## FC grabs silver in BC championships

Salt Spring FC nipped a silver medal over the weekend at the Nike Provincial Recreational Cup in Burnaby after a heartbreaking 3-1 loss to Richmond Town that ended Salt Spring's run for their third trophy in two months.

Salt Spring went undefeated in round robin play beginning with a Harrison Jason goal that resulted in a 1-0 win over the defending champions from Prince George on Friday night. Gathering confidence, the local squad gained momen-

tum to beat Chilliwack 1-0 (with a goal scored by Colin Walde) and rolled over Terrace 2-0 (Zoltan Kodaly and Corbin Scott goals) on Saturday before losing in the finals on Sunday.

Richmond and Salt Spring battled out the classic final, with both teams determined to play good-quality, hard-tackling soccer.

Richmond scored first at about 15 minutes on a corner kick with Salt Spring fighting to get back in the game.

A goal by Scott evened the match before the half and it looked like the boys were on their way to their third championship of the year.

After the break, the contest continued to seesaw with good opportunities created from both teams. At mid-half a twice-deflected cross found the back of the net and Richmond was in the lead 2-1. FC fought to take control but with a couple of minutes remaining, Richmond scored on a long shot through traffic, making

the score 3-1 Richmond.

"I am very proud of these guys," said FC coach Darryl Lister. "They are good quality men and boys who represented themselves, Salt Spring Island and the Vancouver Island Soccer League with honour. On behalf of the FC, I would like to thank our families and friends for all their support; at every game Salt Spring supporters outnumbered the rest."

## Teens stuck between 'rock and hard place'

Perceived problems of kids hanging out in town and wreaking havoc is rapidly turning from a "bad kid issue" to one of problem-solving and community awareness.

Local police, volunteer workers and many teens agree the recent outburst of publicity over youth involvement in drug, alcohol and vandalism is the tail of a snake which has been

wriggling through our community for several generations.

Many believe these so-called "troubled" youth are merely reflections of the greater problems plaguing adults, parents and the world at large. Some say these kids are just acting out the dysfunction in our families and culture.

One teen, 19-year-old Steve Melanson, claims his generation is stuck between a rock and a hard place. Boredom and isolation, he states, are

the prevailing undercurrent pulling many of his peers into anti-social behavior.

"Unfortunately, there's not a lot on this island for youth to look forward to everyday," he said. "We have nowhere to go and nothing to do. We don't get up in the morning and say 'let's get drunk and smash things.'"

Melanson explained a number of the kids hanging out downtown live in the

"boonies" and don't want to go home. "There are a lot of kids with rough lives," he said. "There's a helluva lot of alcoholism on this island and the kids are just a drop in the bucket."

The bucket of caffeine which these kids are pumping into their systems may be another culprit to behavioral swings. Stimulants like coffee and sugar don't make for a good state of mind, Melanson said.

"Most business owners won't let us be there unless we buy a cup of coffee at regular intervals."

Both Melanson and RCMP Sergeant Darbyshire point out the fact that groups of 13- to 25-year-olds hanging out together make for dangerous liaisons. The potentially volatile mixture of backgrounds and ages create a lack of safety for the younger kids.

"The older people can buy the liquor," said Darbyshire.

Melanson is outraged by the dreary reality that naive kids are getting dragged along into doing "so-called" adult things at too early an age.

"There are 38-year-old guys driving around with 15-year-old girls, a car full of liquor and no one gives a damn," he said. "Kids out there are being used by older people. Dealers get underage kids to sell drugs for them because it's lower risk than running the stuff themselves."

One female graduate of Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS) agrees.

"When I finally came out of denial and started to see the problem for what it was, it was so big and so ugly. It's like looking at the underbelly of a dinosaur and real-

izing how vast it is."

But the young woman stressed it's not the kids who have created the drug and alcohol culture, but rather a culture that's been created for them.

"People are desensitized and it's setting back children's rights by decades," Melanson said. "If you remain silent about a topic, you are accepting it. If you see something that needs to be changed — especially if it involves kids — you need to speak up."

The roots of destructive and self-destructive behavior are firmly planted in the images being swallowed by children through broadcast politics, economics and culture, said Melanson.

"Just look at television and movies — there's a lot of pressure on kids to conform to distorted ideas of how things should be."

Values like family, love, trust, food, clothing and shelter don't match up with the things you see on TV and it's really frustrating, the teenager commented.

"The mass media is one of the most confusing and disheartening illusions in the world for kids."

Turning young girls into sex symbols is just one of a host of offshoot problems where drug and alcohol overuse is concerned.

"The real problems with B&Es and stealing is happening because of hard drugs," Melanson said. "Wherever there are hard drugs, there are hard problems."

With an impressionable thirst to figure out who they are and identify with someone, teenagers need positive role models they can look up to for guidance and encouragement. Increased communication between parents and kids can iron out many of these wrinkles, said

Melanson.

"We need mentors. A lot of kids would really like more support, education and input from caring adults."

The 19-year-old advocates an agenda or plan where parents know where their kids will be, when and with whom. That way, youth can check in with their parents throughout the night or day so they are on their own but feel trusted, he explained.

"I think it comes down to an inner hunger," said one fourth-generation island resident who believes it's too much to expect one or two people to raise a family. It takes two salaries to keep the house afloat and the casualties of modern economics are the children. Many kids are not getting the attention they need and looking for it on the street, she said.

Getting kids off the streets and into creative pursuits is the goal of a momentous effort by police, youth advocates and the Youth Crime Prevention Project.

"A huge percentage of kids are just looking for something to do," said Darbyshire. "Let's keep the ball rolling while we've got the momentum and community interest to fulfill that need."

Melanson, who just graduated from GISS, is looking forward to working on youth-positive activities this summer through the initiatives being carried out from the Core Inn youth centre.

