Summer gets full-sail salute with Sea Capers festival

Just when it seemed a favourite Salt Spring community festival might run aground for the last time when it failed to sail in 2005, Sea Capers has returned for this Saturday, June 17.

The Salt Spring Harbour Authority (SSHA), a non-profit organization that manages several island docks, decided to take on the task to ensure the nautical-themed festival could once again be enjoyed by islanders and visitors.

Sea Capers includes events that run leisurely all day and others that aim to follow a schedule, taking place in Centennial Park, Ganges Harbour, the SSHA parking lot and other nearby locales.

Adult and Junior Build-a-Boat contests run from 10 a.m. to noon, with the launch at 12:30 p.m. Kids are given an extra hour to get their projects completed and the Build-a-Boat awards are at 1:15 p.m.

Competitive Build-a-Boat teams are given a generic set of materials from Windsor Plywood to work with and use their own tools and touches to bang together some kind of craft that will float — hopefully.

While watching people try to beat the clock and demonstrate their engineering and construction prowess is entertaining, the real fun takes place when teams try to manoeuvre their “boats” around a course in the harbour.

The not-to-be-missed Walk on Water race — which is also full of laughs — takes place in the harbour at noon while remote control and model boats are demonstrated at the Kanaka and Coast Guard docks at 1:30.

Sea Capers is a great day for kayakers. Sea Otter

Kayaking will offer demonstrations throughout the day in the waters off the Ganges boardwalk by Thrifty Foods, while Island Escapades is doing stroke and rescue demos off Centennial Park at 11 a.m. Then from noon to 6 p.m. people can try out the latest in kayak technology with Delta thermoplast boats at the Island Escapades site at 163 Fulford Ganges Road from noon to 6 p.m.

Ever wonder how to tie a knot that will hold the big one? Fishermen's gear demos run from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Harbour Authority's parking lot next to Centennial Park.

Information booths from the island's emergency services groups and others will also be in play in the SSHA parking lot.

People can catch the sight of Salt Spring's GVM-sponsored dragon boat in action from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and at a 2:45 p.m. closing ceremony, while a classic working boat show is at Kanaka wharf all day with a farewell sail past at 3 p.m.

Music runs in the seaside Centennial Park gazebo from about 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., thanks to musicians like Valdy, Bill Henderson, Black Velvet Band and Donn Tarris.

In addition to food available at the Saturday market, the famous Anglican “pie ladies” will have a booth in the park. Get there early to avoid disappointment as they always sell out!

The only major component of past Sea Capers that won't be part of the 2006 version is the parade.

Last Thursday night's year-end high school music show was a showcase of what happens when a love of music, relentless hard work and voluminous talent meets an in-your-soul appreciation of excellence.

In some cases that gelled most eloquently in a single note or word.

It was even obvious in the stage management, with about a dozen different entrances and exits clicking and flowing without incident or delay and an effective use of lighting.

MC Sarah Howe said the aim was to get the audience out the door in 90 minutes, and they did it — not that we were in a hurry for the night to end.

Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS) music director Bruce Smith commented on the hefty amount of "guy power" he's had this year — the most in his eight years at the school.

It flexed its muscles in all sorts of ways in the concert at ArtSpring. The Duke of Earl

Also of note was the clarity and unity of the junior choir — in spite of its large size — with the same to be said for the guitar class, which is led by drama instructor Jason Donaldson.

The Chamber Orchestra triumphed over A Shaker Melody and the first movement of Schubert's *Symphony in B minor* (the *Unfinished*) — although one occa-

sionally yearned to hear a bit more confidence in that piece (before realizing this is still a high school group).

The Senior Jazz Band had aplomb to spare for their rendition of Charlie Parker's famous *Birdland*, which put the spotlight on the group's five trombone players for a spell.

Under Smith the GISS students are clearly given a chance and the tools to explore all kinds of music deeply. In several cases that's augmented by their out-of-school and in-family musical experiences and training.

Whether or not they pursue music as a career after GISS, these kids have all earned and received an irreplaceable gift.

Speaking of alumni, we also got to hear Simon Millerd on guitar and piano with the jazz band and guitar class. He's accompanying vocalists again Saturday night at the Jazz Fest Showcase at ArtSpring, where some of the outstanding GISS musicians will again be featured. Should be a great show.

piece from Da Boz vocal group, featuring knock-em-dead soloist Aaron Trory; Lowell Rockliffe's pewter-pure voice in the junior choir's *Loch Lomond*; and the flawless Brad Cronin, Gordon Havelaar and Eryn Krieger trio singing *Oh Signore* all provided evening highlights.

