Land cost details released

Protecting the Maxwell Lake watershed from logging will cost a total of \$437,500.

The figure was revealed last week when the North Salt Spring Waterworks District (NSSWD) released the details of its agreement with Texada Land Corporation to buy 48 acres adjacent to Maxwell Lake.

Originally appraised by a local realtor at \$1.7 million, the land sale is subject to approval by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and the water district's ratepayers.

With the Salt Spring Water Preservation Society footing \$100,000 of the bill and the Salt Spring Conservancy handing over \$34,000, the total net cost for the NSSWD comes to \$303,500.

"I really think it's important for the community to purchase this land and ensure that the watershed will be protected well into the foreseeable future," said water district manager Mike Larmour.

"Maxwell Lake is very sensitive to nutrient input and we want to avoid the similar damage that has been done to Weston, Cusheon and St. Mary lakes."

Included in the sale are several covenants to be placed on the secondary watershed of Rippon Creek, as well as agreements about Texada's logging practices.

Under the contract, riparian zones bordering creeks will have a 20-metre setback as "no-machine" zones and a five-metre setback called a "no-cut" zone. Slash remnants will be left in place but not burned and all falling and forwarding of logs to the roadside will be conducted in the warmer months from July 1 to October 30.

Texada also agreed not to build roads within 30 metres of any creeks "except at creek crossings" and that no landings will be developed within 100

Strike threat over with 'new stability'

After walking the plank towards a possible strike, B.C. Ferries and its workers have pulled back from the brink with a new agreement.

A last-minute, tentative deal was struck Friday between the Crown corporation and the 4,400-member union, ending months of intensive bargaining and two years without a contract.

"This long-term tentative contract now provides stability for our customers, coastal communities, the tourism industry and our employees," said B.C. Ferries president Bob Lingwood in a press release Friday.

While neither the ferry corporation nor the union office is willing to speak directly to the media, the union hotline continues to be updated.

"This is a fair and innovative package which your bargaining committee wholeheartedly endorses," said the recorded message.

"This will bring a new era of stability to the ferry workers and the corporation while protecting our buying power."

A complete ratification package must be submitted to the union membership before the details of the new proposed agreement are released, but a bulletin from union Local 3 indicated

the deal would cover five years.

Ferry workers have been without a contract since October 1998 and have since rejected three contract proposals.

The new package is retroactive to their previous contract expiry and would grant no pay increase for 1998 and 1999, a two per cent increase on November 1, 2000 and a cost-of-living adjustment effective November 1, 2002.

The union membership will be reviewing the details of the deal this week and voting is expected to extend through August.

Workshop urges ecological diversity

The Salt Spring Conservancy Stewardship Project is sponsoring a conservation covenant workshop to encourage the preservation of ecological diversity on Tuesday, August 15.

Land can be designated for a conservation covenant to ensure it is left as a legacy for future generations of humans and wildlife. The Salt Spring Island Conservancy, The Land Conservancy of B.C. and the Islands Trust Fund are among the agencies designated by the B.C. government to hold conservation covenants.

Besides ecological diversity, conservation covenants create networks of connecting corridors for wildlife that need to travel between feeding, watering, resting, nesting and shelter sites.

Many creatures will not readily cross over large, open areas where they will be subject to predation. These "green" patches and strips provide buffer zones around parks, streams, wetlands and lakes.

Recent changes in legislation make it more attractive to place covenants on land because some tax incentives can be provided. The incentives are even better if the land is classed as ecologically significant.

Placing a covenant on the land can make it more financially feasible for properties to be handed down intact through generations.

The workshop is being held for individuals who want to learn more about how the covenants apply to their particular situation. Carolyn Stewart, Islands Trust Fund coordinator, will be available to answer questions.

metres of identified creeks. Other points include no skidding of logs, maximum cut-block areas of 14 hectares and culvert installations at all creek crossings.

The water district will finance its end of the purchase with short-term borrowing and a slight increase in water rates. The last piece of the puzzle will be put in place with the consent of NSSWD ratepayers to a nine per cent hike in their water bills.

Larmour said he is also waiting on the final nod of approval from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

"Municipal Affairs requires that we gain consent of our electors to borrow money. We don't have to pay for it right away."

As for the spirit of the negotiations with Texada, Larmour described it as "cooperative."

"They are businessmen. I think we made a very good deal in the end for the island. The community should look at acquiring more property in the Rippon Creek zone. The covenants protect a lot but not totally."

Big donation boosts seniors' fundraising

A second anonymous donor has pledged \$100,000 to a seniors housing project in Ganges.

The Gulf Islands Seniors' Residence Association (GISRA), which is planning to build a seniors' residence on Atkins Road, has to date received conditional pledges of \$200,000.

The first donor pledged to match donations from the community to a maximum of \$100,000.

The newest pledge has been made on the condition that the membership of the residence association matches the amount.

Spokesman Gordon English says donations are also being received from the business and professional community.

"We are encouraged by this show of support and appreciate the co-operation very much."

Salt Spring Seniors Services is also a recent donor with a cheque

for \$2,500.

The association is set to conduct a survey of seniors' housing needs. The information collected will be used to obtain support and approval from funding agencies.

In other fundraising news, GISRA will hold an estate sale at the project's site at 121 Atkins Road on August 12. A range of household effects, paintings, tools, artist's supplies, furniture and other items will be for sale.

And on August 19 a group of local golfers will hold a golf tournament and dinner as a GISRA fundraiser and as an opportunity to "roast" Tom Toynee, recently retired as managing director of Mouat's Trading Co.

