HEARTENING *experience*

Taking care of your heart is better than finding a new one.

So says David Mill, a heart transplant recipient who spoke at Seniors for Seniors Wednesday.

While he's happy with his new ticker, he doesn't recommend the process. At one point, before his transplant, only 10 per cent of his original heart was functioning.

"When I was down to 10 per cent of my heart capability, none of my organs worked to capacity. It was not a pleasant experience."

Yet, in order to qualify for a transplant, his condition had to be life-threatening. "You just don't get into a transplant hospital just like that."

Testing is done to ensure no other measures will sustain life. All other organs must be working well. The patient must have less than a year to live.

"This is a very expensive operation," Mill said, adding that it is reserved for those who truly need a transplant and who will benefit most from the operation.

While in hospital awaiting the operation, Mill said he was briefly taken off the transplant list because of a partially blocked carotid artery. Only when doctors were sure the condition was not life-threatening was he placed

back on the transplant list.

Another issue is the shortage of available hearts. Hearts can only come from accident victims, not from people who die from natural causes and whose hearts have stopped beating.

"Once the heart stops beating, you can't use it," Mill said. A transplant heart must come from an accident victim who has been declared brain dead but whose heart is still beating.

The heart is then kept alive throughout the transplant procedure.

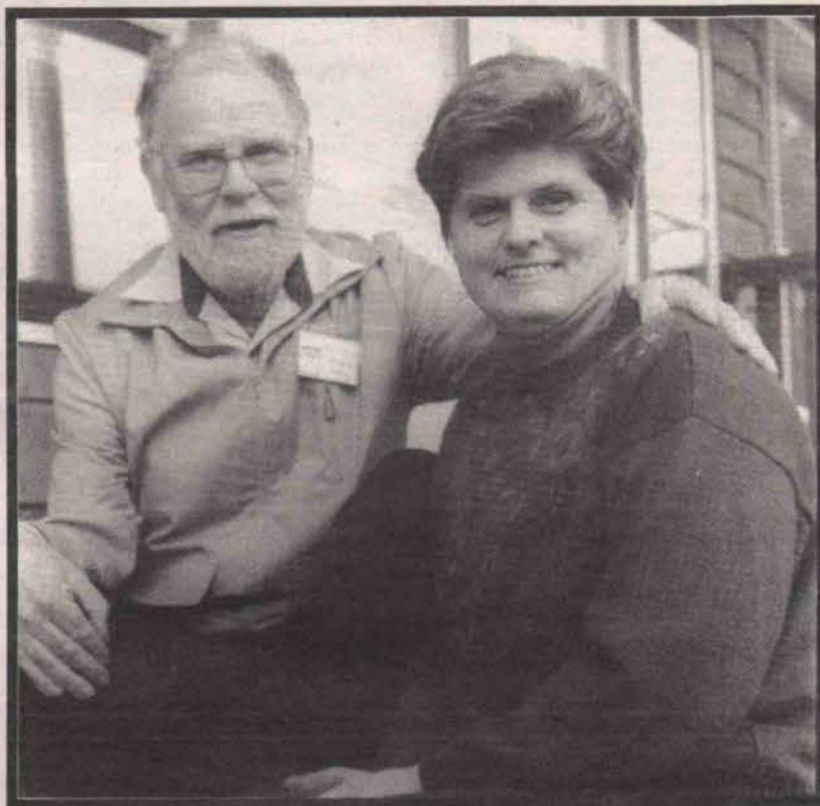
Mill pointed out the number of available hearts has been reduced by the campaign against drunk driving and laws which ensure people wear seat belts. However, Mill stressed that he is in favour of those measures.

More organs would also be available if more people signed organ donor cards, Mill added.

At present, Mill estimated there are only 150 heart transplant recipients in the province. His own induction into the ranks started with a heart attack he suffered while living on Cortez Island. The local doctor initially identified the problem as food poisoning, so for two weeks after the attack, Mill continued to do the garbage run on the

Heart research saves lives

David Mill is living proof of the benefits of heart research. And February is the month the Heart and Stroke Foundation of B.C. pumps up its annual fundraising campaign to aid in that research.

For the past nine years, the Duncan resident has lived with a new heart in his chest.

Thanks to ongoing research and development of treatment options, he was able to survive after a series of heart attacks destroyed much of his heart in 1985.

Research is only part of the foundation's work and money raised during its annual heart month campaign also funds educational programs.

Starting this year, a percentage of the money raised on Salt Spring will stay on the island to fund local programs, said Maryann McColl, president of the Salt Spring unit.