Not to be outdone, the lone male (Brad Cronin) in the seven-member Obmock ensemble did need some "girlz" to execute their challenging pieces, and Charlotte Mellstrom's opening-act scatting was mighty impressive, as was Rosie O'Donnell's sweet solo in the Junior Choir's *Down to the River to Pray*.

Also of note was the clarity and unity of the junior choir — in spite of its large size — with the same to be said for the guitar class, which is led by drama instructor Jason Donaldson.

The Chamber Orchestra triumphed over *A Shaker Melody* and the first movement of *Schubert's Symphony in B minor* (the *Unfinished*) — although one occa-

sionally yearned to hear a bit more confidence in that piece (before realizing this is still a high school group).

The Senior Jazz Band had aplomb to spare for their rendition of Charlie Parker's famous *Birdland*, which put the spotlight on the group's five trombone players for a spell.

Under Smith the GISS students are clearly given a chance and the tools to explore all kinds of music deeply. In several cases that's augmented by their out-of-school and in-family musical experiences and training.

Whether or not they pursue music as a career after GISS, these kids have all earned and received an irreplaceable gift.

Speaking of alumni, we also got to hear Simon Millerd on guitar and piano with the jazz band and guitar class. He's accompanying vocalists again Saturday night at the Jazz Fest Showcase at ArtSpring, where some of the outstanding GISS musicians will again be featured. Should be a great show.

While Pegasus Gallery of Canadian Art was purchased by young Manitoba art aficionado Ian Sigvaldason and veteran Winnipeg art dealer Bill Mayberry last year, the gallery's official re-opening is set for June 16.

Evans, the recent winner of the International Artists award for watercolour landscape, captured

Before his death, Maquinna had stated he would return to this world as a killer whale.

Although Luna was killed in a

collision with a tugboat earlier this year, Walker has obtained recordings of the whale's sonar sounds from the OrcaLab.

Luna's "voice" will be heard in the gallery on Friday and Chief Mike Maquinna will be on hand to tell his father's story and the story of the whale they called Tsu'xiit.

Afternoon and evening receptions take place Friday from noon to 5 p.m. and 5 to 7 p.m.

In addition to the Walker and Evans pieces, gallery visitors will see rare works by legendary North-

west Coast artists Henry Hunt and Mungo Martin, as well as fine Inuit sculpture dating from the 1950s through the 1970s and Group of Seven paintings are shown.

Pegasus Gallery was founded in 1972 by Reg Ashwell, the author of numerous books on Northwest Coast art.

On Friday afternoon at the Mouat's Mall gallery, he will give talks on collecting this art.

Legoland: a surefire fringe winner

The Legoland show at Gulf Islands Secondary School fulfilled all the criteria of a good fringe festival show and then some last week.

It was an hour in length, had a small cast of two talented performers, the writing was clever and sharp, the direction was sure, the choreography filled in spaces that a small show can have, simple props were used in clever ways, and the music and lighting cues functioned like a third performer.

With not a whole lot of cash thrown into production values — just creativity — writer/director Jacob Richmonds, co-director Britt Small, actors Celine Stubel and Amitai Marmorstein, and stage manager Briana Rayner entertained, edified and elucidated a packed house in the high school's Second Story Theatre last Monday night and ran for two more sold-out nights.

Sixteen-year-old Penny (Stubel) is the storyteller, with her 13-year-old brother Ezra (Marmorstein) aiding in plot progression by acting as other characters with the help of a bevy of dolls and puppets.

Home-schooled in a hippie, nudist enclave outside of Uranium City, Saskatchewan, named Elysium Community Farm, we meet the two at a presentation Penny must give for a crime we spend the next hour wondering about. We are immediately complicit in the adventure.

When their parents get busted for a huge marijuana operation, their idealistic bubble gets popped as they enter the outside world or "Legoland."

Starting at Wal-Mart, they seek the collective warm hug of the commune, but are

ignored in this plastic world. To gain sympathy they "simulate human catastrophe to start up a conversation." Ezra pretends to have epileptic seizures.

They are discovered, and Penny is sent to a Catholic school where judgemental girls in the form of a group of Barbies glued together torture her with their bullying taunts of being a lesbian feminist.

