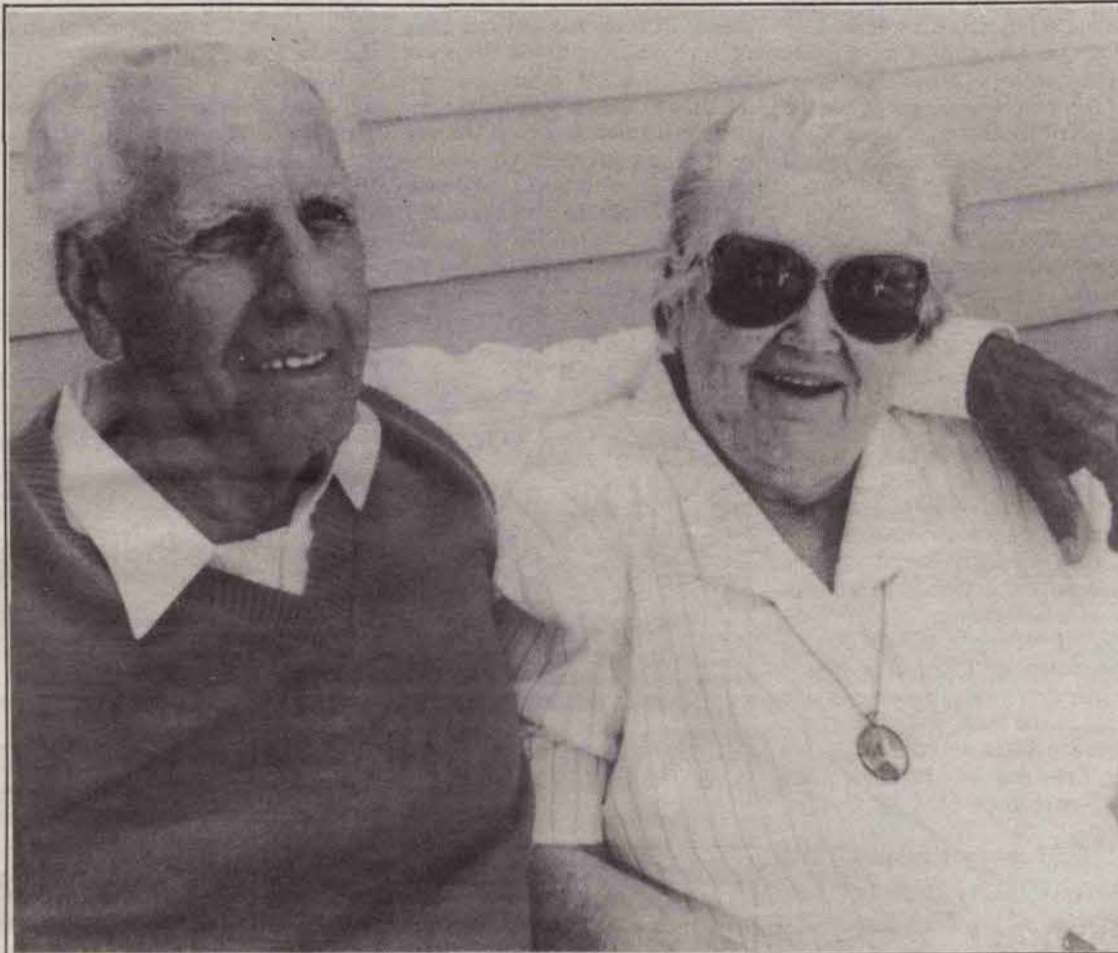


Islanders celebrate 60th, 65th anniversaries

First he worked and saved. Then he got the land. Third, he built the house. Finally, on September 9, 1933 — his 21st birthday — Edwin Miller could marry his girl in their home town of Medicine Hat, Alberta.

Sixty years later the couple recalled the hardships of their early years while celebrating their anniversary at their Vesuvius Bay Road home.

Nothing, including getting married, was easy for young people who reached adulthood in the middle of the Great Depression. Edwin and Nellie had been going together for three years before their marriage, waiting until Edwin had accumulated enough of a nest egg to get the young couple started.

"I used to wheel brick (in a brickyard) all day and walk over and see her at night," Edwin recalled. He lived in Redcliffe, Nellie lived in Medicine Hat, seven miles away.

By the time Edwin met the 16-year-old Nellie, he had been working for 10 years.

He first left school when he was seven to help his carpenter father. He returned to school for another year and left again when he was nine. That was the end of his formal education.

"Everybody had to try and work and help out the family. Times were hard," Nellie said.

Edwin said many other youngsters left school early. Farm children only attended in the winter.

When Edwin was 14 he got a job in a brickyard. By then he had spent years helping his father and had

worked for Dominion Glass.

At 18, Edwin traded "\$10 and a dream" for a homestead in the Peace River country.

He rode a freight train to his new homestead. "That was the cheapest and the best way to go."