Speaking at Seniors for Seniors last Wednesday, Mill noted the first heart transplant patient in 1967 died 18 days after the operation.

The man did not die because his body rejected the new heart but because the anti-rejection drugs used were so strong that they depressed his natural immune system. He then died of pneumonia because he had no defenses against the infection.

By the time Mill had a heart transplant, major advances had been made in anti-rejection drugs. The modern drugs are much more selective and allow transplant recipients to live almost normal lives, Mill said.

Many people deny they have heart problems, McColl noted. Her husband was only 36 years old when he checked into hospital because of chest pain. He believed he had torn some chest muscles and was surprised to discover he had suffered a heart attack.

Mill said the symptoms of a heart attack can easily be misinterpreted because the pain may not occur in the chest. He estimated there are 16 different causes for chest pain, only one of which is a heart attack.

At the first sign of a problem — which can feel like severe indigestion, a weight on the chest or shooting pains across the chest and up and down the arm — the person experiencing the symptoms should seek immediate medical help.

Far too often, people deny the symptoms of a heart attack and seek medical aid too late. If the heart attack victim goes to the hospital within four hours, damage from the heart attack can be minimized by the introduction of anti-clotting agents into the body.

If a heart attack is suspected, call 911 for emergency help or get to hospital as soon as possible. Calling an ambulance can provide more immediate assistance, since the crew can often offer treatment upon arrival at the scene. Learning CPR gives people

the skills to immediately help heart attack victims.

"All of that can save lives," Mill said.

A healthy diet, regular exercise, no smoking and lowered stress can help prevent heart attacks, Mill added.

Supporting the Heart and Stroke Foundation will ensure continued research into treatment. Mill is president of the Cowichan Valley unit. McColl is trying to rebuild the Salt Spring unit following the death of Scotty Wild last year.

"We miss Scotty a lot because he did it all," McColl said. She wants to start a local support group for heart patients and also hopes to encourage island residents to offer heart smart dining choices. She said the group needs volunteers to help with the February fundraising campaign. McColl can be reached at 537-4114 during working hours and at 537-9730 during the evening.

Due to government cutbacks, Mill predicted much of the research into heart disease will be financed by volunteer societies and by private donations. He also predicted individuals and groups will pick up more of the burden for education and post-operative care.

"The way the government health resources are going, we're all going to have to become more expert at health," he concluded.

Heart month aims to increase funds and awareness

Almost half of the deaths which occur each year in Canada are the result of heart disease and stroke.

The Heart and Stroke Foundation of B.C. and Yukon is part of a national organization working to reduce this death toll, an estimated 80,000 annually, through research and education. Of money donated to the foundation, 55 per cent goes for research, 28 per cent for education and community support, 11 per cent to promote the annual campaign and six per cent on administration.

During February, designated as heart month by the foundation, a request for donations will be printed in the Driftwood.

People can use the form or stop into McColl's Shell to make a donation or mail it to the Salt Spring unit of the heart and stroke foundation, c/o 106 Lower Ganges Road, Salt Spring, V8K 2S7.

Donations can also be made by designating grocery tapes to the heart foundation at both GVM and Thrifty Foods.

Address, phone number changes shake foundations

Not my address; not my telephone number. Nothing is for ever. Odd thing is that there has been a change in both, and that the changes were simultaneous. And I've lost the foundations of my being in this process of change.

For decades I have received my mail at the office, partly for convenience and partly to avoid the confusion that a separate address once compounded.

This practice brought a coincidence into my dull and uneventful life. For years my postal address has been, like Driftwood, Box 250, Ganges. That was a coincidence because when I first arrived in this province I wore the uniform of the Royal Air Force and received my mail through the Royal Air Force postal address, Box 250, Sidney.

Hence, 53 years ago my address was Box 250 and until this year it was yet Box 250. I had got kind of used to it. Now all is changed. The mail comes to the office without benefit of box.

It doesn't really mean a thing. The change represents simply a minor sense of nostalgia that has taken a back seat.

But there is a coincidence that the telephone dialing change came at the same time. I have no beef about either. The postal address makes for a direct contact through the mailing address, which was not practical by way of a mail box. My mailing address is also the street address of the office.

Got me!

As far as the telephone system is concerned, how could I take issue? I've had a telephone for many years and I've seen lots of changes. In fact, the biggest change was moving to British Columbia to connect to a manual telephone system.

The telephone taught us a series of expressions so significant at the time and so empty today.

"Number, please!"

"I'm trying to connect you!"
"I'm sorry! That line is busy!"
My right wrist still aches from winding the magneto!