Penny survives this satanic boot camp by crushing on Johnny Moon, the lead singer of 7-Up, a mock boys band. Shown on a screen these swains — fellow students from the University of Victoria — are placed on hilarious backgrounds.

Their journey through the United States, paid for by sales of Ezra's ADD medication, to catch Johnny in a live CD signing, showcases the

fresh part of the show.

Using a recurring form, where we can tell the state they're travelling through by the toy in the McDonald's happy meal, the actors' energetic choreography and flag-waving patriotism make a comment on our neighbours to the south that only an outsider would risk.

They find Johnny is no longer the beacon of a girlhood heart-throb but rather a nihilistic, misogynistic rapper whose single *F@#% You With My Chainsaw* propels Penny to try to change his ways with a song she wrote for him, accompanied by her ukulele.

The meeting with Johnny, played by a large puppet and his monkey sidekick, does not go well and Penny is given the choice of giving talks to people about acceptable behaviour or jail time.

If Stubel hadn't given such a connected and nuanced performance, Legoland would not have succeeded. We completely bought into her character and wanted to go on the journey with her.

Marmorstein, a hometown boy, was very funny, though I didn't understand the physical choice for his character.

For a person who needs Ritalin and Dexedrine to calm his bouncing-off-the-wall ADD energy but who sells his drugs rather than taking them, his controlled physicality didn't make sense.

Putting on the persona of a Dr. Strangelove/Dr. Evil (Austin Powers) could have been traded in for a more original choice by this clearly talented young man.

It's all minor criticism for a show that is going on to Victoria, Vancouver and Toronto.

