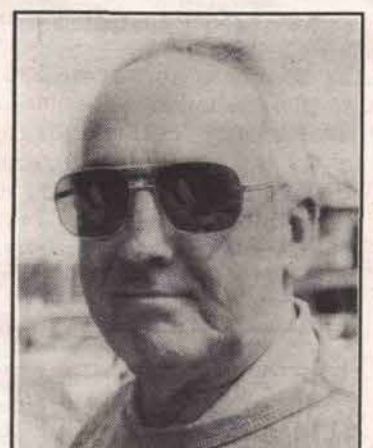
**Robert Harris**

### Consider the context

To the Editor,  
With partial knowledge one can easily miss the point of instructive counsel, only leading to futile arguments.

Under the title, "The Bible," Miha Chiall lists six apparent contradictions, arriving at the "only intelligent response... total rejection of... it" (*Driftwood*, August 11).

For brevity, I can use only this example:

"Thou shalt give life for life," versus "resist not evil... turn to him the other [cheek] also." (Exodus 21:23 and Matthew 5:39). The first scripture gives guidelines for judges (see Exodus 21:1). Murderers were to be executed. The scripture in Matthew shows Jesus' counsel not to let oneself be provoked. A "slap" on the cheek (as many modern translations render this correctly) is not a

dangerous attack but an insult.

In past centuries this was used to provoke someone to a duel. This also harmonizes with Exodus 20:13 in the first so-called contradiction, which properly translates: "You must not murder" rather than "thou shalt not kill." Many translations acknowledge

this difference in Hebrew words.

In conclusion: Don't let yourselves be influenced by those who don't make the effort to consider the context of scriptures and therefore miss the whole point. (see Matthew 13:10-15).

Our bid to acquire the Luigi's building for the young people of Salt Spring has been accepted by the bank. Our next legal step is court approval of the sale.

We would like to remind our potential patrons at this time that donations to the Corin Memorial Fund are tax-deductible, and that we particularly need financial support now, as we strive to acquire a place uniquely for youth.

To this end we are planning several fund-raising events, including another street dance for youth and adults. Thanks to an anonymous benefactor, all donations up to a total of \$125,000 will be matched by an equal donation to the fund.

The functions that building may house — be it a radio station, an art studio, a recording studio, a skateboard shop, a job centre, a coffee shop for teens or whatever else may evolve — will be fundamentally developed and controlled by young people, on their own turf, to use for their own purposes within the limits of the law. We see

adults in association with that process, but not in control of it.

We are asking the community at large to let the young people have a place that is truly their own. We believe that a clear titled building uniquely at the service of young people will prove to be a real contribution to the community, a contribution that will last for generations to come.

We would like to publicly thank all those who have helped us to date. Thank you to Moby's for putting together the street dance, and to the business community for their support. Thank you to the lawyers and realtors who are helping us without fee or commission, to those who have already contributed financially to the memorial fund and to the people who have contributed with comments, ideas, question, signatures and presence. Please keep helping us.

Clearly, many obstacles and challenges lie before us as a community in our attempts to really achieve something with our young people. However, we can do it.

## How much indeed?

To the Editor,  
How much more religious rootin' and rantin' can *Driftwood* readers stand, I wonder?  
Bill Shaw (*Driftwood*, August 25) accuses me of lacking cogent argument; though, to be sure, I don't see too much in the way of cogency in his letter. He then resorts to personal abuse to support his own position; always, it seems to me, a sign of rhetorical desperation.

Personal insults aside, though, a few points in his letter deserve a reply.  
1. He says my Bible quotes are "out of context." Well, of course they are out of context. Every time anyone quotes anything in less than it's entirety, then the quote is, and indeed cannot be other than, out of context.  
2. If Mr. Shaw can cite one single instance of genuinely fulfilled Biblical prophecy, I'll be willing to listen to him further. By this I mean an instance of, as he puts it, a "specific, detailed" Biblical prophecy — not some vague

generality such as "nation shall rise up against nation" — for the fulfillment of which we have genuine historical evidence dating from, let's say, the last 500 years.  
3. Most modern biblical scholars agree that none of the canonical gospels were written by actual eyewitnesses. The genuine eyewitness gospels — the so-called gnostic gospels, the gospels of Thomas, Peter and Mary Magdalene — tell a very different story from the generally accepted one but were suppressed by the church authorities. Most of them have come to light only in this century.  
4. There are, by conservative estimate, about 20 to 30 books in existence all of which are claimed by their followers to be the Word of God or at least to be divinely inspired. Christians reject all these books — except one. I reject only one more than they do.  
5. I have the advantage over Mr. Shaw in that I have no "belief system" to defend. A belief system is merely a set of opinions for which no confirmatory evidence exists. If evidence exists, then it isn't a belief system but a scientific hypothesis. If strong evidence exists it's a scientific law. Clinging strongly to a rigid belief system, whether religious or political, is invariably a sign of mental laziness, in my opinion.  
6. How does Mr. Shaw reconcile these biblical contradictions I quoted in my last letter — and others too numerous to mention?

VICTORIA — He's 41 years old, familiar with both victory and defeat, knows how cynical the public is about politicians, and still hasn't lost his enthusiasm.

He's Graham Bruce, the only one aspiring to the leadership of the Social Credit Party to date, a man convinced he can revive the party that was nearly wiped out in the last election.

We meet on the terrace of a Victoria hotel, overlooking the city's beautiful Inner Harbour. If Bruce doesn't quite appreciate the gorgeous view, he can be forgiven. He's logged more than 15,000 miles since he announced his candidacy for the Socreds leadership back in May.

His is not a fancy campaign. There's no money to criss-cross the province by plane. For the past three and a half months he's been more familiar with the cab of his four-wheeler than his living room.

"This is no big-money, high-powered campaign," says Bruce. "We have no delusions of grandeur."