"There are so many amazing kids on this island with loads of potential. They've got a lot of creative energy and need a positive outlet. They are so full of ideas and feelings that they don't know how to process it all," he said. "If

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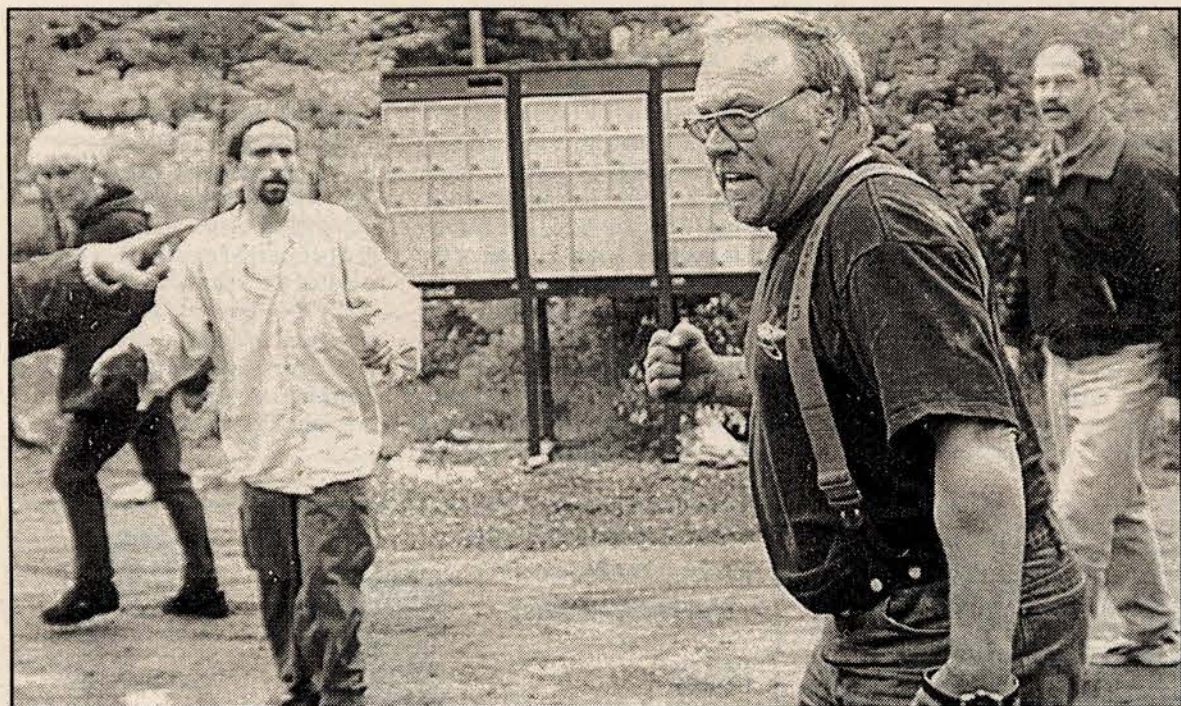

# Violence erupts at Burgoyne triangle

Visible protest action against Texada Logging Corporation receded during the week after a well-attended blockade/street party turned ugly last Wednesday.

About 80 people gathered at the Burgoyne Bay triangle June 7 for a planned blockade. The event featured musical entertainment by Salt Spring's marimba band and was pegged as a peaceful show of support for those protesting clear-cut logging on Texada land.

Uri Cogan, who was on the scene taking photographs for the Vancouver Sun, said that when no logging trucks showed up, "the would-be blockade turned into a street party."

The street party turned ugly, however, when a young protester jumped onto the front bumper of a pick-up truck, and the enraged driver leapt from the truck and began chasing the youth.

Cogan said he was among several people and video cameramen allegedly attacked by the driver.

Cogan, who said his camera was damaged by the man, made a complaint to the RCMP as did one other individual.

"I don't like to respond to negativity with negativity," he said,

"but I'm a photojournalist and there's certain lines you don't cross . . . You don't beat up on cops and you don't beat up on journalists."

Salt Spring RCMP said Tuesday the incident is "under investigation" and that more witness statements are being collected.

In other Texada related news:

- A group of people met with Premier Ujjal Dosanjh before the local NDP club's annual picnic at the Farmers Institute Sunday, briefing him on the Texada lands situation and urging him to come through with a promise to protect community watersheds which he

made during the NDP leadership campaign.

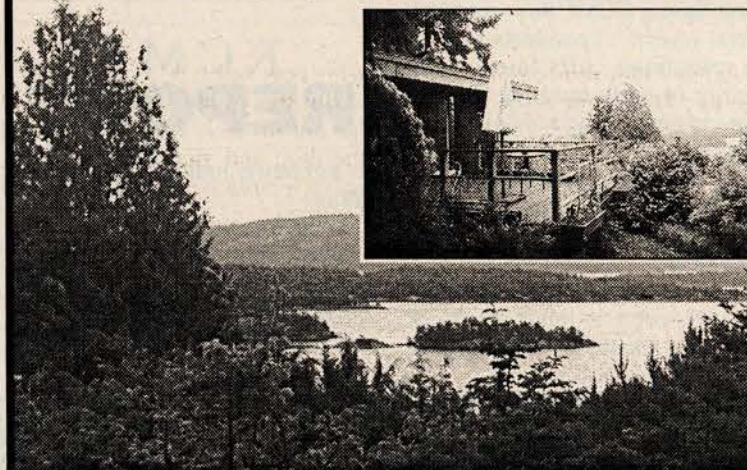
- An application changing contempt of court charges against nine individuals from civil to criminal was set to be heard in Victoria court today.

Those convicted of contempt of court had received unusually stiff sentences.

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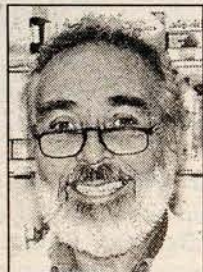

## Dosanjh stresses successes, lists priorities at NDP event

Premier Ujjal Dosanjh spoke to an applauding and table-thumping crowd at the Farmers Institute Sunday, as the island's NDP club moved its annual picnic indoors.

The premier listed his achievements since becoming leader of the province about four months ago and outlined priorities for the future.

The more than 200 people who attended the club's annual lamb barbecue and vegetarian lasagna picnic moved indoors due to non-stop rain Sunday afternoon.

In addition to the premier's speech, the event featured numerous entertainers and an introduction to Dosanjh by B.C. Attorney General Andrew Petter.

Prior to giving his speech, Dosanjh told the audience, he met with several islanders who outlined specific Salt Spring concerns, such as private-land logging by Texada Land Corporation.

Dosanjh stressed that the NDP has reached a crossroads in the province and now is the time to chart a new course, doing things that are appropriate and true to the values that make us social democrats but within the context of a thriving economy.

Times have changed, he noted. People have said we want our budgets balanced. We can do it our way, or have some-

one else come in and do it their way. . . . (But) we have to make sure we live within our means.

He said this year the NDP under his leadership introduced an open and transparent budget process that included several tax breaks for families and small businesses.

He said his government has frozen post-secondary fees and that he would ultimately like to phase out fees entirely.

He pointed to the introduction of universal child care and increased health spending as further pluses in the new budget.

He also outlined several priorities for the future:

- ¥ saving Medicare in B.C. and helping save it across Canada by finding innovative and creative ways to deliver it, while recognizing there are not unlimited amounts of money to spend;

- ¥ improving British Columbia's record in the delivery of post-secondary education;

- ¥ giving more power to communities at the local level;

- ¥ ensuring a greener and cleaner province by protecting water, and designating working and sustainable forests;

- ¥ ensuring absolute equality for women; and

- ¥ putting the government's financial house in order.

