## Reform's Frazer off to Ottawa

Flanked by wife June, a beaming Frazer greeted his supporters after his victory over incumbent Lynn Hunter was confirmed.

### Third-place Hunter: 'Canada nastier place'

A wave of protest swept away New Democratic Party incumbent MP Lynn Hunter and carried Salt Spring resident Jack Frazer to Parliament in Monday's federal election.

Nationally, voters gave the Liberals a strong majority and smashed the Conservative Party, which lost all but two seats. Either Reform or the Bloc Quebecois will form the official opposition.

In Saanich-Gulf Islands, Reform Party candidate Frazer collected 26,016 votes, well ahead of Liberal candidate Alex Phillips, who received 18,226 votes. Hunter was third with 13,207, Progressive Conservative Marilyn Loveless received 8,070 and National Party candidate Judith Rayburn garnered 3,730 votes.

Far behind were the Natural Law Party's Andy Guest with 521 votes, Independent Bob Ward with 215 and the Canada Party's Arleigh Rolind with 52. Almost 77 per cent of the riding's 91,834 voters cast ballots.

"This is a big job I've got and I've got to get a handle around it," Frazer told a 200-strong crowd of mostly grey-haired voters gathered

in a Sidney restaurant Monday night to cheer the newly-elected MP.

Saying he didn't like long speeches, he briefly thanked his supporters and then moved through the crowd, shaking hands and hugging friends.

On the other side of the peninsula, at Prospect Lake Community Hall, New Democrat Lynn Hunter was also exchanging hugs with supporters, who were consoling the defeated candidate.

Although she campaigned on her personal record as an MP, Hunter said she was trying not to view her defeat as a personal rejection. "This is much bigger than Lynn Hunter," she said, adding that some Reform Party members have praised her representation.

If the voters will not reward hard-working incumbents with re-election, she wonders how much incentive future MPs will have to put extra effort into representing their constituents.

"It's not the best night of my life but I will survive," she said.

Both she and Frazer said the

## No marine fuel when station closes Friday

As of Saturday, boats expecting to refuel in Ganges Harbour will be disappointed. The marine refuelling station and bulk fuel storage arms of the Esso business on Salt Spring Island will close Friday.

That does not mean, however, that Esso is going away. Agent Bruce Fiander says that as far as land-based customers are con-

cerned, "it is business as usual." "We are still an on-island presence," Fiander told the *Driftwood* Tuesday. "We are still in business as we've always been, since 1910."

But instead of keeping fuel in tanks at Grace Point, fuel will be brought by truck from Nanaimo. That procedure began three weeks

ago. Boaters, however, are left to find fuel elsewhere. The loss of a marine fuelling station in Ganges Harbour means island-based boats and boat businesses have to fuel up at other stations, such as those in Active Pass, on Saturna Island or in Sidney.

"It's going to be hard on us," Gulf Islands Water Taxi owner Jack Hughes said. "It's going to delay everything."

Two of Hughes' boats, *Scholarship* and *The Graduate*, run high school children between the islands. He will now have to consider getting back to Active Pass for fuel or going to Lyall Harbour on Saturna sometime after the normal run. He said the school run schedule

## Show leads police to murder suspect

A murder featured on television's *Unsolved Mysteries* has led to the arrest of a man on Salt Spring Island.

Local painter and decorator Gordon Neil MacIntyre was arrested Thursday by Ganges RCMP in connection with the 1986 murder in Kissimmee, Florida, of Paula Pasciak.

MacIntyre's real name is reported to be Gerald Gervasoni, who is wanted for the strangling of his girlfriend July 13, 1986, in Kissimmee, south of Disney-World in Central Florida.

He had lived on Salt Spring since about May.

On October 6, after *Unsolved Mysteries* showed pictures of Gervasoni, Ganges RCMP received information that MacIntyre matched

his photo. Investigation by police revealed there were two Gordon Neil MacIntyres with the same date of birth, same place of birth and same description.

Further investigation revealed that only one Gordon Neil MacIntyre was born August 22, 1957 in Alberta. Fingerprints taken from the local MacIntyre matched those of Gerald Gervasoni.

Gervasoni was arrested at his place of work and held under the Immigration Act. The next day he was turned over to immigration authorities in Victoria.

If he is extradited to face the murder charge, Gervasoni faces the death penalty.

He was also facing a sexual assault charge in Victoria, and had been scheduled for a preliminary hearing early next year.

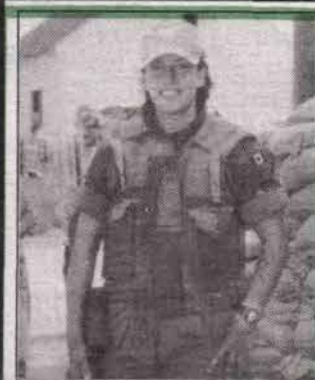

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## Bicycle paths 'too costly'

New paving on Vesuvius Bay Road may please north Salt Spring drivers fed up with the potholes and worn asphalt. But islanders who were expecting to see bicycle paths are disappointed.

"It's incredibly disappointing," Islands Trust representative Bob Andrew said last week. The Salt Spring Island Transportation Committee was also unhappy with the decision not to put in bike paths and called the road "an accident waiting to happen."

Resurfacing of three and a half kilometres of road from Central to Vesuvius was carried out last week by City Paving for \$288,000. Highway officials were calling the work resurfacing and not a capital expenditure, though the ministry was footing the bill, not Vancouver Island Highways Maintenance Corporation, which has the contract to maintain island roads. The road was last paved, one official guessed, 26 years ago.

Highways' south island district manager Richard Harold said right of way and budget were the main reasons major reconstruction was not done. Highways does not own rights-of-way wide enough to put in bike paths, he said, and buying the necessary property would greatly increase the cost.

But after looking at a map Andrew said the only part of Vesuvius Bay Road that was not the standard highways right-of-way width of 66 feet was the part in Vesuvius itself.

"The rest of the road all the way up to Central is the normal width of road," he said. "We felt they could do a bicycle path on part of the road or do a bicycle path to the extent that the budget would allow."

Trustee John Stepaniuk said the bike paths were not put on hold for lack of trying. He cited lack of money and the winding nature of the road as obstacles to upgrading it to accommodate bicycles.

But he also said Highways was using different terminology from when he worked for the ministry and that the extent of the resurfacing work, in his mind, was capital expenditure, and not a simple resurfacing.

Andrew was concerned that the newly resurfaced road would be good for "at least 20 years."

"That to me indicates they wouldn't do a major upgrade in 20 years," he said.

Andrew plans to write a letter to the minister of highways expressing his disappointment.