When the magneto retired to the museums I didn't scream for its reinstatement. It had clearly outlived its time. Nevertheless, I was sorry to see it go. The old sidwinder was a direct link to the world outside. You had trouble, the operator would get you out of it! You had a fire, the operator would call the firehall. You were sick, the telephone would tell you what to do while you waited for help.

And what a difference today! I call my brother in Mill Bay:
"... Please dial 'one' and the area code before the number you are calling!"

I do have a beef, though. All my regular numbers have been duly entered into my telephone's memory. I have now to remember how to change them in order to use the memory system. Right now the telephone memory is no better than mine!

Wave to me, wave to me, wave!

It was the waves what done it! And now, nearly a lifetime later, I see myself as a pioneer of microwave cooking. I wasn't the cook; I was the cooked.

Towards the end of the war I went into a military hospital suffering from a severe bellyache. I had a ruptured appendix and it took the hospital nearly three months to straighten me out and turn me loose.

While I was recuperating from surgery, I was suffering from

renewed aches in the abdomen. I didn't actually have an abdomen at that time, I was still a non-commissioned officer and one of the first lessons for any recruit was that only officers had abdomens; the rest of us had bellies.

The nurses explained that I was going to undertake a new form of treatment identified as "short-wave." For the project I was transferred to a bed with large rubber-tired castors and wheeled to the treatment room.

The room was like a cage. The ceiling and walls were covered with chicken wire. There was a wire on the floor and even the door was tacked over with wire.

A pad was placed on the stomach and I was warned that it might get hot and to call the staff if that should happen. In practice, the pad was hot but not unbearably. I no longer recall the details, but there must have been a second connection somewhere around me.

During the treatment I could feel a pleasantly warm glow inside my stomach. I assumed that the project was cooking the offensive factor in the area of where once I had housed an appendix.

As I recall, it was about the third or fourth treatment when there was loud shouting from across the quite small ward and considerable alarms. A bed was on fire. Even as I watched, I could see flashes as the power jumped across the rubber castors to the metal floor.

Power was switched off and the treatment was suspended. I was transferred shortly afterwards and the future of the strange process was never revealed. For all I know it was considered a military secret.

Everything else was!

The memory makes me very humble when I thaw out a meal. My microwave is probably a direct descendent of that oven that tried to burn us up half a century ago.

Bad news travels slowly

When a distant cousin of my late wife died in Montreal, his wife wrote to inform me.

The letter was mailed in the cosmopolitan city on January 9. I got it on January 20.

The process is a direct refutation of the adage that assures us that "bad news travels fast." I can find no trace of the origin of that saying. The nearest I have is from the Barrons' Wars, by the Elizabethan Michael Drayton who wrote:

"Ill news hath wings, and with the wind doth go,

Comfort's a cripple and comes ever slow."

What a delightfully peaceful summary of our sorrows and griefs!

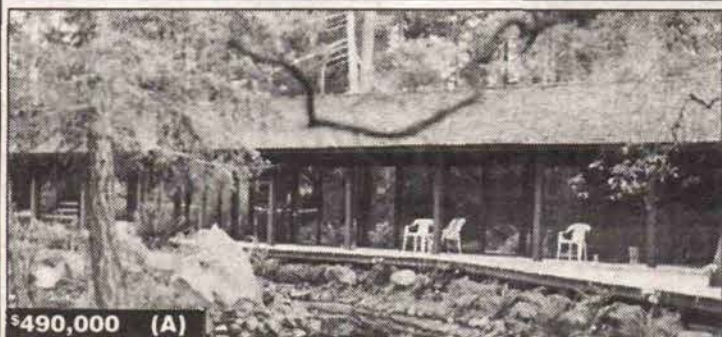
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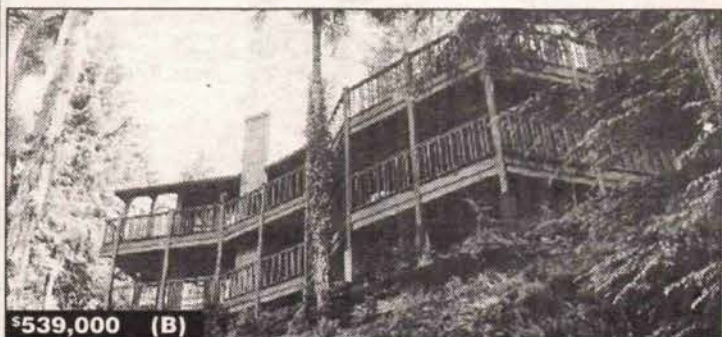

island. When he was finally admitted to hospital, he was told he had suffered a heart attack and needed an angioplasty to open a blocked artery. At first the treatment worked. But six months later, Mill was back in hospital for a second angioplasty.