Architect's drawings and other information about the housing project, which will be named Meadowbrook, is available from a booth at the Saturday Market.

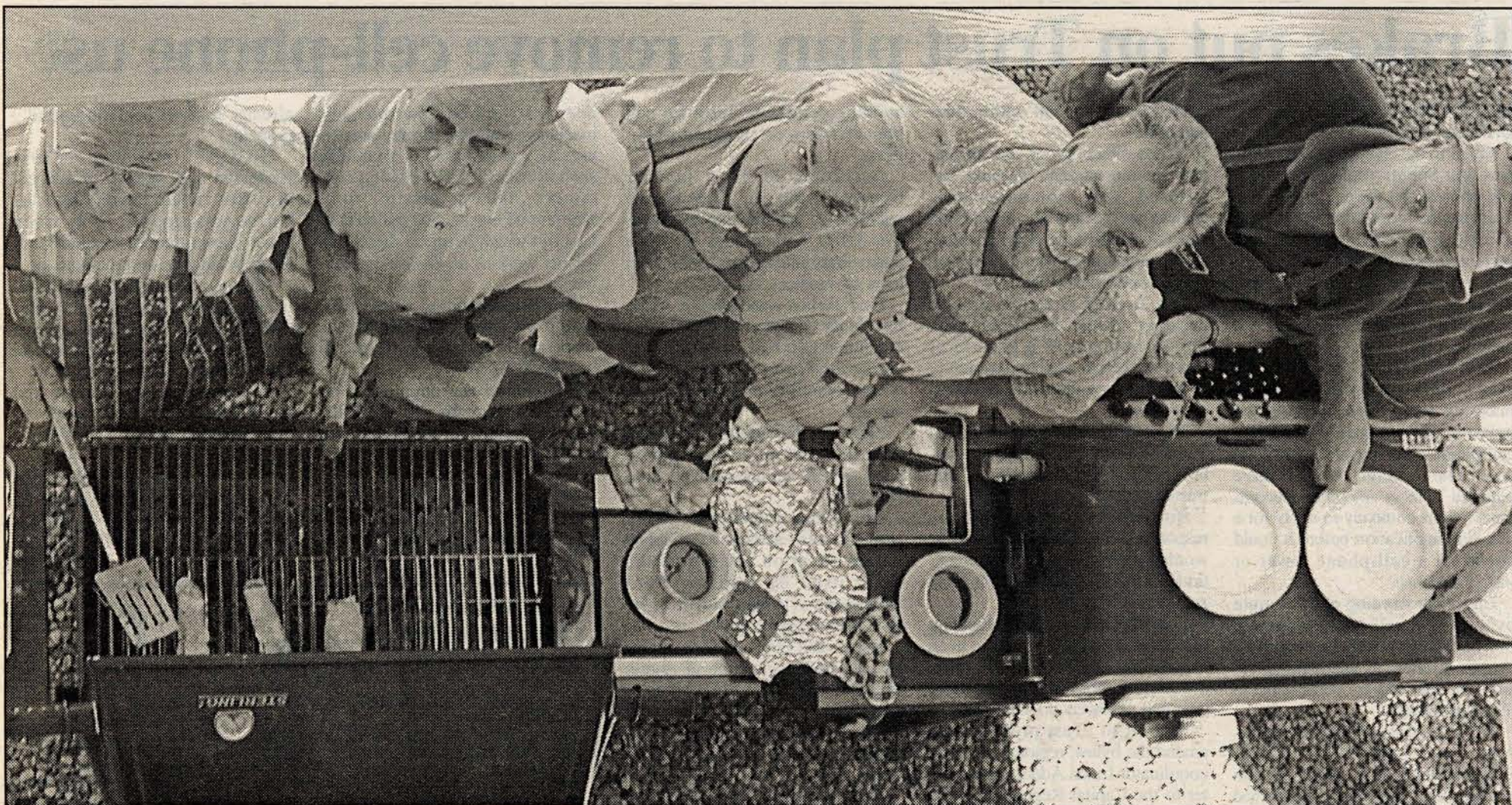

"Reaching this agreement reflects the mature nature of the parties and bodes well for a new relationship," said Trevor Oram, the new president of the B.C. Ferry and Marine Workers' Union.

While press releases from the corporation and union office reflect a hopeful, upbeat attitude, tourism advocates and a Victoria residents poll indicate public sentiment is not as cheery.

The threat of a strike has already caused visitor cancellations and a group of eight Vancouver Island organizations is petitioning the provincial government for direct intervention.

"We are appealing to the premier for action, said Lorne Whyte, chief executive officer of Tourism Victoria. "Enough is enough. We need a permanent solution to ensure that ferry service is guaranteed on a regular basis at all times."

A poll commissioned by Tourism Victoria, the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce and other tourism-related organizations revealed that 93 per cent of 535 surveyed residents agreed B.C. Ferries should be treated as

an extension of the B.C. highway system.

According to Venture Market Research, the survey sample has a plus or minus error of 4.2 per cent.

"The poll reflects the voters speaking not the tourism industry," Whyte added.

Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce president Doug Mitchell agrees the ferries should be a mandatory government service. Overall, he is pleased with the turn of events and the tentative agreement proposal.

"They did a really nice job of keeping it out of the news which was good for us because it (the strike threat) didn't scare way too many tourists. We can go forward this season knowing that the tourists will be coming."

Mitchell made reference to a radio broadcast where he heard Premier Ujjal Dosanjh say that a 90-day moratorium or "cooling off period" is already in place to ensure ferry service is not interrupted by a labour dispute.