Bruce and two of his campaign organizers have been to most every part of the province, except for the Kootenays and the area north of Prince George to Prince Rupert. They are on the agenda for the coming two weeks.

How is a guy received who wants to revive a party that was turfed from office barely two years ago and got back into the legislature with only seven members, reduced to six after Peter Dueck decided to sit as an independent?

What does the public say about a party that didn't even achieve official opposition status? According to Bruce, the voters may be willing to give the Socreds another chance.

What with the mistakes the NDP has made and the constant disarray of the Liberal opposition, voter interest in the Socreds has picked up a lot, he says.

Still, there is a lingering after-taste of incredibly bad government during the Vander Zalm years, and Bruce is the first one to admit that if the Social Credit Party is to emerge from the ashes of 1991, it must not resemble in any way the government that was defeated. "We deserved to be thrown out of office," he says.

The party and the elected people forgot what the party stood for. They abused their power.

Bruce has earned the right to talk that way. When most of his caucus colleagues blindly followed Vander Zalm down the path to political oblivion, he and a few others questioned the premier's leadership. Along with David Mercier and Duane Crandall, Bruce left the caucus.

The move failed to inspire others to follow suit at a time when the party and the government might still have salvaged their reputation. Hopes that some of the big guns like Grace McCarthy might join the rebels didn't materialize. The rest is history.

And now, Bruce is determined to have another go at breathing new life into a party everybody, himself included, thought was dead. Bruce is convinced that from the humble beginnings of his frugal campaign a great party can spring again.

Wherever he goes, he says, he draws good crowds, from the more than 400 who attended a luncheon back in May when he announced his candidacy in Cowichan, to the 200 people he brought out in Kelowna the same day Liberal hopeful Gordon Campbell addressed a small gathering of 40, to the 100 plus that came out to hear him in Port McNeill, a traditional NDP stronghold.

Bruce has a motto he wants to translate into political action: "Give people the hammer." By that, he means that people want to be and should be empowered. In Bruce's opinion, nothing contributed more to the demise of the Socreds in particular and the falling fortunes of politicians in general than the public's frustration with a system that leaves them powerless between elections.

The public needs a real hammer. Governments have abused the public trust, so has the bureaucracy. The public wants to be more involved in the government process.

"If, for instance, government cannot or does not want to live within the means provided by the taxpayers and wants to borrow money to finance its day-to-day operations, they should have to ask for the voters' approval." In other words, no deficit without referendum.

Bruce wants to see the bureaucracy stripped of some of its power and influence. Top bureaucrats, he says, should not be able to build lasting empires. They should sign onto the public service for a limited number of years and be subject to a performance clause.

Bruce is a fresh breeze in the stale air of politics, and if he ever gets a chance to deliver on what he envisions, B.C. politics may never be the same again.

## BRITISH COLUMBIA OYSTER BOARD Notice of Election

The British Columbia Oyster Board is holding a special election on November 30, 1993, for the purpose of electing 5 Oyster Grower members to the British Columbia Oyster Board. Members will serve a term up to two years.

Only a grower (the holder of an aquaculture licence) may nominate or be nominated. All growers are eligible to vote.

Where an aquaculture licence is held by a partnership or corporation, the partnership or corporation must authorize an individual to vote on their behalf and this authorization must be in writing and filed with the B.C. Oyster Board prior to the November 30, 1993 election.

All growers are eligible to be nominated and to stand for election. However, in accordance with Section 3.03(b) of the Scheme, only individuals who do not share business interests can actually be members of the Board. Consequently, if individuals with shared business interests are elected, the individual with the majority of votes will serve on the Board.

The election will be conducted by mail-in ballot and growers should contact the Board office to ensure our mailing records are up to date.

Nominations for a Director should include a profile of the candidate and a statement of intent.

5. Lakes are being successfully used for water reservoirs and recreational uses including power boats all over North America.

6. It has been pointed out that I probably failed science in school. However, I was good at math and the numbers tell me that the thousands of cars driving by, the septic fields, the farms and the domestic animals as well as swimmers present a significantly larger threat than that of a handful of power boats.

7. We do have a number of honest people that state that fast boats and water skiers are a pain in the butt. Having skied, swam, fished and sailed there, most of my life, that is a perception that I don't agree with.

8. The water ski season is a total of two months long as is the swim season. Should the lake resource be off limits for the entire year to fishermen wishing to use the lake with their power boats when the problem may or may not be water skiers?

9. Is it safe to swim out in the middle of the lake with no flotation and no buddy system?

10. It's my rights today but it will be yours tomorrow. And Mr. Ron Holcroft, you are right, we will all have to dig a little deeper into our pocket both for money as you have pointed out and for a tolerance and compromise with our fellow man. In the old Salt Spring Island, people knew how to share.

## Many respondents non-residents

To the Editor,  
Three weeks ago the Galiano Ratepayers' survey made front-page news and last week you wrote in your editorial about it. I would like to present a more in-depth analysis of the results.

Surveys should be sent to the whole population or a random cross-section not just those you think are on your side. This survey was sent to 400 ratepayers and 117 selected islanders. Half of the ratepayers live off-island. I wonder what the results would be if this survey had been done in a manner that was fair and reasonable. Of those that responded approximately half are off-islanders.

Let's use round figures and try to calculate how the results might be differently interpreted: 342 respondents times 89 per cent of the Islands Trust = 305; 305 opposed times 50 per cent live on Galiano Island = 153 locals opposed; 153 locals opposed divided by 900 (approximately) residents = 17 per cent.

I grant that this might be a little higher if everyone was polled or if you look at the poll in different ways. This does show that a majority of people are still in favour of the Islands Trust. This is certainly different than what you make out to be a groundswell of organized opposition.

Surveys must be carefully investigated and thoroughly interpreted for the correct results to be reported on.