Some people think we don't know how to manage an econo-

my, Dosanjh said, I want to turn the corner; I want business to thrive.

He stressed the importance of creating a market economy, rather than a market society.

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# Traffic caught in residents' snarl

Proposals to solve traffic congestion on Cusheon Lake Road have run up against either government or area residents' opposition, with there being little hope of any resolution at least until the fall.

I don't know what we're going to do, said Bob Webb, Ministry of Transportation and Highways (MOTH) district technician. We are looking for a win-win situation.

He pointed out that MOTH has been knocked off course by a not in my backyard attitude among residents in the Cusheon Lake area.

The only thing everyone appears to agree on is that traffic on the road poses a safety problem and an environmental concern because the lake is a drinking water source.

To upgrade the road is not feasible for financial and other reasons, as it runs between houses located extremely close to the water on one side and along a steep bank on the other side, said Bill Monahan, Beddis and Cusheon Area Residents Association (BACARA) president.

Complicating the matter, he said, is the question of residents' property lines actually extending out onto the road.

At a meeting initiated by MOTH in January, Webb and other highways representatives met with BACARA executive members to explore traffic re-routing options.

Four options emerged by the meeting's end. One was to leave the Cusheon Lake Road situation as is. Another was to link up the two sections of Horel Road on the side of the lake opposite Cusheon Lake Road. This would make a through road between Fulford-Ganges and Stewart.

The third would re-route traffic even further from the lake opposite Cusheon Lake Road by joining Horel Road with Kitchen Road. Again, this would serve to connect Stewart and Fulford-Ganges.

Webb said there was immediate opposition to either of the Horel Road options as this could mean polluted run-off into the drinking water system.

Monahan recently told the Driftwood that an area between the two parts of Horel Road is a park reserve and as such acts as a water purifier for the lake.

The fourth option proposed at the January meeting was to join the two parts of Sky Valley Road just east of Cusheon Lake Road. The hook on Lord Mikes Road would need to be straightened for traffic to flow more smoothly and safely between Sky Valley, onto a short part of Cusheon Lake and to the turn down Stewart Road or on to Beddis Road.

According to Monahan, the concept would be that if Sky Valley was

a through road, people approaching the area from Ganges would turn down that road to connect with Stewart Road instead of continuing on to the Cusheon Lake Road turn-off.

On April 10, at MOTH's request, BACARA met with Sky Valley and Lord Mikes residents who adamantly opposed the road link proposal, said Monahan.

These residents argued convincingly, according to the BACARA president, that the plan was flawed. They pointed out that a deep ravine between the two parts of Sky Valley might require an expensive bridge. They also talked about a possible increase in accidents with motorists turning left onto Sky Valley at a part of Fulford-Ganges where a sharp turn obstructs the vision of drivers approaching from the south.

Their third point was that straightening out the hook on Lord Mikes would take out two homes.

Sky Valley resident Peter Nuk also told the Driftwood that he and other residents feared a decrease in property values and an increase in noise pollution and traffic that would change the road's character.

He said he purposely bought his property 26 years ago on a road with a cul-de-sac because he anticipated an increase in traffic on any of Salt Spring's through roads.

Nuk has since fired off a petition to MOTH containing about 45 signatures from Sky Valley and Lord Mikes property owners opposed to the re-routing in their area.

He has also sent a position paper and at least six letters from residents detailing their opposition.

The BACARA executive was convinced by the objections that the Sky Valley option was not viable. Monahan stated this in a letter to MOTH.

Sky Valley (residents) don't have to lose sleep over their road being linked, said Monahan.

Webb, however, was not willing to rule out Sky Valley-Lord Mikes as an option.

In the same letter, Monahan also outlined another traffic re-routing possibility for MOTH to consider. This one would turn Cusheon Lake Road into a one-way road with traffic flowing from Fulford-Ganges Road to Lord Mike Road.

Any vehicle approaching Cusheon Lake Road from Stewart Road would only be able to turn right if going as far as Lord Mikes with a road block preventing any further travel down Cusheon Lake Road in the Fulford-Ganges direction.

All other traffic would have to turn right and proceed down Beddis Road to Ganges, for example.

MOTH has not responded to BACARA's letter but Moss sees

several problems with this proposal. He anticipates protest from Beddis Road residents. He said upgrading that lengthy road would be extremely expensive, more so than the Sky Valley link.

In addition, MOTH has sunk over \$150,000 into paving Stewart Road over the last half a dozen years. For that reason the ministry would like to see the road used extensively.

Moss added that residents concerned with the environment should not shoot themselves in the foot by, on one hand, saving Cusheon Lake from pollution while on the other polluting the atmosphere to a larger extent by using more gas for a longer drive into Ganges.

According to Moss, MOTH is not willing to pursue the issue until it knows whether Salt Spring Island intends to incorporate as a municipality. If it does, the municipality will be in charge of island roads.

Moss intends to meet again with BACARA in the fall if incorporation does not appear imminent.

Meanwhile, it is left up to Environment Canada and local psychics to predict just how hot, dusty and hazardous Cusheon Lake Road will end up being for drivers and local residents this summer.

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# 15 young women speak out

The Female Rural Youth Dialogue which took place at the Core Inn was one of seven provincial-wide meetings organized by the Canadian Rural Partnership and The Status of Women.

We want to open direct dialogue with youth to overcome the barriers that keep them from leaving rural B.C., said Brandon Hughes, Coordinator of BC Rural Partnership, who attended last Wednesday's meeting.

The federal government is taking leadership in that direction. According to the rural secretariat, the government of Canada recognizes . . . rural and remote Canada is a major part of national identity and contributes to defining national values.

Hughes said access to secondary education, employment and job training are in the heat of the burning issues.

The main challenge for the kids has been the shift from the resource sector jobs which require little or no training to more entrepreneurial-type employment in which they need to be trained.

The aim of Wednesday's meeting

was to offer female youth an opportunity to voice their opinions and bring those messages back to the government table.

We want to approach this government initiative in a new way, said Agnes Lui, program officer for The Status Of Women Canada in Vancouver. We want to hear from people rather than just give information. We want direct communication from the community.

In a small group format which dominated the first half of the meeting, the 15 young island women were asked the following question: What do you think are the five most important concerns, strengths, problems or fears for you and for other young women of your age?

Drinking and driving and drug abuse were among the biggest concerns reported by the group. Lack of public transportation that is cheap and easily accessible on weekends was also a huge problem for the women. They said they often feel unsafe getting home or being forced into sharing a car with an impaired driver.

Alternatives are limited because of lack of public transport and the dangers connected to hitchhiking, said Lynda Laushway of SWOVA.

The high level of sexual assault in the community was mentioned as was the women's own knowledge and experience of it. Lack of employment and deficient informa-

tion about nutrition and eating disorders also topped the bill.