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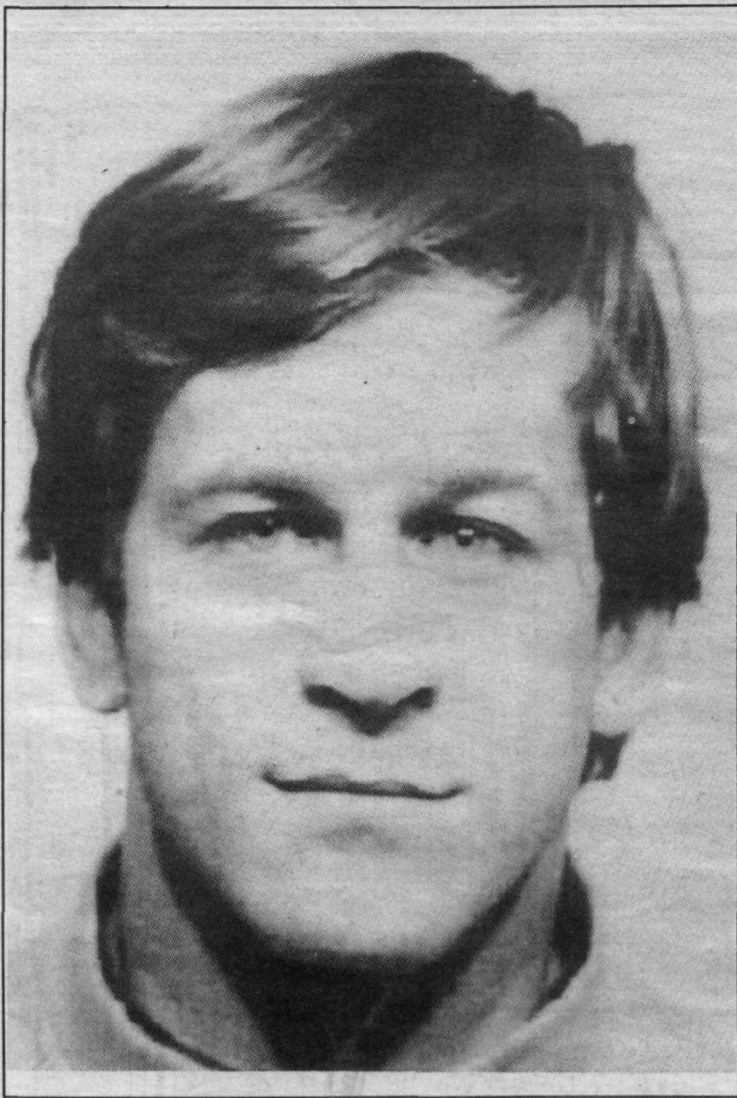

## 'He wasn't nuisance to me'—landlady

"He was kind and clean, a steady worker. He wasn't a nuisance to me."

With those words, a visibly shaken Margaret Cates described the tenant she knew as Gordie MacIntyre, a man who was arrested Thursday on suspicion of murder.

According to police, Gordon Neil MacIntyre was in actual fact Gerald Gervasoni, wanted for the murder of his girlfriend in Florida seven years ago. He had boarded with Cates at her Park Drive home since last May, she said in an interview Friday, less than 24 hours after learning that he was wanted for murder in Florida.

"He was a short, nice looking guy, meticulous about his appearance."

But Cates' assessment of her boarder differed a great deal from that of another tenant in Cates' house, who described Gervasoni as an uncompassionate man whose personality changed quickly and often.

The tenant, who asked not to be identified, said Gervasoni "was in

a total state of paranoia." News of his arrest had first come as a shock, but it brought to mind a great deal "that now adds up."

For one thing, Gervasoni was always the first to answer the telephone, or the doorbell. And he always wanted to know if anyone had called.

"He was very evasive about his past," the boarder said. "It made sense if he was hiding."

He also recalled Gervasoni being reluctant to see *Unsolved Mysteries*, the show that led police to him in the end.

"Whenever we wanted to watch *Unsolved Mysteries*, he'd turn it off."

Gervasoni, he said, was also very kind to his landlady, but spoke unkindly about her when she wasn't around.

For Margaret Cates, the ordeal was still fresh on Friday, particularly after Gervasoni had called her from his jail cell the night before. He was crying, she said, and continued to deny any knowledge of the Florida murder.

"I haven't been able to sleep since," she said.

pre-election polls suggested a possible Reform victory. Hunter said it was clear early in the campaign that there was a wave of support for Reform, but she and her supporters hoped to turn that wave.

Frazer said it was gratifying to find the support predicted by polls was confirmed by votes. He credited his victory to Canadians' desire for change in the political system.

Hunter was also surprised by the "total collapse" of the Conservative Party and said candidate Lovelless — a former school trustee — was caught in the backlash.

Although the Conservatives deserved to reap the anger of the voters, Hunter says the swing to the right and Reform will not serve Canadians. "I think they will regret it and regret it quickly."

Reform is not an inclusive party, Hunter said. Although the party preaches equality, she believes Reformers do not understand the need to remedy the inequalities which exist in Canadian society. "Reform stands for all those things I am opposed to."

Although the New Democrats lost their official party standing, there will still be nine NDP MPs in Parliament, Hunter said. "The voices of New Democrats have been muted, not silenced, thank goodness."

She predicts an antagonistic Parliament, populated by Bloc Quebecois and Reform MPs in opposition. "I think it means our country is a nastier place."

Frazer is retired following a 35-year career in the air force, during which time he achieved the rank of colonel and was base commander at the Canadian Forces Base Baden-Soellingen in Germany. He hopes his expertise in defense and external affairs issues will be used within the Reform Party caucus.

He and wife June plan to maintain their home on Salt Spring — "I can't afford to move" — and Frazer would like to establish his con-

stituency office on the Saanich Peninsula, easily accessible for Gulf Islanders and for his Sidney, Central Saanich, North Saanich and Saanich constituents.

Hunter said she is planning to take a holiday and "try out a personal life." Tears filled her eyes when she admitted how much she

loved participating in government and representing the people of Saanich-Gulf Islands for the past five years.

"I will have to find another way to do what I want to do," she said, adding, "Democracy is about choices — not always about the right choices."

will not be affected at all.

The ambulance boat and Coast Guard will also have to plan ahead so they are not left stranded back in Ganges.

A decision was made by Imperial Oil Canada in January 1992 to close down the marine fuelling station in Ganges as part of cost-cutting measures nation-wide. Imperial Oil public affairs manager Don Coghill said reduced demand for marine fuel, environmental risks and economic viability were factors in the decision to close the facility.

Ganges Marina had had plans for several months to install marine fuelling facilities, but arrangements had not yet been concluded.

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## Call the mayor

While the rest of the nation halted this week at an electoral crossroads, Salt Spring continued to move in a recently adopted circular motion, our new one-way streets being the legacy of three years of planning traffic routes in Ganges.

Some might question the use of the word planning in this case, but the evidence is there. The Islands Trust, the Capital Region, the Chamber of Commerce and the Ministry of Highways have more or less jointly devised the latest traffic scheme with a process that dates back to early 1990.

It was a process that included public presentation on paper of what we see in reality in Ganges today, in addition to newspaper coverage. It was a process that did not exclude public input, but sought it. Obviously, even that was not enough.

This is not to say that the positioning of the bright yellow curbs and the crisp white lines is perfect. Some of the former are located in such a fashion as to cause serious injury to the unwitting cyclist who has not yet had time to chart the new traffic pattern. Curbs that suddenly jut out into what used to be thoroughfare represent nasty booby traps indeed.

The planned elimination of seven parking slots in front of Creekside is a remarkable piece of work that would render that patch of asphalt useless. Perhaps it is slated to become the long-awaited skateboard park.

We are told that Highways dislikes that form of parking and that the development permit for Creekside was issued with a warning saying so.

That being the case, the permit should have been withheld until the matter was resolved to the satisfaction of all.

As to the one-way streets, anything would have been an improvement over the previous mess, particularly on McPhillips Avenue.

The efficient movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic through Ganges is a goal for which many have strived, but success has been elusive.

For those who had bitter complaints last week about the latest changes, it was the kind of issue that cried out for a call to the mayor to try to put things right.

It's too bad we don't have one.