# More participation needed in decision-making, says APC rep

More Salt Spring Islanders should attend land-use hearings, says the Chamber of Commerce representative on the Advisory Planning Commission (APC).

Dee Kinney writes in the August *Chamber News* that too few people participate in local decision-making.

"Our community, like many others, is being strongly influenced by the vocal minority while the silent majority sit back and let decisions [be made] that affect (sometimes adversely) the island."

In her report Kinney recalled recent applications for rezonings for seniors and low-income housing projects.

"The only one that the APC was not in favour of was the Brinkworthy expansion. The irony is that it is the only proposal not dependent on taxpayers' funding."

It was housing, she said, for people "ready and willing" to support themselves. "What is needed is for more people to attend public hearings and make their opinions part of decision making on Salt Spring."

As with all AGMs, members of the society will hear reports from the chief executive officer, chief of staff, auxiliary and board chair which outline what has been accomplished at the hospital this year.

Society members will also elect four members to the 14-member board.

# Youths want somewhere to go, survey finds

Youth on Salt Spring Island feel they have no place to go and nothing to do, a survey of 149 Salt Spring youth has found.

The youths — mostly aged between 13 and 17 — were asked about a variety of issues they face every day by Community Society youth worker Paula Marcotte.

Drugs, alcohol, and AIDS were three issues she asked youth for opinions about. Marcotte said most could not come to a consensus about whether drugs and alcohol were more of a problem here than anywhere else. Some people told her they were a problem, while others said they were not.

On the subject of AIDS, the youths told Marcotte they all knew about the dangers of the disease, but practising safe sex isn't something they talk about. She said their attitude is that they can't get the disease because they know everyone and none of their friends have it.

From this result, Marcotte has recommended that a youth speaker be invited to the high school to discuss the dangers of unprotected sex.

Another problem for many youths was with authority figures such as teachers and police. Youths say they want to be treated as adults.

Education was another topic of the survey. Marcotte asked whether the youths were students, and if not, what could have been offered to them to keep them interested in school.

The most predominant answer was that students do not like the school system. They have a problem with the seniority system with which teachers with fewer years of experience were laid off. They told

her that this practice resulted in some of their better teachers being laid off.

The students also told her they felt there was a lot of favouritism present at the high school. The feeling Marcotte received from the students was that there was not a lot of school pride at Gulf Islands Secondary.

Marcotte said many students told her attitudes between teachers, students and parents needed to

change. Students said teachers often had bad attitudes toward their courses and students, and some parents have not encouraged their teens to do well in school.

But the attitude is a two-way street. Marcotte said many youths also said they needed to change their own attitudes towards school as well.

As for positive feelings about the high school, Marcotte said the only positive responses she had were with the peer counselling program, art and drama, work experience, and exchange student programs.

Community opinions about

youth on the island represented many negative feelings for island teens. Marcotte asked what the community could do to help youth, and the respondents made a number of suggestions, such as having public washrooms open all night, providing an electrical outlet in the park to play music and have jam sessions, and having a graffiti wall downtown.

Young people on the island do not feel accepted by local businesses, the survey found. They feel the community generalizes them as thieves even though it is only a handful of youths who commit crimes.

The young people also suggested they would like to see a coffee shop stay open late, and allow them to be patrons. They told her that only about three places on the island will serve them. It was also suggested that the *Driftwood* write more positive articles about youth.

One of the most important needs expressed was that for a place to go that was their own. Most youths enjoy Centennial Park, but their enjoyment is limited because of weather and tourists, they said.

Regarding an activity centre for youth on the island, Marcotte said many favoured the idea of a recreation centre with a skating rink, swimming pool, or similar facilities. Marcotte added that many youths were positive towards purchasing the Luigi's building for a youth centre.

Both younger and older youths expressed an interest in the establishment of some sort of skateboard park, even if they were not skateboarders themselves.

As for a question about the cause and prevention of vandalism on the island, most felt the causes

were aggression, alcohol, and boredom.

Marcotte has come up with a number of recommendations as a result of the survey. She proposed having an annual youth day which might be a similar activity to the street dance.

If the plans for a youth centre at Luigi's fail, Marcotte suggested

hiring a program organizer who would plan either weekend or monthly activities for island youth.

For an improved relationship between high school students and teachers and administration, Marcotte suggested the school have an ice-breaker day at the beginning of classes because she feels the different groups need to get together.

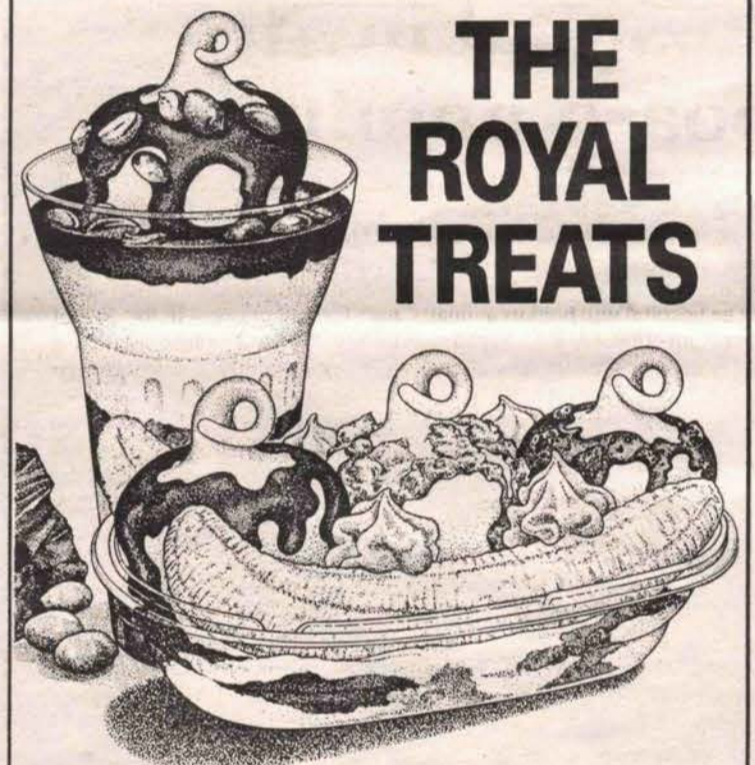

While it was still too early on Tuesday to know how much the annual family event made for the south end community, numbers in the park all day were a gauge of day's success.