"It is my understanding there is legislation in place to allow for the possibility of a cooling off period," confirmed Shari Graydon,

press secretary to the premier.

A CBC Radio report last week indicated that a straw poll of 30 employees at Horseshoe Bay resulted in 28 workers claiming they would vote against the new proposal.

Yesterday's press release from the union urged members to review the gains made under the new collective agreement.

"This is a win-win contract... when our members see the terms of this new deal they will support the groundbreaking wage protection provisions, the improved benefits and the removal of concessions."

Oram also said recruitment and training issues have been addressed.

Brakes put on Trust plan to remove cell-phone use

Much to the chagrin of the 1,000-plus Salt Spring residents opposing cell phones and towers, the Islands Trust has had to rethink its promise to remove cell-phone antennae as a permitted use in all zones.

The Trust learned this month that it has no authority or jurisdiction over communication companies and their devices.

At their meeting on June 22 the local trustees announced they would make an amendment to proposed bylaw #355, effectively excluding cell phone antennae as a permitted use. The change would have required Telus or any other telecommunications company to apply for a rezoning application before it could construct a cell-phone tower or install antennae.

Under the wording of the current bylaw #123, cell phone antennae fall under the general category of "public utilities" as telecommunications services and are permissible in all island zones.

At Thursday's Trust meeting, however, trustees David Borrowman and Bev Byron declared the committee had learned that control over communication

devices does not fall within their authority.

"Since directing our staff to prepare the amendment, we have discovered that communication devices are outside our jurisdiction and fall within federal jurisdiction, so our amendment would have no effect," said Borrowman.

The Trust is in the process of deciding whether to proceed with the amendment as a gesture of intent on behalf of the community or whether to withdraw the proposal altogether.

"In either case, we will be asking Telus to carry out public process before they install anything," the trustee said.

Borrowman added that in response to local feeling, the Trust would prefer that telecommunications companies be subject to local zoning.

It is Borrowman's understanding that Telus is presently engaged in an engineering study but has not made a decision about proceeding with antennae or towers on Salt Spring.

As part of Trust procedure to amend the bylaw, regional planning coordinator Linda Adams sent a letter to the Capital Regional District (CRD) indicating it should not issue

building permits to Telus for cell phone towers or antennae placement.

According to Trust planner Devery Corbin, the Trust has no intention of withdrawing the letter. The CRD will adhere to those instructions until further notice from local government, she said.

Enid Turner, a member of Island Residents Opposed to Cell-Phone Antennae (IROCA), read a letter urging the Trust put a moratorium on the installation of cell-phone antennae.

She said the subject should be "thrashed out in an open public hearing with representatives from both sides."

Also during Thursday's meeting, anti-cell tower activist Kim Hoban turned attention away from the tower itself by accusing Ward Drummond of zoning violations on his Leisure Lane property.

Hoban said Drummond is storing gas and fuel in violation of zoning laws and, while listing himself as an excavating contractor, is illegally repairing, servicing and storing machinery in his 1,600-square-foot shop.

Drummond said in a telephone interview after the meeting that he

does not work on other people's machinery and that the dry area he uses as a work space is a portable shelter made of two shipping containers and a plastic roof. Drummond owns a 500-gallon container in which he stores diesel fuel for his work as an excavating contractor.

"My understanding is that I am within my legal right to carry on working in my own yard on my own stuff," he said.

Drummond was approached by Telus some months ago for a preliminary study to see if his land would be appropriate to house Telus' cell-phone antenna.

To date, there have been no further inquiries. A B.C. Hydro high-voltage transmission line tower is

already located on Drummond's property.

IROCA member Chris Anderson also wanted to address the Trust committee on Thursday but he was stopped short when Trust committee chairman David Essig decided to end the meeting.

Although there were still questions from the 40-member audience, Essig closed the meeting saying the tone of the exchange had become heated and unproductive.

Anderson turned angry and accused the Trust of not complying with the principles of democratic process.

"I felt that the tenor of the meeting got to a point where it was no longer productive so I ended it," Essig said.

Farmers urge delay of LUB reading

Members of the farming community continued their attack on the new land use bylaw at last week's meeting of the Salt Spring Trust Committee.

John Woodward of the Farmer's Institute accused the Trust of working in closed quarters and snubbing the spirit of cooperation.

His delegation spoke at length about the current bylaw's non-conformity to the Official Community Plan (OCP) and urged the Trust to delay the bylaw's first reading until after November 30.

"The OCP clearly states that the Trust will work with the local farming community to develop policies to benefit farming and not make changes to the bylaw to prohibit or restrict farming," Woodward said.

He said the Trust is given a mandate by the OCP to support farming as an important traditional land use, lifestyle and livelihood on Salt Spring.

"The institute is very disappointed that the Trust has not adhered to the policies and objectives of the OCP," Woodward added.

A questionnaire sent out by the the Farmer's Institute to its 165 members on July 4 indicated that 87.7 per cent favour a separate bylaw for agriculture.

Trustee David Borrowman said that proposed setbacks from water bodies seem to be one area of particular concern and confusion to island residents.

"The confusion around setbacks is that the proposed 60-metre setback for septic fields has been projected by some individuals erroneously to include farming practices."

With the exception of Maxwell Lake, Borrowman explained, there is a three-metre setback rule from water bodies on farm land for plowing, haying, vegetation removal and general land alteration. Similar practices carried out on non-farm land would require a 10-metre (33-foot) setback.

On a related note, Borrowman said he received many letters expressing concern that existing septic fields cannot be repaired or replaced under the proposed bylaw.

He assures residents that this is not the case.