A general feeling of isolation and lack of preparedness to move into larger urban shelter was remarked by the young women who recognize the sheltered lifestyle of a Salt Spring upbringing.

Many of the teenagers also voiced concern over the difficulty in preserving anonymity while living in such a small community with issues connected to sex education and gynecological health.

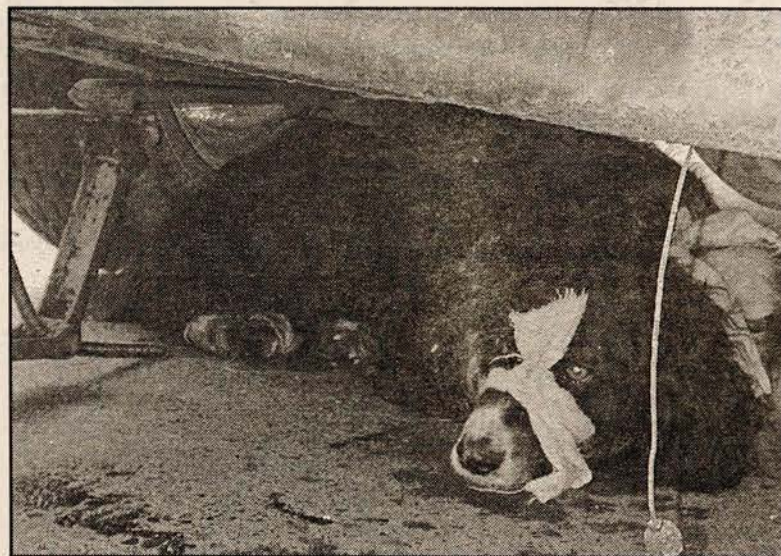
Young girls getting used by older males, date rape drugs, lack of police enforcement and support were some of the other issues enumerated during the five-hour meeting.

One towering complaint was the need for a safe, cheap place to hang out open all night long like a Starbucks, Chapters or 7-11 found in the cities.

Nowadays with globalization, youth in rural areas are stimulated by outside information but there's a lack of continuation in their daily lives said Lui. They want to go out and see the world.

Lui stressed the federal and provincial government initiative needs partnership from the community to make it effective.

If we don't understand young people's fears and aspirations, we can't take action to correct the problems, she said.

# New study maps island economy

A detailed picture of local business activity on Salt Spring will be the result of a new project now under way.

Headed up by coordinator Ellen Garvie, the project will use interviews and broad group representation to map economic activity on Salt Spring.

A final report called Economic Profile of Salt Spring Island will reveal gaps in services and indicate opportunities for growth in local businesses that can be developed to increase employment opportunities.

The project will identify the island's businesses, their services and market, as well as outline the opportunities and challenges facing different business sectors.

Funding for the project has been contributed by Human Resources Development Canada.

Compared to other communities of a similar size, notes press material from Garvie, there is a noticeable lack of information about economic activity for Salt Spring. Yet this information is essential for any future planning that would increase employment opportunities locally.

Information for the final report

will be gathered over the next three months through interviews with business owners and managers working on Salt Spring. The project intends to survey approximately 25 per cent of the business community in various industry sectors such as agriculture, construction, transportation, and retail.

The final report should be completed by December.

In addition to Garvie, several group representatives are involved

in the project, forming an advisory committee. Organizations and individuals involved include: community services society, chamber of commerce, Capital Regional District director Kellie Booth, Islands Trust, Farmers Institute, community arts council, H.E.A.R.T., school district 64, Fulford Business Association, West Coast Trollers Association and Peninsula Community Services.

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## Help for flummoxed ferry travellers

To the ordinary, unwashed islander, designing a ferry schedule would seem a simple matter. But the reason islanders are ordinary and unwashed is that they haven't advanced to the level of intelligence enjoyed by the people who are hired to design ferry schedules.

Intelligent as they may be, however, we understand from reliable sources — was it Wednesday night in the pub or Thursday morning in the coffee shop? we forget — that the schedule design division leads the corporation's internal darts league. How is that, you ask?

It's because they get all their practice aiming darts at a timetable which then determines which vessels leave at what times.

Unfortunately, due to the haphazard nature of this type of schedule planning, islanders are constantly flummoxed when it comes time to go anywhere. And if islanders are so flummoxed, imagine the poor visitors.

It is with visitors on our mind that we have come up with a solution. It may be hard on the scheduling division's proficiency at darts but it might save us once and for all from poorly-designed and ill-planned schedules.

Give the job to the marketing people. We have commented here before on the successful efforts of B.C. Ferries' marketing division. A visit to the corporation's website these days will reveal more reasons for lauding the work of those whose efforts are focused on putting more people on ferries.

Banner advertising leads website visitors to a page that extols the benefits of visiting the Gulf Islands, and advises of the extra sailings being offered to enable them to get here.

Once again, the marketing people have got it right.

So can they design schedules? Who knows, but surely they could do better than publish a schedule that advises changes on the Fulford run which actually went into effect five days earlier, which is what happened two weeks ago. Flummoxed is too gentle a word to describe the state of mind in which this oversight left many an islander and visitor.

So give the job to marketing. At least they recognize the importance of getting people on and off the islands, and understand the means of telling them how.



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## Preserve and protect us from mean-spirited neighbours

This is in response to recent Driftwood articles concerning the new land use bylaw, home-based businesses and secondary suites.

The downside of bylaws on this island is the process in which they are enforced. When I worked in a municipal bylaw department, there were six officers to deal with animal control and complaints for an estimated 40,000 people. To make a valid complaint, people had to provide their name and address, and agree to testify in court.

This second process eliminated half of the complaints because half of them were frivolous.

Currently, a few of us in our neighbourhood are under siege from a few vindictive others who have nothing better to do with their time than speed-dial the CRD and

Islands Trust. To me, as a taxpayer, this is seriously abusing this system. I understand that the Islands Trust has to act on complaints, but where do you draw the line? Can we make a complaint against the complainants? So far there have been over 75 complaints and we in this neighbourhood are fed up with defending our right to be and live in our homes. Where is our legal protection from this happening?

Do we go to the police and file a harassment charge or do we just sit back and take it because that is the bylaw and the Islands Trust has to enforce it? Is this happening in your neighbourhood?

Secondly, the home-based business issue. In Peter Nuk's letter, he stated that there were 10 businesses in his neighbourhood, but he goes on to complain about a par-

ticular one. Hmmm, why are the other ones okay but not this one?

Recently, an auto-shop business was closed down due to the diligence of "concerned neighbours." I drove by there and there is a big fence, you can't even see anything going on unless you stake out the place. Now this person has lost his means of livelihood and the ability to provide for his family. Is this what our community has come to, such a lack of tolerance for our neighbour, such a hatred, that we don't care about how our actions are going to harm another?