He recalls being congratulated by the doctor on the success of the operation.

"Why am I in so much pain?" he remembers asking, before lapsing into unconsciousness.

He woke up in intensive care. In the space of an hour he had suffered four heart attacks, which knocked out two-thirds of his heart muscle. An emergency bypass operation had been performed.

Heart muscle does not regenerate, he explained. When the muscle dies, it calcifies, becoming hard and hindering the operation of the remaining muscle. Mill's condition had now become life-threatening.

Doctors gave him two options. One was to attempt to strengthen the remaining heart muscle with drugs and the second was to obtain a heart transplant. Of the two, Mill felt the transplant offered a better chance of success.

The actual techniques used in the operation have not changed significantly since the first heart transplant was done in South Africa in 1967. The entire heart is not transplanted. Instead, the muscle and the valves from the healthy heart are placed inside the shell of the patient's existing heart.

"So you just get the bottom part of your pump put back," Mill explained. The procedure avoids the danger of lesions or blood

clotting, which would occur if an entire heart was transplanted.

Due to the operation, Mill has also lost the pericardium, a layer of skin around the heart which muffles the sound of the muscle. As a result, Mill said his heartbeat is unusually loud. "When I lie in bed at night I can hear my heart going bump-bump-bump. It's a really nice sound."

Nerves connected to Mills' original heart were not connected to the new heart. Therefore, the transplanted heart does not receive the usual electrical signals from the brain. So, when exercising, Mill must warm up slowly to allow the chemical changes in the body to notify the heart that more output is required.

But, to Mill's surprise, a recent examination showed some of the

nerves in his body were linking with the new heart on their own. "The nerves are reconnecting themselves."

He describes his life as nearly normal, although he does take care to avoid infectious diseases like influenza. "Flu is a very devastating thing for a heart transplant patient."

Although his operation was a success, Mill points out that not every operation succeeds and the option of a heart transplant is not always available.

It is better to take care of your existing heart through a healthy diet, regular exercise, lowered stress and not smoking.

"If people were educated to live a better lifestyle, 80 per cent of early heart disease deaths could be prevented," Mill said.

Woodpeckers visiting your feeder? Here are tips to help identify them

Rat-a-tat-tat-tat! Woodpecker at work. That's a sound we probably all recognize, because on the Gulf Islands we are lucky to have five different species of woodpecker.

Four of the species are fairly plentiful, and we are quite likely to spot them at any time of year. The fifth, the red-breasted sapsucker, is not as often seen. I've only seen two around here, one in September 1991, and one in January 1993.

At this time of year, many of you are having small black and white woodpeckers visiting your feeders. But four of our species are black and white, so what kind of woodpeckers are you seeing?

We can eliminate the before-mentioned sapsucker as it is

quite shy and has a completely red head. It also couldn't be a pileated woodpecker, as they are very large. That leaves a hairy woodpecker or a downy woodpecker.

To tell them apart, just remember that a Hairy is about one-third larger than a Downy, and has a substantially larger bill. So the little black and white woodpeckers you've been seeing are "Downies."

Only the male, by the way, sports that small red patch on the back of the head. Both sexes, however, can make that piercing

call that sounds something like a horse's whinny.

They enjoy suet, so put some out if you want to attract them. Then encourage them to stay, for like all woodpeckers, insects make up the better part of their menu. And that includes carpenter ants - the bane of every homeowner.

Apparently woodpeckers have developed an interesting way of sharing their food supply. The male's longer bill nabs insects by digging deep into the wood, while the female's shorter bill harvests insects just under the bark. In this way, a pair can share a tree or a forest without competing with each other.

I guess woodpeckers figured out "sustainable use of resources" well before we coined the phrase!

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Anglicans in Stitches over new kneelers

Salt Spring Anglicans are in stitches this week, but the condition is not a humorous one.

Anglicans in Stitches is the name of an exhibition of needlework to be held Saturday at the Anglican Centre. And while the stitching work of at least 35 local Anglicans will be on display, it's another kind of stitching that will benefit from Saturday's show.

Organizer Sue Simonson says donations made for admission to Anglicans in Stitches will help purchase materials for kneelers in the Anglican church, a project that may take up to two years to complete.

Each kneeler will consist of canvas over foam rubber on a 10x14-inch wooden base. Charlie Percy is doing the woodwork and more than two dozen people will embroider designs in wool on the canvas before assembling all the pieces.