"The law that applied when you put in the septic field continues to

apply today," the trustee clarified. "Proposed bylaw #355 applies to new construction."

Even if a lot were rendered unbuildable, Borrowman said, an individual can apply for an exception to the bylaw under a variance.

A variance is a tool in municipal law that allows local government to override a specific rule and provide for exceptions.

John Wilcox of Duck Creek Farm said the inherent flaw in the proposed bylaw is the latitude for interpretation.

"It is very important to refine things," he told the committee. "You've taken recommendations and made them into laws."

He recommended the Trust adhere to the OCP and the Guide for Bylaw Development in Farming Areas written by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Other farmers, Malcolm Bond

and Wilfried Ortlepp, addressed the Trust about second kitchen and soil type issues.

Bond feared he would lose half his farm under the new bylaw.

Trustee Bev Byron stepped in and assured Bond the fear around inflated setbacks is unfounded and his farm is not in danger.


Wilcox disagreed. He said that unless the wording of the present draft is changed, the farming community is in trouble.

"New terminology in the bylaw redefines what a water body is and the redefinition is based on the high-water mark in the winter. They (the Trust) have expanded what is termed as a water body to include dry land."

As for the kitchen concerns, farms are allowed a second kitchen as long as it is designed to process products derived and sold by the farm itself, said Borrowman.



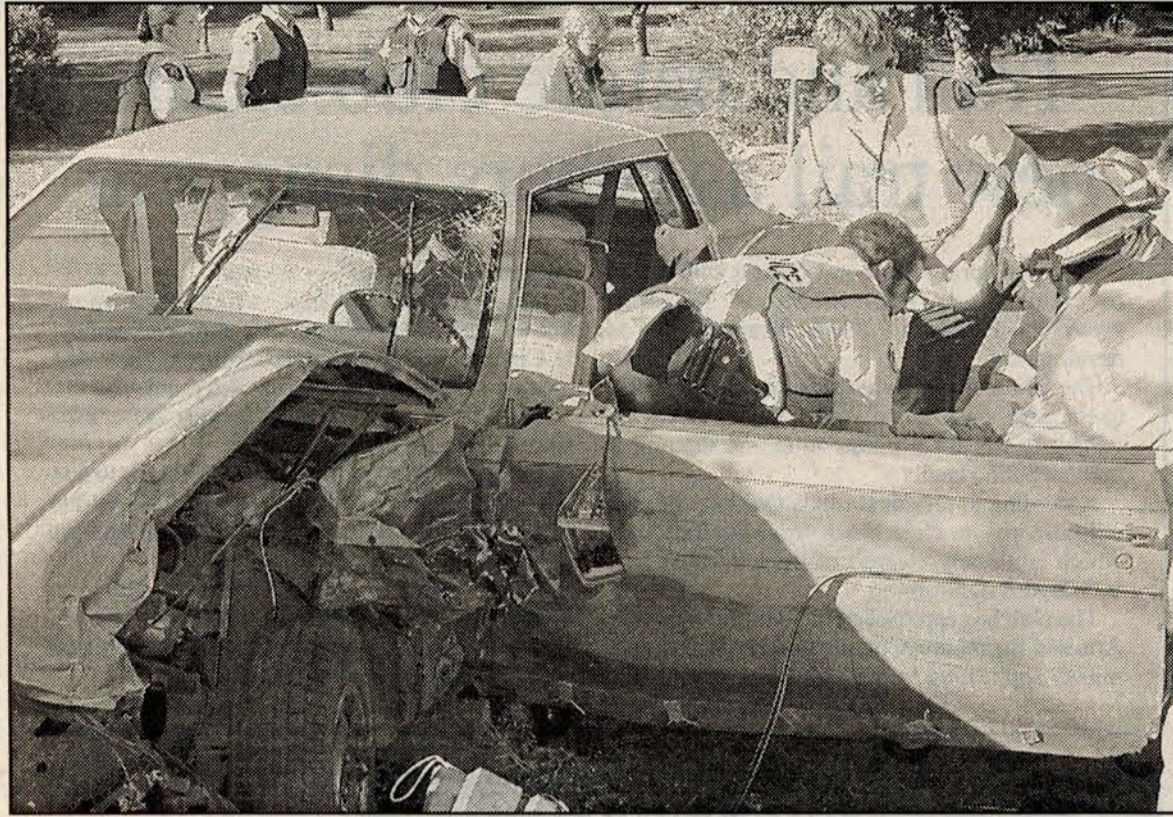

Lower Ganges Road crash results in impaired charges

A 33-year-old Salt Spring man has been charged with impaired driving and refusing to provide a breath sample after he allegedly crossed the centre line on Lower Ganges Road and sideswiped a pick-up truck.

The accident occurred Saturday evening at 6:22 p.m.

The driver of the offending vehicle was taken to Lady Minto Hospital with minor injuries, while the driver and passenger of the truck — both visiting from off-island — escaped without injury.

However, both vehicles sustained major damage and were towed from the scene.

In other police news:

- Police have charged a 40-year-old Salt Spring man with impaired driving after he was found asleep behind the wheel of a vehicle in the ditch on Bittancourt Road Saturday night.

The vehicle was towed from the location and impounded.

The driver was also issued a violation ticket for driving without a valid driver's licence and operating a vehicle without insurance.

The two fines amount to \$690.

- A Salt Spring man was issued a violation ticket worth \$345 for failing to remain at the scene of an accident.

Police were called to Vesuvius Bay Road at approximately 5:16 p.m. last Tuesday, after receiving reports of a pick-up in the ditch

and what appeared to be an intoxicated male walking away.