## Regional representation

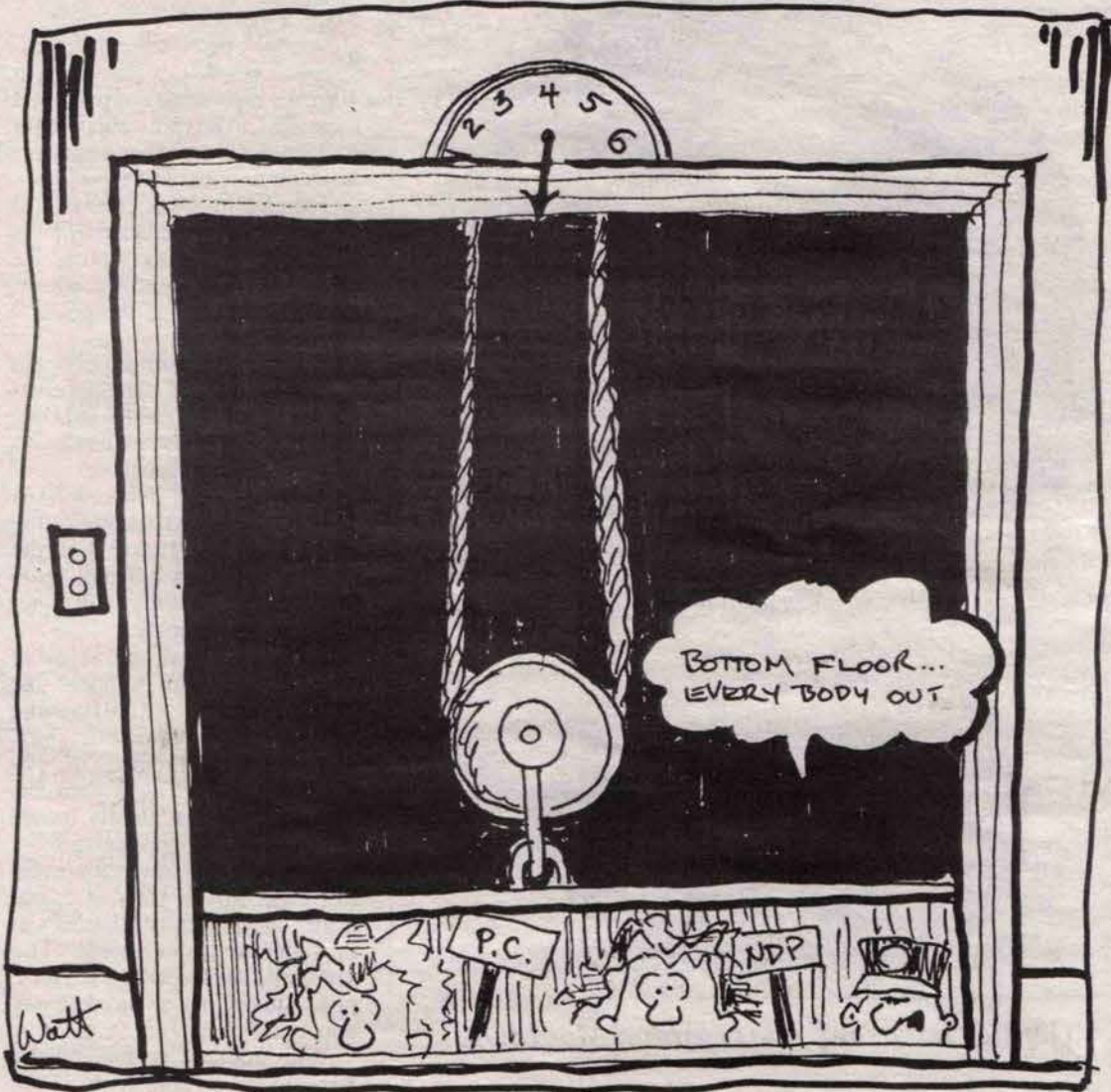
Monday night's election revealed both the strength and the weakness of the Canadian democratic system. On the plus side, Canadians were finally given the chance to oust a government that many had come to despise.

The complaints which had festered in coffee klatch debates, before dwindling lists of job postings and at the store counter — where the hated GST was slapped on their purchases — spurred Canadians to mark their ballots anywhere but next to the name of a Progressive Conservative. All but two of the once mighty Conservative horde fell before the onslaught of X's on ballots — proving that in a democracy the pencil is mightier than the spin-doctor.

But the election also illustrated a weakness in the Canadian system, with the election of over 50 Bloc Quebecois candidates who may well form the official opposition. The Bloc, unfortunately, is a single-issue, single-province party. Members are hardly prepared to fill the role of *Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition*, unless that role includes unhitching their home province from confederation.

Reform, which drew all but six of its seats from two Western provinces, is equally unrepresentative of the country as a whole.

To be effective, both sides of government should contain representation from a majority of Canadian provinces. Failing that, an effective Senate could fill the gap and provide the type of regional representation for which it was originally designed.



## Centre not problem solver but place for teens to go

We've done it! The purchase of the old Garner house — formerly known as Luigi's — is finally completed as of Thursday, Oct. 28. "The Core Inn" as the project is known to date will be the home for youth-oriented activities and a place run by youth, with adults for the community. The teenagers involved with the planning so far have expressed that they don't want it to be "ageist" — youth of all ages are welcome.

The scope of the project and the size of the building can accommodate different programs at various times, to appeal to a broad range of interests. The Student Leadership Council want to maintain their own identity and operate from the Core Inn location. Community volunteers have already offered to initiate and set up programs such as a teen recording studio, in-house radio station, youth employment service and mentor programs in the arts, crafts and other skills.

The Core Inn will start off simple. A late night coffee house seems to be the most popular request by youth to begin with. They need a place to house pool tables and other equipment that has been previously donated.

In only 10 weeks time \$200,000 has been raised thanks to generous donations from the community, grants have been applied for that look promising and we are still actively seeking more donations, support from businesses and corporate sponsorship. Young people have been out the past two weekends and after school canvassing their neighbourhoods hand they have collected \$10,000 so far.

fund for Salt Spring youth. Accounts are set up at each bank and tax receipts are available if you leave your name and address with your deposit.

Help us raise the roof! We've already bought the building but we still need \$25,000 to buy the

roof.

This project was initiated after a tragic accident and the death of two of our island teenagers. Teens in trouble are not 'rotten apples.' Some troubled teens act out in bad behaviour but it is not fair to judge the person based only on their action. Some-

times these teens have been victims of bad behaviours by others and they are crying out for help when they break the rules. I believe that inside — at their core — they are good and beautiful people. The potential is there. The hard core of an apple core is the seed from which blossoms fruit but only if it is nurtured and cared for. As a youth worker for the past 11 years on Salt Spring, I can't count the number of meetings I've attended where the plight of

island youth has been the topic of discussion and the question asked — What can we do that might help make a difference?

The Core Inn will not solve the problems of youth or our island — but it will provide a positive alternative, another choice. Our teens need a place to go where they will feel comfortable and welcome — a place to call their own.

At our auction a couple of weeks ago, Joe Garner, author of a book on the history of Salt Spring, expressed his delight that the old Garner family home would now become a place for youth. As he put it, our youth are the resource of the future and we must look after them.

The word "minimal" can be used only to describe Leanne Wagg's \$75 fine.