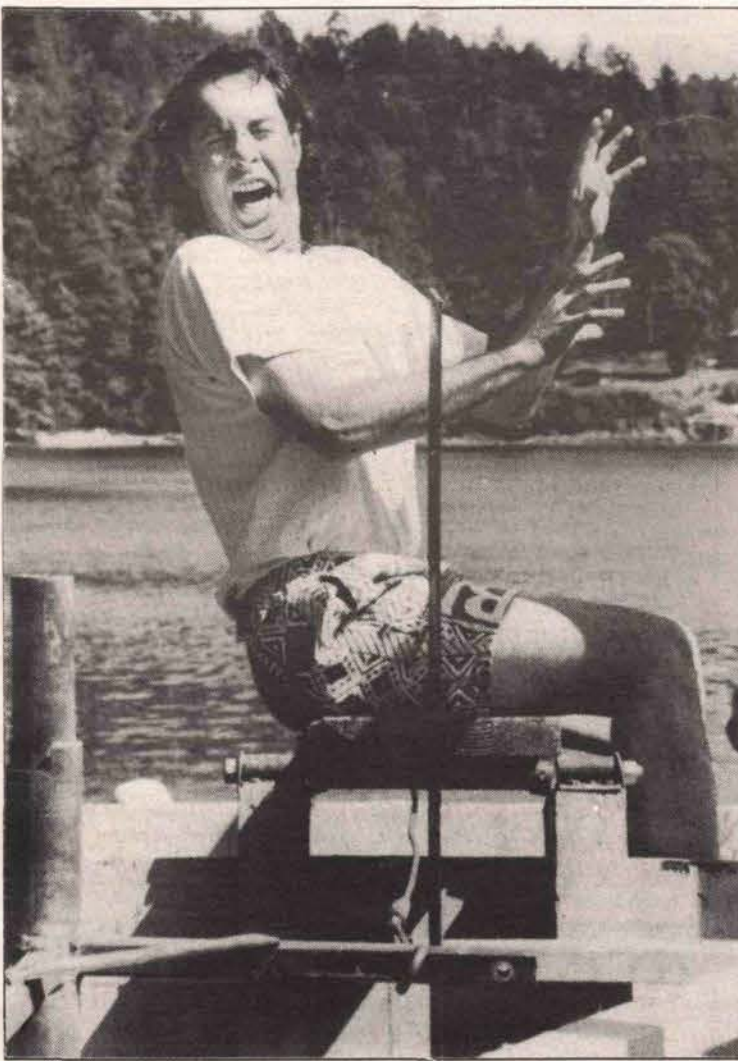
"The money end is really secondary," society treasurer John Nicolson said. "The park was full of people all the time. There were

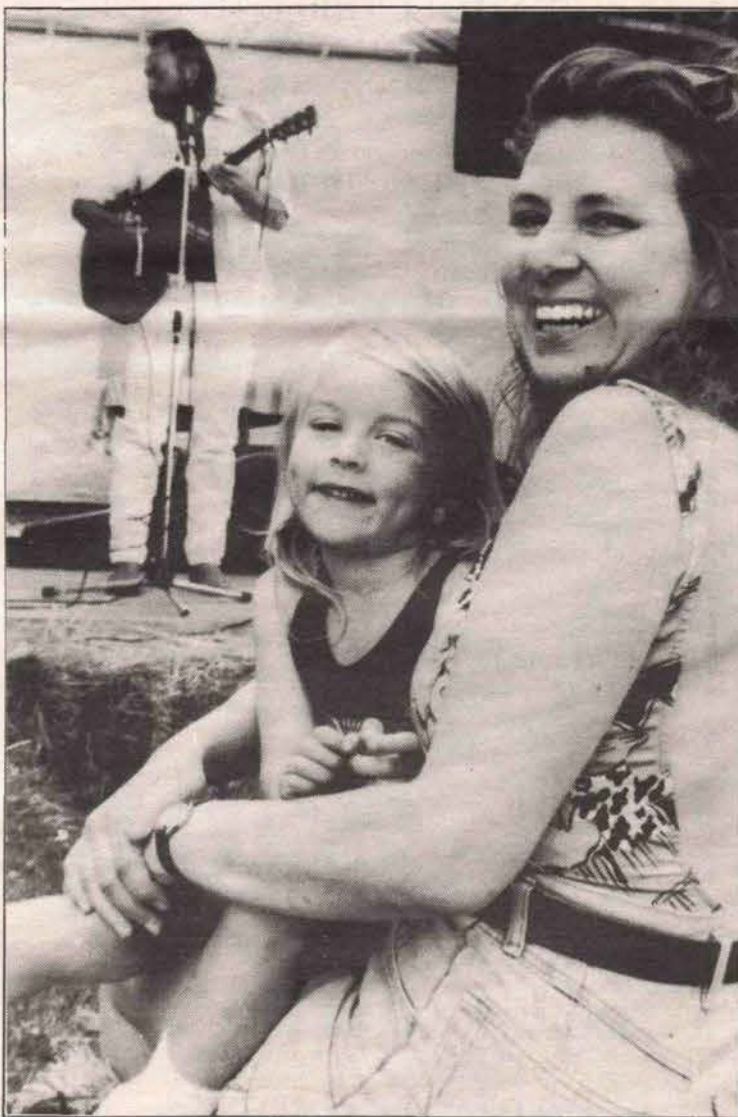
was welcome to the crowds in the heat was too strong for the hang-gliders. A visit by the Coast Guard hovercraft was called off because it had to be on duty.