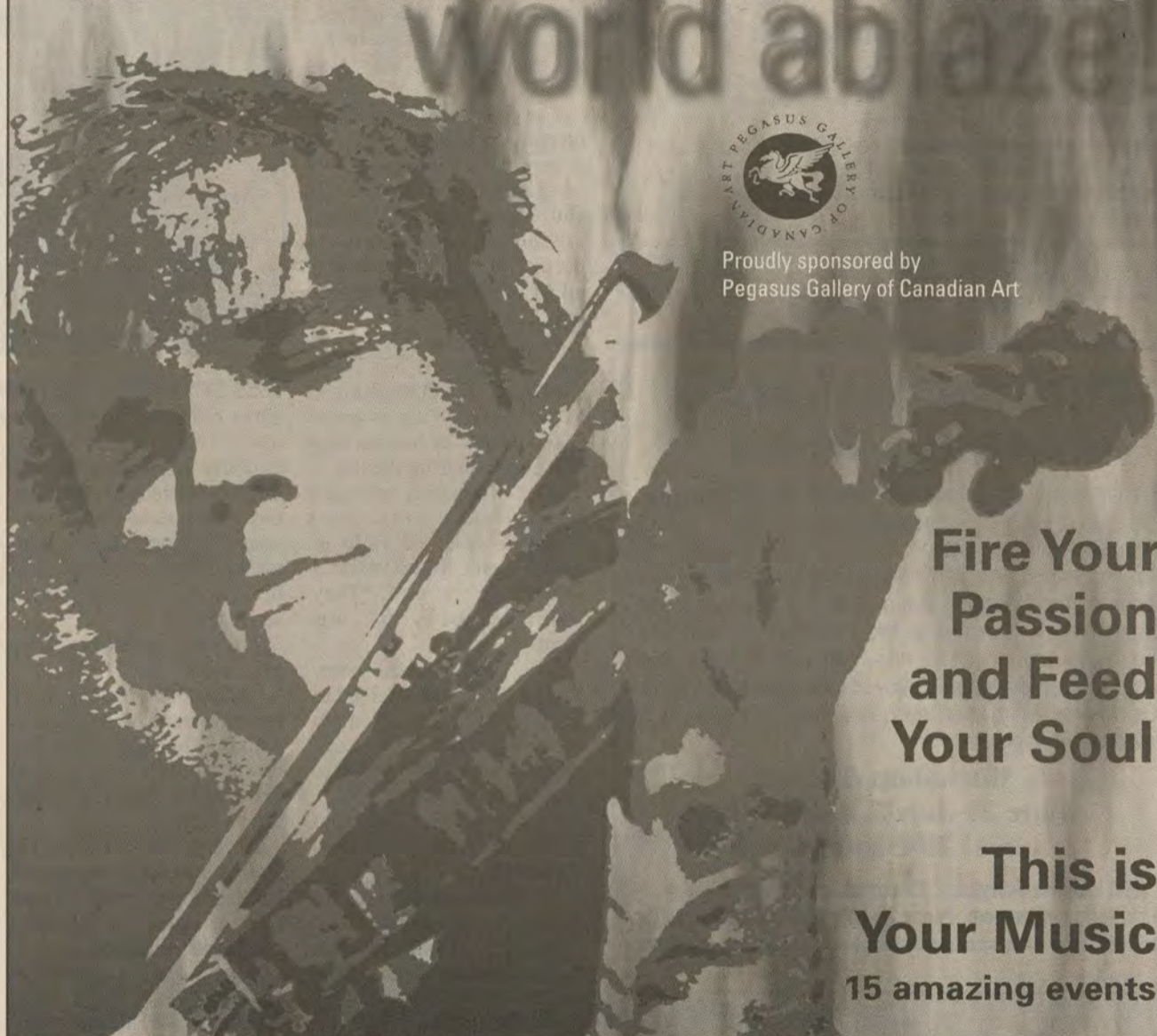

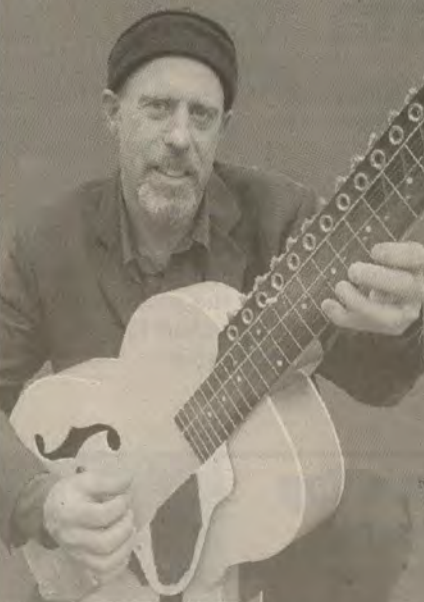

But the last time Wallbank attended school was in 1952 and he's old enough to be the grandfather of his classmates.

The 71-year-old islander recently completed Grade 12 as part of the adult-education program offered through the Gulf Islands School District.

"The school is very supportive of seniors who turn up to complete their education," he said.

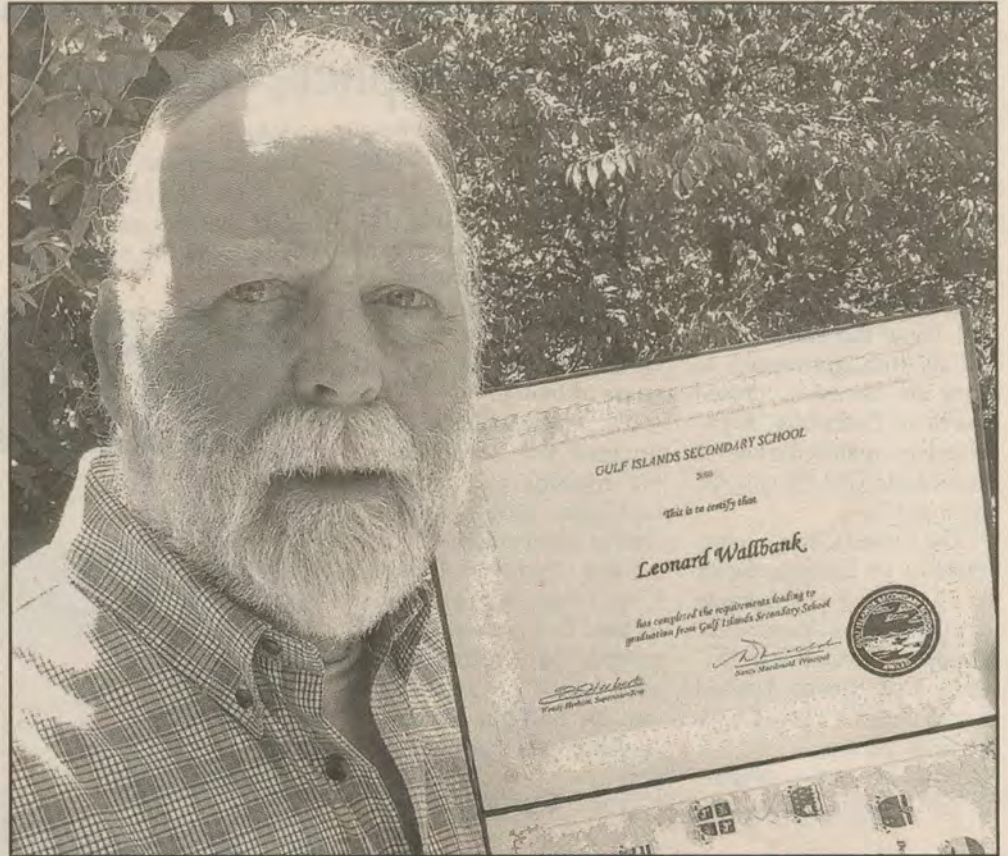
While Wallbank could have completed his Dogwood Diploma through night classes, he took his program a step further by joining regular classes during the day.