Police could not locate the driver and attended the home of the vehicle's registered owner, issuing him a violation ticket.

Trail and nature club clears new trail as others disappear

The Salt Spring Trail and Nature Club is set to clear a new trail in Mount Maxwell Provincial Park while others disappear due to development.

The 300-member club wants year-round access to the park via Armand Way. Club members are willing to pay for a survey to ensure the trail is built on public land.

According to president Linda Quiring, the club will also pay to clear brush from the trail area, which is already cleared of trees because it is B.C. Hydro right-of-way.

The club has approached the Salt Spring Parks, Arts and Recreation Commission (PARC) to submit an application to the provincial government

for permission to conduct the work.

Quiring explained that current logging on Texada Land Corporation land and development at Channel Ridge is displacing areas that club members have used extensively for many years.

She said 85 per cent of the hiking areas used since 1980 have disappeared.

The previous owner of the Texada lands allowed the hiking component of the club to use its land but the new owners no longer do so, said Quiring.

When Texada logs the Mount Maxwell area trails there will no longer be accessible. The village planned for Channel Ridge will also displace trails commonly used by the club.

Shelagh Plunkett has asked us to comment on her editorial that appeared in the July 24th issue of The Barnacle newspaper. Our charming friend, Shelagh Plunkett, never wanting to miss an opportunity to foster false impressions has got it wrong yet again. For Shelagh Plunkett to quote an unnamed source from a CKNW interview (no doubt the Adrian duPlessis interview) and to repeat "paraphrased" comments allegedly made by a Texada official is an employment of the same unusual journalistic tactics that we have come to know as her standard motis operandi. For Shelagh Plunkett to suggest that Texada would be "chopping the Garry Oak meadow up", as if we would actually cut down Garry Oak trees, is misleading and improper.

For the record, what Mr. Kapler of Texada did say was that there are eight titles of property along the north shore of Burgoyne Bay, some of which are up to 160 acres in size, which are owned by Texada. These individual titles could be sold individually for their fair market value.

What Texada thought was a sensible idea was to exchange the Garry Oak meadow lands of approximately 350 to 400 acres for additional titles on the waterfront of Burgoyne Bay. This exchange which would have seen the community receive up to 400 acres of property at no cost, was not good enough for certain members of the community. We have not been contacted by anyone in the community with an alternate suggestion of the plan presented though we have always maintained that we are open to listen to any sensible ideas that the community may have.

Despite what Ms. Plunkett says, there have been no final decisions on the part of Texada as to what will be done with the eight titles on the north shore of Burgoyne Bay. Texada is interested and has stated from the outset that it recognizes that the Garry Oak meadows are ecologically important and would like to see them protected and preferably in the community's hands. We are exceedingly familiar with the concept of compromise, however, we are disinclined to be taken advantage of.

As an aside, the Islands Trustees have never once called on us for a meeting to discuss anything about our properties, nor has the lead planner, Linda Adams, even so much as invited us for a spot of tea to bounce around any ideas. We have not heard from Bill Turner from the Land Conservancy in six months though he seemed like a very nice man when we last met with him. We have spoken for a couple of hours with a senior man with the Advisory Planning Commission, however, he has made it clear that no one should know what we have spoken about.

In my direct discussions with Shelagh Plunkett, I tried to explain to her what I thought was patently obvious, which is, that the market is the market and, if the market is only willing to pay \$200,000 for something, it serves no purpose in asking for \$400,000. The market does not care how much money you have or do not have, or how charitable or greedy you might be. The undersigned would be very happy to meet with Ms. Plunkett to try to explain in even simpler language should she care to get together. It would be the writer's pleasure.

We remain interested and available to meet with elected officials or community planners to discuss anything they feel that it is worthwhile to propose. Hopefully, the community activists will not heap scorn upon those who might choose to call. Unfortunately, it may be the case that community representatives, or the planning department, are hesitant to negotiate with us out of the fear of being pilloried and abused. We hope this will not be the case.

Two Salt Spring students will make a presentation on the local school project, Women and Violence: Education is Prevention, at the X International Symposium on Victimology.

Theirs will be one of two Canadian crime prevention projects to be featured during the five-day event.

Women and Violence: Education is Prevention is a joint effort involving the Gulf Islands School District and the SWOVA Community Development and Research Society.

The red tide closure on shellfish harvesting has been enlarged.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada has announced that all Gulf Islands waters are now closed to the taking of all bivalve molluscs, including all clams, oysters, mussels and scallops, due to paralytic shellfish poisoning, also known as red tide.