# Youths want hassle-free place to 'hang out'

If the Corin Memorial Fund steering committee is successful in its bid to open a youth centre at Ganges, the facility must be operated by someone who will take it seriously.

That was a recurring message from local youths Sunday when the steering committee met to hear what island youngsters want in a youth centre.

Only a dozen youths showed up for the meeting, but many of those who spoke emphasized that there is a lot of interest in plans to purchase the old Luigi's building on McPhillips Avenue.

"There are not a lot of people here, but there is a lot of interest," Nathan Mayr told the gathering of about two dozen residents. "A lot of my friends aren't into going to meetings."

Many of those who did attend did not hesitate to volunteer their input, following the lead of Kirsty Chalmers, the meeting's chair. She said a youth centre should be a safe, hassle-free place to go and listen to music and dance.

Some youths had less than favourable comments about the attitudes towards teens of some local businesses. "There's almost a prejudice against teens," Melanie Stafford said. There was consensus that a youth centre would offer the kind of place where groups of teens could gather to drink coffee and "hang out," among other activities.

While the steering committee has no connection with the failed youth centre opened last year by the Community Society, it did not escape mention, or discussion. That facility attracted "only a certain crowd" of individuals, the meeting was told, because the person hired to run it "only catered to certain people."

Mayr described it as "hokey." "If you swore, they threatened to kick you out." Organizers, he said, wanted tight control over the centre's operation to avoid trouble.

Sunday's meeting also included a presentation by Paula Marcotte on her recently completed survey of local youth. (See separate story). Youngsters were asked what they thought the community ought to do

for its young people.

She said the most important thing seemed to be a place and territory they could call their own.

Another presentation was made by Andre Spencer, a youth and family counsellor with the Victoria Native Friendship Centre. He spoke of his experience setting up a youth centre for several hundred youngsters, and the importance of the attitude of the adults involved.

"All I was as an advisor to (the youths); I didn't have any power." He said the centre needed an adult "who cares and is popular. Someone who's cool."

Someone else made the observation that the steering committee should stick to fundraising and that youths should plan the operation of the centre.

Dietrich Luth warned that the old youth centre's failure represented "unfinished business" that had to be dealt with.

"Some \$60,000 has been puffed away into thin air." Luth proposed that the old youth centre building, located behind the Community Centre on Ganges Hill, be moved

to a new location and reopened.

But there was general agreement that the building was too small. Committee member William Manfield said the Luigi's building was the group's current focus. "If it fails we'll move on to something else . . . Our agenda is the Luigi's building and that's

where we're putting our fundraising at present."

In an effort to encourage more input from local youths the committee is considering holding a meeting in Centennial Park.

Said one youngster of Sunday's meeting at the United Church hall: "This is too much like school."

## Bank has accepted bid, meeting told

An offer by the Corin Memorial Fund steering committee for the old Luigi's building on McPhillips Avenue in Ganges is reported to have been accepted by the Federal Business Development Bank.

Committee member Bev Unger told a youth centre meeting in Ganges Sunday the committee expects a court decision in their favour by the end of September.

The building is tied up in legal proceedings involving owner Peter Grant and the bank.

Unger said the fund needs another \$80,000 to make the purchase. "We've got to do some hard-core fundraising between now and the end of September," she said. A bank spokesman was unavailable for comment this week.



# Meeting will hear concerns of club neighbours

Islands Trust representatives have agreed to do their best to promote a meeting between the Salt Spring Sailing Club and residents of Walter Bay, after an increasing number of residents wrote to trustees complaining about the club.

Pollution, noise, expanding membership and an expanding proportion of power to sailing vessels are at the heart of residents' concerns about the sailing club in Ganges Harbour. In May the Trust

passed a bylaw changing the zoning of the club from Water A to Water B2 and allowing the dock area to expand some 90 metres.

"It is developing (into) quite a complex issue," trustee John Stepaniuk said at the local Trust committee meeting August 17. "It appears there are some concerns raised by others.

"I feel that the Trust should endeavour to attend a meeting with the sailing club and the neighbours and have the issues on the table. I feel it could be resolved to a large degree with a meeting."

Concerns were brought to the Trust's attention at a meeting with some 20 residents August 4. A meeting between residents and

sailing club officials is expected in mid-September.

In other Trust business, the Salt Spring Trust committee has asked the ministry of environment to hold off on two applications relating to Salt Spring Island. The first was an application for an expansion to an oyster lease at Walker Hook.

The second was an application

by Spencer's Excavating Ltd. for an easement through a parcel of crown land on Hope Hill. The applicant needs the road to access land for subdivision.

Trustees wanted the oyster lease application to wait until the foreshore zoning study had been completed. The road easement was requested to be put on hold until an easement on an adjacent property is worked out and because the effect on the forested Hope Hill is unclear.

## Visitors 'attacked' at dance

An incident following a dance at Beaver Point Hall early last Thursday morning left a Victoria youth with some minor injuries and about \$300 in damage to his vehicle.

Two Victoria youths attending the dance were involved in an altercation which ended up with about 25 people attacking them, they told police. The two went to Lady Minto Hospital where they were treated for minor injuries.

Later, while on their way to a relative's house, a black Suzuki Samurai stopped in front of their car and six young men got out. The visitors from Victoria avoided the Samurai and headed home but the Samurai followed.

They told RCMP that when they arrived at the house the individuals from the Samurai pelted their car with rocks.

Police are asking for assistance from anyone who witnessed the altercation or has any information about it. The dance was a fundraising event for the Corin Memorial Fund.

In other police news this week:

- A 20-year-old Ontario man visiting Salt Spring was given a 24-hour driving suspension Saturday morning.

- Police made eight liquor seizures over the past week resulting in two charges against minors in possession.