Last week, Doreen Hamilton and her five-member design committee were working on ideas for the needlework. The kneelers will have "a commonality of design" but the artwork in the centre will be different on each.

Simonson expects they will have to make about 150 kneelers to accommodate church-goers, who currently avoid kneeling during services.

"We sit or we stand," Hamilton said, until the project is finished.

Saturday's show runs from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Meanwhile, outside the Anglican Centre last week other volunteer workers were preparing a platform to hold the church bell. Mike Stacey expected the bell would be put in place some time this week.

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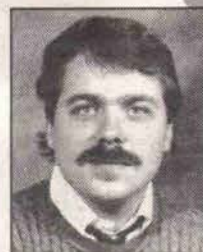

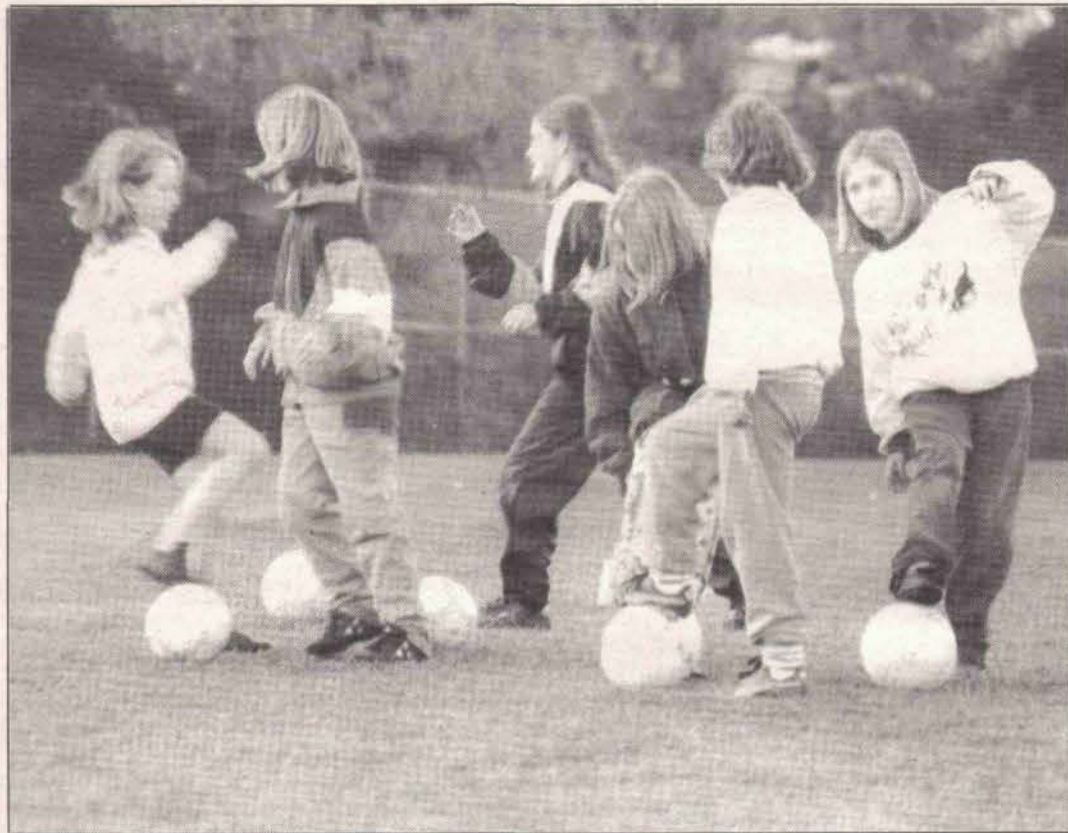

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Akerman looks at contract as Slugs win second in row

The Slugs are on a roll and it's not the kind you eat, as the boys won their second game in a row and have scored an unprecedented 21 goals in the process.

It probably helps that both games were played against the same team, the Lake Cowichan Whalers. But it was a solid Slug effort more than a weak opponent that made the difference in both games.

In this match, he wasted little time showing us his mettle. Just over a minute into the game he picked up a Todd McIntyre rebound and put the Slugs on the scoreboard.

The Whalers, however, were not about to let this game slip away too easily. They mounted a serious attack of their own just a few minutes later and Slugs being slugs, were unable to clear the zone, which tied the score despite the best efforts of Slugs' goalie Derek Topping.