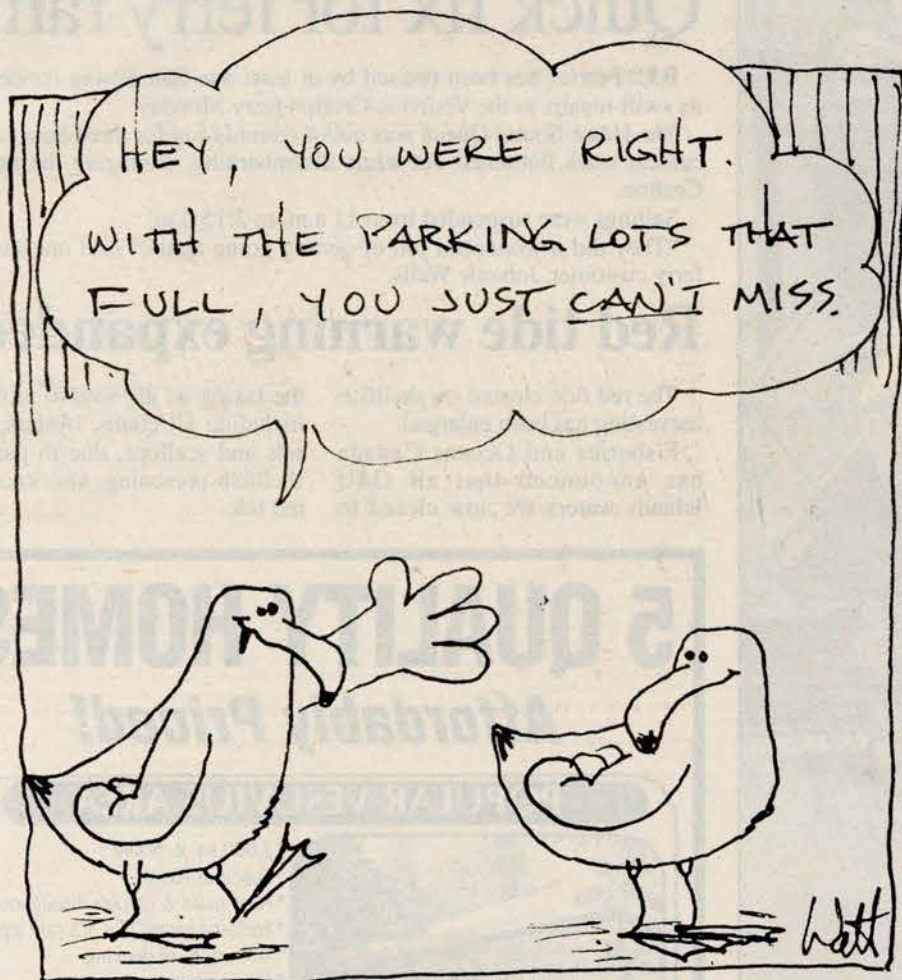

Our soccer program was struggling when Legg arrived on the island. Today, as he moves toward reducing his involvement in the local soccer scene, Legg can look with pride on an athletic movement that enjoys solid support from our children, their parents and the community at large.

We don't build statues to honour special people on Salt Spring, but if we did, Malcolm Legg would be at the top of the list of our nominees.

Long may his contribution be remembered.

Broken glass incident spawns clean-up event idea

Our dog, bounding into long grass, was cut by a broken bottle.

If I had not seen it happen and if I had not had something to use for a tourniquet he would have bled to death before we could get to the vet.

Vein, artery and tendon had all been cut. Someone's momentary amusement or frustration or carelessness in smashing that bottle had left a lethal surprise, almost like a land mine, long after the event.

As a small child I suffered a severe glass cut. We had gone to Wallace Island for a picnic and to swim at one of the sandy beaches. I was waist deep in the water when I stepped on an unseen broken bot-

tle that was partly buried in the soft muddy sand. It cut right across the bottom of my foot.

I remember standing in the water crying, knowing something awful had happened to me. When my parents came and lifted me up, blood poured from my cut and the sea looked red from it. End of picnic and a frightening experience for us all as my parents frantically rowed for home — we had no motor on our boat.

I suffered another similar but not so severe cut as a teen at another beach; another broken bottle, broken by someone long gone and not there to see the pain and trouble he or she caused.

These things all happened before

recycling was established and refunds were paid for bottles. Now there is no excuse for discarded and broken glass. There has never been any excuse for deliberately smashed bottles.

The malicious breaking of bottles in Centennial Park, where it can injure any unsuspecting person, child or pet, is outrageous and disgusting. Have these people no self-respect, never mind respect for others and for their community? And if not, why not?

We live in the best country in the world and in the most beautiful part of this best country.

Instead of self pity and hostility and ugliness of mind and attitude they should be part of keeping it the best place there is. With their attitude it won't be good for long. Yugoslavia was a very beautiful place too, but look at what the people did to it.

It wasn't too long ago that Canada's political parties enjoyed long-term support from their members. It wasn't unusual that successive generations of families would identify with one party.

That type of situation must certainly have made it easy to slot people. The Joneses were solidly Liberal, therefore you knew what to expect their views would be on issues of the day.

How times have changed. In 30 years I have voted for four different parties — no, make that five: I even voted Rhinoceros once. And if anything came along tomorrow that was better than the current crop the number would go to six.

I know I'm not alone. I suspect the majority of voters today will support the party whose platform, candidate and

leader they find most attractive, regardless of whom they voted for in the last election.

Of course, some of us rarely find anything attractive about any of the choices, in which case the best one is the party that offends you the least.

As we have become less inclined to support a particular political point of view, I think it's much more difficult to categorize people, to put them into easily defined slots. Mind you, this is what we like to do because it simplifies things. But how wrong we can be about people when we form opinions that are based on shallow per-

ceptions. The logging issue on Salt Spring today is a case in point. People I know have been categorized as pro-logging simply because they have not jumped upon the protest wagon. Believe it or not, some people don't believe that some forms of civil disobedience are necessarily morally right. And the matter of private property rights is sacred to many more. But this doesn't mean they sup-

port the wholesale destruction of forests. In fact, it's a safe bet that nearly all Salt Spring Islanders share the same values of environmental stewardship. The difference in opinion arises over how we promote those values.

A few months ago some e-mail came my way in which it was suggested that this newspaper was so close to Texada Land Corporation that the company's representatives participated in editorial staff meetings.

The charge would be laughable were it not for the fact that promoters of this nonsensical notion were otherwise intelligent people. It must have something to do with the perpetual attraction of conspiracy theories.