"For older folk who are worried about kids' reactions, no one was rude or disparaging about what I was doing," he said. "They were interested in why I was there."

As a retired printer/compositor, Wallbank decided to return to high school simply because he wanted to exercise his rights of access to education, he said.

"It's something the government offers us and they can't refuse."

But after working on night school for two years, he decided to attend daytime classes at Gulf Islands Secondary School (GISS) so he could gain access to courses like art, biology and the cafeteria program. He par-

ticularly enjoyed studies in English literature, comparative civilizations, history and visual arts. And he liked cafeteria classes so much that he attended them for three semesters.

"It was glorious," he grinned.

Wallbank's wife Rosemary benefits from his interest in cooking, but she joked that now he only knows how to make rice in four-kilo batches at a time.

Among other highlights from his studies, Grade 12 Biology proved to be a tough course, but he still earned top marks, Wallbank said.

"Getting a good mark in biology was a right challenge. I really had to work at it."

He also enjoyed English

literature but he chuckled when he found that students were still reading an updated version of the same textbook that he'd studied in 1952.

"We had a good laugh when we found it on our bookshelf," said Rosemary Wallbank.

Since younger students at the school were pretty involved in their own studies and peer groups, they didn't even seem to notice him as a fellow classmate in the halls, but he still made some connections.

"The obvious clue that I'd been accepted was when I'd been invited to streak with them," Wallbank laughed.

However, he declined the students' generous offer to be included in the grad prank, he noted.

Wallbank participated in the adult-education program for five years (and stayed longer than necessary to complete the bare minimum), but now he's ready to move on, he said.

"I would have liked to study physics, but I'm tired of it now," Wallbank said. "There's a time to quit."

Students even gave him a standing ovation when he received his graduating certificate, his wife noted.

"That brought tears to my eyes."

Now he encourages other adult students to attend classes at GISS.

"The essential thing is that I was made welcome, they cheered me on and I enjoyed it," Wallbank said.

August 6 date set for Eco-Home Tour

Salt Spring's first Eco-Home Tour was so successful last year that organizers are set to do it again on Sunday, August 6.

Guided tours for 10 unique ecological and sustainable homes are offered at the event put on by the Salt Spring Island Conservancy (SSIC) and the Earth Festival Society.

Sustainable home technologies on the tour will include: windmill power, rammed earth, hemp straw bale, cob, water-catchment,

masonry heating, solar and grey water systems.

"The homeowners, who in most cases built their own homes, will give guided tours to explain the many cutting edge features incorporated into the home designs," explains a press release.

"On the tour is an organic farm with solar hot water heating, a masonry heater with built-in bake oven and plumbing for hot water, I-WOOD construction that uses 30 per cent less lumber and less waste, the island's

first legally permitted cob dwelling which has walls made from sand, clay and straw, and insulation made from recycled blue jeans; and a hemp straw bale home."

Other technologies include an energy retrofit of a 1950s cottage with a solar hot water system and several water catchment systems.

The homes are packed with ideas to reduce energy and water usage, and associated operating costs.

Advance tickets are avail-

able at Salt Spring Books (537-2812), Morningside Organic Bakery and Café (653-4414) and at the SSIC office.

Mail order tickets can be ordered by sending a cheque to SSIC Eco-Home Tour, P.O. Box 722, Salt Spring Island, B.C., V8K 2W3. Tickets are \$25 each, or two for \$45.

All proceeds will support the operations of the conservancy to educate schoolchildren, the public and landholders about land and water stewardship.