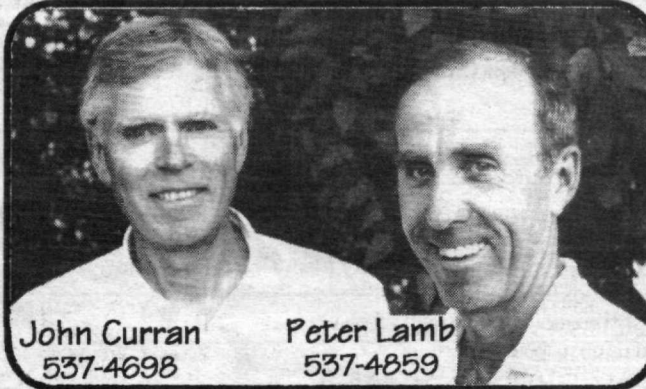

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# No condoms

To the Editor,  
I am writing this letter on behalf of the medical staff at Lady Minto Hospital.

On speaking to many of the young women and men at Gulf Islands Secondary School, I was appalled to discover that there were no condom machines at the school. Current statistics indicate that the largest increase in HIV infection and AIDS cases is occurring in young people, especially women age 15-24.

Young people have always been

sexual, often to the chagrin of the older generation. There is no evidence that making condoms available to young adults makes them be more promiscuous. It does not implant ideas into their heads. The ideas are already there. Unfortunately, I think the message that is given by the fact that there are no condoms available is that we don't really care about the health of our young people.

The decision to have condoms available in schools is a local one, dependent on the attitudes of the local school administration. There are many jurisdictions in which

condom machines are in the schools. Many people often cry out that they believe that special interest groups have too much influence in policy. I think that this is also the case here, where the religious convictions of a few people are being used to deny the young adults of Salt Spring Island access to something which could ultimately prove lifesaving.

As a health care provider on the island, I am seeing more and more cases of HIV infection and AIDS, right here. It's no longer only in the big cities. It's no longer a disease confined to certain segments of society. And that frightens me because it's going to take a major shift in our attitudes towards sex in order to effectively educate people to protect themselves and the people they care about. We could start by sending a message to the teenagers right here on Salt Spring that if they are going to choose to be sexual (and many of them already are) that they protect themselves and their partners and use condoms. A good first step to this end would be overcoming our own hang-ups and making condoms more accessible. Right now, the only place condoms are available is at the very public Pharmasave. This is unacceptable.

VICTORIA — Five southern Vancouver Island NDP MLAs sniffed the wind and ran for cover last Monday.

If it happened in the military during armed combat, the five would be court-martialled, shot for cowardice, and the Harbour government would be minus four cabinet ministers and one backbencher.

If you or anyone you know earns a living in the forest, you'll want to remember the names of the five deserters. They are Sports Minister Robin Blencoe, Finance Minister Elizabeth Cull, Environment Minister Moe Sihota, Forest Minister Andrew Petter, and backbencher Gretchen Brewin.

In a letter released last Monday, the five tried to distance themselves and the NDP government from the contempt of court proceedings that have so far resulted in jail terms and heavy fines for the first 44 of nearly 800 people arrested at the logging road blockade in Clayoquot Sound on Vancouver Island.

The cutely phrased letter says in so many words that the five MLAs don't like the heavy sentences and fines any more than those who received them, but that they can't comment on matters before the courts.

"As politicians and New Democrats, we haven't abandoned our commitment to people's rights to protest, but we can't comment or try to influence the outcome of the consequences," said Petter.

The letter in question took the form of an "open letter" to constituents. It said that the five MLAs are concerned about suggestions that the government, somehow, was responsible for the conduct of the trial and the sentences.

"It was the courts that commenced and conducted action against the Clayoquot Sound protesters, not the government," the letter says.

It's a strange message, indeed, the five are sending. They are saying, in effect, that the government had nothing to do with the matter. Let me refresh their memories. It was the government which decided to allow partial logging of Clayoquot Sound. It also was the attorney-general's staff that led the case in court against the protesters.

Premier Harcourt, in typical fashion, jumped off the fence just long enough to find a sturdier one to climb. No, he said, the five weren't giving in to the pressure from the environmentalists.

They were just setting the record straight and telling people that neither the premier nor any of his government MLAs had anything to do with the book Supreme Court Justice John Bouck threw at the people who chose to ignore a Supreme Court order and then proceeded to turn the court proceedings into a circus.

The five turncoats didn't just give in to pressure, they caved in. Aside from the questionable move by the MLAs—two of whom are lawyers—to comment on a matter before the courts while claiming not to be doing so, they clearly broke solid government ranks to appease the environmental vote.

Make no mistake, the environmental groups, mainstream and fringe, will interpret the letter as the first indication that the government is weakening on its Clayoquot stand. They will smell blood and not only renew their efforts to have the decision reversed but step up their activities.

Unlike the five MLAs, and unlike a small army of bleeding-heart editorial writers who have been waxing eloquent about the harshness of the sentences, I believe the protesters got everything they deserved. They chose the route of civil disobedience, knowing the consequences.

Throughout the Clayoquot Sound controversy, the protesters claimed to be acting in the true traditions of history's great civil disobedience leaders such as Dr. Martin Luther King and Mahatma Gandhi. Mr. Justice Bouck made short shrift of that argument.

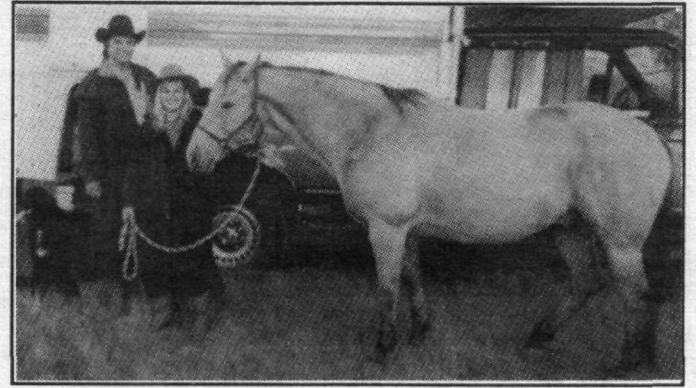
Unlike Gandhi and King, he said, the environmentalists had access to a democratic system. He also pointed out that when Gandhi was before the British courts in India for the first time in 1929, he acknowledged that he broke the law and asked that the court impose the maximum sentence on him.

Our protesters, on the other hand, snivelled and whined. Some protest, some civil disobedience.

And now, five government MLAs, including four cabinet ministers, no less, have joined the whimpering crowd, telling them it's the courts, not they who are sending them to jail.

If I depended for my livelihood on the government's determination to stick to its guns, I wouldn't give a plugged nickel for my chances of survival.

### Letter refuted

To the Editor,  
Re: the letter of John McMullan (*Driftwood*, October 20). Since AIDS Awareness Week has to do with awareness and knowledge, I would like to refute the letter and offer the following:

"The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that current-

ly a total of 8-10 million persons worldwide are infected with HIV. During the first decade of the HIV/AIDS pandemic, an estimated 500,000 cases of AIDS in women and children have already occurred. WHO foresees an increase in the rate if HIV infections, AIDS cases, and deaths among women and children in the 1990's. (From the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 1993).

The CDC has published several statistical trends, one of them being that the percentage of AIDS cases attributed to heterosexual contact has increased by 21 percent from 1990 to 1991. Further, the incidence of AIDS in women increased 17 percent between 1990 and 1991 and is still increasing. The CDC also states that "HIV infection/AIDS is expected to be one of the top five causes of death for women of childbearing age in the early 1990's." (1993)

From the book *Sexual Transmission of HIV Infection*, (Ed.: Schonnesson, L., 1993): until the beginning of this decade, most research involving AIDS was directed at the male population which was until the present time, the largest risk group. Now the Disease is spreading to heterosexuals at an alarming rate, and research is being redirected.

From that same book: a women's risk of contracting HIV from sexual intercourse with an infected male is as high as five times that of a man in the reverse situation. It is also statistically more likely that a heterosexual woman will have an infected partner than vice versa.