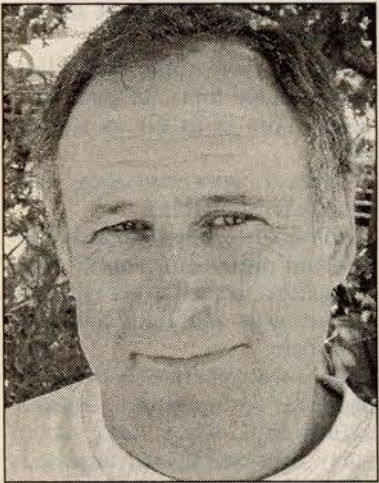
Thus slotted, Reform Party supporters could be expected to oppose abortion, gay rights and immigration.

We'd do well to bear in mind that slots are best for parking cars, not people.

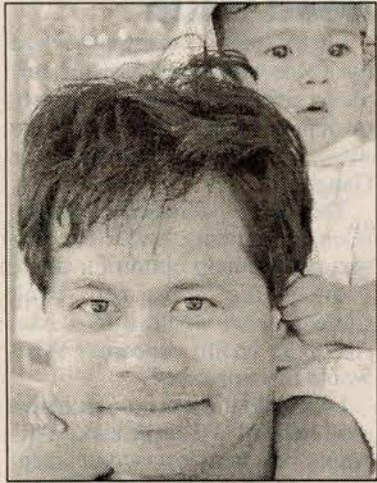

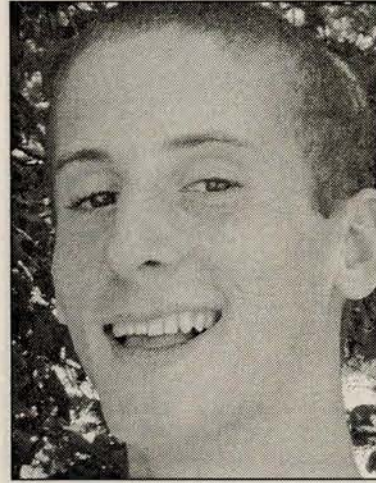

Cell tower dead issue

Last winter I was approached by Telus about a possible cell phone antenna site on my property on Kings Lane. I was told there were several possible sites near Ganges.

They were interested in putting it on an existing tower but this was not the only option for them. I asked the Telus rep, Rick Carlson, what would it look like. Are there health concerns? What would the output be?

I was told there is no conclusive evidence of a health risk. This would be a very low-output antenna servicing a small area, approximate output of a 100-watt light bulb, 800-1,000 times under federal limits.

Telus would canvass the neighbourhood prior to construction. Rick and myself felt that before he or I could proceed further, Islands Trust must be approached, building inspection must be approached. The site should be

accessed to see if it was suitable. I requested more information re output strength, photos of similar installations.

We did have some discussion over possible financial considerations. This is as far as it ever went.

There is no conspiracy with Islands Trust or Telus.

I have since, approximately two months ago, informed Kim Hoban that the cell tower is in fact a dead issue and Telus has gone elsewhere.


My own experience with cell phones is that they are a fantastic safety tool. They have saved many lives and busted thousands of criminals caught in the act.

They have helped catch forest fires before they got away. I seldom go boating or hike back in the woods without one.

Sally Sunshine: in the spirit of joy and creation

Sally Sunshine was given her name when she was 19 years old.

A musician friend in the band called Perth County Conspiracy saw her for who she was and introduced her as Sally Sunshine for the first time and every time thereafter.

The name has stuck even though Sunshine said she has never truly owned it until recently.

The peace and environmental activist, who was honoured by SWOVA at the 2000 International Women's Day celebration, numbers sitting outside with her face turned to the sun as being one of her favourite pastimes.

Sunshine said she was born into activism.

Her parents were involved in peace issues even before the anti-Vietnam War days.

They were active in the labour movement as well. This was in the Toronto area where they owned a motel and gas station.

Sunshine had a dream when she was 11 years old. In it, she talked U.S. President Eisenhower and Soviet President Krushchev out of starting a world war.

This got her going and she never looked back.

At 12, Sunshine attended her first Ban the Bomb rally. At 14, she tried to hitchhike to Salem, Alabama, during the heyday of the black civil rights movement.

"My life's journey is working to help bring peace on earth and the environment is part of that journey," she said.

Two years ago, a bicycle accident in which Sunshine injured her spine left her disabled and in a wheelchair.

"In so many ways it has been such a tragedy, so intense for me and my family," she said. "But it's really made me go deeper into my own healing."

It has underlined for her that doing this personal growth work for oneself and for the interwoven web of life takes a commitment.

"Healing has nothing to do with walking. It's healing the soul that's the journey."

The difference lies between, for example, feeling one should quit drinking coffee and the day when one actually stops drinking

Sunshine believes now that if everyone heals him or herself then together they have healed the planet.

Conversely, being in a wheelchair has frustrated and hindered Sunshine in her environmental activism.

During the Clayoquot Sound protests, she remembers going up to loggers and hugging them.

Now she cannot demonstrate to them her understanding that their motivation is to feed themselves and their families.

Sunshine got national media coverage when she chained herself to a logging truck in protest against Texada Land Corporation's logging.

Yet there have been many days when she wanted to be out on the road demonstrating with everyone but just could not do it.

"I have to do things in other ways. I pray a lot. I need to go there on another level of my being."

Sunshine said it is her children — Sasha, Misha and Shawna — and friends who have been her strength.