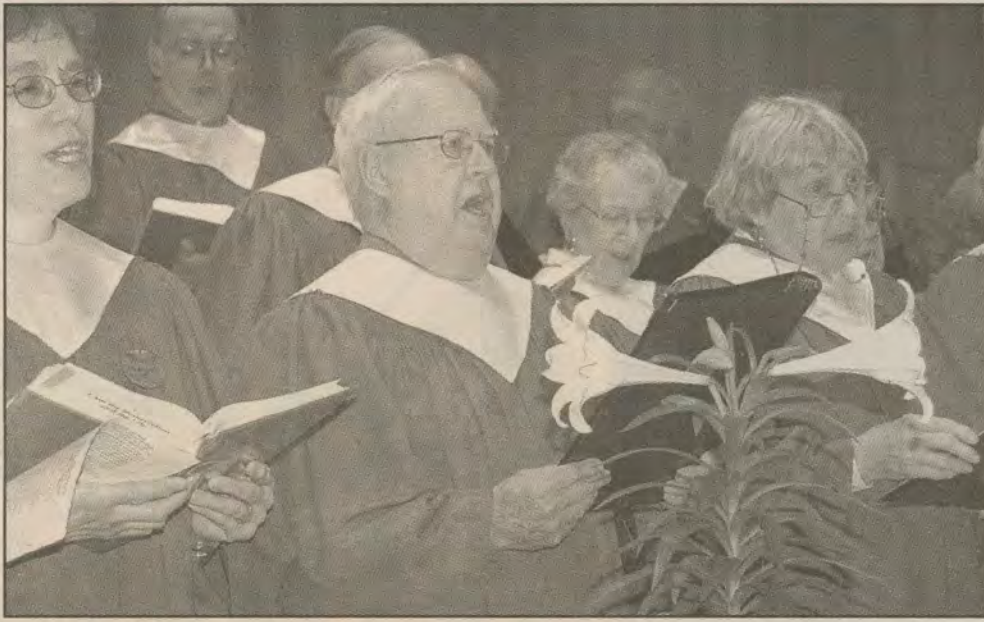

A number of surveys in recent years have demonstrated that weekly attendance at a religious service is on the rise. A 2005 Gallup Poll indicated that in Canada, 37 per cent attend a weekly service, up from roughly 20 per cent in 2000. Salt Spring writer Mary Hughes was curious to find out if these numbers hold true for the numerous religious organizations on Salt Spring Island. The result is a series of articles that answers the question, "What's happening in the churches on Salt Spring?"

"We're full most Sundays," says Nancy Powell, a member of Salt Spring Island United Church. "It's been that way since we arrived 17 years ago."

With a congregation of 130 families, there are more than 200 people involved in church activities.

The familiar white building was built on Hereford Avenue in 1952. The group's pamphlet explains: "Salt Spring Island United Church began in 1861 as a preaching point for Methodist circuit missionaries from Vancouver Island... The first Methodist Church was built (as the Union Church, to serve all Protestants) in 1887 in the Burgoyne Valley... and a second church was built in 1905 in the central area."

Reverend Ruth Cairns says the congregation is in transition.

"We're seeing an influx of newcomers, mostly from the United States, and they tend to be early retirement age. They don't arrive with children, but we do enjoy the grandchildren. There were over a dozen kids on Easter Sunday [this year]."

Cairns was commissioned

to the ministry in 1996 after completing her masters degree in theology at Alberta's St. Stephens College. In her graduating class of 22, there were only three men, and many were mature students.

The United Church settled Ruth in her first position in a rural community in northern Alberta. She stayed four years and might have stayed longer, but family in Victoria needed her closer to home. She came to Salt Spring in 2003.

Salt Spring Island United Church is a busy place, with regular gatherings of the choir, a quilters' group, study groups, Special People's Performing Arts Group and the Ganges United Church Women. Thursdays there's the Men's Breakfast and mid-day Loonie Bridge. It's also a popular rental facility with numerous non-profit groups meeting in the church hall.

"Because we are so central, we are often seen as chaplains to the whole community," adds Powell.

Music plays a big part. There's a fine choir of 20-25 voices led by Shirley Bun-

yan. As Judi Francis says, "We love to sing the songs. Shirley is a wonderful conductor."