To ride the rails, he grabbed an outside ladder and sat on the roof or found a spot inside an empty box car. On passing trains, Edwin would see up to 80 men also perched on the roof, riding the rails in the hope of finding better opportunities elsewhere.

In the Peace River he found 160 acres of raw, uncleared land. He constructed a one-room log cabin, dividing the bedroom from the main living area with a curtain.

Then he returned to Alberta, to work and save and prepare for his marriage.

Nellie recalls being attracted to Edwin because he was tall, dark — "And I had a car," Edwin interjected.

The prized car was an old Model T which Edwin had received in trade for a bicycle. He managed to rebuild the car and get it to run, transforming it into an early roofless "buggy."

Both agreed that once they had been going together for three years, marriage was the next step.

"It seemed to be all the style and rage, so why not," Edwin joked. "Our interests were the same. I was never interested in anyone else at all," Nellie said. "We just decided we'd like to be together all the time."

After their marriage the couple moved to the Peace River, riding inside the train instead of on top. Under the terms of the homestead

Wilsons have spent most of their 65 years near sea

Some marriages may be made in heaven, but for Quentin and City Wilson, it has been played out, on or near the sea. For 65 years now — they were married September 8, 1928 — the Wilsons have spent every minute they could on open water, sometimes working, sometimes fishing, sometimes just cruising.

"We've always had a boat," Quentin said. The Wilsons have lived on Salt Spring Island since 1956, and from 1959 until 1988

they owned and operated the Wilson Marina, now the Fulford Marina.

For most of those years they owned the 40-foot motor launch *Sea-Que*, which is still in Fulford Harbour. Quentin built it himself. When they had the chance they would take their boat out cruising. It was big enough for them to go out for a month at a time if they wanted to.

"When we used to go fishing up at Desolation Sound," Quentin said, "City would can the fish almost as they were caught. She'd clean them and pack them like you wouldn't believe — she did 18 pints one time."

Quentin and City met in Whittier, California, east of Los An-

geles, where Quentin was managing a grocery store.

"Her mother came in the grocery store and told this daughter (City was the middle girl of three) she ought to come in and get acquainted on account of my gentlemanly behaviour," Quentin said. "I used to carry their groceries out for them."

That gentlemanly behaviour is still evident. On their anniversary day last week Quentin told City she "looked just like a bridesmaid."

He says the last 65 years "doesn't seem like a long time" and they both are "shooting for 100."

Their advice to young lovers is to be calm, be loving, be caring and understanding.

Back in the late 1920s, Quentin obviously made a good impression because the relationship soon blossomed from taking groceries to the car to going to see live stage shows together. And in due course there was a marriage proposal.

"We had a very quiet, very plain wedding, with family, neighbours and friends," Quentin said.

Married life was filled with work and visiting family and friends. But the young couple already had a taste for adventure on weekends and holidays.

"I rode out to work on a four-cylinder motorcycle," Quentin said. "City used to climb on behind and we'd drive all through the countryside every Saturday and Sunday . . ."

Quentin changed jobs and became a machinist before long — a move which would tie him to boat engines for the rest of his life.

He worked for a time for the United States Coast Guard at Long

Beach, Calif., and saw the damage inflicted on U.S. warships at Pearl Harbour in December 1941. He was involved in repairing some of them.

He has also been 11 floors down

inside the bowels of the aircraft carrier *Saratoga*. It had come to Long Beach after a failed search for American aviator Amelia Earhart.

When it arrived the sides looked like they had been sandpapered, he said. The seas had been so rough most of the paint was gone. The swaying in the swells way down below deck on that ship as it lay at anchor at Long Beach was the only time Quentin has ever felt slightly queasy at sea.

After the war, he got to see the inside of another famous ship, the *Queen Mary*, when it was retired and docked at Long Beach to become a restaurant.

Quentin said he and City used to go to Sunday breakfast there and he had the chance when it first arrived to see the whole ship "from the shaft galley clear up to the top deck."

"It was quite a thrill."

Apart from work, the Wilsons would spend as much time as they could in their own boat, cruising out to Catalina Island off the southern California coast. They'd go for whole weekend cruises, especially after the end-of-summer crowds died down.

And even now, though they no longer spend every day around boats, they cannot spend a whole year on the land. They went for a cruise to Alaska this summer — not the first, that was in 1954, when they first discovered the Gulf Islands.

"I did certainly enjoy it," City

said. "I enjoyed it thoroughly."

A fantastic and theatrical presentation of 50 baked Alaska desserts in the dining room one night made an unforgettable impression on them both.

A passion that has always gone hand-in-hand with their passion for boats and the sea has been, naturally, fishing. And they have as many stories about the fish they caught as others have about the ones that got away.

They would go after barracuda, cod, mackerel and tuna among others.