"No matter what happens, life is still beautiful," said Sunshine. "There's still joy. There's still laughter. The pain can be so deep but the magic is still there. I will find the sun's rays. I feel the sun and the wind and the ocean are the true healers."

When I arrived at Sally Sunshine's place last week to interview her, I was bemoaning two days of a constant downpour of rain.

Before our hour was up, the sun was out.

That must be the effect Sally Sunshine has on the world.

I have thoroughly enjoyed growing up here and even though my parents considered moving off "the rock" once or twice, I am heartily glad that they did not! (Although at times I think it may have provided an easier stepping stone into the "real" world.)

I fully attribute the island's flourishing arts, crafts and inspirational atmosphere to the many artistic talents and tastes. Salt Spring is a hotbed of the wild and crazy and it taught me many things, including my sense of humour.

The outrageous people I have met (this island attracts characters), the things I have learned and all the opportunities to really explore what I love most (writing this), bring home this simple fact: I will always remember "the rock" and I will be an islander wherever I go.

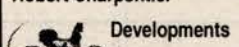

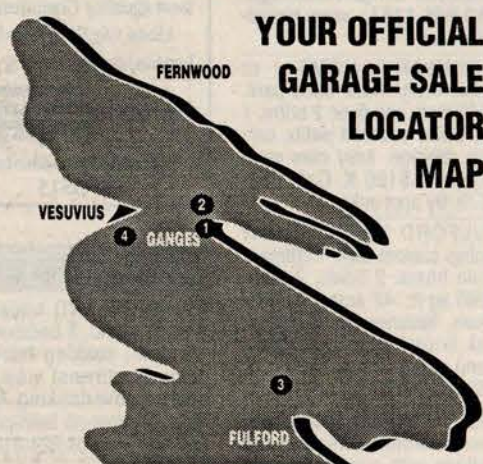

600-acre subdivision opens out onto spectacular views

It was several years in the planning, and a considerable amount of time in the building, but the subdivision developed by **Chris Gosset** and **Ron Spencer** is now on the market.

Located on the slopes of Mount Tuam, the 600-acre, 31-lot development has some spectacular views, from Active Pass on one side to Sidney and Pat Bay on the other.

Initially the proposal was greeted with a favourable response from the Salt Spring Trust Committee, but that quickly changed from warm to cold. Local elections saw a new Trust committee take office and once again the subdivision was deemed acceptable. (The original proposal would have given the community a 300-acre park, an amenity that was lost in the end.)

It's well worth the drive up just to see the extensive road-building that took place to gain access to the views. And the views themselves are amazing. (Realtor **Norman Rothwell** says the subdivision has become an alternative viewpoint to Mount Maxwell because the road is so much better.)

Lot sizes in the first phase of 13 lots range from 5.5 to 19.5 acres, and they all have views. Prices start at \$219,000 and three have already sold. Rothwell and **Myles Wilson** at **Royal LePage Salt Spring Realty** are the agents.

Salt Spring has a new bookstore thanks to a retired health research scientist.

Sabine Swierenga has opened **The Great Ganges Book Co.**, a "serious, second-hand bookstore" located in the rear of **Ron Sullivan's Great Ganges Junk Co.** on McPhillips Avenue.

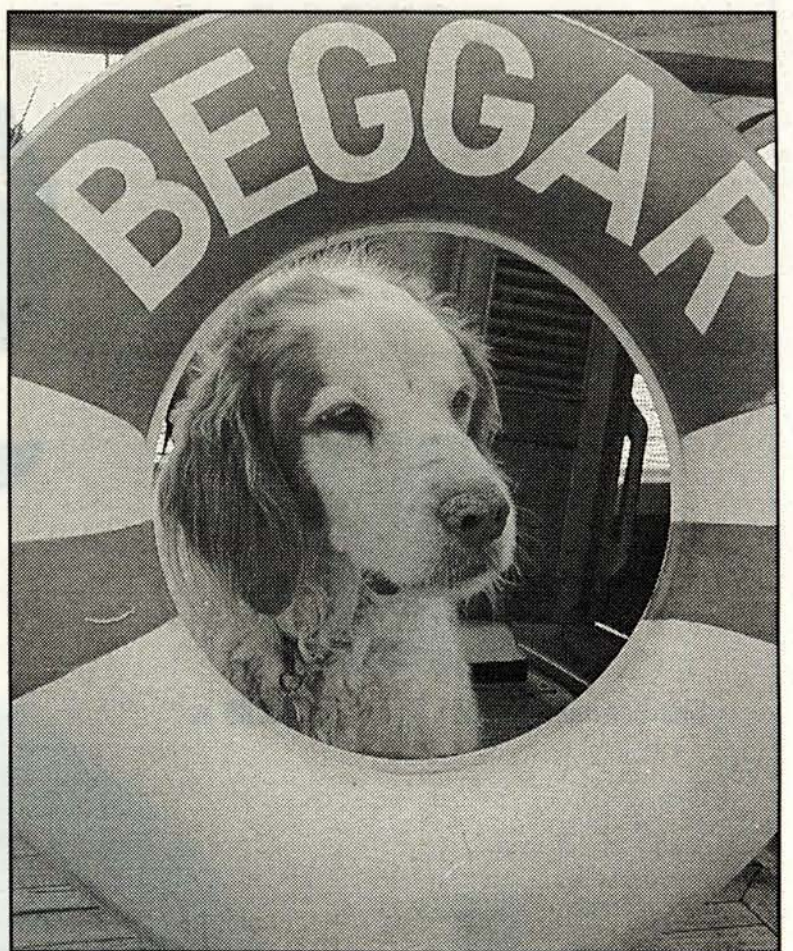