Another argument is the "my property values are going to go down because you have a massage business in your home and those smiling, relaxed people walking out of your house shouldn't be smiling," or something silly like that.

I agree with having rules to regulate, but I am concerned that too many rules will harm the economic growth of the island. Maybe we

should start regulating garage sales: only 2.2 cars at a time, operate between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., must have a garbage can visible, must tiptoe to garage so as to not disturb the neighbour across the road taking a picture of you as you enter the driveway.

Thirdly, the secondary suite issue. We are not living in Surrey, we are living on an island, hence the number of houses is limited to the amount of land available. Affordable housing on Salt Spring is a serious issue that really hasn't been addressed.

What's the big deal about renting out a room? Who does it harm — the "concerned" neighbour? And who does it help — the person in need of a roof over their head and the homeowner who maybe just got divorced and needs financial help to keep that roof over their head?

Secondary suites only harm the "vigilant neighbour" period. Those suites should be allowed

with certain guidelines and the Trust could even collect an annual fee for the privilege. Not everyone on this island can afford \$750 per month basic rent.

In closing I would like to ask the Trust what homeowners can do to preserve and protect their right to live from obviously mean-spirited neighbours.

This complaint system is one-sided and perhaps the process can be reviewed to separate frivolous complaints from real ones. I would like to ask the police what constitutes harassment and when one makes a complaint where action will be taken.

I agree that rules and guidelines must be in place to ensure order but too many rules are going to drain the quality of life and our economic future — we need to think about that.

## Actions that infringe on right, freedom of movement

How can you justify taking an action that infringes upon the rights and freedoms of another?

Consider this scenario: You are walking along the roadside in Ganges and I stand in your way, effectively denying you the right of proceeding to your destination. Would you not view that as an offence against yourself?

The definition of assault has been broadened in recent years to take in all kinds of seemingly minor acts, including verbal abuse. Under the revised definition would not my impeding your travel on the roadside be consid-

ered a form of assault?

These thoughts come to mind while considering the ethics of blockading loggers, an activity that has been deemed acceptable by many British Columbians, from Clayoquot Sound to the Elaho Valley and, of course, on south Salt Spring.

The argument in favour of such action might be that the end justifies the means. That the wholesale removal of trees is a crime against

the earth that justifies drastic measures.

But a counter-argument might question the authority on which such a stand is based. In other words, what gives protesters the authority to decide what is right for the forests of British Columbia, and then take an action that imposes their will on others?

In the case of Texada Land Corporation on Salt Spring, the issue is not as clear-cut (if you'll pardon the expression) as if the logging were taking place on public land. In the Elaho Valley there is a greater degree of public interest involved because it is public land on which the logging is taking place.

The public interest factor on

Salt Spring is only that a private land owner has in its possession such a large portion of the island's land base.

But in neither case are the opponents of the logging addressing their concerns with the right party. Both Interfor, on the Mainland, and Texada, on Salt Spring, are going about their business with a legal right to do so.

The problem (if there is one) lies with the provincial government, which is ultimately responsible for controlling logging activity on either public or private land.

On the other hand, the protests are certainly raising doubts about the efficacy of provincial controls on logging. Are they sufficient? Are we doing enough to ensure

the forest industry will remain sustainable?

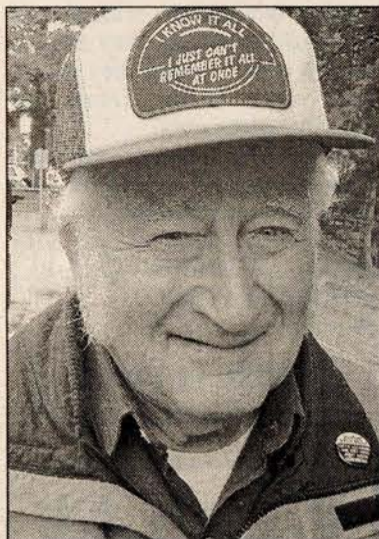
That may be the greatest achievement of the protests, and perhaps the only one. But does that make them right?

For those who are somewhere in the middle in all this, and I believe that takes in the majority, there are more questions than answers. Whom do we believe when it comes to effective logging practices: government, logging companies or protest groups?

Meanwhile, most of us have the freedom to move on public roadways. But how long will that freedom last if someone arbitrarily decides that our doing so is a threat in some way to the public good?

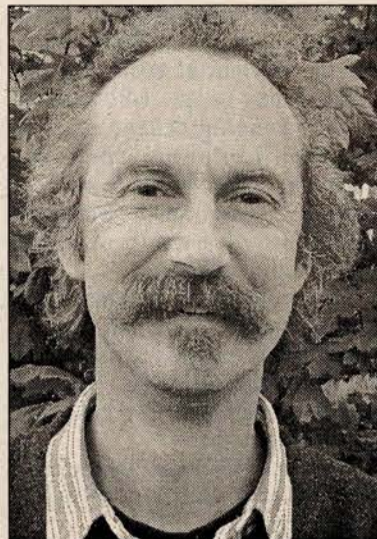

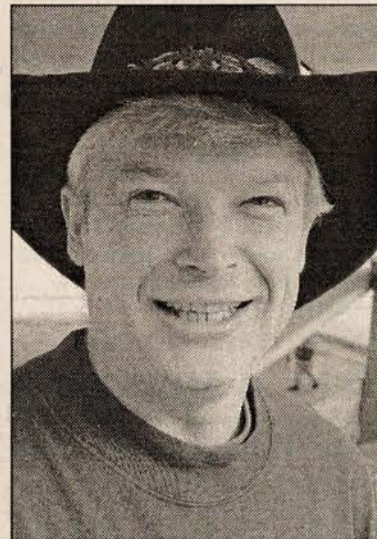

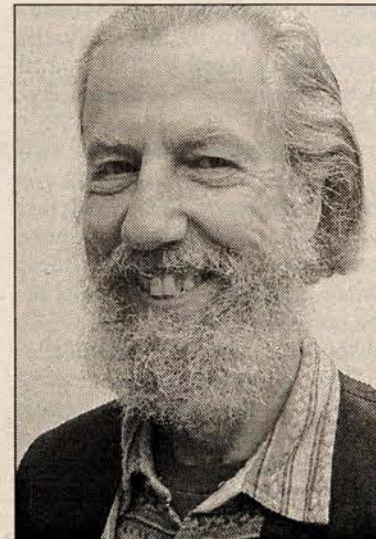

### New campsites

I am writing to draw the attention of the public to the new Land Use Bylaw, which contains proposed changes in the use of the ALR (Agricultural Land Reserve) on Salt Spring.