"You have to go to the Japan current to catch the albacore tuna," Quentin said. "They like the warm

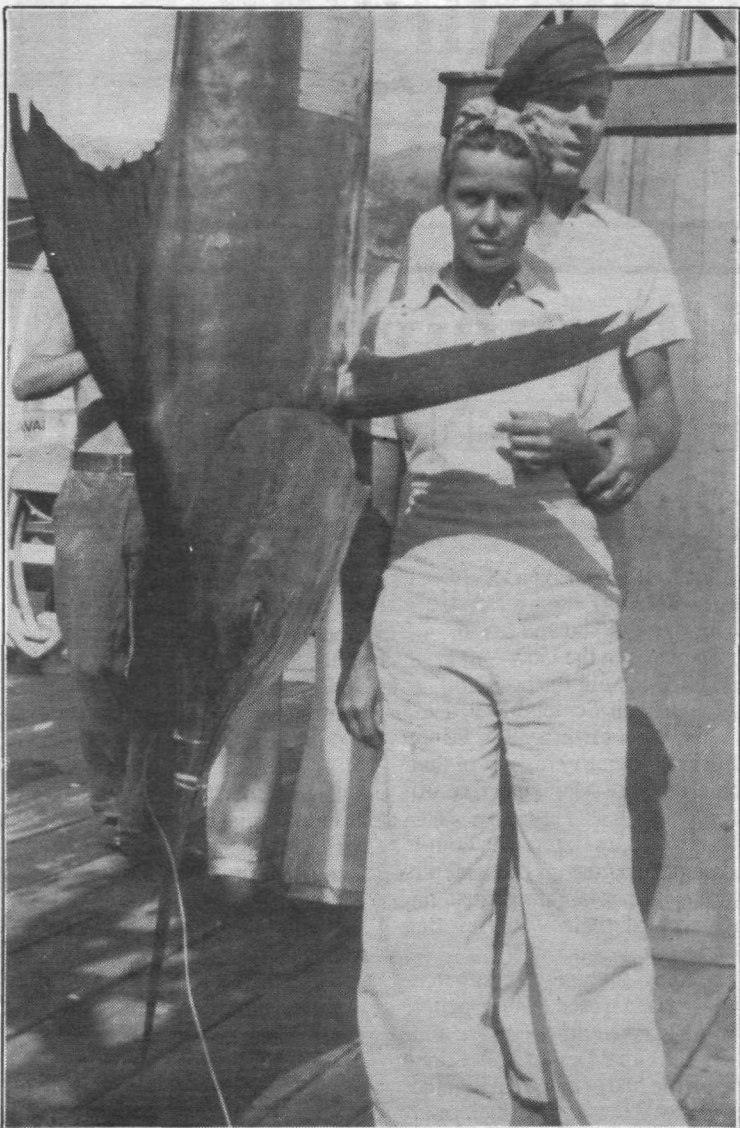
water. From (Salt Spring) that means going out 200-300 miles.

"Barracuda could be up to 50 or 60 pounds, but even a 10-pound fish could give you a run for your money."

But the fish he loves to talk about are swordfish. He has a picture of a 117-pound marlin he and City landed once.

"It took half a day to bring it to the boat," he said.

Even today Quentin still knows all about fishing — they're hot right now at the Galiano bluff, he said. It does not take much intuition to guess that's where Quentin and City would both like to celebrate their anniversary, another year.

'City' derived from 'sister'

City Wilson has always had a sharp wit and a sharp brand of humour. Perhaps that went with her short, short haircut — styled like a man's with dark waves. In 1927 that was unusual in Whittier, California.

She was the middle daughter in her family, born in Belton, Missouri, in 1907. A younger brother grew up not being able to pronounce her given name, which was Martha, or the word "sister." For the latter all he could say was

"city." It stuck.

City's wit and forthrightness come out in a poem she wrote many years ago on a visit home to Whittier.

On arrival, she found the house empty. Instead of leaving a message on the door or under the welcome mat, City wrote a poem. It's called *Trip to Whittier*.

The board was up,
The iron was hot,
Coffee was warm in the little

pot.

I called the girls, but I soon found

That you three heifers had just left town.

I finished the ironing as you can see

And straightened things up generally.

Found a hen eating an egg. I'd have broken her leg.

I ate an olive and a green peach
So now I'm heading back to the beach.

agreement, they were to plant crops on the land and give one-third of the second year's crop to the government.

During most of the first winter, with no crop in and little money, they existed on wild game and berries. "You could shoot moose at any time of the year."

Their first child, Margaret, was born in the one-room cabin. Despite winter temperatures which reached 80 degrees below, they stayed in the Peace River until the start of the second world war.

Edwin enlisted in the South Saskatchewan Regiment in 1940 and Margaret, pregnant with her second child, returned to live with her family until Edwin's return.

Their second daughter, Janet, was born just before Edwin was sent overseas in December, 1940. He took part in the 1942 Dieppe raid, was captured and spent three years as a prisoner of war.

"He didn't come home until the spring of 1945," Nellie said. "Janet was five years old when he came home but she didn't know him."

They had turned their original homestead back to the government when Edwin enlisted. Upon his discharge from the army, Edwin received a half-section of land in the Peace River and \$2,320.

The money and the bare land did not go far when supporting a grow-

ing family, Edwin noted. "It was supposed to be a gift from the government but it wasn't much of a gift."