Mr. McMullan does not do anyone any favours by blaming this group and discouraging others from receiving correct and potentially life-saving information.

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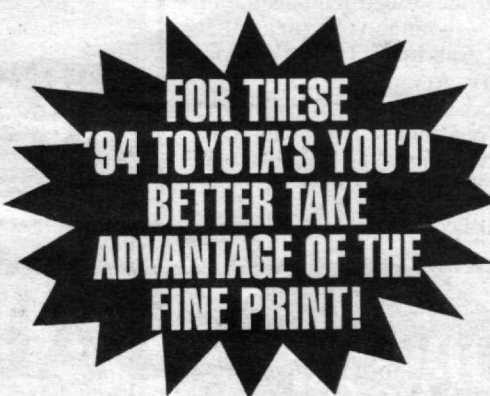

# Trio discusses sustainability at island forum

Transformation of Salt Spring into a sustainable community was examined by a trio of experts at a forum Saturday.

Following their formal presentations, Debra Lynn Dadd-Redalia, Carol Venolia and Robert Gilman fielded questions from the audience about Salt Spring's future and development of a sustainable community.

"You can't snap your fingers and have a sustainable community," Venolia noted.

Developing such a community may be a thousand-year process, she said.

But she suggested residents start the process toward sustainability by making it a guiding principle and asking what leads to that goal.

Dadd-Redalia suggested residents meet and identify 20 local indicators of sustainability and monitor them. By tracking the indicators, residents can measure whether the community is moving towards or away from sustainability.

If the movement is away, the group can then determine what actions would lead to more sustainability. This process can give a group practical goals, Dadd-Redalia said. "We need to be able

to say these are the issues and this is how we're making progress in them."

For Gilman, the movement towards sustainable lifestyles may determine whether humans are around for the next five billion years. Developing sustainability is a life-long process, he said.

Education is part of the process but all three presenters questioned the formal education system.

Gilman said his son is a "fourth grade drop-out" who is now being home-schooled although Gilman's daughter is still in the public school system.

"You should never let schooling interfere with a child's education," Gilman remarked, recommending that children should be involved in family projects and have opportunities to learn about the world.

Public education is still prepar-

ing students for an industrial age which no longer exists, he added.

Asked about transportation, Gilman said transportation problems are an indication that the community is not well-designed. Good land use allows more residents to walk or cycle instead of drive.

In Germany, he said, car cooperatives have developed which allow a group of people to share a pool of vehicles.

This cuts down on the total number of vehicles in use because not all people require cars all of the time.

On Salt Spring, he said there should be more provision for cyclists. He also suggested a car pooling "hotline" so commuters could share transportation.

The danger of such affordable transportation is that it increases urban sprawl by allowing people to live farther from the centre of town, he said.

Dadd-Redalia pointed out that in England and Europe, where most towns were developed before the existence of the automobile, it is much easier to get around by rail and walking because towns have compact central cores where most people live.

Gilman suggested a system of development credits which would preserve property values while allowing development to be restricted to a town centre. Under the system, each piece of property would be assigned a development credit.

Only land near the town centre would be available for development and a certain number of credits would be required for approval of any development project. The developer would therefore have to buy credits from outlying property owners in order to

proceed with any project in the development area.

"It can be a lot of fun. There could be all sorts of projects, steps towards sustainability done one by one. Sustainability is something you do in everyday life," she said.

The forum was sponsored by the Sustainable Salt Spring Community Round Table, which is preparing recommendations for next year's review of Salt Spring's official community plan.

The group is planning three more public events on sustainability.

## 'Address concerns with schools'

Concerns about courses offered at local schools should be taken to the schools before being brought to the school board, chair Allisen Lambert said at the last board meeting.

Lambert said she had received several phone calls from residents asking why specific courses were not offered at their neighbourhood school.

Questions were asked about visual and performing arts and about social and emotional development programs, she said.

However, once the mandatory

programs are in place, the individual school determines which additional programs can be added, based on available funding and the needs of the community, Lambert said.

In other school board news:

- Three school trustees and superintendent of schools Mike Marshall will review the revised Islands Trust draft policy statement for issues affecting schools.

Trustee Grace Byrne said she had read the document and thought it was well done.

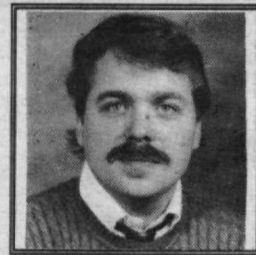
The board received a copy of the

policy and was invited to comment on the contents by October 22 or attend a special public meeting on the draft policy this week at the Dorchester Hotel in Nanaimo.

- Four Gulf Islands schools have applied for computers and software under the federal government's Computers for Schools Project, director of instruction Bob McWhirter told the board.

Under the project, surplus government hardware and software will be provided to Canadian elementary and secondary schools.

Starting at 5 p.m. random outages throughout the Gulf Islands, caused by high winds breaking branches and pushing trees on to power lines.

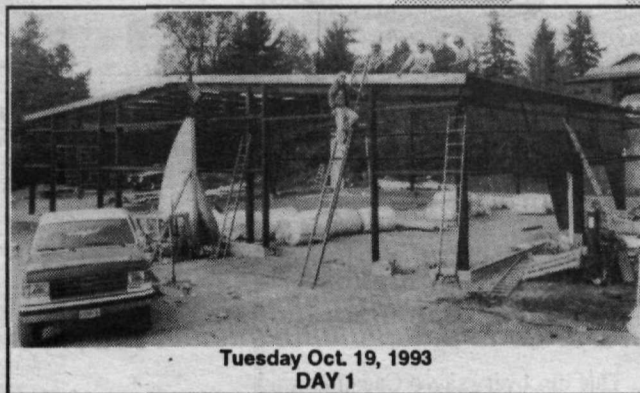
One major outage occurred at the north end of Galiano at about 9 p.m. when a cedar tree knocked down five spans of line. Power was restored by 1:30 a.m.

Langston said the majority of the outages were repaired by 1 p.m.

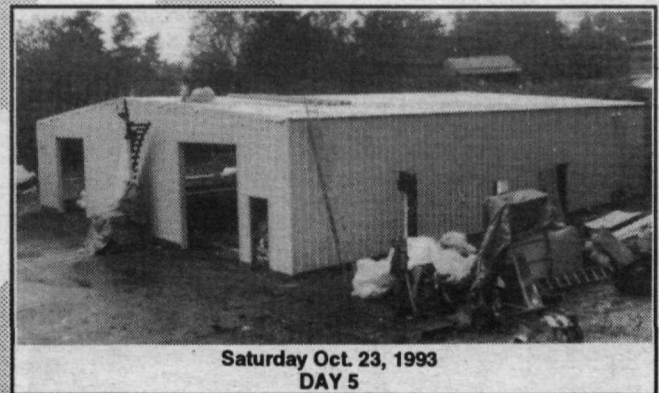

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# Organic farms seen as defense against loss of seed diversity

Bio-diversity as the key to survival was the message brought to Salt Spring October 15 to 17 during an international conference held at the Salt Spring Centre.

Entitled *Filling the Global Pantry: Preserving our Global Food Supply*, the seminar was presented by the Unitarian Service Committee (USC) of Canada. Guest speakers included Dr. Melaku Worede, an Ethiopian ex-

pert on plant genetics, Ethiopian agriculturist Hailu Getu and Canadian agriculturist Dr. John Martin.