I am particularly concerned about this one section which is to be found in Part C of the bylaw on page 13. This needs to be read carefully, but if the reader does not have a copy of the bylaw, and did not attend the public meetings, he should be made aware that a new use in the ALR is being proposed by the Islands Trust. This would permit a commercial campground with up to 50 campsites on lands where a farm business is in operation. The trustees assure us that such a commercial operation would have to be approved by the ALC and meet standard conditions for things like water supply, sewage disposal and layout.

However, they fail to point out heavy use of water by each campground where there may be as many as 80-100 campers. There is also a possibility of ground pollu-

tion, damage to woods and terrain. Again there is a noise factor. Some residents might find campsites almost against their rear lot line due to a proposed change in setbacks from property lines.

We hear that the proposed changes have been made to conform with guidelines under the Right to Farm Act which apply to the whole of the province. However, what may be applicable in the Okanagan or the Cariboo isn't necessarily applicable here on Salt Spring.

I feel that our trustees — our employees — should reconsider their interpretation of the meaning of ALR and work towards a more practicable application of it.

There are many things in this new bylaw which trouble me — the reduction of site setbacks from water courses, the inclusion of "light industry" in residential areas, under the innocuous heading of "home businesses," and the increase in the number of dwellings to be permitted on ALR land.

The time is limited in which to express your concerns about these

changes in land use regulations where they apply to Salt Spring. They will affect "your property values, the promotion of health and safety of this community, and the interests of the next generation."

Copies of Bylaw 355 are available at the Ganges office of the Islands Trust or at the Mary Hawkins Library. There is still time before the last public meeting to study the bylaw and to express your views on the changes proposed.

### Green support

As tensions mount between the Salt Spring community and Texada Land Corporation, Green Party members call upon our government to provide leadership at this critical time.

The Green Party of B.C. has supported the community from the start since logging began last November on 10 per cent of the island, with a call for a sustainable rate of harvest, protection of sensitive ecosystems, protection of community watersheds.

Islanders question how land des-

ignated as Forest Land Reserve, presumably for forestry, can be liquidated for short-term profit, leaving a scarred and depleted landscape in a tourism-dependent community.

However, little has been heard from our government so far, nor our elected representative, Murray Coell, Liberal environment critic, even though the community raised over \$650,000 for land acquisition in less than six months.

The Green Party is calling on the provincial government and our MLA to facilitate and encourage meaningful negotiations between the whole community and Texada; to introduce meaningful legislation and local planning tools that allow for sustainable forestry on FLR land.

The party also wants a moratorium on logging and for all lawsuits to be dropped so that negotiations may proceed in good faith.

Green Party members expect elected MLAs and the provincial government to acknowledge six months of intense community effort by engaging in constructive

dialogue to address community concerns.

## Harbourside resident says grad not trouble free

I am writing this letter to describe my experience on grad night. I take exception to the front-page story in the Driftwood (June 7) where the local RCMP sergeant congratulates this year's grads for a safe and trouble-free celebration.

In the same issue, the RCMP report states that a group of about 60 youths gathered at the end of Collins Road at about 3 a.m., which were quickly dispersed by police.

Well I am glad that the residents of Collins Road enjoy such prompt service because it would seem that residents of Harbourside Place don't. At about 3:30 a.m. on the same Sunday, the cars arrived at the cul-de-sac at the end of Harbourside. (Likely the same group from Collins Road). The noise was as loud as I have ever heard at a car party, rap music at very high decibels, screaming and yelling, glass breaking, and lots of vehicle noise.

It should be noted that my house is less than 50 feet from the edge of the cul-de-sac. I started calling for the RCMP to attend



this disturbance at about 3:45 a.m. when it became obvious that this was no small gathering, and was assured by the dispatcher that although they were busy, someone would be there soon. I phoned about six times in total, and at 5 a.m., the dispatcher told me, I am very sorry but the officer on duty has gone home for the evening.

Great, what am I supposed to do? I asked.

You could try talking to them yourself, she said. I really didn't like her suggestion, but felt I had little choice you see I had to work a 15-hour shift that day and I was trying to sleep in preparation for that.

I certainly wasn't going to walk into the middle of this gang so I got into my truck and attempted to leave, only to find a mini-van blocking my way. My requests to move this f-ing

van were ignored, so I pushed it out of my way with my truck. I make no apologies for this as the vehicle was on private property without permission, and I have no intention of paying restitution for any damage I may have caused.

I then went into the cul-de-sac and because I had really lost my cool at this point (who wouldn't?) I screamed at the teens to leave immediately. To their credit, a lot of them did, but not without a heated verbal exchange. A core group who obviously had had too much to drink decided they weren't going to leave until they were ready to, so as I realized I wasn't having much more of an impact I decided to go back home myself. They all eventually left after 6 a.m. To the teens: you are not welcome ever, to gather for any reason at Harbourside Place. If you are looking for a place to go, why don't you go up to the lookout on Mount Maxwell? You can make all the noise you want up there and you won't bother anyone. Besides, there are outhouses for the ladies, etc.

Twenty-plus years ago, the

grad parties on this island were held on private property. Typically, the Byrons or the Caldwells (and others) would host the event on their large tracts of land and all had a good time. The rules were simple: once you got in you stayed in for the duration until 6 the next morning. There were adults overseeing the event to make sure everything was under control, and usually there was a lamb barbecue served throughout the night.

The teens could then smoke and drink their faces off, get sick and do it all over again if they wanted to; it was okay as it was their party. Times have obviously changed, though. Nobody wants to assume the responsibility or liability and therefore the dogooders have basically said, "There will be no more wet grad parties."

Well that is the biggest crock I have ever heard, because these days as it was back then kids simply are going to do it whether it is allowed or not. Sure there have been a few events over the last several years which were in of themselves dry but I guarantee you that there was a corre-

sponding wet party somewhere else.

Also worthy of mention, back in those days even though the party was being hosted in a private setting, the police presence on Salt Spring was usually quite heavy. Typically extra officers would be brought over from either Duncan or Sidney just for the occasion. However, this year we only had one or two local officers out — a poor decision on somebody's part in my estimation.

In the future, I would like to see more appropriate police presence for the event. I also think that future grad classes should be allowed to have a similar blowout party somewhere (the school maybe?) where at least drinking and smoking would be tolerated (not advocated). There is an awful lot of blind justice occurring in our society today anyways (see Driftwood article Loitering kids, June 7) so why don't we just bite the bullet and do what needs to be done, right or wrong?

It was a life-saver and came at a perfect time, for just a week before the course started my son, who does not live on the island, was diagnosed with schizophrenia.

The teachings helped us understand that schizophrenia is a brain disease and that it's youths greatest disabler.

The course content covered many topics including symptoms, medications, empathy, communications, fighting stigma and much more.

For someone who has never been affected by a mental illness before or someone who has lived with a mental illness, I would highly recommend taking the NAMI course when offered in the fall. If Barry and Betty are leading the course you too, like myself, will soon become advocates for the mentally ill.