## Fallen tree cuts power, halts traffic

Traffic on North End Road was halted for over half an hour and power was out for over five hours Saturday after a fir tree fell across the road.

The three-foot-diameter tree, located 60 feet back from North End Road near Fairway Drive, fell at about 1:20 p.m., B.C. Hydro manager John Langston reported.

Two Hydro poles were taken down at the same time.

## Code prefix to be V8K

Salt Spring Island took another step toward postal service change last week with the assignment of the first three letters in the island's new postal code.

When the new postal system is in place, all postal codes on the island will begin with V8K.

Construction of some of the sites for the new community mail boxes has begun. Once the boxes are operational they will be assigned the final three digits in the postal code.

# Cross-Canada trip offers inspiration for new resident

Most families that take cross-country trips end up with a stack of souvenirs and an album filled with photos of national monuments and the kids feeding animals off the highway.

Not so the Parker family. They spent 12 days crossing Canada in June and their family album is hanging in nearly every room in the house — it's a collection of paintings made from roadside sketches. And what impressive canvases they are, showing sweeping forests, endless wheat fields and meadowed river valleys.

Randolph Parker is a painter who has just moved to Salt Spring with all his family to paint and to teach at the Salt Spring School of Fine Arts. He has been painting for 20 years, and teaching for 12, most recently in Ottawa.

The family decided only this summer to make the move out west.

"We almost bought last year, but didn't," he said. "Then in the early part of the summer, things started happening."

A property with a magnificent view came on the market. A contact with the School of Fine Arts opened up — after an article appeared in the *Driftwood*. Pegasus Gallery in Ganges, Fran Willis Gallery in Victoria and Bau-Xi Gallery in Vancouver all agreed to exhibit his work. And a photo of himself in scuba gear in the *Gulf Islander* — the *Driftwood's* annual tourist publication — also stirred his mind about living here.

"Everything said, 'Here's your opportunity on the west coast,'" Parker explained.

So the family picked up stakes and spent 12 days crossing Canada — listening to Valdy all the way.

"We wanted to make it a good journey for (the children)," Parker said. "We would start the day at 5 a.m. in the van while they were asleep. That's the best light for the artist. You get the most dramatic light."

"... I would sketch as we drove — or I'd say 'Put the brakes on,' and do a more detailed sketch or take a photograph."

The result of all those roadside stops in the cool and quiet of the dawn are a series of stunning landscapes. Parker likes to paint wide canvases — they suit the shape of the land, he said. The carefully layered colours and carefully composed forms please the eye. He captures the land's beauty and its vitality.

That vitality is what Parker describes as the "dramatic element — what makes it unique at that moment."

"Something just has that special feeling that makes you say 'This is so exciting.' Each day I get one feeling like that."

"It might only last one moment and it's gone. That's what I'm trying to catch."

But as excited as Parker is about his painting, he is just as excited about his participation in the Salt Spring School of Fine Arts. He plans to teach watercolour courses and a new weekly class on the history and appreciation of Canadian art.

"When I was studying art nobody talked about Canadian painting," he said. "Nobody answered the questions, 'This is what it is. This is where I am in relation to everyone else.'"

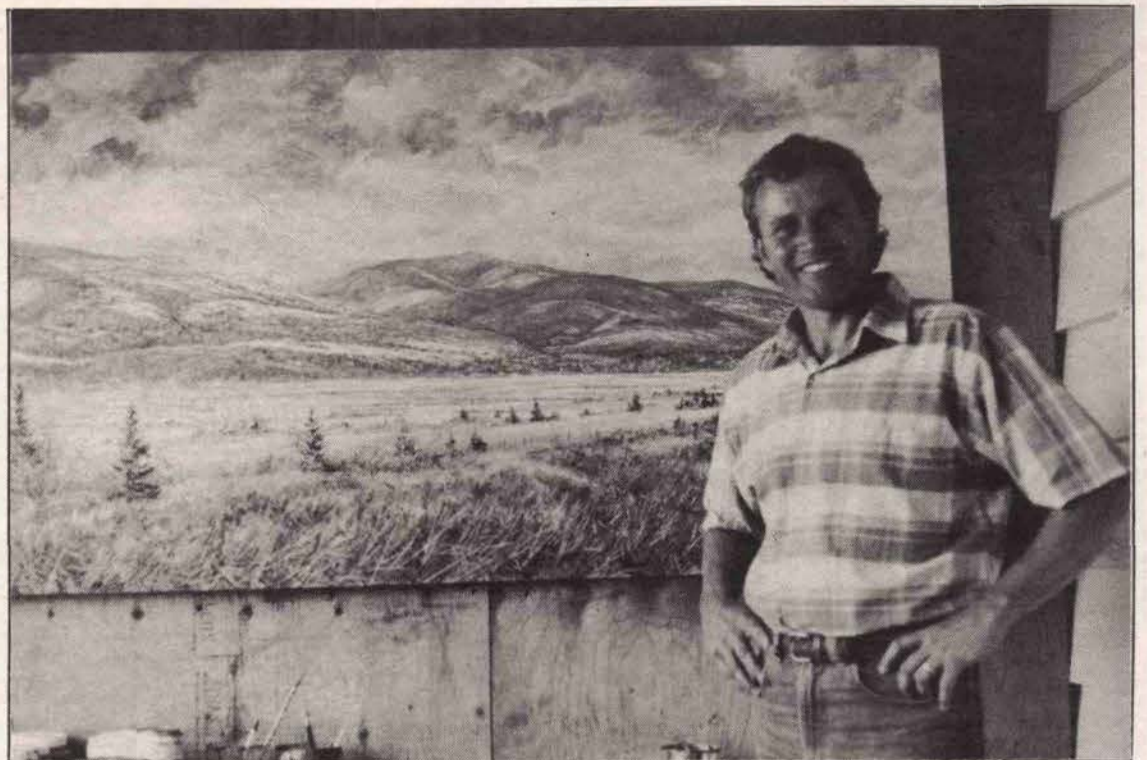
"I'd be walking in as a realist and looking at an abstract painting in a gallery and saying, 'Why is it any good? People say a kid could do that.'"