Coordinator Ann Gillespie said Salt Spring was chosen as a location for the seminar because of the number of organic growers on the island, some of whom had been contacted during an earlier visit by Hailu Getu.

The visit by Worede and Getu

was partially funded by the Canadian International Development Agency, Gillespie said. A CBC crew from Country Canada was also present to film part of the event.

An opening presentation by Martin and Worede on October 16 — World Food Day — outlined the importance of seed bio-diversity.

Martin noted the "green revolution," which started in the mid-1960s, was an attempt to produce enough food to feed the entire population.

High-yield seeds, pesticides, herbicides and intensive irrigation were all introduced in a bid to increase crop yields, Martin explained. However, the green revolution actually increased problems with food production by wiping out the diversity of seeds which had naturally evolved to suit the varied conditions of each field.

High-yield seeds thrived in optimum conditions but produced crops that were wiped out in adverse conditions. Traditionally, farmers' fields in the developing world contained a variety of seed strains, making it more likely that some of the crop would always survive.

The green revolution created financial hardship as it required farmers to buy new types of seed. Traditionally farmers took the seeds for their next year's crop from previous years. The intensive agriculture required for high-yield seeds was also expensive and often inappropriate to the local growing conditions.

In developing countries, most people live on the crops they produce, Martin noted. For them, food security means having a crop to harvest and enough seeds to plant the next crop. "They eat grains. When people grow their own food, their survival is assured if they get a crop."

Sponsored by the Unitarian Service Committee, *Seeds of Survival* sought to collect and preserve the bio-diversity of seeds which had been produced through centuries of agriculture in Ethiopia.

The adoption of uniform, high-yield seeds and intensive agriculture in developed countries makes those countries susceptible to massive crop loss if a disease, pest or condition occurs which the crop cannot withstand.

"Once you disturb nature, what was existing in harmony, then you have trouble," Worede said. There may come a time when food production on the planet depends on the diversity of seeds preserved in developing countries.

"It is for the whole planet." At one point, Worede said, the barley crop in North America was threatened by the yellow dwarf virus disease — until researchers discovered a resistant strain of barley growing in Ethiopia.

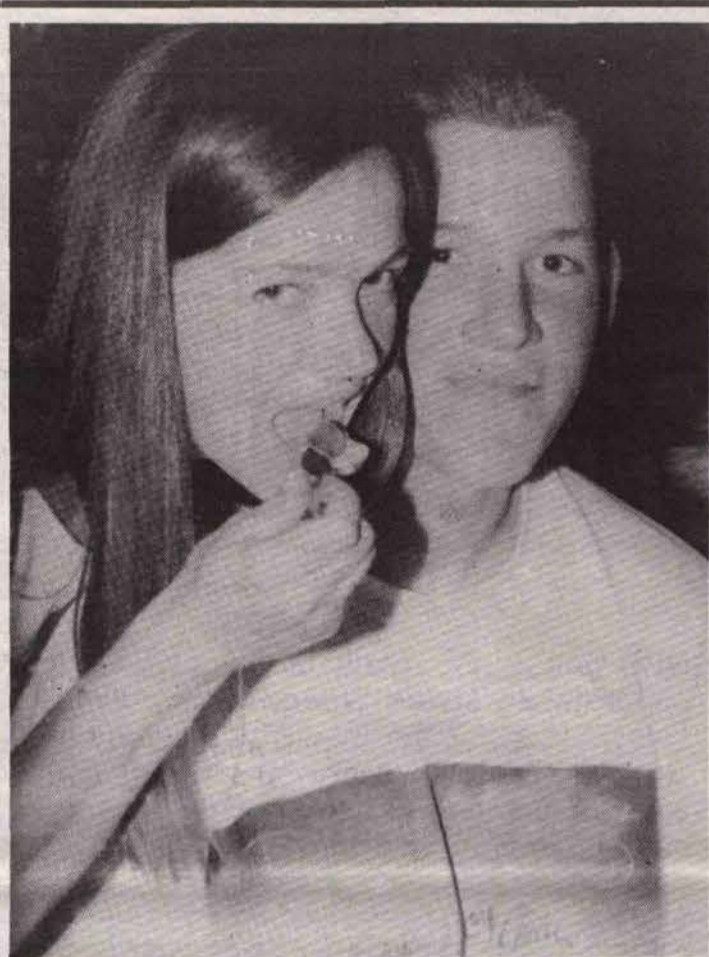
That discovery saved Canadian farmers over \$100 million annually, Worede noted.

For the small farms in the developing world, diversity is the key to survival. A single farm can contain many different types of soil, Worede notes.

In the west, small organic farmers like those on Salt Spring are the best defense against loss of seed diversity, Martin remarked.

Since man's understanding of the balance between seeds and environment is still limited, it is important to preserve what we have, Worede said.

"We don't know what is in these farms therefore why destroy it — why let it go?"

## These protesters are older, don't wear long hair, beads

"This awful truck comes towards you in the dark. I almost expected to see machine gun turrets." That's how Lynda Jensen of Salt Spring describes one experience last summer as a Clayoquot protester.

Twice she stood on the road in the pre-dawn darkness until the injunction was read, the road was cleared and the logging trucks rolled through.

Jensen and friends Rosemary and John Baxter do not fit the image of long-haired, beaded and flower-decked youth who were shown in media clips on the protests over the summer. But that is exactly why they decided to add their voices to the Clayoquot protest.

"Part of our presence is to represent a more conventional segment of the population," John said. Although the television cameras tend to focus on the counter-culture protesters, John says there are many protesters from mainstream society as well.

Jensen, her husband LeRoy and the Baxters all praise the dedication and skill of the protesters. "I was absolutely stunned by the intelligence, the control, the honesty and articulation of ideas by spokespersons for Friends of Clayo-

quot Sound," says LeRoy. He has a 30-year history of protesting and was involved with an early Greenpeace protest against nuclear testing.

He is also the only one of the four who embraces the idea of flouting the injunction and risking arrest. He is, he says, just waiting for the crowds on the blockade to thin before stepping forward.

But Lynda, John and Rosemary

have weighed their options and decided against risking arrest — for now. All own property and feel they run a very real risk of being hit with intimidating lawsuits by Mac-Millan Bloedel if they flouted the injunction.

The technique, known as strategic lawsuits against public participation or SLAPPS, has already been used by the forestry company. Writs served in 1991 against 34 environmentalists claimed damages for harming the

company's business and reputation.

Although SLAPPS do not deter young people who have no assets, they are a potential hazard for people like the Baxters and Jensens, who feel the cost of fighting such a lawsuit through the courts could jeopardize their homes.

But Lynda said she may defy the injunction during a future protest, just because she is so frustrated by the lack of government action and the jail sentences handed down earlier this month to those who defied the injunction last summer.

Both the Jensens and the Baxters have an additional reason not to get arrested: they want to make sure they don't hamper their ability to travel to Central America. As members of the Ometepe-Gulf Islands Friendship Association, they want to be able to visit the group's projects in Nicaragua.

The Baxters are especially upset with the provincial government's decision to allow the clearcut logging. Both worked to help the New Democrats get elected.

"I believed their election promises regarding concern for the environment," John said. "Because I supported them I now feel an obligation to do whatever I can do to make them live up to their promises or get rid of them."