# Pertussis vaccine gives better coverage, fewer reactions

An outbreak of pertussis in the Capital Health Region (CHR), which touched Salt Spring earlier this spring, gave public health authorities some cause for concern.

There were 133 recorded cases of pertussis, more commonly known as whooping cough, in the region with a few confirmed and more suspected on Salt Spring.

A vaccine has long existed for immunizing children against pertussis and for the past few years a new one, Pentacel which public health nurses Chris Smart and Pam MacKenzie say provides much better coverage and fewer reactions than its predecessor. They say the previous pertussis vaccine did cause more negative reactions than most vaccines.

I have not completed an adverse reaction form since the new vaccine came in, said MacKenzie, who has been a public health nurse on Salt Spring for 20 years.

Pentacel pertussis vaccine has been used for the past three years. If parents have decided against vaccination because they are fearful of reactions from the pertussis vaccine, Smart and MacKenzie urge them to investigate the record of Pentacel.

Both acknowledge that whether or not to vaccinate not just for pertussis is a tough decision for parents, made more difficult by a flood of information. They note much of the information is anecdotal rather than statistics-based.

One thing they have found is that some young adults, when they want to travel and find themselves unprotected against certain diseases, resent their parents decision to not vaccinate.

People feel these diseases aren't out there, why should I worry about it. It's almost like the vaccines have done their job too well, said MacKenzie.

But as the pertussis outbreak illustrated, the diseases do still exist, with smallpox being the exception.

Salt Spring's health unit, located in the building behind Lady Minto Hospital, offers a weekly travel clinic for adults and children who need or want vaccinations before travelling.

If someone is going to Nepal,

for example, they can also call the health unit and ask what shots are required to visit that country.

We do huge numbers of travel shots here, says MacKenzie.

People can also update their tetanus shots, which the nurses suggest should be done every 10 years.

Vaccinations are just one of

many services the two public health nurses provide in their 1.5 full-time equivalent positions. Their work includes:

- ¥ pre-conception counselling and education;

- ¥ pre-natal classes;

- ¥ post-natal home visits;

- ¥ Child health clinics for assessment, teaching and immunization;

- ¥ education programs in schools;

- ¥ training parents in techniques such as lice checking, or teachers in medication delivery (such as the Epi-pen for stings);

- ¥ Nobody's Perfect parenting course with Family Place;

- ¥ community-wide education on subjects such as sun safety, how to quit smoking or on-the-rise conditions such as asthma;

- ¥ assisting Ministry of Children and Families with social work-related cases;

- ¥ breastfeeding support for new mothers;

- ¥ the sale of Medela breast pumps and related equipment;

- ¥ community development projects such as the set-up of the Planned Parenthood Clinic.

The health unit also has lots of the most current information on a range of health topics.

MacKenzie said people are often surprised to hear the specifics of her job.

She feels that because public health nurses are generalists it's hard to get a handle on their role but they are available for everyone on the island.

## \$2,500 from seniors kick-starts drive

The campaign to raise money for a senior assisted-living residence is off to a great start with a pledge of \$2,500 already forthcoming by the Salt Spring Seniors Society.

An appreciative Gordon English, president of Gulf Islands Seniors Residents Association (GISRA), said acts of generosity are popping up from all directions.

An anonymous donor has pledged a dollar for every dollar

we raise in the community up to \$100,000, Gordon explained.

Because the money to purchase the existing seniors residence land was borrowed, the campaign to raise \$600,000 is an effort to repay those loans.

Some of the members were so eager to see the project completed, they have loaned monies to the GISRA to purchase the property and begin construction, English said.

So far, there are already 35 people on a waiting list for the residence, which will provide assisted living through daily meals and housekeeping.

It allows people to dispose of their homes and move into a nice community without it being an institution, said English.

No one wants to stereotype people, but when a young woman stands over 6'3", two occupations almost immediately come to mind.

One is modelling and the other is basketball.

Annette Wright had every intention of excelling in the first of those two when she moved to Salt Spring from Nelson to stay with her grandparents, Tom and Irene Wright, four years ago.

The plan was to attend a Victoria modelling school. When she literally grew out of that career option as she continued to get taller, special clothing would have been required. Wright felt obligated to keep a promise she had made to Tony Mason.

He was then coaching basketball at Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS).

In response to his request, Wright said if she stayed for her Grade 10 year on the island, she would try out for the team.

Her love for Salt Spring made her decide to remain here and Wright is not the kind of person to break a promise.

This choice sent her down a path that will soon take her flying across Canada as part of this summer's under-19 B.C. team and to university basketball games with the University of Victoria Vikes.

The thing that really makes Wright's story interesting is the fact she never spent much time participating in sports until she made it onto the GISS team.

Oh, yes, she enjoyed taking part in a team sport now and again, but nothing lasted including a Grade 7 basketball stint. She said she quit because she did not like her teammates' attitudes. They spent a lot of time being cool.

Even at GISS, she only showed promise after the first year and a half.

Attending four basketball camps last summer turned things around for Wright. To hone her skills, she has also been playing with Salt Spring's pick-up men's team.

Wright said her coach Kellie Booth has also provided much encouragement, helped her learn the rules and speaks up for all the team members.

To excel at the sport is in Wright's bloodlines as well. Her paternal grandfather, Tom, played university basketball in Scotland.

Her mother, who is also named Irene Wright, played both baseball and basketball for a small community, which meant she was on the court for the entire game.

Wright's mother remembers that her daughter was always on the move she was running at nine months old. As a child, she was fearless when it came to heights, whether this meant climbing up a pole on the ferry or hanging out among tree branches.

Other aspects of her lifestyle that

Wright chalks up to her advantage is that she has never smoked, done drugs or been drunk.

She eats tons of nutritious food. Pasta and grains provide her with extra energy.

She contrasts this with the fear she might have become anorexic if she had continued modelling.

On the high school team, plays often revolve around Wright, who scored 25 of 41 points in a recent game against Chemainus.

It was when Wright played on a south Vancouver Island all-star team that she was scouted by University of Victoria coach Cathy Shields.

The coach was impressed with Wright's skill and height. Turning 18 in July, Wright will play on B.C.'s girls team in the under 19 category this summer.

In the fall she will begin weight lifting and running, and from October to the end of the university year, she will practise basketball for two hours a day.

On the academic side, Wright plans to enroll in the sciences with teaching or forensic science being possible career goals.

Basketball now means a lot to Wright. It is my life, she said.

When asked if she had anything to say to other graduates, Wright said, Don't let anyone prevent you from doing what you want to do.

A recent Sunday workbee gave the premises a facelift and a community-minded kick-off for the new operators.