Powell calls it a social justice church. The In-from-the-Cold program is a good example. Intended for islanders who live "in the rough," it has sheltered half a dozen people a night over the past two winters. A hot meal and a dry night are provided.

And, being Salt Spring, says Cairns, "We offer a vegetarian alternative."

To meet insurance requirements, a parishioner stays overnight. There have been a few drug and alcohol-related incidents, but nothing destructive. What is a concern is the growing incidence of young people sleeping on and under the church balcony.

The church is involved with Partners-in-Missions and frequently works with the Mennonite Central Committee and other agencies. Mission and Service work is important to Powell, as it supports marginal congregations in rural areas and in inner cities.

ated at four weddings there, and there's usually a Christmas event.

"You need plenty of body heat to keep warm, though," she says. "The old building has minimal wiring and no plumbing. But it's in good condition, as extensive restoration work was needed after a damaging fire some years ago."

Salt Spring Island United Church suffered more vandalism in 2003 when one of its beautiful stained glass windows was smashed.

The damage was repaired, thanks to Jack Clements, and the windows are now protected by plexi-glass.

But insurance has become a major expense and the congregation holds various fundraisers to help with upkeep.

Powell believes her church reflects the island demographic. "We're a very friendly church. Everyone is welcome."

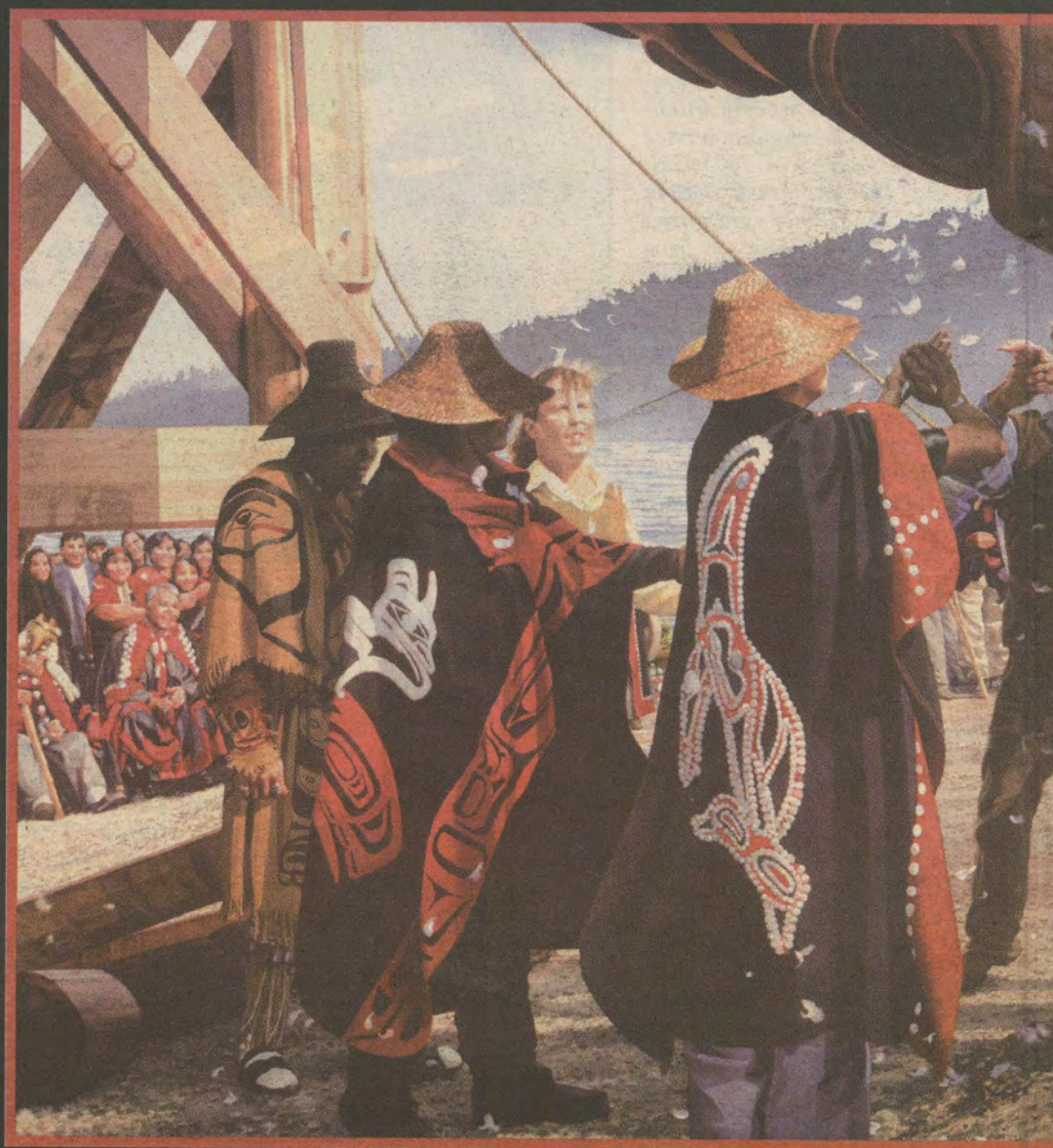

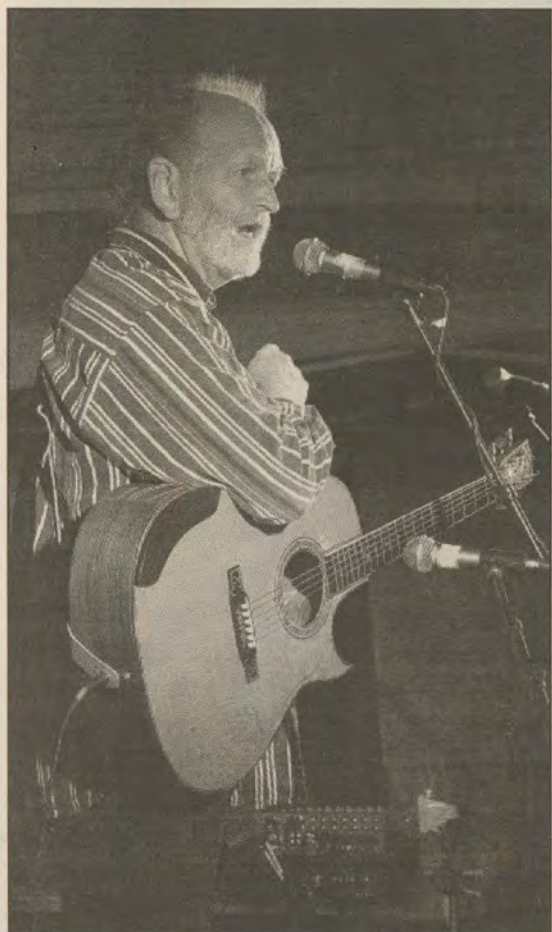

Salt Spring could learn from fictional bridge scheme

In a recent New Yorker magazine's Talk of the Town section, Lauren Collins describes an island not unlike our own.

It's called Shelter Island, lies cozily between the outer