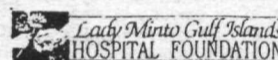

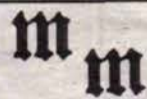

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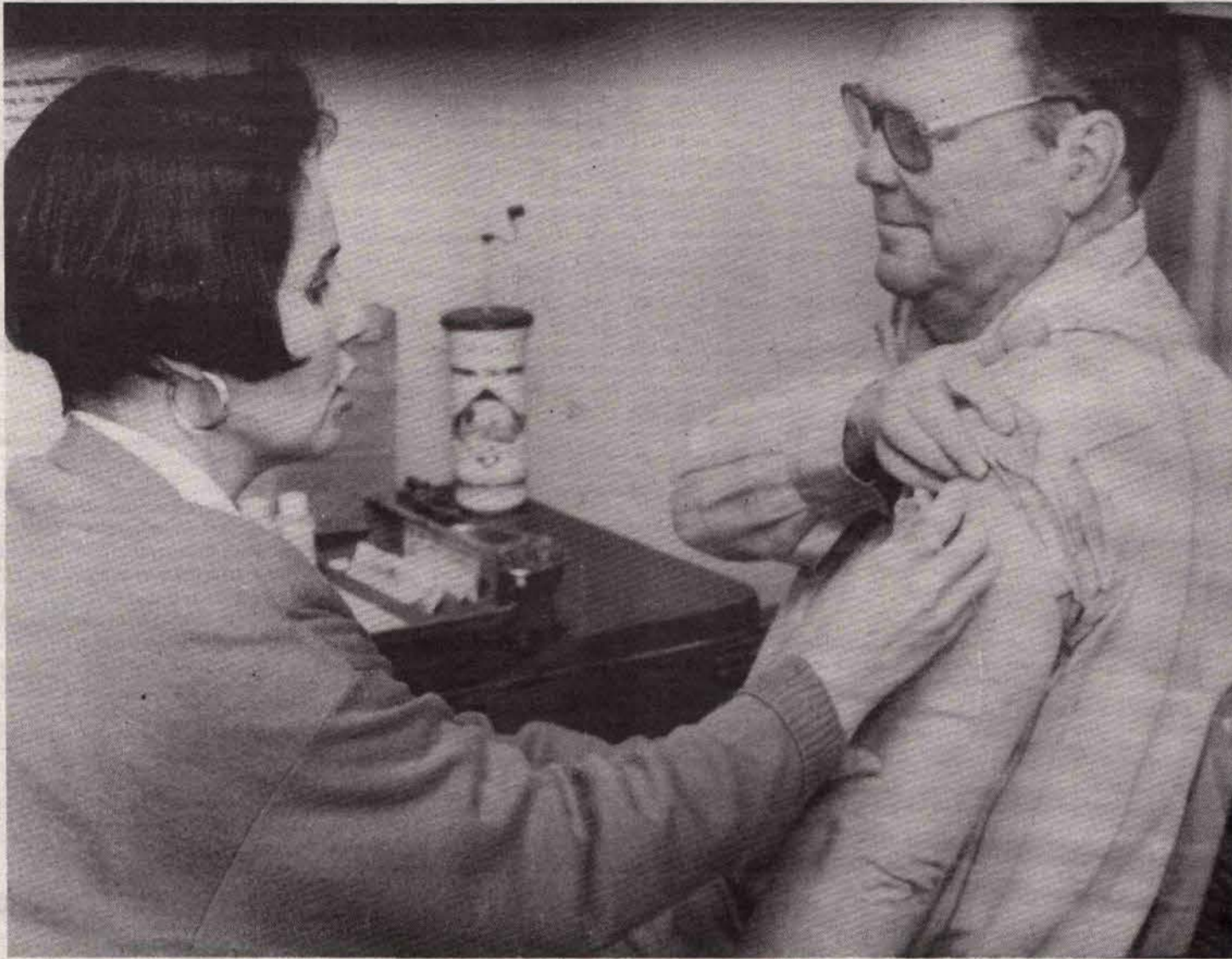

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# More interest in alternatives means greater role for clinic

A wave of the future that is also a legacy of the past: that is how naturopathic physician Dr. Peter Bennett describes his Helios Natural Health Clinic in Ganges.

In the coming month he plans to expand the clinic's role by adding the services of psychologist Honor Griffith and midwife Jean Lyons — both of whom complement the holistic approach of the clinic.

"We had an eye out for some other people who would work with us," Bennett said last week. Ever since the clinic opened two years ago, Bennett wanted a team that could offer a full spectrum of natural health care. Practitioners will be able to share their expertise and offer better care for clients, he said.

"We found two very qualified people," he noted. Griffith specializes in Jungian psychology, and her skills will help clients resolve emotional issues which could hamper their health.

Dream analysis and psychoanalysis are among her skills. "She really impresses me with her commitment," Bennett added.

Midwife Jean Lyons has extensive experience, Bennett said, and is highly qualified. "It will be the first time Salt Spring has had an office to consult with a midwife." The field was recently legalized by the provincial government.

B.C. is unusual among Canadian provinces in that government health insurance will reimburse patients for treatment by a naturopathic physician. In Europe,

it is more common for use of herbs and naturopathic techniques to be incorporated into standard medical care, Bennett said.

Europe was once a major source of information on natural medicines, Bennett said. For example, a book in his office explains that banana powder is good for treating ulcers.

The book was printed in Europe before the turn of the century. "Our training represents the substances used 100 years ago," Bennett said.

"Before the introduction of drugs — around the time of the war — what did people use?"

The Helios pharmacy, stocked with homeopathic medicine and herbs, answers the question. Many of the herbal mixtures are Chinese, reflecting Bennett's interest in Chinese medicine.

In China, he notes, western and naturopathic medicine exist side by side. His interest in Chinese medicines led him to spend extra time studying at Bastier College in Seattle.

To be recognized as a naturopathic physician, students at the college must complete pre-med studies and four years of training, Bennett said. "The person who graduates has to be a doctor." He spent five years studying at Bastier, which he says is known for a scien-

tific approach to naturopathic medicine.

However, not all those hanging out a shingle as naturopathic physicians have met the same requirements. Bennett noted the appropriate course in Quebec is only one to two years — making it difficult to set equal standards across Canada to regulate the profession.

"Our profession is undergoing a rough time," he remarks. However, the field is gaining more widespread acceptance.

Bennett practises on Salt Spring Monday, Wednesday and Friday and in Duncan on Tuesday and Thursday. Operating a clinic requires business skills and creativity as well as healing skills. "You have to have uncompromised discipline and principles to achieve the kind of care you want to create."

Sometimes clients don't like the advice they receive from a naturopathic clinic. "Often you have to counsel people to change their lifestyle."

Although the medicine may be hard to take, the results are often worthwhile, Bennett said. "We get really good results. Natural medicine has survived against all odds."

He hopes the results will lead to revival of the field. At the turn of the century, he said, there were 50,000 homeopathic physicians in the United States. The "romance with technology" over the past six decades dramatically eroded the field. But Bennett thinks the pendulum is now swinging back to natural treatments. "It's an incredible time to be doing what I'm doing."

Bell is one of a team of evangelists selected by Billy Graham for crusade services around the world.

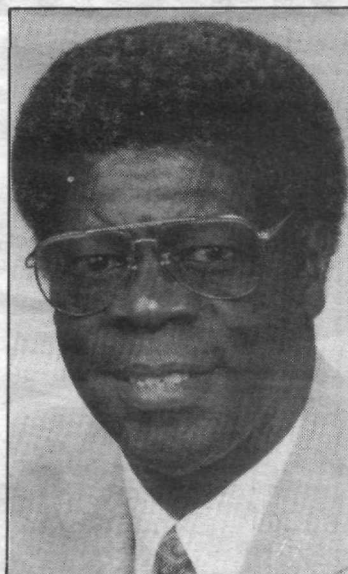
Born in St. Catharines, Ont., Bell has been a church pastor in Los Angeles and a professor at the Los Angeles Bible Training

The crusade at Ganges begins at 7 p.m. and will run about two hours. There is no admission charge.