From the money, he had to buy materials for a home and fencing, put in a well and buy fuel over the cold winters.

"You couldn't make it, no way," Nellie said.

Edwin supplemented his income by doing carpentry and driving a school bus. Good crops would pay 20 cents a bushel — "that was big money," Edwin recalled — but often early frosts would kill the crop before it could be harvested.

In 1959 Edwin traded farming for a job as camp carpenter for MacMillan Bloedel in Kelsey Bay. He stayed with the forestry company until his retirement in 1968.

The couple moved to Salt Spring that year, buying a lot which contained a small shack. Using his carpentry skills, Edwin remodelled the shack into a cosy home.

Their youngest daughter, Mary Anne, graduated from Gulf Islands Secondary School.

For many years, Edwin supplemented his income with carpentry. "I made ends meet."

The couple were also active in a seniors bowling league. Edwin called on his carpentry skills again to build a ramp which allowed a blind member of the league to continue playing.

Both belonged to the Royal Canadian Legion and Nellie served as president and secretary of the Ladies Auxiliary.

The couple have 10 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren, all of whom stay in contact.

For the Millers, staying together is part of the definition of being a family.

"It's the thing to do when you have a family. You just stay together," Edwin said.

Artcraft estimates 200 visitors a day

Artcraft organizers report that the summer-long sale of Gulf Islands arts and crafts was a success — but sales figures are under wraps.

"As a matter of policy we never release how much we've made," said Community Arts Council president Lawrie Neish, explaining that some retail outlets resent the success of the sale. However, he said the event actually improves business for Ganges merchants since it draws visitors to the island.

Work by 205 artists and craftspeople from throughout the southern Gulf Islands was included in the exhibit, which drew an es-

timated 200 visitors a day.

Neish said the event provides low-pressure exposure for many newer artists who may not feel ready for a gallery. For many people, Artcraft is their only commercial outlet.

As sponsor of the event, the arts council nets about nine per cent of the total sales. The money enhances the group's \$35,000 annual budget, making it possible to undertake such projects as ArtSpring, upgrading of Mahon Hall and the awarding of scholarships and grants.

"We take money in and we give it all away," Neish said.

Bank has accepted offer on building

An offer from the Corin Memorial Fund to purchase the former restaurant known as Luigi's has been accepted, said Rich Goulet, area manager for the Federal Business Development Bank (FBDB), south Vancouver Island region.

"It was a suitable offer so we've accepted it."

The development bank is involved in foreclosure proceedings on the 134 McPhillips Avenue property. However, Peter Grant, the principal of the company which owns the building, is disputing the bank's action.

"He is in dispute with us and there are issues which he is attempting to bring before the court," Goulet said. He said he could not comment further on the dispute.

The offer from the memorial fund must also go before the court. The offer is contingent upon court acceptance by September 24.

Youths' wish list heard at Centennial Park meeting

A restaurant "that didn't cost much money," an arcade, a pool table, video training facilities and a sound room were among the items on a wish list made by youngsters at a meeting Saturday.

The Corin Memorial Fund steering committee staged a chili feast and meeting at Centennial Park to invite local youths to share their ideas for a youth centre in Ganges.

The committee is in the process of attempting to purchase a building for such a centre (see separate story).

Committee member Trish Nobile told the gathering of about 50 teens and a handful of adults that

\$40,000 had been raised to date, in addition to the \$125,000 contributed in matching funds by an anonymous donor.

Questions raised by the youths included a query about the condition of the building, and how a restaurant would function. The committee's Frank Coffey said they'd "seen all the reports" on the building and that he was planning to tour the premises with the building inspector this week.

A restaurant, it was hoped, would be self-supporting, the meeting was told.

The committee has arranged to meet every Wednesday at 7 p.m. at Salt Spring Elementary School.

District wants recruits

More firefighters are needed to join Salt Spring's volunteer fire department, says Fire Chief Les Wagg. The department is advertising for four to five volunteers to join the 28 members of the department.

Volunteers can be male or female, should be reasonably fit and willing to complete a 12-week, two-hour-per-week basic training course and to be on call for fires.

Beards are not allowed as they interfere with breathing apparatus. An air brake ticket would be an asset but is not required.

Wagg noted the fire department could use a few more volunteers from the Fulford area although volunteers from any part of the island are welcome.

Firemen practise from 8 to 10 p.m. every Tuesday, Wagg said. The new members would begin training in January. Anyone interested is invited to drop into the Ganges fire hall or to call 537-2531 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Friday.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

The legislation in the Municipal Act that sets out the qualifications for electors entitled to vote at local government elections has changed substantially and if you are not on the Voter's List and you intend to register on Voting Day please take notice of the following:

Qualifications for a resident elector are:

- On general voting day you must be eighteen years of age or older (changed from the minimum of nineteen years of age);
- a person must be a Canadian citizen
- a person must have resided in British Columbia in accordance with section 53 of the Municipal Act for at least six months immediately preceding the day of registration.
- a person must have resided in the area in which the vote is taking place in accordance with section 53 of the Municipal Act for at least 30 days immediately preceding the day of registration (reduced from three months in the previous legislation);
- you must not be disqualified by the Municipal Act or any other enactment from voting in the election.