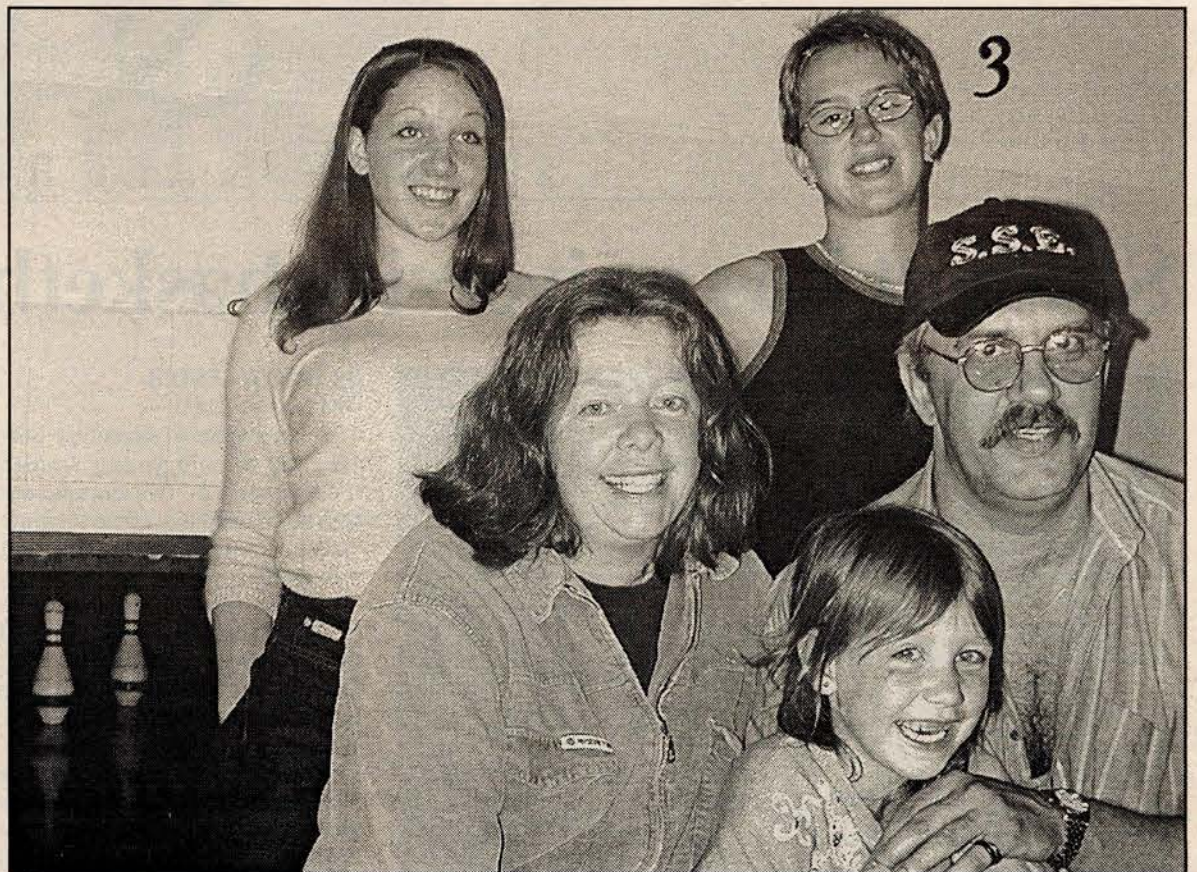

# Island's Pony Club seeking new home

The Salt Spring Pony Club must move from its Cusheon Lake Road location due to rising rental costs, and is asking for public assistance in finding a new home.

Before my daughter got into horses I thought this was a prima donna thing, said Karen Pedersen, who is district commissioner for the local branch of the national club.

Pedersen explained that the girls involved, who range in age from 7 to 15, are not necessarily from an economically elite segment of Salt Spring society.

The girls are involved because, especially in their early teens, they develop a passion for horses and ponies.

They live and breathe for it, said Pedersen. It's not just a relationship with an animal but developing responsibility and skills that are a real challenge.

The club provides riding lessons and workshops for its members which they use regularly in caring and showing the animals which they either own or lease.

On a daily basis, the girls feed and ride the horses. There is grooming and mucking out the stalls as well.

In addition to this, they learn saddlery and first aid for their steeds.

They learn basic riding and go on to master a variety of jumping techniques.

Preparing their horses to show them, such as learning to braid

their manes and tails, is another challenge for club members.

At the very least it gives a group of pre-teens and teens something to do on an island where a common complaint is that there is not enough for young people to get involved in.

For some, club participation can lead to competing with or breeding horses, equestrian coaching, training or becoming a veterinarian.

The Pony Club needs an area for 10 stalls and a riding ring.

Pedersen hopes even people who have this type of ranch setting but do not need to rent it for economic return might consider offering their facility based on how important the program is to its young members.

The club will consider any offers that would make relocation possible anytime between July and September.

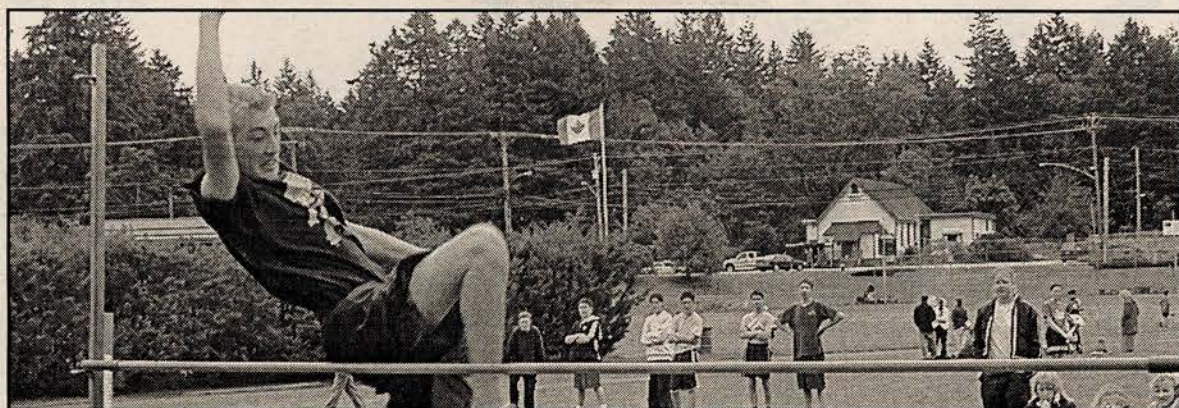

One third standing was picked up by Emma Rimmer in the triple jump. She also placed fourth in the 100 m, with three fifths in the 60 m hurdle, the 200 m hurdle and the long jump. In the 200 m, Rimmer placed sixth with a seventh finish in shot put.