But not so. There is good solid technical work and craftsmanship underneath the brightly coloured squares of colour and straight lines of many modern paintings.

"The best compositions of the past are used today," he said, "but you have to know the compositions."

The course he will be teaching aims to give people a basis not only in the history of Canadian painting, but also an appreciation of composition and balance and all the processes that go into producing a work of art. He wants people to be able to finish the course knowing how to analyze a painting.

He will also be teaching water-colour classes for absolute beginners and intermediates. Interested people should phone the school for details.

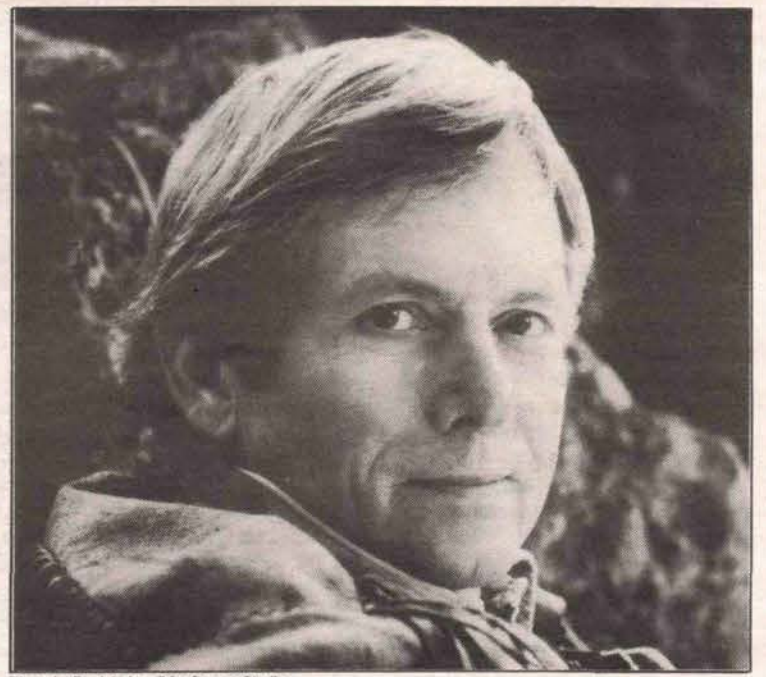

## Bateman show in Vancouver

A Salt Spring Island artist known for his commitment to conservation of the environment is featured at the Vancouver Museum with an exhibition entitled *Natural Visions*.

The display of work by Robert Bateman includes examples of his early experimentation with post-impressionism and abstract expressionism. But most of the work represented displays his realistic treatment of wilderness and wildlife around the world.

Bateman's work has garnered critical acclaim and attracted an enormous following over the past two decades. His paintings not only record the beauty of nature but document the destruction caused by driftnet fishing and the clearcutting of old-growth forests.

When Bateman's show opened in May, more than 700 people crowded into the museum, making it the largest opening the museum had ever seen.

The display features such works as "Northern Reflections — Loon Family," the work commissioned as Canada's gift to the Prince and Princess of Wales for their wedding in 1981, as well as "Dozing Lynx" and "Winter Trackers."

The exhibition runs until September 6.

# Geller captivates Beaver Pt. audience

It was a concert, but on August 14 it was so much more! It was an event that drew an overflow crowd. For a few hours Beaver Point Hall, with its funky wooden interior and perfect acoustics, became an international music centre, when Ian Geller returned to Salt Spring.

Music lovers on the island continue to recall Geller's sterling performance here in 1988. The extraordinary qualities of this great artist are immediately apparent: a rich, velvety voice of limitless power and control which makes the music live.

The program opened with four songs each by Hugo Wolf, Richard Strauss and Arnold Schoenberg. These three late-Romantic composers of German art songs offered a broad scope of characterization and colour, from Wolf's exuberant *Rattenfänger*, the story of the Pied Piper of Hamelin, to the ecstasy of sexual bliss in Strauss' *Morgen*. The chromaticism of early Schoenberg and the atonality of his 12-tone music were realized with depth and grand emotion.

In the second half Geller's accent changed to French as his sensuous colour lent haunting beauty to Henri DuParc's lush harmonic textures. Brahms' *Gypsy Songs* were brilliantly performed with just the right Viennese twist. We especially enjoyed Geller's personable, often irreverent, explanations of the operas from which he sang arias.

And the arias! Ian Geller became the heroic Escamillo in the toreador song from *Carmen*. He personified evil malevolence as Enrico in an excerpt from *Lucia di Lammermoor*. As spurned lover Count di Luna in *Il Traviatore* or as the hyperactive Figaro in *The Barber of Seville* we saw these characters come to life through Geller's dazzling virtuoso performances.

All the excitement of the opera — ringing high notes, bel canto coloratura and high drama — captivated the audience. With Figaro's final high G the crowd went wild, finally demanding a powerful performance of Eritu from *A Masked Ball* as an encore.

One of the outstanding Canadian musicians today is Salt Spring resident Chris Kodaly. His glowing performances of the piano accompaniments were a major factor in the artistic success of the evening. It is a hallmark of all the composers on the program that their piano accompaniments reflect the mood and colour of each song. Kodaly combined virtuoso technique and an unerring sense of balance and ensemble throughout a demanding program.

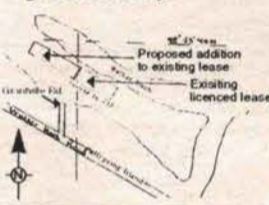

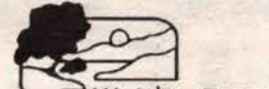

**First issue of new publication examines Pender community plan, Trust policy**

North Pender Island's community plan and the Islands Trust's policy statement are examined in detail by a new islands publication.