Qualifications for property electors are:

- a person must not be entitled to register as a resident elector;
- a person must be eighteen year so age or older on general voting day (changed from nineteen years of age);
- a person must be a Canadian citizen;
- a person must have resided in British Columbia in accordance with section 53 of the Municipal Act for at least six months immediately preceding registration;
- a person must be registered owner of the real property used for qualification at least 30 days immediately preceding the day or registration (this is new in that there was no time requirement in the previous legislation);
- a person must not be disqualified under the Municipal Act or any other act from voting in an election.

In addition to the above requirements the new limitations listed below also apply to property electors;

- if more than one individual is registered a owner of the real property then only one individual is entitled to vote with the written consent of a majority of all other registered owners that are on the title including the person requesting registration;
- if the property elector is not on the voters list and wishes to register on General Voting Day or at an Advance Voting Opportunity a Property Elector Certificate to register must be obtained from the Clerk of the municipality or Secretary of the Regional District in which the property is situated at least 14 days before General Voting Day.

IMPORTANT:

If in past elections you previously registered as a property elector or tenant elector your name will no longer be on the list of electors and if you wish to vote at this election as a property elector the rules set out above will apply. There are no longer any tenant electors or electors qualified as owners of small business.

Restrictions unchanged despite decline

Restrictions on commercial crab fishing and the consumption of crab livers have increased near pulp mills throughout Georgia Strait, but there are no changes in the waters surrounding the Crofton mill, says the federal department of fisheries and oceans.

While overall levels of pulp mill pollutant are declining in fish and shellfish, the department says, more extensive surveys in waters surrounding pulp mills and in urban centres have led to additional closures.

Dioxins and furans are names given to two groups of 210 chemically related chlorinated organic compounds, some of which have been found to be extremely toxic to a variety of animals, including fish. Dioxins and furans are contaminant by-products which can be formed during the production of substances like wood preservatives.

Chlorine bleaching processes such as those pulp and paper mills use can also produce dioxins and furans.

In May 1992, after four years of study the federal government introduced legislation requiring pulp and paper mills to change processes that produced dioxins and furans and to reduce organochlorine levels by 1994.

The areas near Salt Spring Island affected by the federal restrictions are on the west side of the island. Commercial crab harvesting is closed in Stuart Channel south of a line from Yellow Point on Vancouver Island to Thetis and Kuper islands and Parminster Point on Salt Spring Island. The closure remains in effect to a line between Erskine Point on Salt Spring Island and Grave Point on Vancouver Island.

A health advisory has been issued for consumption of crab livers in that area also. No more than 50 grams of liver tissue should be consumed in any one week. Government health officials have been advising people since 1990 not to eat livers from bottomfish caught near coastal pulp mills. The consumption of muscle tissue (fillets) is not affected.

Burgoyne Bay on Salt Spring Island has a 70-gram per week advisory on consumption of crab livers, Maple Bay has a 50-gram per week advisory and Cowichan Bay a 160-gram per week advisory.

Skua off until Christmas

Ganges Coast Guard is playing musical boats this month.

The local boat, the *Skua*, has been sent to French Creek to replace a vessel which is undergoing repairs.

Meanwhile, the Ganges crew have been using the CGE-701, a pollution control vessel. Later this week, officer in charge Dave Howell is expecting the *Manyberries* to arrive in Ganges.

He hopes the *Skua* will return to Ganges by Christmas.

Coast Guard crews were called out last Thursday to check an overturned yellow kayak spotted by the *Queen of Cumberland* in Active Pass. Although the Coast Guard did not find the kayak, Howell said ferry crew members who saw it said it was a derelict.

55-minute video celebrates island's beauty

Droplets of sound, notes as clear and precise as a brook tumbling over stones, underscore the opening of Penny George's Salt Spring Island Video Postcard.

This is a postcard which moves to encompass the beauty of the island. Picture-perfect scene follows picture-perfect scene but in a video postcard the waves fall glistening over the rocks, the crying of the gulls can be heard and the starry flowers nod in the breeze.

George spent a year collecting

images before sitting down at her computer to create the video. The computer editing program allowed her to create special effects, including a striking abstract blurring of the roadside scenery which serves to bridge major segments of the video.

The 55-minute video is divided into six sequences. It opens with the lush greenery and rocky shore of Ruckle Park, captures the folksy charm of Fulford Harbour and a mist-laden Fulford Valley, soars to the peak of Mt. Maxwell, celebrates the markets and harbour

of Ganges and presents the seaside beauty of Fernwood and Vesuvius.

"I really, really love Salt Spring. I think it's beautiful," George said.

She wanted to give people a chance to see the island, even those who have never travelled to Salt Spring. Through her images they can see the sparkle of sun on water, the rich, deep green of seaweed laid in rows against the deep blue of an ocean shore, the mirrored bays, the old orchard divided from a country lane by a split rail fence.