The Slugs did have one worry regarding the game (other than Deadstop, who is a given). We only had three defencemen dressed for the game, including the fabled fatman, as Rodney Challborn was busy next door playing in a bowling on ice tournament. We decided to show him how we felt about this by removing his toupee while he wasn't looking, and gluing it onto his curling rock. Perhaps next time he'll know better.

Back to the game, both teams were making some fine plays and had a number of scoring chances only to be stymied by the goalies. It wasn't until seven minutes into the period that Pete Huser put one between the pads of the netminder after dekeing the defence cleanly.

Huser, who has been playing like a man possessed, has been the Slugs' second most proficient scorer of the new year, chalking up nine markers in five games. But it was John Procter, who leads

The second period started with Huser going at it again. This time it was a power play with McIntyre setting him up. McIntyre, who has three goals in the last two games, has watched Huser catch up to him in the scoring race to lead him by two. The irony is that McIntyre is the one who has set Huser up on nearly every goal he has scored. If it's any consolation to him, he probably has a total of 10 or more assists in the last two games. Too bad we don't count assists.

Nearly seven minutes after Huser's goal, the Whalers caught the Slugs on a line change and went in on a three-on-one. Topping actually made two fine saves before the Whalers managed to lift one over him. If Topping had any doubts about the Slugs before this goal, it must have con-

firmed them, as he probably could have read the better part of a novel before any Slugs showed up to lend a hand.

Following the Whaler's goal, the Slugs got back on track. First it was the line of Huser, McIntyre and Danny Akerman which connected.

Just over a minute later he was at it again, this time nabbing a pass from Paddy Akerman and wiring a blast past the netminder.

After some great forechecking on the part of Huser and McIntyre, they were able to set up Dapper Dan for his second of the night.

Few things could be worse than having Dan Akerman score more than one goal in a game. First of all, his head swells so much it cuts off the circulation to his brain and then he starts talking about things like renegotiating his con-

tract and having his picture mounted on the side of the Slug van.

The boys leave well enough alone, knowing full well that sooner or later he'll forget about it himself and wander back out on the ice to play some more hockey.

After Akerman's goal, Procter got back in the act, in a big way. At the 14-minute mark Procter picked up a pass from Bernie Reynolds and hung a knuckleballer on the goalie who was completely flummoxed by the shot.

Just over a minute later he was at it again, this time nabbing a pass from Paddy Akerman and wiring a blast past the netminder. This gave Procter three goals on the night and his second hat-trick in two games.

But the Whalers were still giving it their best and it paid off for them with just over two minutes remaining in the period when a winger went wide (he had no

choice) around Deadstop and snapped a hard low drive past Topping to end out the period with the Slugs up 7-4.

By the start of the last period the Whalers were beginning to slag a bit, but then so were the Slugs, so it kept the game at an even if somewhat sedate keel.

But the Slugs were still looking to add even more to their lead. The first one to do so was Paddy Akerman, just six minutes into the period. Picking off a pass from Paul Sinclair, who had head-manned the puck out of the Slugs' zone, Akerman then waltzed around a defenceman and got away a hard snap shot over the goalie's glove.

But the best was saved for last as McIntyre finally got on the scoreboard a few minutes after Akerman's marker, with a booming slapshot that the netminder didn't even see as it blew past him. Sweet revenge for the hardest working player on the ice on this night.

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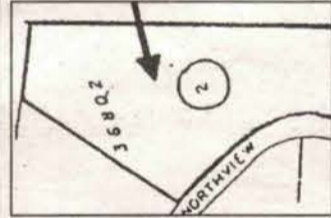
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Galiano service celebrates life of the late Clara Bell

A life was celebrated and a mother and grandmother honoured on Galiano, January 19, when Father Leo Boyd of Salt Spring conducted a service in Saint Margaret's Church for the late Clara Bell of Retreat Cove.

Bell was laid to rest in the Galiano Cemetery beside her loving husband Greig (Tony) who predeceased her 32 years ago. The day of Clara Bell's burial was the anniversary of the couple's wedding day, January 19, 1920.

Clara Philamina was born in 1902 on Reid Island, daughter of Domingo Silvey and granddaughter of Gastown's "Portuguese Joe." Grandpa Joe - Silvey was his surname - opened a saloon in Gastown, the area later to be named Granville and later still, Vancouver. This was some years before the city received its charter in 1886.

Bell's father was Domingo, son of Portuguese Joe by his second wife, Lucy, an Indian lady from Sechelt. The couple was married in a church ceremony there. Portuguese Joe's first wife was a granddaughter of Chief Capilano (Ki-ap-i-la), by whom he had two daughters. He was widowed before he left Gastown for his ship-building venture across Coal Harbour. Salmon fishing and herring seining became his occupation some years before his move with his new wife and growing family to Reid Island. Portuguese Joe is buried there in the family cemetery, as are Bell's father and many other members of the family.