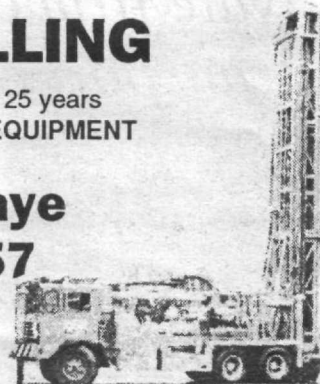

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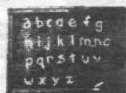

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# down through the years

## Five years ago

October 26, 1988

Ganges was to see the best of the fringe shows from Vancouver and Victoria over three weekends in November. Off Centre Stage was to host the first-ever Stars of the Fringe show, featuring John Patrick Stanley's *Danny and the Deep Blue Sea*, Ross Desprez' *The Ballad of Phil Ochs* and Sam Shepperd's *Savage Love*.

A fish farm proposed for Satellite Channel received negative input from the Advisory Planning Commission (APC). The APC passed a motion to inform the Houston, B.C., applicant of its negative consensus. The size of the proposed fish farm, which was to have been located on floats off Musgrave Landing, was to be the equivalent of three football fields in length and one football field wide.

## Ten years ago

October 26, 1983

In an effort to find a solution to the impasse at Centennial Park a committee of residents was formed, composed of five local groups. The committee was charged with finding out who had tenure over the park and to talk with officials at the ministry of lands, parks and housing to get local control of the park. The committee was made up of a representative of the Islands Trust, the Parks and Recreation Commission,

the Chamber of Commerce, the planning association and the market vendors' association.

B.C. Ferry Corporation managers and workers were locked in negotiations for a contract settlement before October 31. That was the day their current contract expired. Earlier, the union had sought a mandate from its members for strike action and received a resounding 87 per cent vote in favour.

The Salt Spring Island Trust committee asked the ministry of municipal affairs to provide the services of a professional planner for the community of Ganges before the community plan was re-examined. The wide interest of the entire island in the seawalk, Centennial Park, Farmers' Market, parking in Ganges, setbacks and related issues, storm sewers and other aspects of the future merited some detailed attention, said trustee Nick Gilbert.

## Fifteen years ago

October 25, 1978

Angry words and insults were hurled at the Islands Trust during a public hearing called to deal with the Salt Spring Island community plan and proposed revisions to zoning and subdivision bylaws for the island. A large portion of the lengthy meeting was spent discussing the proposal for a core area development of business in Ganges. Objectors to the idea claimed the Trust was being discriminatory

in concentrating expansion of business in the current downtown waterfront area. The most vocal of the protesters was Yvette Valcourt who, with her family, owned the Valcourt Business Centre located about half a mile up the road from the downtown core.

Salt Spring Island Trust committee gave third reading to a proposal from the Blackburn Farm Society for development of housing on the farm's 200 acres. Mrs. Delia Wilson, president of the society, said the society planned to cluster 20 residences on the property and would leave the remainder of the land for use of all residents. Mrs. Wilson also outlined the plan for a par-three executive golf course and to convert the farm's current manor house into a clubhouse.

## Twenty years ago

October 25, 1973

A Duncan man working on the new school facilities in Ganges had a near escape when he was buried beneath a fall of earth. Robert Williams had been working at the foot of a high excavated bank when it gave way and he was buried under earth and rock. His fellow workers dug him out and he was taken to Lady Minto Hospital.

A new entry was announced into the school trustee race for Salt Spring Island. Dr. John Bumsted of the faculty of Simon Fraser University was put forward as a candidate for the local elections. Already in

the running were Charles Baltzer and Ione Guthrie.

## Twenty-five years ago

October 24, 1968

A bigger and busier Lady Minto Hospital was forecast by the referendum bylaw which was presented to ratepayers of the Capital Regional District. The bylaw provided for the borrowing of \$9.3 million for hospital facilities in all parts of the district. Projected for Lady Minto was the provision of another 20 beds for chronic cases. Government would pay 60 per cent of the projected sum, with ratepayers picking up the remainder.

Two contenders had been named already for the federal by-election after the death of Conservative MP Colin Cameron. Nanaimo magistrate and Liberal

Eric Winch and New Democratic Party leader Tommy Douglas were signed up as candidates.

There was a profit in piglets. Adrian Wolfe-Milner, chairman of the Centennial Park maintenance committee, said the recent greasy pig contest netted some \$800. The money was to be used for maintaining the park.

## Thirty years ago

October 24, 1963

A 20 by 36-foot building opposite the old theatre in Ganges was purchased by the Salt Spring Island library board. They held an open house at the new site and attracted close to 100 people. The building had been a boat-building workshop run by Mr. Charles Leggett.

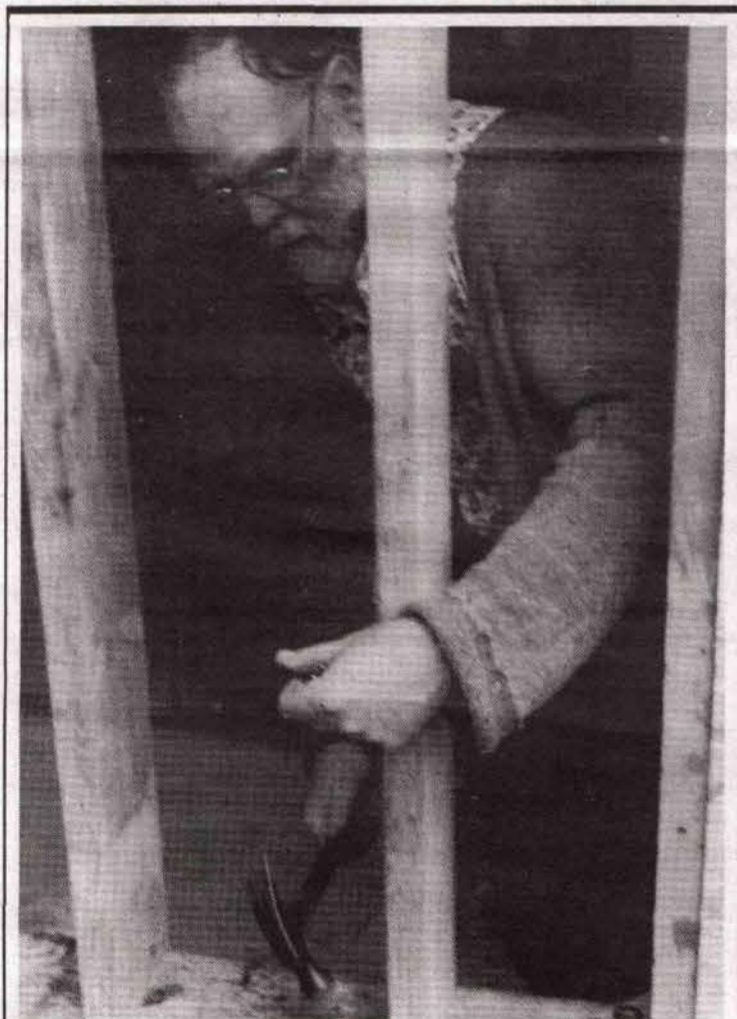

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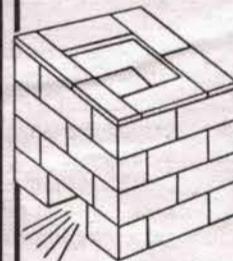
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