prongs of Long Island and is a bit smaller than Salt Spring.

"Native islanders," writes Collins, "are bred to regard the exigencies of the ferry schedule with less annoyance than with pride; in homage to

their ability to run like rabbits for the docks they're known as 'hareleggers'."

One Arthur Bloom (amazing similarity, right?), a sixth-generation resident, reacted to the possibility of constructing automobile-friendly points of egress: "Touristas move here because of its charm and seclusion, then cry out for a bridge so that they will not be so isolated."

One afternoon, he and some friends were "just thinking about how to try to mess with the tourists' heads." They decided that a good way to "have a laugh around town amongst the local goobers" would be to pretend that there were easier ways to get on and off the island — i.e. the "Stirling Memorial Tunnel" and the "Sunrise Bridge." Thus was born the enterprisingly imaginative Shelter Island

Bridge and Tunnel Authority (SIBTA), of which Bloom serves as recording secretary, director of safety and security, rodent mitigation officer and chef de cuisine.

Among the services offered: "EZ-Path" express lanes, SIBTA bumper stickers, a website replete with photographs and its own motto, "Nulla tenaci invia est via" (for the tenacious, no road is impassable).

Then the fun began.

An official from New York's port authority (PA) e-mailed an inquiry about SIBTA's electronic toll collection system and about the signage

on the website showing an entrance to the tunnel built, according to its caption, "in the style of the Hypermatremian Tunnel which connects the villages of Ersatz and Bogusse."

You idiot, Bloom thought. It's a picture of the Lincoln Tunnel; it's your tunnel!

He responded on a sheet of dummied-up SIBTA stationery stating that henceforth only U.S. Mail could be used for correspondence.