The Pender Island Taxpayers Association has published the first issue of *The Liberator*, which is billed as a newsletter for Gulf Islands residents.

"Its primary purpose," its publishers write, "is to focus on the actions and incompetence of

government as they affect established liberties, property rights and taxes."

An introductory column on the first page of the four-page publication summarizes the association's feelings about the draft of the Pender community plan and the policy statement.

While the plan "contains much valuable material," the association feels it includes several "major

flaws."

The policy statement, meanwhile, has many "misconceived" proposals, *The Liberator* says. It urges that it be changed to reflect the legislated mandate of the Trust and be considered by the new trustees following elections in November.

The taxpayers' group takes issue in particular with the policy statement's reference to

"stewardship." The statement describes "stewardship of its resources" one of the primary responsibilities of the Trust council.

The Pender Island Taxpayers say the Islands Trust Act contains no reference to stewardship and the Trust council has no power or mandate to exercise stewardship over resources.

"... the resources over which the Trust council wishes to exercise stewardship includes privately owned land."

The publication urges readers to sign a petition being circulated in the islands. It calls for a referendum in the Trust area on the policy statement.

The task force will make a number of recommendations to Trust council, which will consider them and decide whether to proceed with the public review process for the bylaw.

# down through the years

## Five years ago

August 31, 1988

A meeting was called in the high school band room to discuss problems associated with commercial clam diggers. Island resident Richard Goodhue told the audience how clam diggers had disrupted his quiet island life for the past year with powerful lamps, noise, litter and excrement. Representatives of a federal and provincial committee studying clam digging practices attended the meeting. According to the regulations, clam diggers are only bound by the size of clams and they must have a \$10 licence fee.

About 30 clam diggers were told to leave Bader's Beach and several were issued \$75 fines under the litter act for establishing a camp without proper toilet facilities.

## Ten years ago

August 31, 1983

Provincial highways ministry had not yet decided to replace Vesuvius dock, damaged in an accident earlier in the month. Highways Minister Alex Fraser said repairs would total half a million dollars. A water taxi service for foot passengers would operate in the meantime at the same fare structure as the ferries, subsidized by the government.

Local pot growers were not feeling so high after thieves made off with carefully nurtured plants under a full moon. About 15 island growers were hit, most of whom grow for their own consumption. One pound of marijuana was worth about \$250 on the street.

Fulford School would be built on a five-acre lot on Southridge Road. School trustees approved the purchase of the site which was zoned rural residential 2. The purchase price was slightly more than \$55,000 and the site had been tested for adequate supply of water for the school.

## Fifteen years ago

September 6, 1978

B.C. Ferry Corporation announced plans to stretch two islands ferries, the *Bowen Queen* and the *Mayne Queen*. The vessels were to be extended from their original 207-foot length to 278 feet

by adding a new mid-section. Two new engines were also to be added. The capacity of the ships would increase by 20 cars.

Plans for extensive changes at Mouat's property in Ganges were revealed at an Islands Trust meeting. An 8,000-square-foot food store and a 3,000-square-foot building adjacent to the fire hall were to be built. In two to three years the existing K & R Food Store would be converted to two storeys. In three to four years the Crest Restaurant would give way to about 6,000 square feet of retail space. The project called for provision of about 145 off-street parking spaces hidden by trees.

Boat launching facilities installed at St. Mary Lake were the cause of some concern at the Islands Trust. The ramp had not been approved by the Trust, it seemed. A report prepared by the North Salt Spring Waterworks District chairman had discouraged use of the lake by visiting small boats because of the danger of the spread of milfoil weed.

## Twenty years ago

September 6, 1973

A youth who was reported missing on Galiano Island was found at home in White Rock in bed the next day. A search party had been out half the night after the youth was said to have fallen over the Bluffs. He was one of a party of nine spending the long weekend on the island. Another of the party fell down the 600-foot rock face and was caught by a tree, but did not suffer serious injury.

Woods were closed by B.C. Forests because of extreme fire hazard. A late summer with high temperatures and no rain were to blame. Construction work on the islands was stopped and excavation of foundations or drains was also halted until rain came.

## Twenty-five years ago

August 29, 1968

Plans were in progress for the first general meeting of the Gulf Islands Community Arts Council, which started the summer Artcraft exhibition and sale. The council, which was created to help artists in all fields, urgently required the

support of the people throughout the islands.

Sewage disposal scheme whereby effluent from 85 lots in the Maliview Estates subdivision would be discharged into Trincomali Channel was approved. The Pollution Control Branch announced a permit had been issued to cover the discharge of 21,250 gallons per day of septic tank effluent into the channel. Strong opposition was expressed to the proposal and a number of opponents publicly announced their intent to protest further, but the director of pollution control said the works to be installed by the applicant would be such as to avoid pollution of the waters.

## Thirty years ago

August 29, 1963

St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church at Fulford Harbour was to open its doors once again after several years lying dormant. Old-time resident Dave Maxwell told resident and author Bea Hamilton he remembered the church being built in 1880 as a seven-year-old. A Father Donckle was the first priest, who came over from Cowichan where he had built the stone church on Komiaken Hill.

Salt Spring resident Arthur S. Dickinson died, aged 77. He was a veteran of three wars and served as a lighthouse keeper at First Narrows Station in North Vancouver

for 28 years until his retirement in 1951. He was credited with saving three lives in one night at the sta-

tion and prevented many would-be suicides from drowning after jumping off Lions Gate Bridge.

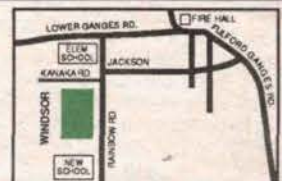