Animals are the stars of George's creation. There are the swans in flight whose wing tips brush the water, shattering the shoreline images reflected on the surface; the horde of ducks surfing over the waves of Fulford Harbour and the aerial ballet of ravens swooping against the side of Mt. Maxwell.

Captured on videotape are eagles surveying their domain, woolly lambs butting heads, a seal capturing lunch in mid-dive, high-stepping herons and deer peering through foliage.

Island musician Alexander Hoechsmann created the soundtrack to match George's shifting images. His music ripples like the sun-struck sequined sea that George filmed off Ruckle Park, becomes folksy to match the hustle and bustle of Fulford Harbour and orchestral to reflect the diversity of Ganges. Tone Prosk shares the credit with Hoechsmann for the Ganges music.

Combining the music and images was, for George, an engrossing challenge. She has been videotaping for three years but became enthralled with the art once she began editing her own work on a computer.

She uses a "souped-up" Amiga 500, digitizing and other software to combine and manipulate the images. "I really enjoy the process and I really like editing," she said.

Her previous projects include a documentary on Lesotho, Africa, for Plenty Canada, promotional work for various artists and musicians and a yoga tape for instructor Elisabeth Smith.

She is now working on a 20-minute computer animation and hopes to develop her Mind's Eye Video into a full-time business.

Response to the video postcard has been encouraging, she said. Released in July, it was available at Artcraft, and can be found at the Video Ranch, Parkside News and Tone's Espresso.

In addition to being a souvenir

or a way to show the island to off-island relatives or friends, watching the video is a soothing experience, George noted.

"It's a really relaxing video. It's almost as good as visiting the island yourself."

Brass offers stellar performance to enthusiastic Ganges audience

"What can you possibly say about the Canadian Brass?"

A Salt Spring musician posed the rhetorical question Friday, during a discussion that couldn't quite find an adjective strong enough to describe the band's stellar performance Thursday at the Activity Centre.

The five-piece brass band played to a packed house — and a wildly enthusiastic one — during a special trip to Salt Spring. It was special because they charged only a fraction of their usual \$30,000 performance fee, a favour to friend Derrick Milton.

But the two-and-a-half-hour show was just as special as the trip. From Spanish to dixieland, from renaissance to rag, with good-natured banter and good-humoured fun thrown in, the Canadian Brass were first-class.

Anyone expecting a serious musical recital did not have to wait long to realize their mistake. Decked out in tuxedos and sneakers, the group opened the program with some dixie, a lively almost irreverent musical style that makes no pretensions and carries no serious airs.

Serious, in fact, would describe very little of the band's repertoire, apart from a piece from Mozart's *The Magic Flute* and some selections from Vivaldi's *Four Seasons*, among a few others. But even those were preceded by amusing anecdotes and humorous — often self-deprecating — jibes.

Composition of *The Four Seasons*, for example, was attributed to a member of the audience, Salt Spring's own "Antonio" Valdy. But humour aside, The Canadian Brass launched themselves into a flawless rendition in which two or three instruments at a time would run up and down scales in perfect unison.

This was a highly polished performance by a highly polished band capable of amazing things. There was at least one song in which you could hear the sound of strings from the stage, rather than a pair of trumpets, a trombone, tuba and French horn.

The Brass went all out with both music and comedy for a presentation of their version of an opera. It was, the audience was told, "everything you really need to hear from the opera *Carmen*." Band members donned wigs and various props to play the different parts, including a very lively tuba-playing bull.

Almost as funny was a tune whose origin could be traced back to a command performance by the band for the queen. (A command

performance is one for which the band does not get paid, a small matter the Brass discovered later).

The queen, the band learned, was most fond of Handel's *Messiah*.

The band, however, was particularly partial to *When the Saints Come Marching In*. So they compromised, and produced a song containing the best of elements of

each.

Following their second or third standing ovation on Thursday evening, the Brass did the *Tuba Tiger Rag* for an encore, complete with "a regular 360-degree rotational of the tuba while performing a low B-flat." The move was perfectly executed, as was the concert, a tremendous treat indeed for an island audience.

Writer-lawyer William Deverell to read Thursday

 Bookworms of Salt Spring unite! And come to the Waterside Bistro tomorrow (Thursday) when the winter season of visiting

authors begins. Award-winning novelist William Deverell will open the series.
 Pender Island resident Deverell has had a long and varied career with words. For seven years he was

a reporter with Canadian Press in Montreal, at the Vancouver *Sun* and at the Saskatoon *Star-Phoenix*. Then he switched from the written word to the spoken word and became a lawyer, winning the MacKenzie prize for evidence in his final year at the University of Saskatchewan law school.

He has been involved in more than 1,000 criminal cases, both as defence counsel and prosecutor, including 30 murder trials.

In more recent years, he has turned back to the written word and has penned a number of best-selling books, including *Needles*, *High Crimes*, and *The Dance of Shiva*. But not all his novels are fiction: *Fatal Cruise—The Trial of Robert Frisbee* is based on a real case.