Bell and her three brothers, Joe, John and James, were students at the North Galiano School when it opened in 1916. In later years a school for family members was established on Reid. Bell married Greig Antonius Bell in 1920 on Kuper Island. Born on Chios, one of the Greek Islands, Bell arrived

in Canada at age 14. During the First World War he served with the Seventh Canadian Battalion and was decorated on three occasions.

In 1928, the Bells moved to Retreat Cove where they built the log house beside Porlier Pass Drive so familiar to passers-by today. A living was made for the ever-growing family - there were eventually seven daughters, one son and one adopted son - through farming, mink ranching and caretaking for the Nelson Brothers' Cannery which operated in the Cove at that time. From 1936 to 1958, Bell was road foreman, first in North Galiano and later for the whole island.

With advancing age, rheumatoid arthritis became a problem for Bell and she had to leave her home at Retreat Cove for Salt Spring, where she received treatment at the extended care facility. Latterly in Saanich, she passed away in the Saanich Peninsula Hospital on January 14, aged 92.

Her 10 a.m. funeral service at Saint Margaret's was followed by a tea and reception for family members in the Lions Park Centre Building. About 45 attended, among them five of the seven daughters and the two sons.

Bell is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Laura Thompson (Gabriola Is.) and Mrs. Glory Blomly (Ruskin), and 27 grandchildren and 39 great grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Preparations for the reception were supervised by Helen Wood, a granddaughter, and Clara Stevens. Preparations at the hall were carried out by Isabel and Lea Stevens, granddaughters by marriage to the late Clara Bell.

Rumours circulate in the ferry line up

It was Sunday noon, not long after the recent B.C. Ferries fare hike.

Weekend visitors were lined up in the parking lot at Sturdies Bay, anticipating the arrival of their ferry, now more than an hour late. Engine trouble was the official explanation for the ferry's late arrival.

However, as the vessel had been late leaving Tsawwassen for its trip across the strait, an unofficial story making the rounds of the parking lot had it that the problem was a financial one - the cash drawers at the mainland terminal were the problem. They were not large enough to take the extra cash it now costs weekenders to enjoy their island retreats. New and larger cash boxes had to be ordered and in place before the ferry sailed.

Not a likely story, but appropriate to the mood of the folks in the parking lot that day.

Deadline extended

Last summer Nature Conservancy of Canada took over fundraising responsibilities for the three district lots which make up the Bodega Ridge area.

Since then, the former owner of D.L. 76, a Salt Spring man, has been paid and the land re-mortgaged through the Delta Credit Union.

According to an agreement with the North Galiano Community Association (owners of D.L. 76 - Bodega Ridge) payment was to be completed by December 31, and to another agreement with the Bodega Partners (owners of D.L. 73, nearby), completion was to the end of March.

In mid-December, however, a new deadline was set and agreed to, as the necessary funds to complete payments were not as yet available. Completion date for both is now March 31, 1995.

Cynics here wonder if this deadline can be met when the other was not. Hope there is, however. Our present government has prioritized the saving of forest lands, salmon rivers and the like. The last government found funds to save Coon Bay - would our present one wish to be outdone in saving park land on the island?

Not likely, especially since it recently made the decision not to place a moratorium on development of forest lands here. The latter decision was not a popular one with many islanders.

Now that our ambulance building is nearing completion (a government building), the betting here is that the government will find a way to save the Ridge. Some are even betting that those yellow lines missing from Porlier Pass Drive for the past year and a half will be repainted soon as well.

