RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 1—Kindly apply to the Secretary for a membership ticket, enclosing \$1.50 as payment for same. Any person over 18 years of age may become a member by paying \$1.50 per annum.

Sec. 2—Exhibitors are requested to fill in legibly the entry papers herewith enclosed. Entries for Live Stock must be in the Secretary's hands by the 8th of September.

Sec. 3—The "Class Tags" will be given out enclosed in envelopes, together with pins and strings for affixing them to the articles.

Sec. 4—Members of the Association will be charged 50c entrance fee for each Live Stock exhibit. Poultry and Pet Stock, 25c. No entrance fee for Divisions VI.-XIV. Non-members will be charged \$1.00 entrance fee for Live Stock and 25c for every other entry.

Sec. 5—Entries will be accepted until 6 p.m. September 13th.

Sec. 6—The price of admission to the grounds is 50c; children under 12 years of age, 20c.

Sec. 7—Membership tickets only entitle the person whose name appears thereon to free admission.

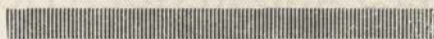
Sec. 8—All exhibits, except Divisions 1, 2, 3, 4, must be in the Exhibition Buildings, properly arranged and ready for judging, before 6 p.m. Tuesday, September 14th.

Sec. 9—The Exhibition grounds will be open to the public Wednesday, September 15th, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. The Agricultural Hall will be open from 12.30 to 5 p.m. No removal of exhibits will be allowed before 5 p.m.

Sec. 10—Live Stock must be in place by 10 a.m. on day of the Exhibition.

Sec. 11—All the Live Stock shall be entered in the name of bona fide owner, and said owner shall have been in possession of same not less than 21 days previous to the date of entry, otherwise no premium shall be paid.

Sec. 12—All Fruit, Vegetables, Garden and Field Products, Nursery Stock and Plants and Cut Flowers (except Wild Flowers) shall be entered in the name of the producers and shall have been grown on his own premises, otherwise no premium shall be paid.

Sec. 13—Exhibitors entering more than ten items are requested to lodge their entry forms early.

Sec. 14—Upon discovery of any deception or any dishonest practice by the owner of any animal or other exhibit which would influence the judge or judges in giving the award, the Board of Management shall have power to refuse payment of any award, and prohibit such person from exhibiting for one or more years as they see fit.

Sec. 15—Any person interfering with or attempting to influence the judge, and who shall on the premises of the Society use any abusive language as to the award made, shall forfeit his or her right to any premium they would otherwise be entitled to and be expelled from the grounds of the Society.

Sec. 16—All prize cards fixed by the judges or Secretary to exhibits shall not be removed from the same until the Exhibition is closed, otherwise no premium shall be paid.

Sec. 17—The prizes will be paid at or before the General Meeting which (according to the Constitution) must be called not later than the first week in January.

Sec. 18—The Society reserves to itself the right to substitute orders on merchants or others in lieu of cash for prizes.

Sec. 19—Should there not be funds enough on hand to pay prizes in full, they will be paid pro rata.

Sec. 20—Flags and decorations are the property of the Association and must not be meddled with or taken away.

Sec. 21—The Society will not be responsible for losses or accidents.

Sec. 22—Owners of all prize stock shall bring their stock out for parade when called for.

Sec. 23—Root crops and vegetables of all kinds shall be delivered into the show room cleanly washed.

Sec. 24—In all classes for pedigreed animals, a full and correct certificate of pedigree must be produced, or exhibitor will forfeit any prize which may have been awarded to him

Sec. 25—No person will be allowed to act as a judge who is in any way interested in the articles to be examined.

Sec. 26—Cards and Ribbons: Blue for first; Red for second, and White for Specials, will be placed by the judges on the prize-winning articles, the winner's name being written on the card.

Sec. 27—In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or articles exhibited be of inferior quality, the judges will award only such premiums as they think the articles deserve. They will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award the first, second or any premium. It does not follow that because a prize is offered for any particular animal, article or display that it must be awarded, unless there is proper competition, or unless the exhibit is really of sufficient merit to warrant the award being made. **THE JUDGES ARE PARTICULARLY REQUESTED TO NOTE THIS FACT.**

Sec. 28—The judges will sign the books containing their award before handing them back to the Secretary.

Sec. 29—The decision of the judges will be final.

PROTESTS

Sec. 30—Any exhibitor who may desire to enter a protest must enter such protest in writing before 5 o'clock, and must deposit \$2.00 with the Secretary, which in case the protest is not sustained, is forfeited and added to the funds of the Society.

If you have any complaints to make, go to the head of affairs and get them rectified.

The Directors, too, solicit your criticisms. They are always ready to listen to any suggestions that will work out for the good of the Society.

The judges at this show are the best obtainable, and you should not comment on their decisions. One may think he has not had fair play in securing second place. Ask for the judge who awarded the honors and talk it over with him, not your neighbor, and after you have listened to his arguments, let it sink into your mind and do better next year. These shows are given to stimulate further activity among the ranchers, both commercially and scientifically, and if you go home without learning something the day has been lost. Therefore, have a good look at the exhibits, make notes on same where there is room for improvement, and next year your long list of first awards will more than compensate you for the trouble taken.

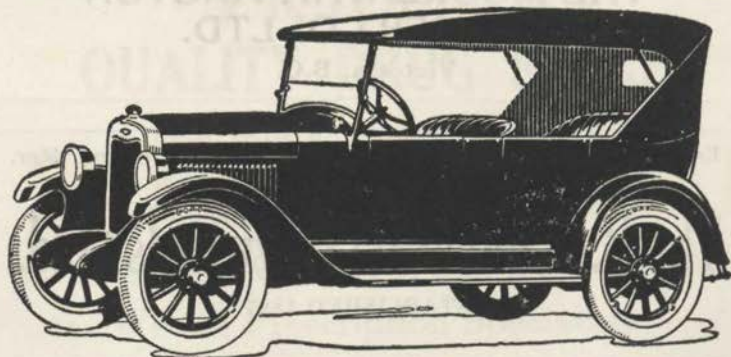