As well as topping best-selling lists, Deverell won the \$50,000 Seal Prize in 1979 and the Book of the Year award in 1981.

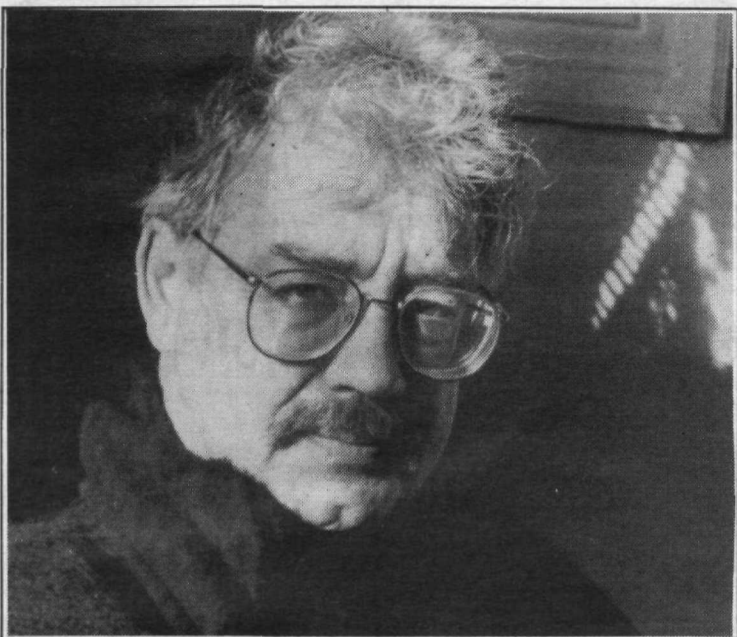
More recently he has turned to film and television. He is the writer of the screenplay of *Shellgame* for CBC Television and the pilot for CBC's long-running series *Street Legal*. He has also written the screenplay for a feature film of one

of his books, *Mindfield*.

Another side to Deverell the author is his activism. As a member of the legal profession, he was instrumental in the founding of the B.C. Civil Liberties Association and is now an honorary director. He is the incoming chairman of the Writers' Union of Canada and a member of ACTRA Writers Guild

and Pen International. Closer to home, he is involved in organizing writers in support of the Clayoquot Sound protest.

The Waterside Bistro reading is sponsored by Theatre Alive! and a grant from the Canada Council. The evening opens at 8:30 and Deverell will begin reading about 9.

About eighty-five singers of predominantly Welsh music will be on Salt Spring Island next month for the love of singing.

The Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir will also be here for ArtSpring when they present a concert October 2 at the Activity Centre.

But organizers still need beds for about half the choir for the night of the second.

"I've got 45 heads on pillows at the moment," Salt Spring resident Simon Foulds said last week. "So I've got about 40 to 50 to go."

Foulds is a former tour director and vice-president of the choir, and has been instrumental in arranging their Ganges performance.

Residents who provide accommodation for choir members are being asked to pick up their billets after the concert at 9:30 p.m. and take them home. In the morning they'll need a cup of coffee and a bun and a ride back into Ganges, Foulds said.

Assistance is also being sought for getting the choir members to and from Long Harbour on Saturday and Sunday afternoon.

The Vancouver Welsh Men's Choir has several members born in Wales or of Welsh parentage, but otherwise reflects the diversity of Canada's background, Foulds said. Its repertoire includes Welsh hymns and Welsh national songs.

Presenting a concert is not their only purpose in visiting Salt Spring. The choir is also using the trip as a retreat to practise its Christmas program.


The choir is bringing its own risers, paying its own transportation costs and presenting the concert as a contribution to ArtSpring.

The concert will be offered at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 2 at the Ganges Activity Centre. Tickets, at \$10, are available at Century 21,



Meeting agrees on fundraising plan to save high school drama program

Parents and students are ready to "pay the piper" to preserve the drama program at Gulf Islands Secondary School. A meeting Monday night agreed to raise money to finance an additional course at the high school.

The unique offer had parents and students agreeing to raise the approximately \$7,500 required to add another course to the curriculum. The parents suggest the board reinstate the school's Learning for Living course and assign teacher Debbie Magnusson, the local expert on the program, to teach it.

When the Learning for Living course was cancelled due to budget cutbacks last spring, Magnusson was then assigned to teach a drama course at the secondary school.

The parents and students want the drama course now taught by Magnusson combined with the three remaining drama courses — for which there is now no teacher — to create a 0.6 full-time equivalent (FTE) position.

Once the drama courses are consolidated, they want teacher Susan Mackie to apply for the position.

The offer went to the district Tuesday morning. Superintendent Mike Marshall said he had relayed the offer to secondary school principal Eric McMahon but did not know if the district could accept it.

"We've never had money come in which has increased our staffing. I'm not sure if that is legal," he said. The offer may be considered at today's (Wednesday's) board meeting, he said.