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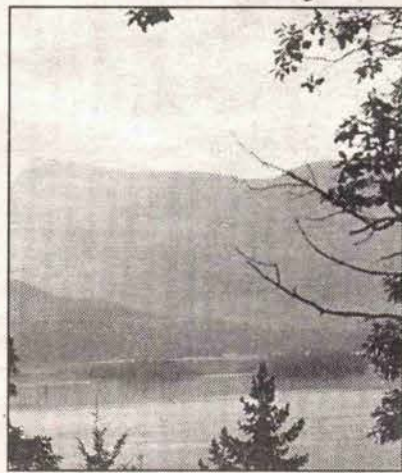
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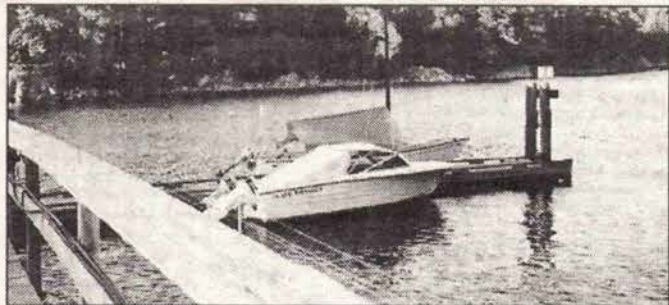
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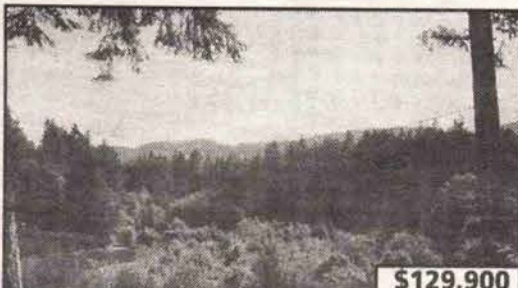
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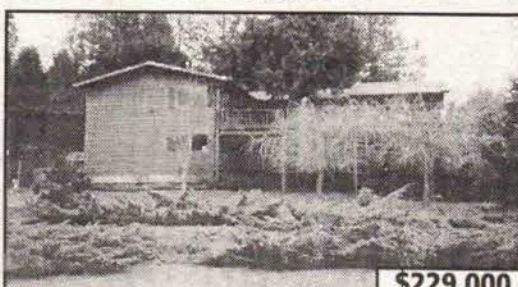
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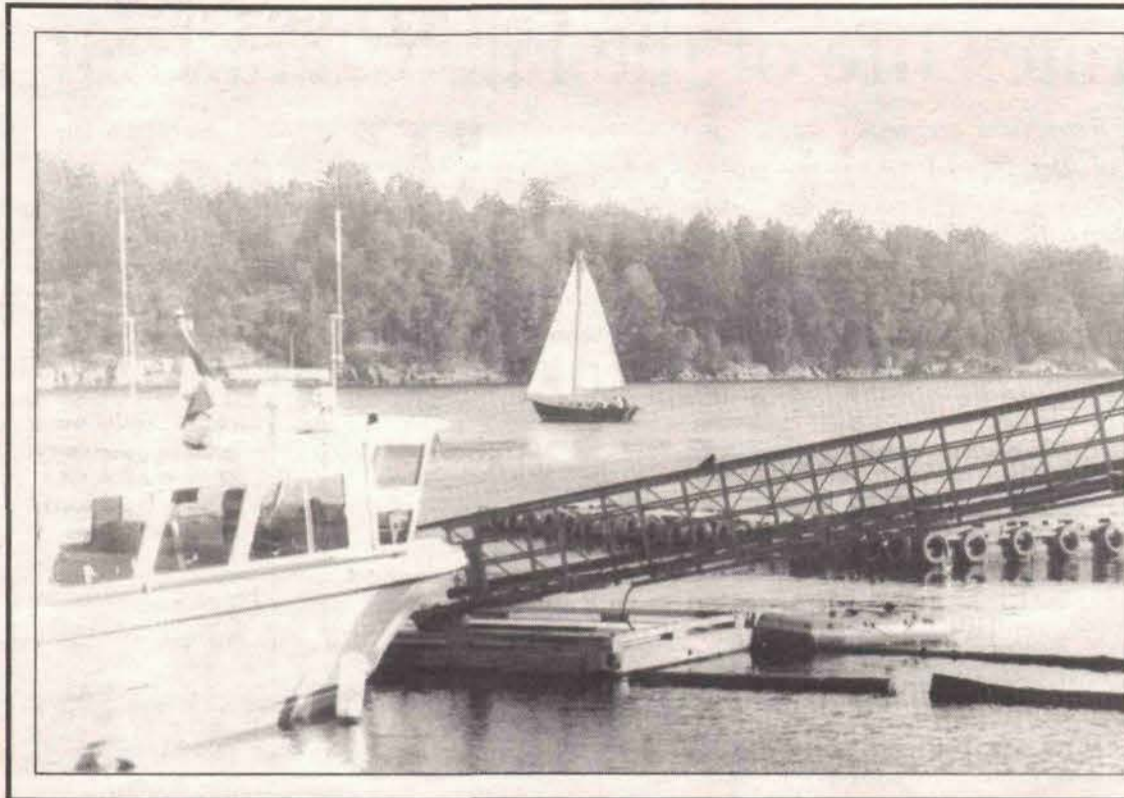