At Monday night's meeting, attended by approximately 50 people, both parents and students outlined the value of Mackie's drama program.

Trustee Charles Hingston — attending as a drama student parent — confirmed that the board recognized the value of the program. The problem, he said, was a combination of money, seniority and callback provisions.

Outlining the progression of events, Gerry Kurz said the district issued a massive number of cutoff notices May 15 and began cutting programs to balance the budget.

As the cuts were finalized, recall lists were posted and teachers had the option of applying for those jobs. However, under the recall provisions teachers could only apply for the same number of working hours they had the previous year.

Although Mackie had worked a 0.7 FTE as a drama teacher and a 0.3 FTE as a counsellor at Fulford Elementary in 1992/93, only the drama courses counted under the recall. Therefore, Mackie was only eligible to receive up to a 0.7 FTE position through recall lists.

When she accepted a 0.3 FTE position as a Fulford Elementary counsellor, she was ineligible for the drama position, which then totalled 0.6 FTE.

In an effort to retain Mackie, Hingston said the district split apart

the drama position to create a 0.4 FTE component which, added to the 0.3 of the counselling job at Fulford, equalled the 0.7 FTE for which Mackie was eligible.

However, knowing the amount of time demanded for a top quality drama program, Mackie turned down the 0.4 FTE since it was less than half-time, Kurz said.

"It's a little unfair to expect someone to put that effort in for the reduced time offered," he remarked.

Mackie was also aware that if the drama job remained unfilled through the recall process it would be publicly advertised. At that time, she could take the job without being hampered by the 0.7 FTE restriction imposed by the callback provisions. "She followed the rules of the contract," Hingston said.

Once the job was posted, the hours were boosted by adding a 0.15 FTE dance course. However, Mackie is unable to teach the dance program so asked instead for the equivalent in drama course hours.

Several students agreed that no one teacher could handle the demands of both a drama and a dance program. One condition of the group's offer is that the dance and drama programs be taught by different teachers. They also felt the drama program should be integrated under one teacher.

Students also pointed out that they had to complete projects begun in the drama program last year to meet graduation requirements.

The consensus, reached after two hours of debate, was to work towards reintegrating the drama program into a 0.6 FTE position.

Parents and students also agreed reinstating the Learning for Living

program was a worthwhile goal on its own, in addition to making it possible to reintegrate the drama program.

Parents also debated whether the school district would be liable for legal action, since accepting the parents' offer would lead to a change in a posted job during the middle of the interviews.

However, parents felt the job would be changed so much by the removal of the dance and reintegration of the four drama courses that it would have to be re-posted.

The re-posting would give

Mackie a chance to apply for the position.

Students agreed to write down their requirements for a drama teacher and present the list to McMahon Tuesday morning for consideration during the interview process.

Debbie Magnusson said Tuesday that she was glad parents valued the Learning for Living program and would be willing to teach it again.

"I think it's a valuable program and I have been the advocate of it for a number of years," she said.

Complaint delays Foster trail

The Jack Foster trail at Southey Point has waited 12 years to be completed.

But it will have to wait a few more months after a complaint to the government requires an additional approval for the public path.

The completion of a circular route to the water off Southey Point depends on the completion of a path along a highways access on North End Road near Northview Road.

But that has been held up after a complaint about a cement support below the high-tide mark. The provincial environment ministry must approve structures below high water.

"There was always a pathway down to the beach," trail and nature club president Jim Barber said Monday, "but it was felt for safety reasons a stairway should be built." The cement support is part of that new stairway.

In actual fact, Barber said, only the highest tides wash around the cement support. But that's all it requires for crown lands to get involved.

The club has already spent a year getting permission from the department of highways to build a stairway and agreement from the

Capital Regional District to accept liability for the public use of the path and stairway.

"The point is," Barber said, "all this is being done for the community. We've had a year of red tape.

"It's such a simple thing. Why does it take so long?"

The Parks and Recreation Commission has said it will ask the ministry for permission to leave the four-foot by six-foot structure below the high tide mark.

The neighbour who complained to the ministry could not be reached for comment this week.

Priorities questioned

The school district's \$244,000 purchase of the old B.C. Hydro building is sending the wrong message to parents upset about school cutbacks and cancelled programs, says parent Frank Coffey.

Coffey plans to take his concerns to today's (Wednesday's) school board meeting. The district's offer of \$244,000 for the Rainbow Road building was accepted yesterday (Tuesday) morning, secretary-treasurer Ken Starling said.

The building sits on one-third of an acre adjoining school district property.

Starling said Hydro gave the district the right of first refusal on the structure since the district al-

lowed Hydro to park its vehicles on school property.

Based on an assessment of the property, the district offered \$244,000. The money came from \$868,000 allocated by the province in the district's capital budget for a bus and maintenance shelter.

The capital budget is different from the operating budget, which finances school programs, Starling said.

Coffey said parents don't recognize the difference between the two budgets. "It's perceived by the public as one thing. There's no reason certain programs should be cancelled at the school while it looks like they're building a bus garage."
